From these quarters it is learned that although in the past it was known that disagreements existed between the High Commissioner and Mr. French, this was before the Land Commissioner com-pleted his survey. When the High Completed his survey. When the High Com-missioner demanded certain changes in from the Jews. the report, it is pointed out that Mr. French introduced them.

The official reason given to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency for Mr. French's resignation is that his appointment as Land Commissioner was made, first, to to allot the £2,500,000 Development Scheme Loan. Since Mr. French himself found the number of displaced Arabs to be very small and there is no money available at present for the loan, Mr. French cannot carry out the duties for which he was appointed. Hence his resignation.
