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Breslau University Closed As Nazis Renew Anti- Semitic Manifestations

Incidents Recur When Jewish Professor Returns to Lecture Platform; Policeman Injured

BRESLAU, Nov. 17—The systematic boycott agitation against the Jews conducted by the anti-Semitic National Democrats assumed a serious practical form in a number of Jewish districts of Warsaw where customers were prevented from entering Jewish stores and Jewish passersby were attacked.

In the Jewish tailoring district of Miodowa Street, force was used to prevent customers from entering Jewish stores. Similar picketing occurred on Bielanska, Wieszowa and Krakauer streets.

The pickets were students armed with sticks. Such a panic was created that the Jews closed their stores.

The police made no effort to interfere. (Continued on Page 4)

One plain clothes policeman was injured during the events. Professor Ernst Cohn who made his initial appearance as a member of the faculty of the Law School last Thursday had been compelled to suspend his lectures because of the attacks upon him as a Jew.

He decided to return to his course only after the faculty of the law school had issued a statement asking him to return and an appeal to the students to maintain order.

**Lubavitcher Yeshiva Closed
Owing to Lack of Funds**

19 Students of Lemberg University Disciplined; Four to Be Tried

Disclosure Made by Polish Consul General in N. Y.; 4 Students Under Arrest; Turned Over to District Attorney

Nineteen students of the University of Lemberg who participated in anti-Semitic attacks last week were punished by disciplinary procedure, states the Polish Consul General in New York, Dr. Mieczyslaw Marchlewski, in a statement made to the Federation of Polish Jews in America and made public through the Jewish Telegraphic Agency today.

Four students were referred to the District Attorney of Lemberg for legal prosecution, states Dr. Marchlewski. "These four students will remain under arrest.

"The Warsaw University," he says, "after being closed for two days, was re-opened again, the Rector being of the opinion that this was sufficient warning for rebellious students."

The statement of the Polish Consul General was issued in connection with the representations made by the Polish Federation with regard to the recurrence of anti-Semitic student disturbances in various Polish University towns.

Sokolow Reveals Executive Sought Unsuccessfully to Prevent Legislative Council

Says Wauchobe and Members of British Cabinet Were Interviewed Without Success

PARIS, Nov. 17—The Zionist Executive in London sought unsuccessfully to prevail upon the Palestine High Commissioner during his London visit not to announce the formation of a Legislative Council for Palestine, Nahum Sokolow, president of the World Zionist Organization reveals in an interview which appears in the "Pariser Hajnt".

The world Zionist head declares that members of the cabinet were also interviewed but the government remains determined to carry out its plans in connection with the Legislative Council.

Nevertheless a number of years will elapse before the Legislative Council plans are carried out in view of the fact that local self government plans must first be carried out and elections held, Dr. Sokolow said.

Order 3,500 Dunams of Haifa Bay Land Returned to Arabs

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**Insists Central Conference
Should Not Have Acted on
"Controverted" Political Question**

**Rabbi Schulman Holds Report of
Social Justice Commission a Tail
to the Kite of Socialism**

Rabbi Samuel Schulman, of Temple Emanu-el, in a statement made to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency yesterday, replies to Rabbi Edward L. Israel, chairman of the Social Justice Commission of the Central Conference of American Rabbis and reiterates his criticism of the action of the Conference in adopting Rabbi Israel's report on the ground that it was taking a stand on a controverted political question.

"If any Rabbi wishes to be a Socialist, that is his privilege as an individual," Rabbi Schulman declares. "But I object to the Central Conference being turned into a debating society on political questions, upon ways and means of meeting the present emergency by legislation upon which men may differ in perfect good faith and with equally exalted ethical motives. When I said that the Conference made itself a tail to the kite of Socialism, it was an exact description of the situation. The Conference met a few days before the election. There were three candidates for the Presidency who represented different types of thought on the questions of the day—Mr. Hoover, Mr. Roosevelt and Mr. Thomas. I must add a fourth one, Mr. Foster. As far as I know it was Mr. Thomas who advocated the levy on capital. Therefore I hold that the Conference took a stand on a controverted political question. Such a stand, I hold, is highly undesirable for the Conference as an intelligent person can readily understand. I may add that as an individual a man may say anything, but for the Central Conference of American Rabbis to do what it did, is most undignified, most imprudent and can

**Leaves Fund to Fight
Organ in Synagogue**

**United Synagogue Calls
Educational Conference**

An educational conference for the purpose of discussing ways and means by which the standards of Jewish education may be raised has been called by the Educational Committee of the United Synagogue of America, according to an announcement issued by Rabbi Alter F. Landesman, of Brooklyn, N. Y., Chairman of the Committee.

The Conference will be held on Sunday afternoon, December 4th, at the Jewish Theological Seminary of America, in New York, and will be attended by presidents of congregations, chairmen of boards of education, chairmen of Sisterhoods, Rabbis and principals of Hebrew schools, in the Metropolitan Area.

Rabbi Landesman stated that the conference would not only be concerned with the question of intensifying Jewish education, but would also take under discussion the practical question of budgets in Jewish education.

only make the Conference ridiculous," Rabbi Schulman holds.

"What does Rabbi Israel mean, as he says in his rejoinder to me and as he says in his report by the phrase: 'private exploitation of the profit-system?'" Rabbi Schulman asks and answers: "Any one acquainted with the literature recognizes in such a phrase an echo of socialistic theory. The present system is based on wages, rent, interest and profits. 'Profits' is a technical term in political economy. Certainly profits may be easily made to appear as unethical. But is the Central Conference of American Rabbis ready to say that it is willing to overthrow the present system and have an industrial organization of our country whereby 'profits' will be eliminated? As to ethical values, I hold that the present system, with all its faults,—and nothing human is perfect, and much in it can be reformed and modified—has profound ethical implications, and is carried on according to these implications.

"The only alternative to our present system," says Rabbi Schulman, "if it is to be abolished, is the object lesson at present at work in Russia. What I criticized is the sophomoric haste with

Philadelphia Court Refuses To Acknowledge Man Born A Jew Is Not a Canadian

Refuses to Accept as Evidence Canadian
Court Decision Upholding Man of
Jewish Extraction Not Canadian

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 17—Refusing to admit as evidence a decision handed down by a Canadian Supreme Court, a jury here dismissed the case of an automobile liability insurance company seeking to escape payment of damages on the ground that a man of Jewish extraction born in Canada is not a Canadian but a Jew.

The suit was brought against the London Guarantee and Accident Company, Ltd., by three victims who had figured in an accident with a car driven by Harold A. Green of Toronto, Canada, at Rye, N. Y., on July 30, 1929.

The insurance company negotiated with them to settle on behalf of Green. This they refused. Later the three sued in the Canadian Courts and all were awarded damages. Subsequently the insurance company denied all liability and repudiated Green's insurance policy, alleging that it was obtained by fraud. The allegation of fraud was based on the fact that Green, born in Canada, had stated he was a Canadian. The insurance company claimed he was a Jew and the Supreme Court of Toronto sustained the allegation of fraud.

Separate suits then were filed here. Grover C. Ladner, counsel for the victims, contended that the insurance company under our law cannot escape liability by repudiation of the policy after negotiating to settle the claim and after the liability of Green had been established.

Judge Marion Patterson refused a motion for non-suit and directed that the evidence be heard.

The insurance company did not put in any defense on the ground of fraud.

The jury's verdict of \$8,500 against the insurance company was unanimous.

Cantor Sues Consistoire Juif for Damages

PARIS, Nov. 17—A suit for damages entered against the Consistoire Juif of France by Cantor Jacob Katz, who was dismissed from his post on the allegation that he married a non-Jewess, concluded here today.

Cantor Katz seeks damages in the amount of 100,000 francs. The decision will be announced within a week.

Cantor Katz claims that his wife adopted the Jewish faith but is unable to prove that a Jewish marriage ceremony was performed.

The Consistoire holds however that even if the wife adopted the Jewish faith, Katz as a Cohen is not permitted to marry a convert because Cohanim constitute a noble Jewish caste.

Jabotinsky Calls for Arbitration Board to Settle All Labor Disputes in Palestine

Wants Board to Represent All Elements
in Palestine; Revisionists Will
Continue to Fight Histadruth

The creation of a non-partisan Board of Arbitration in Palestine, to be comprised of representatives of all branches of production in Palestine under an impartial chairman, by the Assefat Ha-Nivcharim, Palestine Jewish Assembly, and the Zionist Organization, is demanded by Vladimir Jabotinsky, president of the World Union of Zionist Revisionists in a published statement.

The statement sets forth the Revisionist position in connection with the recent clashes in Palestine between the Revisionists and members of the Histadruth, the former being accused of strike breaking.

Mr. Jabotinsky calls for the establishment of compulsory arbitration and neutral labor exchanges, all of which are to be subordinate to the Arbitration Board, to whom all conflicts between employer and employee are to be submitted, and all of whose decisions are to be final.

At the same time, Mr. Jabotinsky makes it known that the Revisionists plan in 1933 the creation of a second Labor Federation the purpose of which will be to break the monopoly of the Histadruth, the Palestine Jewish Labor Federation.

This will be done, he states, because of fundamental differences of viewpoint and because of the failure of the Histadruth to agree to the compromises which would have made co-operation between the two groups possible.

The Revisionists demanded the establishment of neutral labor exchanges, drawn on no party lines; and that the Histadruth alter its principles of class warfare. The Revisionists also asked equal representation in the administration of the Histadruth and on the editorial board of the Histadruth organ, "Davar."

The Histadruth, he says, after a year's delay, replied that it could establish neutral labor exchanges representing employers and employed alike only when requests for such came to them. Further it could not abandon the principle of class warfare.

Mr. Jabotinsky points out that the Histadruth looks upon the Jewish worker in Palestine as a proletarian with proletarian interests which are in constant conflict with those of the employers. If it should be proved that the interests of the Jewish proletarian demand union with the Arabs, it is not excluded that a Jewish-Arab Federation will be formed, he says.

"The Revisionists are opposed to this viewpoint. To them the Jewish workers are not members of a class, but pioneers," he holds. "The Revisionist has come to Palestine not to fight for his class rights, but to create a Jewish

Calls for All Inclusive Type of Organization To Meet Jewish Needs

Lowenstein Says Present Federations
Deficient; Lurie Calls for Change
in Case Work Methods

SYRACUSE, Nov. 17—The need for a change in case work to meet the changing order was stressed here yesterday by Harry L. Lurie, director of the Bureau of Jewish Social Research, at the thirty-third New York State Conference on Social Work.

"There is a growing reaction against the enlarged responsibility for details of family life assumed by the social case worker," Dr. Lurie declared. "We are beginning to realize now in social case work that we have over-emphasized personal factors and influences and have disregarded or have been little concerned with the equally important, impersonal factors and impersonal relationships of the individual to the social and economic order.

"There is needed a more effective integration of the case work method with programs of social work. We should begin to define the social problems for which we have used the case work method in terms of the lack of effectiveness of existing social and economic provisions for satisfactory economic, family and social life.

"We need to begin to think in terms of organizing social services which may use case work and relinquish the assumption that a case work agency is, in itself, the key to the solution of major social problems and less of a technician, skilled in the methods of adapting individuals to the status quo of social and economic organization," Dr. Lurie declared.

Jewish Wedding at Marathon Dance Barred

LANCASTER, Nov. 17—A widely advertised orthodox Jewish wedding ceremony which was scheduled to take place this evening at a Marathon dance here was cancelled due to the efforts of Rabbi Daniel L. Davis of Congregation Shaari Shomayme, who protested in behalf of the community against the profanation of a sacred ceremony.

The American Legion post No. 34, under whose auspices the marathon is being held, following the representations of Rabbi Davis, demanded the cancellation of the wedding and threatened the withdrawal of its auspices unless this was done.
