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Hitler Declines Hindenburg's Terms; Wants to Head Cabinet Independent of Reichstag

Leaves Way Open for New Negotiations; Nazi Leaders Asked to Absent
Selves During Jewish Ball

BERLIN, Nov. 24—President Paul von Hindenburg's terms for the formation of a government were rejected yesterday by Adolf Hitler in a communication in which he pointed out that the formation of a government on a parliamentary basis was impossible and undesirable as well.

Instead, the Nazi chieftain urged that the Cabinet crisis allows of solution only through a cabinet directly responsible to the presidential authority.

Hitler urged a cabinet responsible to the President who would be empowered to rule without the sanction of Parliament if need be. Declaring his willingness to head such a government, Hitler promised to place at the disposal of the president the National Socialist movement.

In Nazi circles, the report is current that President von Hindenburg is weakening in his opposition to Hitler

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Report Guggenheims Withdraw Gifts to Austrian Bodies Because Of Anti-Semitic Excesses

Report Unconfirmed; Representatives
Here Disclaim Knowledge of
Foreign Subsidies

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

VIENNA, Nov. 24—The influential Guggenheim family of the United States, whose subsidies to Austrian Scientific Institutions allegedly in the amount of thousands of dollars annually, have withdrawn their subventions owing to the anti-Semitic brutalities at the University of Vienna, according to an unconfirmed report here.

Many other American philanthropists and large donors from other lands have informed the Austrian government and the University authorities that they are withdrawing their support for the same reason, another unconfirmed report states.

This action has created a difficult situation for the government inasmuch as Austrian scientific institutions are now largely dependent upon foreign support, the government being unable to assist them.

Representatives of the John Simon Guggenheim Foundation, the Murry and Leonie Guggenheim Foundation, the Daniel and Florence Guggenheim Foundation and of Guggenheim Brothers, disclaimed any knowledge of subsidies to foreign institutions or of their withdrawal, in response to an inquiry by the Jewish Telegraphic Agency.

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Jews in Industrial Town Victims of Terrorization For Past Several Weeks

Confirmed by Communiqué Which Says
Terrorization Directed by Political
Party; Jews Certain Nazis to Blame

VIENNA, Nov. 24—The Jewish population of Wiener Neustadt, the largest industrial town in Lower Austria, has been enduring a systematic terrorization for the past several weeks, it was reported here yesterday.

Houses occupied by Jews and stores of Jews have been stoned night and day and the population reduced to a state where it lives in constant terror.

Although the terrorization has been going on for weeks the police have not as yet arrested anyone responsible for the acts.

The terrorization is confirmed in an official police communiqué which states that the acts are carried out in accordance with the plans of a political party. The name of the political party is not mentioned, but Jewish circles are confident that the acts against them originate from the Nazis.

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**Hindenburg Acknowledges

President Paul von Hindenburg of Germany has sent a letter to Rabbi Max Malina of the German-Jewish Congregation, acknowledging the cable of felicitations sent him by the Congregation on the occasion of his eighty-fifth birthday.

The President's acknowledgement declares: "for the friendly wishes which you so kindly sent me on my 85th birthday, I wish to express my hearty thanks."

Fellow at University of Penn.**

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 24 — Dr. Lawrence C. Wroth, librarian of the John Carter Brown Library at Brown University in Providence, Rhode Island, has been appointed Rosenbach Lecture Fellow in Bibliography at the University of Pennsylvania for the current academic year.

The award was announced by President Thomas S. Gates. Dr. Wroth is one of the leading scholars in Bibliography in this country, as well as in early American literature and printing. He is the president of the Bibliographical Society of America and since 1925 has been honorary secretary for America of the Bibliographical Society of London.

The Rosenbach Lecture Fellowship in Bibliography was awarded last year for the first time and was held by Christopher Morley, author and essayist.

The fellowship was established through a gift of \$20,000 from Dr. A. S. W. Rosenbach of Philadelphia, an alumnus of the University of Pennsylvania, who is a distinguished writer, bibliographer and collector.

**Judge Joelson Not
Elected, Recount Shows**

Henry Morgenthau, former Ambassador to Turkey, presided. Addresses were delivered by Acting Mayor Joseph V. McKee, Martin Comboy, Mrs. William D. Spornborg, Dr. Frederick B. Robinson, president of City College; Charles M. Schwab, Rabbi Isaac M. Landman, editor of the American Hebrew and Dr. Finley.

In his speech of acceptance, Dr. Finley said: "The greatest dream of my life has been that this land might be made a spiritual reservation in which Jew and Moslem and Gentile alike might develop a social order that might be a model for the earth."

Mizrachi Leaders Arrive for Convention; Optimistic on Conditions in Palestine

Rabbi Berlin Calls for More Middle Class Immigration from America to Palestine

Rabbi Meier Berlin, president of the world Mizrachi Organization, and Rabbi I. L. Fishman, chairman of the Executive Committee of the same body, arrived in this country on Wednesday on the Berengaria to participate in the sessions of the American Mizrachi convention which opened yesterday in Buffalo, New York.

Both brought back an optimistic picture of conditions in Palestine. There is no sign of depression in Palestine, stated Rabbi Berlin in an interview with a representative of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency. Nor is there any indication of unemployment. It would be well if more Jews would come to Palestine; American Jews, with small capital, would find good investments in Palestine, Rabbi Berlin said. It is a pity, he commented, that more middle class Jews do not come to Palestine.

Rabbi Fishman, too, is of the opinion that the economic situation in Palestine is good. In contrast to this, however, he said, is the politically involved internal situation. The recent crisis in the Executive of the Jewish Agency was due to the fact that Emanuel Neumann and Heschel Farbstein were always over-ruled in their demands for more immigration certificates for middle class elements and a larger allotment in the budget for middle class immigration. The truce reached is only temporary and a decision will have to be reached at the next world Zionist congress, Rabbi Fishman stated.

They were accompanied by the leader of the Palestine Poale Mizrachi, Aaron Ben-Nun, who will also participate in the Buffalo Convention.

Salomon Reinach, Last of a Famous Trio of 3 Brothers Who Played Role in Jewish Affairs

PARIS.—The death in Paris early this month of Salomon Reinach, the famous savant, archaeologist, and member of the French Academy, concludes the story of the famous trio of three Reinach brothers.

The eldest of the brothers, Joseph Reinach, the politician and champion of Dreyfus, died in April 1921, and the youngest brother, Theodore Reinach, the famous historian, died in October 1928.

The three brothers were the sons of Hermann Joseph Reinach and the nephews of Baron Jacques Reinach, who helped to finance the Panama Canal Company and who was also the father-in-law of the eldest brother, Joseph.

All three brothers played a great part in Jewish affairs.

When Baron de Hirsch founded the Jewish Colonization Association in 1891, Salomon Reinach was one of the eight prominent Jews, including himself, whom he invited to subscribe for the foundation shares, the others being Lord Rothschild, Sir Julian Goldsmid, Sir Ernest Cassel, F. D. Mocatta, Benjamin S. Cohen, and S. H. Goldschmidt. He was from the beginning a member of the Council of the Ica, and at the time of his death he was its Vice-President. He was also a Vice-President of the Central Committee of the Alliance Israélite Universelle, and a former President of the Societe des Etudes Juives.

All three brothers were opponents of Jewish nationalism and Zionism. Theodore Reinach once explained his position in the "Paix et Droit", the organ of the Alliance Israélite, by pointing out that at different periods the infiltration of heterogeneous elements in the blood of Israel has been considerable, and that the mysterious influence of soil, climate, regime, and surroundings, have gently but surely modified racial characteristics. To-day Jewry, dispersed over the whole globe, he wrote, has nowhere either a territory or a government which is its own. The Zionists will establish a small group of Jews, at most a million, in Palestine. Will that be sufficient to form a nation of this population of varied origins? What shall we say of the other 14 millions of Jews spread over the rest of the world? Shall we consider them as Nationals dependent on the Jewish State in Jerusalem? What a formidable support that would give to anti-Semitism, to the Nationalist anti-Semitism which falsely persists in considering the Jew everywhere, where he is established, as a foreigner and to demand that he should be treated as such. Martin O. Levy, Grand Secretary of the Order, Urges Lodges to Supplement Plan

PHILADELPHIA, No. 24—The 150 Lodges of the Order Brith Sholom are urged to adopt the Stern plan, in an article written by Martin O. Levy, Grand Secretary of the Order, in the current issue of the Brith Sholomite.

Discussing "Our part in a new community plan" Mr. Levy gives whole-hearted endorsement to the Stern plan but expresses his regret that it is limited to the Synagogue. This Mr. Levy believes can be remedied by extending the plan to include other Jewish units.

"It is generally conceded," Mr. Levy writes in this article, "that Jewish life in America is not functioning as it should. A community of upwards of four million souls should accomplish more, should be better organized, should respond more quickly to the various issues arising from day to day without the need of artificial stimulus and that ballyhoo to which American Jewry has grown accustomed.

"Like so many others, Judge Stern has given serious thought to these vexing problems. As a result of his study and observation he has suggested a plan for the organization of Jewish life in this country."

Following an analysis of the Stern plan, Mr. Levy continues: "For myself, I think the plan is a good one. It is fundamentally sound — with one exception. This exception is that Judge Stern limits his unit to the Synagogue. Whether we like it or not, the fact, let us say the sorry fact, is that all of Jewish life is not to be found in the Synagogue.

"These Jews should be reached not only for the Synagogue but also for other Jewish interests. Once Judge Stern's plan is limited to the Synagogue exclusively, the greater major-

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ity of the Jewish people are excluded. This is wrong for two reasons. In the first place, we have no right to exclude anybody from Jewish activity. Secondly we cannot afford to be deprived of the co-operation and the contribution of these people. It is in this connection that I think Brith Sholom can supplement the plan recommended by Judge Stern.

"My own thought in the matter is this: Following Judge Stern's plan, I would suggest, subject of course to the approval of our Lodges, that in each Lodge there be organized a series of committees, each committee to function in behalf of and to further a specific phase of Jewish activity. Thus we could have in each Lodge a Committee on Palestine, a Committee on Jewish Education, a Committee on Foreign Relief, etc. Each of these Committees should either seek out similar committees in the community, or go ahead on its own initiative and further the specific task to which it is assigned. Personally, I think a great deal of good could be accomplished in this way. If, for example, every Lodge of Brith Sholom had a Committee on Palestine, it could very easily join with the other local Committees when the signal is given. In this way Brith Sholom would be taking a leading part and making a definite contribution to this particular piece of Jewish work.

"In the smaller communities where no permanent committees exist, the Brith Sholom Committee might be the nucleus for such a permanent committee. It might take the initiative in organizing the city for just such purposes. Jewish activity of this type is strictly within the province of Brith Sholom.

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which to beat us? Whatever be the future reserved for the Jewish colony in Palestine, and I wish it all prosperity and all the wisdom possible, for the Jews of the West the problem of nationality was long ago solved. But he did not trouble himself very much about economics or practical matters, while I, since 1886 a member of the Alliance Israelite and one of the founders of the Ica, knew from many years of experience, that enthusiasm may be useful, but that it cannot suffice.

In a letter to Salomon Reinach, informing the Ica of the failure of the Sinai Plan, Herzl wrote: "The project which had almost united us has failed — but this between us — I have still a ray of hope, and if my efforts succeed I count upon you, yes, upon you, my excellent adversary, to uphold my propositions in your Council".
