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## Hindenburg Postpones Naming Of Chancellor After Kaas Fails to Secure Co-operation

See Some Possibility that Chancellor Von Papen May Be Returned to Office

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

BERLIN, Nov. 26—President Paul von Hindenburg today decided to postpone the appointment of a new Chancellor for several days.

The decision was adopted after the president had consulted with the council of his closest advisers.

President von Hindenburg will, it is believed, be compelled to appoint a new presidential cabinet, since Dr. Ludwig Kaas, leader of the Center Party, returned his commission after leaders of the other parties had refused to co-operate with him, the only exceptions being the People's and Bavarian People's parties.

Some circles see a likelihood that Chancellor Franz von Papen may be recalled to replace himself.

## Premises of Geserd Raided by Police

BERLIN, Nov. 26—The premises of the Geserd, the Society for the Advancement of Jewish Colonization in Soviet Russia were raided yesterday by the police, who confiscated a number of documents.

The raid is connected with a raid conducted by the police last Tuesday on the left wing Jewish Cultural Society where thirty foreigners were arrested including the president, Neviarsky, and the representative of the Freiheit, Lev Suckind.

The arrested are to be tried on charges of remaining in the country without permission.

The case of three others arrested was transferred to the public prosecutor.

A conference of the German Geserd scheduled for this evening, has been cancelled, the leaders fearing a second raid.

## Berlin Nazis Seriously Injure Cantor and Wife

BERLIN, Nov. 26—Six members of a Nazi Storm Troop today attacked Cantor Oskar Leibholz, aged seventy-eight and his wife, seriously injuring both.

Robbery is believed to have been the motive for the attack.

## Ask Immediate Convocation Of Actions Committee, Assefat Ha'Nivcharim

Revisionists See Grave Danger in Legislative Council; State Wauchope Strongly Favors It

JERUSALEM, Nov. 26—The immediate convocation of the Assefat Ha'Nivcharim, Palestine Jewish Assembly, and the General Council of the World Zionist Organization, in view of the danger of the establishment of a Legislative Council in Palestine, is urged in a resolution adopted by the Central Committee of the Zionist Revisionists.

The Revisionists declare that the establishment of a Legislative Council is strongly favored by the High Commissioner, according to information in their possession.

A Revisionist delegation visited Naim Sokolow, president of the World Zionist Organization and the Jewish Agency for Palestine, now on a visit here, to discuss this situation with him.

## Confirm Andrews Is Only Acting Land Commissioner

JERUSALEM, Nov. 26—Confirming the statement of the Colonial Office, the Palestine government today informed the Jewish Telegraphic Agency that no new appointment has been made to fill the position left vacant by the resignation of Lewis French, as Palestine Land Commissioner.

The government stated that Mr. French's assistant, Andrews, is merely acting in place of Mr. French.

## Counsel for Schwartzbard Succumbs to Poison

PARIS, Nov. 26—L. M. Goldstein, Russian Jewish lawyer, one of the counsel for Sholom Schwartzbard, who shot the pogrom leader Simeon Petlura, died here today under tragic circumstances.

Last Wednesday his wife, Sofia, active in Jewish welfare work, and president of the Friends of Jewish Students, died. Grief-stricken, Mr. Goldstein took poison on Friday and was taken to a hospital in a hopeless condition where he died.

## Christian Students Undertake To Maintain Peace in Hungarian Universities

Ask Minister of Education to Guarantee, However, There Will Be No Modification of Numerus Clausus

BUDAPEST, Nov. 26—Order was restored today in Hungarian universities, including the University of Debreczin, where disturbances have been recurrent in recent weeks.

The Christian student bodies resolved upon the maintenance of peace in order to permit the resumption of classes.

They demanded assurance, however, from the Minister of Education that he would thwart any attempts to modify numerus clausus and that diplomas of Jewish students who graduated abroad would not be recognized. In this way they hope to prevent the Jews who avoid the numerus clausus by going abroad to take up practice of their professions in Hungary.

## Anti-Religious Museum to "Expose" Jewish Religion

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

MOSCOW, Nov. 26—The Central Anti-Religious Museum will open a Jewish department for the announced purpose of "exposing the exploitative Jewish religion and the close contact which existed between the Czarist police and Jewish clericals."

The museum, says the announcement, intends to "prove by documents" that rabbis and religious teachers were employed by the Czarist government. It proposes to do so by exhibiting a permit issued by the Ministry of Education to one Moïse Leibov. This official permit from the Ministry is interpreted as meaning that Leibov was employed by the Ministry.

Another exhibit is to be a Torah scroll which the Jews of Kishinev presented to Czar Nicholas when he visited Kishinev in 1914. The Torah decorations consist of the Torah Crown, the Star of David, and also the Czarist Crown and a double-headed eagle. This too is to be used to prove the alleged relationship between the Jewish religion and Czarism.

A medal received by Rabbi Dublitzki from General Solonin, in recognition of twenty-five years of faithful rabbinical service, will also be exhibited.

All the exhibits are to be designed to show the danger for the revolution of the Jewish religion.

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## 204 Rabbis Surrender Control of Kashruth

At a meeting of the General Committee of the Kashruth Association of Greater New York, the decision of the Board of Directors was approved, that henceforth all private supervision of kosher butcher shops would be abolished and all butchers selling kosher meat would be placed under the supervision of the Kashruth Association of Greater New York, representing the United Rabbinate of Greater New York.

Samuel Rottenberg, president of the Kashruth Association, who presided, stated that this was the first time that a comprehensive city wide plan for a centralized supervision of Kashruth was developed.

The Kashruth Association is a development of a committee appointed by Mayor Walker last year to make a study of the entire problem and make recommendations of how to improve the enforcement of the Kosher Law, now on the Statute Books in the State of New York.

The first step in the program will be to create order in the sale of Kosher meats among butchers and eliminate fraud and misrepresentation, and that honesty in Kashruth should prevail.

The Kashruth Association will commence to issue its Certificates on December 1st and all rabbis will discontinue their personal supervision by January 1, 1933.

The Kashruth Association consists of two hundred and four leading rabbis of this city and one hundred prominent, outstanding Jewish laymen.

Rabbi M. S. Margolies, dean of the Orthodox Rabbinate of this country, is Honorary President. The other officers are: Samuel Rottenberg, president; Rabbi M. Rosen and Rabbi S. S. Soloveitchik, vice-presidents; Harry Fischel, treasurer; Abraham Levy, secretary.

## 73 New Students Registered At Hebrew University

Four American students are among the 73 young men and women who entered the Hebrew University for the first time this year. Thirty-six of the students come from countries outside of Palestine as compared with 15 last year, it was announced by Dr. A. S. W. Rosenbach, President of the American Friends of the Hebrew University.

Thirty new students from Poland have matriculated at the University this year.

Tuition fees in the amount of approximately £15 will have to be paid by all the students at the University for the first time this year, Dr. Rosenbach stated. There are 200 students registered. Twenty-eight needy students have been exempt from the payment of the tuition fees.

A special fund for needy students, Dr. Rosenbach said, in the amount of \$600 annually has been established by Sigmund Thau of New York, which will take care of ten scholarships for needy students. In addition 14 other scholarships and six prizes have been established by Jewish fraternities and youth organizations, the majority of them in this country.

A student's dormitory will be erected through funds collected by the Jewish Student's Association of London, which has already contributed the sum of £450 for this purpose.

Twelve students will be graduated from the University in January, receiving the degree of Master of Arts, Dr. Rosenbach disclosed.

## 1,000 to Attend North East Religious Convention

One thousand delegates and visitors, representing 157 religious organizations in the states of New England, New York and New Jersey, will attend the second annual convention of the North East Religious Union on Sunday, December 4, in the Community House of the Congregation Emanu-El, in New York City, according to an announcement issued by Roger W. Straus, the Chairman of the Union.

Mr. Straus points to this as a sign of the growing interest in religious activities in the north eastern part of the country, as the first convention, held a year ago, had an attendance of less than five hundred.

Members of the North East Religious Union include fifty congregations, sixty temple sisterhoods, forty-three temple brotherhoods, and four state religious federations.

At the coming convention special consideration will be given to the question of strengthening the work of existing Congregations in this time of difficulty, to the problem of the three hundred small, unorganized Jewish communities in the region, and the amplification of religious facilities for Jewish students in the colleges and universities of the region.

## Mizrachi Women Hold Convention Simultaneously

BUFFALO, Nov. 26—Yesterday's sessions of the 16th Mizrachi convention here at the Hotel Statler were devoted largely to the election of the various committees.

Sessions were suspended over the Sabbath and will be resumed this evening.

Rabbi Judah Levenberg of Cleveland presided. Addresses were delivered by Rabbi A. M. Ashinsky of Pittsburgh and Harry Karp, vice president of the Mizrachi Youth Movement. Max Nadler, treasurer, submitted the financial report.

Rabbi Ashinsky who was elected chairman of the Resolutions Committee stressed the duty of the Mizrachi in the Diaspora and urged the organization to prepare a curriculum for Hebrew Schools in the United States, based on the Mizrachi system in Palestine.

Mr. Nadler pointed out that the receipts of the Mizrachi appeals this year enabled the organization to cover its previous deficits.

## Synagogue Joins With Churches in Service

DULUTH, Minn., Nov. 26—For the first time in the history of Duluth a Jewish synagogue and its members joined five non-Jewish churches in a union Thanksgiving service at the Pilgrim Congregational church. The Rabbi Harvey E. Wessel of Temple Emanuel read the scripture at the union services.

However, this is not the first time that a Rabbi and non-Jewish preacher have cooperated in Thanksgiving services. For five years the congregations of Temple Emanuel and the First Unitarian church have conducted Thanksgiving services together alternating at their churches each year. This is the first time that both of these two friendly congregations have joined other churches in union Thanksgiving services.

## "Manchester Guardian" Opposes Income Tax Project in Palestine

Says Palestine's Prosperity Due to Its  
Absence and England's Drop  
to Its Presence

MANCHESTER, Nov. 26.—Strong opposition to the projected introduction of an income tax in Palestine is expressed editorially today by the "Manchester Guardian."

"Instead of perceiving that it is the absence of an atrocious income tax burden which accounted for the prosperity of Palestine, the controllers of Palestine's destiny now proceed to urge it down that descent to which the high income tax led England itself," the paper states.

## Report Renewal of "Dollar Inquisition" in Russia

WARSAW, Nov. 26.—Renewal of the "dollar inquisition" in Soviet Russia on a grand scale is described in a communication received by a Polish Jew from a Russian relative and published in the Warsaw "Hajnt".

The writer of the letter, who is described as living in the Kiev district declares that in the last two months "thousands of Jews have been imprisoned with the purposes of extracting dollars and gold from them."

The Spanish Inquisition represents only a fraction of the horrors experienced by Russian Jews arrested, in this fashion, says the letter. Food is permitted to be sent to the imprisoned only once in five days or once weekly and parcels must not contain food for more than one day, the communication states.

## 16 Jews Held for Deportation By U. S. Officials in Florida

HAVANA, Nov. 26.—Sixteen Jewish immigrants, seeking to make illegal entry into the United States via Florida, voluntarily gave themselves up to immigration officials in Florida, when their boat was threatened by a storm, it was learned here.

The immigrants will be deported to their native European lands either from Miami or from Havana. Among those involved are S. Frank, W. Rosenberg, L. Selarowitz, J. Berkman, A. Isaac, M. Wilmer, E. Kaper, S. Wolie and daughter Eva, R. Nashelska and son.

## Hungarian Anti-Semite

Gets Two Months in Prison

BUDAPEST, Nov. 26.—The Hungarian Nazi leader, Voes Zoernenyi, was sentenced to two months imprisonment for the distribution of anti-Semitic posters.

The posters, the court held, incited against the Jewish religion.

## Anatomical Institute Head Says Excesses Tolerated So Long As School Property Undamaged

Rector Threatens Serious Consequences  
If Disturbances Are Renewed

WARSAW, Nov. 26.—The Anatomical Institute of Warsaw University was reopened in a surcharged atmosphere with the head of the Institute, Professor Loth, himself adding fuel to the flames.

"We professors always tolerate student excesses, but only when the University property is undamaged," declared Professor Loth. "Unfortunately the latest excesses also caused 200 zloty damages to the University. Therefore energetic measures for the suppression of the excesses were adopted."

This declaration was made by Professor Loth after he had read an official communication from the rector of Warsaw University warning the students that serious consequences would ensue if the disturbances were repeated.

In this connection the Jewish press asks whether excesses will be tolerated if the University furniture is not damaged.

Professor Loth is notorious for his anti-Semitism.

## Council Refuses Permit For Synagogue in Quebec

QUEBEC, Nov. 26.—The Jews of the city of Quebec are aroused over the act of the City Council which passed at its first reading, an amendment refusing the Jewish community permission to build a synagogue in Belvedere Ward.

Opposition to the granting of permits for the construction of the synagogue had been voiced previously by the Administrative Committee of the City and Alderman La Croix representing the Belvedere Ward.

The anti-Semitic publications have already raised the cry that Jews will never be given permission to construct a new synagogue in Quebec.

Deputy Peter Becovitch has appealed to Premier Taschereau to intervene in this matter. In this plea, the Jewish deputy is joined by the "Canadian Jewish Eagle" of Montreal.

## Herriot at Banquet of League To Combat Anti-Semitism

PARIS, Nov. 26.—Premier Edouard Herriot will preside at a banquet on Sunday which will mark the occasion of the fourth international convention of the League to Combat Anti-Semitism.

Among the speakers will be the noted writers Romain Rolland, Henri Barbusse and Victor Marguerite.

The attendance of the French Premier at the League's banquets has become traditional. Last year, Joseph Caillaux, then premier, also participated.

## Polish Government Charged With Policy of Economic Disinheritance Towards Jews

Polish Jewish Federation Scores Failure to Prevent Recurrence of Riots;  
Says No Full Religious Freedom

The Polish Government is charged with conducting a policy of Jewish economic disinheritance, weakness in the matter of preventing the recurrence of the anti-Semitic University riots and a general failure to set an example of tolerance and equality by treating in its own domain the Jews on a footing of equality with their fellow non-Jews, in a statement by the Federation of Polish Jews in America, made public yesterday through the Jewish Telegraphic Agency.

The statement issued by the Administrative Committee of the Federation and signed by Benjamin Winter, president; Z. Tygel, executive Director; and Herman B. Oberman, chairman of the Administrative Committee, challenges the statements made by Mieczyslaw Marchlewski, Polish Consul-General in New York, with regard to the serious efforts being made by the Polish government to reconstruct the shattered life of Polish Jewry, religious freedom of the Jews and protection in the universities.

The statement of the Federation pays tribute to the sympathetic attitude of Dr. Marchlewski and to the defense of Jewish rights of Polish officials on the international scene, but declares the situation is wholly different with Poland itself.

"It is our contention," declares the statement, "that a strongly established government such as the Polish Government is, should use all its resources not only for the suppression of riots in progress, but also to make their recurrence impossible."

Continuing, the Federation points out "The memory of the excesses of last year being fresh in our minds, we cannot help but feel anxious about their habit of recurrence."

"We are well aware that the attacks were inspired by the anti-Semitic elements opposed to the present Government with a view to bring discredit and ignominy upon the present regime," says the statement and emphasizes that "the full severity of the law should be brought to bear not only upon the ignorant and misled followers of the reactionary opponents of the Government, but primarily upon their instigators and leaders. We believe that the laws of Poland give the government ample authority to deal with those subversive elements. The Polish anti-Semites flaunt the law so repeatedly in their destructive actions directed as much against the Jews as against the Government as to provide officials with the legal warrants to proceed against them."

Profound disagreement is expressed by the Federation with the statement

Editor, Jewish Daily Bulletin:

I should like to take issue with Dr. Drachman's statement regarding Spinoza in the Jewish Daily Bulletin of November 22nd.

Dr. Spinoza were living today, he would not be excommunicated from the Jewish fold.

It is quite possible that the seventeenth century Jewish community of Amsterdam, Holland, disclaimed Spinoza as much because of a desire to be acquitted in the eyes of their Christian neighbors of any responsibility for his heresies, which were offensive to the Christian as well as to the Jewish theology of the day, as because of any particularly Jewish consideration.

It is true that Spinoza's views on God, Israel and the Torah are entirely unacceptable to Orthodox Judaism today, and that his pantheism may never even be responsible for his heresies, which were offensive to the Christian as well as to the Jewish theology of the day, as because of any particularly Jewish consideration.

No Jew today is read out of the Jewish fold, unless he reads himself out.

The Jew of today should recognize in the frail leaguer philosopher of Amsterdam, the intellectual clarity and the moral courage which has given the Jew since the days of Abraham, the power to pierce the fogs of darkness and to break down altars of idolatry and superstition.

The Synagogue need not accept Spinoza's doctrine, but Jewry may well acclaim his life.

made by some officials that the government is making an effort to ameliorate the condition of the Jews. On the contrary the condition of the Jews is becoming catastrophic instead of better, it states.

"While it may be true that the reconstruction of Polish economic life along modern lines is responsible for the acuteness of the situation, it still is evident that the indescribable distress among the Polish Jews is the result of a systematic and relentlessly persecuted policy of Jewish economic disinheritance.

"The growth of the boycott movement is, we believe, greatly accelerated by the failure of the government to treat in its own domain the Jews on a footing of equality with their fellow non-Jews. Were the Government itself to set an example of tolerance and equality in Government monopolies, public works and civil service, the rest of the country would no doubt sooner or later follow suit."

The Federation discusses the discrimination against the Jews in the following terms: "We are not aware of any measures taken by the Government to do away with the discrimination practiced in the employment of Jews in the municipalities, in civil service in public works. On the other hand the growth of Government monopolies and the refusal of these monopolies to re-employ the displaced Jewish breadwinners add to the staggering toll of Jewish unemployment.

"The displacement of Jews by the institution of a monopoly in tobacco," it points out, "has been continued by the monopolization of kerosene and oil, salt and numerous other necessities. The contemplated monopoly in agricultural products will undoubtedly result in the further augmenting of Jewish misery.

"Add to this the rigid enforcement of the Sunday laws. The manner in which the Government recently attempted to deal with this problem is a just source for concern. It is, in our opinion, conclusively demonstrated by the sinister influence of the anti-Jewish elements upon the Government. For the recently promulgated decree allowing the two or three hours to trade on Sunday has been quickly rescinded and referred to the Sejm for further consideration, exposing it to the uncertainty of legislative wrangling.

"Contrast this action with numerous decrees of great national importance that the Government promulgates without reference to the Legislature," the Federation comments.

Turning to the subject of the alleged freedom granted Jewish communities to organize their religious and communal affairs, the Federation says, "We are sorry also to be compelled to dispute this alleged freedom. We point to the twentieth article in the constitution of

## 250 Students Study Hebrew in 2 High Schools

Fifteen hundred students representing twenty-five high schools in New York City participated in a demonstration on Thursday evening in favor of the teaching of Hebrew in the high schools of the city.

Judah Lapson, director of the League of the Jewish Youth, under whose auspices the meeting was held at the Textile High School Auditorium, was chairman.

Two hundred and fifty students are receiving instruction in the two high schools that have been teaching Hebrew in the last two years. Messages were received from Dr. Gabriel Mason and Dr. Elias Lieberman, principals of the Thomas Jefferson High School and the Abraham Lincoln High School, where Hebrew is taught.

Dr. Lieberman pointed out that one of the unexpected results from the Hebrew teaching is the growth of a better understanding between Jews and Gentiles because of the growing respect for the Jews as a cultural group.

Dr. Jacob Greenberg, director of Foreign Languages in the Junior High Schools of the city, stressed the progress of Hebrew in the schools and emphasized its importance as a living language which should be learned by more students.

## Syracuse University Spinoza Celebration

SYRACUSE, Nov. 26—The research group of philosophical and psychological departments of Syracuse University will sponsor a program on Tuesday evening, November 29, in Slocum Hall to celebrate the three hundredth anniversary of the birth of Baruch Spinoza.

Five members of the faculty will participate in the ceremony. Each one of the professors will present a ten-minute speech. Dr. I. Harris Levy of College of Medicine will open the evening program with a talk on "Spinoza the Man." He will be followed by Dr. Ismar J. Peritz of Bible Department, who will discuss "Spinoza's Bible and Religion." Dr. Ernst Thelin will explain his psychology; Dr. Ross E. Hoople, his philosophy; Dr. Paul Ward, his ethical theory.
