RIOTS SPREAD THROUGHOUT LEMBERG, WARSAW, VILNA, CRACOW AND PROVINCES

Lemberg Described as Resembling a City in a State of War, with Blood on the Pavements and Half the Windows of the City Shattered; Colleges Closed in Warsaw; Jewish Youth Fatally Stabbed as Evening School Director Looks on; Jewish Stores Closed in Lemberg

WARSAW, Nov. 30.—The anti-Semitic riots in Lemberg spread yesterday to Warsaw, Vilna, Cracow and the provinces.

In Lemberg the riots are on the rise and the memorial services scheduled for today for Jan Grotowski, the Polish student killed, are expected to provoke new disturbances of a serious character.

Lemberg today resembles a city in the throes of war. All the Jewish stores are closed and some of the non-Jewish stores as well. Increased police guards are stationed throughout the city with fire brigades standing ready to assist the police.

The press is prohibited from publishing any details of the anti-Semitic disturbances and only official communications are permitted to be published.

School youths are prohibited from appearing in the streets in the evening after eight o'clock, while the Jews hide themselves behind bolted doors, fearful of appearing in the streets.

The pavements are covered with blood and fifty percent of the windows of the town are broken, says the anti-Semitic organ, "Gazeta Warszawska."

A new and serious panic spread yesterday through Lemberg when a shot was fired upon a throng, estimated at 60,000, returning home from the funeral services of Jan Grotowski, and two Polish students were injured.

Thuringian Diet Commission Approves Schechita Prohibition

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

BERLIN, Nov. 30.—The Law Commission of the Thuringian Diet today approved a Nazi motion for the prohibition of Schechita, the Jewish ritual method of slaughtering animals for food.

The Nazis and the agrarians voted for the measure while the Social-Democrats and the Communists opposed it. Actually the measure, even if adopted by the vote of the entire Diet, is ineffectual since it can enter into force only when other states decide similarly.

tunity was utilized to incite the mob against the Jews.

Witnesses were soon produced who pointed to the windows of a Jewish house as the place from which the shot was allegedly fired. The house, it was later proved, belongs to an engineer, Jeger, who lives there with a brother, former Deputy Jeger. The brothers were ordered to appear at the police station. Later in the evening, the Jewish Telegraphic Agency learned by telephone communication with the home of the Jegers, that both brothers had been released. The windows of their house were shattered.

The shooting incident was the signal for riots throughout the city. Jews were thrown out of trolley cars, the windows of Jewish stores and their equipment destroyed.

Among the injured is Rebbe Waritz, who was saved by the police from his attackers.

States Hindenburg Seriously Considered Resigning as President

Disgust With Failure of Right Parties to Reach Agreement on Cabinet Cause

BERLIN, Nov. 30.—President Paul von Hindenburg seriously considered his resignation as the president of Germany on Saturday because of his anger over the inability of the Right parties to come to an agreement with regard to the Chancellorship.

This assertion is made today by "Der Deutsche," official organ of the Christian trade unions.

The paper sees such an act on the part of the aged president as aiding the restoration of the monarchy.

Adolf Hitler, scheduled to meet General Kurt von Schleicher with regard to the formation of a cabinet, failed to appear today for the appointment.

Cuza's Son Attacks Jewish Deputy in Midst of Speech Before Parliament

Deputy Weisman Attacked as He Protests Against Blood Ritual Murder Agitation

BUCHAREST, Nov. 30.—Mishu Weisman, Jewish deputy, was attacked in Parliament yesterday by George Cuza, son of the anti-Semitic leader, as he was delivering an address protesting against the ritual murder agitation conducted against the Jews by Jassy students.

Deputy Weisman sustained an injury to his eye at the hands of his attacker.

The interpellation was in connection with the agitation conducted by a student paper, "Curentul Studentesc." Deputy Weisman pointed out that the Christian religion is based upon the Jewish religion whereupon Cuza cried out: "Infamy," and fell upon Weisman, who defended himself.

The Undersecretary of Education expressed his shame and indignation that this incident should have occurred.

Later Foreign Minister Titulescu, in the Parliamentary lobby, expressed his regrets to Deputy Weisman.

Zionist Commission To Meet in Berlin

LONDON, Nov. 30.—The Central Office of the Zionist Organization announces that the Executive intends to convene the Permanent Commission on Organization and Propaganda, appointed by the 17th Congress, to a meeting to be held in Berlin early in December.

Among the problems to be discussed are the following: proposals for the improvement of Zionist work in the principal countries, the co-ordination of Zionist youth movement, and new methods of propaganda. There will also be discussed such problems as the co-operation of Zionist bodies within each country (Territorial Joint Committees, Territorial Unions) and the reform of the Shchel. The agenda further includes the consideration of proposals for the reorganization of the Jewish Agency.

Mr. Jacobs succumbed at the age of sixty-two to an illness of two years.

Mr. Jacobs achieved particular distinction in the realty field through his purchase some five years ago of the General Motors Building for the sum of \$12,000,000 becoming the only individual to own a building of such size.

He was active in a number of philanthropies, but did not desire his benefactions to become known. Among his interests were the Educational Alliance and the Home for the Aged and Infirm Hebrews, of which he was a director. Four sisters and a brother survive him.

Durant Pays Tribute to Spinoza

At Meeting Attended by 3,300

DETROIT, Nov. 30—An audience exceeding 3,300, which packed Cass Technical High School to capacity, paid tribute to Baruch Spinoza on the occasion of the tercentenary of his birth.

Under the chairmanship of Frank Cody, superintendent of schools of Detroit, addresses were delivered by Mayor Frank Murphy, Dr. Noah E. Aronstam, chairman of the committee which had charge of arrangements for the meeting; W. G. Bryant, consul for the Netherlands, who read a letter of appreciation to the meeting from the Dutch Minister of Foreign Affairs, and Dr. Will Durant.

Speaking on "Spinoza and Our Contemporary World," Dr. Durant traced the career of Spinoza and declared that this Dutch Jew was not only the greatest Jewish philosopher but the greatest of all philosophers.

"Of all the philosophers, he alone lived his philosophy," Dr. Durant said.

Dr. Durant added that the modern world is coming to place a higher value on the writings of Spinoza. The whole modern scientific structure, he added, is founded on "The Ethics," and he pointed out that Dr. Albert Einstein, the greatest of the scientists, is a devoted follower of the teachings of Spinoza.

Honoring the name of Spinoza, the City Council of Detroit recently named a street in Rouge Park as Spinoza Drive.

Marshall Memorial Building

Used for First Time

SYRACUSE, Nov. 30—For the first time yesterday the new Louis Marshall Memorial Science building of the New York State College of Forestry at Syracuse University was used for opening sessions of the first annual Forest Nursery Conference. The two-day convocation, which includes among its representatives the leading foresters of the country, will have all its meetings in the new structure, which was erected as an additional unit to the State Forestry College in memory of Louis Marshall, president of its Board of Trustees for twenty years until his death in 1929.

The new building is now nearing completion and will be officially dedicated sometime in February or March of next year, when leading figures such as the Governor, secretary of agriculture, chief forester of the United States, deans of forest schools and heads of organizations in the forestry field will participate in the ceremony.

At present workmen are engaged in putting the finishing touches on the interior of the building, and it will be ready for occupancy by the students the first week in February, the opening time of the second semester of the college year.

Rabbi Fram Calls World

Jewish Congress Logical Step

DETROIT, Nov. 30—In an address defining the position of the Jew in the world today, Rabbi Leon Fram of Temple Beth El declared himself in favor of a World Jewish Congress, calling the movement a logical step in the right direction. Rabbi Fram, in the course of his address, stated in advocating the Congress idea:

"With facts we can rouse the conscience of the world against its subservience. In many cases, especially in Eastern Europe, the disabilities imposed upon the Jews constitute violations of international treaties. Only then, by appealing to public opinion on an international scale can the Jew fight his battle for economic existence in Europe. The facts of Jewish self-defense must be presented not by competing duplicating Jewish organizations, not by a different Jewish organization in every country—they must be presented by the united authentic voice of world Jewry. Thus only will responsible public opinion be able to combat irresponsible agitation."

Funeral services will be held this morning from his home for Frederick H. Greenbaum, broker and philanthropist who succumbed to a heart attack at the age of fifty-four.

Rabbi Jonah B. Wise will officiate and interment will take place at Salem Fields Cemetery.

Mr. Greenbaum, a native of San Francisco and a former member of the banking firm of Lazard Freres, was a trustee of the Mount Sinai Hospital, director of the Solomon and Betty Loeb Home for Convalescents and a member of the finance and advisory boards of the Irvington House for Cardiac Children. His widow and a son and daughter survive him.

Deputy Ebner Says Many Jews in Bukowina Threatened With Expulsion

Unsettled Passport Question Responsible for Situation, He Declares

That many Jews in Bukowina, Roumania, are, from time to time, being threatened with expulsion because of the unsettled passport question, is daily brought to the attention of Jewish representatives in Roumania, says Deputy Mayer Ebner in an editorial in the "Östjüdische Zeitung," which has reached this country.

In spite of the terms of the Peace Treaties, many people, but almost all of them Jews, are not regarded as Roumanian citizens, even if they are living within the borders since ten, twenty and even forty years, the editorial states. Thus, they are considered foreigners, and whereas the Jews concerned used to live in the old Austrian Empire, where there was no restriction of migration or settlement, those who resided in parts which now belong to Poland, are now requested to have Polish passports, on penalty of expulsion.

The Polish Consulate is willing to give such people Polish passports, but complying with this formality does not yet solve the question, according to Deputy Ebner. Maybe, there would not be much trouble for the one individual or the other, to regard himself as Pole (the majority, however, declines to do so), but the material consequences are more difficult for him, since he, by doing so, finally admits his foreignness and will become subject to all disadvantages and restrictions of foreigners. Though they may, at first glance, also as foreigners be protected, in truth they are under alien rights, have to ask for a residence permit, are restricted in professional questions, etc. There is a probability that, later on, they will no longer receive the permit, and sooner or later be threatened with definite expulsion.

Dr. Ebner announces an unbending fight against this injustice, though admitting that, for the time being, there is little hope for improvement in the near future, since all Governments in Roumania have denied rights to the "citizens by Peace Treaties."

Governor-elect Henry Horner Marks Fifty-fourth Birthday

CHICAGO, Nov. 30.—Governor-elect Henry Horner, the first Jew to be elected governor of the state of Illinois, celebrated his fifty-fourth birthday by continuing at work in his usual fashion.

If you want to celebrate a real birthday, he told reporters, call the attention of the public to the fact that today is the anniversary of Mark Twain's birth. "My job is just begun. I am going to celebrate my birthday by getting ready for it."

Persian Jews Enjoy All Rights of Equal Citizens Asserts Foreign Minister

No Anti-Semitism in Country; Says Execution of Haim Has No Relation to Fact He Was a Jew

ISTAMBUL — The Persian Foreign Minister, Mohammed Ali Firugh Khan, during a visit here stated that there is no anti-Semitism in Persia, in an interview with a representative of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency.

In accordance with the Persian Constitution, there is no difference made between Persian citizens, irrespective of their race or religion, the Foreign Minister stated. The Jews in Persia enjoy all rights granted to the citizens of the country: they live in absolute security, and play an important and useful part in the economic life of Persia. They enjoy complete freedom in their national and religious life, in which the Government does not interfere in the slightest. There are Jewish schools in our country, Jewish national organizations, and Jewish religious communities.

"I authorize the J.T.A.," he said, "to state officially in my own name and the name of the Persian Government that anti-Semitism never existed in modern Persia, does not exist now, and will never be aroused there. Any rumors that have been spread about persecution of Jews in Persia are entirely unfounded."

"I should like to disperse any wrong impressions which Jewish and other

Honor Jewish President Of Bassee Municipality

BURMA.—Honor was conferred upon R. A. Raphael, the President of the Bassee Municipality, when the Hon. U. B. Tin, the Education Minister, presented him with a special mayoral robe and chain of office, contributed by the merchants and traders of Bassee, in recognition of his distinguished services for the advancement of the city's welfare.

These insignia, for which the sanction of the local Government was obtained, will be worn by the present holder of the Municipality as well as by the succeeding holders of the office on all State functions and ceremonial occasions.

Seek to Bar Professor Einstein as Communist

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30.—The Women's Patriot Corporation has filed a brief with the Department of State asking that Professor Albert Einstein be refused admission to this country on the ground that he was "affiliated with more anarchist and Communist groups than Josef Stalin himself."

State Department officials indicated the request would be refused.

Revisionists Score Zionist Executive in Call for Elections to Congress

State Reforms Inaugurated at Basle Have Not Yet Produced Tangible Results

LONDON.—The Revisionist fraction of the Actions Committee of the Zionist Organization, fifteen in number, have issued a statement criticizing the Executive of the Organization, as "we are on the point of entering the year of the Congress."

"Simultaneously," it proceeds, "we are confronted with the necessity for timely mobilization of our forces, so that the elections to the coming Congress may demonstrate a further and tremendous growth of Revisionism through a vast increase in our voting power! The activity for the upbuilding of the Jewish State on both sides of the Jordan must be proceeded with in all countries, in all fields and spheres of Jewish life."

The last meeting of the Actions Committee, it says, decided to recognize the separate Union of Zionist Revisionists, and thereby clarified the position of the Revisionist shekel-payers within the Zionist Organization. The constant attempts of our opponents to upset this decision are bound to fail.

The Revisionist influence upon the Zionist Organization, it goes on, has not been without result. At the seventeenth Congress the Zionist Organization was freed from that personal regime which represented the defeatist course in Zionism; the Left parties in Zionism who, for many years, supported that old and erroneous policy, were forced back on the defensive at Basle. The claims of the Left to retain their economic dictatorship in Zionism to the disadvantage of the Jewish middle-class and the non-Socialist Chalutzim were repulsed. The Jewish State resolution and our struggle for the definition of the Zionist aims which we tabled at the last Congress, compelled Zionist public opinion to recognize the true content of political Zionism and to oppose the liquidatory tendencies of Zionist leading circles.

It is not sufficient, however, to bring about the complete change of the policy and practice the movement hitherto pursued. The Zionist Executive elected at Basle has not gathered the courage necessary to free itself from the old course. As before, the Executive lacks every initiative, every constructive idea, and thus the reforms inaugurated at Basle have not yet produced any tangible result, the statement asserts.

The fifteenth anniversary of Temple Beth Israel of Albany Park, Chicago, was celebrated with a dinner. Prof. A. L. Sachar of the University of Illinois, was the speaker of the evening. The proceeds of the \$15 dinner went towards the maintenance of the temple's educational enterprises. Rabbi S. Felix Mendelsohn is spiritual leader of the congregation.

public opinion may have gathered about the Jews in Persia and the attitude of the Government to them, particularly in respect of the execution of Mr. Haim, a former Jewish Deputy in the Persian Parliament. Any people may have great men and may have rogues, and to say because a rogue was punished that a whole people is being persecuted, is wrong.

The fact is, the Foreign Minister said, that Haim was executed together with several Persian Moslems, who faced the same charge as he did, of high treason to the State, and that proves that there was no discrimination against him as a Jew. "We sentenced Haim, the traitor, not Haim, the Jew."

"The attitude of the Persian Government and of the Persian people to the Jews continues to be the very best. The Persian Parliament has at present a Jewish Deputy, Mr. Logman, who is an honest and respected man, who takes an active part in parliamentary life, and enjoys the esteem of both his political friends and opponents."

"The Foreign Minister spoke also of the attitude of the Persian Government to the establishment of a Jewish National Home in Palestine."

"The Persian Government favors the idea of the establishment of a Jewish National Home in their historic land of Palestine," he said. "My speech as President of the League of Nations Council when the conflict over the Wailing Wall was discussed, is sufficient to show what the attitude of my Government is in this question."

president of the Lemberg municipality were broken after the Municipal head had issued an appeal calling for the cessation of the disturbances. In this he was joined in individual appeals issued by the Union of War Veterans and pro-government students, who pointed out that the disturbances are aimed at embarrassing the government and disgracing it abroad.

The Polish Jewish daily, "Nasz Przegląd," and the Lemberg "Chwila," were confiscated yesterday for describing the disturbances.

In Warsaw many Jewish students were injured as riots spread through the University. Seven Jewish students were treated at the University for injuries sustained, by Professor Zambrowski. Among the gravely injured are David Gigaretan and Moses Gutfeld.

The disturbances spread to the Colleges of Agriculture and Commerce and the Polytechnic Institute. The Rector closed the University. The police did not enter the University campus but surrounded it to prevent the disturbances from spreading further.

The Agricultural College was closed as well, while the rector of the Polytechnic Institute warned that he would close that institution if the disturbances are renewed.

The streets of Warsaw are patrolled by increased forces. Special guards have been detailed to protect the large Jewish stores in the non-Jewish districts.

In Vilna the riots started in the Law School, where two Jewish women students and several men were injured in the attacks. Among the injured are David Faigin, Mayer Orlin, Jacob Wisotzki, Moses Alexandrovicz, and Wolf Regier.

The rioting students then proceeded to the streets, smashed the windows of Jewish stores and homes and those of the Jewish Students House.

Chief Rabbi Rubinstein called upon the District Governor of Vilna, who informed him that the Rector had been instructed to close the University in the

event of further disturbances. At the same time he assured the Chief Rabbi that order would be maintained.

Riots occurred also in Czenstochowa and Cracow.

In Czenstochowa excesses broke out simultaneously in several parts of the town causing injuries to many Jews. Ozer Freedman was among those seriously injured and was taken to a hospital.

In the evening the excesses assumed their most serious character, increasing the total of the wounded Jews.

Demonstrations took place in Cracow and the windows of houses of Jews were shattered.

WARSAW, Nov. 30.—A Jewish student attending night school was stabbed by his fellow students last night in the presence of the director, who refused to intervene, the "Hajnt" reports.

The Jewish youth, Yechal Kirschbaum, was fatally injured.

LEMBERG, Nov. 30.—All the Jews arrested in connection with the death of the Polish student, Jan Grotowski, killed during a drunken brawl, were released yesterday with the exception of the three directly implicated in his death.

The arrested were released following representations by the Jewish Deputy Sommerstein.

WARSAW, Nov. 30.—A Jewish postal official, Mark Hartmann, was killed last night in an attack by National Democrats on Koernica-strasse.

Hartmann, who was forty-three years old, was mercilessly beaten up and left unconscious in the street. A physician who examined the body ascribed death to a heart attack.

Jewish students returning to Grodzisk from Warsaw after evening classes, were attacked on the train by their colleagues, shouting revenge for the death of the Lemberg student. Two of the assailants were arrested.

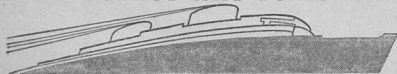
Excesses were also reported in Janowka and Storkrzwska, suburbs of Lemberg, where a Jew, Moisse Morgenstern, was robbed and seriously injured.

The pro-government papers in Lemberg and Warsaw sharply condemn the anti-Jewish disturbances and accuse the National Democrats of making political capital from the death of Jan Grotowski.
