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REICHSTAG PASSES AMNESTY REDUCING SENTENCES OF POGROMISTS AND DESECRATORS OF CEMETERIES

Bill, Affecting Several Jews Sentenced for Participating in Street Clashes,
Passed with United Votes of Nazis, Socialists and Communists

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

BERLIN, Dec. 10—Among the first bills adopted by the new Reichstag is a law amnestying persons who have been convicted for taking part in pogromist acts, the desecration of Jewish cemeteries and in the terrorism by bombs which was so alarming a feature of the period connected with the German general election during August of this year.

The bill provides for a reduction by half of the sentences of imprisonment passed for these outrages. It will also affect a number of Jewish workers upon whom exemplary high sentences were passed for participating in street clashes. These concessions are also to be applied to cases in which misdeeds are traceable to economic want and distress.

The amnesty will thus affect a considerable number of Nazis who are imprisoned for the numerous outbreaks and attacks on Jewish houses of business and synagogues and will also affect the terms of imprisonment passed on those who participated in the at-

tacks on Jews in the Kurfuerstendamm, Berlin, on their way to and from the synagogues on the second day of Rosh Hashonah, 1931. On that occasion scores of Jewish men and women were injured by organized forces who attacked the worshippers, surrounded the synagogues and beat many Jews as they emerged from the services.

The amnesty was passed with the united votes of the Nazis, the Socialists and the Communists against those of the other parties, the vote going 393 to 144 against.

Anti-Semitic Rioters Released As Jew Is Sentenced

WARSAW, Dec. 10—Simultaneously with the release of numerous Endek rioters who had been arrested for participation in the Lemberg excesses, a Jewish clerk, Moses Grinkraut, has been sentenced to two months' imprisonment for an alleged attack on Endek students.

It is significant that Grinkraut was arrested, at the request of the Chief of Police, immediately on the pronouncement of sentence, while no such request was made in connection with the sentences passed on the rioting Endek students. In the latter cases execution of sentence was not immediately carried out.

French Zionists to Perpetuate Memory of Carl Netter

PARIS, Dec. 10—Zionists in France are planning to raise a fund of £10,000 in order to perpetuate the memory of Carl Netter, founder of "Mikveh Yisrael," the Jewish agricultural school near Jaffa, Palestine and one of the founders of the Alliance Israelite.

The fund is to be devoted to the settlement on Jewish National Fund land of the graduates of Mikveh Yisrael. The plan was originally proposed two years ago by M. M. Ussishkin, president of the Jewish National Fund.

Breach Between Adolph Hitler And Gregor Strasser Affecting Alignments in Nazi Party

Nazi Fraction in Prussian Diet Publishes Declaration of Loyalty
and Allegiance to Hitler

BERLIN, Dec. 10—The breach between Adolph Hitler and Gregor Strasser, one of the leaders of the Nazi Party, is already beginning to have its effect upon the alignments of the different groups within the party.

Today, the Nazi fraction in the Prussian Diet, headed by Wilhelm Kube, head of the fraction, published a declaration of loyalty and allegiance to Hitler, in an attempt to counter-act the effect of Strasser's departure. The statement describes Strasser's action as due to Jewish efforts to break up the Nazi Party from within, and declares that these evidences of Jewish incitement against the Nazis must result in the submergence of moderate Nazi tendencies.

The fact that the Nazis should have felt impelled to issue a statement of this kind may be regarded as a symptom of the seriousness of the rift within the Party and the dissatisfaction felt by moderate Nazi opinion against Hitler's determination not to make use of constitutional means in place of his tactics of "storm and violence".

2 New Nazi Publications To Appear in 1933

BERLIN, Dec. 10—Two new Nazi publications will make their appearance in Berlin after the first of the year, it was announced by the "Voelkischer Beobachter."

The papers, which are to be published by Adolph Hitler, will be known as "North German Beobachter" and "Berliner Beobachter."

Premier Herriot on Briand Memorial Forest Committee

PARIS, Dec. 10—Premier Eduard Herriot has consented to act as a member of the Committee which will establish a Briand Forest in Palestine in memory of the late French statesman, Aristide Briand, on territory of the Jewish National Fund.

Reports British Officials

Buying Land in Transjordan

JERUSALEM, Dec. 10—British officials are buying land in Transjordan and are invading the country, declares a report from Transjordan which appears in the Arab publication, "Al Jamia Arabia."

British officials in Transjordan, according to the report, are cultivating large areas of most fertile land without intervention from any one. This danger, the paper says, is even greater than that of Zionism because who will dare to protest against such officials as Peake Pasha?

The correspondent of the paper relates that he was informed that Peake Pasha, the commander of the Transjordan Frontier Force, has acquired and is continuing to acquire thousands of dunams of land in the vicinity of Akaba which he has registered in his name at the Land Registry Office in Amman. These lands, according to the correspondent, are very fertile and even more fit for orange growing than

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Issue New Regulations Regarding Return Permits

The Department of Labor has now issued regulations regarding re-entry permits for aliens which will make it easier for certain aliens to secure these permits, the Hebrew Sheltering and Immigrant Aid Society points out.

The new policy has reference to aliens whose permanent legal admission into the United States cannot be verified from official records.

If the alien arrived before 1897 a re-entry permit will be issued upon satisfactory proof by affidavit that such alien entered this country for permanent residence before 1897 and that he has been a resident of the United States ever since. Such applicants will not be required to file Form 659 in order to obtain a certificate of legal admission.

Applicants who have come to this country between the years 1897 and 1906 will have to file Form 659 and will receive a certificate that they have been admitted legally. If they show proof that they have to go abroad before the proceedings attending the filing of the form have been completed, they will be granted a return permit and investigation and the hearing will take place after their return.

Yeshiva College Departments Have Large Enrollment

A total of 454 students are registered in the Yeshiva departments of Yeshiva College, according to an announcement by Dr. B. Revel, president of the Faculty of the College.

Of these 208 are preparatory students, 121 senior students and 25 post-graduates.

In addition the Teachers Institute has a current enrollment of 152 regular and 12 graduate students. In the academic departments there are 236 students in the high school, while the college has a register of 115 undergraduate students.

22 Year Old Jewish Sculptor Gets Spinoza Award

Gabriel Cohen, 22 year old Jewish sculptor of Brooklyn won the award in a competition for a bust of Baruch Spinoza in which thirty-two sculptors throughout the country took part.

The award was in the amount of \$200. The judges were Howard Giles, Dean of the Art Department, Master Institute; George Gray Barnard, James Frazier, Fausta Vittoria Mengarini and Pietro Montana. Cohen studied at Cooper Union and is at present at the Beaux Arts Institute of Design. Recently he won second place in the Paris Prize Competition of the Beaux Arts Institute.

Maccabean Festival at Madison Square Garden

The third annual Maccabean Festival, in celebration of the Feast of Lights, will be held at Madison Square Garden on Saturday evening, December 24th, under the auspices of the New York Zionist Region, former Congressman William W. Cohen, Honorary Chairman of the Patrons Committee, has announced.

Abraham F. Wechsler has been elected Chairman of the Festival.

One of the features of the evening will be the lighting of the Chanukah candles, the first time this has ever been done in Madison Square Garden, by Cantor Josef Rosenblatt and a choir of twenty-five picked voices. Harry Hershfield is Chairman of the Arrangements Committee.

Drive to Triple Federation Lodge Membership

A special drive to triple its membership of 200 lodges, fraternal societies, labor unions and synagogues is being launched by the Lodges and Societies Division of the Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies.

Invitations were sent out in a city-wide appeal for representation at a rally which will be held at the Community House of Congregation Emanuel, on December 18, at which will be discussed the group's participation in the present drive of the Federation to complete a budget of \$3,923,000 for the support of its ninety-one affiliated philanthropic institutions.

Felix M. Warburg, chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Federation, will speak at the rally, as will Judge Jonah J. Goldstein and B. C. Vladeck.

Henry B. Friedman, of Allentown, Pa., was elected president of the Allentown Lodge No. 916, Independent Order of B'nai B'rith, at the annual meeting. His election was by acclamation. Other officers elected were: Attorney Louis Stamber, vice-president; Louis Rosenberg, financial secretary; Louis Goldsmith, assistant monitor; Walter Silberberg, treasurer, and Samuel Markowitz, warden.

The Easton, Pa., lodge of B'nai B'rith has elected A. B. Jaffe, for a number of years its president, as president emeritus and also decided to tender a testimonial banquet to Mr. Jaffe.

Two Jewish Mayors Re-elected in Canada

WINDSOR, Ont., Dec. 10.—Mayor David Croll was re-elected by an overwhelming vote for a second term.

His duties as Mayor did not deter Mr. Croll from participation in communal affairs, and he has taken an active interest in all Jewish matters, especially Zionist and educational work.

Mayor Croll at one time served as president of the Windsor Talmud Torah and was a member of the board of Congregation Shaar Hashomayim. The Jewish population of the city is 1,500.

CORNWALL, Ont., Dec. 10.—Aaron Horwitz, Jewish mayor of Cornwall, has been elected to this office for the fourth consecutive term by acclamation.

Mayor Horwitz desired to relinquish his office upon the expiration of his last term but was persuaded to be a candidate for re-election. The unwritten law which does not permit a single incumbent to occupy the office for more than two consecutive terms, has been abrogated for Mayor Horwitz.

Dr. Fischer Principal Of Theological Seminary

BUDAPEST.—Rabbi Dr. Julius Fischer, one of the professors at the Franz Josef Rabbinical Seminary in Budapest, has been appointed principal in succession to the late Dr. Ludwig Blau, the great Talmudic scholar, who died last year.

Rabbi Fischer, who is 71, was born at Sarkeresztur, in Hungary. He is himself a student of the Seminary, where he has been for the past 27 years a professor and has now become the head.

After taking his doctorate of philosophy at Budapest University, Dr. Fischer was elected, in 1887, Rabbi of Gyor, and two years later he was called to Prague, returning to Budapest as professor at the Seminary in 1905.

He is president of the Hungarian Jewish Literary Society, and has himself written a number of works, including a life of Alexander Kohut.

Two Jews to Be in Utah's State Legislature

SALT LAKE CITY, Dec. 10.—There will be two Jews in the 1933 Utah State Legislature when that body meets in the first week of January.

Julian M. Bamberger, a son of the late Simon Bamberger, first non-Mormon to be elected Governor of Utah, will sit in the upper branch of the Legislature, the Senate.

In the lower house will be Irwin Arnovitz, an officer of the local lodge of the B'nai B'rith. Mr. Arnovitz was born in Pennsylvania and is a graduate of the University of Chicago and the University of Ohio.

Polish Government Gathering Evidence in Connection With Dr. Thon's Interpellation

Governor of Lemberg Requested to
Submit Detailed Report for
Comparison

WARSAW, Dec. 10.—The Minister of Interior has requested the Governor of Lemberg to secure from the authorities investigating the disturbances at Lemberg a detailed report regarding the occurrences, in order to compare the official reports with the interpellation to the Sejm, submitted by Dr. Thon, President of the Club of Jewish Deputies. This request is taken to have special reference to charges made against the Lemberg police for failing to do their duty, as well as the complaint against the authorities of the Lemberg University who were declared to have attended the funeral of Jan Grotkowski, who was at first alleged to have been murdered by Jews. The official participation by the University authorities was claimed by Dr. Thon to have served as encouragement to the rioters and as confirmation that the dead student had suffered a sort of martyrdom.

At the same time, the Rector of Lemberg University, Pastor Gerstman, has issued a denial regarding official participation by the Professors of the University in Grotkowski's funeral. He declares that the members of the University Senate were not present, only the Rector himself being present among the participating priests. He explains that he was there only in his capacity of Honorary President of the corporation to which Grotkowski belonged. It was in this capacity that he was invited to participate in the funeral. In addition the Rector of the Polytechnic has issued a denial of participation in the funeral, declaring that only the dean of the Academy was present as Curator of another student corporation.

Cincinnati Jewish Welfare Fund Campaign Closes

CINCINNATI, Dec. 10.—Cincinnati's Jewish Welfare Fund Campaign has been brought to a close with a total subscription which exceeds \$80,000, according to an announcement made by Alfred M. Cohen, General Chairman.

The leaders of this year's campaign, recognizing the unusual obstacles which they would have to overcome, were successful in carrying out their plans of seeing every possible prospect. Only 200 possible givers were not reached by this year's workers.

The following officers were elected for the Bridgeport Division of the American Jewish Congress: Samuel Melitz, President; Bernard H. Traeger and Mrs. Joseph G. Shapiro, Vice-Presidents; Sol Rosenzweig, Secretary, and Samuel Carp, Treasurer. An Indictment of Economic Oppression
of Polish Jewry by President of
Club of Jewish Deputies

WARSAW.—A great deal has been said and written about the means by which the Jews of Poland are being gradually forced out of all avenues of employment and subsistence. But it is rarely that so calm, clearly-reasoned and dispassionate a statement covering the situation has been made as that addressed by Dr. Joshua Thon, president of the Club of Jewish Deputies to the recent opening session of the Sejm.

The occasion was the first session of the Sejm during the past seven months. The main task of the session was the consideration of the budget.

Dr. Thon followed Finance Minister Zawadzky and members of various opposition parties represented in the Sejm. Zawadzky had admitted the financial difficulty of the situation and confessed that the income from indirect taxation and from the State monopolies had fallen by 183 million zlotys during the past six months. Most important was the minister's statement that the income from the monopolies alone, which had become the principal instrument of Jewish economic ruin in Poland, had dropped by no less than 40%. He also foreshadowed that the Government would enforce the severest measures against all who failed to pay their taxes punctually, a threat that has produced the greatest trepidation in Jewish circles where methods employed for the "encouragement of payment of taxes" have already been experienced.

Dr. Thon spoke with great restraint, dealing only with facts and not allowing his emotions to get the better of him, as would have been quite easy in the circumstances. He said that the Government had come to the Sejm with the announcement that it was faced with a large deficit. What did the Government do to ease the situation? It could think only of one remedy: more taxation and more burden, mainly on the urban population. Perhaps it was in principle a good idea to save, first of all, the peasants. It was said that Poland was an agrarian State, but he would remind them that an agrarian State could become a Great Power. If they wished Poland to play an important role in affairs they would also have to attend to industrialization and take part in the larger fields of commerce in the world's markets. It was therefore difficult to understand a policy that imagined it could improve the position of the State by impoverishing the towns. In the towns there was a class of citizens who were particularly singled out for treatment as step-children. Every finance office, every tax-collector who wished to make a career, devoted the whole of his attention to

Austrian Paper Publishes Letter Showing Nazis Favor Baptized Jews

Nazis Intervene in Favor of Converted
Jew Alleged to Have Supported
Nazi Funds

VIENNA, Dec. 10.—A sensation was created here by revelations published in the "Arbeiter Zeitung" to the effect that the Austrian Nazis are according favorable treatment to Jews who have been baptized and who support the Nazi Party financially.

The "Arbeiter Zeitung" supports its contention by reproducing in facsimile a letter of recommendation by the Viennese Nazi manager, Erwin Schaffar, addressed to the Nazi Premier of Thuringia, Gauckel. The letter requests permission for the return to Thuringia of the Jewish merchant, Theodor Auspitz, who was expelled from Thuringia by the Nazis. Gauckel, in the same letter, asks that Auspitz be permitted to resume his occupation in Thuringia, pointing out that Auspitz had in the meantime been converted to Christianity and had also financially assisted the Nazi Parties. He adds the observation that Converts like Auspitz are also worthy of acceptance for membership in the Nazi Party of Thuringia.

It is significant that the Viennese Nazis have not so far denied authenticity of this letter.

It may be recalled that the question of the treatment to be meted out by the Nazis to Jewish Converts to Christianity has also exercised German Nazis. It played a considerable part in the agitation preceding the German general elections and every effort was made by the competing Nazi and Stahlheim parties to trace Jewish blood in the veins of the leaders of the opposing parties. Thus the discovery that Colonel Theodor Duestenberg, second leader of the Stahlheim was of Jewish origin, led to a storm among many of his followers and was used by the Nazis for discrediting the Stahlheim organization. On the other hand this was quickly countered by the discovery, made by the Republicans that Dr. Wolfgang Saalfeldt, a Nazi leader in Holstein, was the grand-son of a certain Itzak Saalfeldt, a Jew of Posen.

Refuse to Grant Third Class Tourist Visas to Palestine

WARSAW, Dec. 10.—The British Consulate here has discontinued the granting of third class tourist visas to Palestine.

Tourists travelling first and second class are required to deposit sixty pounds as security for their return to Poland.

"Annals" Devotes Entire Issue to Palestine Subjects

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 10.—The current issue of "The Annals," official publication of the American Academy of Political and Social Science, just out, is devoted entirely to the general theme, "Palestine—A Decade of Development." Each issue of this publication is devoted to a topic of outstanding national or international importance.

The issue is edited by Dr. Harry Viteles, general manager, Central Bank of Cooperative Institutions in Palestine, Ltd., Jerusalem. He is a former Philadelphian and is now on a short visit to this country; and Khalil Totah, headmaster, Friends Boy School, Ram Allah, Palestine.

The past decade of Palestine development is considered from three angles—Government and Politics; Economic Problems; Education and Social Questions. These topics are considered from the Arab and Jewish viewpoint.

The Constitutional aspect of the Mandate for Palestine is reviewed by Dr. S. D. Myres, Jr., of the Southern Methodist University, Dallas, Texas. Aouni Bey Abdul Hadi, president of the Jerusalem Bar Association and secretary to the Palestine Arab Executive, discusses the Balfour Declaration, while Jamaal Bey Hussein, honorary secretary to the Arab Executive, writes on the proposed Palestine constitution.

Local Autonomy in Palestine is discussed by Isaac Ben-Zvi, Member of the Municipal Council of Jerusalem and of the Executive Committee of the Palestine Federation of Jewish Labor, and Director of the Political Department of the Jewish Community of Palestine, while Omar Bey Salih al-Barghuthi, lawyer in Jerusalem, president of the Ram Allah Moslem-Christian Society, member of the Arab Executive Committee and of the Jerusalem Oriental Society, reviews the local self government, past and present.

Rabbi Samuel Horowitz, a graduate of the Jewish Institute of Religion, and Rabbi of Sunbury, Pa., was recently elected to the Sunbury Ministerial Association, and read a paper on: "The Ministry and World Peace."

Rabbi Rudolph M. Rosenthal, a graduate of the Jewish Institute of Religion, class 1932, has been called to serve the Jewish congregations of New Iberia and Lafayette, Louisiana.

Leonard S. Waldman, president of the Jewish Community Center of Albany, was tendered a testimonial dinner at the Shaker Ridge Country Club, in recognition of his services.

this single one class of the population, upon whom fell the whole burden of taxation—the Jewish population.

"The Jewish population is weighed down with taxation," the speaker exclaimed. "They have no one to whom they can turn and are at the mercy of the callous treatment of the dominating factors. The Jews must pay; there are no excuses for them."

The Jews were now suffering terrible distress; they were completely impoverished. They had reached this pass not only because no one worried about them, because no one was concerned about the suffering of what was after all more than 10% of the population of the Polish State—but because everything positive which was likely to harm them was devised and carried out. Whenever the Government felt called on to take action in connection with some large scheme of social reform, she always carried it out over dead bodies—over Jewish economic corpses.

It had become a dogma that the middleman must be eliminated. And even if one admitted the justice of such a principle, there still remained the question of what was to be done with the people who were eliminated. For instance, the postal department had now gone into competition with the pedlars, eliminating them in their service between the villages and the towns. But what had happened to the middleman? Had they prepared for him a substitute means of livelihood? If they barred against him every means of subsistence, how was he going to maintain himself?

The speaker then dealt with the serious situation produced by the State monopolies, citing the example of the tobacco concessionaires of which 480 were Jews at the time of the rebirth of the Polish State, but of which there were now only 4. What had become of those who had been driven out? Here, too, no one was concerned. Jews were driven out of every means of livelihood by these monopolies. It had become a dogma that the Jew dare enjoy nothing of what it was in the power of the State to give.

On the other hand taxes were collected from Jews with unexampled ruthlessness. Executions were levied on Jews even on Yom Kippur, the most sacred day in the Jewish calendar. The executions were even levied in the streets in a barbarous fashion. Houses were entered at night and pockets were searched.

The latter part of Dr. Thon's speech was devoted chiefly to illustrating the virtual exclusion of Jews from Government service, now the greatest avenue of employment in Poland. Even in the exclusively Jewish schools Jewish teachers were replaced by non-Jews. A case in point was that of the Jewish magistrates. There had been a general reduction of about ten percent in this

Prof. Glicenstein to Make Bust of Harry Lapidus

OMAHA, Dec. 10.—Prof. Enrice Glicenstein, noted Jewish sculptor, has been commissioned to make the bust of the late Harry Lapidus, prominent civic, communal and philanthropic leader of Omaha.

The bust when finished will be placed in the Jewish Community Center as a permanent memorial to the memory of the departed leader, and is commissioned by the Jewish organizations of Omaha.

The Community Center was chosen as the permanent site for the bust because Harry Lapidus was one of the founders of the center and was its first president, serving as head of the institution for three years.

In addition to the bust, the establishment of a Community Trust Fund and Yahrzeit services will be Omaha Jewry's tribute to his memory.

service, but as many as sixty or seventy percent of the Jewish magistrates had been dismissed.

With regard to the situation in the universities and the schools. The intermediate schools were closed, and unless the impoverished parents stinted from their very food in order to pay the school fees, there was no chance of their children obtaining an education. Even then, they were not allowed to take up courses in any of the professions that promised a chance of a livelihood. They wandered away abroad in their thousands to study and when they returned home, after much suffering, the State did not grant the necessary authorization to practice their professions.

The speaker concluded with these words:

"I regard it as a simple duty, a humane duty, that the Government should as soon as possible give its closest attention to these questions, before it brings upon itself a complete collapse and an ultimate catastrophe. I have the feeling that such a catastrophe is very near. No effort should be spared to avert it."
