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Jakoby and Son Succumb to Bomb Injuries; £500 Reward For Apprehension of Slayers

Reward Announced as Jews Protest
Against Lack of Protection; Believe
Bombing Part of Arab Plot

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

JERUSALEM, Dec. 27.—Joseph Jakoby, Jewish colonist of Nahalal, succumbed this morning in a Haifa Hospital to wounds received when a bomb thrown by an unknown was exploded in his home on December 22nd.

Mr. Jakoby is the second fatality in his family. His nine year old son died on Sunday. The father's hand was amputated and it was believed that he was out of danger when his death suddenly occurred.

The Palestine government today announced a reward of five hundred pounds for the apprehension of the bombers.

Funeral services held this afternoon were converted into a great outcry against the inadequate protection accorded the Jews. The general consensus of opinion is that the bomb was thrown as part of an organized Arab political terrorization plot.

Representatives of the Jewish Agency, the Palestine Jewish National Council and other central Jewish bodies attended the services. The funeral cortege included virtually the entire population of Nahalal as well as of neighboring colonies.

Speakers included Dr. Chaim Arlosoroff, Ben Gurion, Ben Zvi and Sprinzak, all of whom emphasized the need for Jewish self-defense and a

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Discuss Economic Needs

Of Jewish Youth in Germany

FRANKFURT, Dec. 27.—A conference of German Jewish youth organizations was held here today for the purpose of considering ways and means of continuing the fight of Jewish youth for economic existence.

The Jewish youth is doubly affected, speakers said, being the victims of general economic hardship and anti-Semitic persecution.

The conference resolved to undertake cultural work in the small communities and to organize relief among the Jewish youth on the basis of self taxation. A small Communist minority which attended the conference was outvoted.

Francois Coty Denies Anti-Semitic Stand in Newspaper Interview

States His Character and Industrial
Interests Necessitate a Rejection
of Anti-Semitism

PARIS, Dec. 27.—Francois Coty, perfume manufacturer and newspaper publisher, notorious for his anti-Semitic incitement, completely denies his anti-Semitic stand in an interview which he granted a Strasbourg paper.

M. Coty, who as recently as last April accused the Jews of being responsible for the sufferings endured by the populations of Russia, Poland, Roumania and China, declares in the interview: "I am not an anti-Semite. I am not prejudiced either in favor of or against the Jews. I am far from anti-Semitism, be it racial, political and religious. Not only my character but also my industrial interests necessitate a rejection of anti-Semitism. Further, a number of my most important collaborators in industry and journalism are Jews," he is quoted as having stated.

M. Coty, in addition to heading the perfume company which bears his name, is the publisher of "L'Ami du Peuple" and "Le Figaro" both of which for years have intermittently conducted vigorous campaigns against the Jews and have spread the myth of international Jewish finance and Jewish aspirations for world domination. American Jewish financiers in particular were accused of being in the leadership of the alleged international Jewish plot.

Recently, M. Coty has experienced considerable financial and legal difficulties and has been made the defendant in several suits charging him with fraud in the administration of his business enterprises.

Palestine Commemorates

Ben Yehuda Anniversary

JERUSALEM, Dec. 27.—All Palestine is commemorating the tenth anniversary of the death of Eliezer Ben Yehuda, author of the Hebrew dictionary.

A week of celebrations has been arranged and efforts will be made to raise a fund sufficient to complete the dictionary on which Ben Yehuda was working at the time of his death.

University Professors Condemn Breslau University's Action Against Professor Ernst Cohn

Denounce Curb of Lectures by Jewish
Professor as Destroying Dignity
of University

BERLIN, Dec. 27.—Professors of various universities throughout Germany have united in condemnation of the resolution adopted against Professor Ernst Cohn by the Senate and Rector of the University of Breslau.

The resolution, which is condemned as degrading the University system as a whole, declared that "the continuation of Professor Cohn's lectures cannot be tolerated since Professor Cohn has not maintained the necessary political reserve."

The protest against the professor, who has been for months the target of Nazi opposition and attack, was based on a statement made by Professor Cohn in reply to a question by a newspaper man as to whether or not Leon Trotsky, the exiled Soviet leader, merits asylum in Germany. Professor Cohn replied: "Spiritual workers always deserve protection if they avoid agitation as politicians of whom we have plenty ourselves."

A number of professors have addressed letters to the "Vossische Zeitung" denouncing the attitude of the officials of Breslau University as destroying the dignity of the University.

Czech Government Increases Subsidy to Jewish Religion

PRAGUE, Dec. 27.—An increase of 158,000 kronen in the government's subsidy to the Jewish religion is provided for in the budget for 1933 adopted by Parliament today.

The budget provides for the sum of 1,808,000 kronen to be allotted the Jewish religion as against last year's budget of 1,650,000 kronen.

The tendency to support separatist Jewish congregations at the expense of the United Jewish communities through disproportionately large subsidies is avoided in the 1933 budget. On the contrary the subventions for separatist groups, such as the extreme orthodox group in Carpatho-Russia, show reductions. The support for the Supreme Council of the Jewish Community is increased.

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Hebrew Poet Splits

Warsaw Literary Group

WARSAW, Dec. 27.—The arrival here of Uri Zwi Gruenberg, Hebrew poet of Palestine has precipitated a conflict between the Hebraist and Yiddishist factions of the Literary Union here.

As a result the Union has cancelled a reception scheduled to be held in Gruenberg's honor. The Hebraists are now threatening to secede.

The conflict arose when the Yiddishists protested against an alleged statement by Gruenberg referring to the use of Yiddish: "In Palestine we no longer defile our mouths with the filthy Nalewki jargon."

Gruenberg, a native of Poland and a Yiddish poet for many years, gave up writing in the Yiddish language some eight years ago, and employed the Hebrew language instead. He settled in Palestine.

WARSAW, Dec. 27.—The Hebrew Pen Club has arranged a reception in honor of Uri Zwi Gruenberg, Hebrew poet of Palestine.

The reception will take the place of the one scheduled by the Jewish Literary Union before its membership came into conflict on the subject of Mr. Gruenberg's views of the Yiddish language.

Leading Leipzig Fur

Merchant Succumbs

LEIPZIG, Dec. 27.—Chaim Eitingon, senior partner of the Eitingon Fur Company, an outstanding fur firm, died here at the age of seventy-three.

Herr Eitingon was prominently identified with welfare activities in this city. He endowed the Leipzig Jewish Hospital and was a generous donor to other welfare institutions. A leading thoroughfare in this city is named Eitingon-strasse in his honor.

Abbas Hilmi, Ex-Khedive of Egypt, Arrives in Palestine

JERUSALEM, Dec. 27.—Abbas Hilmi, former Khedive of Egypt, active in the movement to create a Pan Arabic Federation arrived in Palestine on Sunday.

Abbas Hilmi was accompanied by a Jewish secretary, Alexander Meisel.

The former Khedive recently denied to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency that he has any intention of taking an active part in political affairs in Palestine.

At the time he expressed the view that the solution of the Jewish problem in Palestine would be for Jews to become Arabs.

Expressing his views on the Pan Arabic movement, the former Khedive stated that it depends on the shape the movement assumes and who will head it. He stated that he is in very friendly relations with King Feisal, though his relations with Emir Abdullah are more intimate. Not long ago he received a letter from King Feisal. Without disclosing the contents of the letter, he stated that he had refused to participate actively in any Pan-Arabic or kindred movement, preferring to remain outside as a looker-on. At the same time, the Pan-Arabic movement is more to his taste than the Pan-Islamic movement, which in his opinion is doomed to failure.

Friedemann, Close Associate Of Herzl, Dies at 62

AMSTERDAM, Dec. 27.—Adolf Friedemann, prominent Zionist leader and writer of Germany, a close associate of Theodor Herzl, succumbed here yesterday at the age of sixty-two.

Mr. Friedemann, who was born in Berlin in 1871, had lived in Amsterdam since 1930. He served as Herzl's Zionist secretary for a period and accompanied him on his first visit to Egypt in 1902.

Mr. Friedemann was the author of the first biography of Theodor Herzl, published in 1919. From 1902 to 1920 he was a member of the Actions Committee of the World Zionist Organization and a director of the Jewish Colonial Trust.

Funeral Services Today

For V. Schwartz

Funeral services will be held this morning for Velvel Schwartz, prominently identified with the Poale Zion Party, who died suddenly of a heart attack yesterday morning in his forty-fifth year.

Mr. Schwartz succumbed in the home of his friend, S. Boncheck, Poale Zion leader. He was a native of Russia and came to this country in 1907. Mr. Schwartz was active in the Cutter's Local No. 10 and in the Jewish National Workers' Alliance. He had served with the Jewish Legion in Palestine. The Jewish National Workers' Alliance is arranging the funeral.

15,000 At Chanukah Celebration At Madison Square Garden

With Governor Herbert H. Lehman as the guest of honor, making his last public appearance for many months, as he announced, the Maccabean Festival, arranged by the New York Zionist Region at Madison Square Garden, December 24, brought together 15,000 Jews in celebration of the Chanukah holiday. Stars of stage, screen, radio and opera, with Harry Hershfield as master of ceremonies, provided the entertainment program, of which the features were the kindling of the lights by Cantor Josef Rosenblatt and a choir of twenty-five, and the singing of a 120-voice choir under the direction of Leo Low, well-known Jewish composer and conductor.

The Festival, which was conceived three years ago by Morris Margulies, was hailed by those present as the most effective celebration of Chanukah held in the history of the New York Jewish community. Morris Margulies, who is secretary of the New York Zionist Region and of the Zionist Organization of America, was given high praise for his part in the conception of the Festival and for the carrying out of its many details. Abraham F. Wechsler, chairman of the Festival Committee, was chairman of the evening.

The speakers included Governor Herbert H. Lehman, Morris Rothenberg, president of the Zionist Organization of America, and former Congressman William W. Cohen. President-elect Roosevelt sent the following message to the Festival:

"Please convey to all the participants in the Maccabean Festival my greetings and good wishes. This occasion recalls the fortitude of Judas Maccabee and the rededication of the shrine of his people. The name is a symbol of courage, vision and faith, and the kindling of the lights is an emblem of enlightenment not only for the people of Israel but for the non-Jewish peoples as well."

Governor-elect Lehman said: "The Maccabees have always been a symbol and a guide. They stood by their ideas unafraid and prepared to sacrifice their lives if necessary so that their faith might not perish. Their example of bravery and vision can well be emulated in our own time. We have need of the spirit of steadfastness and patience. On all sides forces rise to crush spirituality and to debase human values. In ancient days it was Antiochus who tried to impose idols upon the people. In these days there are other forces which, taking advantage of the circumstances, try to substitute false ideals and values for those sound, constructive doctrines of progress and liberalism which should guide and influence all communities, regardless of faith and denomination.

"In this beloved country of ours we can play a great part in the advance of mankind and in the maintenance of

Lord Melchett Arrives in Poland in Interests of Maccabee Association

Is Guest at Reception; Will Be Received by Foreign and Interior Ministers

WARSAW, Dec. 27.—Lord Melchett, honorary president of the World Maccabee Association, arrived here yesterday to confer on the Maccabee Olympiad to be held in Zakopane on February 2nd to 5th.

The Polish Ambassador in London had advised the Foreign Office of Lord Melchett's visit. Lord Melchett will be received by the Foreign Minister and the Minister of Interior tomorrow.

Yesterday afternoon Lord Melchett was the guest of honor at a reception arranged by the Zionist Organization which was attended by representatives of the Foreign Office.

Earlier in the day Lord Melchett was received by the British Ambassador.

Declaring that his only purpose in visiting Poland at this time is in the interests of the Maccabee Association, Lord Melchett said he is convinced that Jewish muscles are better than the Jewish brain. His aim will be to increase the membership in the Maccabee organization from one hundred thousand to one million. He also expressed the conviction that the non-Jewish world will ultimately recognize the rights of the Jews to equality.

In an interview with the representative of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency here Lord Melchett stated that he plans to discuss the position of the Jews with members of the Polish and Roumanian governments. He will emphasize in particular the right of the Jewish youth to work.

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Zionists Call National Youth Conference To Be Held in February

Administrative Committee Reports Progress in Work; Junior Hadassah Convention

An increase in the membership of the Zionist Organization of America, improvement in its financial status and an enlargement of its various activities were reported to the members of the Administrative Committee of the Organization at a meeting held at the Hotel Astor on Monday, at which Morris Rothenberg, President, presided.

In a report on membership presented by Morris Margulies, Secretary, it was stated that more than 260 Zionist meetings have been held in the last four months in more than 100 cities. This does not include the various other functions held, of which no report was made to the national headquarters. The membership report also indicated that hundreds of members had been enrolled within the Zionist Organization who had never before been affiliated with the movement.

Harry P. Fierst, Treasurer of the Zionist Organization of America, presented a financial report showing that the Zionist Organization has lived within its income and had been able to weather the summer months without a deficit, a procedure never before possible in the Zionist Organization. An improved financial condition for the Zionist Organization has been made possible, the treasurer reported, because of a reduction in expenses and a larger income, the latter largely due to a trans-continental tour by Mr. Rothenberg.

Reviewing the activities of the Zionist Organization since the last meeting of the Administrative Committee, Mr. Rothenberg referred to the two letters he had recently received; one from President Hoover and one from President-elect Franklin D. Roosevelt, expressing their fullest support of the Zionist movement. These statements received wide-spread comment in the European and Palestinian press, Mr. Rothenberg reported.

The Administrative Committee also dealt with new plans for membership. A Committee was appointed to formulate the final plan of the many suggestions that have been offered. Mr. Rothenberg also reported on the progress that has been made in bringing the youth of America closer to the Zionist movement. He announced that a National Conference on Youth would be held on February 12 and 13, under the auspices of the Zionist Organization of America. Educators and communal leaders from all parts of the United States will be invited to attend this Conference, which is expected to have a very great influence on the future youth activities in the United

Gombos Hopes for Inter-Denominational Amity Among Jews as Well as Christians

Christmas Message to Hungarians in America Says Many Jews Work for Hungarian Cause

The hope that there will be inter-denominational amity among Jews as well as Christians during the coming year is expressed by Premier Julius Gombos of Hungary in a Christmas message to Hungarians in America issued through the Amerikai Magyar Nepszava of New York.

Premier Gombos, who was formerly the leader of the Hungarian anti-Semitic party, has repeatedly expressed his desire to treat the Jews on a parity with all other citizens of Hungary since he assumed office as Premier last September.

In his Christmas message, he declared: "In order to achieve Hungary's rights, it is first of all necessary that our nation be united. As a believing Protestant, I fervently wish for inter-denominational amity among our Christian as well as our Jewish citizenry. For I have known ever so many Jewish men of valor and other upright Jews, all of whom pray with us for the triumph of the Hungarian cause."

The father, who is still in a hospital at Haifa, had his hand amputated.

All Nahalal suspended work yesterday to participate in the funeral services for the child which were turned into a demonstration against the recent outrages in various parts of Palestine.

The entire Hebrew press unites in demanding the reorganization of the Police Department in the Haifa District. The papers recall the outrages against Jews in Yajour and Kfar Hassidim and ascribe their occurrence to the leniency of the police.

Dr. Chaim Arlosoroff, member of the Jewish Agency Executive in charge of political affairs, attended the funeral services and called upon the government to end the terror.

Nahum Sokolow, president of the Jewish Agency for Palestine, addressing a Chanukah celebration in Tel Aviv, referred to the bombing outrage and called upon the government to take steps to prevent the recurrence of such incidents.

First Professing Jew to Be Named Polish General

WARSAW, Dec. 27—Colonel Bernard Mond of Gracow will be appointed a Brigadier General in the New Year's honors, it is forecast here today.

Colonel Mond will be the first Jew to be named to such high military rank, the Jewish press points out. While numerous Jewish converts to Christianity hold the highest posts in the army, this is the first time a professing Jew will be thus honored, the papers declare.

Funeral services were held on Monday for Samuel Schwartz, realtor, who died at the age of sixty-five.

Mr. Schwartz, who was a native of Jassy, Roumania, settled in New York in his youth. He was a director of the Menorah Home for the Aged and Infirm and of the Agudath Jewish Free Burial Association and of the First Yiddishman Jewish Congregation.
