Jewish Merchants Appeal For Special Consideration On Trading Licenses

Unable to Pay for Licenses as Their Business Was Ruined by Anti-Semitic Riots, and Boycott Agitation

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

LEMBERG, Dec. 30—Several hundred Jewish merchants have approached the Jewish Merchants Union here with an appeal that the organization intervene with the authorities in their behalf for an extension of the period of payment for new trading licenses.

Their business has been completely ruined by the anti-Semitic excesses which occurred late last month and early in December and by the anti-Semitic boycott agitation which prevented them from benefitting from the Christmas trade, the merchants declared.

As the situation stands at present, they are unable to make payment for the licenses for the new year. Trading without licenses is forbidden.

The Club of Jewish Denialists in the Polish Sejm in its interpellation on the anti-Jewish excesses in Poland asked for a moratorium for Jewish merchants in view of the great damages suffered by them.

The Menorah Organization held a

700 Students and Alumni Of Breslau University Protest Action Against Cohn

Score Declaration of University Senate and Rector Against Jewish Professor

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

BRESLAU, Dec. 30—Seven hundred students and alumni of the University of Breslau issued a joint protest yesterday against the condemnatory statement against Professor Ernst Cohn of the University, issued by the Rector and Senate.

Professor Cohn, who has for months been the target of attack by the Nazis at the University because he is a Jew, attacks which led to the closing of the institution on several occasions, had in the past been protected by the rector and the faculty.

Last Saturday, however, the Senate of the University, joined by Rector

Comzet and Ozet Leaders Pessimistic Regarding Immigration to Jewish Regions

Hold Jewish Regions Not Prepared to Receive Immigrants Scheduled for 1933

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

MOSCOW, Dec. 30—Pessimism with regard to the immigration to the Jewish regions scheduled for the year 1933 was expressed here by leaders of the Comzet, the governmental department for settling Jews on the land and in industry, and of the Ozet, Jewish land settlement organization, at a conference held here in the offices of the "Emess".

Boris Trotski, the Comzet director, reported that the information reaching his organization from the Ukraine indicates that Jewish regions there are unprepared to receive the scheduled number of 2,400 immigrant families.

Reporting on the situation in Bira Bidjan, the Far Eastern district where an autonomous Jewish region is to be set up, the secretary of the Central Ozet, Eidelman, pointed out that the

Urges Jewish Unemployed Be Settled on Land in France

PARIS, Dec. 30—An appeal for the settlement on land of unemployed Jewish immigrants in France was made by the Chief Rabbi of Metz in a communication addressed to a meeting of the Jewish Youth Goodwill Society here.

The Chief Rabbi proposed the creation of a special fund to assist the Jews to settle on the land in France. He urged that this activity can be undertaken without prejudicing in any way Palestine endeavors.

First Jewish Funeral In Spanish Town

MADRID, Dec. 30—The first Jewish funeral in San Sebastian, Spain was held here yesterday for a Moroccan Jew, Nahon.

In order to conduct the service in accordance with the Jewish tradition, however, a minyan and a Rabbi had to be brought from a neighboring town, the French town of Bayonne.

Jewish Merchants Demand Austrian Government Protect Their Shops

Merchants Association Presents Memo- randum of Protest Against Nazi Ter- rorization to Chancellor Dollfuss

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

VIENNA, Dec. 30—Government protection of shops owned by Jews which are the target of attack and agitation by the Nazis was demanded today in a memorandum submitted to Chancellor Dollfuss by Jewish merchants organizations.

Protesting against the anti-Jewish boycott agitation which has spread throughout the country, the memorandum demands that the government take measures to prevent the attacks and to punish the Nazi agitators with the full force of the law.

The memorandum also insists that those responsible for disseminating the Nazi anti-Jewish boycott propaganda be held for trial. They insist that the conduct of this agitation is contrary to the constitutional provisions for the protection of the Jews.

The Jewish Community of Vienna will also make representations to the authorities on the same matter.

The government has deferred its reply to the memorandum.

Professor Max Liebermann Named Vice-Chancellor of Art and Science Order

Elected to Office in Knights of Order of Merit for Science and Art; In- ternationally Famed Painter

BERLIN, Dec. 30—Professor Max Liebermann, internationally renowned Jewish artist and honorary president of the Prussian Academy of Art was yesterday elected Vice-Chancellor of the Knights of the Order of Merit for Science and Art.

Professor Liebermann, who is eighty-five years old, is Dean of German painters and an outstanding exponent of German impressionism.

Last May, Professor Liebermann resigned as president of the Prussian Academy of Art, a position which he had held for sixteen years and to which he had been elected for life. At the time it was thought that Nazi

Open \$100,000 Campaign for Mizrachi Palestine Fund

The Mizrachi of America has formally opened its campaign for the year 1933 to raise one hundred thousand dollars for the Mizrachi Palestine Fund, as was announced by Rabbi Wolf Gold, president of the Mizrachi of America.

To accomplish this purpose a delegation has come from Palestine, consisting of Rabbi Meyer Berlin and Rabbi J. L. Hachoen Fishman, leaders of the Mizrachi World Organization, who will travel throughout the country in the interests of the campaign.

The Mizrachi Palestine fund is the fund of the Mizrachi World Organization which supports all of the Mizrachi activities in Palestine both in the fields of education and religion, and also the Keren Torah V'avodah, Torah and Work Fund, of the Hapel Hamizrachi. It also supports the various colonization and industrial undertakings of the Mizrachi in Palestine.

Active campaign committees have been organized throughout the country.

Lipshultz, Violinist And Composer, Dies

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 30—George M. Lipshultz, violinist, conductor and composer succumbed here at the age of thirty-nine, following a brief illness.

A native of Chicago, Mr. Lipshultz became a violin prodigy at an early age. He is survived by his widow, his mother, three sisters and two brothers.

Dr. Sol J. Applebaum of Rochester, N. Y., was elected Vice-President of the Medical Society of the County of Monroe at the annual meeting of that body here. This Society includes in its membership all members of the medical profession in the City of Rochester, the third largest city in New York State, and a number of towns located in Monroe County. Dr. Applebaum has been active in the Society's work for years and is now chairman of the Periodic Health Examination Committee of that organization.

DETROIT, Dec. 30—Two Jews have been named as his assistants by Attorney General Patrick H. O'Brien of Michigan.

The two Jewish Assistant Attorneys General are Maxwell L. Black and Byron Geller. Mr. Black is the president of the Five Cent Koshier Kitchen and active in Zionist work. Mr. Geller is a member of the reportorial staff of the Detroit Times.

Attorney General O'Brien has also reappointed Max J. Keidan one of the collectors of delinquent debts.

Sheriff-elect Thomas C. Wilcox has announced the appointment of Dr. Mark Herzfeld as under-sheriff and the following Jews as his deputies: Roy Radner, David Gottlieb, Louis Berg, Harry Goldstein and Isadore Jacobsen.

Urges Jewish Women to Cultivate Jewish Social Life

Jewish women must cultivate a Jewish social life if Judaism is to continue, Mrs. Paula Ollendorf of Breslau, Germany, declared at a Chanukah Tea arranged by the New York City Branch of the Women's League of The United Synagogue of America, at the Park Lane Hotel.

Mrs. Ollendorf, who is Vice-President of the National Council of Jewish Women of Germany, an organization of 60,000 members, and also a descendant of Joseph Karo, the author of the Shulchan Aruch contrasted the modern Jewish woman with the Jewish woman of the ghetto.

"The walls of the ghetto preserved the Jewish people by compelling Jews to live together," Mrs. Ollendorf said. "When these walls are down their function must be maintained. The Jewish woman must create a warm congeniality in social intercourse that will keep Jewish life in existence."

Other speakers at the Tea were Rabbi I. H. Levinthal of Brooklyn and Mrs. Samuel Spiegel, National President of the Women's League. Mrs. Louis Ginzberg was Chairman of the Arrangements Committee and Mrs. Samuel M. Cohen, President of the New York City Branch, presided over the occasion.

Dr. William Ersner Heads

Alpha Omega Fraternity

BALTIMORE, Dec. 30—Dr. William Ersner, dental and oral surgeon of this city, was elected Supreme Chancellor of Alpha Omega Fraternity at that organization's annual convention at the Lord Baltimore Hotel here.

Alpha Omega is the oldest and largest Jewish dental fraternity in the world, having forty undergraduate chapters in all of the leading universities and colleges in the United States and Canada, and fifteen graduate alumni clubs.

Dr. Ersner is dental and oral surgeon at the Mount Sinai Hospital, the Philadelphia General Hospital, Northwestern General Hospital, and the Downtown Hebrew Orphans' Home. He is a graduate of the Temple University Dental School, and vice-president of the Temple University Dental Alumni Association.

Mrs. Alice Sachs Leaves \$100,000 to Jewish Charities

The sum of \$100,000 is bequeathed to Jewish charitable institutions in the will of the late Mrs. Alice Goldschmidt Sachs.

Mrs. Sachs, who was the wife of Arthur Sachs, left an estate valued at \$5,147,745 net. She was one of the few American women to be made a member of the Legion of Honor in recognition of her aid to French artists, writers and musicians.

The executors of her estate were directed to distribute the \$100,000 fund as they saw fit and they have granted equal shares to the Montefiore Hospital for Chronic Diseases, Mount Sinai Hospital, the Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies and the Henry Street Settlement.

Rabbi Berlin, Gold to Attend Sessions of Mizrachi Youth

DETROIT, Dec. 30—Rabbi Meyer Berlin, world Mizrachi leader, and Rabbi Wolf Gold, president of the Mizrachi of America, will be guest speakers at the sessions of the Mizrachi Youth of the Midwest, whose four-day convention is to commence in Detroit on January 30.

The local convention committee reports that approximately 25 cities are electing delegates to the convention, and that large delegations of visitors are expected.

Swope Proposals for Meeting Crisis Regarded As Most Constructive

Gives Science Association Plan; Urges Unemployment Reserves by Industry, Minimum Guarantee of Employment

ATLANTIC CITY, Dec. 30—What was described as the most constructive proposal to meet the present economic situation was presented to the American Association for the Advancement of Science here by Gerard Swope, president of the General Electric Company.

Mr. Swope, a brother of Herbert Bayard Swope, the distinguished Jewish publicist, urged that all workers be guaranteed a minimum period of employment per year and that industry set up huge unemployment reserves.

Mr. Swope's program was as follows:

1. We must decide what volume and what kind of products we want industry to supply and how to have industry organized to be of service.

2. We must secure for workers in industry an assurance of minimum employment per year at a compensation adequate to enable them to live in accordance with a standard of living that we want to maintain.

3. Where we have not advanced far enough to give an assurance of employment, unemployment reserves should be built up and maintained as a separate reserve by each unit.

4. Every employe "who receives less than a specified compensation" shall contribute to the plan.

5. The employer's contribution shall equal or exceed that of the employe.

6. Provision of a "minimum waiting period before such benefits become effective."

7. To have the minimum of such benefits adequate to provide for food, shelter and clothing.

8. To provide such benefits over a sufficiently long period without calling on the State or society for relief or charity.

9. To "make provisions for such unemployment emergencies as may transcend the usual periods of unemployment."

Two Jews to Be Made Peers by King George

LONDON, Dec. 30—Two of the three new peers to be created by King George on the occasion of the New Year are to be Jews, according to press forecasts today.

The papers predict that Sir Isaac Isaacs, Governor General of Australia and Sir Joseph Duveen, art connoisseur and dealer are the two Jews thus to be honored.

New Anti-Semitic Party Formed In Austria by Seceding Wing Of Christian Socialist Party

New Party's Program Combines Luegerism with Hitlerism; Hope to Bridge Gap Between Catholics and Nazis

VIENNA, Dec. 30—A new anti-Semitic party has been formed in Austria by an influential section of the Christian Socialist Party which seceded from the parent body.

The new party is to be known as the Social Circle and its anti-Semitic coloring was made evident today with the publication of its official program.

The program presents a mixture of the doctrines of Dr. Karl Lueger, Austrian anti-Semitic leader, and Adolph Hitler, the German Nazi leader.

The Party aims, through a combination of Luegerism and Hitlerism, to form a bridge to enable the Catholics to co-operate with the Nazis.

A number of prominent Catholics head the new party.

300 at Impressive Reception For Mrs. Felix M. Warburg

JERUSALEM, Dec. 30—An impressive reception was held here yesterday for Mrs. Felix M. Warburg, wife of the noted philanthropist who is on a visit to Palestine.

The reception took the form of a Chanukah Tea held on the premises of the Young Women's Hebrew Association.

Three hundred of the most prominent representatives of the Jewish population attended. Among the guests were Nahun Sokolov, president of the Jewish Agency for Palestine; Miss Henrietta Szold, founder of Hadassah, one-time member of the Executive of the Jewish Agency and now a member of the Jewish National Council; Dr. Chaim Arlosoroff, member of the Jewish Agency Executive in charge of Political Affairs, and David Yellin.

Dr. Judah L. Magnes, Chancellor of the Hebrew University, chanted the Chanukah service and lighted the candles.

Mrs. Warburg conveyed the greetings of the American Young Women's Hebrew Association and dwelt on the optimism she found manifested throughout Palestine.

Rosenwald Foundation Spent \$2,367,000 in 1931

The Julius Rosenwald Foundation expended the sum of \$2,367,000 for philanthropic purposes during 1931, according to figures made public by the Twentieth Century Fund.

The Julius Rosenwald Foundation was one of 102 American Foundations which expended \$54,600,000 during the year 1931.

Palestine Labor Out to "Capture" Next World Zionist Congress

Decide to Establish Independent Labor Colonization Fund; Ask United Zionist Bodies in Each Land

JERUSALEM — Determination to make Labor the decisive force at the next Zionist Congress in an effort to "capture" the Congress, and the preparedness of the Zionist Labor movement to assume responsibility for the Zionist leadership was expressed at a special Conference of the Palestine Jewish Labor Party held here lasting two days. Zionist Labor organizations throughout the world are urged to mobilize their whole strength for the coming contest.

The Conference demanded the reorganization of the Zionist movement through the establishment in each country of a single united Zionist Organization, embracing members of all Zionist factions, such as the General Zionists, Labor, Mizrahi, etc., believing this to be the best means of strengthening the forces of constructive Zionism.

Among the resolutions on colonization and economic policy the most important is one to create an independent labor colonization fund at the disposal of the Nir, the co-operative colonization instrument of the Histadruth, which would act as a working class agency in matters of agricultural settlement, in co-operation with national or private institutions. The Conference has issued a call to all Jewish workers and friends of Palestine Labor to subscribe to the shares of the Nir.

Another resolution condemns the attempts to weaken or discredit the national funds. Without the Keren Kayemeth and the Keren Hayesod, it says, there can be no mass immigration or settlement.

The Conference has passed a resolution protesting against land speculation in Palestine, which is now on the increase, declaring that it is bound to

Brockelman issued a statement declaring that "Professor Cohn's lectures cannot be maintained since Professor Cohn has not maintained the necessary political reserve."

The statement referred to a declaration made by Professor Cohn to a newspaperman's inquiry concerning the merits of granting Leon Trotsky, the exiled Soviet leader, asylum in Germany. To this, Professor Cohn replied: "Spiritual workers always deserve protection if they avoid agitation as politicians of whom we have plenty ourselves."

The condemnation of Professor Cohn on this score has aroused widespread protests, particularly among professors in other Universities.

Yonkers Mayor Summons Aid for Jewish Center

situation there shows no improvement over that of last year.

He expressed doubt whether Bira Bidjan will be in a position to absorb even half of the 25,000 persons scheduled to migrate there in the coming year.

The position is somewhat better in Crimea where two hundred new dwellings for immigrants have been prepared, it was reported. The collectives, however, are unwilling to absorb more than 500 families, although the schedule provides for 1500 families, the report declared.

Moreover the question of food supply and livestock for the newcomers to Crimea presents difficulties.

Tendencies to apply extreme conditions to the quality of the immigrants to be selected will be combatted, the conference decided. This will apply equally to those who demand that only declassified be sent to Bira Bidjan and that no workers be taken away from their present employment and to the group which demands that the declassified be barred from immigration.

The new slogan for immigration for 1933 will call on both workers and declassified to proceed to the colonies.

Another departure from previous policy, which it is believed will obviate confusion, will be the signing of agreements with the colonies for the number of workers required for the seasonal work so that accommodation and work will be waiting for immigrants upon their arrival.

defeat the prospects of large scale immigration, and pointing to the Jewish National Fund as the only effective safeguard against this peril.

A special resolution pledges the Labor Party to assist all Jewish immigrants striving to establish themselves productively in Palestine, in agriculture or industry.

The new Local Government Bill was rejected by the Conference as reactionary, because it excludes workers and women from the municipal franchise, and diminishes municipal autonomy. The Conference decided to demand universal franchise in the Municipalities, based on proportional representation, the extension of municipal powers and a system of progressive taxation.

pressure may have been responsible.

Because he is a Jew, Professor Liebermann, a member of one of the most distinguished Jewish families in Germany, was denied all official recognition during the lifetime of the monarchy; the Kaiser vetoed his election as president of the Academy of Art. When the republic was established, he was again elected president and Parliament passed a special law extending the three year term of the President in his favor.

Professor Liebermann is a cousin of the late Walter Rathenau, the German Foreign Minister who was assassinated by anti-Semites in 1922; a brother of the late Professor Carl Liebermann, noted chemist; and the late Professor Felix Liebermann, noted historian.
