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## ARABS SEEK UNITED FRONT IN PALESTINE, SYRIA, IRAQ, TRANSJORDAN TO COMPEL ABDULLAH TO CANCEL AGREEMENT WITH JEWS

Arab Bank Offers to Lease Land Area Involved and Develop It for Arabs; Palestine Arabs Will Seek to Enlist King Feisal to Persuade His Brother Against Consummating Agreement with Jews; Delegation to Seek Audience with Emir Abdullah

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

JERUSALEM, Jan. 19—A united Arab front in Palestine, Syria, Iraq and Transjordan is being organized to force Emir Abdullah of Transjordan to annul the agreement he has signed with a Jewish company for the lease of allegedly 50,000 dunams of his personal domain for a period of 99 years, the Jewish Telegraphic Agency learns today.

Palestine Arabs plan to make representations to King Feisal of Hedjaz urging him to make representations to his brother, with a view to the cancellation of the lease, the Jewish Telegraphic Agency learns further.

A Palestine Arab lawyers' delega-

tion will proceed to Amman to seek an audience with Emir Abdullah for the purpose of discovering if some means cannot be found to prevent the consummation of the agreement.

A Palestine Arab bank, it is reported, today approached Emir Abdullah with an offer to lease the land area involved and to develop it for Arabs.

The Arab press reports that Arab leaders have received numerous communications from Transjordan pledging support to their efforts to prevent the Jews from obtaining possession of Transjordan land.

The Jewish Telegraphic Agency learns, however, from well informed sources, that these communications are not significant of actual sentiment in Transjordan. The Arabs of Transjordan, it is stated, welcome any development of their land that would come from the Jews.

## To Improve Finances by Propaganda Among Sephardim

BARCELONA—A suggestion to utilize the Sephardic Jews for the purpose of alleviating the financial crisis of Spain is made by the Catalan organ of Barcelona, "La Publicitat," in an article entitled, "The Influence of the Sephardic Colonies," written by the well known economist, Senor Vicenc Bernades.

The writer promises that in the course of a series of articles he will discuss more fully the present position of Sephardic Jewry and prove how the Sephardic Jews could be of great use to Spain in solving its present difficulties.

The idea put forward by "La Publicitat" follows closely on a similar suggestion made by the Madrid daily, "Heraldo de Madrid," which said that an extensive publicity campaign should be conducted among the Sephardic Jews for the purpose of inducing them to visit Spain as tourists to see their motherland.

## Demands Jewish Firms in Poland Be Barred From Supplying Products to Army

Anti-Semitic Deputy Charges Jews Are Traitors; Says Jewish Firms Sell to Poland's Enemies in War Time

WARSAW, Jan. 19—Accusing the Jews of being traitors, the National Democratic Deputy Arciszewski, in a long and vitriolic address against the Jews, demanded yesterday that the Polish Sejm forbid the placing of orders for military supplies with Jewish firms.

The attack on the Jews delivered during the course of the debate on military estimates, was directed against scores of Jewish firms who have been supplying the army.

The military must rely on Polish firms only because Jewish firms, in the event of war, sell their products to the enemies of Poland as well. Patriotic Polish firms could never be guilty of such treachery, the deputy asserted.

Dr. Heinrich Rosmarin, vice-president of the Club of Jewish Deputies of the Polish Sejm refuted the charges of the anti-Semitic deputy.

The Polish government, Dr. Rosmarin stated, is satisfied that Jewish firms who supply the military discharge their duties honestly.

Dr. Rosmarin protested against the National Democratic Party's efforts to arouse the population against the Jews on the ground that the Jews are responsible for the country's economic difficulties. He pointed out that such efforts are ultimately doomed to failure and will redound to the discredit of the party as the record of the German Nazi party shows.

## Reject Nazi Motion to Register Jews in Theatres and Orchestras

BERLIN, Jan. 19—The Prussian Diet yesterday rejected the motion of the Nazi fraction to require state theatres and orchestras to register their Jewish employees with the purpose of weeding out the latter.

The Diet adopted, however, a Nazi motion requiring state theatres and orchestras to register a list of foreigners employed by them.

## Chairman of Jewish Collective Gets 5 Years

MOSCOW, Jan. 19—The Chairman of the Kalinindorf Collective "Roiter Stern," A. Heissinski, was sentenced today to five years imprisonment and the loss of his civil rights for a period of two years.

He was found guilty of speculation and misuse of his authority as a result of which the collective failed to achieve its grain quota and to deliver its share to the government.

Heissinski was tried on the basis of charges against him published by the Charkov "Stern."

## To Investigate Palestine Fruit Preserving Industry

JERUSALEM, Jan. 19—Foreign experts will be invited to come to Palestine to investigate and report on the possibilities of developing the fruit canning and preserving industry in Palestine.

This decision was adopted by the Agricultural Council.

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## Permits of Entry Are

### 96 Percent Under Quota

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19.—Only 602 visas were issued to aliens of preference and non-preference status from 21 countries during November, the possible maximum issue being 14,838, the Department of State announced yesterday. The underissue was placed at 96 per cent.

These 21 countries' annual quotas represent 148,383 of the total quota of 153,831, it was stated.

## Workers Alliance to Mark

### Its 20th Anniversary

The Jewish National Workers Alliance will celebrate the twentieth anniversary of its founding early in February.

In connection with the anniversary, a national campaign for membership is being conducted.

A series of mass meetings are scheduled in New York City where the celebration will culminate on February 4th with a concert to be held in Town Hall.

The New York quota for the membership campaign is 500.

Among the activities of the organization are the establishment and maintenance of a series of Jewish schools and a teachers' seminary in this country.

At a two-day annual convention of the New Jersey Federation of Temple Sisterhoods held in Paterson, Mrs. Meta Cannold, of Newark, was elected president. Other officers chosen were: Vice-Presidents, Mrs. Emanuel Breikopf, New Brunswick, and Mrs. William Newcorn, Plainfield; Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. William Klein, East Orange; Recording Secretary, Mrs. S. Reinhardt, East Orange; Treasurer, Mrs. E. A. Fuld, Paterson, and Auditor, Mrs. Isadore Feld, Paterson. The officers were installed by the Honorary President, Mrs. Solomon Foster, of Newark. Among the convention features was a round-table discussion on "Voice of the Sisterhood."

## Mrs. Brin Asks for Study Groups in Social Service

BALTIMORE, Jan. 19.—Training of volunteers in study groups to give efficient social service in these days of depression was urged by Mrs. Arthur Brin, of Minneapolis, president of the National Council of Jewish Women.

Mrs. Brin, who spoke at a meeting of the Baltimore council, came here from Washington, where she has been attending the preliminary meetings of the Conference on the Cause and Cure of War.

Mrs. Harry O. Schloss, Mrs. Sydney M. Cone, Mrs. Henry Oppenheimer and Mrs. Sol Rothschild will represent the local council at the conference.

## Jew Named Head of Michigan Prison Industries

DETROIT, Jan. 19.—Edward N. Frensdorf of Hudson, Mich., was placed in charge of all state prison industries by Governor William A. Cooch.

Mr. Frensdorf previously served on the State Prison Commission under Governors Albert L. Sleeper, Chase S. Osborn and Woodbridge N. Ferris. He was at one time Warden of Jackson Prison and organized that institution's industries to make them earn enough to meet the demands of the institution. He hopes to place all of the state's prisons on a self-sustaining basis and says he believes he can effect economies of \$1,000,000.

Another Jewish appointment was made when Wayne County Clerk Elmer B. O'Hara appointed William A. Sempliner Deputy County Clerk.

## Pay Tribute to Memory Of Harry Lapidus

OMAHA, Jan. 19.—Tribute to the memory of Harry H. Lapidus, nationally-known civic, communal and philanthropic leader who was assassinated a year ago, was paid at a community-wide Yahrzeit meeting held at the Jewish Community Center.

The memorial meeting was in the nature of a Yahrzeit in conformance with Jewish law and tradition. An eulogy was delivered by Henry Monsky, prominent Omahan.

Permanent memorials will consecrate the name of Harry Lapidus in Omaha. A bust is being made by Prof. Enrico Glicenstein and when finished will be permanently placed in the Community Center, which Lapidus helped found and which he served as its first president. All the Jewish organizations of the city have raised a fund for the bust.

In addition, a community trust fund is being created, to be used as a means of aiding and maintaining worthy charitable activities.

## Rothenberg at Meeting Of Palestine Lighthouse

The Palestine Lighthouse, under the leadership of Mrs. Samuel D. Friedman, its President, will hold its annual meeting for the installation of officers and advisors on Monday, January 23, at 8:00 P. M., at the home of Mrs. Leon Kamaika.

Morris Rothenberg, President of the Zionist Organization of America, will install the newly elected officers and advisors.

For the first time in the history of Palestine, the blind of Jerusalem are being housed in their own building, erected by the Palestine Lighthouse, who will continue to help feed, clothe, educate and train them in Arts and Crafts, so that they may become self-supporting and self-respecting citizens of Palestine.

## Rabbi Jacob Teitelbaum Dies in Jerusalem

Word has been received here of the death in Jerusalem of Rabbi Jacob Isaac Teitelbaum, father of Rabbi Aaron Teitelbaum of New York, prominent in the work of the Mizrahi Organization.

Rabbi Teitelbaum was seventy-six years old and known as a scholar. He played a prominent part in the old Jewish Community. He had been a resident in Jerusalem for more than fifty years.

He is survived by Rabbi Aaron Teitelbaum and a daughter, the widow of Rabbi Israel Z. Hurwitz.

## Training Farm for Chalutzim in Canada

MONTREAL, Jan. 19.—A training farm for Canadian Chalutzim is being established in Chambly Basin, Quebec, where prospective Canadian Chalutzim will receive a rudimentary knowledge of agriculture before their departure for Palestine.

The farm is situated not far from Montreal and consists of some 400 acres cultivated as well as wooded soil. The first groups of Chalutzim from Montreal and Toronto will shortly go on the land.

The training farm will be conducted under the supervision of the recently-formed Pro-Hechalutz Committee which is now carrying on a one dollar campaign to raise the necessary means for the upkeep of the farm. Agricultural experts have promised to give the Chalutzim expert advice on all matters pertaining to their life on the farm.

Jerome K. Liberman was elected president of the Jewish Home for Aged of Central New York at the last meeting of the board. This election marked the twenty-first year of founding of the institute, which is affiliated with District Directors from the cities of Utica, Binghamton, Elmira, Rome, Oneida, Watertown, Auburn, Gloversville, and Johnstown.

The will of the late Mrs. Lena Nairn of Detroit, Mich., leaves \$1,000 for Hadassah.

## Tel Aviv Municipality Rejects Provisions of Projected Community Law

**Opposes Appointment of Mayors;  
High Commissioner's Powers  
of Dissolution**

TEL AVIV.—The provision of the projected municipality law, the promulgation of which is to be preliminary to the establishment of a Legislative Council in Palestine, stipulating that mayors henceforth be appointed by the High Commissioner instead of elected by the people, was rejected by the municipality of Tel Aviv at a session of a special committee named to present its observations on the projected measure.

The Committee emphasized that Mayors as well as other municipal officials should be responsible to the Municipal Council exclusively and to none else.

The Committee also opposed the provision that the Municipal Council may be dissolved by the High Commissioner if in his opinion it is not functioning in accordance with the law. The Committee demands that the dissolution of a Municipal Council be made possible only after warning by the High Commissioner and then only after six months have elapsed since the publication of the warning in the Official Gazette.

Opposition was also expressed to a change in the electoral system. Active and passive voting rights should be granted to every man and woman who has reached the age of twenty-one, the Committee emphasizes.

The Palestine High Commissioner, Sir Arthur Grenfell Wauchop, recently announced that the municipality ordinance would be promulgated despite the opposition of many communities who have refused to submit their observations in an effort to prevent its passage.

Sir Arthur stated that the law would be enacted and any modifications necessary could be made thereafter.

## Drop in Circulation of Yiddish Press in Russia

MOSCOW.—The continued fall in the number of readers of the Yiddish Communist press in Russia, was the subject of a consultation in Charkoff held for the purpose of finding ways and means of checking the decline.

The Charkoff Yiddish daily, "Stern," it was stated at the Conference, had in April, 1932, a total of 28,000 readers. By December this number had fallen to 17,000, and the same thing has been experienced by all other Yiddish papers.

The decline is attributed to faulty distribution, especially through the neglect of the Post Office. It is pointed out that newspapers are delivered by the Post Office only once or twice a week, instead of daily.

**Montreal Hebrew School System  
Imperilled by Lack of Funds; 1,400 Children  
Affected as Teachers Strike**

MONTREAL.—After months of negotiations the teachers of the local United Talmud Torahs have declared a strike. Not having received their salaries regularly for the last six months the teachers have finally decided to leave their class rooms, and not return until something definite is done to ameliorate the aggravated condition of the Talmud Torah finances. Twenty-eight teachers and 1,400 children are affected.

The United Talmud Torahs are indebted to the teachers for salaries besides the heavy mortgage and debt that they carry on the new Educational Institute which has recently been erected. The economic depression has played havoc with the chances of the Talmud Torahs to obtain the necessary means for maintenance. Many who pledged large contributions for the new building were unable to redeem their pledges after the crash and the following crisis helped increase the number of pupils who had to receive free tuition. Much hope was placed on the subsidy of the Jewish Community Council, but this grant is being balked by the attitude of the Shochetim who refuse to part with a small share of their income; they even demand 66% of the income from the meat tax. Seeing no prospects to better their position in the future and being unable to continue their struggle for bare existence, the teachers took the only alternative and went out on strike.

In an effort to clarify the situation the executive committee of the United Talmud Torahs issued the following statement:

"The closing of the United Talmud Torah Schools, due to the inability of the teaching staff to continue their work of education, until some payment is made on account of their overdue salaries, is very deeply regretted by the Executive Committee of the United Talmud Torahs. The Executive Committee and the Board of Directors have endeavored to do everything in their power to avoid this 'Chillul Hashem' but found the situation beyond its control.

"The United Talmud Torahs have suffered by this depression more than any other communal institutions. In the best of times, the income of Talmud Torah was hardly adequate to meet the needs of Jewish education which the Community has entrusted to us. The last several months have been especially trying. Much as the Executive Committee sympathizes with the teachers in their plight, it has no available resources to draw upon immediately. It is because of these facts that there is now due several months' salaries to the teachers.

## Complain of Slight Use of Yiddish as Jewish Workers Increase in Soviet Russia

**"Emess" Protests Yiddish Language  
Little Used in Political and  
Cultural Work**

MOSCOW.—The Yiddish language is little used for purposes of political and cultural work among the Jewish workers in the factories and industrial enterprises, the Yiddish Communist daily "Emess" complains.

The number of Jewish workers in heavy industry grows from day to day, it points out. Kiev alone now has forty thousand Jewish workers, the majority of them engaged in heavy industry. The number of Jewish members in the industrial professional union in the Ukraine, which in 1926 was ninety-six thousand, grew by 1931 to two hundred and twenty-six thousand, which represents an almost four-fold increase, the paper declares.

The growth in the number of Jewish workers in Central Russia is even greater. In the Moscow electrical station three thousand Jewish workers are employed. On the automobile works at Stalin there are thirteen hundred Jewish workers. In the shoe factory "Paris Commune," there are over two thousand Jewish workers. Many thousands of Jewish workers are engaged in the dress factories. In the Leningrad shoe factory "Skorochod" nearly two thousand Jewish workers are employed, and there are a large number of Jews to be found in all other enterprises.

The great majority of Jewish workers come from the Jewish villages, the paper declares, and have not yet become assimilated in the proletarian melting pot. Many of them still speak Russian badly, in spite of which the Yiddish language is not used among them. In the factory "Petrowski" in Cherson, nine hundred Jewish workers are employed, but the entire work is conducted in Russian, and similarly in other Cherson factories where the Jewish workers number between sixty and seventy per cent. In the Minsk factory "Oktiabr" there are a thousand Jewish workers, but throughout the premises not even a single notice appears in Yiddish.

The factory organization justifies itself by putting forward the excuse that it is conducting its work internationally, and therefore it is not necessary for it to devote special attention to Yiddish. This, however, the Yiddish press points out, is only a chauvinistic excuse which must be combated.

The chair left vacant by the late Gustave Steiner, President of the Astoria Center of Israel, for five consecutive terms, was filled by Bernard D. Klein, First Vice-President, at the annual meeting of the membership of the Astoria Center of Israel, at the Center building in Long Island City.

Other officers elected were Dr. Mandel Weinstein, Dr. Jacob N. Feinberg, and Henry Rubenstein, Vice-Presidents; Jacob Klein, Treasurer; Hyman Zipes, Financial Secretary and Dr. Samuel Streim, Recording Secretary.

## Insurance Trust Fund Gives \$4,500 to Eight Causes

DETROIT, Jan. 19.—Eight Jewish institutions—six local and two national—are to benefit from a special insurance trust agreement prepared by the late Samuel P. Wilkus during his lifetime. Mr. Wilkus died in Los Angeles on Dec. 20 and funeral services were held in Detroit on Jan. 1.

The trust insurance agreement, prepared by Morris Garvett, attorney, names Mr. Garvett and David Wilkus, son of the deceased, as trustees. The agreement distributes the sum of \$4,500 as follows:

Jewish Old Folks' Home of Detroit, \$1,000; Detroit Fresh Air Fund, \$500; Young Women's Hebrew Association of Detroit, \$500; United Hebrew Schools, \$500; Hebrew Free Loan Association, \$500; Jewish Children's Home, \$500; National Jewish Hospital for Consumptives at Denver, \$500; Jewish Consumptive Relief Society of Denver, \$500.

This trust agreement is similar to the one that was written, also by Mr. Garvett, for the late Abraham Cohen, who assigned a sum of \$10,000 for various institutions, the Congregation Shaarey Zedek receiving \$5,000. Mr. Garvett's efforts in urging the writing of insurance trust agreements have been lauded as making a definite contribution to the needs of worthy causes.

## Salt Lake City Jewish

### Mayor Cuts Own Salary

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Jan. 19.—Mayor Louis Marcus, of this city, has announced his intention of reducing his own official salary by 10 per cent in an effort to reduce the expenses of city government.

Mayor Marcus is the first Jew to hold the office of Mayor in this world capital of the Mormon Church, having been elected during a heated contest with a Mormon in the fall of 1931.

For the first time in the history of the city of Elizabeth, N. J., a Jew will hold an executive position in the municipal government. Mayor Williams has just appointed Nathaniel Weltchek, a lawyer, to membership on the Board of Works. The appointment is for three years.

however, to point out that the teachers have not been left entirely without funds, having received salary from time to time as the financial condition of Talmud Torah warranted. During the last twelve months, the teachers have received salary for nine full months. They were behind two months' salary at the beginning of the year. This accounts for salary now due for five months.

"The leaders of Talmud Torah have placed a great deal of hope and reliance in the Vaad Ho'ir as a source of additional income. The new Administration of the Vaad Ho'ir seems to have utilized every effort to obtain an income for Talmud Torah but has failed so far because of the obdurate attitude of a certain element in the Vaad Ho'ir. Being denied this source of revenue, our financial situation became even more desperate.

"The 1,400 children whom we are educating in seven schools in the various parts of the Community are the innocent victims in the entire situation. The sad condition of the teachers and the action which they were compelled to take deprives this vast number of our children of their right to a Jewish education, having to go about idly at a time when they should be receiving the valuable teachings of our Torah and the traditions of our ancestors. The Jewish Community cannot afford to forsake our children who are the guarantee for a Jewish future nor to neglect the Jewish teachers who are devoting their entire energy to the Jewish education of our young.

"The Directors have done all within their power to keep the Institution going to date. If they have failed to do more, it is because the Jewish Community has failed to do its share."

The local Jewish press lays the blame for the situation at the feet of the Shocheit whose "avarice threatens to disrupt the work of the Jewish Community Council which was created for the purpose of subsidizing Hebrew Education."

## Unpublished Article by

### Ben-Yehuda Appears

A hitherto unpublished article by the father of modern Hebrew, Eliezer ben Yehuda, on the revival of the Hebrew language appears in the first issue of "Hatzion Haklali" — The General Zionist — just published in Jerusalem. The article was written by him during his stay in New York at the time of the War, and expresses his confidence in the full revival of Hebrew.

Hatzion Haklali which is devoted to the interests of the General Zionists, also includes in its first issue articles and letters of greeting from N. Sokolow, President of the Zionist Organization; M. Ussishkin, head of the Jewish National Fund, and Emanuel Neumann, member of the Palestine Zionist Executive.

## Fourth Volume of "Thesaurus Of Mediaeval Hebrew Poetry"

Dr. Cyrus Adler, President of the Jewish Theological Seminary of America, announces the publication of Volume 4 of the "Thesaurus of Mediaeval Hebrew Poetry" by Professor Israel Davidson. This volume completes a scholarly undertaking which has extended over a period of nearly two decades. It consists of four quarto volumes totalling 2,063 pages entirely printed in Hebrew, with the exception of a few pages of preface, printed at the Hebrew Press of the Jewish Publication Society. The publication of these volumes is largely owing to a Jewish benefactress greatly interested in the furtherance of Jewish scholarship.

To complete this Thesaurus, Professor Davidson has travelled far and wide, has searched public libraries and private collections the world over; has combined critical faculty and unremitting industry. These four volumes, according to Professor Davidson's Preface, "record at least 35,000 poems, just about six times as many as Zunz recorded in his Literaturgeschichte."

## Mailamm and Young Judea

### Arrange Music Festival

An all-star festival of Jewish and Biblical music will be given on February 28, at Carnegie Hall, under the auspices of Mailamm, Palestine Institute of Musical Sciences and Young Judea.

The program for the evening is being arranged in cooperation with the Mailamm Committee on Musical Activities of which Lazare Saminsky is chairman, Joseph Achron, associate chairman and Ernest Block and Reuben Goldmark, honorary members.

The presentation includes a galaxy of famous artists and ensembles in a program by the foremost composers of the past and present. Mildred Kreuder, Pauline Koner and a Chorus conducted by Leo Low will be featured in the biblical stage performance directed by Ruth St. Denis, including her Ballet. Solo numbers by Nina Koshetz, Joseph Yasser, The Musical Art Quartet and the Stradivarius Quartet in addition to a four pianists' ensemble will be augmented by other unusual features, to be announced later.

Ossip Gabrilowitsch and Mischa Elman are honorary chairmen with Felix M. Warburg, honorary chairman of the Society for the Advancement of Music in Palestine.

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
