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COLONIAL OFFICE SAYS IT HAS NOT YET FORMULATED ATTITUDE TO LEASE OF TRANSJORDAN LAND TO JEWS

LONDON, Jan. 23—The Colonial Office today informed the Jewish Telegraphic Agency that it has not yet received sufficient information concerning the lease by Emir Abdullah of Transjordan of part of his personal domain to Jews. In the circumstances, the Colonial Office has not yet formulated its attitude toward the question.

When more facts are available, the matter will be considered in all its bearings, including the various repercussions which may arise, the Colonial Office spokesman stated.

Political circles sounded by the Jewish Telegraphic Agency here express the view that while the Jewish company interested in the lease of Transjordan land carried on negotiations with Emir Abdullah exclusively, the British Government may have an important voice in the matter because Jewish immigration to Transjordan is certain to arouse a measure of difficulty.

Among the difficulties cited are the question of additional security, an increase in the government budget and political considerations of various categories.

The Jewish Telegraphic Agency was

assured, however, that there is no reason to assume that the British authorities will view unfavorably Jewish ventures to colonize in Transjordan.

Dr. Heinrich Rosmarin Scores Discrimination Against Jews In Government Monopolies

Points Out That Last Few Jewish Workers in Tobacco Industry Have Now Been Dismissed

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

WARSAW, Jan. 23—The last few Jewish workers in the tobacco industry, which is now a government monopoly, have been dismissed, Dr. Heinrich Rosmarin disclosed today in the course of a debate on the budget in the Polish Sejm.

The vice president of the Club of Jewish Deputies charged that the government is practicing discrimination against Jewish workers employed in its monopolies.

In the tobacco factory in Grodno, which before the war, was almost an exclusive Jewish enterprise, there were until recently eleven Jewish workers left. Now even this small group has been dismissed. Among the discharged employees are workers who had been with the factory for twenty-six years. They had been scheduled for pensions within a short period, but this is forfeited by the dismissal.

Almost 30 per cent of the government's income is derived from its monopolies. In view of the share that the Jews contribute to the government's income by their purchases, the discrimination against Jewish workers is particularly damnable, Dr. Rosmarin asserted.

Declassed Rabbis With Positions Will Not Be Compelled To Leave Large Cities

Ruling to Apply to Clergy of All Denominations, Soviet Authorities Inform J.T.A.

MOSCOW, Jan. 23—Clergymen of all denominations, although in the category of the declassified, will not be ordered to leave the cities, in Soviet Russia's purging process, if they can show that they are permanently attached to houses of worship of registered parishes, the Jewish Telegraphic Agency was informed today by authoritative quarters.

The statement was made in response to an inquiry by the Jewish Telegraphic Agency correspondent in view of the fears of the rabbis that they would be expelled under the system of internal passports.

Under the internal passport system, all persons above the age of sixteen are required to register and to describe the nature of their activities. Unproductive elements are to be weeded out of the large centers and will be required to leave the cities within ten days after passports have been refused.

The Jews, who comprise a large percentage of the declassified elements, are entertaining grave fears on this score.

Jewish Quarter in Berlin Unaffected by Nazi Review

BERLIN, Jan. 23—The Jewish quarter was unaffected by yesterday's review of the National Socialist Storm Troops with Adolf Hitler in command.

The expected anti-Jewish riots failed to take place. The Jews remained indoors throughout the day, while police forces guarded Jewish homes.

The fears of the Jews have been aroused because the Nazi press called for a united front against Liebknechtshaus "where young Jews are provoking German workers."

The demonstration was part of memorial exercises for Horst Wessel, author of the Nazi official battle anthem who was killed allegedly by Communists, in 1930.

Youth Wounded by Police Succumbs in Havana

HAVANA, Jan. 23—Berl Waxman, a Jewish youth who was wounded by the police on January 10th, in connection with a student demonstration, died yesterday from blood poisoning.

He is survived by a father and sister in New York. Waxman had been emigrated for years by Ben Dizik, former president of the Jewish Center.

It is not known what disposition will be made of the body inasmuch as Waxman had been placed under military arrest and had been guarded while in the hospital. An autopsy is to be performed by order of the military commander, after which his body may be turned over to the Jewish burial society.

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Jewish Federation Holds Annual Meeting

Samuel I. Rosenman and Mark Hyman were elected trustees of the Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies, to serve until 1934, at the annual meeting of the Federation held on Sunday.

Addresses were delivered at the meeting by former Judge Joseph M. Proskauer, president of the Federation, and Judge Martin T. Manton of the Circuit Court of Appeals.

Judge Manton praised the work of the Federation in its relation to the general scope of relief.

Mr. Proskauer hailed the successful culmination of the Federation's drive for \$3,923,000.

The following trustees were elected for a period of three years: David A. Ansbacher, Ralph E. Samuel, Percy S. Straus, Ludwig Vogelstein, William N. Cohen, Samuel Mundheim, Dr. H. G. Friedman and Mrs. Sidney C. Borg.

Atlantic City Federation of Charities Launches Drive

ATLANTIC CITY, Jan. 23.—Supported by every Jewish organization in Atlantic City, the annual campaign of the Federation of Jewish Charities opened last night with a large rally of campaign workers at the Jewish Community Center. The goal of this year's drive is \$30,000.

The principal speakers were Mayor Harry Bacharach of Atlantic City, Dr. Jacob Billikopf, the Executive Director of the Federation of Jewish Charities of Philadelphia and Dr. Philip R. Goldstein, the Campaign Director of the National Jewish Welfare Board of New York City, in charge of the local drive. The local Rabbis also spoke. City Solicitor Joseph B. Perskie presided. Max E. Blatt is the chairman of the campaign.

Scores Nazi Physicians for Anti-Semitic Agitation

BERLIN, Jan. 23.—Charges that the Nazi physicians are promoting anti-Jewish agitation instead of medical knowledge caused a conference of the Berlin Medical Society to be adjourned yesterday.

The charge against the Nazi physicians was made by Dr. Friedrich Brodnitz, a son of Dr. Julius Brodnitz, leader of the Central Union of German Citizens of the Jewish Faith.

Weizmann Visit to United States Postponed

PARIS, Jan. 23.—Dr. Chaim Weizmann, former president of the World Zionist Organization, now on a visit here, will not come to the United States in February as scheduled, according to a statement made by him.

Pressing business reasons are ascribed for this change of plans. Dr. Weizmann had been invited to come to the United States by the American Palestine Campaign.

Dr. Weizmann's visit to the United States has not been called off entirely, the Jewish Telegraphic Agency learns.

There is a possibility that his visit may merely be postponed and that he will come to this country in the spring, probably in May.

Advertising Manager of "Chicago Forward" Dies

CHICAGO, Jan. 23.—Funeral services were held here today for Solomon I. Turovlin, advertising manager of the "Jewish Daily Forward" here, who died suddenly of a heart attack on Saturday at his home.

Mr. Turovlin was forty-seven years old. His wife and two children are in Palestine. They were notified of his death and will sail for the United States immediately.

The body will be placed in a vault pending the return of the family.

Mr. Turovlin was a native of Poland and came to Chicago twenty-seven years ago: He joined the "Forward" as its advertising manager fifteen years ago. He was also a contributor to popular Jewish magazines.

Funeral Services Held For Morris Fleishman

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 23.—Funeral services were held here for Morris Fleishman, active in Jewish communal work, who died at the age of 60.

Mr. Fleishman was a director of the Federation of Jewish Charities and of the National Farm School. He also served as treasurer of the Seaside Home for Children in Atlantic City. A widow and two children survive.

Stress Education and Membership Aspects of Zionism

NEWARK, N. J., Jan. 23.—Emphasis henceforth on the educational and membership aspects of Zionist affiliation, rather than money-raising, was the keynote sounded here yesterday at a state conference of the New Jersey Zionist region, held in the Y.M.-Y.W.I.A. Building.

"Bring the movement back to the masses" was the term used by Mordecai L. Lipis, president of the Newark Zionist District, in addressing the conference. This view was re-emphasized by Joseph Kraemer of this city, speaking at the dinner which closed the conference, as a member of the administrative committee of the Zionist Organization of America.

Morris Rothenberg, president of the Zionist Organization of America, who was guest of honor at the dinner, acknowledged during the course of his address that Zionist memberships "during the years between 1927 and 1930 had suffered a drop of 25 per cent, and between 1930 and 1932, a decline of nearly fifty per cent."

"With membership campaigns now under way, however the end of this year should show a substantial increase," he said.

Mr. Rothenberg asserted that he is now "making a determined effort to remove any friction among Zionist leaders for there really are no fundamental differences in our ranks."

Jonas Weil of Minneapolis Succumbs at Age of 58

MINNEAPOLIS, Jan. 23.—Jonas Weil, vice-president of the Minneapolis board of public welfare, and for many years one of the outstanding figures in the Minneapolis Jewish community, died here at the age of 58.

One of his outstanding activities in behalf of the Jewish community was as chairman of the anti-defamation committee of the B'nai B'rith for Minneapolis. He was president of the Minneapolis B'nai B'rith lodge from 1904 to 1906 and president of District Grand Lodge No. 6 during 1909 and 1910. He was for years president of Temple Israel, a member of the Council of Social Agencies. As an official of Minneapolis he began his duties in 1926 when he was appointed to the board of public welfare.

He is survived by his widow, a son, Hanford Weil of New York, and two daughters, Miriam Weil of Minneapolis and Mrs. Richard Tewelles of Milwaukee.

Jabotinsky Forbids American Brith Trumpeldor to Deal With Congress Court

**Says It May Offer Histadruth Proposal
to Jointly Form a Real Court
of Honor**

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

PARIS, Jan. 23.—Vladimir Jabotinsky, president of the World Union of Zionist Revisionists, today cabled the Brith Trumpeldor Organization in America forbidding it "to have any dealings with the World Zionist Congress Court of Honor. You may offer the Histadruth the proposal to jointly appoint a real court of honor."

The Revisionist leader's instructions refer to the statement issued by the Revisionist Organization in the United States and signed jointly by Elias Ginsburg, its president, and Joseph Beder, acting chief of the Brith Trumpeldor, agreeing to submit the differences between the Histadruth and the Revisionists in Palestine, on the question of labor, to the Congress Court of Honor.

The statement was in acceptance of a proposal made by Israel Mereminski, Histadruth leader, now in the United States. The proposal was made by Mr. Mereminski in connection with the guerrilla warfare that has been current in Palestine for months between members of the Palestine Labor Federation and the Revisionists.

The Revisionist leader's reference to a real court of honor is a deliberate criticism of the present Court of Honor which is now regarded as a party organ because of its vote to suspend the Revisionists separate Union, following trial of the Revisionist Union on the charge of breach of Zionist discipline. The Revisionists had asked postponement of the trial until the World Zionist Congress when their spokesmen could be present.

Court of Appeal Dismisses Arab Claim to Haifa Bay Land

HAIFA, Jan. 23.—The Court of Appeal today dismissed the Arab claim to the Haifa Bay land owned by the Jewish National Fund, and the Bayside Land Corporation, an American Jewish firm.

The District Commissioner ruled on November 17th that 3500 dunams of land in the Haifa Bay district must be returned to the Arabs. The Court of Appeal, however, sets aside this verdict.

Mrs. Abraham Ruth, active for a quarter of a century in Jewish philanthropic work in New York, died of spinal meningitis at Mount Sinai Hospital at the age of fifty-four. She served as director of the Ladies Auxiliary of the Jewish Maternity Hospital and was a member of the women's board of the Home of the Daughters of Israel. She also was a member of the Hebrew Day Nursery, the Daughters of Jacob, the Daughters of Israel, the Kovner Aid Society, the Kadaner Aid Society and of Temple Anshe Chesed.

1,000 at Dinner in Honor of Bernard S. Deutsch; World Jewish Congress Urged

**Testimonial to American Jewish Congress
President Resolves Itself Into
Forum for World Jewish Congress Idea**

Bernard S. Deutsch, president of the American Jewish Congress, and candidate for the Independent Party for the Supreme Court, was honored on Sunday evening at a testimonial dinner in the Hotel Commodore, attended by more than 1,000 friends and associates in Jewish communal service and in the legal profession.

The dinner resolved itself into a forum to plead the urgency of convening a world Jewish congress, such as is projected in the summer of 1934. This theme was reiterated in the addresses of all the speakers who included Lord Snell of Plumstead; Rabbi Stephen S. Wise, honorary president of the American Jewish Congress; Mark Eisner, Chairman of the Board of Higher Education of New York and Mr. Deutsch. George Z. Medalie, United States Attorney, who was chairman of the dinner committee, presided.

Messages of greeting were received from Professor Albert Einstein, Senator William E. Borah, Lord Melchett, Chairman of the British Committee for a World Jewish Congress; Dr. Nahum Goldmann of Berlin and Morris Rozinberg, president of the Zionist Organization of America.

Endorsement of the world Jewish congress idea was offered by Professor Einstein. "May the 1934 World Jewish Congress ideal which Mr. Deutsch has so effectively furthered, contribute to strengthen the solidarity of threatened European Jewry," Professor Einstein's message declared.

Lord Snell, who was the author of the Minority Report of the Shaw Commission on the Palestine riots of 1929, spoke of conditions in Palestine and other parts of the world and severely scored anti-Semitism.

Of Palestine he said there is great reason for the Jews to be comforted. Arab-Jewish relations are improving through association. A talk with the present High Commissioner for Palestine was encouraging owing to the hopeful attitude of Sir Arthur Grenfell Wauchope and his clear cut view of what the possibilities are. Sir Arthur, he stated, admires the spirit of the Jewish pioneers.

Openly favoring a World Jewish Congress, Lord Snell said: "A people that has not the will to defend itself against outrage is a people that must ever be subject to persecution."

He scored the "discreditable revival of anti-Semitism in Europe. Something is wrong about it whatever your view of life. It is not the way of progress," he asserted and called upon Europe to carry out not "a pogrom but a program."

Says Immigration to Palestine Will Be Cut If Employment Openings Drop

**Statement Made to Mandates Commission
by Wauchope; Says Sealed
Armories Will Not Be Withdrawn**

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

GENEVA, Jan. 23.—Immigration to Palestine will be reduced if there is a reduction in employment openings, Sir Arthur Grenfell Wauchope, the Palestine High Commissioner, informed the Mandates Commission of the League of Nations, the minutes of the Mandates Commission reveal.

Immigration quotas are decided strictly according to the absorptive capacity of the country, the High Commissioner stated after Lord Lugard and Professor Rappard had urged the importance of keeping immigration into Palestine down to the limits of the country's absorptive capacity.

Dealing with the question of public security in Palestine, Sir Arthur stated that the sealed armories which were issued to certain Jewish colonies for defensive purposes gave them a certain feeling of security and it would be premature to make any changes in this respect.

Several questions were put to Sir Arthur about the recent Moslem Congress held in Jerusalem.

It was an Islamic World Congress, the High Commissioner explained and must not be confused with the Pan-Arabic movement.

The Congress has nothing to do with the Supreme Moslem Council, which is a Palestinian institution, he asserted.

As for the contemplated Arab University, he said it is his belief it would not be hostile to the Government nor hinder it in carrying out the Mandate.

The government did not, however, intend to grant a subvention towards the cost of construction of a University Building.

Release Three Jews Arrested During Czernowitz Attacks

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

CZERNOWITZ, Jan. 23.—Three Jewish students arrested during anti-Semitic Cuzist clashes here on Friday in connection with the trial of 9 Jews allegedly Communists, have been released by the authorities.

Renewed anti-Semitic attacks on Saturday were vigorously repulsed by the Jews, who chased their attackers to the Town Hall district. There a Jewish mass demonstration formed and uttering cries of "Long Live the King!" "Long Live Greater Roumania!" "Down with Cuzai!" the Jewish demonstrators held the Cuzists in check.

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it is necessary to improve the status of the Jew everywhere—to give him a home," Lord Snell asserted.

Rabbi Wise described conditions in Europe as an earnest of the serious need in which world Jewry stands today for an organized and representative spokesman. He attacked those who oppose the world congress idea as "super-optimists or assimilationists."

He cited the case of Poland as a typical example of the situation which confronts Jewry. "In Poland," he said, "the statement of the recently arrived Ambassador is virtually an announcement of governmental abdication—to declare that the government dared not act more vigorously against the student hooligans attacking young Jews lest the former be provoked to further violence."

He scored the "dollar inquisition in Soviet Russia."

The world Jewish congress must be established by us in conjunction with public opinion, he asserted. "We are prepared to resign to leaders who believe in human kindness and the democratic spirit," Rabbi Wise said.

"Vast changes are in store for the whole civilized world," said Mr. Medalie. "The Jewish people are strenuously affected by these changes and must adjust themselves to the new conditions by organized efforts behind which must stand all the resources of Jewry."

Mr. Medalie then told of the necessity for organized effort to defend Jews robbed of religious liberty, and economic, academic, and political freedom.

"We have never had a congress composed primarily of Jews, motivated with the purpose of presenting an exalted program inspiring to action the nations of the world," said Mr. Eisner. "Perhaps I am visionary when I say that the time may be very near at hand when a Jewish Congress might exert a world-wide influence and continue in an effective way Israel's traditional message in life."

In urging the world Jewish Congress idea, Mr. Deutsch declared that "nearly eight million Jews in European countries are affected by the virus of anti-Semitism which thrives unchecked by any concerted attempt on the part of our Christian brethren to stamp out this barbaric relic of the Middle Ages."

The sum of \$12,000 was raised for the American Jewish Congress.

Jewish Company, Emir Abdullah is quoted as having revealed to the press here.

Emir Abdullah, according to the same reports, confirmed that the agreement had been reached and stated that he is ready to carry it through because he is convinced that great economic benefits will accrue to the entire country.

The pressure of the Palestine Government must first be overcome, before the lease can be carried through, Emir Abdullah allegedly stated. The fate of the entire matter thus appears to be in the hands of the High Commissioner.

JERUSALEM, Jan. 23—A threat to overthrow Emir Abdullah of Transjordan, if he persists in consummating the agreement to lease 70,000 dunams of his personal domain to a Jewish company, was voiced here yesterday at a meeting of the Istiklal, the Arab independent party, which has branches in Palestine, Transjordan, Iraq and Syria.

The meeting also submitted a petition to the Palestine High Commissioner, Sir Arthur Grenfell Wachope, requesting him to intervene and to prevent the lease of land in Transjordan to Jews.

A cabled request for intervention in their behalf was also sent yesterday to Charles Crane, head of the Institute of World Affairs in the United States.

The Arabs, in their cable to Mr. Crane, asked financial assistance to enable them to obtain possession of Emir Abdullah's land.

Charles Crane, to whom Arab nationalities have appealed for aid to prevent the lease of Transjordan land to Jews, is well known for his pro-Arab sympathies.

In 1919, Mr. Crane headed the American Commission on Mandates in Turkey appointed by President Wilson in 1919. President Wilson hoped to find in this report a basis for the formulation of a practical stand in connection with his sympathetic attitude toward Zionist aspirations in Palestine.

The report, which was completed before the Balfour Declaration, proved to be intensely pro-Arab and advance indication of its contents aroused considerable criticism. The result was that the report was never published.

Mrs. Ruth Kashare Tishkoff, former secretary of the California Teachers' Association, died at her home in Los Angeles after a brief illness. She was a prominent member of a number of Los Angeles clubs and active in educational circles. She is survived by her husband, A. Tishkoff, and three children.

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
