Farm School to Accept Large Class This Spring (Tewish Daily Bulletin)

DOYLESTOWN. Tan. 25-The Freshman class to be admitted to National Farm School this Spring will consist of 85 students, an increase of 25 students over classes admitted during the last few years, it was announced by Herbert D. Allman, president.

The decision was reached by the Board of the School at a meeting this week, when statistics were presented, showing the large number of boys out of school who can find no employment and are roaming the country without guidance. This is one of the first practical gestures offered, toward the alleviation of what promises to become a national problem of boy delinquency. Urges Relief of Hardships Inflicted on Sabbath Observers By Sunday Closing Laws Plea Addressed to Members of the

New York State Legislature by Jewish Sabbath Alliance The Jewish Sabbath Alliance of

America has sent a communication to all members of the New York State Legislature, signed by its president, Dr. Bernard Drachman, urging the enactment into law of a measure to relieve "the great harm and injury inflicted on a most worthy element of the citizenry of this State," who ob-serve the seventh day as the Sabbath, by the present Sunday laws of the state.

The Jewish Sabbath Alliance has re-ceived a pledge of support in its work in this direction from the Rt. Rev. Francis J. McConnell, Bishop of the Methodist Episcopal Church. The communication addressed to the

Legislature declares: "The undersigned is addressing you

in this communication in order to put before you the description of a state of affairs by which great harm and injury are inflicted upon a most worthy element of the citizenry of this State. A condition which calls for relief. We desire to obtain your views in the matter and your suggestion as to how this urgently needed relief can be obtained.

We refer to the effect of the Sunday Laws upon the seventh-day Sabbath-keeping population of the State, especially upon the small Jewish shopkeeper who desires to keep his place of business closed from Friday evening to Saturday night, in accordance with the precept of his religion, and is compelled by the Penal Code of the State to keep his establishment closed also on Sun-

"Persons not familiar with the inner conditions of the Jewish community can hardly realize the tremendous hardship which is inflicted upon the conscientious Sabbath-keeping Jewish storekeepers and the gravity of the struggle of conscience to which he is submitted. It is literally a contest between his faith and his sentiment of his religious and moral duty and the possibility of earning his livelihood-of obtaining the bread with which to sup-port his family. This matter has al-ways been a sore spot in the religious and social life of the Jewish people of this State. Even in the best and most prosperous of times it has always been (Continued on Page 4)

Jabotinsky Says World Union of Zionist Revisionists Not Affected by Congress Court's Decision By Our Berlin Correspondent

BERLIN - The World Union of Zionist Revisionists is not affected by the decision of the Zionist Congress Court of honor which voted the suspension of the Revisionists as a separate Union, declared Vladimir Jabotinsky, president of the Revisionists, in an address delivered here at a conference of the German Revisionist Organization. Mr. Jabotinsky described the decision

of the Congress court as unjust and contrary to the statutes. The Congress Court voted the suspension of the Revisionist Union on the ground that it infringed upon the regulations binding it in conducting separate political activities and negotiations. "Of course, the Union of Zionist Revisionists is not affected by the de-cision," he asserted. "The Union is a

sovereign body. It includes, however,

many members who are at the same time

has made a demand that they must withdraw from all participation in the independent political activity of the Union. "This claim of the Revisionist Union to conduct independent political work has very little to do with the Calais resolutions. It was adopted by the First Revisionist World Congress held in 1925. The second and third Conferences confirmed the decision, and when the Zionist Organization, by the creation of the mixed Jewish Agency surrender-ed its sovereignty and officially de-clared this to be the case in a letter to

us, our fourth World Conference held

in Prague in 1930 removed the only

limitation that had existed to our po-litical freedom of action, the recog-nition of the "prerogative of the Zionist Executive" "All these decisions were adopted unanimously by these various Conferences. I have, therefore, come here today to ask you - Can the Revisionist Union, after the decision of the Congress Court, count in its political actions, on the active assistance of all its members? That is the question which I put to the Conference.

"To the Party Council which will meet at the end of February, I shall put a further question — What is now, after the confirmation of the Calais decisions by the Vienna Conference, the

"Racketeering War" Leads to Arrest of Yeshiva Dean: Police Apologize: Dismiss Charges Rabbi Levenberg Arrested in Connec-

tion with Bombing of Market Owned by Jew (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

CLEVELAND, Jan. 25-The bombing of the Danches Poultry Market in a racketeering war against kosher butcher shops, last week, led to the ar-rest of Rabbi Yehuda H. Levenberg. Dean of the Cleveland Yeshiva. Rabbi Levenberg was arrested at

before he was released. The arrest of the rabbi led to a

mass meeting of protest attended by 2.500 people and resulted in an apology from the Director of Public Safety, Frank J. Merrick. Director Merrick declared, "There

has been evidence of racketeering among kosher meat dealers. The police are doing everything in their power to break it up. After the bombing of the Danches place we had to work fast on any tips we could get. The police did not mean to insult the rabbi and we are sorry to have caused any unpleas-antness. If we seemed to have acted too hastily, it was because of the emergency. The charges against Rabbi Leven-

berg were dismissed by the police. The Federation of Orthodox Congregations maintains that the incident arose during Rabbi Levenberg's exercise of his duties in the interests of Kashruth and had no connection with the racketeering that has been prevailing.

According to Nathan Schoenfeld, secretary of the Federation of Ortho-

dox Congregations, the trouble started over the fact that various complaints were coming to the rabbis that meat was not being prepared in the kosher manner in many of the kosher shops.

In some shops, it was said, proprie-tors were charging the "Schochtim fee" after killing chickens themselves and in some instances hiring colored help for the killing. In agreement with the Association of

Shochtim, a committee of rabbis suc-ceeded in righting the condition except in the case of the Danches poultry market, Schoenfeld said. Police questioned the rabbi after

Danches, proprietor of the shop, reported that the rabbi had called on him the week before demanding that the fowl be killed by a registered Shochet. The rabbi was later released by the

one, that the Revisionist Union is the sole bearer of Jewish State Zionism, which engages in independent activity in all fields of State upbuilding, while exercising influence on other pro-Zionist bodies is no more than a means to be employed when and insofar as it appears useful and opportune.

The sentimental attitude of looking to the 'conquering of the Congress' must stop," Mr. Jabotinsky declared. "It may seem very desirable, and the time may come when all of us, without exception, will join in it, but it is not the 'sacred duty', nor any 'duty' at all of the Union.
"The real successor to the Zionist Or-

ganization created by Herzl is the Union of Zionist Revisionists, and its 'duty' is to work for the upbuilding of the Jewish State. However hard the task may be, however young and weak we may still be, I am convinced that in our root, our trunk and our branches we

have the potential power to carry through this task. "People remind us what happened to

the Territorialists. That has nothing to do with us. Territorialism repudiated Palestine, and therefore was condemned

to fail. "Our idea is Palestine as a Jewish State, an idea which expresses the quintessence of the Jewish soul. The failure or success of an organization depends primarily on whether it pursues bad or good aims. It is not true that the Revisionist masses will not follow us. It is true that a large section of these masses regard it as a very im-

"If we had forbidden them to take the shekel, they would have found it very painful. We did not do that. I shall always be against any such prohibition from our side. But now the Zionist Organization is demanding in return for the shekel that we must give up all independent political action, which has been unanimously approved by our five World Congresses. I am convinced that our masses will reject this demand.

"When the Jewish Agency was formed in Zurich in 1929, many of us were afraid that our non-participation in what was at the time a very popular movement would deprive us of influence. The fact is, however, that since 1929 our movement has grown immensely, while the Agency, without our participation, has declined into a tedious, futile body, which is now regarded without sympathy in every quarter.

"I am in favor, however, of leaving the question of the nature and the mission of the Union to the Party Council. There is only one thing to decide. Can the Union in its independent political activity count on the active cooperation of all its members? Is our central office to be transferred to Geneva-a step which means something only if we are determined to negotiate with the

a task of intense difficulty to conduct a business on a paying basis if obliged to abstain from carrying on the same two days in the week while one's competitors were only obliged to remain closed one day. In the present period of depression it has become a virtual impossibility.

"The Penal Code of the State grants some relief to the Seventh-day Sab-bath-keeping laborers, by making it a valid defense to prosecution under the Sunday Law for work and labor per-formed on Sunday. But even this slight measure of relief is denied to the humble Sabbath-keeping storekeeper In the present time, their cry for relief has become most intense for their position is becoming unendurable.

"It seems to the undersigned that it cannot be the intention of an American Legislature to inflict such spiritual suffering; such actual religious persecution upon a worthy and sincerely religious element of the population. believe that the Sunday Law should be amended to exempt seventh-day Sabbath observers from its provisions.
