TENSION OF GERMAN JEWS INCREASES AS SPORADIC NAZI ATTACKS OCCUR; REPORT GOEBBELS WILL BE POLICE HEAD

Beobachter" Reports Mass Jewish Migration Movement from Germany; J.T.A. Learns Report Exaggerated; Goebbels Known as Worst Jew Baiter in Nazi Party; Nazis Demonstrate at Stock Exchange and University of Berlin; Central Union Seeks to Calm Jews; Fear Situation Will Be Most Serious in Prussia; "Rundschau" Says Jews Will Unite for Mutual Defense If Attempt Made to Deprive Them of Rights

BERLIN, Jan. 31—The report that Paul Josef Goebbels, head of the Hitler party in Berlin, editor of "Der Angriff," and the worst Jew baiter in the Nazi party will be appointed president of the Police Department of Berlin, coupled with sporadic attacks upon the Jews, has contrived to considerably increase the tension of the Jewish population, living in great anxiety since Hitler's appointment as Chancellor.

Several cases of attack on Jews by Nazi Storm Troopers, drunk with victory, have been reported to the Central Union of German Citizens of the Jewish Faith. A Jewish funeral procession was abused by the Nazis; the windows of a book store owned by a Jew, Gornzer, were smashed; Nazi Storm Troops riding in city trains, shouted abuse at the Jews: "Out with the Jews!" they cried. These incidents are regarded as symptomatic of the present mood of the Nazis.

An effort to introduce some semblance of calm was made by spokesmen for the Central Union at a press conference today. The Central Union leaders declared that seven members of the cabinet are not Nazis and thus outweigh three enemies of the Jews whom the cabinet does contain. Even the Nazis will hesitate before carrying out actual excesses against the Jews, the Central Union holds, because they will consider the impression created abroad, particularly

on Mussolini who opposes anti-Semitism.

The Central Union leaders admit that the situation is more serious in Prussia than elsewhere in view of the fact that Captain Hermann Goering, the Nazi leader in favor of extreme measures against the Jews, has been appointed Minister of Interior with control of the police.

In Prussia therefore, discrimination against the Jews, including non citizens and Staatenlose, is awaited.

The Central Union has established the closest contact with the Jewish population throughout Germany including the isolated districts and the quarters populated by East European Jews in an effort to calm the population, it was revealed.

Austria Permits Nazis to Celebrate Hitler's Victory

VIENNA, Jan. 31—The Austrian government has granted permission to the Nazis throughout the country to arrange celebrations to mark Hitler's victory in Germany, after receiving assurances from the Nazis that peace would be maintained.

A huge torchlight procession has been arranged for tomorrow evening in Vienna, in which 500,000 Nazis are expected to participate.

Special police guards will be stationed in the Jewish quarters of Vienna and at cafes as a precautionary measure, during the progress of the march.

The Austrian Nazis have announced a campaign to force new Parliamentary elections in Austria. In this fashion they hope to duplicate the success of Hitler in Germany.

National Democrats Seek to Instigate New Riots Against Jews in University Towns

Employ as Pretext Jewish Responsibility for Projected Limitation of University Autonomy

WARSAW, Jan. 31—The anti-Semitic National Democratic Party is making an effort to bring about a series of new anti-Jewish disturbances in the various University Centers.

This time the National Democrats are utilizing as a pretext for their agitation against the Jews, alleged Jewish responsibility for the threatening abolition of University autonomy. Limitations on University autonomy were proposed following the November anti-Jewish riots.

Student mass meetings are now being organized in Cracow and Warsaw to protest against the projected limitation of University autonomy.

Deputy Sommerstein, addressing the Sejm Education Committee yesterday, referred to this attempt and deplored the tendency to draw Jews into a political fight. The Jewish attitude is a practical one, based upon experiences during recent excesses when the university authorities failed to protect the Jewish students and failed likewise either to arrest or sentence the student rioters, the Jewish deputy stated.

A draft of a bill proposing a reduction in the autonomy of the universities has recently been presented to the Minister of Education. Students and professors have debated the subject and strong protests against it have been received by the Ministry of Education from rectors and university professors.

Bialik Celebration Cancelled in Berlin

BERLIN, Jan. 31—A celebration scheduled last night to mark the 60th anniversary of the distinguished Hebrew poet, Chaim Nachman Bialik, was cancelled at the last moment upon the advice of the police department.

The police department asked that the meeting be cancelled in order to prevent any possible encounter between Jews returning from the celebration and Nazi Storm Troopers, returning from a torchlight procession to celebrate Adolph Hitler's appointment as German Chancellor.

Form Permanent Local Council for Congress

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 31—A permanent local council for the American Jewish Congress was organized Sunday at a meeting which was attended by representatives of upwards of eighty fraternal and other organizations.

Leon Meitzer was unanimously elected President and Harry M. Seidenberg, Secretary. Other officers elected include: P. Miller and Dr. M. E. Kalish, Vice-Presidents; Abraham Hirsh, Chairman of the Executive Committee and Simon Lackerman, Treasurer.

The Conference was addressed by Rabbi Joshua Goldberg who described the conditions confronting the Jewish people in many lands. Resolutions were adopted calling upon the incoming administration to take steps leading to the strengthening of the organization. An effort is also to be made to establish a Court of Arbitration for the settlement of disputes arising among Jewish institutions. A resolution was adopted felicitating the poet, Chaim Nachman Bialik, on the occasion of his sixtieth birthday anniversary.

Felix Moses has been installed as president of the Minneapolis chapter of B'nai B'rith.

Stock Exchange and at the University of Berlin.

A group of five hundred Nazis including students and Storm Troopers in full Nazi uniform organized a demonstration outside the Stock Exchange where they proceeded to shout abuse of the Jews. "Out with Jews from the Stock Exchange!" "Down with the Jews!" "Down with the Jewish Robbers and Plunderers!" were the shouts that rang through the air.

Nazi speakers in motor lorries attempted to address the crowds around the Stock Exchange.

After this demonstration, the Nazis proceeded to the University campus, marching to the tune of "Judaea Perish!" Jewish students were driven from the University buildings, despite the efforts of Rector Kohlrusch to pacify the demonstrators.

"Beobachter" Says Jews Seeking to Leave En Masse

BERLIN, Jan. 31—The "Voelkischer Beobachter", principal organ of Chancellor Adolph Hitler's National Socialist party publishes a report that all the passport offices of Germany are crowded with Jewish applicants seeking visas to go abroad.

The paper asserts that the reason mentioned in their applications is that they desire to take the cure, but that in actuality the Jews are seeking flight abroad with their possessions.

The Jewish Telegraphic Agency learns that the Nazi press report is greatly exaggerated. There is no mass migration movement among the Jews although the Jewish population is terrified and living in intense anxiety as a result of Hitler's appointment as Chancellor.

The Nazi press, celebrating Hitler's victory, announces that the present Prussian Minister of Education, Kaehler, will be replaced by a Nazi, Rust. The Nazi's appointment is interpreted as meaning the creation of new stringencies for Jewish professors in German educational institutions. One of the first to suffer, it is predicted, will be the Jewish professor Ernst Cohn, of Breslau University, whose ouster the Nazis have unsuccessfully sought to bring about since last November.

Jews Will Defend Rights

BERLIN, Jan. 31—The Rundschau, organ of the German Zionist Federation gave warning yesterday that German Jewry will combat any attempt made to bring about the withdrawal of its rights.

Commenting upon the appointment of Adolph Hitler to the Chancellorship, the

paper assumes that President Paul von Hindenburg and the parties supporting the Hitler cabinet will respect the equality of rights guaranteed to the Jews under the German constitution and that the Hitler anti-Semitic program will not become the program of the Federal Government.

"We are convinced," the Rundschau asserts, "that the German people will oppose a barbarian anti-Semitic policy. Germany's position among the civilized nations of the world depends upon its attitude toward the Jewish question."

"German Jewry will preserve its honor in peace, but it will combat any attempt at a formal or practical withdrawal of its rights, standing together for mutual defense," the paper states.

Nazis Demonstrate Against Cohn At Breslau

BRESLAU, Jan. 31—Nazi students, encouraged by the elevation of Hitler, inaugurated a new campaign today against Professor Ernst Cohn.

Hundreds of Nazi students, carrying swastika flags and singing anti-Semitic songs assembled outside the campus and presented their demands to the rector.

The Nazis called for the discontinuance of Cohn's position.

Union of Orthodox Congregations Approves \$100 Tax on All Members of Orthodox Congregations

The Union of Orthodox Jewish Congregations, at the closing session of its annual convention at the Hotel Edison, adopted a resolution approving the immediate imposition of a tax of \$100 on all members of orthodox Jewish congregations, for the purpose of raising a fund to meet the emergency situation in Jewish religious institutions.

The resolution was in support of the plan proposed by Rabbi Herbert S. Goldstein, the retiring president, who estimated that the sum of \$1,200,000 could be raised inasmuch as there are 3,000 orthodox Jewish Congregations with an average membership of 400.

A membership drive in all orthodox congregations is also to be launched.

Other resolutions adopted approved the efforts to secure uniform Sunday legislation to permit Sabbath observers to work on Sunday, and the American Federation of Labor's stand for a five day week.

The convention also approved the imposition of a Torah stamp on all candles used for religious purposes to raise a fund for the support of Yeshivas and Talmud Torahs.

\$500,000 Campaign for Ort Launched at Dinner Here for Lord Marley

Lord Marley Says Conditions in Poland Worse Than in Russia, Owing to Economic Anti-Semitism

A campaign for \$500,000 for the People's Ort Federation was launched on Sunday evening at a dinner at the Hotel Commodore. New York City will be asked to subscribe the sum of \$100,000. The funds are to be used to continue the Ort's reconstruction work in Eastern Europe along agricultural and industrial lines.

Three hundred persons attended the dinner which was in the nature of a reception to Lord Marley, deputy Speaker of the House of Lords and chairman of the Parliamentary Advisory Council of the Ort in Great Britain. In addition to the guest of honor addresses were delivered by B. Charney Vlodek, national chairman of the People's Ort Federation; Murray Levine, vice president; and Mrs. Florence Dolowitz, president of the Women's Association of the Ort. Dr. Henry Moskowitz, chairman of the board of directors presided.

Lord Marley described the conditions of the Jews in Eastern Europe, particularly in Poland and in Soviet Russia, stressing the importance of the work of the Ort in readjusting them to new economic and social conditions.

Of the situation of the Jews in Poland, he said that conditions are growing progressively worse for them as a result of economic anti-Semitism, and that the situation there is much worse than in Russia.

Discussing the Jewish situation in Russia with reference to the deceased, Lord Marley said that Jews are accepted on the same footing as other nationalities. Much of the suffering of the Jews in Russia is due to the Soviet law which admits to full citizenship only

Chicago Jewish Institutions To Spend \$2,617,963 in 1933

CHICAGO, Jan. 31—More than 700 members of the Jewish Charities of Chicago attended the annual meeting and dinner of the organization.

The estimated net budget requirements for 1933, James H. Becker, treasurer, reported, will be \$1,605,413. This will leave a deficit of \$330,413 after the estimated income of \$1,275,000 is taken into consideration, he said. Total expenditures by organizations allied with the Jewish Charities and receiving help from it will amount to \$1,013,550 in addition to the Jewish Charities budget, making total expenditures by Jewish institutions of Chicago for 1933 of \$2,617,963.

Sol Kline, acting president, reported on the organization's activities during 1932 and explained that a campaign to

World Zionist Court of Honor Vindicates Soskin; Revisionist Leader Refuses to Attend Trial

Found Not Guilty of Breach of Discipline in Trial Held Without His Attendance

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

BERLIN, Jan. 31—Dr. S. E. Soskin, vice-president of the World Union of Zionist Revisionists was placed on trial in absentia, last night, and found not guilty, by the Court of Honor of the World Zionist Organization.

Dr. Soskin was charged with a breach of Zionist discipline, in that he conducted independent political activities in behalf of the Revisionist Union, an infringement upon the prerogatives of the Zionist Executive.

Dr. Soskin last week refused to appear for trial, declaring that he no longer recognizes the validity of the decisions of the Zionist Court of Honor, holding that its suspension of the Revisionists as a separate Union was proof that it was a partisan body.

Dr. Gronemann, president of the Court, in announcing Dr. Soskin's vindication, declared that the action against him was based on reports taken from the Revisionist press. These reports are unreliable and therefore do not constitute proof of guilt, Dr. Gronemann asserted.

Hermann Barth, Congress attorney, urged that Dr. Soskin be declared guilty since he did not contradict the reports published in the Revisionist press concerning his political activities.

Mrs. Israel Zangwill To Speak in Syracuse

SYRACUSE, Jan. 31—Mrs. Israel Zangwill, widow of the famous English-Jewish writer, will address the Temple Society of Concord, Thursday evening, on "World Disarmament," sponsored by the Syracuse Council of Jewish Women, of which Mrs. Alex Mason is president, and the local branch of the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom. Mrs. Zangwill, who is on a lecture tour of this country in the interests of disarmament, is the guest of the Women's International League, of which Jane Addams is the founder and international head. This society has taken an active part in the campaign for disarmament.

The League announces that Mrs. Zangwill's tour is the beginning of the drive to be made this winter to secure action from the disarmament conference, which will meet shortly in Geneva, Switzerland.

Judge Philip Rubenstein of Boston, Mass., has been elected as a Trustee for three years of the Judge Baker Foundation of New England, which handles annually the personality, conduct, educational and vocational problems of various organizations in Massachusetts and other states. The cases handled by the Foundation are presented through many agencies including the Associated Jewish Philanthropies.

City Council Gets Resolution Calling for Probe Into Arrest of Rabbi

Ask Disciplinary Action Against Police Officials Responsible for Forcible Detention of Rabbi Levenberg

CLEVELAND, Jan. 31—A resolution was presented to the city council last night for an immediate investigation of the forcible detention of Rabbi Jehudah H. Levenberg, for questioning in the bombing of the Danches Poultry Market on January 18th.

The resolution was introduced in the form of an emergency issue by Councilman Herman E. Kohen.

Mr. Kohen's demand provides that Mayor Ray T. Miller be requested to direct Director Frank J. Merrick to investigate the action of the police department to determine which members of the department are responsible for "such outrageous conduct and take such disciplinary measures as the case may warrant."

Rabbi Levenberg, besides being Dean of the Cleveland Yeshiva, is spiritual leader of three major orthodox congregations in the city. He was taken into custody by police at 3:00 A. M. after the bombing of the Danches Market had occurred.

The resolution further asserts that Rabbi Levenberg, "one of the outstanding Orthodox Jewish rabbis in Cleveland and considered as such by Jewry of the country, was held incommunicado at the Central Police Station for 14 hours. Furthermore that police abused and insulted the members of his congregation who called at the station for the purpose of making an inquiry as to why their rabbi was detained."

It was learned yesterday that Mayor Miller had received telegrams from all parts of the United States protesting against the conduct of police in the

"Vossische Zeitung" Refers to Anti-Jewish Repercussions

BERLIN, Jan. 31.—Of all the German papers, the "Vossische Zeitung", is the only publication, to refer to the possible anti-Jewish repercussions of Hitler's appointment to the Chancellorsip.

The paper points out that if the present government fails to alleviate the distress and the unemployment situation, the Nazis may choose the road of least resistance, establishing the theory that "hunger cannot be expelled but the Jews can be."

"Guardian" Questions Whether Will Carry Out Anti-Jewish Program

LONDON, Jan. 31.—The Manchester Guardian is the single English newspaper which refers directly to the Jewish question in the press comments on Hitler's Chancellorsip.

The paper queries whether Hitler plans to carry out the program against the Jews which he had preached before he came into power and whether he really intends to drive the Jews from the country and distribute their wealth and property among the impoverished middle classes.

raise funds would be held in April and May of this year.

The sum of \$1,888,031 spent by the Jewish Charities in 1932, Mr. Kline explained, was the largest sum ever expended by the organization in one year.

Samuel A. Goldsmith, executive director of the Jewish Charities, who has been devoting a great deal of his time and energies during the past two years in taking an important role in the money raising activities of Cook County for all of the charitable organizations, stressed the need for the Jews of Chicago to subscribe more money for the work of the Jewish Charities.

Leo F. Wormser, who acted as toastmaster, introduced the guest of honor, former Judge Joseph M. Proskauer, President of the Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies in New York, who emphasized the necessity for the retention of the Jewish spirit and its development. The Jewish Charities, he declared, is the common ground on which all Chicago Jews can meet to aid their own people.

peasants and industrial workers, he said.

"The Jews feel the effects of this law," he declared, "for to a large extent they have been traders and because a larger number of them were traders, they suffer proportionately. The work of the Ort therefore was to relieve this condition; to provide training in industry and agriculture for these Jews.

"The position of the present time is such that owing to the speeding up in the liquidation of private trade, the Ort will have an especially difficult task within the next few years," said Lord Marley. "It is of vital importance that this training work should not be crippled at the present moment through lack of funds, and despite the world depression, I feel confident that the value of the reconstruction work of the Ort has only to be realized for it to receive continued public support.

"This is the very worst moment when the assistance so generously given in the past could be stopped. I believe the situation in Russia can be cleared up in ten or fifteen years and therefore it is immensely worth while to assure the completion of the task to which we have put our hands.

"The work of the Ort now includes the establishment of trades inside the colonization settlements, the building up of cooperative workshops and factories, the provision of machines for maintaining of Jewish families and the supplying of machines direct to relatives and subscribers. The services rendered also include traveling engineers to repair and keep in order those machines, the supplying of raw materials and educational work such as technical lectures."

Anti-Semitism is now considered counter-revolutionary in Soviet Russia and therefore a punishable offense. As evidence of the pro-Jewish sentiment in Russia he cited the fact that 60 per cent of the members of the Ozet, Jewish Land Settlement Society, are non Jews.

case of Rabbi Levenberg. Police Chief George Matowitz has been instructed by Director Merrick to look into the case immediately and make a report to him.

Police, according to the resolution, accused Rabbi Levenberg of being a racketeer and of having a criminal record. Such accusations, the measure asserts, are "wholly unfounded, false and ridiculous," and that a great injustice and humiliation had been perpetrated upon Rabbi Levenberg and every member of his three congregations.

"The wanton disrespect of the rights of the citizens of Cleveland was an affront to Jew and Gentile as well, and was a direct insult and outrage to the Jewry of Cleveland," Mr. Kohen's resolution reads.

Mrs. Danches, owner of the poultry market, the bombing of which has implicated the rabbi, told police that Rabbi Levenberg and another man had come to her house to collect tax on killing of chickens and that these men had threatened her after a dispute had arisen. It was the second time in a month that the poultry shop had been bombed. The truth of Mrs. Danches' statements to police are being questioned, and the threat is reported to be unfounded.

The local B'nai Brith will co-operate with the Federation of Orthodox Congregations to control racketeering among Kosher butcher shops and markets.

**Benj. F. Weil Dies After
Attending Brother's Funeral**

MINNEAPOLIS, Jan. 31.—Having come to Minneapolis to attend the funeral of his brother, Jonas Weil, leader in civic and Jewish communal life, Benjamin Weil, formerly of Minneapolis, succumbed to a stroke.

He was in his room at the Radisson hotel when he suddenly became ill, dying a short time afterward. His family lives in Chicago. Mr. Weil, a native of Chicago, came to Minneapolis when he was about two years old and lived here for 50 years. He was for years a member of the firm of Isaac Weil & Sons. He left Minneapolis several years ago, making his home in Chicago. Surviving him are his widow and two daughters, Miss Hannah Weil and Miss Adelaide Weil, as well as two brothers, Herman Weil and William Weil, and a sister, Mrs. D. C. Jeffery.
