GERMAN JEWISH LEADERS DECLARE SITUATION DANGEROUS FOR JEWS; STRESS NEED FOR CALM

Administrative Discrimination Against Jews Even If No Legislative Sanction; Believe Goering Will Act Against Jewish Staatenlose; Aged Jew Attacked in Berlin; Hitler's Legal Adviser Calls for Liquidation of All "Cohn Cases"

BERLIN, Feb. 3.—While the "night of the long knife" has not materialized, upon Hitler's accession to the Chancellorship, and the Nazi Storm Troops have not been incorporated in the regular police department, the present situation promises to be dangerous for the Jews, in the opinion of representative Jewish leaders of Germany interviewed by the Jewish Telegraphic Agency.

While there is a great need to impress upon the Jewish population the urgency of maintaining a calm attitude, they are fully alive to the seriousness of the situation which presents itself and the dangers which loom, the Jewish leaders declared.

There is the danger, they hold, that the Hindenburg circle, for the purpose of securing Hitler's co-operation in the interests of the country and neutralizing the opposition of his party, may readily agree to concessions aimed against the Jews. While the Hindenburg circle may prevent discrimination against the Jews from being authorized by Parliamentary action, they may, notwithstanding, permit Nazi Ministers and officials to conduct a policy of provocation and persecution against Jewish individuals and Jewish groups.

Such elasticity with regard to the Jewish question, may enable Captain Herman Goering, Minister of Interior for Prussia, to carry out his plans

Nahum Sokolow Leaving Palestine February 7th

against the Jewish Staatenlose; namely to expel them from Germany or to confine them in prison camps, it is feared.

In connection with the compulsory labor item, one of the principal planks of the present program of the government, the demands of the Nazis may be acceded to and Jews be excluded from compulsory labor, paying, instead, an additional tax of five percent.

Some hope that the Nazi anti-Semitic policy will be mitigated, is placed by the Jewish leaders, in the presence in the cabinet of Franz von Papen, Dr. Alfred Hugenberg and General von Blomberg.

Hugenberg, the present Minister of Labor, it is recalled, fought anti-Semitism in his own party, the Nationalist Party. General von Blomberg, the Minister of Defense, has participated in meetings of the Union of Jewish Veterans, it is also recalled.

On the other hand, Jewish leaders are wondering why these German leaders enabled Hitler to become Chancellor before the dissolution of Parliament, thus increasing the Nazi chances for new election gains.

It is pointed out that former Chancellor von Schleicher asked for the dissolution of Parliament and was refused, at a time when such action might have brought about a further decline in Nazi strength.

With no concrete knowledge of the extent to which those who oppose Hitler's anti-Semitic policy, will seek to hinder it, Jewish leaders are entertaining grave fears for the future. They fear that the new elections will further entrench Hitler in power, so that a Nazi government will be permitted to remain in office for a considerable period. In such an eventuality, Nazi Ministers will not hesitate to carry out their anti-Semitic policy, it is believed.

Anti-Semitic Disturbances Spreading in Roumania; Three Jews Injured in Jassy Attack

Special Police Patrols Stationed in Jassy, Following Attack by Anti-Semites on Student Meeting

BUCHAREST, Feb. 3.—Anti-Semitic disturbances which began on Wednesday with an attack upon a Jewish engineer on Bucharest's principal thoroughfare, by a group of Iron Guards, led by Deputy Robu, are spreading to other parts of Roumania today.

Anti-Jewish disturbances were renewed last night in Bucharest but no Jews were injured. Excesses occurred in Jassy, causing injuries to three Jews.

The Jassy excesses occurred at a joint meeting of Jewish and non-Jewish students. Non-students of Akerman invited Jewish students to participate in a meeting in Jassy, after the municipality of Akerman had refused to grant a subvention to the students unless all students were united in one group and benefited equally.

Iron Guards and Cuzists, learning of the scheduled meeting, arrived in a group and proceeded to attack the hall where the meeting was taking place.

The student leaders, Moculsky and Tashka, led the attack. The two were arrested, but immediately released after their names had been taken by the police.

As a result of the attack, special police patrols are now stationed in Jassy.

The three Jews injured are S. Weltmann, George Wahrman, and a student, Novikow.

Offer Reward for Apprehension Of Attackers of Carlebach

BERLIN, Feb. 3.—The Israelitisches Familienblatt today announced a reward of two thousand marks for information leading to the apprehension of the attackers of its editor, I. Carlebach, who was seriously injured last month.

Carlebach's condition, which was at first despaired of, continues to improve and it is believed that he will soon be able to resume part of his duties.

It is believed that Communists, enraged because of his critical articles of Soviet Russia, are responsible for the attack.

Dedicate Trees to**Marshall and Cantor**

SYRACUSE, Feb. 3 — "Chamishah Asar B'Shvat," the "New Year of the trees in Palestine," will be celebrated Sunday afternoon by the children of the Temple Society of Concord Religious School with the dedication of two trees in memory of Louis Marshall, Jewish leader, and Louis Cantor, chief sanitary engineer in Palestine, who recently died there. The two men were both born and raised in Syracuse, and were members of the Temple. The two trees will be planted in their honor early in spring on the Temple Society of Concord grounds.

Mrs. Louis J. Bragman, principal of the school, and Rabbi Benjamin Friedman, will direct and supervise the ceremonial exercises.

Mount Sinai Hospital School**Graduates Ninety-eight Nurses**

Ninety-eight young women, nineteen of whom received special awards, were graduated by the Mount Sinai Hospital School of Nursing.

It was the fiftieth commencement, the school having granted 2,040 diplomas since its founding. During the past year the school had a daily census of 287 students and forty probationers, according to the Hospital Information and Service Bureau of the United Hospital Fund, one of the largest nurses training schools in the city.

The exercises were held in the Blumenthal Auditorium and were followed by a reception in the Nurses' Home. The address to the graduating class was made by Dr. Stephen S. Wise. Hugo Blumenthal, president of the board of the School of Nursing, welcomed the large audience and Miss Elizabeth A. Greener, superintendent of nurses and principal of the school, presented her annual report.

**Lipsky Urges U.S. Jewry
To Act Quickly on Palestine**

Louis Lipsky, National Chairman of the American Palestine Campaign, this week communicated with every Jewish community in America as part of the concentrated, nation-wide drive to obtain funds immediately to enable the Jewish Agency for Palestine to continue its projects in Palestine.

Mr. Lipsky warned Jewish leaders that unless the budget of the Jewish Agency were safe-guarded, unfortunate consequences would result for the entire economic position in Palestine which has been progressing satisfactorily.

Special emphasis was placed by Mr. Lipsky upon "primacy and priority" for the Keren Hayesod budget, for which the American Palestine Campaign, in co-operation with Hadassah, aims to raise the American portion. The Keren Hayesod (Palestine Foundation Fund) is the sole financial instrument of the Jewish Agency for Palestine. "Delay in fixing early dates for American Palestine Campaign is dangerous to the interest of Palestine," Mr. Lipsky declared.

B'nai Brith Head Says Body Ready to Help German Jewry; Executive Meets

Progress in All Activities of B'nai Brith Reported at Annual Executive Meeting

CINCINNATI, Feb. 3.—Progress in all its activities was reported and a determination to carry on was expressed at the annual meeting of the Executive Committee of B'nai Brith held here.

Alfred M. Cohen, President of the Order, summed up the Jewish world situation and the achievements of B'nai Brith during 1932, and pointed out the larger problems facing the organization during the coming year.

Mr. Cohen, speaking of the German situation, said, "Were it not a grim fact, it would seem impossible that intellectually enlightened Germany had so far lost its sense of justice as to have well nigh accepted the leadership of Hitler, who is hell-bent on destroying a section of Germany's population, distinguished alike in the past and at present for its contributions to the best the world has produced in science, literature, music, and other arts. Hitler, if sane, cannot believe that the Jew is what he depicts him to be. I have kept in constant contact with Dr. Leo Baeck of our Executive Committee in Berlin, and assured him that we were at his command to do anything within our ability that would help."

Three Jews Named to Office in New Jersey

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

TRENTON, N. J., Feb. 3.—Three appointments to office, of special interest to the Jews of the state, were announced here by Governor Moore. Judge Joseph Siegler of Newark, was reappointed for a five-year term as judge of the Essex County Juvenile and Domestic Relations Court.

Abe J. David, of Elizabeth, was reappointed for a five-year term as Prosecutor (District Attorney) of Union County. Judge David is active in the Jewish communal life of his city and at present is serving as honorary head of the Y.M.-Y.W.H.A. Membership campaign there.

The Governor announced that Assemblyman Joseph Greenberg of Hoboken will become judge of the District Court there, succeeding William E. Hanley. At the personal request of Assemblyman Greenberg, who last year served as Speaker of the Assembly, he will take up his new duties at the end of March.

Governor Moore's recent appointment of Police Judge Harold Simandl of Newark, to the Circuit Court of the state is still pending in the Senate, where it must receive confirmation in order to take effect.

Number of Americans at German Universities Too Small To Warrant Alarmist Reports

View Held by American Jewish Committee; Conducts Investigation After Recent Difficulties of Jews at Cologne

In connection with recent difficulties experienced by American Jewish students at the University of Cologne, which have given rise to exaggerated reports of the increase in the number of Jewish students at German universities in recent years, the American Jewish Committee has ascertained that, while on a percentage basis the number of Americans at the German universities at the present time appears to be much greater than in preceding years, even the maximum of today is too small to give any valid ground for such alarmist statements as have appeared in some German newspapers.

Complete figures are not available, says the Committee in a statement to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, but statistics at hand indicate that for a number of years American students have constituted an almost infinitesimal proportion of the total student bodies of German universities and technical high-schools. In the scholastic year 1926-27 there were 138 Americans out of a total of 93,228 students at these institutions, a percentage of only 0.15. In the summer semester of 1927, the Americans constituted less than one-tenth of one per cent, there being 101 American students out of a total of 101,436. In the summer semester of the following year there were 147 Americans out of a total of 112,315 (0.13%). The figures for 1929-30 are not available. In the winter semester of 1931-32, there were 469 American students (0.36%) in the German universities and technical high-schools, when the total enrollment was 129,247. The number of Jews among these American students could not be ascertained. According to recent reports, however, this number does not exceed 200 at the present time.

Much of the increase of the number of American students at German universities during the past two years can be traced to the efforts of steamship companies whose advertisements regarding the cheapness of living in Germany and ease of obtaining admission to the universities have attracted an increasing number of American students, the statement declares. According to press reports from Berlin, these advertisements are not entirely accurate, especially when they do not take into account the fact that many German universities are overcrowded.

Rabbis of the three largest Orthodox Synagogues and of the reformed temple in Yonkers, N. Y., filed a petition with the mayor of that city protesting the closing of the night schools, as an economy measure.

With only \$15,000 of a \$50,000 goal realized, the Jewish Community Center of Yonkers, N. Y., has extended its fund campaign.

League Asked to Probe Anti-Jewish Discrimination in Poland and German

Resolution Adopted by Meeting of National Jewish Women's Organizations

The League of Nations was requested to investigate Poland's violation of the rights of its Jewish citizens and Germany's threats to the peace and safety of its Jewish citizens, in a resolution adopted by the Conference Committee of the National Jewish Women's Organizations meeting here on Thursday at a peace conference.

The resolution was introduced by Mrs. Estelle M. Sternberger, secretary of the Committee, who declared:

"Though it is the province of the League of Nations to adjust issues that threaten the peaceful relations of governments, the League should also be aroused to the crying need for sending a commission to those countries that have committed flagrant crimes, not against international peace, but against internal peace. United States recalls its ambassador when the Russian government under Czar Nicholas failed to honor the passport of an American citizen of the Jewish faith. The Jews of Poland are essentially the wards of the League of Nations. Why is the League silent as thousands of Jews suffer daily at the hands of Polish mobs? Governments ostracize Soviet Russia for its repudiation of debts contracted under the Czarist regime. Governments associated with the League of Nations

As Zionists we are especially mindful of your never-failing sympathy and understanding of our aims, and of your courageous advocacy of the cause of Palestine in times when that cause was unpopular and thankless one.

Aged Jew Attacked by Nazis

BERLIN, Feb. 3.—Two uniformed Nazis yesterday attacked an aged store keeper on Bismarckstrasse, one of Berlin's principal streets.

The Nazis entered the store and demanded that cigarettes be given to them without charge. When the proprietor refused, they fell upon him and beat him up. A son rushed to the defense of the aged Jew. One of the attackers escaped. The incident assembled a crowd which brought about the arrest of the second Nazi.

"Angriff" to Become Government Organ

BERLIN, Feb. 3.—"Der Angriff," Berlin organ of the Nazi Party, is expected to become the official organ of the government, now that Adolph Hitler has become Chancellor.

Some abatement in the violence of the "Angriff's" anti-Jewish policy is expected as a result, and in view of the imminent appointment of its editor, Paul Josef Goebbels, as the head of the government broadcasting station.

In the meantime, however, the paper continues to launch attacks on the Jews, assailing them as parlor Bolsheviks who are behind the scenes directing the red terror.

It warns that the Jews will soon get their just desserts. For sowing the wind, they will reap a whirlwind, according to "Der Angriff."

across the seas, Mr. Cohen reported that the Jews of America enjoy a "happy situation" by contrast.

"There are some clouds on the horizon of American Jewish life in the field of economic and social relations. Evidences of anti-Jewish feeling in the press, on the stage and screen are diminishing. On the other hand, economic discrimination is not diminishing and justly occupies a prominent place in our thoughts and discussions," Mr. Cohen said. "Undoubtedly the very distressing level of present employment conditions is responsible for this unfairness which grows as unemployment increases. In the final analysis, both defamation and discrimination are nothing else than manifestations of lack of good will and correct understanding among the various religious, cultural, and national elements which together constitute the American people."

The report of Dr. I. M. Rubinow, Secretary of the Order, showed that the organization's budget is safely balanced, and that with appropriations cut to the bone, the B'nai Brith is able to prosecute its world-wide activities as thoroughly as before. Richard E. Gutstadt, Director of Membership and Special Activities, pointed out that during 1932 several new lodges were formed and defunct ones reorganized throughout this country and in other countries.

Sigfurd Livingston, of Chicago, chairman of the Anti-Defamation Commission, reported scores of cases settled satisfactorily.

Sidney G. Kusworm, of Dayton, O., reported that the Order's Americanization Committee, of which he is chairman, had progressed markedly in the work of citizenizing aliens from one end of the country to the other during 1932. The membership of the Aleph Zadik Aleph was greater on January 1, 1933, than a year before, according to Sam Beber, of Omaha, president of the Supreme Advisory Council. Maurice D. Rosenberg, B'nai Brith's Washington representative, reported on many cases handled for the Order at the nation's capital.

are not threatening to ostracize Poland for its repudiation of the rights vouchsafed to the minority peoples when Poland was reconstituted as a separate country, under the treaty of Versailles.

"No nation is threatening to ostracize Germany for its shameful violation of the rights of man and its disturbance of its internal peace, in placing at the helm of its government a leader whose party threatens to crush and abuse the Jews in Germany. The claims of humanity should be equally sacred with the claim of monetary debts, in international relations."
