GERMAN JEWRY ELECTS COMMITTEE TO REPRESENT IT AND TAKE NECESSARY ACTION IN PRESENT SITUATION

Committee of Five Named After Meeting of Representatives of All Federal Unions of German Jewry to Take Council as to the Measures Required in the Face of the Present Danger; Centre Party Spokesman Assures Delegation It Will Continue to Fight Equality Rights of Jews; Urges Jews to Continue Their Fight for Rights

BERLIN, Feb. 14.—A meeting of representatives of all Federal Unions of German Jewry was convened here yesterday for the purpose of taking council as to the measures to be taken in the face of the dangers with which German Jewry is confronted in view of Adolf Hitler's Chancellorship.

The meeting, which was presided over by Leo Wolff, elected a Committee of Five, to represent all German Jewry and to take such action as may be deemed expedient.

An appeal was issued to German Jewry "to stand together in this serious period."

Leaders of the Jews whose voting allegiance has been given in the past to the Centre Party visited former Chancellor Wilhelm Marx yesterday for the purpose of learning from the latter the attitude of the Centre Party with regard to the rights of the Jews.

Dr. Marx declared that the Centre Party will do all within its power to protect the religious and civil equality rights of the Jews and Scherbats. He urged the Jews not to tire in their fight for the maintenance of equal rights.

Nazi Leader Would Rid Germany of "Jewish Vermin"

BERLIN, Feb. 14.—Germany is urged to get rid of its "Jewish vermin," in an election article published in the "Hamburger Beobachter," Nazi organ, by Wilhelm Kube, leader of the Nazi fraction of the Prussian Diet, which was dissolved last week.

The article, entitled "Vermin," declares: "The Jews, like vermin, come a lot from Potsdamersplate until Auster-Baschod. Through the sale of ussidy they become rich department store owners, and commercial councilors, while the Germans are impoverished. The only way to smother out the vermin is to expel them," counsels Kube.

Speaking at a Nazi meeting in Hamburg, Kube expounded on this theme and promised a "total" of the anti-

Semitic program of the Nazis for the purpose of purging Germany of its Jews and eliminating the influence of the "Semitic press." No one will be spared in this purging process, he asserted.

Says Student Bodies Will Soon Assume Official Character

BERLIN, Feb. 14.—The Prussian Minister of Education, the Nazi, Dr. Bernhard Rust, informed a Nazi student delegation from Breslau that German student bodies in all the Universities will shortly be given an official character.

Kolo Votes Against Budget as Protest Against Government's Indifference to Jewish Plight

Club of Jewish Deputies Has Lost Hope of Making Impression On Government

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

WARSAW, Feb. 14.—For the first time since the Galician moderates have taken over the management of the Club of Jewish Deputies in the Polish Sejm, the latter voted against the government budget yesterday.

Last year, the Club of Jewish Deputies supported the government budget, with the exception of Deputy Isaac Greenbaum, who did not vote.

As the spokesman for the Club of Jewish Deputies of which he is the president, Dr. Josiah Thon informed the Sejm plenium that the Jewish Deputies are compelled to vote against the budget as a protest against the indifference of the government to the ever-increasing despair of the Jewish population.

EMIR ABDULLAH ISSUES SECOND COMMUNIQUÉ DENYING LEASE OF TRANSJORDAN LAND TO JEWS; ARAB PRESS REPORTS BRITISH PRESSURE RESPONSIBLE

New Communique Asserts That If He Cannot Develop Domain with His Private Capital, He Will Leave It Just as It is as a Memorial; New Statement Follows Conference with Palestine High Commissioner; Arab Press Openly Charge Abdullah's First Communique Was a "Fake"; Arab Papers Assert Transjordan Frontier Forces Will Be Reorganized to Include 50% Jews; Transjordan Sheikh Warns Mufti and Palestine Arab Executive of Rift with Transjordan Arabs if Campaign Against Abdullah Does Not End

JERUSALEM, Feb. 14.—For the second time within a month Emir Abdullah today saw fit to officially deny rumors gaining strong currency that he is planning to lease part of his personal domain to Jews.

Without any previous warning, the Emir suddenly issued a second communique, a companion piece to his communique of January 26th, declaring: "Some of the foreign newspapers have published reports that despite the official communique from the Emir's Palace announcing the annulment of the projected land lease, many, nevertheless, remain regrettably suspicious regarding its truthfulness. Therefore the Palace announces herewith definite assurance to public opinion of Transjordan that all these rumors are with-

out foundation and confirm his previous announcement.

"His Highness has accepted the above land with thanks, as a gift, and if he does not succeed in developing it with his private capital he will leave it just as it is as a memorial."

Denial that he planned to lease his land to a Jewish company and cancellation of an option allegedly given to this company was made by Emir Abdullah on January 25th and 26th.

In the last week, however, reports were revived that an agreement for the lease of Transjordan land would be concluded with a group of Jews. In this connection, it was reported that a movement was being formed in Transjordan itself, led by Transjordan-

Convention Urges Positions Of Greater Responsibility Be Given Jewish Youth

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 14.—Let the synagogues give the Jewish youth of America greater responsibility; make them members of boards of directors; include them in discussions of serious problems that are causing the older generation so much concern, and they will become more deeply interested in affairs of the synagogue and in Jewish life generally.

This thought was expressed and approved at the sixth annual convention of the Young People's League of the United Synagogues of America whose business sessions were held here Sunday and Monday with 300 delegates representing branches throughout the country.

The principal address of the morning was delivered by Harry H. Goodell, president of the Young People's League. He stressed the important part the Jewish youth can and should play in the affairs of the synagogue.

Addressing himself to the educational program of the League, Morton Levine, Chairman of the Educational Committee, stressed the need of placing greater responsibility on the shoulders of the youth.

He called upon the directorates of synagogues to give the younger generation an opportunity to serve. This call to service will induce the youth with the responsibility to carry on, he said.

Louis J. Moss, president of the United Synagogues of America, paid tribute to the memory of Abraham Lincoln.

The afternoon session was given over to a debate on the subject of the immediate convening of a world Jewish congress. Those who participated were Rabbi Eliaz Margolin, Rabbi Samuel

chief, to prevail upon Abdullah to change his mind and upon the Transjordan Legislature to sanction the lease of land to Jews.

A petition in this sense had been drawn up and signed by twenty-one Transjordan sheiks and presented to Emir Abdullah and the High Commissioner for Palestine. The opening of the Transjordan Legislative Assembly last Thursday was to have heard a plea for the legalization of land leases to foreigners, but the session was suddenly postponed at the last minute.

The renewed reports of the land lease brought with them a renewal of a vigorous campaign of opposition on the part of the Arab press of Palestine, which openly accused Emir Abdullah of having registered the petition of the sheiks and termed his denial of the lease a "fake."

Charge British Officials Influenced Abdullah's Communique (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

JERUSALEM, Feb. 14.—Simultaneously with the issuance of Emir Abdullah's communique denying for a second time the lease of Transjordan land to Jews, the Arab press reports that Emir Abdullah was urged to postpone the lease of land to Jews by the Palestine High Commissioner and the British Military Commander of the Transjordan Forces at a conference they had with him on Sunday.

The postponement of the land lease was urged by the British government representatives because the admission of Jews may cause trouble and endanger public security, the Arab press alleges.

Asked by the Jewish Telegraphic Agency whether there is any connection between Emir Abdullah's sudden communique and the conference with British representatives on Sunday, responsible Jewish leaders declared: "We have nothing to say at present."

Dr. Chaim Arlossoff, member of the Jewish Agency Executive in Palestine in charge of political affairs, will be received by the High Commissioner today.

Arab Press Reports New Transjordan Force with 500 Jews

JERUSALEM, Feb. 14.—The reorganization of the Transjordan Frontier Force, to be comprised of 500 Jews, is reported by the Arab press today.

The papers assert that this change will be made to provide for the equality of Jewish settlement in Transjordan to safeguard both the Jews and Emir Abdullah. Those who oppose the lease of land to Jews will be regarded as opposed to Emir Abdullah as well, they write.

The Grand Mufti of Jerusalem, who

was scheduled to proceed to India for a stay there suddenly changed his mind today and will remain at home, the Jewish Telegraphic Agency learns.

The representation of Jews on the Transjordan Frontier Force has long been a subject of discussion and disagreement.

The Jews have objected to their small representation, which today consists of two officers and 15 privates of a total force of 1500.

This dissatisfaction was acknowledged by the Palestine High Commissioner in his report to the Mandates Commission of the League of Nations last November.

According to the minutes of the Mandates Commission, Sir Arthur Guestell Wauchope admitted that dissatisfaction continues regarding the Jewish share in the Transjordan Frontier Force from which Jews were practically absent. He declared that this Force was open to all but the fact that a knowledge of Arabic was essential in the Transjordan Frontier Force interfered with the recruitment of Jews.

Warn Mufti of Rift with Transjordan Arabs

AMMAN, Feb. 14.—A number of leading Transjordan sheiks have sent telegrams of protest to the Grand Mufti of Jerusalem and the Arab Executive, objecting to the propaganda the latter are conducting against Emir Abdullah in connection with the matter of leasing land to Jews.

The sheiks have warned the Mufti and the Arab Executive that a continuation of this agitation may lead to a break in the relations between the Arabs of both countries.

Palestine Arab Press in Open Con- troversy with Emir

JERUSALEM, Feb. 14.—The split between the Arabs opposing the lease of Transjordan land to Jews and Emir Abdullah is developing into an open battle, with the Arab press making deliberate accusations against the Emir.

Emir Abdullah, it is reported, took an angry tone and informed the Grand Mufti of Jerusalem and the Arab Executive that he will not tolerate the present campaign in Palestine against the proposed land lease to Jews.

Emir Abdullah, it is further stated, is establishing a political party for the purpose of supporting his policy of admitting Jews to Transjordan on the ground that this provides the only solution for his country's acute economic state.

On the other hand the Arab press for the first time openly charges that

PERMANENT COMMISSION ON EDUCATION AND YOUTH ORGANIZATION FORMED AT TWO DAY CONFERENCE CONVENED BY Z.O.A.

Israel S. Chipkin Elected Chairman of Commission Which Will Conduct a Survey of Present Status of Zionist Education and Synthesis of Means by Which It May Be Enhanced; Will Study Feasibility of Federating Present Zionist Youth Groups

The Commission on Education and Youth Organization, which met at the Y.M.H.A. auditorium Sunday and Monday, convoked by the Zionist Organization of America, called into being a permanent organization through a resolution adopted at the concluding meeting of the Commission.

Described by Morris Rothenberg, President of the Zionist Organization of America, as a meeting "of the best minds in the Jewish educational world", the two day conference was participated in by educational and youth organization leaders from many parts of the country.

Following the adoption of the resolution establishing the permanency of the Commission, Israel S. Chipkin, director of the Jewish Education Association of New York was elected its chairman.

The terms of the resolution provide for a preliminary survey of the present status of Zionist education and a synthesis of the means by which it may be enhanced.

Mr. Rothenberg in opening the Conference suggested that the Commission undertake, with reference to the study of means of strengthening the various youth Zionist organizations, the feasibility of federating them under one common head.

Interest in Zionism, said Mr. Rothenberg, was never more keen than it is today, but the technical means of converting this interest into an engine of strength for the Zionist movement had not been found.

Mr. Rothenberg listed the various youth organizations now in the Zionist field, declaring that one had gone so far as to establish farms for the preparatory training of American Chazuzim, but on the whole, he declared, none of the youth organizations, with the exception of the Junior Hadassah, had succeeded in gaining any great numerical strength. The contention that the Junior Hadassah had succeeded solely because of the influence of the Jewish mothers on their daughters, Mr. Rothenberg challenged with the question: Do not the mothers also influence their sons?

Mr. Rothenberg struck a note emphasized by several of the speakers that some of the organizations had a tendency to regard themselves as the end rather than the means to an end, that leaders were prone to have a "vested interest" in the organization, dangerous to the general objective. The federation of the various youth organizations, he held, might remove this objection.

Dr. Alexander M. Dushkin, director of the Bureau of Jewish Education of

Chicago, emphasized the need for strengthening the Zionist youth movement and called for the establishment of a Central Bureau to stimulate activity among the youth.

He stressed the need for placing emphasis on Palestine and the national aspects of Jewish life in the curricula of Jewish schools throughout the country. He called for the reorganization of community life through the drawing in of new elements and the assignment of specific pieces of work to various groupings.

Dr. Dushkin expressed the belief that the Zionist Organization in this country should give priority in its program to educational work instead of concentrating all its energies on fund raising.

In 1917, he said, we might have thought that Palestine could be built up in ten years. No one believes that now and whether we raise \$100,000 more or less for the Palestine campaign is comparatively unimportant. On the other hand educational work in the Diaspora is indispensable for the future of our efforts here in Palestine.

Dr. Dushkin declared that there was a great deal of generally unrecognized Zionist education being done in the Hebrew schools of the country. But the Jewish schools face great difficulties. There were approximately 2,000 Hebrew schools in the country, he said, but the majority of these were "one-teacher or two-teacher" schools. Most were small schools. Even in New York, the average enrollment was small and in the last year or two, they have suffered a great decline. In New York, he said, the drop in the last year or two had been from 160 pupils to the school to the present average enrollment of 100 pupils to the school.

An equally unpleasant picture of the condition of Jewish education in the country was brought to the Commission by Dr. Jacob S. Golub, director of Jewish education for Cincinnati.

A great many of the teachers in Jewish Sunday schools, said Dr. Golub, can not translate the Bible, many can not even read the prayerbook. If you want to see the Bible taught without living interest, said Dr. Golub, a visit to many of these schools is all that is necessary. Dr. Golub lamented that the teaching of many of the Jewish subjects, purely from the traditional approach, without reference to Palestine and modern Jewish life was responsible for much of this colorlessness. In this, he said, the teachers were not so responsible, as the influences which control these educational institutions.

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 14 — The Jewish youth of America were called upon to join forces with those elements in the American community that are fighting for the reduction of armaments and for the achievement of international peace at the closing session yesterday of the ninth annual convention of the Young People's League of the United Synagogue of America.

education for the Union of American Hebrew Congregations declared that "to be a Zionist does not mean merely to contribute to funds collected for the upbuilding of Palestine. It also means the development of attitudes and practices conducive to intensive and creative Jewish life in America."

"Our youth groups and adults must be made conscious of the sacred Jewish culture and aesthetic values that are a part of our Jewish social heritage. Jewish life will then come to be appreciated in its multi-colored expression in language, in literature, in art, in religion and in music. Such appreciation should lead to the development of a vital, pulsating creative Jewish life."

Dr. S. A. Friedland, director of Jewish education for Cleveland sought to find the key to Zionist education through a contrast with the influence wrought by Berlin and Rome. Germany, he declared, had sent millions of her sons to America, but the Germans here had been divorced from the influence of German culture. Rome on the other hand had succeeded in keeping vital its foreign influence. Jerusalem, he declared, must imitate Rome. He suggested various means to make Palestine alive in the American Jewish consciousness.

Rabbi Samuel Blumenfeld criticised the multiplicity of organizations in Jewish life. His criticism precipitated considerable discussion both as to his major theme and to the merits of the individual organizations.

Joseph S. Shubow, of Avukah, declared

the Communique issued by Emir Abdullah on January 26th, regarding the cancellation of the alleged land lease to Jews, was "fake".

While denying officially that he had leased land to Jews, he had already signed an option for the territory, the papers assert.

The "Falastin" now gives a new interpretation to Emir Abdullah's communique which declared: "The Emir's Palace is withdrawing the advertisement published regarding the lease of the above lands and from today on these lands are not for sale." The "Falastin" comments sarcastically: "Naturally land already leased can no more be for lease."

The Arab press has started a campaign to influence the Transjordan Legislative Council to withdraw the area of land presented to Emir Abdullah as a gift which includes the area which was to have been leased to a Jewish company.

The papers declare that the Legislative Council can withdraw this gift since it presented it.

At the same time the papers urge a series of demonstrations be held in Transjordan this week to protest against the lease of land to Jews and that Arab delegations be sent to Emir Abdullah to present these protests in person.

The Arab press reports that Emir Abdullah is planning a banquet this week to be attended by Transjordan sheiks, where official support of the lease of land to Jews will be proclaimed.

Says Sokolow Visit to Fuad Significant

Another Jew, David Rapaport and two Jewish girls were also attacked by anti-Semites, but were rescued by a taxi driver.
