## Jews from 11 Countries to Be Affected by New Interpretation Of Palestine Immigration Law

**Immigrants of Capitalist Category from  
Lands Where Money Export Forbid-  
den Must Show Cash Before Landing**

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

JERUSALEM, Feb. 18—Jews from eleven countries will be affected by the Palestine government's new interpretation of the immigration law as it applies to immigrants of the capitalist category.

Immigrants of the capitalist category have been permitted free entrance into Palestine, hitherto, provided they could show that they possess one thousand pounds in cash, any place in the world, or property valued in that amount.

The new interpretation of the law requires immigrants coming from lands where the export of money is forbidden to produce the stipulated sum in cash before landing or permits from their governments to take their money out of the country.

This new ruling creates difficulties, especially for the Jews of Germany, Czechoslovakia and Greece, where the export of money is prohibited.

An official complaint against this ruling has been submitted in behalf of the Jewish Agency Executive by Dr. Chaim Arlossoff.

## Emir Abdullah Week-End Guest of High Commissioner

JERUSALEM, Feb. 18—Emir Abdullah of Transjordan has been invited to spend this week-end as the guest of the Palestine High Commissioner, Sir Arthur Grenfell Wauchop.

The visit of Emir Abdullah may have some connection with the proposal to lease Transjordan land to Jews, is the belief in some circles.

## Fines of Nineteen Anti- Semites Reduced on Appeal

LEMBERG, Feb. 18—Nineteen students, who were accused of leading attacks upon the Jews during last November's serious disturbances, and who were fined between fifty and twenty zlotys, have appealed against this light verdict.

The court which heard the appeal has now further reduced the fines, which in the original verdict were considered the lowest possible under the law.

## Seven University Presidents On Committee Sponsoring Dinner in Tribute to Einstein

**300 Nationally Known Leaders Form  
Committee on Dinner to Distinguished  
Scientist Here on March 15th**

Over three hundred nationally-known leaders in public affairs, science, education, industry, art and letters, have joined the Committee which will sponsor the Tribute Dinner to be given to Professor Albert Einstein on the occasion of his only public appearance in New York on March 15th at the Hotel Commodore. The list of names was given out yesterday by Dr. A. S. W. Rosenbach, president of the American Friends of the Hebrew University, under whose auspices the Tribute Dinner will be given.

Seven university presidents have accepted places on the Committee and are expected to be present—among them Dr. John Grier Hibben of Princeton, President Robert M. Hutchins of the University of Chicago, Chancellor Elmer E. Brown of New York University, President Frederick B. Robinson of the College of the City of New York, and

## High Court Annuls Marriage of Jewess to Arab; Recognizes Religious Marriage Laws

**Rules Religious Laws Prohibiting Mar-  
riage of Girl Under 18 Without  
Consent of Parents Apply**

JERUSALEM—Recognition of religious laws affecting marriages, which may set an important precedent, was offered here in a verdict handed down by the High Court in the case of a young Jewess, whose marriage to an Arab it ordered annulled.

The court further ordered her returned to the home of her Jewish parents.

The case involved a Jewess, who three years ago, at the age of seventeen, secretly married an Arab without the consent of her parents. She was converted to the Islamic religion by her husband.

Later, she sought to leave her husband on the grounds of cruelty. Whereupon her husband locked her up and it was not until last September that she was able to escape.

She returned to the home of her

## To Impose Sentence Today On 15 Members of Klan Who Attacked Jewish Family

**Found Guilty After Ten Hours of De-  
liberation; Face Prison Terms  
Ranging from 1 to 10 Years**

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 18—Sentence will be imposed Monday by Judge Scott on fifteen alleged members of the Ku Klux Klan, who were found guilty of criminal assault upon a Jewish family at Long Beach.

The fifteen face prison terms ranging from one to ten years. They were found guilty after ten hours of deliberation.

The guilty group were part of a mob of fifty, garbed in the regalia of the Ku Klux Klan, who on the night of November 16th attacked the home of a Jewish tailor, David Milder. Milder, members of his family and some guests at the house were beaten up.

The Klan members broke into the house after burning a cross on the lawn of the Milder home.

The defense of the Klan members was that Milder and his family were Communists. This the family denied.

At first all but four of the Klansmen were released by the police. Later a summons was issued to sixteen to appear before a Grand Jury, which held fifteen for trial.

## Jews Blamed for Serious Situation in Germany

BERLIN, Feb. 18—Responsibility is fastened upon the Jews for the allegedly retrogressive economic situation in Germany by the Nazi organ "Der Angriff."

The paper charges in particular the "Jewish Ullstein press" with responsibility for creating pessimism on the Stock Exchange. Jewish bankers are accused of artificially forcing quotations downward.

The increase in the price of lard, for example, is laid not to an increase in import duty, but to Jewish traders who allegedly influence the population to reserve large stocks.

### Rosenwald Listed Among 19 Who Contributed Most To Chicago's Progress

CHICAGO, Ill., Feb. 18.—The late Julius Rosenwald was named by Miss Jane Addams, head of Hull House, as one of the ten men who have "contributed the most to the progress of Chicago during the first century of the city."

Miss Addams prepared the list of leaders at the request of the Presbyterian Banner, with the view of selecting men for special honors during the World's Fair year.

### Canadian Young Judaea To Raise Scholarship Fund

MONTREAL, Feb. 18.—Canadian Jewish youth through the medium of the Federation of Young Judaea, the Zionist youth movement of Canada has inaugurated a Dominion-Wide Drive to assist in the promotion of Jewish Scholarships at the Hebrew University in Palestine.

Three thousand members of the organization, comprising over 150 clubs, located in forty of the larger cities in Canada are cooperating in this drive which is being run during the last two weeks in February and which will conclude early in March.

### First Aluminum Factory to Be Opened in Palestine

JERUSALEM. — An aluminum factory, the first of its kind in Palestine, will be established at Ramat-Gan by a Jewish manufacturer of Riga, Hill Rifman.

The factory will employ fifty workers and in addition to putting out products for local consumption, plans the development of an export trade.

### Dr. Feuchtwanger Delays Departure; to Sail March 2

Dr. Lion Feuchtwanger, the distinguished German author, who has been in this country on an extended lecture tour has postponed his return to Europe for a short period.

Dr. Feuchtwanger, who was scheduled to sail for Europe on February 18th, has arranged to sail instead on March 2nd on the "Albert Ballin".

### Death Sentences for Two Jews Convicted

MOSCOW, Feb. 18.—Two leaders of the Jewish collective "Shenar", near Odessa, were sentenced to death by the High Court of Ukraine, which found them guilty of concealing grain from the government, as an example to grain speculators.

In view of the excellent past record of the two, however, the sentence was commuted and both were released.

The two Jews sentenced are G. D. Seider, chairman of the collective, and Jacob Weidenbach, inspector of granaries. The court also ordered the confiscation of their property.

The court found three guilty of concealing 588 pud grain underground while the government received only 48% of its quota.

The commutation of the sentence was ordered in view of Seider's excellent record last year when the entire quota was sent to the government and in view of the regret expressed by both.

### Mrs. Pearlman Heads Midwest Hadassah Region

### New Named Art Director Of Notre Dame University

CHICAGO, Ill., Feb. 18.—President Charles L. O'Donnell of Notre Dame University, South Bend, Ind., announces the appointment of Dr. Maurice H. Goldstein of Chicago, a distinguished art expert, as director of the art gallery of the university.

The university has one of the best collections of old masters in the country. Dr. Goldstein was internationally known and has been decorated by the French government for his discoveries in the Louvre on a visit to Paris several years ago. He also is a musician of note.

### Congress Executive To Discuss Hitlerism

The National Executive Committee of the American Jewish Congress which meets here on Sunday, February 26th, will devote its morning session to a discussion of Hitlerism.

The morning session of the Committee will take place at Carnegie Hall by courtesy of the Free Synagogue, and will be devoted to addresses by Dr. S. Parkes Cadman, Chairman of the Good-Will Committee of the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ, and Martin Guggen.

The afternoon session will take place at the Hotel Commodore. Among the subjects to be discussed are the economic status of the Jews in America and Jewish community organization in America.

### Jewish Organizations Asked To Aid Religious Education

An appeal to Jewish organizations to come to the aid of children of the poor to enable them to continue their studies in Talmud Torahs and other Jewish schools, has been issued by the Jewish Education Association of New York. The organization is calling for assistance for the first time, include fraternal lodges, mutual benefit societies and others.

The appeal, which is signed by Israel Untereber, president of the Association, Otto A. Kowalsky, vice-president, Jonah J. Goldstein, vice-president and campaign chairman, and Bernard Sussel, honorary secretary, points out that a contribution of \$20 to the Scholarship Fund of the Association insures the Jewish education of one boy or girl for a period of a year. Since its existence, the fund has helped in this way a total of nearly 20,000 boys and girls.

### Last Rites for Cohen, Curb Exchange Governor

The last rites for Philip Cohen, governor of the New York Curb Exchange were held yesterday at the Riverside Memorial Chapel.

Mr. Cohen succumbed to a heart attack on Thursday as he was riding home in a taxicab.

Mr. Cohen was a native of New York, having been born on the lower East Side. His widow, three sisters and three brothers survive him.

### Services Held Yesterday For Harry Sachs, Banker

Funeral services were held yesterday from his residence in New York for Harry Sachs, member of the international banking firm of Goldmans, Sachs and Company.

Mr. Sachs died in Atlantic City at the age of seventy-six following a brief illness.

Mr. Sachs contributed the sum of \$10,000 to the Fine Arts Department of Harvard University. His widow, a son, Howard J. and a daughter, Edith Sachs, survive.

## Starving Syrian Peasants Flee from Villages; Seek Refuge in Transjordan

Children Left to Perish of Hunger; a  
Number of Travelling Mtn.  
caravans Robbed

BEIRUT.—A large number of refugees, fleeing from the famine in the Djazirah districts, have been pouring into Dair es Zor, it is reported here.

The famine has ravaged 24 villages, forcing the peasants to desert their homes completely. Pastures have been destroyed and a large number of livestock has perished.

Mortality has been high among the farmers as well. In one village more than sixty lives were lost. Many Bedouin tribes have sought refuge in Transjordan from the deadly desert cold. In desperation, they have been selling their livestock for a song to buy bread. Starving children were left to perish of hunger in deserted tents.

Some, emboldened by hunger, have sacked the deserted villages, and with what remains of their troops have robbed a number of travelling merchants.

In Transjordan itself, however, conditions are not much better and reports of starvation are widespread. The acute economic situation in Transjordan, moreover, has led many Transjordan sheiks to urge the lease of land to the Jews, believing that Jewish capital invested in Transjordan would bring a measure of prosperity similar to that enjoyed by Palestine.

## To Absolve Jewish Students from School Fridays and Saturdays

BAGHDAD.—Modification of the school closing law, which worked hardships on Jewish students, has been ordered by the Iraq government.

The Ministry of Education has ordered the schools to absolve Jewish students from attendance of classes on both Fridays and Saturdays.

The original school law called for the closing of the schools on Friday, the Muslim Sabbath, and the resumption of classes on Saturday. The Jewish community protested against this desecration of their Sabbath and the modification resulted.

## Alfred K. Stern to Lead Chicago Charities Drive

CHICAGO, Feb. 25.—Alfred K. Stern has accepted the chairmanship of the forthcoming drive for \$1,000,000 to maintain the Jewish Charities of Chicago.

Mr. Stern is a director of the Berman-Freed Foundation, Chairman of the Illinois State Housing Commission and President of the Board of Trustees of the Institute for Psychoanalysis.

### Interesting Discourse on "Peculiarities of Jewish Chess Players"

BERLIN.—An interesting discourse on the "Peculiarities of Jewish Chess Players" was delivered recently by Dr. Emanuel Lasker, chess master and philosopher, in the course of a lecture at the High School for the Science of Judaism.

Dr. Lasker, who was the world chess champion from 1894 to 1921, after an abridged outline of the history of the game of chess, whose origin he refers to 3000 to 2000 B.C., gave a general psychology of the game which he connected as the ancient emblem of war and combat.

He distinguished seven periods in the perfection of the player: First, the primitive period, in which the player has only the desire to capture chess men; in the second period, the desire for races and traps prevails; in the third the joy of attack; in the fourth of aerial defenses; in the fifth of sagacious development; power; in the sixth of thoughtful combination; and in the last period, success in the building up and consolidating "position" is the chief aim. Chess has conquered all peoples and professions. The Sephardic Jews might have adopted it in Spain, but they did not distinguish themselves in it. Only at the beginning of the 19th century, the Ashkenazic Jews did begin to devote themselves to the game.

Externally seen, the peculiarities of the Jewish players lie mainly in a special tenacity, and abundance of expression, a peculiarity of all Mediterranean peoples which is being lost with growing assimilation in northern and western Europe. When playing, all Jewish players show a special strength in the art of defense, by which they have tremendously developed the refinement of the game all over the world. Lasker explains this ability by the century-old history of suffering and oppression of the Ashkenazic Jews in Europe.

The art of the defense in the game is well developed among all oppressed groups, while among peoples which are accustomed to rule, as the English, Dutch, American, the art of attack is supreme. But the strongest peculiarity of the Jews, and only found among them, is the mental and spiritual fervor of the game. They cultivate besides the defense combination and idealistic construction which often do not take realities into account. They exploit chess as a disposition and create a parallel to the Jewish joke which lives up by the force of the play of ideas. Lasker refers this peculiarity to the absorption of the Jews in the Talmud, and to their exercises in Talmudic reasoning. The joy of the play of ideas and the neglect of reality may explain the love of the Jewish players' systematics, and their

## J. D. C. Receives Pledges of Assistance and Cooperation in Intended Appeal

Response Gratifying, Says Dr. Jonah  
B. Wise, Campaign Chairman; Lead-  
ers Join National Advisory Body

Pledges of assistance and cooperation in the intended appeal of the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee for funds to carry on overseas welfare activities during 1933 are being received in "gratifying" numbers, Dr. Jonah B. Wise, chairman of the National Fund-Raising Committee, announced last night.

Many of the nation's outstanding Jewish leaders have already signified their acceptance of membership on the national advisory campaign committee, Dr. Wise said, and pledges of local support have been received from Jewish communal leaders in a number of the more important cities. Endorsements have also been received from many Jewish groups and organizations.

"From the inns of the hundreds of letters received at the Committee's offices since we announced our decision to make an appeal for our suffering co-religionists overseas," Dr. Wise declared, "it is evident that the Jews of America, despite the heavy burden of supporting their local institutions which they are carrying, are appreciative of their obligations to the less fortunate overseas and aware that they have the additional duty of aiding them.

"The response to our plea for assistance thus far has been gratifying and we have received pledges of cooperation and support that assure active conduct of the campaign throughout the country. I am hopeful that sufficient funds will be raised, as a result, to continue through 1933 the emergency relief measures now sponsored by the Joint Distribution Committee among the millions of impoverished Jews in Eastern Europe."

## Impoverished Group of 100 Seeks Palestine Entry

WARSAW, Feb. 25.—A Jewish delegation from a group of villages in the vicinity of Lomza arrived in Warsaw yesterday and implored the Palestine office to arrange for the sending of a group of one hundred to Palestine.

The delegation declared that a group of 100 persons all anxious to depart for Palestine settlement had been formed. None, however, possess the necessary traveling expenses. All were willing to make the journey on foot, via the overland route, provided visas are secured for them.

The Palestine office was not able to satisfy this request.

Rabbi Sol Berman Friedman, formerly of Philadelphia, was installed as rabbi of the Washington Heights synagogue.

Rabbi Morris Katz of Chicago has accepted a call to Petersburg, Virginia, to be the spiritual leader of the orthodox congregation there.
