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## CENTRAL UNION ISSUES STATEMENT DENYING COMMUNIST SYMPATHIES OR AFFILIATION AFTER 8-HOUR SEARCH OF HEADQUARTERS

Two Central Union Officials Taken to Police Headquarters for Questioning; Released in the Morning; All Leaders of Central Union Present During Search; Police and Nazi Guards Render Communication Impossible; Normal Routine Resumed; Report Zionist Offices Would Be Searched; Government Spokesman Says Similar Treatment Would Be Accorded All Suspects

BERLIN, March 2—The news of the search of the premises of the Central Union of German Citizens of the Jewish Faith, for proof of alleged Communist affiliation, has left German Jewry thunder struck and has spread a pall of indescribable gloom over the Jewish population.

The search of the headquarters, it is now learned, began at four o'clock in the afternoon and continued until midnight in the presence of all the leaders of the organization.

A number of the leaders of the organization were on the premises when the search was suddenly announced by the police supplemented by Nazi Storm Troops, in the role of auxiliary police, while the others arrived as soon as word reached them of what was transpiring.

Among those present were Dr. Julius Brodnitz, president and Ludwig Hollaender, director of the Central Union.

Police and Nazi guards were stationed outside the building, who made communications with the outside world impossible. Likewise efforts to reach officials of the Central Union by telephone proved futile, as the telephone remained unanswered.

The Nazi organ "Voelkischer Beobachter" reports that the search of the Central Union premises resulted in the confiscation of an enormous quantity of inciting material and alleges that the name "Central Union of German Citizens of the Jewish Faith" is only a facade for a secret Communist organization.

The paper asserts further that the offices of the Central Union of German Citizens of the Jewish Faith have been closed and that all officials of the Central Union were taken to the police praesidium last night.

The Jewish Telegraphic Agency learns, however, that only two officials of the Central Union were taken before the police praesidium last night. The two are Dr. Alfred Hirschberg, the

press chief of the organization, and Fraulein Johanna Rose, a secretary. Both were released this morning.

It is expected that an official communique with regard to the search will be issued in the course of the day.

The "Voelkischer Beobachter" also reports today that three Jews in a motor car fired on a Nazi Storm Troop Brigade marching on Uhlandstrasse last night. No one was injured. In such circumstances, the paper comments, it is not surprising that the Nazis were compelled to defend themselves.

BERLIN, March 2—Normal activities were resumed this afternoon at the offices of the Central Union of German Citizens of the Jewish Faith, following yesterday's search of the premises by police and Nazi aides.

In a statement issued to the Reuter Press Service, following the police search, the praesidium of the police department declared that any persons whose political activities are suspected will be subject to such measures.

## Lubawitcher Rebbe Cables Cermak Hopes for Recovery

The message declared: "Your good deeds in behalf of the general public and the Jews aid you in your recovery."

The Lubawitcher Rebbe had been asked by one of the Mayor's daughters to pray for his recovery.

## Britain Definitely Refuses To Give Preferential Status To Palestine Imports

Colonial Secretary Says It Is Impossible To Do So Owing to Serious Juridical Difficulties

JERUSALEM, March 2—Owing to serious juridical difficulties the British government regrets that it finds it impossible to grant preference status similar to that of the Dominions, to Palestine imports, Sir Philip Cunliffe-Lister, the Minister of State for the Colonies, declared yesterday in the House of Commons.

The definite refusal to grant preference status to Palestine products constitutes a particular blow to the Palestine orange industry.

The Zionists and Palestine Chambers of Commerce have been endeavoring to secure exemption ever since tariffs were first imposed by Britain.

## Cunliffe-Lister Gives Different Version of Benjamini Death

LONDON, March 2—The killing of a former Jewish legionnaire, Joseph Benjamini, by Bedouins in Wadi Hawareth, Palestine, on February 22nd, was raised in the House of Commons yesterday by Colonel Josiah Wedgwood.

Benjamini, according to the reports, was killed following a clash with Bedouins who attacked the settlement of the former Legionnaires in Wadi Hawareth.

A contradictory version of the incident, however, was offered yesterday by the Colonial Secretary, Sir Philip Cunliffe-Lister. The Colonial Secretary denied that the Bedouins had attacked the colony, declaring that a misunderstanding arose when Arabs accompanied by a British officer had to pass through the colony on their way to another plot of land.

The High Commissioner's observations on the incident have not yet been received, he declared.

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**Discuss Strengthening****Of Jewish Agency**

BERLIN.—A number of proposals for reorganizing and consolidating the Jewish Agency were considered at a meeting of the Commission appointed for this purpose by the Administrative Committee of the Jewish Agency held here.

Berl Locker, member of the Jewish Agency Executive, was in the chair, and there were present Dr. Leo Baeck, Kurt Blumenfeld, Dr. S. Federbusch, Dr. Nahum Goldmann, Dr. Arthur Hantke, Dr. Bernhard Kahn, Leo Motzkin, A. Reiss, Dr. Werner Senator, Oscar Wassermann and B. Zuckermann.

With a view to giving a firm structure to the non-Zionist section of the Jewish Agency, a proposal was put forward that contributors to the Keren Hayesod in the various countries should be given a vote for electing the non-Zionist section of the Agency Council.

No decision was adopted, and all the proposals brought forward will be submitted to the organs of the Jewish Agency. They will also be made available for discussion by Jewish public opinion, so that the next session of the Jewish Agency Council in the matter will be able to judge of the feeling that exists on the matter.

**Dr. Kaplan to Inaugurate****Forum on Sunday**

Beginning Sunday morning, March 5, at 10:45 A. M., Dr. Mordecai M. Kaplan, leader of the Society for the Advancement of Judaism, will conduct a regular Sunday morning Forum at the Society.

The Forums will be devoted to the exposition of the conception of Judaism "as a civilization" and of the implications of that conception for present day Jewish and general life.

**Score 2 Universities for Refusal To Cooperate with Students On Sabbath, Holiday Observance**

Greenberg Says Authorities Refuse to Change Examination Dates When They Occur on Sabbath, Jewish Holidays

PHILADELPHIA, March 2.—Temple University and the University of Pennsylvania were criticized for their refusal to co-operate with their Jewish students in the matter of Sabbath and Holiday observance, in an address delivered before the annual meeting of the Philadelphia Branch of the Jewish Theological Seminary of America, held at Dropsie College.

The general topic under discussion was "The Jewish Student and His Religion" based upon a volume on this subject by Rabbi Marvin Nathan. Following the set address by Rabbi Nathan in which he summarized some of the major points touched upon in his book, Rabbi Greenberg was called upon to discuss "The Place of Judaism in Jewish Student Life." Basing his observations on more than five years association with Jewish students on the Campus of the University of Pennsylvania and at the Jewish Students House on that Campus, Rabbi Greenberg expressed the opinion that it is almost impossible for a Jewish boy or girl coming from a home where traditional Judaism is observed, to complete a four year course either at the University of Pennsylvania or at Temple University without being compelled to violate either the Sabbath or the Holidays.

When spokesmen for these Universities attend public functions arranged under the joint auspices of Jewish and Christian students, he said, they talk of the importance of religious affiliation and call upon each group to adhere to the tenets of its faith. Yet in the arrangement of the curricula these preachments are completely ignored. Rabbi Greenberg cited instances where he went to the authorities of the Universities requesting them to change dates for examinations because these dates were on the Sabbath or on Jewish Holidays, but without success.

There are approximately 4,000 Jewish boys and girls receiving higher education in this city. These, Rabbi Greenberg explained, should receive spiritual guidance. It is to be regretted, he said, that virtually nothing is being done by the Jewish community in this direction.

In his Presidential message, J. Solis-Cohen, Jr., reviewed the work done by the Seminary during the past year and of the co-operation given by the Jewish community of Philadelphia. Mr. Solis-Cohen presented the regrets of Dr. Cyrus Adler who had planned to attend this meeting but was prevented by the sudden death of Mrs. Therese Schiff, widow of Jacob H. Schiff. A telegram of condolence was sent to Mrs. Felix M. Warburg, daughter of the deceased.

**Court Dismisses Speculation Charge Against Jew Who Refused to Trade on Sabbath**

Roumanian Court of Appeal Calls Indictment a Misapplication of the Law Referring to Speculation

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

BUCHAREST, March 2.—The Court of Appeal today dismissed the charges against Lupu Fain, a Jewish merchant of Berescht, who was indicted on charges of speculation because he refused to trade on the Sabbath or Jewish holidays.

The court annulled the charges against Fain and dismissed the action declaring the indictment constituted a misapplication of the law referring to speculation.

The case had aroused considerable public attention and had even come up before Parliament where questions were asked concerning it.

A representative of the Ministry of Commerce was invited to give evidence to the Court and a statement was submitted in Fain's behalf by Dr. William Filderman, president of the Jewish Community of Bucharest.

Had Fain been found guilty, he would have faced a prison term of from three to nine months and the payment of a fine of 30,000 lei.

**Haarburger, Prominent South African Jew, Succumbs**

CAPETOWN.—Ivan Haarburger, a pioneer figure in the commercial and public life of the Orange Free State and a leader of the Jewish Community, died in Bloemfontein.

Mr. Haarburger came to South Africa in 1888, and succeeded in establishing one of the largest warehouses of pianos and musical instruments in the country. He subsequently took a keen interest in municipal affairs and was elected mayor of Bloemfontein in 1912, holding that office until 1914.

In the field of Jewish affairs he took a leading part in the formation of the South African Jewish Board of Deputies, which is now the representative body of South African Jewry. As a Zionist, he played a leading role in the various campaigns in support of Zionist funds.

Providing for the distribution of an estate estimated at more than \$100,000, the will of Benjamin Strouse, retired Baltimore clothing firm official, has been filed for probate.

The will bequeathed \$500 each to the Jewish Children's Society and the Sinai Hospital and \$250 each to the Hebrew Benevolent Society and the Associated Jewish Charities.

Secretary of the Philadelphia Branch, was unanimously elected President. Nathaniel I. S. Goldman was elected Secretary. Other officers elected include: Vice-Presidents, Rabbi Samuel Fredman and Dr. Aron Brav; Treasurer, Joseph Caplan.

## Dr. Feuchtwanger Sails for Germany; Defies Nazi Threats Of Reprisals Against Him

### Urges American Jewry to Express Its Sense of Solidarity With German Jewry

Defying the Nazi threat of reprisals, once he returns to Germany, Dr. Lion Feuchtwanger, the distinguished German novelist, sailed for Germany yesterday on the "Aquitania" after an extended lecture tour in this country.

In a statement issued to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency prior to his departure, Dr. Feuchtwanger explained that he was returning to Germany against the advice of friends because "Germany needs her intellectuals. We must defend the country against the literary mode of Hitler. I am not afraid to go to Germany. I don't think I will be imprisoned for literary criticism."

He urged American Jewry to express its sense of solidarity with German Jewry in this hour of crisis.

He expressed the view that a large protest demonstration, joined in by all groups of American Jewry, would prove effective in halting the Hitler terroristic tactics against German Jewry.

Referring again to Adolph Hitler's book "My Struggle," the original criticism of which aroused the ire of the Nazi press, Dr. Feuchtwanger stated: "I am disappointed that Germany has such a bad writer for Chancellor. But one thing I will say of the book—the speeches of the characters are much better than Hitler's speeches."

## Deny Report Illegal Jewish Entries Will Be Legalized

JERUSALEM.—The Arab press publishes a report that every Jew who illegally entered Palestine will have his entry legalized if he appears before the authorities for residential registration.

The Arab press says further that an official order to this effect will shortly be issued by the Palestine Government in the form of instructions to the Immigration and Naturalization Departments.

The Jewish Telegraphic Agency learns, however, that the report is without foundation. "The report in the Arab press is absolutely false," the Jewish Telegraphic Agency was informed in reliable quarters.

At the annual meeting of the Newark Beth Israel Hospital it was reported that in the five years since the new \$4,000,000 hospital building was opened, 101,263 patients received service. Of the total number of patients hospitalized, 55 per cent were Jewish, 28 per cent Protestant and 17 per cent Catholic. A financial summary showed that during the five years, ward service in relation to hospital service, approximated 35 per cent, representing a charitable contribution to the community of \$1,061,626. ### Lord Melchett Sees Marked Improvement in Attitude of Palestine Administration

LONDON.—A marked improvement in the attitude of the Palestine administration towards the ideal of a Jewish National Home was observed by Lord Melchett in the course of his recent visit to Palestine, he stated, in the course of an interview with a representative of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency with whom he discussed his recent trip to Palestine and the tour in the interests of the Maccabee from which he has just returned.

The improvement he attributed very largely to the influence of the High Commissioner, Sir Arthur Grenfell Wachope, whom he praised as a just administrator determined to see the terms of the Mandate carried out in full, and whom he considered had imbued with this policy the entire Palestine government.

"Palestine at the moment," he said, "is forging ahead with the utmost vigor and enthusiasm. This is not a temporary phenomenon destined soon to end, and, although periods of relapse may occur, it is probable that the country will continue to develop on the same lines for some considerable period, and that the present boom will be extended by the uninterrupted arrival of Jews from various countries, who daily invest their money in the development of the small, newly-started industries of the land."

"The position of the Jews in Palestine stands out in strong contrast with their position in East European countries," Lord Melchett said. "The plight of the Jewish population in the latter is the result of the general crisis aggravated by the specifically Jewish problems of anti-Semitism and discrimination."

At the same time he draws a distinction between anti-Semitism in Germany and anti-Semitism in Poland. While the anti-Semitism in Germany is artificial, in the view of Lord Melchett, the Jews constituting a hardly noticeable proportion of the population, in Poland there is a real and difficult problem, for the solution of which co-operation between the Government and Jews is essential. In the long run, the Polish government will not be able to ignore the needs and requirements of ten per cent of its population such as the Jews constitute, and will have to find ways and means of dealing with the problem. It will have to meet Jewish representatives, and seek in conference with them the way to alleviate the hardship of the Jewish population. The present economic policy of the Polish government appears to be directed, not primarily against the Jews, but largely towards the interests of a

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## Jewish Charities Federation Adopts Unique Hospital Plan

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

SAN FRANCISCO, March 2.—An original budgeting plan, aiming at drastic reductions in all classes of hospitalization in keeping with the present economic situation, has been adopted by the board of directors of Mount Zion Hospital, an agency of the Federation of Jewish Charities.

According to hospital authorities, the plan never has been tried before in the United States and is the result of an intensive effort to bring hospital care within the means of people of small incomes. In the main, reductions of 10 and 11 per cent have been effected.

The plan provides an offer of flat rates for patients requiring hospital care for varying periods of five, ten and fourteen days for surgical cases. This affords an opportunity for patients to know in advance exactly what hospitalization will cost them and to budget accordingly.

In medical cases a flat charge of 50 cents a day is to be made for hospital supplies and the like, eliminating the former method of itemizing each article included in the supplies. In the basic rate schedule for surgical cases this charge is absorbed.

It is expected that the plan will serve to greatly lighten the burden on people of curtailed means requiring hospitalization and the result of its application is being watched by physicians and hospital authorities throughout the city.

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large section of the non-Jewish population. In the long run, however, no Government can carry on a policy which is to the detriment of a large and valuable section of its population.

Rowdy anti-Semitism, Lord Melchett considers, belongs to quite a different order of things. Some of this can, and will, be overcome as the Jew develops his physique. Rowdy anti-Semitism is, as a rule, carried on by cowards who never dare to attack a Jewish quarter, but who rather limit their attacks to individual Jews whom they may outnumber ten or a hundredfold, he said. Even during the recent disturbances in Lvov, Lord Melchett was informed while he was there, the Jewish quarter was never attacked. Both in Poland and Germany Lord Melchett found that where an organized group of Jewish youths confronted the hooligans the latter immediately gave ground, and seldom dared to repeat the attack.

Lord Melchett is therefore a strong believer in, and supporter of, the Macabees, as part and parcel of Zionism, confident that, in the course of time, Jewish youth will develop their morale and their muscle to such an extent as to enable them to materially mitigate this type of rowdysim.

Palestine is the obvious solution for Jews who are confronted with the menace of anti-Semitism in their own countries, but the absorptive capacity of Palestine is not yet sufficiently developed, and many who wish to go there cannot as yet carry out their intention. In Palestine, however, Lord Melchett sees hope for the Jewish people and an ultimate solution of their problems.
