Huge Nazi Mass Meeting In Vienna Jewish Quarter Ministerial Council Meets to Discuss

Prevention of Nazi Growth (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

VIENNA, March 7-Last night a huge mass meeting, held in the midst of the Jewish quarter, and addressed by the notorious Nazi leader, Frauenfeld, compelled the closing of the Jewish shops for several hours.

This is part of the alarming increase in anti-Semitic propaganda evident throughout Austria, since the an-nouncement of the Nazi victory in Germany. Emboldened by the triumph of their German colleagues, the Nazis here have opened an intense campaign with the object of forcing the resignation of the government and a new election in which they hope for success.

Nazi slogans and proclamations an-nounce that they no longer regard the present rulers of Austria as having any authority over them, but that "Hitler is our chancellor".

While last night's meeting, which attracted a concourse of some 40,000 people was in progress; a ministerial council was convened in order to discuss measures to counteract the growthof the Nazis in Austria. The minister-ial council is also apparently anxious about plans which are being made for an enormous Nazi offensive, which is to be opened with a campaign led by 150 Nazi speakers, assisted by propagandists from Germany.

"Near East and India" Proposes Conference on Transjordan Settlement

(Tewish Telegraphic Agency) LONDON-A suggestion for a conference between representatives of the Emir Abdullah, the Arab politicians of Palestine and the Jewish Agency, under the chairmanship of a represent-ative of the Palestine Government, for the purpose of discussing the question of Jewish colonization in Transjordan, is suggested in an editorial published in the "Near East and India" magazine in London, which is regarded as being in close contact with the Colonial Office. At such a meeting, the editorial sug-gests, "mere denunciation of the plan for Jewish colonization would not carry weight, and the different parties would have to produce arguments in support of their respective points of

150 Sabbatarian Christians Apply for Palestine Visas

Intend to Adopt Judaism in Palestine, Says Leader

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) WARSAW, March 7-One hundred and fifty Christian peasants from a village near Luzk, approached the Pal-estine office in Warsaw with the request for certificates to enable them to proceed to Transjordan to settle there. The Sabbatarians declare that the crisis in their village is so acute, and the starvation and need so pre-valent that they have unanimously decided to emigrate to Palestine and to help Jewish colonization in Transjordan, as they have heard about the intention of the Jewish company to purchase land there. The delegation pointed out that already a colony of Sabbatarians who converted to Ju-daism exists in lower Galilee. We are not afraid, they said, of the Bedouins or of the difficult conditions which will confront us during the first few years until we acclimatize ourselves to the new land, because we have been peasants for many generations. WARSAW.-Sarah Brilliant has died here at the age of 110.

The deceased was noted for her energy and activity despite her great age. She read without spectacles and until a few weeks ago paid regular visits to the Yiddish theatres.

In the philanthropic work of Warsaw, she played a considerable part, particularly with the societies that provide

charities for poor brides and that make themselves responsible for the weddings of orphans. Her funeral was attended by her

numerous grand-children and greatgrand-children, as well as students from the Talmudic colleges which she helped during life.

imposing a large ransom on the community. Woliewski was the son of a wealthy

land-owner in the neighborhood of Wilna. His father left Wilna some thirty years ago and settled in Irkutsk, where he served as a judge. On the outbreak of the Russian Revolution, Woliewski joined the roving band of the notorious Semenov, who was re-sponsible for one of the blackest and most murderous chapters in the history of Siberia. During the Civil War, Woliewski took part in many of the depradations on the general population for which Semenov, with his White Battalions, was responsible.

Following the killing of Woliewski. numerous arrests have been made among his followers. There is now every reason to believe that his band has been broken up, and that the kid-nappings which had terrorized the population will now cease.

Of Jewish World Congress (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

PARIS, March 7-A meeting in support of the projected Jewish Congress was held here yesterday, under the Chairmanship of M. Justin Godart, the French statesman noted for his deep interest in Zionist affairs. It was also attended by Professor Langevin, Deputy Henri Torres the famous advocate, Andre Spire the poet, and Edmond Fleg. The Jewish Agency was repre-sented by Robert Bollak.

In connection with the meeting, an appeal to French Jewry not to abstain from participation in the elections to the Jewish World Congress, was issued by the French Section of the Committee for the Congress, of which Advocate Leonce Bernheim is president. The statement published by the Com-

mittee declares that the projected Congress aims at the fuller development of Jewish conscience, and the creation of an instrument capable of expressing Jewish needs and aspirations through its elected representatives. It adds that such a Congress would be authorized to take decisions with regard to the Jewish situation the world over, and calls upon French Jewry to continue the work initiated by such fa-

mous Jews as Cremieux, Charles Net-ter, Bernard Lazare, Sadoc-Kahn, as well as the Alliance Israelite Univer-Election lists were also circulated together with an invitation for the Jewish public to inscribe their names on the election register of the Jewish World

Effort to Discover Extent, Nature . Of Prejudice Among Faiths

Congress.

The most ambitious effort to learn the most amontous energy to learn the extent and kinds of prejudice among Catholics, Jews, and Protestants is now being made by the Institute of Social and Religious Research. The

Hon. Newton D. Baker, Prof. Carlton J. H. Hayes, and Roger W. Straus, Co-Chairmen of the National Conference of Jews and Christians with head-York City, are sponsoring these "Community Case Studies." The survey will attempt to answer the question, "Why are contacts among America's chief religious groups sometimes satisfactory and sometimes unsatisfactory?" and to gather material for use in education for clearer understanding among the faiths.

Five widely scattered city areas, including surrounding small towns, are to be studied. Baltimore, and surroundbe studied. Battimore, and surrounding territory, is the scene of the first study. The two experts selected to make the studies are C. E. Silcox, of Toronto, who has been analyzing the church union movement in Canada, and Galen Fisher, of New York, director of the Institute of Social and Religious Research. Funds are being supplied by John D. Rockefeller, Jr.

Jewish Detachment Entrusted With Defence of Shanghai (Tewish Telegraphic Agency)

SHANGHAL-The defence of the foreign settlement of Shanghai, which is entrusted to the hands of the self-defence volunteer brigades, was recently entrusted to the Jewish detachment which forms part of the brigade. Each week one detachment in turn is in charge of the defence. The Jewish Volunteers' hattalion now consists of 60 Jewish youths and their number increases daily. The Jewish Volunteers are all members of the Revisionist Youth Organization of Brith Trumpeldor and carry the blue-white Zionist flag as their ensign.

The Jewish battalion was awarded special recognition during the annual parade of the brigade, and participated in the manouevres at which government representatives and military attaches of the various consulates were present.

Palestine Emigrants in Bira Bidjan Tell of Difficulties There (J. T. A. Mail Service)

JERUSALEM - The "Davar," the Hebrew daily which serves as the organ of the Palestine Labor Federation, has recently devoted considerable space to the lot of the Palestinians who left Palestine last summer in order to settle in Bira Bidjan, the area set apart for Jewish settlements by the Soviet Government

The "Dayar" has published excerpts from letters by some of those who have emigrated from Palestine. These tend to show that the high hopes held by the emigrants appear to have given place to keen disappointment. The "Davar" reproduces from these letters passages such as "this awful life" and descriptions which concur in describing a state of affairs in which there are "no dwellings, no food, no water, and no soap"; "there is not even time for reading a newspaper." The "Davar" sums up the significance

of the letters that have come to its notice, with the observation that most of the emigrants regret their fatal folly of having left Palestine and ask for counsel in their difficult situation.

Sabbatarians to follow the example of their Palestine co-religionists and openly convert to Judaism. The Palestine office, however, had to inform them that they are not in a position to assist them. The Sabbatarian Sect, which was of the 18th century, believes in the Testament, in one God, and not in Trinity, practises circumcision, and ou serves the Sabbath instead of Sunday as the day of rest, and therefore, its members carry the name of Sabbatarians. This sect suffered considerably under the Tsarist regime, and Jews were forbidden to have any contact with them. Whole villages were, un-der the reign of Nicholas 1st, expelled to Siberia, some after inhuman torture. Massacres were organized against them, sometimes led by the Greek Orthodox clergy. There are no exact figures as to the number of the Sabbatarians in Russia, and at one time their number was estimated to have reached 21/2 million souls. In dress and mode of life, apart from their religious life, the Sabbatarians do not in any way differ from the Greek Orthodox Russians.
