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WALTER WINCHELL BECOMES BUTT OF HITLERIST ORGAN; LIPPMAN AND WISE ARE SUBJECT OF TIRADE

Quotation from Year-old Issue of "B'nai Brith" Magazine Exploited as Excuse for Forceful Measures

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

BERLIN, March 16—A paragraph by Walter Winchell, the well-known columnist, is made the subject today of a tirade in the "Voelkischer Beobachter," the organ of the Hitlerists in Germany. The "Beobachter" reproduces a paragraph by Walter Winchell, published on February 2nd, in which Winchell had written, "Too bad that a man like Hitler can rise so high in politics, who hates intensely.... His hatred of the Israelites is contemptible—and when an assassin shoots him down one day a lot of locals won't be sorry.... The best way to fight a person like Hitler is to ridicule him, of course...."

To this the "Beobachter" replies, "It divulges his Jewish mentality."

The same issue of the "Beobachter" takes to task Walter Lippmann, the well-known writer on political subjects, for his uncomplimentary observations on Hitlerism in his column, and deduces from them that "Jewry is appealing to the powers of the world to form an alliance against Germany," as though it were bent on bringing as many names as possible into its imaginary counter-Nazi plan.

The real purpose of these various quotations in the "Beobachter" becomes apparent when it uses a quotation from last year's March issue of the "B'nai Brith Magazine," in order to prepare the world for vigorous measures to be taken "to protect the life of the leader of German liberty—Hitler." The passage in the "B'nai Brith" journal ran, "The eminent success of Hitler, and the occasion of our observance of the downfall of Haman, made timely a consideration of the similarity that stamps the two demagogues as of the same mold. Like Hitler, Haman had risen to high political position.... How far will the analogy go? The destruction of the

Jews was averted by Esther and the tables turned against Haman, and the gallows that Haman had made ready for Mordecai became the instrument of Haman's own execution. Then the King said, 'Hang him thereon.' So they hanged Haman on the gallows that he had prepared for Mordecai. Then was the King's wrath pacified."

The "Beobachter" also adds Rabbi Stephen S. Wise to the list of personalities it takes to task. It quotes an address delivered by Rabbi Wise at this year's Lincoln day celebration, as evidence of such a plan.

Replying to an inquiry from a J.T.A. representative as to the subject of the address referred to by the "Beobachter," Rabbi Wise could recall nothing more damaging than the passage "Lincoln said, 'With malice toward none, and with charity for all'; Hitler says, 'With malice towards Semites, and charity only for Aryans.'"

Polish Jewish Deputies Call For United Jewish Front Against German Excesses

WARSAW, March 16—The Club of Polish Jewish Deputies has today issued an appeal for a united Jewish front against the cruel torture of Jews in Germany. It utters a vigorous protest against "the disgusting barbarism which is proceeding under the auspices of the Nazi government. It declares, "Let German Jews know that world Jewry is solidly behind them in sympathy." The appeal was issued after a special session in conjunction with the Zionist committees.

In addition, it is planned to hold a monster protest meeting against the events in Germany.

Anti-Jewish Excesses Vigorously Dealt With by Polish Police

Endek Agitation in Connection with Law Limiting University Autonomy

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

WARSAW, March 16—Four rioters were wounded, and one died from his injuries when the police fired at a rabble which attacked Jewish shops at Zywice, in the region of Krakau, according to an official report published here today. The police have also arrested a number of Endeks—members of the National Socialist anti-Semitic party—engaged in inciting the local peasant population to riot. The moving spirit of the local Endeks, Zajoncek, was among those arrested.

The police have also made arrests of Endeks at Bielsk, while at Krakau a number of Endek students caught distributing anti-Semitic leaflets in factories were apprehended. Arms were found on the Endeks arrested at Bielsk.

Later reports describe the attack at Zywice as an onrush of peasants, armed with sticks and agricultural implements, bent on looting. The mob which had been incited by Endeks, offered resistance to the police, who then fired at the rioters. With the obvious object of intensifying the agitation the "Gazeta Warszawska", an anti-Semitic paper, publishes a partly censored report under the headings "Anti-Jewish Disturbances at Warsaw—Reports Partly Exaggerated—Minor Jewish Incidents Partly Invented."

It is evident that the report in the "Gazeta Warszawska" is intended to inflame the masses, and is part of the Endek campaign against the Govern-

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Jewish Doctors to Be Dismissed From Prussian First Aid Stations

VIENNA, March 16—The Trans-Atlantic Radio Service here announces that the Prussian Government has resolved on the dismissal of all Jewish doctors from the First Aid Stations throughout Prussia. It reports that with this decision is connected the actual expulsion of Jewish doctors from a Berlin hospital, while the doctors were still in their white clinical smocks.

It also records the kidnapping of the Jewish professor, Zondeck, from the Berlin Municipal Hospital, while the professor was in the midst of teaching.

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Bills Covering Various Phases Of U.S. Immigration Introduced by Dickstein

Legalization of Illegal Entries to July 1924; Reduction of Naturalization Fee; Exemption of Citizens' Parents

WASHINGTON, March 16 — Many phases of the problems of immigration in the United States are covered by a series of five bills, which have been introduced by Congressman Dickstein, Chairman of the House Immigration Committee. Altogether, five bills are in question. The first, a bill to legalize all persons who entered the country illegally up to July 1st, 1924, was reported out by the Committee on Immigration and Naturalization on the last day of Congress, and was passed by the Senate, but too late to get House action. A further bill aims at the reduction of the naturalization fee. In view of the present economic depression, the heavy naturalization fee may be regarded as a considerable hardship, and may even retard desirable citizens from seeking citizenship. The measure provides for a 50% reduction, and the complete exemption of all honorably discharged war veterans from all naturalization fees.

Another one of the bills introduced seeks to exempt parents of citizens from the immigration quota. This is the identical bill that was reported out in the last Congress after much difficulty and was passed by the House by a large vote. The matter was then brought before the Senate and was reported out after being subjected to a number of immigration and naturalization amendments. When the bill came back to the House for concurrence, it was too late to call a conference and straighten out certain objections made by the House. It came in during the

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Jewish Communities Aid Stricken Earthquake Areas

LOS ANGELES, March 16—Almost immediately upon the heels of the news that Long Beach and neighboring Southern California towns were struck by the earthquake last Friday, the B'nai B'rith District Grand Lodge Number Four, with headquarters at San Francisco, began to make investigations through the various lodges of the southern part of the State in order to see what assistance could be given.

David Blumberg, Grand Lodge representative, called a meeting Saturday night of all Grand Lodge officers at the home of Mrs. Rose Corn, executive secretary of the Women's Grand Lodge, at which Mrs. Rose Bertram, president of the Women's Auxiliary Grand Lodge and about twenty other members were present to discuss way and means of helping the stricken Jewish families. It was decided to enlist the Jewish communities of the other cities in Southern California, and through the Officers Conference of B'nai B'rith Lodges of Southern California, machinery was started for the organization of relief stations and for the supply of food. Three truck loads of food were sent down to the two stations opened in the

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Emergency Measures Taken To Provide Relief for Needy

DETROIT, March 16—With the two leading banks—the First National and the Guardian—closed by order of the Treasury Department at Washington, and with the situation here economically as acute as on the day almost five weeks ago when all local banks closed, drastic steps are being taken by social service agencies to feed the hungry and to carry on the relief work.

The Jewish Welfare Federation is working with the Community Fund to provide day to day service to dependents and to maintain organizations on an emergency basis.

Cash to feed and shelter 400 dependent families, to care for aged men and women, and to provide food for employees is the goal toward which the entire staff of the Jewish Welfare Federation has bent its efforts this past week. The Jewish Old Folks Home, the House of Shelter, and the Unemployment Emergency Council depend for their existence on the amount of currency which can be raised to meet the present financial crisis.

All members of the Federation staff turned collectors last week, in a united effort to bring in every dollar of cur-

Assures Protection of British-Jewish Subjects in Germany

LONDON, March 16—Mr. Stanley Baldwin, Lord President of the Council, and one of the leading members of the British Cabinet, reiterated in today's House of Commons the assurance that the British Government, was mindful of the safety of British subjects in Germany. The statement was in reply to a question by Colonel Josiah Wedgwood, who had asked what measures the British Government proposed to take for the protection of British citizens in Germany, especially Jews and Indians. The reference to Indians was occasioned by the arrest of two Indians in Berlin, charged with Communism by the German authorities.

Vienna Police Order Watch Over German Refugees

VIENNA, March 16—The police department here has ordered a strict watch over aliens' arrivals in Vienna. Particular stress is laid on two provisions over incoming German refugees who are crowding the Vienna hotels and pensions. The order points out that expulsions will undoubtedly follow in many cases, as the new arrivals are overwhelmingly Jews with tendencies towards the Left.

Polish Minister in Berlin Submits Note on Attacks On Polish Jewish Citizens

WARSAW, March 16—The Polish Minister in Berlin has submitted to the Foreign Office in Berlin an *Aide-Memoire*, detailing a number of cases in which Polish citizens have suffered material loss and physical hurt during the present German disturbances.

The document, which reserves the right of the Polish Government to submit to the German Foreign Office a demand for damages, deals exclusively with attacks on Jews.

Following are some of the cases typical of those enumerated in the *Aide-Memoire*:

IN BERLIN: on March 4th at 6 a.m. Izrael Weiss, residing Dragonerstreet 10A, threatened with a revolver, was ordered to leave his house and was conducted to a garage at 56 Prenzlauer Strasse by men calling themselves members of the National Socialist Party. In the cellar of the garage Weiss was beaten with rubber black-jacks and his passport and ring were taken away from him. At the Police Station the passport and ring were taken away from him and he was kept in the Police prison until Monday, March 6th, 2 p.m.

On March 6th, at 3 p.m., Abraham Leib Mittelman was stopped at the Brandenburgerstrasse and was conducted by men dressed in uniforms of Schoch troops of the National Socialist Party to the kitchen of a nearby restaurant. Threatened with a revolver he was ordered to drink some indefinite fluid and when he refused to do so, was beaten on the head and back. As a result of that beating Mittelman is unable to work.

On March 7th Rabbi Mosiek Chaskiel Rottenberg, residing at Weisenbergerstrasse 6, was aroused from his sleep at 3 a.m. by men who called themselves members of the Auxiliary Police and who, unable to penetrate into the apartment, fired three shots into the window of Rottenberg's bedroom.

On March 9th Hilel Cehlbau, residing at Muenzstrasse 16, was attacked in the Cafe Sachs, situated at the Schoenhauser Tor, was severely beaten up and 850 Marks were taken away from him. On the same day, at 6.15 p.m., Aaron Lizband, residing at Grenadierstrasse 31, was attacked on the Linienstrasse and he and his parents were se-

Many Refugees Reach Belgium From Germany

ANTWERP, March 16—Dozens of Jewish families arrived in Belgium this week. Among the refugees is a Schochet of Dusseldorf, by the name of Dolinger, a Polish citizen. He relates that last Friday night Nazi's broke into his house, at the point of a revolver, and warned him to leave the country immediately. The Nazi threats, he tells, were repeated on Saturday. He communicated with the police, but he was informed by them that they could offer him neither protection nor any guarantee for his safety. He thereupon decided to escape into Belgium.

Association for Hebrew Culture To Establish Section Here

There will be a meeting of the Society for the Advancement of Judaism on Sunday afternoon, March 19th, at two o'clock, at 13 West 86th Street.

The meeting will be a preliminary for the establishment of a permanent organization in America of the Brith Ivrit Olamith, a world association for Hebrew Culture.

Professor Ch. Tchernowitz, the renowned Hebrew writer and scholar, is founder of the American Section of the Brith Ivrit Olamith, and is Chairman of the Temporary Committee.

Polish Minister in Berlin Submits Note on Attacks On Polish Jewish Citizens

At 7:30 p.m., Janka Panner and her husband, residing at 32 Kaiser Wilhelmstrasse, were attacked and beaten up with rubber black-jacks by uniformed men under the threat of a revolver. Panner was compelled to give up his portfolio containing 850 Marks and various documents.

MAGDEBURG: On March 8th, at 11 p.m., several men, some of them in uniforms, penetrated into the hotel belonging to Homza Brzostowiecki, situated at 2A Brandenburgerstrasse. Firing revolvers they attacked the guests in the hotel's restaurant, beating them and wounding with a knife Brzostowiecki's daughter, who tried to call the police. She was pulled away by force from the telephone. The furniture in the restaurant and the windows were broken and serious damage done.

PLAUEN: On March 8th the following were hurt: 64 years old Heinrich Klein, Moritz Klein, Milewski, Heinrich Segal, Isaak Segal, David Segal, Szulern Kucinski.

On March 10th, Menasche Dorembs, 13 Reichsstrasse, was arrested.

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gency that was available from campaign subscriptions.

Plans for relief agencies are being drawn up by a sub-committee, of which Kurt Peiser, executive director of the Federation, is chairman. Under this arrangement the Jewish Social Service Bureau will function as a unit within the Community Fund and work in closer co-operation with the Department of Public Welfare. It is probable that the Bureau will take over a large group of Jewish families for active case work, and that in return the financing of all dependent families will fall under the jurisdiction of the city department.

A committee, consisting of Fred M. Butzel, Isadore Levin, and John Ballinger, plans to petition the Reconstruction Finance Corporation in Washington this week for a grant for approximately \$240,000. This amount will be offset against frozen bank assets of the Community Fund and will be used for direct relief purposes.

Another committee, of which Clarence H. Enggass and Mrs. Samuel Glogower are members, is undertaking a cash raising campaign to obtain cash on pledges of over \$100 to the Community Fund.

The Fund will attempt to pay small instalments on back salaries on a subsistence basis, although it has undertaken no salary obligations after March 1, according to Mr. Peiser.

The members of the Jewish Welfare Federation, who are participants in the Community Fund and affected by this ruling are the Jewish Social Service Bureau, the Jewish Child Care Council, the Jewish Children's Home, North End Clinic, Hebrew Free Loan Society, and the Fresh Air Society.
