Montgomery Rabbi Loses Post in Fight On Behalf of Negroes

Goldstein Says He Resigns, Temple
Head That He Won't Stand
for Re-election

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

MONTGOMERY, Ala., April 12.—The activities of Rabbi Benjamin Goldstein on behalf of the Scottsboro Negroes, the first of whom, Heywood Patterson, was found guilty and sentenced to death last Sunday, have cost him his post as rabbi of Temple Beth-Or, in this city.

In an exclusive statement made to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, Rabbi Goldstein said:

"My resignation resulted from my activities not only on behalf of the Scottsboro Negroes for whom I demanded a fair trial and a change of venue, but also on behalf of the Tallapoosa Negro share-croppers for whom last December I demanded fair treatment."

On behalf of the share croppers, Rabbi Goldstein had petitioned Governor Miller, and during his activity for the Scottsboro Negroes he had presided at a protest meeting of whites at Birmingham, before and after which there was "slanderous newspaper publicity".

The opposition to Rabbi Goldstein centered around Ernest Mayer, president of the congregation, who demanded the rabbi's withdrawal.

A special message from Mr. Mayer informs the Jewish Telegraphic Agency that Rabbi Goldstein will not stand for re-election at the expiration of his present term.

Lachmann-Mosse Quits The Tageblatt on Condition

BERLIN, April 12.—Hans Lachmann-Mosse, publisher of the Tageblatt, has resigned his post on condition that the profits for the next fifteen years be put into a common fund for the benefit of war victims of all faiths.

From Riga, the Jewish Telegraphic Agency learns that the German Nazis have purchased the Rigasche Rundschau, and a second Nazi paper in the same city, the Deutsche Zeitung, has announced its appearance.

Commons Upholds Right To Anti-German Posters

LONDON, April 12.—The House of Commons in effect has reproved the authorities by whose order police yesterday visited Jewish shopkeepers of the Whitechapel district with demands that anti-German boycott posters be removed.

The issue was raised in the Commons by Major Attlee, who was supported by Winston Churchill, Major Nathan, Barnett Janner and Godfrey Locker-Lampson, among others.

John Gilmour, the Home Secretary, finally asserted that Jewish shopkeepers who prefer to restore their posters have a right to do so, and stressed the fact that the police were using their own discretion with no other intention than to maintain the peace. The Home Office, he said, was not moved to act by the representations of members of Hitler's mission.

To Churchill's pointed question as to the quarter from which the Home Office feared a disturbance of the peace in the event that the posters were not removed, an evasive answer was given. Pressed further by Mr. Churchill, the Home Secretary promised to make it clear the Government intends

'Join Your Synagogue' Drive Opens Today

The Union of Orthodox Jewish Congregations of America, which has its headquarters at the Yeshiva College Building, has launched a Nation-wide Synagogue Membership Campaign, William Weiss, President of the Union, announces.

The purpose of the drive is to induce unaffiliated Jews to join their neighborhood Synagogue.

Another feature of the drive will be to urge patrons to give their children a religious education.

A National Membership Committee, with Max S. Rosenfeld, President of the Ohav Zedek Synagogue, and also President of the Hebrew Teachers' Training School for Girls, as Chairman, has been organized with units in the principal Jewish communities throughout the country.

The campaign, which will start with the Rabbin in Orthodox Synagogues delivering special sermons during the Passover Holidays, will continue during the whole month of April.

Landau, Weizmann Say Hello Over 5,000 Miles On the Eve of Passover

First Palestine-New York Conversation
Brings Zionist Message to the
Jews of America

The first telephone conversation between the United States and Palestine took place Monday when Dr. Chaim Weizmann, former President of the Zionist World Organization and the Jewish Agency, who is visiting his mother in Haifa for the Passover holidays, spoke to Jacob Landau, Managing Director of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency. The voice of Dr. Weizmann was clearly heard over the line.

"I feel privileged," Dr. Weizmann declared, "to be permitted to be the first to thus bridge this distance of about 5,000 miles between Palestine and New York. By a happy coincidence this happens to be the eve of Pesach, when the Jews in Palestine and throughout the world are celebrating the festival of the liberation of the Jews from the yoke of Egypt. Give to the Jews in the United States my greetings and those of Palestine Jewry. Palestine today is the only bright spot in the Jewish world, permeated by an atmosphere of healthy growth and steady progress. This feeling, however, is dimmed by the tragic occurrences in Germany, where the Jews, after having lived for 1,600 years on German soil and made a great contribution to every walk of life, enriching German literature and science to no mean degree, are

University Exclusions Continue in Germany

BERLIN, April 12.—No Jew in Bavaria will be allowed admission to the medical school of any University in that province, according to an announcement made by the Bavarian Minister of the Interior, Dr. Stutzel.

At Leipzig University, the period during which no Jewish student may be admitted has been fixed for the next five years.

In the province of Baden and in the city of Kiel, all Jewish professors and lecturers have been dismissed and the Government hospitals accept no Jews, except those assistants whose immediate discharge might imperil the health of patients.

Valued Scientific Award**To Go to Dr. Willstaetter**

Again, a German Jew has been honored for scientific achievement. He is Dr. Richard Willstaetter of Munich, like Professor Albert Einstein, a Nobel Prize winner. He has just been awarded the Willard Gibbs Medal for 1933, outstanding American distinction in the realm of chemistry bestowed annually by the Chicago Section of the American Chemical Society.

The medal will be conferred on Dr. Willstaetter in Chicago on September 13 during the eighty-sixth meeting of the American Chemical Society, which will be held in connection with the Century of Progress Exposition. A distinguished group of scientists from Europe and America will witness the ceremony.

Dr. Nahum Shtiff Dead

MOSCOW, April 12—Dr. Nahum Shtiff, philologist, author and editor of the Yiddish "Sprachfront," died suddenly Sunday in Kiev at the age of fifty-four.

Dr. Shtiff was born in Rovno, now in Poland. He received a traditional Jewish education. After the first Zionist Congress in 1899, he became a Zionist, and at the Kiev Political

Technical group called "Young Israel." He was imprisoned for his radical activities and fled to Switzerland in 1904. His first works appeared in Russian and subsequently he wrote in Yiddish exclusively. His chief work was in the field of Yiddish philology. He held the chair of Yiddish philology in the Ukrainian Scientific Academy.

**United Synagogue Convention
To Discuss Social Justice**

What the synagogue can do to effect a more equitable social and economic system will be the principal topic of discussion at the 21st annual convention of the United Synagogue of America, which will take place at the Hotel Pennsylvania, New York, from May 7th to 9th, according to an announcement issued by Louis J. Moss, Brooklyn, N.Y., national president of the organization. The United Synagogue is composed of over 700 affiliated organizations comprising synagogues, sisterhoods, men's clubs and young people's leagues throughout the United States and Canada.

"The twenty-first annual convention of the United Synagogue of America will not simply be concerned with the expression of an ideology of social justice," Mr. Moss said, "but with concrete ways as to how the synagogue can be instrumental in creating more equitable and more humane social conditions. The attitude of religion at the present time is towards a growing liberalism so far as social and economic factors are concerned and as regards the cruelties inherent in our present social order. The synagogue feels that it should frankly consider this subject from all sides.

"The convention will attempt to define the attitude of Judaism towards present world problems such as social justice, peace and war, and economic security, and will come to a definite conclusion as to what the synagogue can do in the way of solving these problems."

Delegates representing synagogues, sisterhoods and brotherhoods from all over the United States and Canada will be present at the annual convention, which is held coincident with the annual convention of the affiliated organizations of the United Synagogue of America: The Women's League of the United Synagogue and the National Federation of Jewish Men's Clubs of the United Synagogue.

Refugee Dies in Czech Hospital

PRAGUE, April 12—In the hospital at Wladislaw yesterday died a German refugee, Salomon Kopf, who with three fellow-refugees had been brought there by Czech frontier police. Of the skull three, one was found with his skull broken and the remaining two were in a less dangerous condition.

A college for the unemployed has been organized by professors of the University of Iowa under the direction of Prof. Moses Tung of the University School of Religion. Informal lectures and demonstrations are presented twice a week on economics, civics, history, science, sanitation, nutrition and mental hygiene. Six university departments with 23 institutions are cooperating. The University has granted the use of its library and class-rooms to the unemployed. Within three weeks the attendance has grown from a group of 35 to more than 200.

**Tourists Hail Passover
In Palestine Barracks**

JERUSALEM, April 12—One hundred and twenty-three Jewish tourists whom authorities had refused to allow to remain here over the Passover holidays were yesterday permitted to land for a four-day period, after their relatives at Haifa had posted one hundred pounds as a guarantee for each. They will be confined for the four-day period in police barracks.

Following their arrival on the Roumanian steamer Aridail and the refusal of permission to land they had declared a hunger-strike. The offer of a financial guarantee by the tourists' relatives permanently resident in Haifa had also been rejected by the Government, while representations made by Chief Rabbi Kook and the Jewish Agency were equally fruitless at the time.

**Hamburg Jewish Paper
Allowed to Reappear**

BERLIN, April 12—The Jewish weekly published in Hamburg under the title of "Israelitisches Familienblatt" has received permission to reappear following an order that all copy be submitted for censorship in advance of publication. Of the fifty employees on the German-written weekly, only seven are Jews. The original prohibition followed the publication of an imaginary dialogue between a teacher and a pupil on the subject of anti-Semitism.

Publisher of "The Day" Dies

Alfred W. Noreck, head of the publishing company which issues The Day, the New York Yiddish daily, died Sunday afternoon at Beth Moses Hospital in Brooklyn, at the age of thirty-eight. His death is believed to have been hastened by his distress at the plight of the Jews in Germany, for, following the Madison Square Garden protest meeting, he suffered a relapse; he had undergone an operation a year ago.

The Passover in Berlin

BERLIN, April 12—The Jewish population of Berlin and environs will not remain without matzoths for the Passover holidays, as had been previously feared. Although a sufficient supply of matzoths has been baked, packages of unleavened bread have not been openly displayed, as in former years, but are concealed under the counters of Jewish bakeries and are secretly supplied.

At a recent meeting held in New York a provisional committee for the organization of a Hillel League was constituted. This League will be composed of alumni and parents of students attending universities served by the B'nai B'rith Hillel Foundations. It will be limited to alumni and parents living in New York and vicinity, and will be made up principally of those connected with Cornell University. The committee consists of Lawrence L. Levy, Louis Robison, and Morton Hoffman.

DOROTHY THOMPSON ON WAY TO BERLIN AS SPECIAL CORRESPONDENT OF THE J. T. A.

DOROTHY THOMPSON, author and newspaper correspondent, is on her way from Italy to Berlin to make a survey for the JEWISH TELEGRAPHIC AGENCY of the situation in Germany.

Miss Thompson, in private life Mrs. Sinclair Lewis, will keep the Agency informed in a series of exclusive cables and approximately six news letters on the latest developments in Hitler's Germany.

Miss Thompson is not unknown in official and newspaper circles in Berlin. For four years (1924-28) she was there as chief of the Central European Service of the Curtis-Martin Newspapers, which she had represented abroad since 1920. Her first book, "The New Russia", was written out of knowledge gained as a foreign correspondent and, recently, she published a book about Hitler, "I Saw Hitler".

The first of her extensive articles will appear in the first enlarged Sunday edition of the *Jewish Daily Bulletin*, to appear April 23rd, under the editorship of Harry Salspeter.

Police Called to Quiet Detroit Hitler Meeting

DTROIT, Mich., April 12—Hitlerites and anti-Hitlerites clashed at a meeting in Deutsche Haus here when approximately 500 gathered to hear addresses on the German situation.

A chorus of boos greeted the address of Heinz Spanknoebel, head of the Hitler movement in America, when he commenced to attack the protest movement in this country against the anti-Jewish occurrences in Germany. Police had to be called and quiet was finally restored.

According to the police, there were no Jews or Communists in the audience, all having been Germans and sentiments being divided among them on the present outrages.

Frank Zeigler, national commander of the Steel Helmets (Stahlhelm) in this country, and Fritz Haier, German consul in Detroit, criticized the protest movement as not being justified. They attacked the American press as being misinformed on the true status of the Jews in Germany.

Anti-Nazi Protests in France

PARIS, April 12—Edouard Herriot, former Premier of France, addressed a mass meeting in Lyons in protest against the withdrawal of human rights from the Jews in Germany. At a meeting here addressed by Leon Blum, there was organized a League to Combat Anti-Semitism. M. Blum, in a rousing address, associated himself in the protest against the maltreatment of Jews as one who himself had been born a Jew and had never forgotten that he was a Jew.

More Jewish Lawyers May Be Readmitted

BERLIN, April 12—An unconfirmed report states that the Cabinet may decide to raise the percentage of Jewish lawyers who may be readmitted to practice. Instead of fixing the number of Jewish lawyers in relation to the proportion of Jews in the whole country, it will be fixed in relation to the number of Jews in Berlin alone, and each community throughout Germany may be permitted to fix its own proportion of lawyers to be readmitted.

The readmission, thus far, of thirty-five Jewish lawyers in the Berlin district, has caused considerable difficulty, in view of the fact that many more Jewish lawyers are war-veterans and were wounded, were practicing law before August 1, 1914, or are sons or fathers of men who fell in action in the war. Objections have been raised by the Association of Lawyers, Notaries and Clerks, pointing out that the vast majority of the thirty-five to forty thousand employees of Jewish lawyers are not Jews.

Belgians Raise Protest

BRUSSELS, April 12—A protest resolution against the persecution of Jews in Germany and the withdrawal of their means of livelihood was introduced by the Catholic leader Segers in the Senate Foreign Committee. The resolution asserted that this matter would soon be brought up before the League of Nations and the Belgian Government will demand the adoption of measures to bring to an end this tragic situation.

Zion German-Jews Plan To Help Countrymen

JERUSALEM, April 12—The sum of 20,000 pounds sterling is to be raised among the Jews of Palestine for the temporary relief of German refugees who are arriving here in increasing numbers, many of them penniless.

At a meeting held by the organized German Jews here resolutions were passed pledging every old settler from Germany to accommodate at least one newcomer with room and board until he finds employment and adjusts himself to the new conditions.

Sir Philip Cunliffe-Lister, minister for colonial affairs, who left London Saturday by plane, announced upon his arrival that he would recommend an economic study of the number of additional German-Jewish settlers Palestine is capable of absorbing.

Spaniards Welcome Einstein Appointment

MADRID, April 12—The acceptance by Dr. Albert Einstein of the Spanish Government's invitation to him to occupy the chair of the research professorship of science at Madrid University, has been received joyfully by the heads of the Spanish Government, chiefly by Fernando de Los Rios, Minister of Public Instruction. In a statement to the press, Professor de Los Rios, pointed out the only purpose of the invitation was to enrich the University with so magnificent a world figure as Professor Einstein.

This acceptance does not cancel Professor Einstein's engagement, beginning October 1, as a member of the faculty of the School of Mathematics of the New Institute of Advanced Study, affiliated with Princeton University. With Princeton and Madrid thus competing for the services of Professor Einstein, it can easily be seen how venomous and absurd are the statements of the Nazi press to the effect that Einstein's achievements have won recognition only in Jewish circles.

New Havana Yiddish Weekly

HAVANA, April 12—A new Yiddish weekly, under the title of "Dos Yiddish Wort," made its appearance in Havana April 5. The editors are David Utianski and Eliezer Aronovsky. Havana thus has two Yiddish weeklies. The other is called "Havaner Leben."

Austrians Aloof from Nazis

VIENNA, April 12—There will be no rapprochement with the Nazis of Germany, the Christian Socialist Party of Austria was informed at a conference here addressed by Dr. Wilhelm Miklas, president of the Republic, and Carl Vougin, War Minister.

Alfred Hart of Rochester Aids 400 Needy Families

ROCHESTER, N. Y., April 12—Four hundred needy families of all faiths, Jewish, Catholic and Protestant alike, received Passover and Easter holiday greetings and gifts in the form of checks when Alfred Hart carried out an annual custom started four years ago.

Mr. Hart is the founder and head of the chain of 140 groceries and markets in Rochester and vicinity, known as the Hart Food Stores, Inc. He is president of Temple Beth El and the Jewish Children's Home. He is a member of the Board of Directors of the United Synagogues of America.

Mr. Hart mailed checks of five dollars each to one hundred Jewish families, one hundred Catholic families, one hundred Protestant families, and also to one hundred families of war veterans of the three faiths.

The names of the poor families were taken from lists of the Jewish Welfare Council, Social Welfare League, and the Catholic Charities.

deprived of their rights as citizens and turned into Pariahs.

"My message to the Jews of America is 'Hope and Courage.' Speaking from Palestine, from where the Jew made his great contribution to the moral development of the world by giving it the Bible, whence the conception of justice as the greatest human ideal preached by our Prophets has gone out to the world, I urge them not to despair for the future. The world-enlightened public opinion will not permit medieval anti-Semitism to uproot and destroy men and women for no other crime than that of belonging to the Jewish faith and race.

"To the Jews of the United States I say in this grave moment, at no time in Jewish history was there such need for a united front and for a great and concentrated effort for the upbuilding of the Jewish homeland in Palestine as in this trying hour which threatens the very existence of the Jew in the very heart of Europe."

Dr. Weizmann informed Mr. Landau that he intends to come to the United States on July 1st and asked him to give his best wishes to Felix M. Warburg, prominently identified with the Jewish Agency for Palestine, Morris Rothenberg, President of the Zionist Organization of America and Louis Lipsky, President of the American Palestine Campaign.

Actually the police orders against the posters had already been withdrawn before the debate, whereupon new posters appeared in even greater quantities in Jewish shops.

Rabbi Goldstein Warns Of Kosher Meat Frauds

Referring to the "wicked management of one of the largest delicatessen firms in the country who paid a rabbi for the use of his name for Kosher endorsement and had at the same time barrels of non-Kosher meats in its possession" and disclosing that this firm was tried by eleven rabbis and found guilty, Rabbi Herbert S. Goldstein of the Institutional Synagogue issued a warning to the Jewish public to be on guard against Kosher frauds. Rabbi Goldstein urged upon the public to demand as a guarantee of Kosher the sanction of the known rabbinical organization or the Union of Orthodox Jewish Congregations of America.

A Correction

In the issue of Sunday, April 9th, the Jewish Daily Bulletin carried a boxed dispatch from Berlin quoting from an address by Adolf Hitler, in which he asserted that the "rebirth" of Germany had been achieved at a cost of 330 killed, 40,000 wounded and 100,000 driven from commercial life. These figures referred to Hitlerite victims and was not intended, as the Bulletin erroneously interpreted it, as a confession of the violence and boycotts practiced by the Hitlerites against Jews and other victims of the Nazis.
