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Campaign of English Nazis Taken Up in Rome During Mosley-Goering Parleys

Sir Oswald Denies His Movement Is
Anti-Semitic, Claims He Has
Half-Million Members

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

LONDON, April 18—Ways and means for developing an intensive Fascist campaign in England were discussed by Sir Oswald Mosley, leader of the British Fascists, in the course of his meeting in Rome with Herman Wilhelm Goering and other Fascist leaders. Sir Oswald claims he already possesses half a million followers in England.

Sir Oswald also announced recently that his movement is not anti-Semitic. Nevertheless, the publications of his party are filled with abuses and slanders against the Jews.

It is believed that Prince Bismarck, despite the setback he received recently at the meeting of the Royal Institute for International Affairs, succeeded in organizing an influential group of Members of Parliament and politicians for the National Socialist cause, with the definite promise, however, that anti-Semitism will be abandoned in the Nazi program. This, it is alleged, Bismarck has undertaken.

In view of the unpopularity which the Nazi cause at present has in England, the names of those who joined this group have not been made public.

For the first time the Daily Express, which maintained a non-committal attitude towards Hitler, has come out with an editorial for the National Socialist cause, with reservations, however, as regards the persecution of Jews. All the other newspapers in England, without exception, continue their criticism of the Nazi cause.

Hooligans Almost Bomb Eisenach Synagogue

BERLIN, April 18—A bomb attack on a synagogue at Eisenach was prevented by the timely intervention of the police. The gang of hooligans, who attempted to attack the edifice, escaped, throwing the bomb intended for the synagogue into a neighboring garden. The public prosecutor has announced a reward of three hundred marks for information leading to the identification of the hooligans.

Metz-Ridder Mission To Try to Win Germans In America to the Nazis

Invited to Berlin to Help Government
to Placate Opinion in U. S.,
Belief in Vienna

VIENNA, April 18—Practical steps to win over the six million Germans in the United States to National Socialism are being worked out now in Berlin, it is learned from political circles in Vienna.

Victor Ridder, one of the publishers of the New York Staats-Zeitung, and Herman Metz, President of the German-American Board of Trade, have arrived in Berlin under the pretext of making an objective study of conditions in Germany, but it is alleged that they have been invited in order to advise the German Government how best to pacify public sentiment which has been roused against the Nazi government in connection with its persecution of Jews and other elements in Germany, and to devise methods how best to organize the German element in the United States against American Jews.

Holland Refugee Tells How Nazis Beat and Tortured Congregation in Round-up

Head of Community Recovering from
Wounds in Amsterdam Hospital;
Complains to Polish Consul

AMSTERDAM, April 18—In a hospital here, slowly recovering from wounds he says were inflicted upon him by Nazis, is the head of a Polish-Jewish Congregation of the Gelsenkirchen District, Westphalia, just across the border.

According to the evidence submitted by him to the Polish Consul here, he received his injuries when the Nazis, surrounding the synagogue during a recent Passover service, rounded up all the worshippers and marched them through the streets to the Nazi prison.

There they were all compelled to kneel and keep their hands raised for twenty minutes. It was at this point that the head of the congregation, protesting, was beaten about the head and face. He then managed to cross the frontier into Holland.

Nine-Months Prison Term Given "Atrocity" Tale-Bearer By Special Berlin Court

Russian Peddler-Woman Gets Same;
Accused of Saying She Saw Eyes
of Jew Gouged Out

BERLIN, April 18—The special court here imposed a nine months' imprisonment term upon Herman Beer, a Polish Jew, on the charge that he had informed friends that the bodies of three mutilated Jews had been found in the streets of Berlin, and that, in Dresden, twenty-eight Jews were dragged out of a synagogue and beaten until blood flowed. He is accused of having disseminated a report that a Jewish professor had disappeared leaving not a trace behind.

The court in imposing sentence did not take into consideration whether Beer's information was accurate or not. It did, however, consider that since Beer communicated only what he had heard, the sentence should be nine months instead of the usual year, as in similar cases.

This unexpected "mercy", however, was shown to a Russian peddler-woman named Schumilkin, who was sentenced to only nine months, although she was accused of having asserted that she herself saw the eyes of a Jew gouged out.

In announcing the verdicts, the president of the court appealed to the press to print precisely the reasons for these verdicts because he wishes it to be known that although "this special court is strict, it is not cruel".

French Deputies Applaud Prof. Einstein's Courage

PARIS, April 18—The French Parliament debated the offer made to Prof. Albert Einstein of the chair of mathematical physics in the Sorbonne here.

Louis Marin, leader of the extreme Right, received thunderous applause when he declared, "We abhor religious oppression. In 1914 Prof. Einstein refused to associate himself with the anti-French Manifesto. Now France is happy to render him homage."

Premier Daladier, in his speech, stated: "We glorify Prof. Einstein not only as a scientific genius but as a courageous man."

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Junior Federations Hold**Meeting and Social Tonight**

Sol M. Strock, former President of the New York Federation and Judge Mitchell May, President of the Brooklyn Federation, will be the guest speakers at the Annual Joint Meeting of the Junior Federations of the New York Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies and the Brooklyn Federation of Jewish Charities, which will be held tonight, at Temple Emanuel-El Community House, 1 East 65th Street, New York City, at 8:30 o'clock.

This meeting is held for the purpose of establishing closer working contacts and furthering the cooperation between both organizations. Other speakers will include Abraham M. Lowenthal and Albert D. Levin, Presidents of the Brooklyn Junior Federation and New York Junior Federation respectively. A program of entertainment and dancing will follow.

The guest artists who will appear are Charles Nagele, Pianist, and Dorothea Fitch, Discuse, and music by the Montanians.

Sir Edward Stern, Banker**And Philanthropist, Dead**

LONDON, April 18 — Sir Edward Stern, well-known Jewish banker and social worker, died here yesterday at the age of seventy-eight. He was the head of the firm, Stern Bros., a son of the Viscount de Stern and a brother of the first Lord Wandsworth. In politics he was a Unionist, belonging to the Chertsey Division of the Surrey County Unionist Association. He was president of the League of Mercy. In recognition of his public services he was created a Knight in 1904 and a Baronet in 1922, and he was also a Fellow of King's College, London. For twenty years he served in the Yeomanry of Surrey.

Boston Creates Liaison Of Temple and College

BOSTON, April 18—A development of interest in the integration of religion and higher education comes from Boston University. A definite working relationship has been effected between the School of Religious Education and Social Service of the University and Temple Israel, the Reform Synagogue of Boston. Last summer Rabbi Beryl D. Cohon of Temple Israel was invited by the University authorities to introduce instruction of specifically Jewish interest. The courses offered—one in contemporary Judaism and one in the literary prophets—proved to be the beginning of a larger development. Dean Henry H. Meyer and a number of his faculty met with Dr. Albert Ehrenfried, Rabbi Harry Levi and Rabbi Beryl D. Cohon, representing the Committee on Education of Temple Israel, and an organic relationship between the University and the Temple has evolved. Dr. Ehrenfried, Chairman of the Committee of Education of Temple Israel, was appointed to the Religious Education Committee of the School.

The courses are given by instructors approved by the Committee on Education of Temple Israel, and under its supervision, and are intended to be authentically Jewish. The project has two main objectives: to afford students in all departments of the University, Jewish and non-Jewish alike, an opportunity to acquaint themselves with Jewish culture; and to develop at the School of Religious Education and Social Service a training school for Jewish religious school teachers and social workers, under proper university and synagogue auspices.

Tangier Jews Attacked

TANGIER, Morocco, April 18—Anti-Semitic disturbances suddenly broke out here during Passover when native Arabs attacked the Jewish population. Several were injured during the street fighting. Many arrests were made from among combatants on both sides.

"We Must Go on With Boycott"

Clothing for Rochester's Children Foundation Gift

ROCHESTER, April 18—The A. F. Horwitz Memorial Foundation has been established in memory of the late founder and head of the National Clothing Company for the benefit of the boys of the Jewish Children's Home of Rochester.

Through the foundation, all the boys at the Children's Home will be furnished with clothing and shoes at all times in the future. Last week all the boys, ranging in age from 3 to 17 years, were taken to the National Clothing Company store and provided with new suits, hats, shirts, ties, and shoes for the Passover.

The Foundation was established by Jess Horwitz, president of the National Clothing Company, a son of the man whose memory the gift perpetuates. Besides this gift, the Jewish Children's Home was bequeathed \$2,500 by the late A. F. Horwitz who died in New York City on October 25, 1932.

Y.W.H.A., Y.M.H.A., Centers In Three-Day Executive Meeting

In recognition of the growing importance of membership income in relation to balancing the budget, Harry L. Glucksman, executive director of the National Jewish Welfare Board, has called a conference of executive directors of Y.M.H.A.'s, Y.W.H.A.'s, and Jewish Community Centers, to be held Saturday evening, April 22nd, Sunday, April 23rd, and Monday, April 24th, at the Y.M.H.A., 92nd Street and Lexington Avenue, New York City. Executive directors from a number of communities throughout the country are expected to attend.

The conference will consider an evaluation of present membership policies, new systems of membership affiliation, the experience of recent campaigns, and other measures that will build up the membership in Jewish Centers so as to enhance their usefulness in the present emergency.

Council of Congregations To Hold Symposia Series

The XXXIII Council of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, which will meet in Chicago, June 18-22, will consider as a general theme "Jewish Life and Thought in the Last One Hundred Years" in the Symposium which forms an important part of its program.

There are to be three sessions in this Symposium which is entitled "Judaism Tomorrow." The first will be devoted to "Cross Currents in Religion Today" and "Impacts of Contemporary Life upon Judaism"; the second to "Jewish Contributions to the Social and Spiritual Ideals of the Twentieth Century," and the third to "The Synagogue," "The Home" and "Jewish Education," under the general title "Judaism in Action."

Spain Begins Restricting German-Jewish Immigration, Refugees Must Have Visas

Embassy in Berlin Formerly Had
Invited Nazi Victims to Go to
Southern Republic

MADRID, April 18—The large number of German Jews who have come into Spain in recent weeks has obliged the Spanish Government to clamp the first of what may be a series of restrictions against further Jewish immigration from Germany.

The Spanish Government has just announced that beginning Thursday, Spanish visas would be required by all German refugees wishing to make their homes in Spain. This formerly had been unnecessary.

At the time of the first drive against the Jews the Spanish Embassy in Berlin displayed on its gates a poster inviting Jews to make Spain their home.

Press in Britain Resents

Nazi Comments on Debate

LONDON, April 18—The British press is indignant about German criticism of the debate in the House of Commons concerning the situation of the Jews of Germany and the Hitler Government's decision to file a protest through its Ambassador with the Berlin Government. British newspapers are particularly unanimous in objecting to references in the German press to the speech of Barnett Janner in the House, in which they referred to the deputy as "this Jew."

The "Manchester Guardian," in an editorial, expressed the hope that the German Government, in protesting against Sir Austen Chamberlain, realizes that he spoke much more than for himself. Other newspapers reveal that the German protest is directed not only against Sir Austen's attack, but chiefly against Sir John Simon, Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, because Sir John, in reply associated himself with the protest.

Palestine's Duty on Oranges

JERUSALEM, April 18—Sir Philip Cunliffe-Lister, Under-secretary of State for the Colonies, speaking at a reception given in his honor by the municipality of Jaffa said that the increased duty on oranges from Palestine would not become operative until May.

Dortmund Jew Kills Self

BERLIN, April 18—The name of another Jew was added to the long list of those who have committed suicide since the Nazi regime came into power in Germany when a Jewish lawyer named Elias, who lived at Dortmund, took his life in prison. Elias was being held under charges of income tax evasion.

Jewish Leader in West Found Dead in His Auto

Jacob B. Findling, Salt Lake City Business Man, Headed District 4,
of the B'nai Brith

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, April 18—Jack Findling, whose full name was Jacob B. Findling, president of District No. 4 of the B'nai Brith and one of the most prominent Jews in the West for many years past, was found dead here in his automobile by two men who notified the Sheriff's office. An officer said Mr. Findling had apparently been dead from five to seven hours. He told the Jewish Daily Bulletin correspondent that the deceased had succumbed to natural causes; that there was no suggestion of foul play.

Mr. Findling had taken his car out of the garage at 9 a.m. in the morning and his friends did not see him alive again. The machine with his body was parked at a curb in a residential section in the southeastern part of the city. The news of his death came as a great shock to his wide circle of friends and associates.

Mr. Findling was born in Poland fifty years ago and came to the United States as a youth. After spending several years in Chicago, he came to Salt Lake City in 1908 and entered the dry goods business, being one of the principal owners of the well-known Boston Store at the time of his death.

Mr. Findling had been a moving spirit in intermountain Jewish organizations almost from the first. He had much to do with the founding of the Salt Lake Jewish Community Center Association and was its first president. He had also been president of the Congregation Montefiore and at the time of his death was on the board of trustees of the Congregation B'nai Israel. As District Grand President for the B'nai Brith, Mr. Findling gave generously of his time and talents, and only recently he made his annual visitation to the lodges in the district, which extends as far as British Columbia, Canada.

The nearest surviving relatives are the widow, two daughters, a son and three grandchildren.

Greek Jews Will Help

In Relief of Nazi Victims

SALONICA, April 18—The Jewish community here, operating through the General Assembly of the Kehilla, has decided to organize a large scale emergency fund for the relief of German refugees. Representatives of all Jewish organizations here have been invited to participate in an extraordinary session for the purpose of protesting against Jewish persecutions in Germany.

Move Against Quebec's Anti-Semitic Journals Withdrawn by Premier

Papers, Object of Anti-Defamation
Measure, Go Out of Business;
Bill Displeases Many

MONTREAL, April 18—The premier of the province Quebec, L. A. Taschereau, has withdrawn the bill amending the act respecting defamatory libel, explaining that the reasons which had given rise to its presentation did not exist any more, the papers against which it was directed having ceased publication. The premier promised, however, that if ever such an occasion arose, he would bring the measure back before the Legislature.

The bill was mainly intended as a weapon against the anti-Semitic publications "Le Miroir", "Le Goglu" and "Le Chameau", the premier having promised to bring in such legislation after Judge Desaulniers found himself powerless to grant an injunction to prohibit the above-mentioned sheets from attacking the Jews. In the interval the Goglu publications went out of existence and the premier found it a good excuse for withdrawing the bill which had aroused dissatisfaction in Jewish as well as labor quarters.

16 Professors in Germany

Given Leave of Absence

BERLIN, April 18—Of the sixteen professors in Prussia upon whom were conferred enforced leaves of absence, in the drive against Jews and Marxists in the Universities, thirteen are Jews.

Chief of these is Professor Moritz J. Bonn of Berlin, one of Germany's foremost economists who had lectured at several American universities and at the Williamstown Institute of Politics. The other three economists include Emil Lederer also of Berlin; Dr. Loewe, of Frankfurt, and Dr. Feller, of Koenigsberg. The four excluded Professors of Public Law are: Dr. Kelsen, of Cologne; Dr. Mark, of Breslau; Hermann Heller, and Dr. Sinzheimer of Frankfurt. The others are Dr. Mannheim and Dr. Holledheimer, zoologists, of Frankfurt; Dr. Kantorowitz, Professor of Law at Kiel, and Dr. Cohn, Professor of Law at Breslau; two Professors of the Medical Faculty at Bonn, Dr. Loewenstein and Dr. Alfred Kantorowitz and finally two geologists, Dr. Gunther Nehn of Halle and Dr. Tillich of Frankfurt.

Hungary Opposes Swastika

BUDAPEST, April 18—The Minister of the Interior has prohibited the exhibition of swastika uniforms and badges in Hungary, particularly in the Debreczin district, where Nazi organizations have been formed. The local authorities ordered that Nazi leaders ignoring this prohibition be severely punished.

Danish King Will Appear At Synagogue Centenary

COPENHAGEN, April 18—King Christian X will attend the hundredth anniversary marking the establishment of the Grand Synagogue here this Friday, April 21. His Majesty, in accepting the invitation, added that he desired to show his esteem for the Jews of Denmark, particularly at the present time.

Detroit Jew Named Judge

DETROIT, Mich., April 18—Governor William Comstock has appointed Joseph Sanders to be judge of the Common Pleas Court.

Mr. Sanders is a life-long Democrat and ranks among the outstanding leaders of his party in the state. Besides being a lawyer he is also an engineer and has originated the course of study of engineering jurisprudence at the Detroit Institute of Technology, a course which was later adopted by the University of Michigan.

Detroit Zionist Dead

DETROIT, Mich., April 18—Abraham J. Koffman, one of Detroit's Zionist leaders, died suddenly while attending Passover services at Congregation Shaarey Zedek.

Mr. Koffman, who was 53 years old, had served as president of the Zionist District, Jewish National Fund and other organizations. He was affiliated with all important local Jewish philanthropic and educational causes and was one of Detroit's most liberal donors to worthy causes.

Russian Cantor in Chicago Tells How Nazis Held Him Up

CHICAGO, April 18—Leo Lange, noted European cantor, told how he was detained three weeks by Nazi forces in a hotel in Bremen on his journey to Chicago. Lange lives in Moscow and was invited to sing here at the Passover services in Congregation Knasses Israel.

Cantor Lange said that his luggage was confiscated and that he was kept a prisoner in his hotel room in Bremen when he tried to cross Germany on his way to America. His property was restored and he was permitted to resume his journey as soon as the American consul there at the behest of Congressman Adolph Sabath, intervened in his behalf with the Nazi agents.

Cantor Lange was met at the station by Aaron Friedman, president of the congregation; Ben Fishbein, vice-president, and Morris Hechman, chairman of the board.

Swiss Resent the Swastika

GENEVA, April 18—Possibility of a Brown Shirt ban in Switzerland was indicated here by the Minister of Justice. Attempts made to introduce foreign police uniforms into Switzerland are such as to justify apprehension, he declared.

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No Harbor for Tel-Aviv Says Cunliffe-Lister

TEL-AVIV, April 18—The proposal made by the Tel-Aviv municipality to establish a small harbor at Tel-Aviv was rejected by Sir Philip Cunliffe-Lister, under-Secretary for the Colonies. He declared it was necessary first to consolidate the Jaffa Harbor.

Detroit Youth Off for Zion

DETROIT, Mich., April 18—Two interesting functions were held here marking the departure for Palestine of 12 Detroit boys and girls. One of the functions was a farewell for Ephraim Ticktin of Hashomer Hatzoir, the Zionist Youth organization, and another bade farewell to 11 boys and girls of the Chalutzim, the Pioneers, who are sailing for Palestine April 29. A group of adults is leaving for Palestine with the Chalutzim.

Furriers to Boycott Germany

ANTWERP, April 18—At a conference of Jewish market traders in the fur business here, resolutions binding the organization to boycott German furs and accessory goods used in the trade, were passed unanimously.

Siegfried Popper Dies at 85

VIENNA, April 18—Siegfried Popper, naval engineer, died here Sunday, after having been hit by a tram. He was eighty-five years of age. He was born in Prague. In 1902 he was appointed Director of Naval Construction for Austria and in 1904 was in charge of dock construction.



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
