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Berliner Tageblatt Prints Special Supplement On Jewish Question

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

BERLIN, June 5—What may be indicative of a change in policy in treatment of the Jews of Germany was the appearance yesterday of a special four-page supplement, devoted exclusively to the Jewish situation, in the Berliner Tageblatt. This first effort to solve the question other than by proscription of the Jews was entitled "How to Incorporate the German Jews into the New Germany."

The supplement contained many articles pro and con, including two by Max Nauman, president of the National Union of German Jews, who recently protested to the League of Nations against consideration of the Jews as a national minority, and Rabbi Jelsky.

"We feel it our journalistic duty to bring up this difficult problem the solving of which should not be impossible, for the sake of building up Germany's spirit of communion," the paper declares editorially. It promises several more similar editions setting forth all sides of the question.

While including both favorable and unfavorable observations, the supplement tends to create a favorable Jewish sentiment. It enumerates editorially, Jewish contributions to German art and science, especially Jewish inventions and discoveries, and also brings out the role played by Jews in the War.

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Palestine Representative To London for Exposition

Jewish Question to Fore At World Congress Of League Societies

MONTREAUX, June 5—Efforts of representatives of the German League of Nations Society to arrange some compromise whereby the German Jewish question would not come up in the discussions of the congress of League of Nations Societies now in session here, were unsuccessful, and the Jewish question occupied a prominent place on the congress calendar. Two resolutions of the Palestine and French societies were on the agenda for consideration. They came up in the minorities commission meeting and later were to be brought up in the plenary congress.

Speaking before the minorities commission, Dr. Ben-Zion Mossinson, Palestine representative, described impressively the deprivation of Jewish rights and the "violation of elementary human rights" of the Jews in Germany. He urged refugee aid, especially support of immigration into Palestine.

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German Jewish Paper Opposes World Congress

BERLIN, June 5—Discussing the Jewish world congress scheduled to be held next winter, the Frankfurter Israelite points out that it is impossible for the congress to focus on anything but the German Jewish situation.

"Making a public show of the Jewish tragedy in Germany will not serve the interests of Germany's Jews," it warns. It expresses the hope that English and American Jewish organizations will consider this point carefully.

"A quiet not demagogic meeting of the responsible Jewish bodies of the world is advisable," it says, "but the manner of New York in arranging for the congress destroys the possibility of a quiet, businesslike, international consultation."

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League Council Today To Hear Jurists' Verdict On Bernheim Petition

GENEVA, June 5—A meeting of the League of Nations League Council to consider the Bernheim petition matter has been definitely fixed for tomorrow morning. At that time, the committee of three jurists which has been considering Germany's legal objections to acceptance of the petition by the Council, will render its report.

This report will state, it is learned, that the German objections are untenable under construction of Article 147 of the Polish-German convention governing the Upper Silesia plebiscite area, since that article does not contain the restrictions which the German delegation has claimed. This is especially so since Franz Bernheim, who protested to the Council that the rights of the Jews in Upper Silesia had been violated by the Nazi anti-Jewish laws, was domiciled in Upper Silesia and left that place temporarily when the anti-Jewish laws were published. The committee will hold, it is learned that it was unnecessary for Bernheim to suffer personal loss in order to have the right to petition the League of Nations. (The Bernheim petition, however, also states that the petitioner was forced out of his position as a result of the laws about which he protested.)

There are no indications here that the German Government has receded from its adamant opposition to acceptance of the report of Sean Lester, rapporteur on minority.

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Hungarian Bishop Decrees Anti-Semitic Persecution

BUDAPEST, June 5—Bishop Balthasar, head of the Hungarian Clvanist Church, expressed to a deputation from the Jewish community here his opposition to the persecution of the Jews in Germany and his sympathy with Hungarian Jews in their anxiety.

"I highly appreciate that the Jews of Hungary, promoting art, science and the economic life are horrified by these anti-Semitic dragons' teeth born of shattered nerves."

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Boycott Group Organizes Advisory Council

An advisory council of noted American industrialists and economists is being formed to compile complete lists of American substitutes for all German products now being imported. Aided by the almost unanimous consumer's boycott on the part of the Jewish population and by other Americans, the League for the Defense of Jewish Rights has proceeded with the organization of the various trades and professions in order to make the boycott fool proof.

A canvass among importers reveals that, since the proclamation of the boycott at a conference of organizations representing the Jews of the nation at the Hotel Astor, there has been a decided drop in demand for German goods. Orders with German concerns have been cancelled on a large scale in recent weeks, the importers reveal.

Following a series of executive conferences held in Newark, N. J. over the week-end, the American League for the Defense of Jewish Rights will extend its activity into Newark and vicinity to organize a boycott against German-made goods.

Honor Professor Idelsohn

CINCINNATI, O., June 5—Professor Abraham Zevi Idelsohn, noted authority on Jewish religious and folk music, received the degree of Doctor of Hebrew Law from Hebrew Union College. Professor Idelsohn has just completed a ten-volume work, "Thesaurus of Hebrew Oriental Music." He also holds the chair of Jewish Music and Liturgy on the College faculty.

Nazi Terror Reports True Says Jewish Pianist On Arrival Here

Miss Rachelle Shubow, of Boston, concert pianist, who has been in Germany for the last four years, and has just returned, stated in an interview with a correspondent of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency that all the reports concerning outrages against the Jews are absolutely true. She indicated, however, that many of the most refined and cultured elements of German society, are uncompromisingly opposed to Hitlerism.

"The feeling current among these better circles," she said, "is that Hitler will not last, that he will be removed from power, or that his tactics will be altered due to the pressure of world public opinion."

Miss Shubow, who studied with Professor Arthur Schnabel in Germany, gave nine concerts in Berlin, Leipzig, Munich, and other cities. Because she is an American, the concert which she gave on April 1, the day of the boycott in Germany, was not disturbed, and was attended by 1,600 people. She stated that although she and her mother were not molested on the streets of Berlin, she saw many instances of cruel insults to Jews.

She described the pitiful condition of some of the most eminent lawyers and distinguished physicians who have been forced into idleness by the Nazi decrees. They have been made beggars, whose only means of existence is possible if they are employed as an assistant to a so-called Aryan physician or lawyer.

Dinner to Justice May

Governor Lehman, Mayor O'Brien and other public officials were among the guests at a testimonial dinner tendered to Supreme Court Justice Mitchell May by the Lawyers Club of the Brooklyn Federated Jewish Charities at the St. George Hotel, Brooklyn, Sunday night. The dinner celebrated Justice May's completion of forty years as a member of the New York Bar and was in tribute to his leadership in the communal and philanthropic life of Brooklyn.

It was announced during the dinner that \$10,000 had been raised by the guests toward the budget deficit of the Brooklyn Federated Jewish Charities.

Rip Swastika Off German Ship

RIGA, Latvia, June 5—Indignant Jewish and Latvian workers ripped the swastika pennant off a German freighter which entered the harbor of Libau yesterday and bombarded the steamer with rotten eggs. Police were called to quell the anti-Nazi demonstration.

Polish Jews' Federation To Fight Misconceptions Of East European Jewry

A proposal to establish an Association of Federations of Polish Jews will be considered at the joint convention and celebration of the twenty-fifth anniversary of the Federation of Polish Jews in America, which will be held at the Astor Hotel beginning June 10, Benjamin Winter, president of the Federation of Polish Jews announced yesterday. The nucleus of such an association already exists, Mr. Winter stated, in the Polish-Jewish Federation of the United States, England, Argentine and Brazil.

The convention will take up a proposal to launch an educational campaign against the "false impressions" about East European Jewry. A volume has been prepared by Z. Tygel, executive director of the Federation of Polish Jews in America, giving a history of Polish Jews in all parts of the world which he hopes may contribute towards dissipating "false impressions" frequently current about Polish Jewry.

Among those who will address the convention are Rabbi Stephen S. Wise; Bernard Deutsch, president of the American Jewish Congress; Rev. Everett R. Chinchy, of the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ, who recently visited Poland; M. Maldwin Fertig; Mrs. Rebekah Kohut and Louis Lipsky.

The gratitude of the Federation of Polish Jews to the Polish Government in protecting its citizens of Jewish faith residing in Germany was expressed by a delegation from the Federation which called to pay its respects to the Polish Ambassador in Washington, Stanislaw Patek. The delegation was composed of: Benjamin Winter, Jacob Brown, Dr. J. Tenenbaum, Z. Tygel, Benjamin Weinberg and Samuel Kalesky.

Reelect Brown President Of Workers' Alliance

CHICAGO, June 5—Resolutions condemning Hitlerism, persecution of Socialists and Zionists in Soviet Russia and factional fights in the unions was adopted here at the closing session of the thirteenth annual conference of the Jewish National Workers' Alliance. Other resolutions opposing a united front with the Communists and calling for recognition of Soviet Russia by this country, were also adopted. It was also voted to establish a pension fund for aged members of the organization.

Meyer Brown was reelected president of the Alliance; Louis Segal, secretary, and Nathan Zwirin, treasurer.

**Mexican West Coast Jews
Ask State Authorities for
Aid Against Campaign**

MEXICO CITY, June 5—Jews in the state of Sinaloa, especially in the port town of Mazatlan, have requested aid of state authorities in controlling a nationalistic campaign directed against the Jews, and which, according to press dispatches, seemed to have the support of police and municipal authorities.

Several days ago the Jewish merchants, most of whom have their places of business on Angel Flores Avenue, came to their establishments and found the walls and sidewalks plastered with anti-Semitic posters, urging the expulsion of the Jews from Mexico.

Press dispatches reported that when the Jews attempted to remove the posters, police prevented them from doing so, declaring that they should be allowed to remain for several hours for "everybody to see, since the propaganda did not contain any insults to anybody but merely expressed the opinions of the nationalists toward foreigners."

The greater part of the town, including those sections not in the Jewish business area, was covered with the blatant posters. As far as is known, this is the first outward manifestation against the Jews on the West Coast of Mexico, where most of the nationalistic fever has vented itself on the Chinese.

**Demand Equality for Jews
in Berlin Olympic Games**

VIENNA, June 5—Treatment of the Jews in Germany was to be one of the chief topics of discussion at the meeting of the executive committee of the International Olympic Committee with the American delegation leading a protest against any discrimination in the events.

The American delegation will not only demand that Jews be free to represent other nations at the next Olympiad to be held in Berlin in 1936, but also that they be free to represent Germany. Brigadier General Charles Sherrill, American delegate to the meeting, declared last night.

If Germany refuses to accede to these demands, it was said, the games will not be held in Germany and invitations will be sought from other countries.

German Resort Seeks Patronage

**Forty Cities Pledged
To J.D.C. Mid-West Drive
For German Jewish Relief**

CHICAGO, June 5—Jewish communities in fifteen mid-western states stood pledged today to mobilize their forces for an intensive fund raising effort in behalf of the German Relief Campaign of the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee. At a conference here Sunday afternoon at the Standard Club, four hundred delegates agreed to this action after hearing addresses by Rabbi Jonah B. Wise, national fund-raising chairman of the Joint Distribution Committee who recently returned from London; Paul Baerwald, chairman of the committee; Alexander Kahn, of New York, a director of the committee and others. Sol. J. Kline opened the conference. James Becker, of Chicago, who was named chairman, presided.

The proceedings were private. A statement issued by Dr. Wise after the close of the meeting described the response as "enthusiastic" and declared that the campaign would be devoted solely to relief and that no political issues would be considered.

No definite quotas were fixed for the forty cities in which the campaign is to be launched, it was said, but each community will attempt to raise a maximum amount.

A check for \$1,000, the contribution of the Jews of Springfield, Ill., was presented to Dr. Wise by Rabbi Herman L. Schneider.

Philadelphia Raises \$50,000

PHILADELPHIA, June 5—Almost \$50,000 was raised last night at the opening here of the Emergency Campaign for Jewish work abroad which includes both the American Joint Distribution Committee, and the Jewish Agency for Palestine. Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver in an impassioned address described the conditions of the Jews in Germany as he had recently observed them. He pleaded for emphatic and continued protest against the Hitler madness and called upon American Jewry to help settle as many as the German victims in Palestine as possible. The original quota of \$100,000 which was set by the community is expected to be exceeded. Samuel S. Fels donated \$10,000. The campaign is expected to be completed within the week.

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Nazi allegation that Jews avoided service on the German front and gives data revealing that 84,352 Jews enlisted in the German army, including 10,000 volunteers. Of all these, 78 per cent fought in the trenches, according to the Berliner Tageblatt and 12 percent found "a hero's death." Decorations were awarded to 29,874 Jewish soldiers, the paper declares.

The supplement features on the first page, an especially touching appeal from a Christian woman, Pauline Leiser, married to a Jew. It relates her recent experiences and contains an appeal to all Christian womanhood to sympathize and feel all that she is going through "as the mother of three Jewish children." She assures the readers that the Jews are not evil and states that she dares to declare that even many National Socialists and ardent supporters of the Chancellor of the Reich are not against the Jews.

Publication of this supplement aroused much interest and speculation here, especially in Jewish circles. The more optimistic were inclined to consider it as indicative of a change of attitude and the adoption of a more reasoning policy toward the Jewish population.
