Nazis Campaign Against Reinstated Jewish Lawyers In Upper Silesia Region (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

BERLIN, June 7-Pointing out that the National Socialist movement respects the decisions of the Government and does not intend to hinder the Jews of Upper Silesia who were ordered reinstated in their civil and political rights yesterday by adoption of the Lester report by the Council of the League of Nations, the National Socialist Party bureau for the district comprising the Upper Silesian industrial cities has issued an appeal urging the population not to patronize reinstated Jewish lawyers.

Bureya Settlers Quota Again Reduced for Lack Of Food and Shelter (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

MOSCOW, June 7-This year's quota of settlers for Bureva, the autonomous Jewish region which Soviet Russia is establishing in the Far East, originally fixed for 25,000 and subsequently reduced to 17,000 has now been cut down to 6,800. This drastic cut is not due to any lack of prospective immigrants, who this year are more numerous than in the past, but to the absence of food supplies and shelter for a larger number of people.

A complete cessation of emigration to Bureya until the latter half of the year has been ordered. It is hoped that conditions will improve later in the year and permit the resumption of the colonization pro-

This was the conclusion of the Berliner Tageblatt regarding the Geneva decision yesterday. Other Berlin newspapers which featured the League action in the Bernheim case did not comment on it.

Sound, Visitors Report

Two reports on the current economic situation in Palestine were given Tuesday evening to members of the American Economic Committe for Palestine by Sidney Matz and Edward A. Norman, members of the body's executive board, both of whom have recently returned from Palestine. Both stressed the economic soundness of the country and the self-reliant attitude of the inhabitants

Mr. Norman declared the capacity of the country to support a large population seems more dependent on the people than on the land and said that the industrial opportunities are unlimited.

Mr. Matz compared the Palestine Jewish community of two years ago with that of today. "The fundamental note," he said, "is a difference of feeling as to what existed in Palestine then and what exists now. Two years ago, except for Hebrew, which is the vernacular among Jews, the predominating language on the streets of Tel Aviv was Russian; today it is German. Two years ago Tel Aviv had 40,000 souls: today it has more than 60,000. Two years ago landlords were looking for tenants; today there are insufficient houses and people are living on the outskirts of the city in tents, waiting for homes to be prepared for them. Two years ago there was considerable unemployment; today there is a lack of labor. Two years ago was as dif-ferent from today in the spirit of Tel Aviv as 2,000 years ago might have been.

"Two years ago there were a few German Jews in Palestine," Mr. Matz continued. "They had come there for idealistic reasons. Today one finds all types of German Jews in the country. There are the well-to-do, the professional, the white collar class and the artisans. Walk along the streets of Tel Aviv and you see Mercedes automobiles with fine liveried chauffeurs and owners dressed appropriately for the grand march along the bouldvards of Berlin and Munich. Louis Bamberger Gives \$25,000 to Relief Fund (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

BERLIN, June 7-German firms not having any Jewish employees are now receiving from Nazi headquarters official certificates testifying that they are "pure Aryans". The certificates, which resemble business licenses, are usually displayed in a prominent place in the offices or stores of the company.

The Jewish Telegraphic Agency has secured one of these certificates issued to the Olex gasoline concern Luther strasse. The certificate reads

as follows:

"The economic-political department of the National Socialist party headquarters testifies that the Olex company has fired all non-Arvan leading employes and is henceforth to be considered Arvan. All authorities may patronize Olex unhesitatingly."

On the strength of this certificate, Olex has circularized its stations, ordering that while a copy of this certificate is to be kept in each station, nevertheless it is not to be displayed prominently because "we undoubtedly have also many Tewish and other thinking customers who might feel offended if the certificate is prominently displayed."

The certificate is intended for customers doubting the Aryanism of the firm, according to the instructions to the station managers.

'A Nation Gone Mad' Browne Says of Germany (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

LOS ANGELES, June 7-Lewis Browne, author and lecturer who recently returned from a world tour in which he spent some time in Ger-many, said that it may be possible to bring so much pressure to bear upon Germany by means of a boy-cott that the Nazis will be forced to discontinue their persecution of the Tews.

In an interview here, Mr. Browne stated that he did not see any acts of atrocities while in Germany.
"But the situation is far more tra-

gic. A much more grievous wrong is being done. A people is being starved to death. Bankers have been forced out of their positions. Merchants are being ruined. Physicians, scientists, lawyers, teachers and artists have been driven out of their professions. Only one per cent of the Iewish children can receive any schooling. Jews may not receive treatment in public hospitals, and Jewish hospitals are being forced out of existence.

Maryland Physicians Protest Nazi Treatment Of Jewish Colleagues (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

BALTIMORE, June 7-A protest against the treatment accorded physicians of the Jewish race in Germany has been recorded by the Medical and Chirurgical Faculty of Maryland in a resolution passed by

that organization.

The resolution has been forwarded to the House of Delegates of the American Medical Association with a recommendation for adoption. The local body asks that, if and when-it which is located in the Martin is adopted by the national medical group, it be sent on to President Roosevelt, Secretary of State Hull and the two Maryland Senators, Millard E. Tydings and Phillips Lee Goldsborough, for insertion in the Congressional Record.

"That this body of American physicians", the resolution says in part, "indignantly protests against the in-justice visited upon members of the medical profession in Germany, who, because of their race or faith or descent, have been thrust out of their positions in dispensaries, hospitals and universities, and greatly hampered in their practice.

"Among them are many whose contributions to medical science and art have been invaluable, and have brought great credit to Germany, irrespective of birth or descent, to vindicate that honor by bringing about the abolition of a discrimination so repugnant to the spirit of science and humanity."

While the German group confined itself to not voting either for or against the resolution, they strongly objected to Lord Cecil's letter, actually leaving the hall in protest as the letter was read.

It declared: "The action taken against the Jewish citizens has caused the most serious uneasiness in many parts of the world. It is not too much to say that the events. in the words of the covenant, have impaired good understanding between the nations. The German Government has taken legislative and administrative measures against a body of their citizens solely because they belonged racially to the Tewish people. This discrimination is impossible to reconcile not only with the spirit of the Covenant, but even with the progress of Western civilization during two or three centuries, to which Germany has made eminent contributions. The Federation hopes and believes that in the future nothing could more effectually promote good feelings between Germany and other countries than decisive evidence that in the future all citizens of the Reich can rely on equal treatment before the law irrespective of race, language or opinion."

Congress circles consider the resolution, and the letter, in particular, as an important Jewish success and unmistakable condemnation of Germany's Jewish policy.

The German delegation will probably publish a letter in reply to Lord
