War on Jews to Go On, Goebbels Assures Nazis; "Worse Still in Store"

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

HAMBURG, June 24—The Hitler Government does not intend to make any compromises whatsoever in its policies regarding the Jews of Germany, despite protests from abroad, declared Dr. Paul Joseph Goebbels, Nazi minister of propaganda and public enlightenment, addressing a mass-meeting here.

"When we are accused of being against the Jews, we reply, 'Yes,' he shouted. "Has anybody thought us pro-Jewish? When we are reproached for the vigor of our measures we reply, 'Have we ever said we were not vigorous in our measures?' When we are said to be blunt because we are uncompromising, we reply, 'Yes, our opposition does not need to doubt this.'

"The German nation," he declared, "is fed up with compromises. It wants us to wipe the slate clean."

The German nation does not accuse the Nazi regime of being too vigorous, Goebbels declared, but of going to the other extreme, and tempering its acts by too much humanitarianism.

"The revolution is not yet finished," he warned his audience. "Worse events are still in store."

Nazis Spurn Memorial Subsidy of Otto Kahn

MANNHEIM, Ger., June 24—The closing down of the Bernhard Kahn Reading Room was resolved upon here by the authorities today when they transformed the Mannheim people's academy into a German school.

The Reading Room was established in 1927 by Otto Kahn, New York banker, who maintained it in memory of his father. Otto Kahn was born in this city.

Nazi educators now decline to accept further subsidy from the American banker and have ordered the Reading Room shut up. The Reading Room was attached to the people's academy.

Paul Eppstein, who since the establishment of the people's academy has served as honorary supervisor,

Attempted Raid on Jewish Agency Offices by British Fascists Foiled by Police

LONDON, June 24—An attempted raid on the London headquarters of the Jewish Agency for Palestine early this morning by a large gang of British Fascists was foiled by prompt action of the London police who learned of the plans for the raid in advance.

The offices of the Jewish Agency and the Zionist Organization at 77 Great Russell Street yesterday were informed by detectives that a raid on the offices by a Fascist group was pending, and detailed instructions were given the caretaker of the offices on the measures to be taken in case of trouble.

At three o'clock this morning, two large trucks, packed with shouting Fascists, drove up in front of the Zionist offices, unaware of the fact that a force of thirty to forty policemen were guarding the building. As soon as the leaders saw the police, they shouted instructions to the

Hisses Greet M. Coty At Libel Suit Brought By Jewish War Veterans

PARIS, June 24—Excited scenes marked the resumption today of the trial of Francois Coty, perfume manufacturer and newspaper publisher, on charges of libeling Jewish war veterans. Coty is accused by the Union of Jewish Ex-Soldiers of stating that the veterans' organization and Jewish sports organizations were merely disguised revolutionary bodies. The accusation was made in articles appearing in Coty's paper, L'Ami du Peuple.

Jeers and cat-calls were heard in the court-room when Coty denied that he was anti-Semitic and asserted that he was opposed only to communists, anarchists and international financiers, but respected conservative Jews. The presiding judge had to threaten to clear the courtroom repeatedly as a result of the vent given the excited feelings of the spectators. The trial was postponed until June 29.

The case has aroused much attention since it marks the first time that

Arlosoroff Murder Suspect Transferred to Jerusalem Prison; In Separate Cell

JERUSALEM, June 24—Abraham Stavsky, 28-year-old Zionist Revisionist, who has been under arrest since last Monday in connection with the assassination of Dr. Chaim Arlosoroff, noted Zionist labor leader, has been transferred to the Jerusalem central jail where he has been put in a separate cell.

Stavsky, who has repeatedly asserted his innocence and claimed that he spent the night of June 16 when Dr. Arlosoroff was shot in Tel Aviv at a hotel in Jerusalem, found some support when one of the three men who he said were with him at the Turgeeman Hotel, corroborated his alibi. One of the trio failed to do so. The third has not yet been located.

Stavsky has refused to accept the customary jail fare, it was learned, and insisted on kosher food which he is now obtaining daily through his attorney from a local restaurant.

The mystery of the dead Jew who was found near Kiryat-Anavim has not yet been solved and his body remains unidentified although a photograph was published by the entire press of Palestine.

Although Dr. Arlosoroff's widow was unable to identify the body as that of one of her husband's assassins, the suspicion is growing rapidly, that there is some connection between the dead man and the Arlosoroff murder.

A special office to deal with the Arlosoroff case has been established by the Palestinian police.

MacDonald Party Deplores Nazi Anti-Jew Emphasis

LONDON, June 24—Prime Minister J. Ramsay MacDonald's National Labor Party has adopted resolutions deploring the continued policy of the German Government of practicing discrimination against the Jews. The resolution, it was learned today, has been forwarded to Mr. MacDonald.

Czechs' Defensive War on Nazis Told by Socialist Head

Czecho-Slovakia is doing everything in its power to succor Jewish refugees from Germany, declared Dr. Franz Soukup, Socialist president of the Senate of the Czecho-Slovakian Republic, on his arrival here Friday aboard the Berengaria.

Dr. Soukup has come to the United States to visit the Century of Progress Exposition in Chicago and to deliver a series of lectures before groups of Socialists in this country.

He described the elaborate precautions being taken by his government to counteract the propaganda with which Hitlerites are trying to flood his country.

"The Hitlerites are doing everything in their power," he said, "to invade the borders of my land and start propagandizing the people against Jews. We have suppressed them thoroughly so far, even over the radio. We have prevented them from placing loud speakers on their side of the border, through which they fill the ears of our people with their militant ideas."

The Germans in Czecho-Slovakia, he explained, like the Jews in Germany, constituted a recognizable minority, though many of them have lived in Czecho-Slovakia for five or six generations.

"Hitler himself doesn't really know what he wants," asserted the aged statesman in his native tongue. The Czech consul general in New York, Dr. Nowak, translated Dr. Soukup's remarks into English.

He stated that Jewish refugees in his country were permitted to look for work, contrary to the procedure in France and elsewhere in Europe.

Judeans Hear Need of Goal by Jewish Youth Stressed at Sessions

SHARON, Mass., June 24—Led by Frank Ruben, cantor, and followed by a sermon by David Polish, services were conducted here this morning by delegates to the 25th annual convention of Young Judea, which is taking place in this city.

1,350,000 Francs Donated For Relief of Refugees

PARIS, June 24—Between 10,000 and 12,000 francs are being spent daily by the "HICEM" committee here for relief work among German Jews in Paris.

During the last two weeks 1,350,000 francs were donated to the fund for relief. Biggest contributors were the Rothschilds, 500,000 francs; David-Weill, 100,000 francs; Lazard Company, 100,000 francs, and Goldsoll, 100,000 francs.

Youth to Hold 'Graduation' Service for Jews Nazis Are Denying Diplomas

The rally of Jewish youth in Greater New York, in behalf of the Jewish youth in Germany which will be held at Temple Emanu-El, 65th St. and 5th Ave., tonight, will be converted into commencement exercise services for the young Jews of Germany who will be unable to be graduated from the universities and colleges because of the discriminations now in force against them. The services are being sponsored by the Junior Division of the German Relief Campaign of the Joint Distribution Committee.

Miss Pauline Baerwald will preside and the baccalaureate sermon will be delivered by Rabbi Ralph A. Habas, executive secretary of the Junior Division. Others who will speak include James W. Gerard, former American Ambassador to Germany, James Marshall, Paul Felix Warburg and Rabbi Jonah B. Wise.

It is expected that messages of sympathy will be read from presidents of leading colleges throughout the United States.

Baltimore Ministers Protest Nazi Persecution

BALTIMORE, June 24—"Indignant disapproval of the reported unjust discrimination against the Jews by certain of the German people, with the apparent approval of German officials" is expressed in a resolution adopted by the Ministerial Union of Baltimore, a copy of which has been sent to Cordell Hull, Secretary of State.

"We consider," the resolution states, "all such un-Christian prejudice as a relic of the barbarism of the 'Dark Ages' and ask that representatives of the Jewish race be accorded that consideration which their distinguished service to Germany so richly deserves."

The letter to Mr. Hull expressed the hope "that the good offices of the United States Government be used to urge the German Government to cease their anti-Jewish propaganda."

Nazis Suspend Another Paper

BERLIN, June 24—The Berlin daily newspaper, Der Reichsbote, has been suspended by the Government for carrying an article criticizing the Government attitude toward the Jews. The article was described by the authorities as "a malicious defamation of the Government's prestige."

James N. Rosenberg Makes Plea for German Jews in Radio Relief Drive Talk

The Jews of America have a duty to bring aid and relief to the Jews of Germany, James N. Rosenberg, noted attorney and vice-chairman of the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee, declared yesterday in a radio speech over WMCA. The Jews of Germany have been reduced to a class almost lower than that of the "untouchables" of India, he said in his appeal for support of the German Relief Campaign of the Joint Distribution Committee.

Describing the plight of Germany's Jewish population and the special hardships of the children, he said:

"In the face of this unspeakable catastrophe, what part shall we in America play? Shall we content ourselves with protests or denunciations? Do we not owe it to ourselves and to the cause of civilization to take every possible means whereby the conscience of the world may be aroused and the voices of decent men and women of all races and creeds raised against these dreadful acts? But we have a more immediate and compelling duty to perform. This is the duty to bring relief and aid and hope to the Jewish victims in Germany; to give them at least some little help toward reconstructing their lives somewhere or somehow. The duty, as it seems to me, is cast upon all men and women who have any feeling of humanity to bring relief and help to the Jewish victims in Germany, to find some way to help them become self-supporting; to find some way whereby the Jewish children may receive some education, some training of hand and mind to prepare themselves for the pioneer life which seems to be their only hope."

German Future Not Nazis' Asserts Michael Williams

The future of Germany will not belong to the Nazis, declares Michael Williams, editor of the Catholic magazine, The Commonwealth, who has recently returned to New York from an investigation of the persecution of German Jews and of Hitler's attempt to control the Protestant and Catholic churches in Germany, in a statement issued through the American Committee on Religious Rights and Minorities.

"Far too great a proportion of the German nation is opposed to the Nazi doctrine and the methods of its application," he states. "There may be a restoration of a monarchical system; or there may be another left-wing revolution; or, as a third possibility, the Nazi regime may be compelled to modify its policy in regard to racial and religious intolerance."

Conference of Rabbis Hears Demand for Control of Industry

MILWAUKEE, June 24—In his paper on "The Concept of God in Jewish Life and Literature" read before the Central Conference of American Rabbis, Dr. Bernard Heller, of Ann Harbor, Mich., criticized the attempts of a certain school of Jewish thinkers who, he said, "have attempted to dovetail the implied creed and implicit character of Judaism with the ideologies of modern Humanism, secular Hebraism and a non-religious or even irreligious type of nationalism. These scholars, he warned, believe that "allegiance to the Jewish people rather than to the Jewish religion is supreme and cardinal in Jewish life."

Delegates to the convention attended prayer sessions all this morning.

Strong demands for social control of the profit system, for unemployment insurance, for a greater curb on manufacturers under the industrial recovery act, and for justice toward the Negro came yesterday from delegates attending the convention.

The delegates overwhelmingly adopted a series of progressive measures formulated by the conference's commission on social justice.

The convention went on record for more aggressive attempts before legislatures to get action on bills for old age pensions, unemployment insurance, restriction of child labor and other social legislation.

Officials of the federal government were urged to put into effect constitutional machinery that would facilitate the spread of social measures among the states.

Extinction of sweatshop conditions brought about by unscrupulous employers was demanded, and such employers, particularly those that were Jewish, were denounced for breaking down labor standards and practicing "exploitation of the vilest sort."

Anti-Semitism has grown rapidly in the center of the Eastern textile industries where Jews may be owners of some of the sweatshop plants, the commission declared.

The report was submitted before the convention by Rabbi Edward L. Israel, of Baltimore.

President Roosevelt was praised by Rabbi Israel for his leadership in the field of economic planning, but the commission in its report urged that the final responsibility for such planning be reposed with the government, not with trade associations.

Legislation for effective management of production and distribution was recommended, as well as definite labor representation in the con-

Train Palestine Pioneers Near N. Y., Plea at Order Sons of Zion Convention

LONG BRANCH, N. J., June 24 —A request by Isaac Allen, grand master, that a spot be selected near New York as a training ground for Chalutzim or pioneer workers in Palestine featured the opening here tonight of the 24th annual convention of the Order Sons of Zion. Delegates from 30 cities in six different states were in attendance.

"If we could prepare 50 young men a year as pioneer workers, the organization would certainly be doing something worth while," said Grand Master Allen. "The fact that such a farm area would be in the vicinity of New York would afford us an opportunity to bring out to the farm hundreds of people interested in Palestine. We would show them the methods used in training Chalutzim for pioneer life. Next to a personal visit to Palestine no better form of propaganda for Zionism could be conceived."

Allen also urged the convention to go on record as favoring a boycott against Germany. He requested the convention to call upon the Mandatory Government to open the gates of Palestine "for our stricken German brethren, and for all Jews fleeing from persecution, regardless of the capacity of the land for absorption." He urged the delegates to go on record for a Jewish minority on both sides of the Jordan in Palestine.

Jacob Kaplan, of Newark, grand secretary, reported that despite financial conditions there was a significant increase in the Order's Insurance Reserve Fund. He also told of the increase made in cultural work during the year. Among his recommendations was one that the Order establish an employment bureau to enable member employers to contact unemployed members.

A memorial was offered for the late Josef Baroness, former Nasi of the Order.

National Fund Planning All-Zionist Outing July 9

An All-Zionist excursion is being arranged by the Jewish National Fund for Sunday, July 9. The excursionists, who will sail on the S.S. Miles Standish, will start out Sunday morning from Pier 6, South Ferry, Manhattan, and will sail to Hook Mountain. The boat will return to New York the evening of the same day. A diversified program of entertainment on the boat will feature this first Zionist excursion of the season.

trol of industry and a proper social control of our present profit system. This phase of the commission's report was given to the resolutions committee for reshaping.

Ask Inquiry on Temple Rift

The conference called for abolition of injustices toward the Negro, especially as shown in the Scottsboro trial. It also voted for the appointment of a committee to investigate the rift that has occurred between Congregation Beth-Or, of Montgomery, Ala. and its rabbi over the latter's outspoken reference to the Scottsboro case. The inquiry, requested by the congregation, was ordered "out of fairness to the congregation and a deep zeal for the freedom of the rabbinate."

The conference appealed to congregations of all faiths to "support their leaders in activities on behalf of a persecuted race."

"The Jewish pulpit must not be made an echo for the comfortable prejudices and conventional bigotries of the day," the conference declared. It pointed out, however, that no matter how forward looking the rabbi may be, the laity often fails to understand his approach to social problems. The conference therefore authorized the publication of pamphlets detailing the ethical background of its program of social justice.

Keep Courts Out of It

One of the most heated discussions developed yesterday over the question of whether governmental power should be employed to enforce Kashruth regulations, and whether introduction of Yiddish instruction in public schools should be favored or opposed.

In the report of the committee on church and state presented by Rabbi Joseph Rauch, of Louisville, Ky., it was recommended that the conference oppose invoking power of the courts or police to control the kosher slaughtering of meat.

The Kashruth racket scandals of New York and Chicago were assailed, and an attack was made on "unscrupulous people in our midst who have taken a rite sacred to millions in Israel and degraded it to commercial purposes, bringing shame to all of us."

The conference, however, disagreed as a whole with the committee, which contended that use of the courts to end such abuses violated the principles of church and state

Fear of American Nazis

The committee criticized the attitude of "Yiddishists" in introducing Yiddish in the curriculum of schools located in thickly-populated Jewish areas, but the conference as a whole refused to condemn such action on the ground that classes in Yiddish as a tongue did not interfere with the principle of separation of church and state.

The committee also pointed with alarm to the activities of American Nazis in circularizing Louisiana with copies of the "Elders of Zion" and to apparent attempts in Minnesota to institute a numerus clausus system for keeping down the number of Jewish teachers in the schools.

Introduction of Chanukah programs in Minneapolis schools where attendance of Jewish pupils is heavy was opposed.

Resistance against budget cuts for congregational religious schools was voted by the conference.

Wherever else economies may be effected, educational efforts "must not be minimized," the conference agreed, in adopting reports of the committee on religious education, read by Rabbi Abraham J. Feldman, of Hartford, Conn.

Coty has been taken into court in connection with the inciting articles appearing in his two papers, L'Ami du Peuple and Figaro. On June 1, when the case came to trial only to be postponed because of the illness of Coty, it was stated by his attorney that the statements in the papers did not refer to the combatants but only to irresponsible groups.

School for Deaf and Dumb Functioning in Palestine

JERUSALEM—The project for the foundation of a deaf and dumb home here, following a bequest made to the Alliance Israélite Universelle in Paris for the purpose, by the late Leone A. Levy, a well-known resident of Shanghai, who died in May, 1929, has been successfully consummated. A sum of £15,000 has been spent on the new building. At one time the question of organization was rather complicated, the revenue from the bequest, though important, not being sufficient to create a boarding school. For this reason it was decided, while waiting for other gifts, to start the experiment with a day school.

The school has been functioning this year with 20 children on the roll. All the pupils, who are taught to converse in Hebrew, receive their mid-day meal at the school; those whose parents do not live in Jerusalem also receive, if the family is without means, the evening meal and lodging as well.

The Alliance has engaged for one year M. Hoxter, an experienced Jewish professor from the model deaf and dumb school of Berlin.

Star of David on Stamp Angers Dutch Anti-Semites

AMSTERDAM, June 22—Dutch Nazis are using the fact that a Mogen David, the five-pointed Jewish star, symbolizing peace, appears on a Dutch stamp, as the excuse for a new flood of anti-Semitic propaganda. The presence of the symbol on a Dutch stamp is interpreted by them as an example of the influence of international Jewry.

The Minister of the Interior, in a surprising move, today ordered limitation of the acceptance of foreign students in the Dutch universities under the pretext that there was a stream of non-Jewish and Jewish Socialist students to the institutions.

In this connection it is pointed out however, that thus far, in all, only twelve German Jewish students have applied for permission to study in the universities of Holland.
