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Stavsky Alibi Partially Supported by Hotel Man;

He Turns Gray in Jail

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

JERUSALEM, June 26—The alibi claimed by Abraham Stavsky, who is being held here in connection with the assassination of Dr. Chaim Arlosoroff received partial substantiation today in an investigation by the Jewish Telegraphic Agency. The proprietor of the hotel at which Stavsky said he stayed on the night of the murder, Mr. Turgeman, told the Jewish Telegraphic Agency that he had seen Stavsky at eight o'clock in the evening and again at six o'clock the following morning. The murder was committed at eleven P. M.

Mrs. Arlosoroff, who witnessed the slaying of her husband, however, is definitely convinced that Stavsky was the companion of the man who fired three bullets into her husband's body.

The police are working on the theory that Stavsky may have slipped out of the hotel during the evening and proceeded to Tel Aviv by automobile, returning later. They are trying to check on all vehicles reported near the Moslem cemetery in front of which the murder occurred.

A lawyer retained by the Polish consulate to represent Stavsky, declared that Stavsky had become completely gray since his arrest.

Messages of condolence were received by Mrs. Arlosoroff from Mitqual Pasha, chief of the Transjordanian sheiks favoring Jewish settlement.

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Breslau University Nazis

Boycott Jews on Faculty

BERLIN, June 24—Nazi students at the University of Breslau have proclaimed a boycott of lectures by the only remaining Jewish professors at the institution. At a special meeting of the medical students, at which Jewish students were denied admission by Nazi troopers who refused to let them enter the hospital to attend their lectures, it was voted to boycott lectures given by Professors Fraenkel and Bielschowsky, both of whom are converts and exempt from dismissal on account of their war service records.

Nazi Arrest Scores

For 'Economic Sabotage'

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

INNSBRUCK, June 26—A large number of Jewish merchants have been arrested in Muenster and Essen and taken to concentration camps, accused of practising "economic sabotage."

Nazi political police have also arrested many Jewish merchants and are holding them for trial on a similar charge. Merchants arrested include the prominent Jewish industrialist, Herr Dauz, of Muenster, and the Jewish proprietor of the Brunner photo company of Essen.

Many Jewish merchants and industrialists are now in a condition which places them between "the devil and the deep blue sea." On the one hand, fearing unfounded charges of "sabotage," they are anxious to liquidate their businesses altogether. On the other hand, such liquidation would result in new charges of dismissal of workers and employees, thus increasing unemployment.

Nazi authorities are waiting eagerly for such an opportunity to demonstrate to the workers the extent of the government's solicitude for the care and protection of their interests.

DELAY WORLD CONGRESS UNTIL AMERICAN JEWRY IS UNIFIED, CONFERENCE OF RABBIS URGED

MILWAUKEE, June 26 — The Committee on World Jewish Congress of the Central Conference of American Rabbis, in session here, in its report today advised the delegates to refrain from calling a world meeting until American Jewry is unified. Otherwise, the report stated, the congress would open under a handicap so great that it would be doubtful if anything worthwhile could be accomplished.

The executive board authorized a special committee to study the advisability of organizing a world congress. The committee, members of which will be named later, will report at the October 17 meeting of the executive board in Cincinnati.

The executive board voted today to contribute \$1,000 through the Joint Distribution Committee for relief of needy Jewish rabbis and scholars in Germany.

Germany Retaliates

With the Expulsion of Austrian Jews From Reich

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

VIENNA, June 26—The first Austrian Jewish victims of the Nazi Government's reprisals against the Austrian Government for expelling German Nazi leaders, reached the German-Austrian boundary today, according to reports from Innsbruck. Although the exact number of Jews expelled in the Nazi retaliation move could not be ascertained, it is feared that a large number of Austrian Jews residing in Germany may be affected.

Renewed Nazi anti-Semitic disorders were reported yesterday in this city, Salzburg and other towns throughout Austria as Nazi gangsters, continuing their terrorist acts against the Dollfuss Government, smashed windows in Jewish stores and homes, set fire to the clubhouse of the Hakoah, famous Jewish sports association, damaged their football field, attacked Jewish pedestrians in the streets and molested Jewish patrons in the cafes. Many Nazi rowdies were arrested.

The final session of the convention proceeded smoothly, following previous animation over many serious questions.

Yesterday a controversy over whether to revise the reform prayer book to include a humanistic conception of God, man and the universe broke out before the convention.

Palestine Has Room for Greater Number of Jews Says Dr. Weizmann

Palestine today can absorb a far greater number of Jews than the 200,000 already there, Dr. Chaim Weizmann, world Zionist leader, said in a radio address Sunday over the Columbia network.

"A few weeks ago I was in Palestine," he said. "I saw there men and women with heads high and eyes gleaming, offering a remarkable contrast to the dejection and tension so common in Europe. Palestine is prosperous! These are the magic words that are cabled across continents to incredulous people suffering from the depression."

Now that Palestine has emerged successfully from the experimental stage, he stated, there is an obligation upon the Jewish people and upon the whole world to deal adequately with Palestine in a program for the constructive solution of the Jewish problem.

Labor Conference to Have Debate on German Jews (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

GENEVA, June 26—An open debate regarding the situation of the Jews in Germany is to take place at the plenary session of the International Labor Conference this week as the result of the decision of the Labor Office to put the resolution adopted in committee last week urging the Labor Office and the conference to investigate the labor situation resulting from the exodus of Jews from Germany, before the conference as well as before the League of Nations.

Discussions of this question, to date, have been conducted quietly by the Labor Office in private sessions.

Services Held Today For Samuel Epstein

Funeral services will be held today for Samuel Epstein, one of the oldest trade union leaders, who died Sunday, after a prolonged illness. He was connected with the Retail Dress Goods Association for the last 27 years, with the United Hebrew Trades for 30 years, and was active in the Workmen's Circle and the Forward Association.

Women's Boycott Meeting Today

Over 2,000 Jewish women are expected to be present at the mass conference of the Women's Division of the American League for the Defence of Jewish Rights, to be held this afternoon in the grand ballroom of the Hotel Astor. The purpose of the conference is to organize a nation-wide consumers' boycott of German goods and services among the women of the country, to last as long as the Jews of Germany are deprived of their rights.

Edna Ferber, noted novelist, yesterday endorsed the anti-Nazi boycott in a message to the Women's Division of the League. She expressed regret at her inability to attend, and extended her best wishes for the success of the conference.

Boycott Stamps

After being informed by the postal authorities that the use of anti-Nazi boycott stamps, printed and distributed by the Jewish War Veterans of the United States was not permissible, J. C. Fredman, Commander-in-Chief of the organization, urged that instead of pasting the stamps on the envelopes, the stamps be pasted on the face of the correspondence.

Spain Willing to Give Citizenship to Sephardim (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

MADRID, June 26—The readiness of the Spanish Government to grant Spanish citizenship to Sephardic Jews if the applicants are in a legal position to accept citizenship, was announced today by former Foreign Minister Luis de Zulueta in the course of a press conference when he was asked to elaborate on his statements before the League of Nations Council during the discussion of the Bernheim case, that Spain was friendly to the Jews.

Describing the "lasting love" of the Sephardic Jew for Spain, its language and its culture, the minister declared that this action was the least Spain could do in return, within the limits of international etiquette, and would be to the spiritual interest of all Spanish descendants.

Shanghai Jews Protest; 3 Youths Leave for Zion

SHANGHAI — Jewish residents held a meeting at the Shanghai Jewish school auditorium, recently, under the auspices of the Shanghai Zionist Association, to express their sense of indignation against the persecution of Jews in Germany, and their sympathy with the victims.

The Shanghai Zionist Association, gave a party in honor of the three young pioneers who left for Palestine, before their departure, at which Mrs. R. E. Toeg, president of the Zionist Association, presided. Speeches were delivered by Rabbis Mendel Brown and M. Z. Ashkenazi, Miss Lily Noblston and others. It is expected that more young men will receive certificates from the Palestine Government shortly.

Liebermann to Become Exile

PRAGUE, June 26—Max Liebermann, noted German Jewish artist and former president emeritus of the Prussian Academy of Art, has decided to accept exile in France despite his advanced age. It is as yet uncertain whether the German Government, however, will permit him to leave the country.

Services Held for Mrs. Grabelsky (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

JERUSALEM, June 26—Impressive funeral services were held here yesterday for Mrs. Bathsheba Grabelsky, noted patron of Hebrew culture in the United States, who died in New York last September.

Reuben Grossman, the American Hebrew poet, delivered an eulogy at the grave.

Mrs. Grabelsky was the wife of B. Grabelsky, prominent American Zionist leader.

Canada Citizenship Rules Affect Jewish Applicants

MONTREAL, June 26—The so-called Communist menace has brought instructions from the Canadian Secretary of State, Hon. C. H. Cahan, to all judges to exercise unusual care in the granting of naturalization papers.

"The large number of applications require at the present time greater carefulness and closer scrutiny than in ordinary times. There are undoubtedly Communist, Bolshevik and other illegal agitations being carried on in various parts of Canada, and many propagandists of these ideas apply for naturalization, in order to camouflage their propaganda and also to preclude any proceedings for deportation," states his communication to the judicial officers.

This order has had its repercussions in the local court where 63 foreign-born residents, mostly Jews, made application for citizenship and each one was asked the question whether he was a Bolshevik or was communistically inclined.

Church Studies Plight

Of Baptized Jews

BERLIN, June 26—The Protestant Church of Germany, under its new Nazi leadership, will study the question raised as to the position of the baptized Jews in relation to the general discriminatory laws against the Jews. Hitherto, conversion has not exempted Germans of Jewish descent from the laws. The new Nazi religious leaders announced that Pastor Muller, the leader of the "German Christians," Nazi church group, is investigating the situation.

Sir Lewis Cohen Dead

ADELAIDE, Australia, June 26—Sir Lewis Cohen, nine-times mayor and lord mayor of this city, died here suddenly at the age of 84. He was a native of Liverpool, England, and was educated at Jewish College, Edmonton. He was a member of Parliament for North Adelaide from 1887-1893 and for Adelaide, from 1902-1906. He was prominent in Jewish communal life and was knighted in 1924.

World Zionist Congress Problems Analyzed at Sons of Zion Assembly

LONG BRANCH, N. J., June 26—Problems facing the approaching world Zionist congress are substantially twofold; first, to secure greater co-operation on the part of the mandatory powers in execution of the terms of the mandate so that the Jewish national home may really be made available to those Jews who have to flee their own homes at this tragic moment; and, second, to discover how Jews throughout the world can speed up and enlarge the work of building up Palestine, through the Jewish Agency.

This was the opinion of Captain Abraham Tulin, member of the administrative committee of the Zionist organization of America, in an address delivered last night at a banquet climaxing the convention of the Order of the Sons of Zion.

Captain Tulin asserted that the solution of both problems will depend largely on the executives which the congress will select in both the economic and political fields.

"It is obvious from the nature of the problem," he said, "that the new executive must be profoundly in sympathy with the objectives to be accomplished and must have the necessary skill to put the plan into execution."

Grand Master Isaac Allen was toastmaster at the dinner. Other speakers included Sidney Matz, on "The Citrus Industry in Palestine"; and Joseph Hestrin, of Poale Zion, who eulogized Dr. Chaim Arlosoroff. A memorial prayer was chanted for the slain leader by Cantor Walitzky, of New York.

In a resolution deploring Hitler's attacks on the Jews the convention by a rising vote went unanimously on record as "joining in the movement to boycott all German goods, manufactures, shipping and travel facilities." Every member was urged to carry out the resolution to the fullest extent of his ability. The order pledged fullest support to the American League for the Defense of Jewish Rights, which is conducting the anti-German boycott in the nation. Dr. Coranik came here yesterday specially to speak in favor of the resolution.

The convention was also addressed by Rabbi Meyer Berlin, of the World Mizrahi.

Greetings to the delegates were sent by Young Israel, New York Talmud Torah Teachers and Brith Trumpeldor.

More than 250 delegates and visitors from six states were present at yesterday's sessions of the convention.

Jews Moving Businesses Are Traitors, Say Nazis

BERLIN, June 26—Jews moving their businesses abroad are guilty of high treason because they are increasing unemployment in Germany and are stimulating foreign competition, it was declared at the German Industrial and Commercial Conference. Stricter control by the Government of the transfer of money abroad and the refusal to issue exit visas to specialists in order not to diminish the quality of German industry, were demanded by the conference.

DELAY WORLD CONGRESS UNTIL AMERICAN JEWRY IS UNIFIED, CONFERENCE OF RABBIS URGED

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Joseph L. Baron, of Milwaukee, demanded drastic changes and the inclusion of a prayer service that would eliminate the old, traditional concepts of God and all references to the Jews as a chosen people, an idea that Rabbi Baron branded as "immoral."

"The old theology and ritual is not being accepted by thousands and must be modernized to draw into the fold those who now shun it," Rabbi Baron declared.

Other rabbis heatedly opposed the humanist proposal, some declaring that such a thing would do violence to the historical evolution of Judaism. They argued that such a revision would open the way to special services for persons in congregations who are Ethical Culturists, Christian Scientists, agnostics or atheists.

A decision on the question was delayed to a later session. The clash arose on the presentation of a report of the Liturgical Literature Committee by Rabbi Solomon B. Freehof, of Chicago. This committee proposed to provide several alternative services, all based on traditional religious conceptions. It also suggested the publication of an anthology of prayers in prose and verse written by rabbis.

In presenting the report of the Committee on Contemporaneous History and Literature, Rabbi Jacob R. Marcus, of the Hebrew Union College, Cincinnati, surveyed the situation of Jews in the world and pointed out that the problem of the Jew in Germany, while overshadowing everything else in Jewish life, tends to make us forget that conditions are by no means satisfactory in other lands.

"Anti-Semitism is rife in Poland, Roumania, Austria and Hungary," he declared.

After engaging in its most heated argument the conference went on record in favor of recognition of Soviet Russia at its final general session last night. For an hour the rabbis debated fiercely on whether such a stand would further injure Jews here and in Germany and whether it would give anti-Semitic agitators a chance to call all Jews Bolsheviks.

In the end, the conference adopted a resolution by a 3 to 2 majority asserting that "in consonance with the expressed opinion of representative Americans, we believe continued non-recognition of the Soviet

Union by the United States constitutes a great barrier to the improvement of international relations. We join in the sentiment to end this uncertain relationship."

Opposition to the resolution was led by Rabbi George Fox, of Chicago, who pointed out that "with the present resurgence of anti-Semitism it is dangerous to give additional weapons to those who accuse us of being Communists."

Rabbi Samuel H. Goldenson, newly-elected president of the conference, warned "that such a resolution may make the lot of German Jews harder."

The conference also adopted a series of other resolutions, as follows:

1—That the conference deplores the disabilities to which the religious agencies of the Catholic Church have been subjected in various lands.

2—That President Roosevelt be supported in any far-visions social program to aid the masses, but that legislation be included for effective governmental management of production and distribution, that definite labor representation in management of industry be provided for, and that a proper social control of the present profit system be put into effect.

3—That President Roosevelt be thanked for his sympathetic attitude toward the suffering of the Jews in Germany, and that he be urged, as well as his delegates to the economic and disarmament conferences, to maintain that a return of freedom and equality for all German citizens would be the surest basis for confidence in the peace ideals of the German government.

4—That endorsement and cooperation be given to the efforts made toward unity in American Israel to meet the present emergency arising out of the German situation.

5—That support be given to the Joint Distribution Committee in its efforts to gather funds for the preservation of German Jewry and to the Jewish Agency in its appeal for funds to promote the settlement of German Jews in Palestine.

6—That the conference favor United States adherence to the World Court.

7—That private manufacture of war materials be opposed and that legislation be passed to abolish such practices.

8—That members ask their communities to aid a movement to strengthen the Hebrew Union College so that it may make room for expelled German-Jewish students and scholars.

9—That the conference cooperate

with the anti-defamation committee of B'nai B'rith against anti-Semitic propaganda.

10—That a joint convention be negotiated for next year with the National Council of Jewish Education.

A new slate of officers was elected by the delegates. These include honorary president, Rabbis David Philipson, of Cincinnati; Samuel Schulman, of New York, and Joseph Stolz, of Chicago; president, Samuel H. Goldenson, of Pittsburgh; vice-president, Felix A. Levy, of Chicago; treasurer, Harry S. Margolis, of St. Paul, and recording secretary, Isaac H. Marcuson, of Macon, Ga.

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
