## Anti-Jewish Discrimination In Roumania Reported by Hitler Paper in Berlin (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

BERLIN, Aug. 15.—The Bucharest correspondent of the Voelkischer Beobachter, in a despatch today insists that despite denials "issued under Jewish influence," anti-Semitism is growing in Roumania. The Government realizes this, the correspondent asserts, but is making efforts to avoid public conflict on this score.

A secret circular which Premier Vaida-Voivod allegedly sent out to all bankers in Roumania, advising them to bear in mind when engaging new employees whom the majority of the population of the country consists of, since it had been repeatedly complained of that bankers were deliberately choosing for their staffs "members of one particular ethnological minority," is quoted by the paper.

This cannot continue, the circular is quoted by the paper as stating, without endangering interests of the State. The paper asserts that despite the careful wording of the circular, there is no doubt as to whom is meant by "ethnological minority."

The paper ridicules the decision of the Palestine Government to ad-

## Roumanian Official Denies Anti-Semitic Numerus Clausus Plan (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

BUCHAREST Aug. 15.—The Nazi insistence that anti-Semitism in Roumania is growing by leaps and bounds as instanced by the introduction of a numerus clausus in the universities of Roumania was flatly denied here by Undersecretary of the Ministry of Education Pandrei, today.

In an interview with the press he stated that there was no intention of discriminating against the Jews. He insisted that Premier Vaida-Voivod, in view of the shortage of space in the university laboratories was limit-

## Refusal to Grant Visa To Jabotinsky Stirs Zionist Congress Circles (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

PRAGUE, Aug. 15.—The refusal of the Czechoslovakian Government to grant a visa to Vladimir Jabotinsky, noted Revisionist leader, created a sensation among the numerous guests and delegates gathered here on the eve of the 18th World Zionist Congress and is one of the chief topics of discussion.

The Revisionist delegates are to visit the Czechoslovakian Foreign Office tomorrow, in the hope of obtaining a visa for Mr. Jabotinsky.

In Congress Bureau circles it is explained that the visa would never have been refused if Jabotinsky had made his application through the Congress Bureau, the course fol-

## Expect World Congress To Be Held in December (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

PRAGUE, Aug. 15.—The executive committee of the Jewish world congress concluded its deliberations here after sessions of several days with plans for a determined fight against Nazi Germany and proposals for dealing with the German-Jewish situation for submission to the League of Nations.

The committee will meet again immediately after the World Zionist Congress to decide the manner of boycotting German goods and how to make the boycott effective throughout the world. The committee also fixed the agenda for the Geneva conference in September.

It was stated that sixty newspaper correspondents representing European and American newspapers had already applied for cards of admission to the deliberations at which 120 delegates will meet.

The Geneva conference, it is expected, will call the world congress for December in view of the urgency of the German situation and the need for immediate action.

## Laborites Demand Voice In Actions Committee in Proportion to Strength (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

PRAGUE, Aug. 15.—Asserting that the Actions Committee of the World Zionist Organization, as at present constituted in proportion to party strength manifested at the seventeenth world Congress, no longer represents the membership of the Zionist Organization as expressed by the voting this year for delegates to the eighteenth Congress which opens on August 21, the delegates of the Zionist labor groups today, in a prelude to their assumption of the dominant role in the Congress, demanded that the Actions Committee invite representatives of the Labor Party as ex officio members, in order to give the party proper voice in the committee's activities.

The Laborites want to be represented when the Actions Committee votes approval or disapproval of the acts of the retiring executive and also when it is deciding other political questions.

## Cut in Revisionist Number

In addition, they made the demand that the Grossman Democratic Revisionists, now having seven members on the committee, have their

## WIZO Ends Conference, Demands Palestine Entry For German-Jewish Youth (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia, Aug. 15.—The Conference of the Women's International Zionist Organization closed here today after adopting resolutions demanding the emigration of German Jewish youth to Palestine. The conference also demanded a greater middle class immigration, more certificates for girls and equal rights for all women.

A budget for the next two years totaling 47,000 pounds including the National Fund quota was adopted by the Zionist Women, for all work in Palestine.

During the debate on the resolu-

### Anonymous Appeal Calls On Brazilians to Create A Fascist Fatherland

(J.F.A. Special Correspondent)  
RIO DE JANEIRO, Aug. 3.—A  
"group of journalists and people of  
liberal professions" have addressed  
an appeal to all intellectuals in this  
country, asking for aid in establishing  
a fascist state in Brazil. The  
appeal reads in part:

"The nation is slowly dying out,  
divided as it is into as many father-  
lands, each organized to protect its  
own interests, as there are groups in  
the country. We must be concerned  
with Brazil as a whole. We must  
create a Brazil for Brazilians, fight-  
ing for the introduction of a fascist  
regime among us . . . We want a  
disciplined, energetic and morally  
cleaned nation and a prolific father-  
land."

The call, which was sent to all in-  
tellectuals of Brazil, is signed by  
"Brazil Social Action". There are  
no other signatures on it, and it is  
therefore impossible to determine its  
source. It is evident, however, that  
it originated among the local Hitler-  
ites and their Brazilian exponent,  
the Integralist party, which is very  
insignificant and has not been heard  
from for some time. The most in-  
fluential newspapers made no men-  
tion of the appeal, but the local Hit-  
lerite paper grabbed at "the awaken-  
ing to consciousness of the Brazilian  
masses". Nor did it spare the Jews,  
who "came to Brazil to rob the poor  
Brazilians".

In the Jewish colonies of the country  
the appeal created a great deal of

### Nazi Reign of Terror Described by Reichert

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 15.—  
News stories reaching America of  
the atrocities and barbarities in Ger-  
many are only tiny segments of the  
whole tragic story, according to  
Rabbi F. R. Reichert of Temple  
Emanuel, who has just returned  
from an official visit to the land  
dominated by Hitlerism.

Rabbi Reichert so reported at a  
special meeting of his congregation  
called to hear his first-hand account  
of conditions in Germany as he  
found them.

He said that the Jewish people of  
Germany welcomed him — the  
second American Jew to visit that  
country — as the American ambas-  
sador of Israel.

"There is a veritable reign of ter-  
ror," he said, "for those not mem-  
bers of the National Socialist party,  
for at any time their homes may be  
raided, their property confiscated,  
their bodies imprisoned."

"Suspects are shadowed, tele-  
phones are tapped, letters are opened  
and cabbages decoded by a coun-  
try under severe censorship."

Judge M. C. Stone presided at the  
meeting.

### American Jewish Congress To Consider Boycott Action

When asked to comment on the  
speech made by Rabbi Stephen S.  
Wise in which he came out openly  
for the boycott of Germany, Ber-  
nard S. Deutsch, president of the  
American Jewish Congress, said:  
"The American Jewish Congress will  
consider the whole question of the  
boycott at the meeting of the ad-  
ministrative committee to be held on  
the 17th of this month and at the  
meeting of the national executive  
committee of the Congress which  
will take place on the 21st of the  
month."

"I have been in conference with  
Mr. Samuel Untermyer and while  
the subject of the boycott was  
thoroughly discussed, I did not  
consider the American Jewish Con-  
gress in any way. True I have my  
own personal viewpoint, but my own  
viewpoint is not to be confused with  
that of the Congress. The whole  
subject will be settled at the two  
Congress meetings."

### Portuguese Jewish Paper Projected in Sao Paulo

SAO PAULO, Brazil, Aug. 3.—A  
Jewish newspaper in Portuguese has  
been projected here by a group lead-  
ed by Presidential, Albery and

The newspaper is expected to link  
the local Jewish community with the  
outside world and to unite the  
Ashkenazim and the Sephardim on  
all movements which concern world  
Jewry, and in particular, the Ger-  
man Jews. The publication group  
are known for their knowledge of  
Portuguese, and are leaders among  
the Jewish students in various  
faculties in Brazil.

The first issue is planned to ap-  
pear towards the end of August.  
Prominent Brazilian journalists and  
intellectuals will be among the con-  
tributors.

### Brown Shirt Disorders in Poland

WARSAW, Aug. 15.—A meeting  
of the Polish Brown Shirts held in  
Bendzin, near Polish Upper Silesia  
was closed down by orders from  
the government. The participants  
in the meeting began to molest  
Jews in the streets of the town but  
were quickly dispersed by the police.

### Romanian Named as Riot Investigator Seeks Damages From Jewish Accusers

**BUCHAREST, Aug. 15**—Damages of a million lei from a group of Jewish Deputies and Jewish Senators was asked by Professor Corneliu Samuleanu, of Jassy University, because he was named as the investigator of the recent anti-Jewish excesses at Jassy University, in a memorandum submitted by the Jewish deputies to the government.

When Professor Samuleanu was notified of the complaint, he lodged a counter claim for damages. The trial which is to take place on October 24 is awaited with great interest here since some of the most important Jewish leaders in Rumania are involved.

Deputies Meyer Elser, Michael Landau and Joseph Fischer and Senators Nisenzon, Max Amschelski and Ziselshtein are among the group from whom Professor Samuleanu seeks damages.

### Protest Resolution Alloys Tension as German Day Is Held at Syracuse

**SYRACUSE, Aug. 15**—Members of many German societies in the state of New York gathered here for the first time in 17 years to celebrate German Day. This is the first time since the World War that an attempt was made here to revive German Day. The ceremonies opened with a parade through Syracuse streets. The American flag predominated, but the old German imperial colors were also in evidence.

The main speaker of the day was Colonel Edwin Emerson, president of the Friends of Germany. Emerson had promised previously that his speech would be entirely non-political.

During the speech, leaders denouncing Emerson as a friend of Hitlerism were distributed through the crowd. The leaders bore the signatures of the National Committee to Aid Victims of German Fascism. Colonel Emerson attacked the leaders vigorously and denied that his organization is pro-Hitlerite. He claimed that his aim was to cultivate friendly relations between the peoples of the United States and Germany.

Emerson's presence here brought some tension among the Jews of Syracuse, but this feeling was rapidly dissipated after the German societies adopted resolutions against the Hitlerite persecution tactics.

### Zionist Congress Agenda Announced in London

(J.T.A. Special Correspondence)

**LONDON, Aug. 8**—The Zionist solution of the Jewish question in Germany and the settlement of German Jews in Palestine will be featured in the fourth session of the Eighteenth World Zionist Congress which opens in Prague on August 21, according to the agenda of the Congress made public here today by the World Zionist Organization central office.

The Congress will be formally opened Monday evening, August 21 with formal welcoming speeches and a memorial address in honor of Dr. Chaim Arlosoroff. The remainder of the agenda follows.

Second session, Tuesday morning: Election of the Congress president, report of the congress court on the election of delegates, address on the position of the Jews in the world.

Third session, Tuesday afternoon: Addresses on the Zionist Organization and its problems, problems of agricultural colonization of Palestine, problems of urban colonization with special reference to the Jewish middle-class, and problems and prospects of Palestine's economic situation.

Fourth session, Tuesday evening: Addresses on the Zionist solution of the Jewish question in Germany and on the settlement of German Jews in Germany.

Fifth session, Wednesday morning: Reports on the Keren Kayemet Le Israel, the Keren Hayesod and problems of national capital in Palestine. Election of Congress commissions.

Sixth session Wednesday afternoon through sixth session Friday morning: General debate, meeting of commissions.

Tenth session, Friday afternoon: conclusion of general debate.

Eleventh session, Sunday morning: Memorial address, address on Hebrew culture in Palestine, debate, meeting of commissions.

Twelfth session, Monday Afternoon: Reports of commissions, voting.

Thirteenth session, Tuesday morning: Reports and voting.

Fourteenth session, Tuesday Afternoon: Reports and voting, elections, Congress adjournment.

The third ordinary meeting of the Jewish Agency for Palestine will open August 21 and conclude September 1.

### Coalition Executive For Zionist Organization Is Urged by Mirachi

**KRAKAU, Poland, Aug. 15**—After an all night session, the World Mirachi Conference closed its sittings. A new leadership was chosen. The newly elected leaders of the orthodox Zionists of the world are El Farstein, Rabbi Meyer Berlin, Rabbi Wolf Gold, Rabbi Fishman, Schlechterman and Gershowski.

The Vaad Haraachi (Supreme Council) is to consist of 71 members. The new council is to have 46 Mirachi members and 25 members of the Torah Vavoda (Orthodox Labor Zionists).

At the closing session of the Orthodox Zionist Organization, resolutions were adopted demanding a coalition Zionist Executive, in which Hachad Farstein would hold the portfolio of immigration. The conference also demanded that the Jewish Agency be reorganized.

### French-Conservatives Pledge to Fight Against Open Door for Canada

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

**MONTREAL, Aug. 15**—That the French-Conservative members of Quebec in the Federal Parliament would always oppose the resumption of an open-door policy in matters of immigration, was promised by many speakers at a large rally of Conservatives held in the province. This promise may have been made as a means of easing the anxiety caused among immigrant-haters by the recent declaration of the Attorney-General of Ontario, Hon. William Price, that Canada is ready to receive another 100,000 immigrants and he hopes to see in the Dominion a population of twenty-five million within the next generation.

Le Devoir and other French-Canadian publications are carrying on an intensive campaign against the possibility of admitting a number of German-Jewish refugees into Canada. Now and again they flash scare headlines about the Dominion being in danger of a refugee flood, and have even hinted that Sir Herbert Samuel's visit to Canada was made with the purpose of obtaining concessions for German-Jewish refugees from the Canadian Government.

Brennet, an one who has redeemed his pledges, one of the speakers at the conference, Osmund Capton, stated that from the very days of his advent to power, Premier Bennett has shown his determination to keep his word when he shut the door of Canada to foreign immigration, and the speaker said, he could promise for his French colleagues of the Province that they would oppose any opening of this door whatever the political consequences of such an attitude.

This anti-immigration line and cry is being raised in the face of an incessant drop in the number of new arrivals to the Canadian shores. During the month of June immigration into Canada totaled 1,424 arrivals, a decrease of 44.6 percent from the same month a year ago, when the figure was 2,592. The countries of Central and Southern Europe sent 236 immigrants during that month.

It is however understood that Jabotinsky not only did not wish for the Bureau's assistance, but rejected intervention by anyone save the Revisionists.

## May Arrive Friday

The representations to be made by the Revisionists, it is expected, will enable Jabotinsky to arrive in Prague on Friday.

For the first time, Germany, like Soviet Russia, will not be represented at the World Zionist Congress. It was officially stated today that the German delegates would not participate in the Congress. Even Zionist officials who are German citizens are leaving Prague before the opening of the Congress, fearing that any participation in the Congress activities will involve persecution by the Nazis. It was learned that many letters have been sent to the Congress asking that the Congress abstain from any anti-German attacks.
