Untermyer, Rabbi Silver Denounce Deals Reported Negotiated With Germany

Cable Zionist Congress at Prague
Denouncing Their Repudiation and
Call to "Bankruptcy" Purchase

Protest against the reported deal between Germany and Palestine whereby ten million marks in Palestine oranges would be sold in Germany and twice that amount of German goods sold in Palestine was made here yesterday by American Jewish leaders.

Cablegrams denouncing the reported agreement were sent to the Eighteenth World Zionist Congress at Prague by Samuel Untermyer, president of the World Jewish Economic Federation, and by Rabbi Abba Hillel Silver, of Cleveland, the Jewish Telegraphic Agency reported.

Mr. Untermyer demanded a comprehensive denial of the report from Zionist leaders threatening that unless this is forthcoming, a convention will immediately be called here, repudiating the action and demanding the withdrawal of the American delegates from the Congress.

No Dealings With Germany

Characterizing the report as "probably untrue" and "manifestly spread to injure the boycott that is daily growing more formidable" Mr. Untermyer warned that "world Jewry will tolerate no dealings with Germany and will denounce any body that dares them to sell our brightest for a mere pot of postage. We are loyal Palestinians," the cable stated, "but the outcome of this

Sir Philip Magnus Dead; Scientist, Communist Leader

LONDON, Aug. 25.—Sir Philip Magnus, educator, mathematician and scientist, died here today at the age of 71. One of the most prominent figures in Jewish communal life in England for many years, he was widely known for his activities in many varied fields of endeavor. He was created a knight in 1925 and a baronet in 1927 in recognition of his many public services. He retired from the House of Commons in

WISE ATTACKS LABORITES, WEIZMANN, URGES ZIONIST CONGRESS TO ELECT LEADERS WHO WILL CARRY ON FIGHT FOR JEWISH STATE

Weizmann Rejects Presidential Offer When Conditions Are Turned
Down—N. Y. Rabbi Denounces Jewish Agency Deal, Calls for
a Palestine Uniting, Not Dividing, World Jewry

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

PRAGUE, Aug. 25.—Dr. Stephen S. Wise of New York, addressing today's session of the Eighteenth World Zionist Congress, launched a sharp attack on Dr. Chaim Weizmann, former president of the World Zionist Organization, and on the policies of the Zionist Laborite party. Cheers and exclamations from the Laborite section frequently interrupted Dr. Wise as he appealed to the congress to elect only such leaders to the organization's administration as do not oppose the idea of a Jewish state in Palestine and support the demand for a Jewish majority on both sides of the Jordan River.

Dr. Weizmann, who, it was reported, would arrive here today from the resort where he has been resting for the last few days, has definitely declined to accept the presidency of the organization and will not visit the congress, it was reliably learned today. Although

his election to the presidency seemed assured on the basis of his Laborite support and other Weizmann strength among the General Zionists, Dr. Weizmann yesterday declined the presidency although agreeing to head the campaign for funds to settle German Jews in Palestine.

In his speech before the congress this morning, Rabbi Wise declared himself bewildered by Dr. Weizmann's criticism of constructive negotiations for the opening of Transjordan to Jewish settlement, especially as voiced by Dr. Weizmann in his speeches at the American Zionist convention in Chicago in July. The negotiations have been conducted by members of the Palestine Executive of the Jewish Agency with friendly Transjordan Arab leaders.

Calls Agency Dead

Referring to the Jewish Agency, Rabbi Wise declared that it was "dead." He urged the congress to "stand wisely but firmly with this organization which has added honor to and has taken much from the strength and integrity of the Zionist movement."

Turning his gaze on the Laborites, the American Zionist leader accused them of trying to translate Palestine into "Utopia." He declared that they should not attempt to postpone settlement of Jews in Palestine "for the sake of this possible Utopia," and should not seek to limit the admission into Palestine of those who are not associated with the ideals of the Laborite movement.

Speaking in behalf of the General Zionists (centerists), Dr. Wise urged a policy of arbitration in Palestine to bring to an end the labor disputes which have been a principal cause of dissension in Zionist ranks and are the basis of the animosity existing between the Laborites and the Rightists, the extreme right-wing Zionists.

"Palestine must not divide the

The Austrian chancellor received Lord Melchett after a storm of press criticism which followed his avoidance of a pre-arranged interview with Lord Melchett yesterday because of the chancellor's policy of not receiving Jews in audience. Lord Melchett had proceeded to Vienna to keep the appointment yesterday, leaving Prague where he had witnessed the Jewish sports festival of the world Maccabee organization, of which he is honorary president, and had greeted the Eighteenth World Zionist Congress now in session there.

1922 after sixteen years of service as a Conservative member.

He was the author of many papers on mathematics, problems of physics and education and was joint editor of the London Science Class-books. Among his Jewish communal activities, he served as president of the West London Synagogue of British Jews and vice-president of the Joint Foreign Committee, a representative Jewish body. He was a fellow of the University of London senate, vice-president of the Royal Society of Arts and president of the College of Preceptors.

His son, Lewis Magnus, editor of the Jewish Standard and a noted publicist, died last spring. His grandson, Philip Messinger Magnus, succeeds to the baronetcy.

Phoenix Rabbi Speaks At Cathedral Services

Jews last unite them," he declared. "The Zionist Organization," he continued, "cannot permit or sanction a monopoly of the labor organizations nor monopolization of immigration certificates."

Executive Could Say "No"

Rabbi Wise highly praised the Palestine executive for its activities during the past two years, and said it, "with dignity, replied 'No' to the Mandatory Power whenever this 'No' was to be said. "From the beginning," he declared, "the executive bravely challenged, contested and sought to avoid the French Report." (The report of Louis French, director of development in the Palestine Administration, which declared that no state laws were available for Jewish settlement and asserted that Jewish colonization was responsible for the "displacement" of Arabs from the land.)

"Regarding the intolerable and unjust income tax proposals, the executive vigorously and convincingly said, 'No.' Regarding the legislative council, which amounts to abrogation or annulment of the Balfour Declaration, the executive had the courage to say, 'No,'" he continued.

"We demand that the new executive should also say 'no' in the proposed land ordinance which we consider a very mean act of the Mandatory Power," he stated.

Prize for Mr. Neumann

Dr. Wise freely praised Emanuel Neumann, American member of the executive, and the late Dr. Chaim Aelcoroff, for their conduct of negotiations leading to the opening of the spacious Transjordan area to Jewish effort. He concluded his speech with criticism of Dr. Weizmann for his policy of parity between the Jews and Arabs in Palestine.

The three-million mark agreement made with Germany for export of Jewish capital from Germany to Palestine in the form of German goods, came up in the congress again today when Meir Grossman, head of the Jewish State Party, formerly the Democratic Revisionists, in an interpellation, asked why the Zionist Organization's executive had not yet submitted its promised explanation of the agreement.

Grossman, in sessions last week, vigorously denounced the agreement as being a blow at the worldwide anti-Nazi boycott and announcement of the deal has provoked a storm of criticism everywhere.

Burt Locker, Laborite member of the executive, replied that at the

Saturday evening session of the congress he had established that the negotiations leading to the agreement had not been carried on in the name of the Zionist executive nor with the executive body's authorization. Further details, he said, would be reported to the political committee which will decide whether or not to bring them up before the fall congress.

Demand Approved

Grossman further asked whether the Anglo-Palestine bank, named as the clearing agency in the agreement, in part of the Jewish Colonial Trust Company, and whether the executive exercises any control over it.

Grossman's demand that the report to the political committee be made today so that it can be brought up before the congress tomorrow was approved by the congress.

The congress closed, after a session lasting almost the entire night, voted a resolution to M. Berolin, editor of the Revisionist magazine, Rasviet, which is published in Russian in Paris. The magazine was accused by the Histadruth, Zionist labor federation in Palestine, of stating that the Histadruth had given the police names of Revisionist workers illegally in Palestine, in order to have them deported.

Weizmann's Conditions

The reported insistence of Dr. Chaim Weizmann, former president of the World Zionist Organization, that he be empowered to name the executive body of the organization and that the present structure of the Jewish Agency for Palestine be maintained, confronted the Eighteenth Zionist Congress last night as it gave thought to the question of leadership of the Zionist movement during the next two years.

Long distance telephone negotiations were conducted with Dr. Weizmann throughout the day, with the view of inducing him to accept the presidency of the organization. The Jewish Telegraphic Agency learned reliably that while declining the presidency, Dr. Weizmann declared his readiness to lead the campaign for funds to settle German Jews in Palestine.

Dr. Weizmann has not been present at the congress, but has been resting at Zorvik, a resort several hours distant from here. A delegation composed of David Ben-Gurion and Dr. Josef Sprinzak, representing the Laborite Party, the largest faction in the congress, returned here last night after unsuccessfully nego-

Salonica's New Chief Rabbi Fronchas Inaugured Service In Presence of Officialdom

SALONICA, Greece, Aug. 21 — Dr. Zvi Hirsch Koretz, the new chief rabbi of Salonica, preached his first sermon since the assumption of his new duties this morning before the Governor-General, M. Hludka, and the director of the Department of the Interior, M. Lazaridis. A delegation representing the Salonica communal council also was present at the ceremony.

Speaking in Greek, Dr. Koretz thanked the Greek Government for ratifying his election and for "accepting me as a son of the Greek people. I shall fulfill my duties," he pledged, "in conformity with the laws of the republic, as a faithful citizen of my new and beloved country."

The Governor-General, in reply, promised the new chief rabbi the cooperation and assistance of the Greek Government.

Detroit Rabbi Suggests Plan to Aid German Jews

DETROIT, Aug. 21—Rabbi A. M. Hershman of Congregation Shaare Zedek, who recently returned from a three months' stay in Palestine, proposed a four point plan for the rescue of the German Jews based on his experience in Palestine.

Dr. Hershman declared that it was necessary to help the German Jews financially, to take as many as possible out of Germany and settle them in Palestine, induce President Roosevelt to intervene on their behalf with the German government and also to carry out an unofficial boycott against Germany.

Yonkers Jewish Leader Named Aid to Van Schaick

People Heart Commander J.D.B. Special Correspondent

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 21—Dr. Brandon Borastin, Los Angeles attorney, was installed as Commander of the Purple Heart Association, Post 2, on August 17. This organization is composed exclusively of wounded and decorated ex-soldiers, who saw active service in the world war.

Palestine Laborites Meet To Protest Immigration Ban

JERUSALEM, Aug. 21—Mass meetings, called by the Jewish labor councils, were held Sunday in this city, Tel Aviv and Haifa to protest against the restriction of Jewish immigration "during this period of Palestine prosperity when there is a large demand for Jewish workers."

Resolutions to this effect were adopted as well as other protests against the Government attitude toward tourists. Resolutions urging the Eighteenth World Zionist Congress, now meeting at Prague, to make the subject of Jewish immigration in Palestine its chief activity were also adopted and dispatched to the Congress.

Rosinsky Gives Eulogy At Levine Funeral Services

Funeral services for Judge Max S. Levine of the Court of General Sessions, who died Sunday night, took place yesterday afternoon from the Shaare Zedek Congregation. Rabbi Herbert S. Goldstein and Elias Solomon officiated. Judge Otto A. Rosinsky delivered the eulogy. Interment was in the Mount Lebanon Cemetery.

Judge Levine was sick for several months following a serious operation. At his bedside when he died were his wife and his two daughters. Judge Levine was active in the political life of New York City for many years. He was one of the leaders of the Tammany organization and had been on the bench since 1919. He had been a judge in the General Sessions Court since 1927 when he received his first appointment from former Governor Smith.

The Judge was active in fraternal organizations and was closely associated with Jewish philanthropic endeavors. He was 52 years old.

Returned Rabbi Describes Flight of Jews in Germany

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Aug. 21—Rabbi Julian Mark of the Vias Street Temple, who returned recently from Germany, declared that the two weeks he spent in Germany this summer were the "unhappiest of my life."

Rabbi Mark declared that the sight of the Jews was very sad and that German Jews felt that they were in a "trap." He described the dramatic scene that occurred when Sherwood Eddy, noted American liberal, dared to criticize the Nazis in a speech delivered in Berlin, on which occasion Rabbi Mark was present.

Canadian Groups Demand Doors Be Double-Locked to Bar Refugee Immigration

OTTAWA, Ont., Aug. 21—Commenting on the receipt by the federal government immigration department of resolutions from a number of Quebec municipalities against permission for the immigration of German Jewish refugees to Canada, a spokesman for the department declared tonight there would be no change in the present restrictive immigration policy of the government.

A campaign to build up public sentiment against the admission of refugees from the Hitler regime is being vigorously waged throughout the province of Quebec and was dismissed Saturday by passage of a resolution to this effect by the council of the city of Quebec.

Anti-Semitic newspapers in the province, especially in Montreal, have been featuring stories regarding a purported wholesale invasion of Canada by Jewish refugees from Germany. When Sir Herbert Samuel arrived at Montreal at the head of the British delegation to the conference of the Institute of Pacific Relations at Basel, the anti-Semitic press sensationally featured his arrival as that of a Jewish emissary attempting to force Canada to open her doors to the refugees.

The statement tonight, it is believed, was aimed to allay fears aroused by anti-Semitic propagandists that the federal government was planning to change its immigration policy.

N.Y.U. Exam Dates Not To Be on High Holidays

As a result of the intervention of Rabbi Solomon Eidelman and Louis Fedusky, the date of examinations of New York University students has been changed so as not to conflict with the Jewish High Holidays.

In a letter to the Rabbis, Charles F. Barry, director of the summer term, declared that the date for the examinations which had been set through a misunderstanding had been changed and that the University would always respect the religious obligations of the students. New York University has several thousand Jewish students.

European Stage Director Here to Aid Miss Goldstein

David Herman, famous European stage director, arrived Tuesday on the French liner Paris. He has come at the invitation of Jennie Goldstein, owner of the Prospect Theatre, Bronx, to direct a Classic play of Chaim Lieberman, "The Neider," which is to open the season at the theatre.

struggle is vastly more important than selling oranges."

In an interview with the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, Rabbi Silver denounced both the reported deal between the Palestinian orange growers and Germany and the three-million mark deal announced by Dr. Arthur Ruppin to the Zionist Congress, by which German Zionists would have been allowed to take that much capital out of Germany in the form of an equivalent amount in German goods.

"If the reports of those two deals are correct," said Rabbi Silver, "and I for one find them unthinkable and inconceivable, then every Jew who goes to Palestine becomes an importer of German goods into Palestine, and this at a time when we deny Jewry of the rest of the world the right to trade with Germany."

"Why, the very idea of Palestinian Jewry negotiating with Hitler about business instead of demanding justice for the persecuted Jews of Germany is unthinkable."

"One might think that the whole affair was a bankruptcy sale and that the Jews of Palestine were endeavoring to salvage a few shrapnels for themselves."

"Palestinian Jewry should be showing the way to unified action and not be willing to victimize the Jews of the rest of the world for a million crates of oranges."

"This is a test case," said Rabbi Silver. "Always Palestine has asked the Jews of the world to sacrifice for Palestine, now the time has come to ask, will Palestine make a commercial sacrifice for the interests of the 15 million Jews of the world?"

"We say to the Palestinian Jews, we won't trade with the enemy and we won't permit the Jews of Palestine to trade with the enemy."

fighting with Dr. Weizmann over acceptance of the presidency.

Dr. Weizmann's reported insistence on the authority to determine the composition of the executive was not made to the Laborite representatives, it was learned. In discussions regarding the Jewish Agency for Palestine, he was quoted as expressing his belief that there should be no drastic reforms but that any changes in the structure of the Agency should be on the basis of friendly negotiations with the non-Zionist members of the Agency.

Hit at Non-Zionists

The Agency, which is composed of fifty percent Zionists and fifty percent non-Zionists, among whom are Felix M. Warburg, Rabbi Samuel Schulman, of New York, and Dr. Cyrus Adler, of Philadelphia, has come under heavy criticism during the present congress. Every faction has voiced demands that the non-Zionist representation on the body, which represents Jewry in negotiations with the League of Nations and with Great Britain, the Palestine mandatory power, should be reduced. It was established in 1929 largely through the efforts of Dr. Weizmann, who is known as the "father of the Jewish Agency," and the late Louis Marshall.

Consideration of leadership of the organization therefore, entered a new phase tonight, as leaders of all factions began negotiations among themselves over the composition of an executive body not built around Dr. Weizmann.

Emmanuel Neumann, American member of the Jewish Agency executive, reporting for the political complexion on the Transjordan situation, tonight recommended consideration of negotiations leading to the opening of the Transjordan area to Jewish colonization, and the appointment of a special committee to continue them.
