Jewish Stores Closed, Thousands More Made Jobless in Germany

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

BERLIN, Sept. 16.—Hundreds of Jewish stores are liquidating their business because they are unable to cover running expenses and thousands of Jewish employees are being thrown on the streets. Unlike the non-Jewish employees, they get no state relief, since they have been expelled from membership in the trade unions. Even such Jewish members of the union, numbering hundreds, who belonged and paid dues in the unions for forty years, have been expelled.

These aged Jewish unemployed, for whom the only recourse is begging, are in addition exposed to additional danger under the projected "parasite law" recommending sterilization of charity-seekers in the same way proposed for mental defectives.

The details of this law are as yet unknown, but today's papers announce that a memorandum to this effect is now in the hands of Heindl Hess, assistant to Adolf Hitler in command of the Nazi Party.

The order issued a few days ago by the Minister of Economics, Kurt Schmeiner, not to discriminate against the Jews in commerce, is of little value, as long as the Nazi party itself continues the discriminations, it is apparent. Since the German government departments are no longer state organs, and the Nazi party has no intention of abandoning specially built up machinery for the restriction of Jewish trade and the expulsion of the Jews from business or even the modification of these activities, such decrees as those of Dr. Schmeiner's, seem destined to be of little effect.

German Milk Dealers Vote To Exclude Jewish Members

DICKSTEIN URGES ROOSEVELT CUT IMMIGRATION RED TAPE TO ADMIT REFUGEES FROM HITLERISM

WASHINGTON, Sept. 16.—Asking for "a wise administration of the immigration laws," Congressman Samuel Dickstein, chairman of the House Immigration Committee, today urged President Roosevelt to modify the Hoover immigration regulations in order to permit the entry "under proper safeguards," of refugees suffering from religious and racial persecution.

The Hoover immigration orders, Congressman Dickstein advised the President, were without the authority of Congress. He said they had

resulted in the separation of thousands of American families. Under the regulations, Congressman Dickstein charged, the United States consuls have become virtual monarchs in immigration matters.

The law itself, he said, contemplated keeping prospective passers out of the country. The admission of German refugees would not be contrary to this end, he declared.

He urged that "religious refugees, scientists, skilled artisans, businessmen and others who would be assets instead of liabilities to America, even during the depression," be admitted to this country.

"Between the Hitler persecutions and our own short-sighted immigration policies, America is losing an opportunity of securing some of the most civilized and cultural influences in the world," Congressman Dickstein declared.

The New York congressman recommended that President Roosevelt "cut the red tape" so that some thousand Jewish children, orphaned by religious and political persecutions, may be brought here for adoption.

Some 75,000 Germans entitled to enter this country under the immigration restrictions, have been denied entry under the Hoover regulations, he asserted. He pointed out that many of these prospective immigrants have families in this country and that the regulations are keeping members of families apart.

Man's Christian Character More Vital Than His Race, Dollfus Tells Pressmen

VIENNA, Sept. 16.—Chancellor Dollfus of Austria declared in an interview with the press here last night "that the Christian character of man is more important than his race. I look upon Austria as one unit. I think we must look to the soul of man and not to his race or nationality."

His statement was made after one of his interviewers had queried him on the Jewish question in Austria.

Polish Jews Responding To Gov't Loan Flotation

WARSAW, Sept. 16.—The attitude of the Polish government toward the Jewish question in Germany is receiving the warm commendation of Polish Jews among whom there is a speedy response to an internal loan floated by the administration.

Jewish organizations and Jewish officials issued an appeal to the Jewish public here today and Polish Jews in foreign lands to support the government loan.

Word received here from Palestine indicates that the Polish-Jewish population there has already pledged its support.

Famous Jews to Represent Holland at League Council

Chicago Daily News Backs Correspondence of Mowrer

(Jewish Daily Bulletin)

CHICAGO, Sept. 16—The Chicago Daily News came out today squarely backing its former German correspondent, Edgar Ansel Mowrer, on charges of alleged misrepresentations in dispatches which were published in The News.

Dr. R. L. Jagger, acting German consul general in Chicago, wrote a protest against the correspondence of Mowrer, who last year was awarded a Pulitzer prize for reporting, declaring in effect that Mowrer's dispatches were "erroneous and contrary to reports received from Germany."

The News' reply praised Mowrer's writing and said that the reporter had "an enviable record for discernment and veracity."

Chicago Jewish Family Group Sends Protest to Hindenburg

CHICAGO, Ill., Sept. 16—Heated objection against the "propaganda of hate which has been spread by a few of the present masters of Germany" is embodied in a letter of protest forwarded today to President Paul von Hindenburg by the Eisenrath Cousins' Club of Chicago, one of the largest Jewish family groups of German descent in America.

Tearing the Nazi anti-Jewish campaign to its "insect to Christians and German patriots," the communication directs attention to the donations of the late Julius Rosenwald which were used to alleviate conditions of German children suffering from post-war conditions.

Armory to Be Site Of Pageant, Starting Next Saturday Night

Announcement is made that the Jewish pageant, "The Romance of a People," will be presented at the 28th Field Artillery Armory, Jiverson Avenue and Kingsbridge Road, beginning Saturday evening, September 23.

The pageant which was scheduled to open at the Polo Grounds Thursday and was postponed on account of the weather, received such widespread support that present plans call for nightly performances lasting possibly all of next week. It is estimated that about 15,000 persons will attend each presentation at the Armory, which is the largest in the world.

The task of removing the enormous stage that was set up at the Polo Grounds for the affair is under way. Workmen under the direction of Peter Clark, stage designer, are taking down the sound amplification apparatus and light equipment which will be transferred to the Armory at once.

Governor Herbert H. Lehman's co-operation made possible the use of the Armory whose National Guard drills have been called off until after the conclusion of the pageant. All tickets purchased for the show will be honored.

Montreal Consumptive Aid Groups in Drive for \$10,000

High Jewish Holidays

Start Sundown Wednesday

The High Jewish Holidays begin this week at Sundown Wednesday with the celebration of Rosh Hashbona, the beginning of the year 5694, according to the Jewish calendar. The holiday will be celebrated in the Jewish homes and in the synagogues.

Among the orthodox Jews, the holiday celebrations continue for two days, among the reformed Jews, only one day.

Yom Kippur, the Day of Atonement, begins at sundown on Friday, Sept. 22, and ends at sundown Saturday. The ten days between are known as the "Ten Days of Penitence."

Jewish Music and Dancing For Benefit of Palestine Funds to Be Staged on Coast

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Sept. 16—A festival of Jewish music and interpretative dancing will be held here on October 14 for the purpose of raising funds to help the German refugees in Palestine. The League for Labor Palestine, of which there are several rapidly growing groups here, have arranged for Benjamin Zernach, well-known Halibush dancer, and his Jewish ballet to repeat part of his "Light of Israel Ballet" with which he delighted thousands at the Hollywood Bowl last summer. Solonor Hefetzky will sing Palestinian songs and Max Hahnowitz will play the piano.

The Los Angeles League for Labor Palestine have pledged themselves to raise money for a well to be sunk in a colony in Palestine, as a memorial to Dr. Chaim Arlossoff, and which colony will be particularly devoted to the rehabilitation of refugees from Germany.

Scroll Consecrated in Indianapolis Synagogue

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Sept. 17—A scroll of the law containing the entire five books of Moses, was consecrated formally this afternoon at the Congregation Shalom Tefila, here.

The dedication of the scroll of the law, the gift of Haiman Barrett, pioneer Indianapolis merchant and leader in Jewish activities, was marked by an inspiring ceremony, the occasion having the spirit of a wedding symbolizing the close association of the scroll of the law to the synagogue.

Rabbi Samuel A. Katz, leader of the congregation, spoke at the consecration ceremonies.

Hebrew Schools of Detroit Back "Education Month"

DETROIT, Mich., Sept. 15—The United Hebrew schools of Detroit will sponsor an "education month" commencing Ninth Heshbonah and continuing through the month of Tishri. This will be the seventh year of the organized drive to enroll pupils for schooling in Hebrew language and letters.

Judge Charles Rubincov, of the Common Pleas Court, who was designated as chairman of education month by Robert R. Maxwell, president of the United Hebrew Schools, issued a statement today urging early registration in the schools and enrollment in large numbers.

Shall Swastika Fly Here "German Day", Issue Exciting Clubs

Whether the Swastika will wave over the German Day celebration here October 29 or whether the Black, White and Red of the Republic alone will float over the celebration together with the American flag, was to be decided over the week-end at meetings of the executive body of the United German Societies. Several German-Jewish organizations are members of the society which is sponsoring German Day.

It had been the intention of the organization to invite Dr. Hans Luther, the German Ambassador, to attend the celebration. Whether Dr. Luther would attend if the Swastika were not displayed and whether the organization could invite him if it were decided not to display the hooked cross, were among the questions to be decided.

German Day in Baltimore, Md., was celebrated last week with no representative of the German Embassy present for the first time since the celebration was initiated there. The embassy had refused to patronize the affair unless the Swastika were displayed and the Baltimore German-Americans had refused to give the Hitler cultists recognition.

What will be the stand of the Jewish organizations which belong to the United German Societies if the organization votes to raise the Swastika over the German Day celebration here, has not been announced. It is expected, however, that such an act would make Jewish participation impossible.

Canada's Only Jewish Trade Expert Is Sent to Panama

MONTREAL, Sept. 16.—Announcement was made here that John M. Vochter, the only Jewish trade commissioner in the service of the Canadian government, has been appointed trade representative of the Dominion in the Republic of Panama.

Mr. Vochter has been assistant to the Canadian trade commissioner at Chicago and New York. He was awarded honors for service.

Fishing License Transfer Denied to German Jew

BERLIN, Sept. 16.—The transfer of a fishing license in the town of Waldenbuch in the Palatinats, to a Jew, named Stein, from the town of Landau, was cancelled today by the local authorities who declared "in the present National State, the Jews cannot exercise such rights."

Neurath Tells Press Men Law and Justice Justify Measures Against Jews

BERLIN, Sept. 16.—The German government has no doubt that the anti-German agitation abroad in connection with the treatment of the Jews will soon die down, Baron Constantin von Neurath, Minister for Foreign Affairs, told representatives of the foreign press at the reception for them held last night.

He admitted that the treatment of Jews in Germany meant hardships for some, but the minister justified it on the ground of necessity, and "in order to strengthen law and justice." He maintained that the question of the treatment of the Jews in Germany was a German internal problem.

Los Angeles Times Calls "Silver Shirts" Ridiculous

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 16.—Reminiscence of its editorials during the days when abhorred Ku Kluxers flitted through the Southern California night, bearing the fiery cross and gospel of creed discrimination, the Los Angeles Times has editorially attacked the "Silver Shirts," the focal American Fascist organization.

Referring to adherents of the Silver Shirt organization as "nuts," the Times editorial remarks: "Perhaps the easiest way to dispose of this Silver Shirt menace would be to set free a gag-load of hungry squirrels in the Southern Appalachians.

"So far Dr. Peley has made only the inside pages, and those only to the extent of a half column after a year's assiduous work; but in that he might stagger in making a first class entrance of himself, Hitler did—with even a more obscure start."

German Town to Destroy Statue in Honor of Jew

BERLIN, Sept. 16.—The municipality of Erlangen resolved today to destroy the statue erected in 1875, on the Leopoldplatz, in honor of the popular Jewish doctor and teacher, Professor Jacob Herr.

Professor Herr was born in Bayreuth in 1816 and died in Erlangen in 1871. He became a teacher in the medical school of the University of Erlangen and under the then liberal regime became a full professor of medicine, an unusual feat in those days.

He was greatly loved and admired and when he died, the city of Erlangen, where few Jews were ever allowed to live, erected a statue in his honor.

Nazi Threat to Jews More Gross Than World Knows, Says Rabbi Wise on Return

A review of his investigations carried on during a two-and-a-half month's trip abroad which led to the renewed determination that Hitlerism must be crushed by world opinion and political action, was given by Rabbi Stephen S. Wise, honorary president of the American Jewish Congress, at a press conference on his return from Europe.

Dr. Wise aired his views regarding the import of German products and Jewish relief, saying in substance that the problem in Germany is "far graver than has yet been told," that "there is no understanding of the phases which look to the political uprooting and economic extermination of German Jewry" and that "Germany is in truth become a menace to world security and peace."

How long can Hitlerism last? What action will be taken on the Jewish problem at the forthcoming session of the League of Nations Assembly? How can economic pressure be applied so that Germany will be forced to yield to world opinion? In what way can the world cooperate in dawning Hitlerism?

Dr. Wise asserted with emphasis that Hitlerism will last "until the German people are undecieved". The great majority of Germans secretly know what is going on under their

Blood Test Authority to Read Papers Before Rome Body

ANN ARBOR, Mich., Sept. 16.—Dr. Ruden L. Kahn, director of the bacteriology laboratories at the University of Michigan Hospital, will present two papers dealing with immunity to disease and blood tests before the international meeting of the Royal Academy of Italy to be held at Rome the last week in September.

Dr. Kahn, who has won world-wide recognition for his work in the use of the blood test for social diseases, will be the guest of the Volta Foundation. He is also noted for having scored first place at Copenhagen in 1928 and Montevideo in 1930, at competitive blood test demonstrations held there.

Rabbi Rosen Chosen to Lead B'klyn Temple, Petach Tikvah

Temple Petach Tikvah selected Rabbi Nathan S. Rosen as its spiritual leader by a unanimous vote of the board of directors of the Temple, it was announced yesterday.

The temple, which is located at Rochester Avenue and Lincoln Place, Brooklyn, ranks as one of the largest congregations in the borough.

Rabbi Rosen, who is a graduate of the Isaac Elchanan Theological Seminary, was the rabbi of one of the large synagogues in Savannah, Georgia. During his senior year at the Seminary, he acted in the same capacity for the Valley Stream Jewish Center, Long Island. He is a member of the National Governing Board of Young Judaea and vice-president of the Zionist Youth Organization.

now, he said, adding that the depression in the Reich must force ultimate surrender by Hitler's forces.

The League at its session to be held in March will review the whole German situation, said Dr. Wise. Consideration is to be given to the "threat to the security of nations" which is coming from Germany.

The rabbi's remarks were punctuated with outbursts of emotion he found it difficult to control.

"Historism is the incarnation of intolerance at its basest," he declared. Quoting Wickham Stead at a Chamber of Commerce meeting in London, he added, "Historism is a Nordic myth based on the rejection of Christ and the affirmation of Odin."

The boycott against Germany must be moved as well as economic, Dr. Wise insisted. This will lead to political action.

"I cannot believe that liberty-loving countries such as England and France and America will endure the liberty-destroying, the justice-violating conduct of the Hitlerite Reich toward its own people."

The decision agreed upon by the World Jewish Congress that a tribunal should be appointed "before which Jewish causes shall be brought with a view to informing the mind and awakening the conscience, and evoking the help of the Christian world upon which we do not fail to place our reliance," was also discussed by Dr. Wise.

Omaha City Council Votes To Close City Hall to K.K.K.

OMAHA, Neb., Sept. 16.—The city Council of Omaha decided to bar the Ku Klux Klan from use of the city auditorium, by a vote of 5 to 2.

The action was taken following receipt of an application from Gail S. Carter, who signed himself "grand dragon of the realm of Nebraska, Knights of the Ku Klux Klan."

In seeking the use of the auditorium, Carter argued that Jewish, Roman Catholic and other special groups had been granted use of the auditorium.

Commissioner Harry Truscia, Jewish member of the Council, led the opposition to the application.

Palestine-Canadian Trade Relations Seen Stronger

MONTREAL, Sept. 16.—Inquiries regarding tariff regulations are being received here in increasing number from Palestine merchants since the Canadian government decided to import in quantity oranges raised in Palestine.

Yves Lamontagne, Canadian Trade Commissioner at Cairo who is visiting the Dominion, said today that reciprocal agreements are pending between the two countries.

Mr. Lamontagne, whose supervision covers Egypt, Palestine, Syria, Cyprus, the Anglo-Egyptian Sudan, Iraq, Persia and Abyssinia with a combined population of about 50,000,000 persons, said that conditions in Palestine are progressing on account of the influx of Jewish capital, in spite of the world-wide depression.
