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## New Zionist Executive Outlines Policy, Expresses Concern at British Acts

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

LONDON, Sept. 19.—The outline of the policy of the new executive of the World Zionist Organization, chosen at the Eighteenth World Zionist Congress at Prague, which was issued yesterday, under the signature of all ten members of the executive, while stressing the fact that the policy will be based on co-operation with the mandatory power, Great Britain, declares that many features of the British policy in Palestine have caused grave concern.

The renewed attempts to place obstacles in the path of Palestinian colonization; legislation which can only injure the entire country, especially Jewish colonization; proposed changes in the constitution contrary to the obligations assumed by the mandatory power on the erection of a Jewish national home in Palestine, and holding back of the Jewish work in the Transjordan despite the fact that many of the Transjordanian Arabs desire the work to be carried out, are listed by the new Zionist executive, as acts causing great concern.

### German Jews in Palestine

The executive, according to the statement, will develop its political work with the mandatory power and with the League of Nations in order to insure a rate of progress in the rebuilding of Palestine commensurate with the immediate needs of the Jewish masses suffering in the diaspora (dispersion). 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## Health Official Urges Ban on Jewish Doctors

BERLIN, Sept. 19.—The Berlin Commissioner of Health of the Reich government, Professor Reiter, came out here with the request that only Nazis be permitted to practice medicine in Germany.

The old system, which admitted Jews to universities and colleges, was annulled by the commissioner, who asserted that non-German physicians have "corrupted" the women, leading to disastrous family morals.

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## Minorities Congress Loses Prestige by Failure to Act on Jewish Question

BERN, Switzerland, Sept. 19.—The Minorities Congress concluded its annual sessions here today, as the gross points out, in hopeless confusion. In the opinion of the majority of the delegates at the congress, the assembly, in view of the absence of the Jewish delegation, lost its moral and political significance.

Efforts of the congress president to conceal the actual state of affairs by issuing misleading communications to the press was sharply criticized in the lobbies of the congress today. In fact, the opinion was expressed here that the congress, in failing to take any action on the suppression of minorities in Germany, and particularly on the Jewish persecutions, had lost all justification for its existence.

The Jewish delegation to the congress had declined to participate unless it was assured that there would be free discussion of the German-Jewish situation and the congress

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## 6,000 German Jews Settled in Palestine in 6 Months, British Fund Report Shows

LONDON, Sept. 19.—Six thousand German Jews have been settled in Palestine in the last six months, the British Central Fund for German Jews disclosed today. The report reveals that investigations of the possibility of settling German Jews in all parts of the world are being continued, and that already about 100 of them have been settled in Brazil and other over-seas points.

The British committee has already raised 185,000 pounds (approximately \$250,000) toward the work of organizing the German Jews. Of this, about 170,000 pounds has been allocated. Approximately fifty per cent of the total went for work in Palestine and the remainder for assistance to refugees in England and countries on the continent.

Only 25,000 pounds (about \$40,000) has been expended within Germany and this was in the form of subsidies

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## GERMAN-JEWISH BODIES QUIT FEDERATION WHEN NAZIS PACK MEETING, VOTE SWASTIKA DISPLAY

German-Jewish organizations formerly affiliated with the United German Societies, yesterday announced their secession from the organization as a result of its failure Monday evening to adopt a resolution condemning anti-Semites at the same time as it adopted resolutions calling for the display of the Swastika on German Day, October 29, and inviting Dr. Hans Luther, German Ambassador, as principal guest.

Magistrate Charles Brandt, Jr., president of the United German Societies, announced yesterday his resignation in protest at the tactics employed by the Nazi supporters and sympathizers in railroadng their resolution through the meeting.

In an interview yesterday with the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, Magistrate Brandt, who guardedly intimated that he sides with the members of the organization who walked out of the meeting because of the Swastika vote, declared that he had completely severed all affiliations with the or-

ganization after forty years of service and two years as its president. He expressed disappointment as to how 35 Nazi workers succeeded in getting themselves admitted to the meeting.

### Nazis Cause Trouble

"They are not American citizens," he said, "nor were they members."

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## Tel Aviv Votes to Float £250,000 Improvements Loan

TEL AVIV, Sept. 19.—The municipality of Tel Aviv yesterday voted a floating loan of 250,000 pounds, maturing in twenty-five years, from private banks. Consent from the Palestine government sanctioned the loan.

It is estimated that about 200,000 pounds will be used in improving the water drainage system in Tel Aviv and 50,000 pounds will be expended on school buildings which are badly in need of repair.

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**Untermyer Asks Rabbin to Urge Boycott from Pulpit**

An appeal was issued yesterday by Samuel Untermyer, generalissimo of the anti-Hitler boycott forces, that rabbinical leaders take advantage of the High Holidays by "preaching boycott" from their pulpits. A rider to his appeal calls for contributions toward a fund of \$200,000 which is to be used to mobilize forces to prosecute the boycott.

Meanwhile word was received that H. Nelson Street, secretary of the Retail Dry Goods Association of New York, has reported "intensive and effective" cooperation by consumers in the city who have supported the boycott. Retailers at a conference to discuss the effect of the boycott reported that purchases and sales of German products have diminished to such an extent that less than one per cent of total stock on hand in each of the large department stores was imported from Germany.

Fear that an actual ban placed on all German goods "would set a dangerous precedent" has prompted the stores to regulate their importations from Germany according to demand. This has of course meant that the importations are down to minimum and the boycott works automatically without the necessity of a formal declaration by the stores. The figure representing the drop in quantity of German products carried is between 25 and 84 per cent.

**JEWS PREPARE TO GREET ROSH HASHONAH WITH TRAGEDY IN GERMANY SHADOWING SERVICES**

Thousands of Jews throughout Greater New York will suspend business activities at midnight tonight and greet Jewish New Year 5694 with prayer and thanksgiving at synagogues all over the city.

The High Holy Day observances will be colored by tragic developments in Germany and grief for the persecuted German Jews. Rabbis will preach on topics relative to the Nazi regime. Congregations everywhere will voice their condemnation of Hitler and say prayers for German Jewry. In many synagogues and temples, special prayers will be recited.

The Rev. Dr. Israel Goldstein, rabbi of Temple Israel, 10th Street, West 89th Street, will address his congregation on "A World in Travail." Rabbi Stephen S. Wise will speak on "Addicted to the Interior" at services to be held at the Free Synagogue in Carnegie Hall. At Temple Emanu-El, Rabbi Samuel Schleinman will preach on "The Dying Year's Challenge to Israel."

In many neighborhoods where the synagogues are unable to accommodate the demand for seats, halls and other public meeting places will be used to conduct services. Union Temple, in Brooklyn, has rented the Academy of Music, Lafayette Avenue, where Rabbi Sidney S. Tedeschi will preach.

**Services in Church**

The Jewish Congregation of the Community Reform Temple, Kings Highway, will hold its Holy Day services in the Christian Kings Highway Congregational Church. The Rev. Herman F. Reising, of the church, invited Rabbi Samuel Peizer to honor his congregation in the church, which is larger than the community house synagogue. The rabbi accepted.

Unemployed and needy Jews will be invited to attend services held by the Bronx Jewish Civic League.

The program to be held as part of the High Holy Day services at Town Hall will feature contributions to culture and learning made by German Jews. It is sponsored by Rabbi Joseph Sonderegger, formerly of the Hamburg Solomon Synagogue.

Services for the disabled, the old, the poor and otherwise incapacitated will be held under the auspices of the ninety-one charitable agencies affiliated with the Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies.

Bedridden patients at the Hospital for Joint Diseases will be relocated into the hospital auditorium in wheel chairs or carried in on their

beds in order that they may join in the services.

Relatives will work with patients, doctors, nurses and employees in the auditorium of Beth Israel Hospital, while at Mount Sinai Hospital, services for ambulatory patients will be held in the synagogue.

More than 1,700 persons will assemble in the synagogue and religious school of the Bronx Young Men's and Young Women's Hebrew Association, Fulton Avenue and 171st Street. Junior services will be conducted by students of the association's Talmud Torah.

The Young Men's Hebrew Association, 92nd Street and Lexington Avenue, will mark the observance in its auditorium with Rabbi Henry M. Rosenthal officiating. Cantor Jacob Reimel and his choir will conduct the services.

**"Homescoming" Time**

Prominent rabbis and laymen will speak at services in the synagogue of the Young Women's Hebrew Association, 31 West 105th Street. The Rev. Dr. Louis I. Newman will deliver the sermon on Friday morning. M. Malinin Fortig, legislative counsel to Governor Lehman, will speak on Thursday.

Rosh Hashonah is home-coming time for the "almos" of the Hebrew Orphan Asylum, 1560 Amsterdam Avenue. Abraham S. Weber, newly-appointed director of the budget of the State of New York, is expected to be among those who will attend the services.

Under the supervision of Rabbi Samuel A. Barman, director of Religious Education at the Hebrew Sheltering Guardian Society, Pleasantville, services will be conducted at that institution with a trained choir composed of children from the institution singing the choral responses.

At the Home for Aged and Infirmed Hebrews, 121 W. 105th Street, men and women, ranging in age from 62 to 98, will enjoy a special holiday dinner. Rabbi Isadore Perlmutter will preside at the synagogue services.

Crippled children at the Ethel-Eda Home, Yeshiva, N. Y., and healthy boys and girls whose mothers are incapacitated, at the Children's Haven of Far Rockaway, will also observe the day with special festive dinners. At the Children's Haven, divine services will be held for the older boys and girls and religious talks will be heard by the younger ones.

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## GERMAN-JEWISH BODIES QUIT FEDERATION WHEN NAZIS PACK MEETING, VOTE SWASTIKA DISPLAY

It was they who caused all the trouble."

He refused to be quoted as to his views on the use of the Nazi flag in the German Day celebration.

"I simply disapproved of the tactics and the behavior at the meeting," said Magistrate Brandt. "So I am through. I'll have nothing to do with the flag issue."

Magistrate Brandt expressed the belief that the non-Jewish members "should have succeeded to the compromise," a proposal made at an earlier meeting called by the executive committee whereby it was agreed to float the Swastika over the Ambassador's box purely as a gesture of courtesy. This was rejected by Heinz Spitznagel, chief of the Hitler forces here and nominal delegate of the New York branch of the Stahlhelm, monarchist war veterans' organization.

The decision of the Jewish members to secede from the United German Societies was announced by Robert Rosenbaum, president of the Federation of German Jewish Societies and of the Deutscher Israelitischen Landesverband.

### Rosenbaum Statement

"Until now we have had an American-German group in the United States," declared Mr. Rosenbaum. "From now on we can speak of the Nazi Germans trying to impose racial prejudice on the German element in this country disregarding the spirit of liberty which is characteristic of our country.

"We German Jews have together with Germans of non-Jewish confession for decades carried out best efforts for German prestige in America. With pride we look upon the results which this harmonious cooperation has so far brought.

"With regret we establish the fact that among the delegates a new movement inclined to the liberty-loving ideas hitherto existing has made its appearance, called forth by the intrusion into the meeting of new elements,—elements which heretofore have done little or nothing for the prestige of Germany in the United States. Although we acknowledge the meditative action of the present board of directors of the United German Societies, we see no possibility of continued cooperation under the existing conditions. Wherewith we declare our secession from the United German Societies."

Over 200 were present at the meeting Monday evening at the Turnershall, including a large contingent of Nazis under the leadership of Spitznagel, and a number of Nazi sympathizers. From the

opening of the meeting it was evident that the packed assembly was openly anti-Semitic and that there was little chance of concessions being made that would permit the Jewish members to continue their association.

Speakers opposing the Swastika resolution or urging the adoption of the resolution condemning anti-Semitism were interrupted by Nazi sympathizers in the hall and had little opportunity to express their views.

### Stahlhelm Packs Meeting

When the meeting opened, the Stahlhelm, which was entitled to 4 representatives, demanded thirty more. All 34 were at the meeting and were permitted to vote on the question of whether they should be allowed to vote. Likewise, twenty representatives of the Commercial Club of '30, a pro-Nazi organization, were allowed to vote on their own admission to the organization. Both these were done over the protests of the spokesmen for the German-Jewish organizations who were led by Mr. Rosenbaum and Dr. Fritz Schlessinger, a member of the organization's executive board.

The resolution subsequently adopted after the Jewish members had quit the meeting, was directly contrary to the stand taken by the organization at a previous meeting when it was voted not to raise the Swastika and not to invite DeLocher.

Spitznagel led the fight on the compromise section of the resolution condemning anti-Semitism which pointed out there was no political significance in the display of the Swastika and recorded the organization's rejection of every form of anti-Semitism. The Jewish representatives had agreed to the display of the Swastika in the ambassador's box with the proviso that the anti-Semitism resolution be adopted. When it was apparent that this would be rejected, the Jewish delegates quit the hall before the voting.

The NRA was vigorously criticized at the meeting because the Swastika was not down at the Madison Square Garden meeting last Tuesday when flags of all nations were flown. The flag of the German Republic was flown without the Swastika. Bernard H. Eddler was attacked by speakers for not having insisted on a display of the Swastika. The attack on the NRA, at Monday night's meeting of the United German Societies, was sharply criticized as being "un-American." It added fuel to the discussion in the organization. ## Health Official Urges Ban on Jewish Doctors

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This is the second prohibitive ban placed on the Jewish physician in Germany and reveals the intention of the Reich government to ban altogether Jews from the medical profession.

The recent order of the Minister of Economics saying that merchant stores are not to display signs that they are German firms, was ignored today when all members of the Nazi organization for Trade Activists were ordered by party headquarters to obtain special display signs. These signs will show affiliation with the Nazi party. They are obviously intended to stimulate the anti-Jewish trade boycott.

## 4,000 German Jews Settled in Palestine in 6 Months, British Fund Report Shows

All the allocations were made after consultation with the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee and other agencies in order to prevent duplication and overlapping of effort. Close cooperation has been maintained throughout, particularly with the Joint Distribution Committee which, in addition to carrying on considerable work independently, shared responsibility for some of the allocations on important projects.

In conjunction with the Joint Distribution Committee, the British group advanced 1,000 pounds to the Ben-Shimon colony for children in Palestine, to provide accommodations for German children. Special attention was given to the needs of young men and women in training centers established throughout Europe.

Among the committee's allocations were 25,000 pounds to the German and French central committee for emigration and resettlement of refugees in Palestine and elsewhere; 20,000 pounds for housing in Palestine; 25,000 pounds for agricultural and industrial training of German settlers in Palestine; 25,000 pounds to the Keren Hayesod (Palestine Foundation Fund); 5,000 pounds to the Hebrew University; 5,000 pounds for vocational training for refugees in Europe; 25,000 pounds for German refugees in England; 4,000 pounds for placement of German professors and teachers in British institutions.

Fifty thousand refugees left Germany before July 1, the committee stated in its report. The number has nearly increased since that time, it declares.

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would condemn the deprivation of Jewish rights in the Reich. Yesterday, following the declaration by the representatives of the German minorities, which attempted to justify the anti-Jewish measures, the Jewish representatives announced that this declaration made Jewish collaboration impossible. The German minorities, in the concluding debate, attempted to modify the attitude they had taken by explaining they were fighting for a new form of nationality rights, but were prepared to recognize the rights also of those out of the same blood.

The Hungarians, Catalans, Russians and Lithuanian minorities made a declaration strongly condemning anti-Semitism.

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man Jews, the executive declares that the lasting solution of the German Jews is possible only with large settlement in Palestine, to which they will bring their possessions and their cultural abilities.

The executive also declared that in accordance with the decision of the Eighteenth Congress to establish a special office for settling German Jews in Palestine, headed by Dr. Chaim Weizmann, former president of the World Zionist Organization, in union with the executive, "the executive rejoices that in this way, the great creative powers of Dr. Weizmann will again become directly available for the work of organization."

### Inquiry Commission

In a reference to the murder of Dr. Chaim Arlossoff, noted Zionist labor leader, last June, for whose killing these Revisionists, members of the extreme right wing Zionist movement, are now being held in Palestine, the executive declared, "The Eighteenth Congress was forced to deal with this problem, but the Congress overcame the difficulty and emerged with increased vigor. The commission of inquiry decided upon by the Congress has already been appointed by the Actions Committee and the executive is confident that all sections of the Zionist movement will patiently await the results of the inquiry."

The question of the commission of inquiry demanded by the Laborites, the single strongest group at the Eighteenth Congress, for the purpose of investigating the activities, allegedly terroristic, of the Palestinian Revisionists, created a storm at the Congress, the Revisionists challenging the right of the Congress to make the inquiry. The decision to hold the inquiry and the membership of the commission, as yet officially unknown, was only decided upon after protracted negotiations between the various Zionist parties. The Revisionists refused to have anything to do with the matter.

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
