Rothermere Paper Attacks Einstein for Proposed Speech at Albert Hali (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

LONDON, Sept. 26-An editorial attack on Professor Albert Einstein is made today in Lord Rothermere's Evening News, which calls on the scientist to cancel his plans to address a mass meeting at Albert Hall next week on the German situation. The paper couples its attack with outspoken approval of Nazi aims under the pretext that they are suppressing communism. Professor Einstein is attacked for his pacifist activities and his alleged communist associations.

Sir Austen Chamberlain, noted statesman, who is scheduled to address the meeting, is also subjected to the Evening News' criticism as is Commander Oliver Locker-Lampson, Professor Einstein's British host. Sir Austen is denounced for associ-ating with "Reds", and Commander Locker-Lampson ridiculed for utilizing Professor Einstein for purposes of self-publicity. Photographs show-ing him bearing arm at his estate for the purpose of defending Einstein from threatened Nazi Fehmic attacks are held up for derision by the paper.

The paper asserts that the meeting will not do any good either to Anglo-German relations or to the German Jews. In any case, it declares, Professor Einstein, as a pacifist with communist associations, is not the right man to plead the case of the German Jews.

Nazi Anti-Semitic Papers Publish 'Kol Nidre' Text (Tewish Telegraphic Agency)

BERLIN, Sept. 26-The full text of the "Kol Nidre", the prayer used to open the services on the eve of the Day of Atonement, is being published in several anti-Semitic papers here to support their contention that the Jews never take their oaths or pledges seriously.

Celebration of the Jewish New Year in the provinces was quiet and unmarked by anti-Jewish disturb-ances except in certain towns in Hessen, a survey completed today revealed. In Hessen, synagogues were invaded during the services by local Nazis and the worshippers dragged out.

Believed Aryan, Jew Beaten For Walking with Jewess: Danzig Aryan Mutilated (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

BERLIN, Sept. 26-Both Aryans and Jews who have associated with each other or have been suspected of associating with each other are feeling the mailed fist of the advocates of so-called Aryan racial superiority within the past few days. Jewish men walking with fair-

haired women of the Aryan or Nordic type in the Berlin streets, have been assaulted by Nazis, as have Aryans who are seen with Jewish women. Several cases of Jews being assaulted in the streets by these defenders of racial purity were reported today, including that of Samuel Spann, a Jewish youth, with blonde hair and the type of features claimed exclusively for Aryans, who was badly beaten up by Nazis who saw him walking with a Jewish girl and mistook him for an Aryan.

A shocking case was reported here today from Danzig. A non-Jewish Danzig youth courting a Jewish girl, was followed by Nazis, who set upon him when he crossed the German frontier in his automobile. Seek League Commissioner

The appointment of a League of Nations commissioner to handle the problems arising from the existence of thousands of German-Jewish refugees will be urged on the assem-bly by Leonard Montefiore and Norman Bentwich, outstanding British Jewish leaders, who came to Geneva to press the Jewish cause.

Mr. Montefiore, president of the Anglo-Jewish Committee, and Mr. Bentwich, former atorney general of Palestine, were designated by the Board of Deptuies of British Jews to seek League aid in behalf of the refugees.

Money, Goldstein Reports

Palestine needs men and money. declared Nathan L. Goldstein on his return to New York yesterday on the S.S. Paris after a trip to Palestine, where he made a special study of conditions. Mr. Goldstein attended the World Zionist Congress at Prague.

Reiterating the prevailing opinion among those who arrive from trips abroad, Mr. Goldstein said that the German Jews are in great suffering. He voiced the hope that Palestine will be a haven for the refugees, for "those who manage to escape."

"The Jews who are willing and anxious to enter the country, Mr. Goldstein, "are of the same type as those who have emigrated there since the close of the World War and they will undoubtedly make the same contribution to the upbuilding of the country as their predecessors. But man power is not

"Money is needed to finance the projects which must be undertaken to absorb the emigration. While the existing Zionist organizations must continue to count on donations for their various purposes, the real money that is needed must be in the form of substantial investment capital to adequately finance the enterprises which must shortly be under-

Sir Herbert Samuel Pleads Hebrew University Cause

(Jewish Doily Bulletin)

MONTREAL, Que., Sept. 26-Sir Herbert Samuel, famed British statesman and first High Commissioner of Palestine, yesterday pleaded the cause of the Hebrew University at Jerusalem as the haven of refuge for German-Jewish scientists and men of learning ousted from their posts in Germany by the Nazis. Speaking at a luncheon arranged in his honor here, Sir Herbert declared that directors of the university, although confronted with the need of providing facilities for these ousted men, had been forced to cut the institution's budget from 250,000 pounds to 130,000 pounds.

Funds are urgently needed, he declared as he revealed his intention of touring the principal cities of the United States in behalf of the uni-versity. Five thousand dollars wascontributed for the university here following the meeting.

Economist to Teach Here (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 26-Dr. Hans Neisser, one of Europe's ablest economists, has been elected to professorship in the Wharton School of Finance and Commerce at the University of Pennsylvania, Dr. Neis-ser was formerly on the faculty of the University of Kiel and left Germany as a result of the recent developments there.

A member of an old German-Jewish family of scholars, Dr. Neisser speaks English fluently and under present plans will conduct two graduate courses at the university. is the author of a number of notable works among them "The Exchange Value of Money" and "The Interna-tional Gold Market Before and After the War." He will begin his work at the university on Friday, the opening of the academic year.

Ludwig, in New Plea for Jewish Unity, Sees It as Only Hope for German Jews

A plea that Tews the world over unite as a means of warding off persecution was sounded by Emil Lud-wig, eminent German Jewish author, who arrived here vesterday on the

S.S. Paris Mr. Ludwig will spend a few days in New York and in Chicago, where he will visit the World Fair, before proceeding to Beverly Hills, California. There he is to work on a sccnario for the forthcoming cinema production of his biography, "Napoleon."

Besieged by newspaper men to discuss the political situation in Ger-many, where his books have been publicly burned and where he himself has been ostracized, Mr. Ludwig declined to go into the subject, repeating with emphasis:

"I don't know Hitler. I don't want to know him. No. I will not talk about him.

But in a statement which he had previously prepared for publication, the writer said in part: "Hitler suits the German character

as it has developed for sixty years far better than we do, who tried unsuccessfully for a decade to have western European ideas take root in Germany, but who at the most represented only a small minority.

"Now the Germans are, so to speak, at ease with themselves, as their present leaders proclaim. And Hitler has the right to assert that his ideals of race, blood and war-worship are indeed the German na-tional ideals. The working class and the other European-minded Germans are defeated. The middle class, led by the barons of big industry, rules

The only hope which Herr Ludwig said he sees for the Jews in Germany, where he believes Jewish persecution is extremely popular, is in union.

B'nai B'rith Lodge Votes **Endorsement of Boycott** (Tewish Daily Bulletin)

MILWAUKEE, Sept. 26-Approval of a national boycott against German-made goods while the present anti-Jewish terrorism of the Hitler regime continues was expressed by the Gilead lodge of B'nai B'rith here at its first fall meeting. I. B. Padway, leader in the lodge, predicted the national B'nai B'rith would officially come out for the boycott. He contended further that the boycott would be a patriotic act at this time, since it would encourage consumption of American-made products. He attacked the "sadism and perver-sion" of the present Nazi government.

German Group Boos Plea For American Tolerance, Quietly Hears Nazi Leader

After repeatedly interrupting by boos and catcalls a strong plea by Bernard F. Ridder, newspaper publisher, for the elimination of the spirit of intolerance from its actions, a meeting of the United German So-cieties at Turn Halle Monday night came to order and listened quietly to rhetorical declaration by the spokesman of the Steel Helmets and the Friends of New Germany, Heinz Spanknoebel, who denied that these organizations forced the withdrawal of the Jewish groups from the United German Societies.

.The meeting was called by the Rev. William Popcke of Zion Lutheran Church, honorary president of the United German Societies and the only official who did not resign as a result of the split which developed last week when a meeting of the United German Societies, called to decide wheher or not Ambassador Hans Luther should be invited to attend the German Day exercises on October 29, refused to pass a reso-lution condemning anti-Semitism.

Spanknoebel's declaration came at

the close of Mr. Ridder's speech, in the meeting that "the new spirit of intolerance" could only end in the robbing of Germany of American friendship. which he warned those present at

"All my life," Mr. Ridder said, "I have fought for Germany's cause. But today I must tell you, whether you would hear it or no: You are on the wrong road, and do not realize where it will take you. Spanknoebel, maintaining that discussions about racial and religious questions were not on the calendar and that the German Jewish groups had withdrawn of their own accord.

Gov. Arthur Seligman Dead: Was Outstanding Figure In New Mexico's Growth

(Jewish Daily Bulletin) ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., Sept. 26 -Arthur Seligman, Governor of New Mexico since January 1, 1931, one of the four Jewish Governors in the United States, died here of a heart attack, a half hour after her had spoken at a meeting of the New Mexico Bankers' Association. He

was sixty years old. Governor Seligman was one of the few native-born sons of Jewish parentage in New Mexico. He was one of the outstanding figures in the social and economic development of New Mexico and is credited with laying the first pavement in the State, when he was Mayor of Santa. Fe. His absorption in the public affairs of his State dates back to the time when he established a newspaper of his own, The Evening Star of Santa Fe, at the age of twelve.

He was actively engaged both in politics and business. He occupied many public offices, among them Chairman of the Santa Fe County Commissioners, member of the Board of Irrigation Commissioners and President of the Educational

Survey Commission. He also was president of the company which built and operated. one of the largest hotels in the State, president of the First Na-tional Bank of Santa Fe, and director of the Northern New Mexico

Loan Association.
As Governor he was guided by liberal principles with the objective. of efficiency and economy in the State Government.

He was actively interested in civic and philanthropic work. He is survived by his wife, Frankie Lacker of Cleveland, two children and a sister, Mrs. Eva Seligman Cohen of

Philadelphia. The body was taken to Santa Fe. his life-long residence, for burial.
