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Jews Arrested, Injured, Accused as Communists, Turmoil

In Cuba Riots, Turmoil
(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

HAVANA, Oct. 9.—Government parties and press are spreading agitation among the people of Havana and the military forces are blaming the Jews for carrying on Communist propaganda throughout Cuba. According to the conservative press, the Jews are responsible for all the ills that have afflicted Cuba. The morning paper La Manana reports on the authority of the Havana chief of police that the Jews are disturbing the life of Cuba and that the Jews in Cuba are leading immoral lives.

House-to-house searches are being carried out on the pretext that arms and Communist literature have been secreted in them.

Li the course of a labor demonstration, the Jewish worker Abraham Duge was mortally wounded and the merchant Weintrob was almost shot when he was falsely accused of firing on the troops from the roofs of his house.

The Jews Gasman, Rubin and Eweshtein were arrested on various pretexts and are in danger of being deported.

The Jewish student Moses Rai-gorodsky was arrested and charged with being a Communist leader. His father, owner of a printing press, was also arrested.

Havana Jewish institutions have called a special meeting and created a Jewish committee to clear the Jews of Cuba of the accusations made against them.

The newly created committee plans to intervene both with President Grau San Martin and with the Cuban chief-of-staff, Colonel Batista. Unrest pervades the Jewish

Brazil May Open Its Doors, But Only to White Guards

SAO PAULO, Brazil, Oct. 9.—The Brazilian Minister of Labor, it was learned today, is considering a proposal to allow one thousand Russian White Guard families, now unemployed in Germany, to enter Brazil. The White Guards are the remnants of the reactionary monarchist elements forced out of Russia by the revolution.

GERMANS CONSENT TO LEAGUE APPOINTMENT OF BODY TO CONSIDER REFUGEE PROBLEMS

GENEVA, Oct. 9.—It was learned today that German delegates at the League of Nations had agreed to the appointment of a League High Commission for refugees provided that the connection of the League with the question of minorities cease with the appointment. An American, it was also learned, would be on the Commission personnel. Thus submission of its reports by the Commission to the League will cease and open debate over the German Jewish question will be avoided.

Germany's delegates made this concession at today's secret meeting of the subcommittee of the second commission. It was learned however that representatives of Holland, France and other nations opposed this compromise, insisting that the League is organically connected with the refugees' question.

The subcommittee appointed an

editorial committee whose purpose will be to edit the new resolution. Further dilution of clauses, it is hoped, will gain the support of Germany.

The sixth commission will probably meet again tomorrow and receive the report entertained by the subcommittee regarding reaffirmation of the 1922 resolution which was adopted Saturday against Germany's vote. The resolution which had proclaimed the obligation of all League members to maintain the same standard of rights toward minorities embodied in certain special treaties, and had defined a minority group as "nationals who differ from the majority by their race, language and religion," was opposed by German delegates who did however recognize the first part of the resolution. The German delegates will vote against the resolution, making passage impossible since unanimity is required.

It is expected that Germany will stand alone in opposition to the second point in the resolution, and will not have the support of any other nation. An address and debate with German delegates is anticipated in which Germany's attitude will be condemned.

JERUSALEM, Oct. 9.—Five Jewish lads, whose age ranged from thirteen to sixteen, students at the Yabneel school, were drowned while bathing in the Jordan River. They were on an excursion and had planned to attend the memorial meeting for Dr. Chaim Arlosoroff, murdered Zionist labor leader, which was to have been held at Dagania. At the time the boys were bathing no teacher was present to supervise them. The Dagania meeting was postponed following news of the tragedy.

Guardian Describes Tortures

Inflicted on Jewish Children In Schools of Upper Silesia

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

LONDON, Oct. 9.—The German obligation to give free schooling to the children of minority groups in Upper Silesia has turned into a farcical fraud as far as the Jews are concerned, the Manchester Guardian, noted liberal paper, declared today. The Guardian is continuing to publish the results of the investigations made by a correspondent on conditions in Upper Silesia, following the promises made by Germany to the League of Nations following the Bernheim petition.

Discussing the position of the Jewish children, the Guardian declares that hatred and abuses have turned the schools into torture chambers for the children of Jews, who dread their teachers, schoolmates and school. The moral suffering alone is enough to shatter the nerves of grown men, to say nothing of the sensitive minds of small children. Medical men told the Guardian correspondent that the health of the Jewish children is suffering seriously.

Not only have the schools become

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real infernos for the Jewish children and places of mental torture, but the Guardian correspondent cites a number of instances of brutal physical attacks against Jewish children by their schoolmates.

One Jewish boy was saved by a non-Jewish lad after being dragged by his schoolmates into a hut, made to kneel on pointed nails and compelled to shout, "Heil Hitler," as he was being brutally beaten.

Many Jewish children come home from school with the swastika cut into their clothes while little Jewish girls near Hindenburg had their aprons cut into the shape of swastikas.

Even in the kindergartens, little Jewish children aged six and seven are insulted and abused.

The teachers are mostly encouraging the children against the Jewish pupils. Others ignore the attacks on the Jewish children, fearing expulsion if they side with the Jews.

The Guardian correspondent concludes by urging the League of Nations to come to the rescue of the Jewish children or, failing that, he urges some welfare society to take up the case immediately.

of minorities at the session of the League of Nations commission when German delegates withdrew the veto which had prevented the adoption of the resolutions dealing with German refugees and minorities.

Negotiations had been under way to dissuade Germany from executing her threat of voting against the refugees' resolution instead of merely abstaining when it came before the plenary Assembly.

The compromise consisted of an amendment providing for the submission of reports of a Commissioner and Administrative Council for minority groups, to be appointed by the League, to states cooperating. German delegates had feared that if the reports went under consideration of the League Council, there would be constant discussion of the Jewish question, an eventuality which was not relished. The activities of the minorities' Administrative Council which will be appointed, is also to receive copies of the reports.

The Silesian Question (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

GENEVA, Oct. 9.—The question whether treatment of the Jews in upper Silesia will be brought to the attention of the League of Nations Council now in session, is doubtful although it is generally conceded that the unsettled matter will be considered by the League soon.

Rapporteur Lester who is no longer a member of the Council of the League, confined his activities as rapporteur in circularizing a confidential report received from Germany among all members of the Council. In an accompanying letter he refrained from expressing an opinion regarding the working of the minority rights guarantee in Silesia. Neither does Lester express satisfaction with the report, which is the usual procedure in such a matter.

It is believed that in view of the material which Lester received con-

cerning the actual treatment of the Jews in Silesia, he considered it impossible to declare to the League that the situation is satisfactory.

A copy of the confidential report circularized by Lester was brought to the attention of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency. The report does not deal with the actual situation in Upper Silesia. Instead it explains in detail the measures taken by the German government for informing officials, including the Silesian Nazi Lawyers' Union, regarding the necessity for keeping the matter within the Geneva convention.

The report concludes by stating that Franz Bernheim, Silesian Jew whose petition for the restoration of his rights had been passed by the League in June, had been denied the complaint for wrongful dismissal and his demand for compensation to the local Minorities office. The results of his action were unstated and the presumption is that there were none.

Jewish Teachers College In Opening Ceremony Tonight

With one hundred pupils already enrolled, the College for Jewish Teachers will start its academic life with special services and ceremonies tonight, at the Community House of Temple Emanu-El, Fifth Avenue and 65th Street. The main speaker of the evening will be Rabbi William Schwartz, of Temple Israel of Lawrence, chairman of the College committee; Rabbi William F. Rosenblum, of Temple Israel of the City of New York, chairman of the Teachers' Conference Committee, from which organization first came the demand for the formation of the college; and Rabbi Jacob B. Pollak, director of the College. Class sessions will begin directly after the opening ceremonies.

Hillquit Funeral Services At Cooper Union Tomorrow

Funeral services for Morris Hillquit, internationally known Socialist leader, will be held at Cooper Union Auditorium, tomorrow morning. The funeral is to be under the auspices of the American Socialist party. Cremation of the body will follow in accordance with the wishes expressed by Mr. Hillquit.

The Socialist leader died early Sunday morning at his home, 40 East 69th Street, after a long illness contracted originally during the strenuous New York mayoralty campaign in 1917.

Heine Books Confiscated; His 'Lorelei' Condemned (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

BERLIN, Oct. 9.—The works of Heinrich Heine were confiscated by authorities who were searching a privately owned Hamburg library today. It was declared that Heine's works are "un-German." The Nazi press in Bavaria declared that the folksong "Lorelei" will be prohibited in the future because the words were written by Heine, who is said to have been "one of the meanest Jews Germany ever saw."

Janner Calls Palestine Colonization Triumph Of Practical Idealism

The thesis that the Anglo-Saxon outlook on progress devolves from the principle that there is no distinction between peoples whatever their party or religious affiliation, was developed in an address by Barnett Janner, member of the British Parliament, delivered Saturday at the Jewish pageant where he was the guest of honor.

Mr. Janner denied that this is a Jewish principle exclusively and added that it was born in the travail of world advancement.

He denounced the atrocities being committed in Germany against Jews and pleaded for the success of the settlement of Palestine as a Jewish homeland.

"The idea of colonizing Palestine," he continued, "is being brought to a successful end beyond the expectations of even the most optimistic. I venture to say that nowhere in the world has there been shown a more vivid illustration of what idealism combined with practical effort can achieve, than that displayed by the Jewish pioneer work in Palestine."

"These people are a determined people with a vision. They were prepared to suffer indescribable hardships, to live on the barest sustenance, to work steadily onward and if need be to fall by the way, smitten by disease."

"Day by day this new peasantry has toiled often under a broiling sun, man and woman side by side, breathing in a new atmosphere of contentment in spite of the arduous and exacting nature of the work. When the day's work is over they pour out their hearts in song under an open sky. Their bookshelves are stocked with the literary gems of the world which they read with pleasure and understanding. Their board is meagre but their lives are full. They have made of Palestine an oasis of optimism in the desert of world pessimism."

German Liner Delayed In Voyage to Palestine

BERLIN, Oct. 9.—The departure of the S.S. Espana, first direct Palestine boat from Hamburg, was postponed until the eighth of November, according to an announcement.

Jewish organizations interested in emigration are anxious to assist directors of the steamship line in securing a direct permanent connection between Germany and Palestine. Their hope is thus to establish favorable relations with German authorities on the question of Jewish emigration. A special organization has been formed with the purpose of supporting the line.

A. F. of L. Expected to Issue Boycott Stand Tomorrow

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 9.—A report from the resolutions committee of the American Federation of Labor, which will include recommendations to the convention on the Federation's position on a boycott against German goods, is expected to be made Wednesday morning, it was indicated by officials today. Matthew Woll, third vice-president of the Federation, is chairman of the committee.

In view of a recommendation for a boycott made at the opening session of the convention by the Federation's Executive committee headed by William Green, president, it is freely predicted that the report from the resolutions committee will recommend a boycott in retaliation for Hitler's destruction of the labor union movement in Germany, and his treatment of the Jews in that country, under the Nazi regime.

Hope for the adoption of a boycott was given added force by an address delivered before the convention by James Rowan, delegate of the British Trade Union Congress, who presented a vivid picture of the treatment of the Jews under the Hitler regime, and made a plea to American labor that some expression of resentment be made.

Jewish Rights League Holds Women's Boycott Meeting

The role of the Jewish woman in the struggle for survival of the Jewish people against the onslaughts of the Hitlerites, with particular reference to the part of Jewish womanhood in the intensification and extension of the boycott against German products and services, will be discussed at a meeting of Jewish women this afternoon at the Hotel Astor, it was announced by Mrs. Mark Harris, president of the Women's Division of the American League for Defense of Jewish Rights. The principal address will be made by Samuel Untermyer, president of the League and leader of the world boycott movement.

"The meeting on Tuesday," Mrs. Harris declared, "will be devoted to a careful consideration of all the phases of the struggle now waged by the Jewish people against an unparalleled attempt to annihilate them in Germany and to spread hatred and intolerance throughout the world."

In addition to Mr. Untermyer, the meeting will be addressed by eminent speakers of both sexes, Jews and non-Jews. Admission to the meeting is free both to members of the Women's Division of the League and to non-members.

Vienna Sport Club Quits United German Societies; No Swastika for Luther

With only two dissenting votes the Vienna Sport Club of New York has added its name to the roster of the groups which have withdrawn from the United German Societies since September 16, when it became clear that that organization had fallen under Nazi control.

A resolution adopted by the club at its last meeting at the clubhouse, 432 East 86th Street, declares that the club has no interest in belonging to an organization which is directly or indirectly concerned with politics. At the same time, the German American Football League has issued to all its members a warning against introducing the currently prevalent political differences into recreation centers and sport fields.

In its open letter the German American Football League decries intolerance as unworthy of true sportsmanship, and cautions against the repetition of political clashes in the sport world.

"All politics must be kept apart from sports," the letter reads. "In out football games we can make no distinctions in racial, creed or blood relationships. A football player is a football player and nothing else. If as a football player he fights for the honor of his club, whether he belongs to one race or the other, should be immaterial to every other football player."

"The executive body (of the German American Football League) cannot and will not permit the recreation centers of its member groups to become the playground of political passions which are superimposed. And it is the duty of every officer of the league to see to it that spectators behave in just as civilized a manner as they, in reversed circumstances, would expect of dissenters."

"The German American Football League Executive Board therefore decided at its last meeting to notify the organizations that playgrounds where players of other races will be heckled will be closed."

The football league's executive board also announces that it has charged umpires to inform it of all instances, even the very slightest, in which a player is insulted.

Earlier this week, the Mainz Carnival Society withdrew from the United German Societies for reasons similar to those prompting all the other seceding societies. At a meeting held Tuesday evening at Luchow's the society voted unanimously to sever its connection with the United German Societies when Hermann Horn, Emil Hoffman and Oskar Borchert, the Mainz Carnival Society's delegates to the recent meetings of the United German So-

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cities, declared that they would be forced to relinquish their delegations if their society continued to belong to an organization which concerned itself with political and religious matters. Such matters, the Mainz society declared, are foreign to its traditions as a social club.

One of the Mainz society's delegates characterized the last few meetings of the United German Societies as being in the hands of "a group of recently immigrated Germans who have grasped the reins of the society and have suppressed every attempt at opposition in debate."

In protest against such proceedings the Mainz Carnival Society has also voted not to participate in the German Day celebration.

The split in the United German Societies in New York, which had its origin in the question of whether or not the Swastika should fly at the German Day celebration here October 29 and has now become a matter of attitude towards German National Socialism, is being echoed in various parts of the country.

From Newark comes the news that the German American League of Newark, the leading German group in that vicinity, has decided to take legal steps against attacks which have been made against it and its officers, presumably by Nazis.

In San Francisco, J. Emmet Hayden, Supervisor of the Pacific Saengerbund and Chief Secretary of the Order of the Sons of Hermann, acting upon the numerous protests which had reached him, refused to participate in the German Day celebration which began there on October 3, with the result that the United German Societies of San Francisco voted to oust the groups in question. Mr. Hayden refused to let the singing society participate if the Swastika would fly at the celebration, because he feared that there would be protest against it. He remained adamant even after hearing the usual excuse that the German consul would not be able to speak unless the Swastika flew.

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Brith Trumpeldor Delegates Brownshirted at Conference

WARSAW, Oct. 9—The third all-Polish Brith Trumpeldor conference, Revisionist Youth organization, opened here yesterday, with 493 delegates representing 464 Polish branches. The delegates wore brown shirts.

The former English army captain, Halperin, now chief instructor of the Polish Trumpeldorites, read a greeting from Vladimir Jabotinsky, leader of the world Revisionist movement.

Uri Zwi Gruenberg, Hebrew poet, who greeted the conference in Hebrew, declared that the theory of Jewish pacifism was an "historical lie," and that the truth was that Jewish ethics was not a "creeping worm," but was the "beauty of strength."

Arrested Jew For Blowing Shofar At Wailing Wall

JERUSALEM, Oct. 3—Aaron Zuckerman of Tel Aviv, believed to be a Revisionist, extreme right wing Zionist, was arrested for blowing the "shofar" (ram's horn) at the Wailing wall, during the "Neilah" the final prayer of the Yom Kippur, Day of Atonement.

According to the ruling made by the international commission appointed by the League of Nations, following disorders between the Jews and the Arabs, the blowing of the "shofar" is forbidden at the Wailing Wall.
