Achimeir Cleared on Charges Of Conspiracy to Murder But Held on Other Counts

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) JAFFA, Palestine, Nov. 8-Aba Achimeir, one of the three men held in connection with the murder last June of Dr. Chaim Arlosoroff, noted Zionist labor leader, today was cleared of charges of conspiracy to murder, as the magistrate's investigation of the crime continued here. Achimeir, however, is still held in connection with the murder on two other counts.

The conspiracy charge was ruled out after a spirited plea by defense counsel on the gorunds that the holds that a conspirator must necessarily be present when the crime takes place. No evidence was presented during the course of the magistrate's investigation to show that Achimeir was present when the murder took place, the prosecution stressing only that the defendant had instigated and planned the assassination which was carried out by oth-

Following completion of the pros-ecution's presentation of evidence against Achimeir, Abraham Stavsky and Zvi Rosenblatt, all of whom are identified with extremist groups of the Revisionists, the right-wing Zionists, the defense attorneys yester-day began a heavy attack on the testimony offered. Second Class Citizenship For German Jews After Election, Official States (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

BERLIN, Nov. 8-German Jews will be definitely declared second-class citizens, with limited rights, by a law to be promulgated immediately after the election of November 12, said Professor Karl Schmidt in an address before the Academy of German Rights. Professor Schmidt is charged with the reform of the existing laws by the Nazi government.

Professor Schmidt declared that a special sub-committee will be appointed to modify citizenship, with ciple the basis of the modifications.

Funeral Services Today for Dr. Leo Motzkin, Noted Jewish Statesman, Leader (Tewish Telegraphic Agency)

PARIS. Nov. 8-Funeral services will be held here tomorrow for Dr. Leo Motzkin, noted Jewish statesman and outstanding protagonist of the nationalist conception of Jewish minority rights, who died here yesterday at the age of 66. Dr. Motzkin had been in ill health for several years and succumbed yesterday to a sudden heart attack.

Dr. Motzkin had been present at every international gathering at which matters pertaining to the Iews were under consideration, for over a score of years. At all of those he fought carnestly for his conception of the Jews as a national minority with their religious and cultural development safeguarded by international treaties and obliga-tions. The advent of the Hitler regime in Germany, with its consequent assault on the Jewish rights for which he fought came as a great shock to him and he was among the

Samuel Levy was returned to office as Borough President of Manhattan. Henry Hesterberg, in a starding election up-set, was defeated for Borough President of Brookley.

Justice Samuel I. Rosenman was returned to the Supreme Court bench. In Brooklyn, Aaron L. Jacoby was elected Register. In Manhattan, with returns incomplete, frying Ben Cooper, Fusion candidate, was apparently defeated for City Court Justice.

of his health, Dr. Motzkin, after his success at Geneva, took a leading part in the Eighteenth World Zionist Congress at Prague, at which, as at many previous congresses, he served as president of the congress and as chairman of the Actions Committee of the World Zionist Organization. Respected and admired by all Zionist factions, his tact and diplomacy were frequently called upon during the congress to prevent serious splits between the various groups. He was elected chairman of the Administrative Committee of the Jewish Agency for Palestine, the body representing Jewry in negotia-tions with the League of Nations and Great Britain concerning Pal-

He was also a prime mover, with American leaders, in the World Jewish congress held at Geneva in September to plan action in behalf of the Jews of Germany.

He was head of the Jewish delegation which declined to attend the National Minorities Congress because the congress could not agree considered to the control of the conmany for its violation of Jewish minority rights. Although the Jewish delegation did not attend the congress, Dr. Motzkin was elected to a post on the congress executive election.

Dr. Motzkin's death came as a severe blow to Jewish leaders here. Representatives of all the Zionist parties formed a committee to arrange for the funeral services. Interment will be in Montparnasse cemetery and it is expected that the body will be sent to rest in Palestine at a later date.

Dickstein Studies Status of Schmitt, New Nazi Agent Here to Unite Stahlhelm

Representative Samuel Dickstein, conductor of a House investigation of Nazi affairs in the United States, yesterday combed the immigration credentials of Captain George Schmitt, Hitlerite delegate to the Stahlhelm organizations in this

country. Schmitt, admittedly here for the purpose of coordinating the Ameri-can Stahlhelms with the Nazi Party in Germany, has decided it is unnecessary to present his credentials to the State Department. His decision to assume the status of an unofficial visitor to the United States came after conference with the German Consul-General in New York. The decision to withhold credentials from the United States Government comes while federal officers are still searching for Heinz Spanknoebel, fugitive head of Nazi organizations in this country, who is wanted for having failed to announce his official capacity to the State Department.

It is understood that Representative Dickstein's investigation into the entrance of Schmitt is being undertaken with a view toward discovering whether or not the Hitlerite agent falls into the same category of officials as Spanknoebel. In the event that he does, action is anticipated by the leader of the House committee.

Steuben Society Silent On German Day Plans

While plans for the entertainment of attendants at the projected German Day celebration at the Madison Square Garden on December 6 have been drawn up, no mention was made as late as yesterday as to decorations of the hall nor of the speakers who were being invited to address those present.

Meanwhile Jewish leaders in New York have decided to take no action against the celebration pending completion of the program. It is understood, however, that should the swastika flag be displayed at the celebration, or should Ambassador Hans Luther be invited to speak, a situation which would call for the display of the Hitler emblem, Jews will not attend and protests will be

offered by German-Jewish groups against the staging of the affair. According to plans reached at a meeting of the Steuben Society, sponsors of the fete, and delegates of many German vereins, the entertainment program will consist of a ball, and numbers by various singing societies. The press was excluded from the conference at which these

London Conference Value In Its Potentialities, Says James W. Wise, Delegate

The London conference for the relief of German Jews was signifi-cant in its potentialities rather than in accomplishments, said James Waterman Wise, editor of the monthly magazine, Opinion, on his return on the French liner Champlain, after having represented the American Jewish Congress at the London conference.

"The problem was placed squarely before world Jewry," said Mr. Wise. "The conference, if it was not to have been held in vain, must be followed by constructive action. "It is significant, because it is the

first time that the so-called power-ful Jewish organizations of Europe and the United States have taken common counsel with the representatives of the Jewish masses.

"One of the most important insights gained in London was the need of a powerful, effective world Jewish Congress. A Congress which would dare to deal with the issues such as the whole complex of political questions, which the London conference could not or would not con-

"If the London conference will have served as a training ground for preparing Jewish leadership to meet with and come to understand and respect the opinion of the Jewish masses, it will have proven well worth while," said Mr. Wise.

(Continued from Page 1) by Mrs. Sima Arlosoroff, the Zionist leader's widow, who was a witness to her husband's murder, revolving around identification of Stavsky and Rosenblatt as the alleged murderers, came in for sharp criticism.

Identification of Stavsky as one of the assailants through identification of his foot-prints by an Arab tracker employed by the police was criti-cized by the defense attorneys, who charged that the witness and another tracker had been present at police headquarters and had seen Stavsky before picking him out of an identification parade. On this ground, the defense asserted, the tracker's

testimony was inadmissible. Identification of Staysky's coat as the one worn by one of the alleged murderers by Mrs. Arlosoroff was legally not corroborative, according

to the defense. In arguing for dismissal of charges against Achimeir, the defense declared that not only was there no evidence of incitement to murder by this defendant but that Achimeir, in his beliefs, was strongly opposed to individual acts of violence and ter-

The hearing was adjourned until November 15, 16 and 22, when the defense will be given further opportunity of being heard.

American Jewish Year Book. 1933 Edition, Is Published

The Jewish population of Palestine has increased by 90,816 in a ten-year period since 1922, according to the latest Palestine census begun in November, 1931 which is begun in November, 1931 which is reported and analyzed in the 1933 edition of the American Jewish Year Book. This is the thirty-fifth volume of the Year Book which is published annually by the Jewish Publication Society of America, of the American Jewish Committee of the American Jewish Committee of New York by Harry Schndederman, assistant secretary.

The total population of Palestine at the date of the census was 1,035,-821. Of this number, 759,712 were Mohammedans, 174,610 were Jews, 91,389 were Christians and 10,101 were persons of other religions. A table listing the languages habitually spoken in Palestine in 1931, brings out the fact that while Jews speak over ten languages, 94.59 per cent of all Jews speak Hebrew, and 2,216 Jews speak Arabic; only eight Mo-hammedans speak Hebrew.

Ii addition to the section dealing with the population figures in Pales-tine, the Year Book contains a review of Jewish events of the twelvemonth period, from September 21, 1932 to September 9, 1933. This article, written by Mr. Schneiderman, is devoted in the main to a resume of the events in Germany and their reprecussions in other lands.
