Palestine Govt. Launches Wide Drive on Illegal Jewish Immigrants (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

IERUSALEM, Nov. 16-The widest round-up campaign ever undertaken in Palestine is getting under way here as the government of Palestine opens its campaign against Jewish tourists who remain in Palestine illegally. The campaign is beginning in Jerusalem, where even hotels are raided at midnight in the search for persons illegally in the country.

The campaign against illegal Jewish immigration into Palestine is assuming the character of a mass hunt. Last Thursday, Sir Philip Cunliffe-Lister, Secretary of State for the Colonies in the MacDonald cabinet, announced in the British House of Commons, that the strictest measures would be taken against tour-ists who remained in Palestine and against all others, who came into Palestine in an illegal fashion.

Control of the Palestine frontiers control of the raissant frontiers has been tightened, but only passports held by the Jews are being examined. Patrols of British and Arab constables and motor-boat patrols are engaged in a country-wide check-up, to capture as many of the illegal entrants as possible. In addition, the Palestine government has offered rewards for the capture of offenders.

Nazi Influence Deprives German-Jewish Refugees of Work in Other Countries

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) LONDON, Nov. 16-The policy of the German government is to

persecute German-Jewish refugees and to prevent their employment even in other countries, it was revealed today to the Jewish Tele-graphic Agency. It was learned that the German government is using every means to induce other com-

every means to induce other coun-tries to abstain from engaging ref-ugee Jews.

As a result of this policy, the plan to settle a number of Jewish doctors in Egypt has failed. After lengthy negotiations, the Egyptian govern-ment sent a special emissary to Ber-lin to interview displaced Jewish scientists. However, the Nazi gov-ernment succeeded in inducing the Egyptian emissary to employ Nazi doctors instead.

Similarly, the Nazi government is now trying to persuade the Turkish government not to employ a group of forty doctors who petitioned the Turkish government for employment in hospitals.

It is hoped that the Turkish government, unlike that of Egypt, will not submit to Nazi influence, although, already the Turkish government, out of a desire to compromise with the Nazi wishes, has engaged fifteen Jewish professors for the new clinic, established by the government, instead of the contemplat-ed engagement of thirty Jews. Havana Jews Under Reign Of Terror as Troops Search Quarter for Hidden Arms (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

HAVANA, Cuba, Nov. 16-Arrests of Havana Jews on charges that they are manufacturing bombs for the use of the opponents of the Grau San Martin regime, and firing from the roofs on Cuban army patrols, are continuing.

The Jewish quarter is in a state of continual terror. Army patrols search the Jewish section night and day for hidden arms which the "Jew-polakos", as Jews are known in Cuba, are alleged to have hidden. There have been numerous cases of robberies. Jewish homes, stores, and even Jews on the streets,

The Jewish merchant, Jacob Altshul, was taken away by an army detachment, told that he was going to be shot, and only released when he gave the soldiers forty dollars, it was learned.

Anothor Jew, whose name is Blank, is reported to have been severely beaten by soldiers in his own home. The soldiers are alleged to have robbed him of a number of gold articles and a sum of money. The residents of the Havana

suburb, Buenavista, are collecting signatures on a petition to deport (Continued on Page 4)

Alfred E. Smith Urges U. S. To Admit German Refugees

Alfred E. Smith, in an article entitled "Can We Make Room for the Refugees?" in November's Outlook, discusses our immigration laws and the necessity for allowing those Jews, Liberals and Socialists, who have suffered under the present German government, entry into our

country. He writes: "I am fully aware of the persuasive arguments for cutting down unrestricted immigration into this country. I have always suspected, however, that some of the more drastic provisions of our laws and some of the national quotas which were established were fixed on the basis of fantastic Arvan theories rather than American principles. The theory that only people of Protestant extraction from the north of Europe can absorb our ideals and understand the spirit of our institutions has suffered a rude shock since the World War. Recents events in Europe have blasted this theory along with a lot of others. In spite of these events, however, some of our patriotic societies continue to entertain strange notions of the exclusive uses which the Almighty intended that this continent, so long bidden from the rest of the world, should be put for the benefit of mankind. "Whatever may be our ideas as

to immigration, we have before us now a demand for asylum for a limited number of German refugees which we cannot ignore. Many of these Germans are people of superior education and great ability who, if intelligently distributed over the country, will be an invaluable asset to the communities in which they settle. It is not unlikely that among them will be found men like Carl Schurz, one of our most distin-guished statesmen, and Dr. Abraham Jacobi, who was for so many years at the head of the American medical profession, both of whom were driven over here from Germany in 1848. It is to be assumed also that adequate funds will be provided by responsible groups and societies to insure that these people will not become public charges, and that they will be given a proper start in life

"The test of neighborliness made in time of want and trouble. We must uphold our traditions and vindicate the principles on which this nation was established by mak-ing room here for our share of the refugees from Germany. We shall never regret it."

Citizenship Law Changes On Race Basis, Frank Says (Icwish Telegraphic Agency)

Citizenship will be replaced by membership in the nation and racial membership, Dr. Frank declared, adding amid cheers "we German lawyers who profess anti-Semitism are not Jew-haters, but lovers of the German people

Committee Studies Plans To Offer German-Jewish Children Sheiter Here

Preliminary plans for the relief of German Jews who may possibly want to find homes in the United States for their children are under consideration here by the Committee on German-Jewish Immigration Policy, a subcommittee of the Joint Council on German-Jewish Persecutions. Represented on the committee are the American Jewish Com-mittee, the American Jewish Congress and B'nai B'rith

The subcommittee has itself appointed a subcommittee to investi-gate the question of how to bring aid to the Jews in Germany. committee's main task will be first to ascertain how many of the German-Jewish children in Germany are likely to desire entry here and how they can be provided for in appro-priate individual homes. \$750,000 Haifa Expenditure Heid Up by Labor Shortage (Tewish Telegraphic Agency)

HAIFA, Palestine, Nov. 16-The Nesher cement works, which is desirous of investing about 150,000 pounds (about \$750,000) in the expansion of its works, is unable to age of labor, it was learned vesterday.

At the same time, the Palestine government, over the bitter protest of the Jewish organizations, is drastically curtailing the number of Jewish immigrants permitted to enter Palestine. Recently, the Exceutive of the Jewish Agency for Pal-estine asked the government for some twenty four thousand im-migration certificates for the period between October 1933, and March 1934. However, the government granted only some 5,000 odd cer-tificates, claiming that that number represented the absorptive canacity of Palestine.

Hungary Bans Swastika Party in Berettyo Area (Tewish Telegraphic Agency)

BUDAPEST, Hungary, Nov. 16-Hungarian authorities today dissolved the swastika party in the district of Berettyo, sealing the Nazi premises.

The violent demonstrations staged by the anti-Semitic students against the Jews in the city of Debrecen, continue unabated. Hitlerite slo-gans are being freely used by the anti-Semites, thus revealing from which quarters the demonstrations are being organized.

Recently the university suspended

all classes because of anti-Semitic outbreaks. Jews were openly as-saulted on the streets by sympathizers of the Nazi students.

It was decided that pending the celebration of German Day in Madison Square Garden on December 6 and another celebration for all German-Americans of Greater New York in Brooklyn at the Labor Lycum on November 26, little would be done in view of the possible consequences to these demonstrations.

The Brooklyn affini is under the direction of the United German Societies of Brooklyn. The United German Societies of New York were sponsors of the German Day celbration scheduled for the 165th Regiment Armory last month, which was suspended by Mayor O'Brien when he became convinced that the occasion was to be used as an attempt to propagandize Hitler's anti-Semitism.

The committee in charge of the Brooklyn demonstration is Theodor Schmidt, president; Paul Marx, secretary; George Beatzel, and Fritz Kaelber. Another committee was appointed to report on the program for the German Day celebra-

tion in Manhattan.

Representatives of the Steuben Society, sponsors of the German Day celebration, attended the meeting and called upon all German-Americans to turn out for the celebration as a matter of patriotism toward the German element in the

United States.

It was decided that a powerful thrust be made by all German-Americans and all German-American organizations against subversive elements.

The meeting received with frequent expressions of bitterness a report by the president of the Platt-deutsche Societies on an editorial recently appearing in a Brooklyn daily newspaper in which an anti-

German boycott was advocated.
