Zionists of All Factions in Tide of Protests Against Immigration Restrictions

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) SALONICA, Greece, Dec. 4-The Revisionists, right wing Zionists; the Mizrachi, orthodox group; the youth Mizrachi, and the Radical Zionists pooled their resources at a joint meeting here and voiced their demand for annulment of immigra-tion restrictions established by the British government in Palestine.

The meeting also demanded abolition of the certificate system which admits a limited number of workers at stated periods. It was resolved to urge the convocation of the Actions Committee of the World Zionist Organization to form a coalition executive.

Million Bottles of Wine To Be Imported Here from Palestine Within 3 Years

A contract providing for the importation here of one million bottles of wines and liquor from Palestine during the next three years has been concluded between the famous Rishon-le-Zion wine cellars in Palestine founded by Baron Edmund de Rothschild, and the Distillers and Brewers Corporation of America, a \$15,000,000 concern, the Jewish Tele-

SIQUELUM CONCETT, the Jewish Tele-graphic Agency reported yesterday. The first shipment being made under the contract is of 5,000 cases of liquor, according to Harry Mottsman, president and general manager of the Dand B. Import Corporation, subsidiary of the Distillers and Brewers Comparison of Americs Mr. Corporation of America. Mr. Mottsman and Gustave Wilder, representative of the Palestine wine cellars, concluded the agreement after negotiations in which Israel B. Brodie and Robert Szold of the American-Palestine Economic Committee assisted.

Plots Extensive Program (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

CLEVELAND, Dec. 4-Final preparations in the campaign to establish Yiddish as a national tongue and tie it up with Jewish culture, were made at the concluding sessions of the second conference of the Midwest Region of the Jewish Culture Society which opened here on Friday.

The agenda of the convention included eleven points of action which emphasize the utilitarian aspect of the Yiddish language in keeping alive the spirit of Judaism.

The convention decided first to

form a cooperative publishing com-pany for Yiddish authors, and to urge the Yiddish press to give as much consideration as possible to Yiddish culture.

Subsequent points adopted in resolutions stress the need for arousing interest among thickly populated Jewish cities and areas in the United States, in colonization projects. Dramatic studios are to be established as well as reading circles whose purpose it will be to disseminate knowledge of the language. Translations into Yiddish from other tongues without credit to their au-thors was protested. Youth groups will be encouraged to master Yiddish, and in this connection periodi-cals will be published for them.

Also the convention resolved to extend financial aid to the Yiddish Scientific Institute in Wilno, Poland, and help its publication, the Kinder Journal.

Resolutions were passed protesting the German anti-Jewish atrocities and encouraging support of the boycott of German-made goods. America's recent rapprochement with Rus-

sia was praised. The matter of establishing Yiddish schools in Palestine was under discussion, although no action was Rothenberg Confers With taken.

Steps were taken to organize midwest dramatic and music societies and literary clubs as a means of encouraging a spread of Yiddish.

The Society celebrated the twenty-fifth anniversary of the Czerno-witz conference held in Roumania in 1908 at which time Yiddish was officially declared the Jewish national language.

The next convention of the Society is scheduled to be held in Detroit next October. Morris Kaplan, of Chicago, was named new district secretary.

Jews Barred from Trade In Christmas Accessories

(Tewish Telegraphic Agency) BERLIN, Dec. 4-Commerce in the annual Christmas trading was moved into the sphere of Aryan business today when an order was published prohibiting Jews from selling evergreen trees, crosses, angels, stars and other religious symbols. Nor are Jewish merchants to be permitted to use any of these symbols on wrapping boxes or paper. The order was issued by the All-German Chamber of Commerce. Open Door Policy for Jews in Palestine Favored By British Labor Party

Holding to its view that the gates of Palestine must be kept open to as many Jews as the absorptive capacity of the country permits, the British Labor party, in a cable to the National Labor Convention for Palestine, which concluded its threeday conference Sunday night at the Pennsylvania Hotel, said it welcomes "in particular the opportunity afforded to German Jews who are eager to escape from oppressive Hitler regime.

After expressing "fraternal greet-ings and best wishes" to the conference, the cablegram says that the La-bor party watched "with greatest interest the steady growth of Labor Zionist institutions" during the last fourteen years. The message cites the development of labor settlement schools in the Holy Land as an in-

stance of this growth. "Prominent members in our movement", continues the message, "recently visited Palestine and returned with enthusiastic praise for all branches of work being done by the Jewish labor pioneers. We know that difficulties remain and more must be done to win Arab cooperation. But the work is pro-ceeding along the right lines. "British labor reaffirms its deter-

15,000 Chicagoans Pledge Support of Nazi Boycott At Meeting of All Faiths (Jewish Daily Bulletin)

CHICAGO, Dec. 4-Fifteen thousand persons joined the boycott of German-made products and lined up with the forces opposing Adolf Hitler and the Nazi government, when they gave voice to their condemnation of the Nazi regime at a mass meeting held in the Chicago Stadium yesterday afternoon. Cheering the speakers who phras-

ed their attacks on Hitlerism in scathingly denunciatory language, the crowd, assembled by the Chicago Committee for the Defense of Human Rights Against Naziism, eagerly approved the labels prominent leaders of Jewry, Protestantism and Catholicism used to describe the present power in the Third Reich.

The boycott was enthusiastically given the support of the crowd "un-

given the support of the crown un-til the curse of Nazism is weeded out of the German government." Speakers insisted that the assem-blage was one of Americans, and not of Jews and Christians, who were simply organizing against a threat to their liberty.
