Roumanian King Attacks Discrimination, Urges Work for Common Good

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) BUCHAREST, Dec. 20 - King Carol of Roumania today publicly expressed disapproval of racial and religious discriminations in kingdom and declared that they would not be tolerated.

"Our desire for peace in our in-ternational relations," the Rouman-ian ruler declared in a press interview today, "necessitates the en-forcement of peace also in my country where all citizens, regardless of their race or religion, are urged by me to work for the common good." The king's remarks were taken as

definite assurance that racial and religious discriminations would not be tolerated in Roumania and as tacit approval of the actions of the Duca government in banning the anti-Semitic, anti-government organizations.

Rothenberg Denies Reports Of German-Pelestine Deal

Morris Rothenberg, president of the Zionist Organization of America and co-chairman of the Council of the Jewish Agency for Palestine, yesterday issued a statement denying that any responsible agency in Pal-estine had contracted an agreement with the German government where-by the latter would increase its orange import from Palestine in return for greater exports of German goods to that country.

Mr. Rothenberg's statement was issued on the basis of an assurance forwarded to him by the Vaad Leumi, the Jewish National Council of Palestine.

His statement follows:

"Because of distorted information that appeared in the American press with regard to an alleged agreement between the Jewish orange-growers of Palestine and the German gov-ernment, an inquiry was made of the Jewish National Council of Palestine, the highest authority repre-senting the Jewish people in Pales-tine, which states that no exchange agreement exists.

'It had been reported that an important grower or group of growers had entered into an agreement with the German government regarding the export of oranges in exchange for German goods that would be imported in Palestine. The Jewish National Council states that a plan to that effect was worked out by an official of the German government, who obtained the aid of a minor Jewish merchant toward carrying out the scheme. But the plan was unanimously rejected by all responsible individuals and firms in Palestine as being inadvisable and con-trary to the best Jewish interests."

2.500 Attend Federation Rally at Waldorf-Astoria

More than 2,500 persons attended the largest rally ever held by the Federation for the Support of Jew-ish Philanthropic Societies at the Hotel Waldorf-Astoria Tuesday Hotel Waldorf-Astoria Tuesday night. The purpose of the meeting was to place on sale minutes, at \$11 apiece, proceeds of which will augment the fund being raised for the support of ninety-one affiliates. The sum of eleven dollars represents the Federation operating cost for one minute.

Announcement was made that on Jan. 24 a concert will be held at Madison Square Garden where the drive to raise \$4,200,000 will be wound up.

Philanthropies Benefit From Blumenthal Estate

Hebrew philanthropic organizations received requests amounting to \$14,000 from the will of Robert G. Blumenthal, who died on January 14 of this year, according to appraisal by the Transfer Tax Department made yesterday.

Mr. Blumenthal left a gross estate totaling \$741,735 and a net estate of \$633,456. The principal assets consisted of stocks and bonds amounting to \$509,023.

Mr. Blumenthal bequeathed \$5,000 to Mt. Sinai Hospital, requesting that this sum be added to the Anna M. and Gustav Blumenthal endow-M. and Gustav Bilmmentral endowment created by the late Gustav Blumenthal, who died in 1919; \$0,000 to Montefiore Hospital; \$2,500 to the Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies; \$1,000 to the Employees Association of Commercial Factories and \$500 to the Henry Street Settlement.

The balance of the fund went to Mrs. Dorothy S. Blumenfeld, his widow, who lives at 930 Park Avenue. Provision was made for relatives, friends and former employees,

Jewish Ex-Soldiers Form Federation in Germany; Aims to Preserve Rights

(J.T.A. Special Correspondence) BERLIN, Nov. 26-The part which the Jews who as front-fighters dur-ing the War are exempt from the anti-Jewish discrimination in Germany are playing in the general struggle of German Jewry to retain struggle of German Jewry to retain their status of equality, was ex-plained to a gathering of press rep-resentatives here by the leaders of the Federation of Jewish Ex-Soldiers.

Dr. Ernst Rosenthal, who is in charge of the War-Disabled Welfare Department, told the press men that the negotiations with the qualified authorities in this field of work justified the expectation that the treatment of the Jewish war wounded will not in future be in any way different from that of the non-Jewish war-wounded.

The work of dealing with the Ine work of dealing with the Jewish war-wounded has, in agreement with the National Socialist War-wounded Federation, been placed in the hands of the Federation of Jewish Ex-Soldiers, he said.

Walter Beck, who is in charge of the Sports and Athletic Section, said that the participation of Jewish athletes for years past in the general clubs had contributed to a better understanding of the Jew, and the Jews therefore found a larger meas-ure of understanding in athletic cir-

cles than elsewhere.

The Federation of Jewish Ex-Soldiers organized its own sports clubs not to foster segregation from non-Iews, he went on, but to provide a foothold for those Jews who were

Honor American Jew Who Founded Rome Institute (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

ROME. Dec. 20-A tablet was unveiled here today at the International Agricultural Institute in honor of its founder, David Lubin, an American Jew, who established the Institute in 1904, after having been received in audience by King Victor Emanuel.

The president of the Institute, Prince Spada Potenziani, former Governor of Rome, paid a tribute to the services rendered by Lubin to science and agriculture by the establishment of a first rank school such as the Institute.

Mr. Lubin, who was born in Pol-and in 1849, went to the United States in 1855. After a successful career in business, he became intercareer in business, ne became inter-sested in Palestine and agriculture as a livelihood for Jews. In 1904, fol-lowing a trip to Palestine, he came to Rome, was received by the king, and founded the International Agri-cultural Institute. He died in Rome in 1919.

Japs Supplant Germans In American Toy Trade, Says Berliner Tageblatt (Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

BERLIN, Dec. 20-German exports of Christmas toys to the United States has been replaced this year by the import of Japanese toys as a result of the Jewish boycott of German goods, the Berliner Tageblatt declared today, disclosing that German toy sales in America are a half million dollars less than

last year. Germany, which formerly occupied first place in American toy imports, the Tageblatt stated, declined from fifty-one percent to thirty-four perentire American import of toys.

4.449 Jews Admitted to Palestine in October

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) JERUSALEM, Dec. 20—Government figures published today disclose that 4,572 persons settled in Palestine during the month of October.

The number includes 4,449 Jews, of whom 410 were immigrants entering in the capitalist classification which requires a cash fund of one thousand pounds and 32 were Jew-ish tourists who had their status

legalized after arrival. The number of tourists who were refused permission to remain permanently totaled 136.

The figures do not include Arabs who entered Palestine from Transjordania during the month, as there are no restrictions imposed on such immigration.

Gov't Immigration Policy Aggravates Labor Dearth In Growth of Holy Land (J.T.A. Special Correspondence)

JERUSALEM, Nov. 27-M. Novomeysky, managing director of Palestine Potash, Ltd., the company working the Dead Sea minerals concession, recently published an ar-ticle in the Palestine Post, warning the Palestine government against precipitating an economic crisis by its over-cautious immigration policy.

"At the end of last year," writes Mr. Novomeysky, "the country had apparently just sufficient labor to cover its requirements. There was no large surplus available for incent compared to last year. Japan-ese imports, however, rose from half of January, 1933, the situation thirty-nine to sixty percent of the semi-skilled labor could be found only with difficulty. By the end of August, the position had become still worse, and in the report to the board of directors of Palestine Potash, Ltd., it was stated that one of the reasons for delay in fulfilling the approved extension program was the scarcity of labor in Palestine.

"At the end of September the situation was critical. Some of the workmen who had been employed for over three years began to leave and about a quarter of them had left by the end of October, attracted by the considerably higher wages offered in the towns. There was actually a competitive race for labor between the various industrial enterprises, a rare event in presentday world economic conditions.

At the same time the effect of the old common activities of Jews and non-Jews in the same clubs was still evident today in the fact that they knew of many Christian sport clubs that would be willing to play matches against Jewish teams, if the opportunity were given them.

The sports section of the Federation of Jewish Ex-Soldiers now numbers, after six or seven months, seventy clubs with over 6,000 active

members.

"We are not thinking of fighting the Zionist sports clubs," he continued. "For that reason we are re-fusing to admit Zionist clubs so that there should not be the slightest ground for suspicion that we are trying to put obstacles in the way of the development of the Maccabee movement.

The excellent relations which exist between us and the Maccabees, he said, "are demonstrated by the fact that both our Federations worked in conjunction in the negotiations which have resulted in our official recognition by the Reich Sports leadership.

"It is regrettable," he said, "that we have not yet found any Maocenas for the new Jewish sport clubs, to anything like the same extent that they existed in the general clubs in the past. We must still do a great deal of work to bring this need home to the Jews concerned."
