

\$25 a Plate Dinner For Hospital Drive

Beth David Seeks to Raise
\$25,000 at Hotel Astor
January 14

The Beth David Hospital has launched its annual drive for funds for the sale of tickets for the \$25-plate dinner which will be held January 14, at the Hotel Astor, according to an announcement made yesterday by Arthur L. Levine, president of the institution.

Mr. Levine, who has for many years been identified with the work of the hospital, has announced that the Beth David expects to raise \$25,000 as a result of this dinner.

The event, which will be patronized by many communal leaders in Greater New York, is the fund-raising instrument of the Beth David Hospital, a non-sectarian institution situated at Lexington Avenue and 13th Street. It is expected that enough funds will be raised to maintain the hospital for the coming year and to insure at least 15,000 free hospital days to needy patients.

In a statement issued by Mr. Levine, he made it clear that while the institution professes the tenets of the laws according to the orthodox Jewish tradition, its services are extended to all who are in need of care, race, color or creed, and that "because the hospital is so completely non-sectarian in Jewish, it has proven to be a veritable haven for Jewish medical students."

"The Beth David Hospital," Mr. Levine continued, "is completely staffed and supported by Jews. At present, more than 100 Jewish doctors and nurses are employed at the hospital and its laboratories, but it is the dream of the Board of Trustees to have in the not too distant future, a bigger and better building for the research activities of the medical board."

Hitler-Goering Rift Hinted by Writer

Prague Paper Publishes Article Showing Rift Within Party for Control

It is generally known that for several years past, there have been serious differences among the National Socialist leaders, writes Chronos in "Die Wahrheit" of Prague. To be sure, "none of the rifts actually reaches the outside world, and the disagreements and intrigues should not be overestimated; in the first place they are mostly of a more or less personal nature, and in the second place, they do not yet have any external effect."

Nevertheless, a number of the incidents which occurred lately are of interest. The mysterious death of the astrophysicist, Dr. Gertman Labor Front, Reinhold Muchow, is especially worthy of note. The official explanation of the case is more than suspicious. Ostensibly, one of the higher Nazi functionaries, Maehling, who was sitting in a chair at the dinner table of the chow, Ley and others, butted his head against a corner of the table; the revolver was thus discharged, thus fatally wounding Muchow. Well, for one thing it is customary to carry a revolver securely; besides, it is hardly likely that a bullet would happen only once in a hundred times that the shot from a revolver, the muzzle of which points downward, should take a horizontal direction.

Besides this, which suggests a "Fehme" murder, the wholesale dismissal of the faithful which is taking place in various parts of Germany should be taken into consideration. Thus the Hessian Minister of Education, Werner was suddenly removed from his post, "by his own request", of course. At the same time there is a report that "still further changes in personnel" are imminent in Hessen.

Similar things are reported from Saxony, where an especially lively game of intrigue between the Minister-President and Storm Troop leader Von Killinger on the one hand, and the Reich Governor of Saxony on the other hand is in progress.

Chicago Jewish Lads Put on the Gloves

Jewish Youth Movement Sponsors
All-Round Athletic Program for Boys Over 16

CHICAGO, Jan. 5.—An all-round athletic program is being sponsored by the newly-organized Jewish organized Youth movement here with headquarters at the Jewish People's Institute. Jewish boys and girls of Chicago and the entire state are invited to join in its activities.

Well known characters of the sport world have volunteered to support the athletic committee of the J. O. Y. in promoting its first athletic event, a boxing tournament to be held next month at the gymnasium of the Jewish People's Institute.

Danny Spunt, featherweight boxer of other days, will help coach the boys. Harry Garbell, 138-pound Glove champion in 1929, also will coach, as well as Leonard J. Sterling, sports announcer for the Illinois Athletic Commission. General A.A. and the Chicago Gloves, Jimmy Medill, former lightweight contender, and John Penn, formerly of Cincinnati, who did most of his fighting in the east.

Al Schwartz, captain of the 1932 American Olympic swimming team and former Northwestern University, Illinois Athletic Club and J.P.I. swimming star, also promised to tip the new organization.

All amateur boxers of Jewish nationality are eligible for the tournament provided they are physically fit and 16 years of age or older. The participants will be divided into two classes, novice and championship and will include all weights from featherweight at 112 pounds to heavyweight at 175 pounds.

A little bug that whispers in every man's ear and is widely known as the wanderlust, has been a faithful companion to Joseph Leon Ben-David, who sailed for America for fourteen years.

He was mastered so completely in fact that to this day although his folks are still urging him to "settle down" and "get married" and take a share in his father's cloak and suit business, he insists on wandering further.

"Joseph Leon Ben-Morris, however, is not of the ordinary run of wanderers. He has capitalized on his achievements. He has won the much-disputed title of King of the Hoboes by acclamation of the Hoboes Union which holds conventions occasionally; he has been the recipient of letters from American Presidents and a Canadian Prime Minister; he has been photographed by Paramount News Reel; he is writing a book of his experiences; he possesses—if nothing else—a neat collection of clippings on himself.

In Line With the Kings

The uncrowned head nodded in assent when asked whether he isn't weary of the open road. "I live in Brooklyn with my family," he said. "I have two sisters and two brothers. 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OFFERED CITY POST

Progress Slow in Jewish Crimean Settlement

(J.T.A. Special Correspondence)
MOSCOW, Dec. 20.—There are several shortcomings in the Jewish autonomous region of Freidorf in the Crimea, particularly the large re-emigration of over 30 percent of the new arrivals, M. Gutman, secretary of the Freidorf Regional Party Committee, reported to the president of the Jewish colonization society, Ozet. It was the first time that the head of a party organization has reported to the Ozet on his region, the usual procedure being to report only to the higher party bodies in the area.

The chief reason for the re-emigration, he explained in the report was that the local Ozet groups are sending large numbers of men under sentence because of their lack of qualifications for the work involved. Another difficulty, he declared, was the lack of accommodation.

There is a great shortage of labor in the Jewish collective farms in Freidorf, he added. Consequently it is not possible to cultivate all available land, and the standard of work is not high. The task of the Ozet is to get the Jews in the collective farms, and build houses, he stated.

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EDITORIALS

A Courageous Precedent

The secular year 1934 opened rather brightly in Germany, of all places. No edict was promulgated by Adolf Hitler to the effect that the persecution of the Jews constituted a ghastly mistake and a blotch on Germania's escutcheon, and was hereby rescinded. But a courageous note was struck by Cardinal Faulhaber, the Catholic prelate whose cathedral is Munich, in his New Year sermon. While there is a Faulhaber, there is the hope that the words of the minority cannot be choked off.

This prelate, who is a member of a German family of title, one who is neither a social nor racial upstart, devoted the greater part of his sermon to the slashing attacks on the Nordic myth. The old Aryan tribesmen were not, as that un-Nordic-looking person Goebbels would like us to believe, God's noblemen. They were a pretty dirty and mean lot, it appeared. They were, the Cardinal told one of the largest audiences that ever got inside the doors of St. Michael's Cathedral, stoical, kept slaves, presumably an Asiatic habit; were self-indulgent and forced their women to do much harder work than that which is involved in taking in washing. And then the Cardinal pointed out, the Babylonians had perfected a postal system and the Jews an educational organization. "Let it not be forgotten," he said, "that we were saved not by German blood, but by the blood of the Saviour," meaning Jesus, who cannot be represented as anything but a Jew even by twisted reasoning of the Aryan ethnologists.

Cardinal Faulhaber expressed his aversion to the attempt to base a confession of faith on the apostasy of the New Testament injunction of Jesus to his disciples to teach and baptize all peoples and unite all nations in a Kingdom of God.

There are so many elements of paganism in the Nazi psychology and mythology, that in speaking up against the Hitlerian intrusions in the religious life of Germany, Cardinal Faulhaber is waging the fight of a Christian. For one of the tenets of Christianity is that a man, or woman, has the right to choose his way to God, and to seek salvation, and that his choice is not to be delimited for him by his race. Hitlerism, in an amended form, might be found acceptable to Catholics and Protestants, but in its present form, with its racial mythology, no fearless Catholic and no fearless Protestant can accept it—for the simple reason that it is based on the Jewish-Christian concept that a man's race has nothing to do with his will and his capacity to save himself and enter the (Christian) Kingdom of God. Hitlerism, with its mythology,

cuts off from the hope of salvation and election tens of millions of human beings who would otherwise be acceptable. It destroys the assumption on which missionary efforts are based. Therefore when a Christian clergyman speaks up against Hitlerism he is affirming his Christianity, and when a Christian clergyman pretends to accept Hitlerism—as so many have—he is simply cowardly, a time-server, and temporarily at least, not a Christian.

Another Surrender

English colonial and mandatorial pride has bowed the neck again to Arab urgency. The English colonial government has in effect repudiated and apologized for its attempt to break the back of the Arab riots at Jaffa of October 27th. It has done this by repudiating the action of the responsible officer, Superintendent John A. M. Faraday, Jaffa police chief, who has just been ordered transferred to Beersheba, which action constitutes at the least demotion and rebuke. Jaffa is, despite its name, a city compared to which Beersheba is a wild frontier post. This demotion comes as the result of an inquiry by Attorney General Herbert, a member also of the Marston investigating commission which has been conducting an inquiry into the Arab riots, in secret, but has not yet issued its report.

The transfer of Superintendent Faraday is not the only concession made to Arab clamor. The hunt for Jewish tourists who were oversteering their leaves was most obviously instituted to quiet the Arabs, while at the same time, Trans-Jordan Arabs have been crossing the border without any by-your-leave from the authorities. It is on the whole difficult to avoid the conclusion that the Mandatory government welcomes the opportunity, extended to them by Arab demands, to restrict the rights of Jews to Jewish land, instead of seeking to limit that right to the Mandatory government to exercise a mandate over Palestine for the Jews.

A Little Quiet in Roumania

There is, for the moment, peace in Roumania. The five-day-old Cabinet of the times of Angeliac has yielded to one formed by M. Tatarescu, a young leader of the Liberal Party who accepted the Premiership only on condition that he be able to end the campaign of his slain leader, Ion G. Duca, shot to death by an Iron Guard student. This young man, Radu Constantinescu, after striking several heroic poses, was interrogated by police, before whom he expressed his conviction that he killed the Premier of Roumania not as a murderer, but as a patriot.

If we only get our fair share (for we surely don't receive less) of "unemployment, starvation, etc., stalking the world," don't we have to bear the added burden of suffering on account of being Jews? Does this not entitle us to be more irritated and cry out louder against the tormentors who specialize on us?

When demented Germany attempts to destroy us, it is our business to resist, in self-defense to protect and save ourselves, or must we delve first into the spirit motivating her ("a spirit not of perversity," as Mr. L. assures us)? If a criminal or maniac comes at us with a gun will you first start to psychoanalyze your attacker and study his background, or instantly grapple with him, or run for dear life (whichever you may find more expedient)? It is not our business to appear as the apologetic Jew, but to fight to the tooth and nail. Because liberals like Lloyd George and Shaw, who

are free for themselves to say as they please and the rest of us to follow, are "not altogether a demagogue of Hitlerism" shall we inquisitely our common sense, healthy instincts of life, and to these leaders?—I can still in Lloyd George running up and down England inflaming the mind of British people with his cry of "the Kaiser!" when Wilhelm had already abdicated and was an out of the way. Life of North American Jewry In Review

Philadelphians to Buy Palestine Acres For Persecution Victims

To Announce Details Today At Zionist Conference; Lipsky, Rothenberg to Speak

TO GET 1,000 DUNAMS

New Purchases to Be Made; Tract to Be Known as Nachlatz Philadelphia

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 5.—The Jewish community of Philadelphia is about to make a definite investment in Palestine. This investment is to be in the form of a tract of land to be known as the Philadelphia Homestead (Nachlatz Philadelphia) and to be settled as soon as expedient by immigrants from the various lands of persecution.

Details of the plan will be announced by Arthur Greenstein, member of the Pennsylvania State Legislature and recently elected Chairman of the Jewish National Fund Council of Philadelphia and vicinity at the all-day Zionist Conference to be held Sunday. At this conference the various aspects of Palestine development will be discussed, with special emphasis on the importance of strengthening existing Zionist institutions. The call for the conference was issued jointly by Morris Rothenberg, national president, and Rabbi Max D. Klein, Philadelphia chairman of the Zionist Organization of America.

Mr. Rothenberg and Louis Lipsky, national chairman of the American Palestine Campaign, will also speak at the conference, which will be attended by representatives of more than 40 Jewish communities in Eastern Pennsylvania, Southern New Jersey and Delaware.

Mr. Greenstein explained that the project which has already been approved by the Council will be known as "Nachlatz Philadelphia." The colony will be started with an initial purchase of 1,000 dunams to which other tracts will be added from time to time. "It is expected," Mr. Greenstein declared, "that the establishment of this Nachlatz Philadelphia will be not only a mark of honor, in recognition of this city's contribution to the rebuilding of the ancient homeland, but will also serve as a bond to tie the Jews of Philadelphia closer to their brothers and sisters in the Holy Land." The conference on Sunday, the plan will be formally presented and steps taken to dispose of as many dunams as possible during the month of January. The efforts will close early in February with a banquet, to which all contributors to the fund will be invited, and at which Nachlatz Philadelphia will become a fact.

The Philadelphia Council is composed of delegates from all the Zionist groups in the city. In it are represented the general Zionists, Hachad, Hachad Hachad, United Party Poale Zion-Zeire Zion, Jewish National Workers Alliance, Young Judea, Mizrahi, Gordonia, Young Judea, Alliance, Hashomer Hatzori, and representatives from Zionist organizations in neighboring communities.

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Connecticut College Institutes Course In Jewish History

Rabbi Morris Silverman to Give Instruction in Chronicle of Hebrew People

(J.D.B. Special Correspondence)

HARTFORD, Conn., Jan. 5.—Connecticut State College at Storrs, with 125 Jewish students, will add a two-credit course in Jewish history next February, becoming the first college in the state and one of the few in the country to formalize the subject. Rabbi Morris Silverman of Emanuel Synagogue here, has been named lecturer for the course which will cover the history of the Jewish people from early times to the present.

The undertaking has the endorsement of the Connecticut Council of Churches and Religious Education. Rabbi Silverman is well qualified for this task. He holds a master of arts degree from Columbia where he majored in history. He is a graduate of the Jewish Theological Seminary, president of the Connecticut branch of the United Synagogue and past president of the Ministers' Association of Hartford.

The spiritual contributions of the race; its social, cultural and economic life, under which prophecy, legend, mysticism and nationalism will be considered, are to be included in the course. Rabbi Silverman said. The background of ancient and modern civilizations with which the Jews have had contact and problems of adjustment will be discussed. The dark ages, Americanism, life in the new Palestine and the present status are also to be covered.

Discussions will predominate in the course. Rabbi Silverman said. He is considering what to use as a text. Rabbi Silverman has instructed a number of Hartford people who have volunteered to contribute books for the reference library.

It is the hope of the Hartford rabbi that other colleges and state institutions throughout the country will include courses in Jewish history.

Captain Gateries is a good soldier, but he is also an intelligent man, an English idea of a gallant gentleman. At the outbreak of the war, so to speak, the worthy captain is in Mainz, on the Rhine, and he is made to understand that the end occupation of the Rhineland is an international one. There is very delightful, but rather blood-tinged love affair between the French officer and the daughter of the German family on which he has been quartered, and it is partly through his daughter, and her influence on her mother, that we get a glimpse of young Germany. When, by command of Poincaré, the French troops enter the Ruhr cities, the situation is clear that no greater could have been made, and he is allowed to infer that the occupation of German territory by the French constituted the earliest injustice of the war. After the Occupation we accompany the grizzled captain to his home town, where, because of his knowledge, his heroism, and his honors, he becomes a teacher of history—and, unfortunately, for his cause, a pacifist. We see the captain Gateries trying to sow the seeds of peace in the growing gen-

eration; we see him striving to create a rapport between French and German youth. One of the results of his work is that three young Frenchmen refuse to serve when called to the colors, whereupon his colleagues, his mother, his wife and the family of his wife turn against him.

It is in the meantime becoming a friendship with the German pacifist editor, a Jew, Gustave Hoffmann, and it is from the lips of this editor—who had once prevented the French captain from being bayoneted by a German commandant in the Ruhr cities, and the Nazis and of their threat to peace. Sir Philip forces his conclusion by having Captain Gateries to Duesseldorf as Hoffman is preparing to flee and going down under a Nazi blueguard, going down never to rise again. He died for the German who had saved his life, he died bearing the cross of peace, he who had for so long survived the cross of war.

"The Cross of Peace" is chiefly interesting because it gives us a rapid survey of the past few years in the guise of a story which may be described as at least palatable. H.S.

Among the Literati

As a rule the enthusiasm of publishers for a manuscript is based on money rather than on saleability. Occasionally, however, a publisher becomes enamored of a title that finds ready response from both the public and critics. During the past year there were a number of such books, the outstanding example being "Anthony Adverse." This month he has another book, "The Knight of the Alley poor," Farrar & Rinehart are shoeing up its virtues with pages of trade advertisement. Another instance of publishers' faith was Phyllis Bentley's "Inheritance." Macmillan put about \$18,000 on the line for advertising before the book had sold 10,000 copies. Eventually the book paid for itself. I am expecting books by authors with records of sales behind them. Such writers as Alice Lewis, Wilfrid Cuthbert, Ferns and Kathleen Norton need no introduction to the public. It is only a few outsiders that need to be that a book by any one of these writers is about to appear. But take the case of Charles Morgan's "The Fountain of Youth." Morgan announced this book, Morgan was comparatively unknown to American readers. He was the confidence of Knopf that they predicted a sale of 50,000 copies a month before publication. As a matter of record they were only fifty percent enthusiastic enough. Other publishers' hunches had come through were "Crowded Out" by Alice Longworth, and "Testament of Youth" by Vera Brittain.

During the next few months publishers are again warning you of their prize books by new authors. Among the titles for which large sums are promised I find "The Fool of Venus" by George Gromy (Coffin, Friede); "L'Affaire Jancy" by Etlid Bernstein (Stokes); "Journey to the End of the Night" by Louis Ferdinand Celine (Little-Brown); "Pagan Adventure" by Peter Bannister (Doubleday); "The Americans" by Rosemary and Stephen Bennet and "Nynskys" by Ron-

ald Nynskys. It might be fun to watch these books and see how many of them reach the best seller lists.

Random Items

Walter Pitkin's very much kidded book, "More Power to You," has sold 35,000 copies up to the first of the year. Thomas Craven, who wrote "Men of Art," has finished another which he calls "Modern Art." Meyer Berger of the New York Times has definitely decided not to write the book about New York's better known gangsters but promises some day to write the story of the kid gangs of the city. . . . Alfred King, the publisher, claims to have a novel that will end the "pacifist" school of modern fiction. It is called "Mad Hatter's Village" and was written by Mary Cavendish Gore. A publisher has about as much chance of changing the public's taste as a Nazi at a Y.M.H.A. picnic. . . . "Taps on Tables" George Ross's book on New York restaurants, will contain descriptions of some of our better known eating places. George should know them. . . . The new Pearl Buck book, "The Mother," is not a sequel to the last "Good Earth" or "Sons." . . . The death of Jakob Wassermann came as a shock to the literati in New York. He had recently written to his publisher, outlining three new novels. . . . Emil Ludwig, prolific German biographer, has another publisher. His next book, "Nine Elches from Life," will be brought out by McBride. The new Mary Roberts Rinehart is cleverly titled "The State versus Elmer Norton." . . . Julius Messner is all excited over a novel by Beatrice Lutz called "Strangers in the Night." The comedy Phyllis Bentley book has a bad title, "A Modern Tragedy." It will scare a lot of big buyers away. . . . Edgar Carter, known as "Diplomat," under which name he wrote a number of not too successful detective stories, has gone over to Coward-McCann. . . . A new publisher, John H. Hopkins & Son, makes its debut with "Chimney" by Ethel Rankin and Lenora Beahm. They say it is very good indeed.

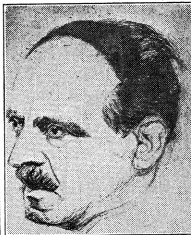

resented a touch of trickiness in his devices.

A Nazi minister may have excluded Wassermann from the Prussian Academy of Letters, but none can exclude him from the minds of his hundreds of thousands of readers, wherein he reigns with the greatest masters of the story.

Directories Excluding Jews Are Withdrawn from Sale

(J.T.A. Special Correspondence)
BERLIN, Dec. 27.—All commercial handbooks and directories for 1934 which list only Aryan firms and have left out the Jewish firms, will have to be withdrawn from sale, in view of a resolution adopted today

jointly by the Federated Board of German Industry, the All-German Association of Directory Publishers, the Federated Association of German Banks, the Federated Board of German Artisans, and the All-German Association of Insurance Companies.

None of the organizations affiliated to these federations will distribute directories and handbooks, the resolution declares, unless they include Jewish enterprises.

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Orinstein and Sherrill State Opposing Views On Stand On Olympics U.S. Should Take

Member of American Committee Advocate of Berlin Boycott Stand, While General Believes "Threat" Would Act as Boomerang against Jews in United States

Two well-known American sportsmen, both of them fighters and both of them who deem the principles of "democracy in sport," both leading members of the American Olympic Committee which some days ago passed a resolution opposing Germany's discrimination against Jewish athletes, talked today with a representative of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency.

The interviews have a heightened effect on account of the opposite views of the men represented, and are more important than the views of the intellect which decided issue of considerable interest to everywhere.

Charles L. Orinstein and Charles Sherrill are both Army men and famous figures in international competition. Both advocates of treatment for athletes of every race, both took the stand in the National political program which believe inhumane and especially cruel to athletes.

Orinstein, a former, a Jew, led the way opposing a resolution which the American Athletic Union passed in 1928 prior to the Washington meeting of the American Olympic Committee. Brigadier General Sherrill opposed the resolution on the ground that it clause threatening removal of American from the Olympics scheduled to be held in Berlin unless the atrocities are ended and anti-Jewish discrimination is ended. Sherrill, a Jew, led the way in the opposition to anti-Semitism in the United States. Orinstein succeeded in winning a vote at a caucus of a special committee named at the A.O.A., and the language of the resolution was changed to his satisfaction. General Sherrill said that it is his own resolution which he proposed. He said that the First Lieutenant in the Army insists that the resolution is a threat of withdrawal, just

as certainly as the A.A.U. resolution openly avowed it.

Mr. Orinstein believes that the Olympic nation should follow the example of the American bodies. Mr. Sherrill, who is an American member of the International Olympic Committee, said that regardless of the feeling expressed by the American bodies, the games should be held in Berlin. To him the matter of anti-Jewish discrimination was a fair subject for protest, but sufficient to warrant a threat. At bottom, the General disclaims the right of interference by American sport of American sport.

Mr. Orinstein, a vigorous individual, dark, not at all the spare man Sherrill is, is inclined to identify with a former athlete and soldier. That the American Olympic Committee wanted the German government was not a new deal for the Jews, but a square deal. Mr. Orinstein spoke with conviction. "Unless we see action by February coming, we shall most certainly withdraw the American games from Berlin and encourage boycott the German athletes who want to compete with us in the athletic games."

Said Mr. Sherrill: "There is something worse than the existing anti-Semitism in Germany, and that is arousing anti-Semitism throughout our own country. Mr. Orinstein is the only Jewish member of the executive committee of the A.O.A., and is the former vice-president of the A.A.U. Mr. Sherrill is ex-officio member of the A.O.A., with full voting power, and is the former vice-president of the American Olympic Committee.

The two men are diametrically opposite, but not opposed on the issue of anti-Semitism. They differ on whether it is America's part to stand behind its own principles its athletes decide.

The position is an important one since Judge Sabath is responsible for the court's proper functioning and the assignment of sitting judges in all branches of that court in Cook County. Judge Sabath was elected to the Superior Court in 1916. His case occupied the post since that time.

KINGSTON—Arthur B. Ewig, prominent Kingston attorney, was elected County Attorney of Ulster County by the Board of Supervisors. He is the first Jew in the history of the county to hold any office. Mr. Ewig is active in Jewish affairs in Ulster County. He is president

of Temple Emanu-El and treasurer of the local Zionist Organization.

SYRACUSE—Rabbi Jacob Sonderling, former chief rabbi of the German armies of the war, spoke here under the auspices of the local Hadassah groups. Rabbi Sonderling, who was the first Jew that Jews must cease being dreamers and become doers. "They must progress through the medium of Palestine, that they can go back to the land and can produce what they preach," Rabbi Sonderling declared.

CINCINNATI—Rockdale Avenue Temple will hold its annual dinner, January 18. William J. Mack is general chairman in charge of the dinner. Dr. Henry Freiberg is chairman of the program committee.

BUFFALO—Professor Ralph C. Epstein, acting head of the economics department of the University of Buffalo, has been chosen to serve on a committee of statistical experts to advise the heads of governmental departments at Washington on reorganization problems.

CINCINNATI—Philip R. Goldstein, campaign director of the Jewish Welfare Board, New York, has been placed in charge of the membership campaign of the Jewish Community Center Association of this city.

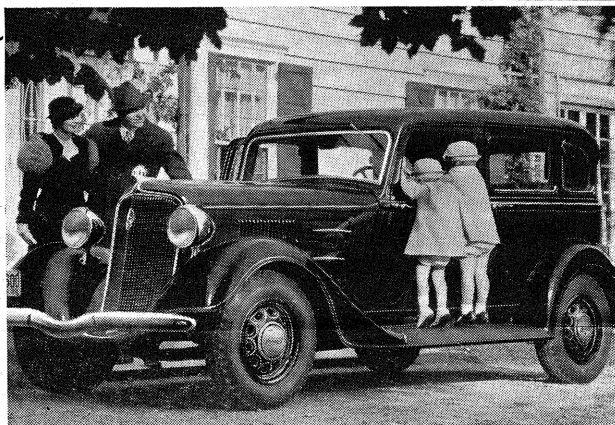

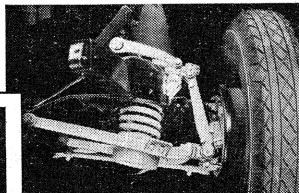
