

It has fulled the purpose for which it was founded. It has called into existence a number of financial institutions of the colonial trust of the colo Government securities, cash in hand and deposits with other banks. Few even of the biggest banks could show so high a proportion of their assets in immediately realizable investments. In addition, some \$8,000,000 are invested in Palestine itself. 000 are invested in Palestine itself-in the form of mortgages, loans and investments in industrial and finan-cial undertakings.

The Anglo-Palestine Bank con-trols the General Mortgage Bank of Palestine, and has considerable holdings in the Palestine Electric Corporation and in Palestine Potash

Ltd., three of the most important enterprises in the country.

EDITORIALS

Outlook for 1934

By DR. HANS KOHN Mankind has entered upon the

year 1934 with renewed hope. The economic situation shows a definite improvement in very many coun-tries. The worst of the depression seems to be behind us. An exag-

But if the economic outlook for seems brighter than in any of the three preceding years, the gen-eral political horizon is deeply clouded. In 1934 twenty years v have passed since the first World War broke out. The reason for its outbreak was the emotional grip which nationalism had taken of the peoples in Europe. The atmosphere in Europe was so tense at that time with national aspirations and passions that an outbreak seemed sooner or later inevitable. The spark which kindled the fires into explosion was the deed of a passionate nationalist, a Servian student who killed a man who to him

aspirations of his people.

Today the atmosphere of Europe is as tense with national passions as it has been in 1914 or perhaps even much more so. And nationalism has reached beyond Europe and people all over the earth, in both Americas (where a war_between Bolivia and Paraguay has been going on for many months notwithstanding many energetic efforts at conciliation) and in Asia and Africa. As the assassination of the Roumanian Prime Minister Duca proves, the passionate nationalists (most of those idealistic fanatics are to be found among the students) have not died out in Europe. The governments of Hitler in Ger-

many and of Mussolini in Italy try to strengthen and increase, by all educational means at the disposal of the modern state, the nationalistic spirit among the youth. But it is not the governments or some governments in Europe which are forcing the nationalistic spirit upon the peoples and preparing them for war, the peoples themselves are full of

the spirit of nationalism and even liberal governments build strong navies or adhere to economic nationalism. Thus the political out-look for 1934 seems very obscure. Nevertheless the year will pass in

all probability without any largescale war breaking out because the governments are afraid of the possible consequences and of the un-known outcome of a modern war and do not wish to take the risk. Therefore they will try to restrain their peoples. This breathing space will allow those who believe peaceful cooperation as the aim of human development to strengthen all their efforts to replace the at present dominant national ideals of this people by loftier ideals and emotions which will augur better for the future of mankind. But this is necessarily a work of many years and therefore we must welcome meanwhile every effort to keep the precarious peace of the world, preprecarious peace of the world, pre-carious as it is, to allow us to lay the foundations for coming years which may open to us an outlook less full of anxiety and animosities than the present period has been.

The Tydings Resolution

The halls of the United States Senate rang again with denuncia-tion of the German persecution of the Jews when Senator Millard Tydings of Maryland arose and submitted a resolution urging President Roosevelt to convey to the Hitler government "an unequivocal state-ment of the profound feelings of surprise and pain experienced by the American people" at the op-pression of the Jews of Germany.

Several months ago Senator Jos-Several months ago Senator Jos-eph Robinson, majority leader in the Upper House, spoke in a vein very much like this, His expression of indignation had no effect beyond goading the barbed Nazis to out-bursts of anger, very much like that was the symbol of a hated political system, which, as he thought, frus-trated the fulfilment of the national a bull emits when the banderillas strike its hide. A resolution passed by the Senate, and, it is to be hoped, in the lower House as well, would provide him with the impulse and the jus-tification to put the United States on record as an outspoken friend for justice to the oppressed.

In commending Senator Tydings for raising his voice for justice to Jews of Germany, one should not forget to give praise also to Max J. Kohler, for whom the Senator derived the basic information for his resolution.

Perhaps if Wassermann had lived in a land other than Germany, the classic land of Jew hatred, where intellectuals are given to so much mor bid brooding over race and nationalism, and where metaphysical dialectics are so frequently brought into the service of national aberrations he would not have wearied his soul so much with painful self-scrutiny and with so many fruitless attempts at needless recon-

ciliations. Race psychology and nationalistic vagaries are a German specialty. Unfor-tunately many of the intellectuals among the Jews in Germany permitted themselves to fall under its weird spell and thus suffered a tragic spiritual and intellectual

dochotomy.

The Jewish people, which missed the in-tellectual leadership which Wassermann might have given to it in the testing and turbulent times of the last quarter of a century, will nevertheless not be unkind to his memory. He was, after all, only a child of his age, one among many, beguiled by the glamorous promises of liberalism and eman-cipation and at last betrayed and broken by

His people will treasure the works of his genius and will rescue them from the bonfire into which the Germans have cast them. The unmistakable stamp of the moral tradition of the Jew is upon all his works—the racial passion for justice, for freedom, for peace, the reverence for human life, for the invio-lability of human personality.

Wassermann wrote "none can deny that justice—not merely as an abstract idea, as the incarnation of deity, but as a moral command of supremely violent urgency but as a moral command of supremely violent urgency— constitutes the moral and legislative, political and religious fundament of Judaism." And of himself he wrote: "Indubitably the work of every outstanding author can be viewed as centering about one dominant idea. In my case, I believe, the dominant idea is that of justice." The cry for justice which rings out from the pages of "The Maurizins Case" and "Exte Ander-gast", the love of humanity which is the essence of "The Gones Man" the mystic reason of the section sold "The Goose Man", the mystic gospel of the reality and greatness of the human soul which is the burden of "The World's Illusion", place Wassermann in the direct line of the great moral teachers of his people. 
