The Worst Method

THE Dollfuss government has expelled the Vienna correspondent of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency and the Jewish Daily Bulletin, Mr. M. A. Tenenblatt, a Polish citizen. Our correspondent was warned last month by the Austrian authorities that his despatches were considered unfavorable to the Dollfuss regime. Now he was arrested, fingerprinted and treated like an ordinary criminal. His home was searched and his books and papers were confiscated. He was ordered to leave Austria within twenty-four hours, although no official charges were brought against him, and no statement was made public denying the veracity of his news despatches.

This is the characteristic way in which the Austrian government has been treating the Jews. It has pressed truthful news reports about their doings. Mr. Tenenblatt, who is regarded as a very reliable newspaper correspondent, and who represented the JTA in Vienna for many years, was expelled in order that this legitimate source of information may be stopped at this particular moment and also in order that other foreign newspaper correspondents might be intimidated. But the truth cannot long be concealed by such methods. And the government that resorts to such methods usually succeeds in discrediting itself.

"Made in Germany"

The amendment in the customs regulations, approved by Secretary of the Treasury Morgenthau, making it compulsory to mark all imports with the label of the country of origin, will henceforth prevent German-made goods from being labelled "Made in Saxony" or "Made in Bavaria" instead of being plainly and conspicuously marked "Made in Germany." This ruling will stop the dumping of Camouflagé German-made goods in this country.

The recent amendment is clear and specific. It reads: "The marking required by section 304 shall include the name of the country of origin. The name of a sub-division such as a kingdom, principality, state, or province of a city within the country of origin is not alone sufficient. The term 'country' as used in section 304 is held to mean the political entity known as a nation."

Credit is due Mr. Samuel Untermeyer who, as president of the Non-Sectarian Anti-Nazi League, protested effectively and vigorously, on the basis of voluminous documentary evidence, against the laxity of the customs regulations which permitted German exporters to have their goods brought here under misleading labels. Allow Jewish Kultur Bund In Bavaria

Minister Sanctions New Group; Bares Political Activities for It

BERLIN, Feb. 19.—The Bavarian Minister of Education today granted permission for the formation of the Jewish Kultur Bund, similar to the organization recently founded in Berlin. He specified, however, that no organization was to stimulate or even tolerate any political ambitions, and do nothing whatever to provoke disturbances among the population.

Shut out as they are from the cultural, political and social life of the country in which they live, the German Jews are forming similar organizations composed only of Jews. The Berlin government has sanctioned the formation of a Jewish book publishing concern, a Jewish theater, and a Jewish cultural group.

Austria Reassures Jews As Britain Advises Care

British Warn Austrians to Go Slowly

Simon Warns Vienna in Answer to House Question

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

LONDON, Feb. 19.—The British government has made representations to Austria asking the Dollfuss regime to tread lightly in dealing with the situation that has arisen out of the recent civil war, Sir John Simon, British Foreign Secretary, revealed today in the House of Commons.

Sir John's statement was made in answer to a question from a member of the House as to whether the Foreign Secretary had made it plain to the Austrian government that "the continuance of the political and financial support given in the past will be contingent on the way in which she treats the working classes in that country."

Foreign Secretary Simon replied: "The British government has been making representations as to clemency and appeasement in the present situation."

He then read to the House of Commons the three-power communique in which England, France and Italy stated that they recognized the independence of Austria.

Colonel Josiah Wedgwood, Labor, M. P., asked whether this agreement was given before the Austrian government perpetrated its massacres or afterward. He also asked whether the government's views had been modified as a result of Austrian developments.

Sir John answered that he felt sure it would be recognized "that whether the peace of Europe and can be secured by the disappearance of Austria or not can hardly be said to be changed by the events of the last few days."

Reich Dissolves Jewish Sports Organizations

New Ones Can Be Formed Under Government Supervision

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

BERLIN, Feb. 19.—The Reichsbanner and the Organization of Jewish was Veterans, the only two Jewish sport organizations permitted in Germany under the Third Reich, were dissolved today throughout Bavaria. The dissolution order was given by the political police of Bavaria, who declared that while these organizations would no longer be permitted to exist, the Federation of Jewish Communities would be allowed to form new Jewish sport groups under specified conditions.

Dollfuss, Fey Speeches Ease Fear of Jews

Situation Still Critical; Austrian Nazis Ready for Strike

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

VIENNA, Feb. 19.—The terrific tension under which the Austrian Jews have been living for the past two weeks was somewhat lightened today when highest officials of the Dollfuss regime, without mentioning the Jews by name gave assurances that the government has no intention of instituting anti-Jewish measures.

In speaking over the radio to the United States, Chancellor Dollfuss declared that the state will fully protect all citizens who are tolerant toward the state. The Chancellor thus publicly dispelled fear current in Jewish circles that anti-Semitic laws may be expected in the near future. He stated categorically that the government is not planning special steps against individual sections of the Austrian population.

A similar attempt at conciliation was made by Vice Chancellor Emil Fey, when he issued a statement to the foreign press stating, "We are determined to confront with equal energy all other groups which attempt force." Major Fey obviously referred to the Austrian Nazis.

Both speeches, it is thought here, were made out of deference to opinion in foreign countries and convince Jews everywhere that the Dollfuss regime does not intend to differentiate between groups of citizens.

Situation Still Tense

The situation in Vienna and through the provinces is still uncertain, latest reports showed. In Vienna sporadic outbreaks of shooting and bombings showed the Socialist forces were carrying out party orders to continue resistance and to use sabotage. Five Socialists, arrested by Heimwehr auxiliaries when they were found in a machine gun nest.

Reich Bares Werfel's Book on Jews

BERLIN, Feb. 19.—A new novel by the distinguished German Jewish novelist and dramatist, Franz Werfel, was prohibited today by the German authorities. The novel deals with present day Jewish life in Germany.

Werfel, who was the recipient of the Schiller prize for literature in 1928, is best known in the "Great Song," "The Song of the Jews," and "The Song of the Jews."

Jewish Activities in the Metropolitan Area

Cleaners and Dyers Strike This Morning

Claim NRA Code Is Violated; Demand Minimum Wage

Thousands of workers in the cleaning and dyeing industry in the metropolitan area will go on strike this morning in an effort to halt violation of the NRA fair practice code by chain firms and non-union store owners.

Throughout the five boroughs and Westchester efforts will be made by the Inside Cleaning and Dyeing Workers Union, Local 12,322, consisting of shop workers, and the Cleaning and Dye House Drivers Union, both affiliates of the American Federation of Labor, to halt all traffic in the industry by means of picketing and distribution of literature.

Officials of both unions, interviewed at their headquarters at Clinton Hall, 151 Clinton street, yesterday, said that store owners are behind the strike and lockout, and employees. Protest against the cut-throat prices maintained against NRA code provisions were to be voiced yesterday afternoon when about 4,000 strikers indicated their intention of attending a mass meeting.

Jacob Effrat, general manager of the Cleaning and Dye House Drivers Union, issued a statement to the public declaring in substance that plant owners owe drivers from two to twenty weeks back salary, that drivers are working eight hours per week, that competition has forced tailors to decrease fifty-cent dollars weekly plus ten percent of the commission of the collection weekly.

To Inform Public
"It is our purpose to educate the public regarding the degrading evils existing in our trade, also to effectuate machinery to eliminate these evils," said Mr. Effrat.

Issued a statement to the public relations committee of the union, said that the union will aim at complete unionization of the trade.

Samuel Weintraub said, "We ask nothing more than what is reasonably due us. Not a single outsider will lift a hand to work under conditions that are degrading. Furthermore, insiders and outsiders have come to a mutual understanding and agreement that neither of the two locals will authorize its men to go back to work until both unions have been satisfied as to the contract, back pay and conditions. Our workers will receive a living wage and decent working conditions."

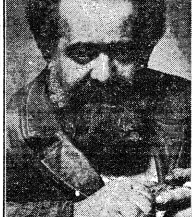

A souvenir magazine, "Youth Speaks," prepared by alumni of the schools, was distributed. The magazine is printed in Yiddish, the language of instruction in Workmen's Circle Schools, which there are a number throughout the country.

Jewish Science Birthday
Jewish Science, founded somewhat more than a decade back, by Rabbi Morris Lichtenstein, is celebrating its twelfth anniversary this month.

Jo Davidson, the sculptor, did not pop into Mayor LaGuardia's offices in City Hall and hide in closets in an attempt to make a bust of the busy Mayor, as reported in the papers.

Mr. Davidson denied the story explicitly to the Jewish Daily Bulletin. "People don't but in like that," he said. "Of course Mayor LaGuardia is a great man, the fact that he didn't do any sitting for me is true, but Mr. LaGuardia knew about the project in the sense that he agreed to under the 'ordel'."

Since his arrival in the United States early last December, Mr. Davidson said, he has made busts of President Franklin D. Roosevelt, Nicholas Murray Butler of Columbia University, and Professor Albert Einstein. These works will be exhibited at the Municipal Art Exhibition, scheduled to open at Rockefeller Center on February 28.

Discussing the current controversy about the exhibition from which several artists have threatened to withdraw their exhibits because Rockefeller destroyed the Diego Rivera murals, Mr. Davidson declared that he was in sympathy with those who were against the destruction of any work of art.

"A work of art," he said, "belongs to the people, and it belongs to the person who pays for it. No one has the right to destroy any work of art. The only real judge of art is Time. We are unable to judge a work of art at the moment it is produced." If the exhibits were moved to some other building, the sculptor suggested, all the complaining exhibitors might be mollified.

His bust of Roosevelt will be on display at the National Academy of Design, 215 West 57th street, about the middle of next month, and then will be sent to Chicago to be shown at the 1934 Century of Progress Exhibition.

Mr. Davidson is leaving for California within a few weeks to join friends there.

Fellowship to Fete Presidents' Birthdays In Large Celebration

A triple birthday celebration honoring Washington, Lincoln and Franklin D. Roosevelt, all of whose birthdays occur in February, will be held by the World Fellowship of Faiths on Friday evening, Feb. 23, in the ballroom of the Hotel New Yorker.

Among the speakers who will pay tribute to the three presidents are Rev. Dr. G. G. Gurnea, president of the National Council of Churches; Rev. Albert C. Grier, pastor of the Church of the Truth; Dr. George J. Haynes, executive secretary of the commission on race and church and race relations of the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America; and Pandit Shyama Shankar, representing the Hindu Religious Association, Benares, India.

Nina Koshetz, soprano, and Sascha Gordinitzki, pianist, appeared in a joint recital in her stead.

A refund was offered to the audience but only a few availed themselves of the offer. Mrs. Koshetz and Mr. Gordinitzki were warmly received, however.

The announcement of Mrs. Jeritza's illness was made from that platform by Felix M. Warburg, who with Mrs. Warburg, was one of the box holders.

Mrs. Herbert H. Lehman was honorary chairman of the committee in charge of the concert. The receipts will go toward the maintenance of the Hadassah health programs in Palestine.

Socialism Will Come After Fascism, Avers Solomon in Address

Fascism in Germany and Italy were characterized as a "political interlude" between capitalism and Socialism by Charles Solomon, former Socialist Majority candidate, who spoke at a meeting of the Jewish Center, New York.

"Hitlerism is a particularly vicious brand of Fascism since it adds to all the other undesirable aspects of Fascism the element of anti-Semitism," he said.

Gruening New 'Post' Editor; Edited Nation

Noted Liberal Journalist Long in News Field; Studied Medicine

Dr. Ernest Gruening, one of the country's outstanding liberal journalists, yesterday assumed his duties as editor of The New York Evening Post. He resigned from his post as managing editor of the Nation, liberal weekly.

Born in New York City in 1857, Dr. Gruening studied medicine at Harvard, graduating in 1911. He was attracted to newspaper work, however, and in 1912, the start of the Boston American. In 1914 he became the editor of the Boston Evening Traveler, and resigned when ordered to publish a retraction of a story about Mayor Curley's lobbying for a banned motion picture in another state.

Dr. Gruening came to New York and did special work for Frank A. Munsey, then head of the New York Sun. He was managing editor of the New York Tribune until 1918 when he was volunteered for military service and drilled at the Zachary Taylor Post in Kentucky. He subsequently, by editor La Frons, published in Spanish in New York, The Portland News which he founded in 1927, and the Nation.

His article "Mexico and Its Heritage," which he wrote after a tour of that country, is generally accepted as the authoritative work on the subject.

Dr. Gruening exposed facts regarding the American occupation of Haiti and Santo Domingo following the World War. He directed the LaFollette presidential campaign in 1924.

Russell Urges United States to Help Refugees

In Magazine Article He Asks Aid in Opening Palestine Gates

Declaring that the American people must help open the doors of Palestine as a refuge for the persecuted Jews of Germany, Charles Edward Russell, president of the Pro-Palestine Federation of America, declared in an article for the January-February issue of the Pro-Palestine Herald that "our duty and immediate objectives are made clear. To agitate for the opening of the doors of Palestine. To provide the funds to help the needy to reach Palestine. To build, develop and further Palestine, the way out of the hope of the distressed, the rational relief for an otherwise hopeless situation." Mr. Russell also advocated the continuance of the anti-German boycott and the passage of Congressman Samuel Dickstein's bill to admit persons fleeing from religious persecution.

Other writers in the current issue of the magazine include Dean Justin H. Moore of City College; Colonel Josiah Wedgwood of the anti-German League; and Roy H. Tuttle, Royal S. Copeland and David Lloyd George.

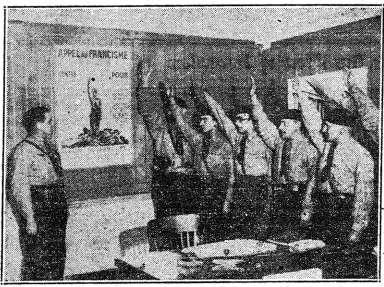

Emmanuel Neumann, former president of the Administrative Committee of the Jewish Agency for Palestine, on his return from Palestine said, among other things, that "Palestine itself has by no means reached the maximum of her absorptive capacity," that the Jews "have not begun to exploit all of the possibilities," that "there is room in Palestine for another million Jews." And he expressed the opinion that the real job of the Jewish people is to bend every effort to attain that goal within the next fifteen years.

All honest and intelligent observers who have visited Palestine in recent years know that the Jews have now transformed the land neglected for centuries by the Arabs into a living land, throbbing with energy, with productive toil, with cultural activity, with economic prosperity brought about with the aid of Jewish initiative and enterprise, of Jewish idealism and self-sacrifice. And these observers know that the Jews who have resettled in the land of their forefathers are rebuilding it so that all the inhabitants of the land are being benefited, for the Jews go there to live and work in peace, to build and not to destroy.

It is inconceivable that Great Britain, with its fine traditions of justice and fairness, will persist in pursuing the shortsighted Colonial policy affecting Jewish

Rabbi Feldman's NRA Appointment Confirmed, He Accepts Post

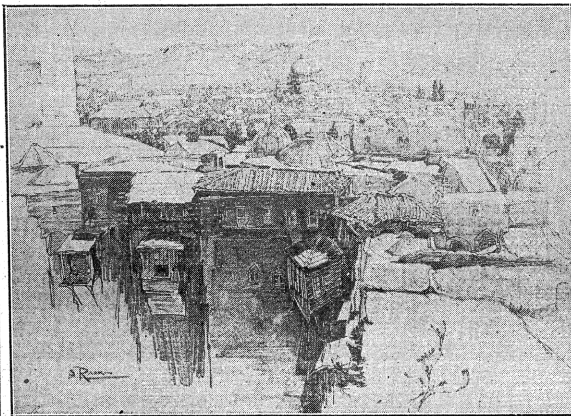

War on Fascism In Milwaukee Gains Support

He was asked to "make clear" to the Austrian trade commissioners now in Washington that "America will make no agreement to trade in goods wet with the workers' blood."

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 18.—Criticism of the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee on the part of the Ussishkin colony has been taken up to join forces with other groups in world Jewry for the purpose of dealing with the German situation under a common program directed by a common administration was voiced by Louis Lipsky, national chairman of the American Palestine Campaign, at the Jewish National Fund here today. He declared that "at the present time there is every probability that there will not be a joint drive in the United States as between the Joint Distribution Committee and the American Palestine Campaign."

The conference adopted a resolution introduced by Abraham Spiechandler and seconded by Morris Rothenberg, president of the Zionist Organization of America, to raise the sum of \$400,000 to establish Kfar Ussishkin in honor of the seventieth birthday of the veteran Zionist leader, Menachem M. Ussishkin, in addition to the sum of \$400,000 as America's contribution to the Jewish National Fund.

The conference adopted resolutions to urge for the liquidation of Jewish National Fund money in the country; approval of Tydings resolution, which calls upon the United States to stop the treatment of the German Jews, and voted to boycott all German merchandise.

Bringing the greeting of the American Palestine Campaign, Lipsky deplored lip-service to unity in world Israel by forces in American life who refuse to translate into action the slogan. He said the discussion about unity in Jewish life," Lipsky declared, "The fact is lost sight of that unity deals with ideas and the proper basis of cooperation. What we need in Jewish life is whole-hearted and unreserved cooperation in dealing with the present tragic situation of the Jewish people."

"Many of those who constantly speak of peace and unity, in practical terms, are actually engaged in the actual work of cooperation. With them it seems that these words, peace and unity, can be used before to cloak and mask the essential Jewish opposition. We are working together with all Jews for the common good."

Belgian Jewry
Mourns Passing
Of King Albert

Ruler Showed Dislike
For Anti-Semitism
Friendly to Jews

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
BRUSSELS, Feb. 18.—Belgian Jewry was profoundly shocked to learn of the news of King Albert's death. King Albert in a mountaineering accident near Namur, Belgium, yesterday. The popular, democratic, King of the Belgians, who was respected by his Jewish subjects. He was known to be friendly towards them and manifested his interest in the Jews and Zionist movement on many occasions.

The entire Belgian press hailed the event as demonstration of the sympathy of the ruling house with the Jews and saw in the visit a triumph for the Jewish cause. The papers pointed out that the Queen intended to express her feelings regarding the persecution of the Jews and to show them an effective means of doing this.

A month earlier, King Albert granted an audience to Dr. Chaim Weizmann, head of the Zionist Organization, who had just returned from Germany. King Albert had discussed current happenings with the Belgian monarch and had expressed his sympathy for the building in Palestine and the future possibilities of the country, in which the King was known to be interested.

At the same time the liberal immigration policy pursued by Belgium in the period after the war, which permitted the entry of thousands of East European Jews into Belgium and led to the creation of a flourishing Belgian Jewish colony, was attributed to the friendly policy of the King.

The Belgian ruler, was very friendly with Professor and Mrs. Albert Einstein and received them during their last visit to Belgium from Germany. Professor Einstein spent some time in Belgium, and a warm friendship is said to have developed between the monarch and the scientist.

King Albert, who was noted as a mountain climber, set out on Saturday to climb Rocher de la Vierge, near Namur, a mountain peak near Namur. He was accompanied by a personal servant.

During the ascent, he slipped and fell. His body was found at the foot of the mountain. Searchers found a deep wound in his head and declared that there was no doubt that the monarch had been killed instantly.

Tribute to Albert

A striking tribute to the dead Belgian leader, king, was paid last night by Dr. Elias Lieberman, principal of the Thomas Jefferson High School during a meeting of the Women's Division of the American Zionist Congress. Dr. Lieberman said "I met King Albert in Palestine," Dr. Lieberman declared. "He was a lover and a great friend of the Jewish people. He was interested in the work of reconstruction in Palestine and paid a splendid tribute to the enthusiasm of the Jewish people."
