The Worst Method

THE Dollous government has expelled the Vienna correspondent of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency and the Jewish Daily Bulletin, Mr. M. A. Tenenblatt, a Polish citizen. Our correspondent was warned last month by the Austrian authorities that his despatches were considered un-favorable to the Dollfuss regime. Now he was arrested, finger-printed and treated like an ordinary criminal. His home was searched and his books and papers were confiscated. He was twenty-four hours, although no official charges official charges were brought against him, and no statement was made public denying the veracity of his news despatches.

This is the characteristic way in which dictators try to suppress truthful news reports about their doings. Mr. Tenenblatt, who is regarded as a very reliable newspaper correspondent, and who represented the JTA in Vienna for many years, was ex-pelled in order that this legiti-mate source of information may be stopped at this particular mo-ment, and also in order that other foreign newspaper corre-spondents might be intimated. But the truth cannot long be concealed by such methods. And the government that resorts to such methods usually succeeds in discrediting itself.

"Made In Germany"

He specified, however, that no organispecined, however, that no organi-zation was to stimulate or even tolerate any political ambitions, and do nothing whatever to pro-voke disturbances among the population.

Shut out as they are from the cultural, political and social life of the country in which they live, the German Jews are forming similar organizations composed similar organizations composed only of Jews. The Berlin govern-ment has sanctioned the formation of a Jewish book publishing con-cern, a Jewish theater, and a Jewish cultural group.

Dyers Strike This Morning

Claim NRA Code Is Violated; Demand Minimum Wage

Thousands of workers in the cleaning and dyeing industry in the metropolitan area will go on strike this morning in an effort to halt violation of the NRA fair practice code by chain firms and

non-union store owners. Throughout the five boroughs and Westchester efforts will be made by the Inside Cleaning and Dyeing Workers Union, Local 18,232, consisting of shop workers, and the Gleaning and Dye House Drivers Union, both affiliates of the American Federation of Labor, to halt all traffic in the industry by means of picketing and dis-tribution of literature.

Officials of both unions, interviewed at their headquarters at Clinton Hall, 151 Clinton street, yesterday, said that store owners are behind the strike and lockout by employers. Protest against the cut-throat prices maintained against NRA code provisions were to be voiced yesterday afternoon when about 4,000 retailers indi-

agen about 4,000 retailers indi-cated their intention of attending a mass meeting. Jacob Effrat, general manager of the Cleaning and Dye House Drivers Union, issued a statement to the public declaring in sub-stance that plant owners owe drivers from two to twenty weeks' back salary, that drivers are work-ing eighty hours per week, that competition has fored tailors to default on payments to drivers and that "drivers demand a new contract before returning to work guaranteeing them a minimum of twenty-eight dollars weekly plus ten per cent of the commission of the collection weekly."

"It is our purpose to educate the public regarding the degrading evils existing in our trade, also to effectuate machinery to eliminate these evils." said Mr. Effrat.

Isaac Freedman, chairman of the public relations committee of the union, said that the union will aim at complete unionization of Samuel Weintraube said. "We

samuel Weintraube said, "We ask nothing more than what is reasonably due us. Not a single outsider will lift a hand to work until conditions are cleared up. Furthermore, insiders and out-siders have come to a mutual understanding and agreement that neither of the two locals will authorize its men to go back to work until both unions have been satisfied as to the contract, back and guarantee that workers pay and guarantee that workers will receive a living wage and decent working conditions

Mr. Davidson denied the story explicitly to the Jewish Daily Bul-letin. "People don't butt in like that," he said. "Of course Mayor that," he said. "Of course mayor LaGuardia expected me. Noted Liberal Journalist Long in News Field; Studied Medicine

Dr. Ernest Gruening, one of the country's outstanding liberal journalists, yesterday assumed his duties as editor of The New York Evening Post. He resigned from his post as managing editor of the Nation, liberal weekly.

Born in New York City in 1887, Dr. Gruening studied medicine at Harvard, graduating in 1911. He was attracted to newspaper work, however, and joined the staff of the Boston American. In 1914 he became the editor of the Boston

became the editor of the Boston Evening Traveler, and resigned when ordered to publish a refraction of a story about a Mercarion of a story about a Mercarion of a story about a motion picture in another state.

Dr. Gruening came to New York and did special work for Frank A. Munsey, then head of the New York Sun. He was managing editor of the New York Sun Alter and the New York Sun He wollman and the New York Sun He was managing editor of the New York Tribune until 1918 when he volumer the New York Tribune will 1918 when he will be the Zachary Taylor for the Kentucky. He successively edited La Prensa, published in Spanish in New York, The Portland News which he founded in 1927, and the Nation.

His book, "Mexico and Its. Heritage," which he wrote after a tour of that country, is generally accepted as the authoritative work on the subject.

Dr. Gruening exposed facts regarding the American occupation of Haiti and Santo Domingo fol-lowing the World War. He directed the LaFollette presidential campaign in 1924.

All honest and intelligent ob-servers who have visited Palestine in recent years know that the Jews have now transformed the land neglected for centuries by the Arabs into a living land, throbbing with energy, with pro-ductive toil, with cultural activity, with economic prosperity brought about with the aid of Jewish initiative and enterprise, Jewish initiative and enterprise, of Jewish idealism and self-sac-rifice. And these observers know that the Jews who have resettled in the land of their foreresetteen in the land of their fore-fathers are rebuilding it so that all the inhabitants of the land are being benefited, for the Jews go there to live and work in peace, to build and not to destrov.

It is inconceivable that Great Britain, with its fine traditions of justice and fairness, will persist in pursuing the shortsighted Colonial policy affecting Jewish

immigration to Palestine at this crucial moment. This is, in-deed, the acid test of the mandatory power's sincerity with re-gard to the Balfour Declaration. The actual fulfillment of the Balfour Declaration would not only save the victims of Nazi perse-cutions but would also make cutions but would also mal tors for peace and stability in that sensitive danger zone. The delay in the actual fulfillment of the Balfour Declaration has unfortunately served to intensify friction between Arabs and Jews, for the deluded or mercenary Arab agitators endeavored to convince the Arab masses that Great Britain had never fully intended to make good its promise to the Jewish people. It is to be hoped that the ne-

gotiations of the Jewish Agency with the mandatory power will soon result in a new policy truly sympathetic to the Jewish settlement in Palestine, in the spirit of the Balfour Declaration as in-terpreted by Lord Balfour him-



The tragedy of being a Jew in Russia before the Communists come into power is not a particularly new theme for a story, play or moving picture, but down at the Acme Theatre on 14th street, a silent film with a new angle on the problem is now being shown.

The plot follows the fortunes of two families, one of them poor (the father is a tailor), the other wealthy. The head of the latter owns a shoe factory. While the poor tailer (I. Mindlin) is away fighting for the Czar, the factory owner (Y. Solnzeva) is at home fighting for more profits.

Tragedy descends upon the tailor's family and his sister is forced to marry the unattractive son of the factory owner. Circumstances arise whereby all the Jews of thi ctown are forced to leave. It is at this point that the Soviet producers of the film have injected their dose of propaganda. The capitalists (personified by the factory owner) are held up to scorn They are shown enjoying all man-ner of luxury while their co-rener of luxury while their co-re-ligionists are literally starving ligionists are literally starving.

the capitalists are permitted to
take their wealth with them,
while the poorer classes are left to their fates

Some of the prisoners were kept in these coffins on the slightest pretext for fourteen hours. One prisoner, Newman, was kept in a cell for eight days and eight nights. This diciplinary punish-ment was inflicted by the commander entirely arbitrarily.

German stamps are being reprinted. They will now be printed on a paper containing the Swastika as a watermark, according to an order of the postal authorities. This watermark will only be visible when the paper is held up to the light.

THE HUMAN TOUCH

THE Hebrew Immigrant Aid Society of New York has done many strange things on behere and abroad. It has met many incoming passenger steamers and given as friendly care to incoming immi-grants as its re-

sources allowed. It has housed and fed them Harry Salpeter and found many employment.

All of those bare, though eloquent,

tatistics you will find in the string of annual reports which it has issued during its long career. But the other day its office here was met by a poser, or a facer, as it might be termed. A visitor, appealing for help, requested that a cow, for which he was perfectly willing to pay, should be sent to his brother in Poland, who appa-rently was in need of a cow. The rently was in need of a cow. The cow is certainly a serviceable animal, and even the Hebrey Immigrant Aid Society, sometimes known by the abbreviation of HIAS, was not prepared to deny extent of its usefulness, but the difficulties involved in humber of the state o difficulties involved in buying a cow in the United States, putting it on shipboard, getting it off on the other end, and moving it from the port of debarkation by rail-road and ox-cart, or truck, or similar mode of conveyance, to Brother's farm—this responsibility made even the hardy HIAS offi-cial blanch. "Send your brother he money and let him buy the cow in Poland." No, that would

not do at all as a solution. It wasn't that the person had any obections to Polish cows, or that he ad any strong feelings in favor in America; it wasn't eve n that he had any particular American cow in mind; any good American cow that that HIAS official could purthat that HIAS omeial could pur-chase with the money which he would be happy to leave with aforesaid official would serve the purposes of his brother in Poland. The difficulties were explained, but the man who wished to buy a cow and have it shipped to Poland also had an explanation, and, curiously, it was a valid one. Every time he it was a valid one. Every time he sent his brother the money with which to buy a cow, the money was spent, if not squandered, on other things. Four times he had sent his brother the mon which to buy a cow and the cow hadn't been bought yet. Instead of four cows-there was nothing. Patting the loyal brother's hand sympathetically, if also figura-tively, the HIAS official promised him that if he paid in cash for the cow the HIAS representative at the other end would attend to the purchasing details and he could be certain that the next sum for a cow would go into a cow, and into nothing else. Incidentally it would nothing eise. Incidentally it would be interesting to know what are the transportation charges for a live cow, from the North River docks to, say, Danzig, with charges

for fodder, transportation and et-ceteras itemized. I am a city feller, but I have enough imagination to see how much trouble a cow can be on the high seas. The evidence in either case is just slim enough to allow free play for the speculative intelligence. It continues to be possible to play the game: "Was Columbus a Jew?"

Zion Stamps Belgian Fascists Thwarted Printed in ByNewAppreciation of Jew

(J.T.A. Special Correspondence)

BRUSSELS, Feb. 10.—No less than four officially anti-Semitic parties have been founded in Belgium in the course of the last year. Their programs differ in many respects, but one thing they all have in common: "Down with the Jews!"

The most violent and aggressive of this quartet is the so-called "National Corporative Workers Un-ion." As far as the Jews are conone. As far as the Jews are con-cerned, this body is by far the most dangerous, for while the policy of the "Dinasos," the other large anti-Semite party, is Flemish au-tonomy, that of the National Corporative Union is Belgian nationalism, which makes its appeal a much greater one. It publishes papers in both Flemish and French, and in them conducts violent and unscrupulous propaganda against the Jews. The anti-Semitism thus created

is an entirely unnatural one, for there is not the slightest justification for it. But the anti-Semites, inspired as they are by the German Nazis, are missing no oppor-tunity of agitating against the Jews. And since the economic situation in Belgium is a very serious one, the danger exists that they may succeed in persuading the Belgian masses that the Jews are responsible for all the difficulties

So far, however, these Belgian Fascists have not been very suc-cessful. On the contrary, their agitation has led to a strengthen-ing of the anti-Fascist circles, and ing of the anni-rascist circles, and
a "League for the Defense of
Freedom and Democracy" has been
founded. The Socialists, too, are
carrying on a vigorous anti-Fas-

cist campaign. -During the last few weeks, however, little has been heard of the ever, little has been heard of the Jewish problem in the Belgian press. The reason is that other matters, of greater public inter-est have arisen, chief among them the enormous scandal when a whole net of corruption and dishonesty was discovered in the Belgian administration and police. Belgian administration and poince.

Not a single Jew was involved in
this scandal, which assumed very
large proportions, and the whole
anti-Tascist press pointed this fact

out to the anti-Semites.
While the general Jewish situation in the country is not entirely unsatisfactory, that of the Jewish traders is becoming very serious. Some four thousand Jewish families in Belgium are dependent on market trading, and lately, in consequence of the economic crisis, many of these have been forbidden to carry on their trade. The mu-nicipal authorities who are responsible for this, deny that they have been actuated by any anti-Semitic motives and blame the crisis. Most of the traders affected are Polish subjects, and the Polish Consul has taken the matter in hand, so far, however, without success. Already several hundred Jewish traders have thus been deprived of a livelihood, and their position is extremely serious, for under present conditions, there is not the slightest chance of obtaining work

in any other occupation. Attitude Changed Just lately a considerable change in the attitude of the Belgians to the Jews has taken place, as a rethe Jews has taken place, as a result of a series of articles in the important Belgian paper, Le Solr, on Zionism and Palestine. These articles were written by Pierre Goenaere, a well-known journalist, who had previously openly declared himself to be an anti-Semite. His visit to Palestine completely changed his views. He saw what the Jews had achieved there in the face of innumerable difficulties, and he became pronouncedly pro-Towish The articles have had a great influence on the Belgian pub-

lic. An entirely new type of Jew was revealed to them. Previously they had always thought of the Jew as a small trader. Now they were shown a Jew working on the soil, creating a new land. And their respect for the Jews went up by leaps and bounds. (Mr. Fuss here refers to the series of articles "When Israel Comes Home," appearing now at intervals in the wish Daily Bulletin.)

These articles had another beneficial result. The Belgian Catho-lics had always been afraid of what might happen to the Christian holy places should the Jews become a majority in Palistine. They were now told that the Jews had no designs on these places, and that definite assurances had been given by the Zionists on this point, and that the Pope himself had declared himself satisfied with these assurances, and in favor of Zionism.

But it is not the fact that these articles have made the Belgians more favorable to Zionism that is It is that the knowledge of what the Jews are doing in Palestine that has greatly in-creased the average Belgian's respect and liking for the Jews in And that, in the face of the 'violent Fascist agitation throughout the country, is a factor of inestimable importance.

Ruler Showed Dislike Military Escort for Anti-Semitism; Friendly to Jews

The popular, democra-tic, King of the Belgians, was loved and respected by his Jewish subjects. He was known to be

friendly towards them and manifested his interest in the Jews and in the Zionist movement on many Last November, Queen Eliza-beth, his consort, paid a visit of state to Yiddish Theater in Brus-

sels to witness the performance of "Kiddush Hashem", by Sholem Asch, which portrayed the sufferings of the Ukrainian Jews in the pogrom period of Bogdan Chmelpogrom period of Bogdan Chiner-nitzki. The Queen stayed through the whole performance, which was given by the Wilno troupe, and later received the director of the The entire Belgian press hailed

the event as demonstration of the sympathy of the ruting house with the Jews and saw in the visit a protest against anti-Semitism. The papers pointed out that the Queen intended to express her feelings regarding the persecution of the Jews and chose the visit as an effective means of doing this.

A month earlier, King Albert granted an audience to Dr. Chaim Weizmann, head of the Zionist commission for the settlement of German Jews in Palestine. It was understood that Dr. Weizmann had discussed current happenings with the Belgian monarch and had described to him the work of upbuilding in Palestine and the fu-ture possibilities of the country, in which the King was known to be interested. At the same time the liberal im-

At the same time the liberal im-migration policy pursued by Bel-gium in the period after the war, which permitted the entry of thousands of East European Jews into Belgium and led to the creation of a flourishing Belgian Jewish colony, was attributed to the friendly policy of the King.

The Belgian ruler, was very friendly with Professor and Mrs. Albert Einstein and received them several times. After being exiled from Germany, Professor Einstein spent some time in Belgium, and warm friendship is said to have developed between the monarch and the scientist.

King Albert, who was noted as a mountain climber, set out on Saturday to climb Rocher de Marches les Dames, a mountain peak near Namur. He was accom-

panied by a personal servant.
During the ascent, he slipped
and fell. His body was not recovered until early this morning.
Searchers found a deep wound in his head and declared that there was no doubt that the monarch had been killed instantly.
