The Sensitive Nazis

HEINZ LIEPMANN, the German Jewish author of "Murder—Made in Germany," published recently in Holland, and now brought out in English in this country, was sentenced by a Dutch court to one month's imprisonment for "having libeled the head of a friendly govern-

ment."
It is believed that the Nazi
government is also making efforts to have Liepmann extradited to Germany.

We do not know whether the reference to President von Hin-denburg and Chancellor Hitler in that book is true or not. But the German government is apparently extremely sensitive, especially when unfavorable material is published about it abroad. The Dutch attorney, Francois Pauwels, representing the refuge writer, made the charge that the Nazl government was instrumen-tal in bringing about Liepmann's arrest. And yet the Nazi government, through its propagan-dists in Germany and in foreign lands, does not hesitate to dis-tort the truth, to justify its savage race hatred, to vilify the Jewish people, to libel men in high office in other governments and to attack the democratic institutions of other lands.

The Nazis are very sensitive They resent being classed among enemies of mankind, although by their misdeeds they are en-deavoring to undermine the foundations of civilization.

Dollfuss Again Reassures Jews

Need Have No Fear in Event of Accord Between Austria and Reich, Says Official for Chancellor

Copyright, 1934, Jewish Telegraphic Agency VIENNA, Feb. 23.—Jews of Austria need have no fear that there will be any change in their political or legal status in the event of an

accord being reached between Austria and Germany, the Jewish Telegraphic Agency was informed today in an official, exclusive statement by a high government official in the name of Chancellor Engelbert Dollfuss. "The government does not stand on the race viewpoint. It is not

> sued in the name of Dollfuss asserts. "Furthermore," it contin-ues, "all apprehensions of an al-teration in the government atti-"Furthermore," it contintude to the Jewish question in the event of an accord with Nazi Gerevent of an accord with Nazi Ger-many are completely unfounded. An accord with Germany is pos-sible only on the basis of mutual non-interference in our internal affairs or there will be no accord." The government does not intend to permit any inner political changes along Nazi 'Aryan' lines."

Hits Nazi Claims

Attacking Nazi claims that a majority of the population is be-hind the movement, the official statement belittled these asser-tions and proclaimed the readiness of the government to deal with the movement.
"The Nazi movement in Aus

"The Nam movement in Aus-tria," the statement issued for the Chancellor pointed out, "is over-estimated abroad. A number of well-organized youths know how to attract attention without a real hold on the population. The gov-ernment is quite prepared to deal with the Nazi movement, too, 1

"All fears of the Jews in the land or abroad concerning the Nazi demands may be dispersed since the government is determined to adhere to its present attitude to-wards the Nazis."

The statement, however, did not cover action by the present government affecting the Jews irrespective of the Nazi situation. Chancellor Dollfuss. addressing British and American newspaper-British and American newspaper-men yesterday, declared that the government policy toward the Jews will remain unattered. The Heimwehr is definitely anti-Semitic and makes no secret of the fact. The Heimwihr says quite openly that in a Fascist Aus-tria the Jews cannot be treated with as much tolerance as is accorded them in Fascist Italy.

Pushes Drive To Raise Funds For Charities

B'klyn Federation to Discuss Dates and Allot Quotas

A campaign to raise funds for its twenty-five constituent agencies was announced by the Brooklyn Federation of Jewish Charities at its headquarters, 94 Clinton street. The drive will commemorate the Federation's twenty-fifth anniversary.

A dinner conference will be held at the Unity Club, Bedford avenue at the Unity Cine, Bednord avenue and Dean street, Brooklyn, on February 27, at which time the date for opening the drive, the amount sought, and other details, will be discussed. Representatives of the ninety groups comprising the Trade and Membership Coun-cil of the Federation will be allotted quotas at the conference.

The Federation, which was organized in 1909, is the community chest of the largest Jewish community in the world. During the past year, it has taken care of more than a million and a quarter cases, its affiliates spending more than three million dollars in behalf of the needy.

The twenty-five constituent societies of the Federation include the Brooklyn Hebrew Orphan Asylum, First Hebrew Day Nursery and Neighborhood House, Beth Moses Hospital, Jewish Hospital of Brooklyn, East New York Dispen-sary, United Jewish Aid Societies, Brooklyn Hebrew Free Loan As-sociation, Council of Jewish Wosociation, Council of Jewish Wo-men, Council Home for Jewish Girls, Brooklyn Jewish Social Ser-vice Bureau, Hebrew Educational Society, Jewish Community House of Bensonhurst, Y. M. H. A. of Boro Park, Y. M. H. A. of Brooklyn, Y. M. H. A. of Williamsburg, Hebrew Free School of Browns-ville, Glory of Israel Hebrew In-stitute, Machzike Talmud Tona-thebrew National School, and New Hebrew School of Brooklyn.

Physicians' Committee Sponsors Affair to Aid Medical Department

A concert for the benefit of the medical department of Hebrew University in Jerusalem will be held at Carnegie Hall next Tuesday evening under the auspices of the American Jewish Physicians' Committee.

Organized in 1921 during a tour in the United States by Professor Albert Einstein on behalf of the University and Dr. Chaim Weizman, the American Jewish Physicians' Committee has as its objective the support of the department of micro-biology, and the chemistry department of Hebrew University.

Ten acres of land have been purchased on Mount Scopus as the purchased on Mount Scopus as the site for the proposed medical school of the university. Togeth-er with the Hadassah, the com-mittee is seeking to raise a fund totaling \$200,000 for a University Hospital. Both groups have totaling \$200,000 for a University Hospital. Both groups have equipped an X-ray institute in the University which is the first of its kind in Palestine and is on a par with any in the world.

The committee also supports the medical library of Hebrew University, known as the Dr. Jul-ius Jarcho Medical Library, which houses more than 25,000 volumes.

It is barely possible that the Austrian Nazis may not combine openly with their colleagues in Germany, setting up instead a separate organization and govern-ment, thus giving other nations no valid cause to claim violation of the Versailles Treaty, Simonds said. He added, however, that un-ion will nevertheless gradually be effected.

Hitler's next step, the speaker claimed, is absorption of Czecho-lievakia, with the eastern part given to Hungary and the western portion retained by Germany. Unportion retained by Germany. ChicagoProject By Rosenwald Suffers Loss

Buildings for Negroes Loses Money for First Time

(Special to the J.D.B.)
CHICAGO, Feb. 21.—For the first time since the Michigan Avenue Garden apartments were erected by the late Julius Rosenwald at a cost of \$2,000,000, the nig Negro apartment group has shown a loss. At the annual meeting of the board of directors of the Michigan Boulevard Garden Apartments corpor-ation, held yesterday at the First National Bank in the offices of the chairman of the board, Edward E. Brown, the audited report disclosed a deficit of approximately \$8,000 for 1933.

This is only one-half of one per cent, of the capital investment after allowances for all expenses and fixed charges, it was stated by Al-fred K. Stern, president of the corporation. These fixed charges in-clude taxes and interest at five and one-half per cent. on a mort-gage which has been reduced from \$1,000,000 to 750,000 during the last three years from the profits on the operation of the building. An average depreciation of three per cent. was allowed on the building and equipment.

The average occupancy for 1933 was eighty-seven per cent, and bad debts were three and one-half per cent. The report shows that per cent. The report shows that the building at present has an oc-cupancy of ninety-six per cent. with an average room rental per month of \$10.50 after allowing for free gas, electricity and refrigera-tion and bonus certificates. This rent average is a reduction of thir-ty per cent. from the rental charged in 1930.

charged in 1930.

In his report Mr. Stern pointed out the earnings record of the big housing project on the \$1,500,000 capital stock has been four per cent, for 1930, three and sevententh per cent, for 1931 and nine-tenths per cent, for 1932. Mr. Stern said the continuous record of earnings through 1930, 1931 and 1932, with only a slight loss in 1933, and the conservative write off for depreciation and all other charges, was a better record than

charges, was a better record than practically any other real estate development in Chicago can claim. Mr. Storn, who is chairman of the Illinois housing commission, said. Public works funds are more than justi-fied for investment in the low cost housing field if the rents are low enough to provide new housing for those who have not been reached by private capital during prosper-ous eras or in a depression.

WesternTempleHas Fine Collection Of Books, Judaism

Milwaukee Congregation Maintains Valuable Library and Museum

MILWAUKEE, Feb. 23 .- With the recent addition of many gifts of books and historical Jewish objects. Temple Emanu-El B'ne Jeshurun has developed what is believed to be the most outstanding congregational library and museum in the midwest.

Its library has grown to over 4,000 volumes on religion and Judaica, and is now being used intensively by college students and teachers, speakers seeking facts on Jewish topics, and program chairmen of many organizations. as well as the congregation and its school of religion. Hundreds of Gentiles have also utilized the library, and the Milwaukee Public library has referred many of its patrons to the temple for Jewish volumes it did not itself pos

Hundreds of reference works are maintained by the library; 30 current magazines; a clipping department, and a wide selection of books on the Nazi movement that has drawn many students of the subject to the temple.

Rabbi Joseph L. Baron plained that the library also has a complete file of the Jewish Quarlish editions) for the past 45 years; many old, out-of-print Jew-ish periodicals: a continued ish periodicals; a continuous col-lection of other Jewish magazines; a wide variety of anti-Semitic lit-erature; and hundreds of volumes

on Jewish drama and music.

The library is classified according to modern cataloguing sys-tems, and books are lent free. The salary of the librarian, Mrs. Ida Beller, is paid out of the temple's budget. Development of the library is directed by a committee headed by Mrs. Hugo Teweles.

The museum, with rarities esti-mated to be worth \$25,000, contains a collection of contemporary Jewish art, Jewish historical and ceremonial objects, objects exca-vated in Jerusalem, ancient He-brew coins, old prints and pic-tures on Judaism, Jewish charms and amulets and archives of old Jewish organizations in this city and the state.

Death of Gallant King Albert A Deep Loss to World Jewry Mourn Albert

Ruler and Consort in Act and Word Abhorred Race Hate

This week Belgian Jewry mourned the passing of the be-loved Albert, King of the Belgians, hero leader of the little country in its resistance against the in-vading German army in 1914. World Jewry mourns the death of a high-minded, simple, democratic individual who abhorred anti-Semitism and on more than one occasion showed his friendliness to the Jewish people in general and to the Zionist movement in parti-

to the Zionist movement in parti-cular. The King was loved and respected by his Jewish subjects. In an exclusive statement to the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, the Belgian Minister in Washington, S. Paul May, declared: "His Ma-jesty, King Albert has always con-sidered the members of every relielous faith on a footing of shanlute equality; holding for all of them in his heart, the same sentiment of royal favor and solici-tude." Minister May is Jewish.

Last November, Queen Eliza-beth, consort of the dead monarch, paid a visit of state to the Yiddish theatre in Brussels to witness the performance of "Kiddush Hash-em," a play by Sholem Asch, which portrayed the sufferings of the Ukrainian Jews during the pogrom period of Bogdan Chmelnitz-The Queen stayed through the whole performance, which was given by the Wilno troupe, and later received the director of the

troupe to whom she expressed her interest in the play. Meaning of the Visit

The entire Belgian press hailed the Queen's visit to the Yiddish the Queen's visit to the Yiddish theater as an event of importance heads as a demonstration of the sympathy of the Belgian ruling house with the Jews. It interpreted the Queen's visit as a protest by her against anti-Semitism in general as well as against the persecution of the Jews in Germany.

A month previous, King Albert had granted a lengthy audience to Dr. Chaim Weizmann, head of the Zionist commission for the settlement of German Jewish refugees in Palestine. It was understood that Dr. Weizmann discussed curthat Dr. Weizmann discussed cur-rent happenings with the Belgian ruler and described to him the work of upbuilding Palestine and the future possibilities of the coun-try, in which the King was known to be interested and which he had

At the same time the liberal immigration policy pursued by Belgium after the World War and for which the King was known to be responsible permitted the entry of many thousands of East Eurows into the country led to the creation of flourishing Belgian Jewish communities in such centers of population as Brussels and Antwerp

I called on Yehudi Menuhin with no psychological intention. I saw the young violinist, broke bread with him, walked and talked with him for more than an hour and, what is more important, saw him and spoke with him in the matrix of his family. In no single moment of the three hours that I spent with the Menuhins did I have the consciousness that a show was being put on for my benefit, or that the routine of those three hours was altered in the slightest degree. There was the give and take of table conversation and differences of opinion between father and son were freely aired. On neither side was there any impo-sition of authority and one could sense in young Menuhin's manner a quiet tenacity of intellectual purpose. I emerged from that in-terview with the assurance that Yehudi Menuhin is not only a gifted young violinist, but a rich personality maturing in every direction. He is as unusual in other as he is in the role in which the public is aware of him-a vio-

Young, But Intelligent

Yehudi Menuhin is seventeen years of age and the first blond down is flecking his cheeks. He is tall and slightly heavy. He is slow of speech and deliberate of thought. He answers your question with less words than your question took. less words than your question took.

I don't think he likes gush, and
insincerity in another makes him uncomfortable. I have a feeling that he manifests this anticipation of discomfort by a disinclination to look you straight in the eye. He thinks of many things besides his music. For a performer who carries in his mind the widest violin repertoire in the world and who can fill Carnegie Hall to the brimming-over point for two consecutive performances, he is most remarkable for the range of his curiosities. For example: the other was awake for half an hour solving, by mathematics, a card trick which had been performed the previous evening to the puzzlement of his elders. "In the dark," he told me, "it is easier to concentrate." He is intensely interested in Russia and he believes that Russia has a solution for the world. He plans some day to visit the Soviet states. He is keen on languages and although he can use several now with easy fluency, he is having tutors in others, in which he is weak, notably Russian, Spanish and Italian. The gift is not ex-plained by heredity, replied Mr. Menuhin, and quoted his wife as saying that if the gift came from an ancestor, it came from an ancestor, it came from none other than King David.

Plays for Music's Sake

Yehudi Menuhin, now seventeen has been performing on the con-cert stage for almost ten years and at no time has he not self-possessed and at ease with his audience, no matter how vast. Part of the explanation lies in the manner of his upbringing and the upbringing, for that matter, of the time was Yehudi put in his place, or excluded from the company of elders, or denied part in the conversation of the mature. The Jewish Sense of Humor

By IRVING DAVIDSON

In these times of economic Jewish humor must reflect and stress, the suffering of the Jew is as keen as that of any other representative class of population. Yet in searching through the storehouse of his rich past, he may still find the consolation of a keen sense of humor, ever present, and which centuries before did much to lend cheer and give heart, if only for a brief time, to his breth ren of bygone days throughout the long stretches of their bitter history. From these same wells of Jewish laughter there still flow living waters to cool and refresh the troubled spirit of Israel, banishing all the darkness and sad ness of the human heart, like the brilliant rays of the sun dispersing the heavy clouds and bringing light and warmth into the world. The Jewish sense of humor is hard to define because it is so nard to denne because it is so closely identified with the complex and extremely diversified nature, character and disposition of the Jew himself and so necessarily

though he may not know it. he is stating in another form the ques-tion; if a tree falls in the heart of the jungle and no one hears can it be said to have fallen? vehudi that tree has not fallen, for practical purposes. Even the coloring of a flower, Yehudi re-flects, serves the practical purpose of attracting the bees and aiding in the process of pollenization. Music must be heard and must be enjoyed; it must, in short, serve a practical purpose before it can serve an aesthetic purpose. He re-sents the evidences of misery in the world and would himself much happier if he knew that the world knew joy rather than sorrow. "He is a radical boy," said his father, and I could perceive Yehudi's impatience at the slow rate at which the world is moving toward improvement. There was nothing more boyish about him, it seemed to me, than that impatience. To compress that point of

chronicle in its varied aggregate the very life of the Jew. However, a number of characteristics might be ventured without danger of exaggeration. That Jewish humor in its essence is intellectual and subtle as opposed to physical and physiological; it is a larger laughphysiological; it is a larger laugh-ter as, in the contrary sense, the Jew had a keener cry. of pain; it is, so to speak, the laughter of the mind as opposed to the laughter of the body, producing a humor which brims with nimbleness of intellect, with a scintillating and trenchant logic, incisive reasoning, and which actually instructs while it delights. Also, that the Jew is peculiarly given to being humorpecularly given to being numor-ous at his own expense, preferring to laugh at himself before others do so contemptuously; and yet at the same time ready to forgive much wh'm his risibilities are tickled. When the Jew does strike back at his oppressor, he does so by way of repartee, quip or sally growing inevitably out of the growing inevitably out of the darkness of retaliation and always intending that the blows be regarded only in a spirit of jest or merriment.

Brevity Its Core

Ultimately, as brevity is the essence of wit in general, it is like-wise the soul of Jewish wit, and as an eminent contributor to the galety and pleasure of nations, the Jew also, in his keen sense of humor, has cultivated a rare quick-ness in noting the absurdity of claims or the delicate lines which separate the sublime from the ri diculous.





Spengler Pronounces Doom

OSWALD SPENGLER wrote "The Decline of the West" and OSWALD SPENGLER wrote "The Decline of the West and has therefore a great vogue as a philosopher. He has just given us the first part of a book to be known as "The Hour of Decision" under the sub-title of "Germany and World-Historical Evolution." It is so hard to appraise fairly and accurately a book which does violence to every value you have been brought up to believe in that my first impulse, as a liberal, if not a radical, as a pacifist and as a Jew, is to condemn, denounce and ridicule Herr Spengler. But possessing also, with my other weaknesses, a pas-sion for fair play and perhaps bending a little under the weight of Herr Spengler's reputation, I do not know whether this is the voice of a prophet crying in the wilderness, or of a vindictive fool.

Gospel of the Right "The Hour of Decision," it can fairly be said, was written by a man who had his spurs on. It is the gospel of the Right against the Left. It preaches the inevit-ability of War, the necessity for a Caesar; it is an affirmation of a Caesar; it is an amrimation of Frussianism as the core of strength of the "white" nations. From these nations are excluded Russia and Southern Italy and Spain. It affirms the "Faustian spain. It imms the Faustian soul" as against the undifferentiated mass. It beepeaks the aristocrat against the "workers" who are aggrandizing themselves at the cost of their superiors and to the ruin of civilization. It argues for the immediate cancellation every gain of labor since 1840 or thereabouts and against every right of representation of the es gained since about 1792. "The Hour of Decision" is an ar-"The Hour of Decision" is an argument against the tax on the community of the political wage, as against the economic wage, and against the inroads of the mass through Parliamentary representation. I think that Herr Spengler must find even Hitlerism inadequate, although he does not count on the device of anti-Semit ism to bring Germanic readers to the bookshops. Whether he is a the bookshops. Whether he is a prophet or a fool, I must say that his philosophy is consistent and integrated — however profoundly it wars with every decent instinct in man. Extolls Prussianism

A bench and bar dinner will be held on the follow-ing evening at the Hotel Parker, with Judge Lewis Goldberg heading the sponsoring committee. On Thursday night, March 1, a medical and dental dinner will be held at the Hotel Parker. Dr. Hyman Morrison heads the sponsoring committee. Maurice Samuel and Lieutenant Governor Gaspar Bacon are among those scheduled to speak.

Many leading women's groups are also aiding in the campaign, with the definite aim of raising \$20,000 for the support of 250 Ger-man Jewish children in Palestine. A thousand women volunteers are expected to comb every district of greater Boston in a house-to-house canvass which will start March 1.

THE WEEK IN REVIEW

Uncertainty, unrest and the fear of impending disaster is the lot of the thousand-year-old Austro-Jewish community in the troubled period through which Austria is passing. While Chancellor Dollfuss and his second in command, Major Emil Fey, continue their attempts to reassure the Jews and, incidentally, foreign opinion so important to the Dollfuss regime, that the government has no intention of taking any steps against the Austrian Jews, leadintention of ers of the Christian Socialists, the clerical group and the leaders of the anti-Semitic Fascist Heimwehr announce that they are fighting for a "German Christian state" with two classes of citizens. The Jews are to be in the second or lower class. A strong faction in the Dollfuss government seems bent on introducing severe re-strictions against the Jews, but without Nazi violence. It is sig-nificant that the Heimwehr, which insists on anti-Semitism, is heavily armed and has led the Chancellor to repudiate, to some extent, his own party, the Christian Social-ists. M. A. Tenenblatt, chief Austrian correspondent of the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, was expelled the country after living in Vienna sixteen years. The Dollfuss government objected to his dis-No charges were filed against the newspaperman. He had been warned earlier that the tenor of his dispatches was not pleasing to the Dollfuss regime. More than 5,000 Jewish families face immediate starvation. In the drive to rid the state and municipal administrations of Socialists, Jewish employes were summarily dismissed although they were not Socialists. None of the vacancies thus created was filled with Jewish supporters of Dollfuss. In all cases, Heimwehr or Christian Socialists received the posts. The Vienna Jewish community is making arrangements to feed these w Jewish poor from funds donated for the purpose. Dr. Emmerich Czermak, leader of the Christian Socialists, speaking at a party conference, repeated the canard so assiduously spread by the government during the fight-ing that the Jewish Socialists ing that the Jewish Socialists leaders had fied like cowards from the fighting, leaving the workers to die on the barricades. At the same time he was making the ch a court martial sentenced the Jewish Socialist leader Urdler to twenty years imprisonment for participation in the fighting.

Germany From Berlin comes news of an easing of restrictive measures against Jews in industry. How-ever, since the measures came from the central government itself, it remains to be seen how much attention provincial Nazi organizations will pay to orders from Berlin . . In East Prussia, the Nezi land commissar told the peasants to trade with whomever they please, "Aryans" or "non-He declared that at Aryans." He declared that at-tempts to exert pressure on the peasants would be regarded as sabotaging the upbuilding of the state and would be treated accord-ingly . . . The semi-official traveiing magazine published by the government-owned railways carries a number of Jewish advertiseof Jewish hotels, including some in which the Mogen David is prominently displayed. Thus the wide-spread boycott against Jewish advertisements seems definitely broken . . . Jewish organizations in Germany seem to be adopting a somewhat firmer tone. This week the Central Union of German Citizens of the Jewish Faith announced that it was undertaking the protection of Jewish com-mercial representatives recently expelled from their trade associations under the "Aryan clause

It is thought that the long-drawnout hearing may end within a fortnight . . . Hebrew daily papers point out that while the govern-ment, with an enormous budget surplus on hand, continues to fear unemployment, a definite shortage exists in Palestine. Davar pointed out that ships wait in groups in the harbors of Jaffa and Haifa to be unloaded, with no workers to be had and that the me thing applies to many of the industries with improvements in factories and machinery postponed because of the shortage of labor.

Belgian Jewry mourned the death of Albert, King of the Belgians. The King was known to be interested in the Zionist movement and on more than one occasion expressed his friendliness toward the Jews and Zionism. He visited Palestine and expressed his enthusiasm for the constructive work of the Jews there. At the time of his death, the King was said to have been planning an-other trip to Palestine. Italy, they say, has quite another situation. The Italian Jews are quite another brand of Jew. But here in Austria, the Jews must be placed on a much lower level. In Austria they must, on no conbe permitted to maintain equal citizenship rights.

The attitude of the Christian Socialist Party toward the Jew is very similar. Now the Social Democrats have been prescribed and are eliminated from the political arena. Now the field is clear for all reactionary parties, from the Nazis to the Christian Socialists, Now the Austrian constitution may be amended without any opposition or difficulty whatsoever.

The Present Dange And it is in this point that the greatest danger lies for the Jews of Austria.

At the present moment there is barricade fighting in the s of Vienna. But I have no streets of Vienna. doubt that soon after my article reaches New York, Austria will have a new constitution—one that has been "reformed," one based on the thesis that Austria is a

Christian country and that the Jews must enjoy no constitutional rights in Austria. Anyone who thinks that it will be possible, through the League

of Nations, to force Austria to protect the rights of the Jews is mistaken. It would be wrong to assume that as much noise hire be made at the League of Nations about Austria as was made Germany's violation of Jewish rights in Upper Silesia.

The Austrian government — the government of Dollfuss, of the Christian Socialist Party and of Heimwehr, is prepared for an attack. Austria knows that the only thing the Jews can do is complain to the League. Austria is prepared to deprive the Jews of their rights in such a fashion that even the League of ons will not be able anything.

What Suvitch Said

In intimate diplomatic circles where they know just what Doll-fuss said to Suvitch, Under-Secretary of foreign affairs of Italy, when he was here recently-they also know that Suvitch tried to warn Dollfuss not to play with the Jewish question, to follow Musso-lini's example and let the Jews alone

Dollfuss's reply to this advice was: we cannot help ourselves. We shall not openly rob the Jews of Austria of their rights, as was done in Germany. Should we be obliged to change our constitution in a manner which would affect the Jews, no power in the world will be able to keep us from doing

That is the sentiment of Dollfuss. And Dollfuss really has n knows that when the Jews declare a boycott against Austria, Austria will really be crushed. He knows that when the Jews stop support-ing Austria financially Austria will be bankrupt. He knows that when the Jews arouse the press of the world against Austria, Aus tria will be in very much of a pre-

Nevertheless . . .

He is very well aware of all less things. Nevertheless the Austrian constitution will nowafter the defeat Democrats-certainly be changed. Nevertheless, too, Austria will be proclaimed a "purely Christian" country.

tainly have no more rights. The ring around the Jews in ustria is becoming smaller and Austria is becoming smaller and smaller. Something must be done for the Austrian Jews. Now, when Austria is not yet completely in the hands of the Nazis, something can still be done. Appeals can be made, and if these are unavailing, something could perh availing, something could perhaps be accomplished by threatening. Later things will be much worse. A salon in the S. S. Kosciuszke yesterday was consecrated as a synagogue by a group of orthodox rabbis who presented the lines with the Holy Scroll, Safer Ha-Ceremonies were simple and impressive.

The Kosciuszko was anchored off the Thirty-ninth street pier in Brooklyn and will sail for Gdynia, Poland, this morning. A majority of its passengers are Jewish. The scroll was given to the liner

by the Kosciuszko Friends, an organization of former passengers on the ship, who meet regularly and arrange for placing newcom-ers in the United States in positions and comfortable homes. Off. pers, accompanied by about a doz-na rabbis, arrived at the pier in a als which started from Conus which started from Congrega-on Agudath Ansche Mamod, 156 enry street, about noon. They pere accompanied to the salon by aptain Eustazy Borkowski. Deck ands served choice Polish vodka or the ceremonies.

Await Cameraman

The president of Kosciuszko Friends, Philip Sinitzer, who are ranged the affair, instructed the rabbis to await the pleasure of six photographers who were late in arriving. The rabbis, most of them bearded ancients, promptly

disposed of their vodka.

Rabbi David Levine, of the Stockton Talmud Torah, Brooklyn opened the scroll and inscribed the first line of Genesis and the last line of Malachi, according to an old custom which ordains that the law be written in the house of prayer where it is to be used. Surrounding Rabbi Levine dur-

ing the cereniony were Rabbi Sam-uel A. Ruben, Rabbi Schmul Zwei Rosengarten, Rabbi Meyer Such-Rosengarten, Kabbi Meyer Such-man, Rabbi Moshe Jehude Kaplan, Rabbi Simcha Leib Schatz, Rabbi Zwei Wolf Greenberg and Rabbi Chaim Ruben. Rabbi Ruben offi-

Rabbi Enoch Stavatycki, who is spiritual adviser for Jewish pas-sengers on board the S. S. Koscluszko, officially accepted the Torah and announced that Sabbath services will be held regu-larly. In the past, he said, wor-shippers gathered on the prome-nade deck when weather permitnade deck when weather permit-ted. Henceforth, he said, the services will be designed for larger congregations and formal worship.

Problem of Three Faiths

There was some difficulty in deciding where the scroll was to be placed. The ship nas no single room in which Jewish services can be held to the exclusion of all other activities. Captain Borkowski told The Bulletin that a great many Catholic passengers use the Kosciuszko and they celebrate mass in the same room where on mass in the same room where on Saturday Jews congregated for their own worship. He admitted that it might be embarrassing to sing High Holy Mass in a room where the Holy Torah was lodged.

But the captain said he remem-bered an army post where a similar situation confronted soldiers of three faiths, and the Roman Catholles were not amiss, he said, to hold communion in the room where Jews worshipped. The Catholic chaplain on board could not be reached for comment.

Anti-Race Hate Welfare Board Bill Introduced MeetingSunday In New Jersey

Aims to Apply Severe Penalties Against Disseminators

(J.D.B. Special Correspondence) TRENTON, N. J., Feb. 23 .bill, believed to be a blow toward dissemination of Nazi propaganda in this State, was introduced into in this State, was introduced into the State Legislature Monday by Minority leader Rafferty of Mid-dlesex. The measure aims to apply severe penalties against those guilty of spreading propaganda against any group because of their religion, race or color.

While the bill does not me my specific organization, it is believed to be aimed at Nazi propa-gandists in this State. It would materially strengthen the constitutional rights of civil and religious liberty here. The measure prohibits issuing, possessing or disseminat-ing propaganda, whether oral or written, which "tends to subject written, which "tends to subject any group or groups to prejudice, shame, hatred, ridicule, disgrace or contempt by reason of race, color, religion, creed or manner of worship." It also bans delivery by hand or circulation in any manner, by mail or otherwise, of any such propaganda.
