Students May Keep Citizenship if Practice in Other Lands

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
BERLIN, March 11.—German Jewish medical and dental students who can prove that they have obtained employment abroad will be permitted to graduate without being compelled to renounce their German citizenship, Dr. Bernhard Rust, Prussian Minister of Education, announced today. Jewish doctors and dentists will only be compelled to renounce the right to practice in Germany, Dr. Rust said.

Up to now the Nazi authorities prevented the graduation of German Jewish students in these fields unless they renounced their German citizenship rights and left the country immediately.

The Jewish applicants for diplomas in the fields of medicine and dentistry must address their requests to their own medical faculties and each application must be accompanied by a declaration of their renunciation of the right to practice in Germany. However, the decision on each individual case will be left to the discretion of the Minister of Education.

In addition to dismissing a large number of Jewish physicians from all state employment under the "Aryan clause" and depriving other Jewish physicians of a living through the boycott against the Jews, the Nazis have imposed restrictions against Jewish students, declaring that there are still too many Jewish doctors and dentists left in Germany.

Numerous clauses have been imposed in all the German universities, limiting the number of Jewish students to a figure slightly less than the percentage of Jews in the German population. In some German universities the Jewish students are compelled to carry special yellow cards without which they are not admitted to lectures. But the chief weapon against Jewish students is the threat of expelling them from the universities.

First sums are required, then Jewish people are expected to give its proper answer to Hitlerian by saving the victims of Hitlerism. Free Synagogue Sermon Is a Stirring Story of War for Reform

Forty years of uncompromising struggle against political corruption, religious intolerance, and social pollution have convinced Rabbi Dr. Stephen S. Wise of the soundness of the ancient adage, it pays to speak the truth.

Preaching a pre-anniversary sermon yesterday on the eve of his sixtieth birthday before more than 1,000 persons who gathered at the Free Synagogue in Carnegie Hall, Rabbi Wise reviewed the highlights of the triumphs and failures during the course of his career.

Characterizing himself as a man who "just wasn't born to be a fu-

Joint Drive for Refugee Work, Relief and Palestine Budgets

Joint Distribution Committee and American Palestine Campaign Merge Fund Plea—McDonald Urges Support of Drive

A concerted effort on the part of the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee and the American Palestine Campaign of the Jewish Agency for Palestine to raise \$3,000,000 for relief work among German Jewish refugees was announced yesterday. Officers of the administrative body to direct the campaign have not yet been chosen.

The drive, which is to enlist the joint efforts of both organizations, follows a plea by High Commissioner James G. McDonald, of the German refugee bureau, for funds to be used in a program of reconstruction work among refugees within and without Germany.

Two statements came from leaders of the Jewish organizations and from Mr. McDonald, asking that contributions toward the relief program be made as evidence that donors are "aware of the desperate needs of the hour."

Allocation of Funds

The joint statement which was issued by Paul Baerwald and Rabbi Joseph B. Wise, representing the Joint Distribution Committee and Louis Lipsky and Louis Rothberg, representing the American Palestine campaign, pointed out that the funds collected will be allocated in two channels.

From the first funds to be collected, says the statement, \$250,000 will go toward the program of the Jewish Agency and the same amount for the Joint Distribution Committee. An additional \$250,000 for each organization will be used to meet commitments. An allocation committee to "represent the joint objective of both groups, whose members are yet to be chosen, to apportion the remainder of the fund raised.

High Commissioner McDonald's statement, couched in simple and direct language, sets out with a tribute to the "willingness to make generous sacrifices in behalf of their fellow Jews" of the Jewish people, and asks that the response in this drive be "prompt and whole-hearted."

Appeals For Contributions
"It is only through the generosity of private contributors that those of us engaged in the task of finding new homes for refugees—tens of thousands of helpless, innocent exiles—can help to make our work effective," said the High Commissioner.

"Once more, as so frequently throughout their long heroic and tragic history, the Jews are showing their willingness to make generous sacrifices in behalf of their fellow Jews," Mr. McDonald said.

"The decision of the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee and the American Palestine Campaign to merge their efforts for Palestine to make a united effort to raise \$3,000,000, to be used in large part to meet the immediate needs of the refugees in Germany, deserves the highest praise. I hope that the response, both from Jews and non-Jews, will be prompt and whole-hearted. It is only through the generosity of private contributors that those of

us engaged in the task of finding new homes for the refugees—tens of thousands of helpless, innocent exiles—can help to make our work effective.

"The concerted effort of the Joint Distribution Committee and the American Palestine Campaign is a fulfillment of the hope which I have frequently expressed, both publicly and privately, since the first meeting of the High Commission at Lausanne last December. This coordination will, I am confident, result, just as it has in the past, in a more effective and as most essential, a nation-wide effort on behalf of the approximately 50,000 Jewish refugees from Germany.

"The plight of the Jewish men, women and children who, through no fault of their own, are today homeless and desperately uncertain of the future, is one of the gravest problems facing mankind. The direct effects on the individuals concerned are, in all conscience, bad enough; but the implications of the situation are so grave as to disquiet all those who believe that religious and racial tolerance are essential qualities of civilized man. The issues involved are as broad as humanity itself.

A Complicated Problem.

"The problems created by the situation in Germany are complicated. Their solution involves aiding the Jews still in Germany, to maintain their cultural and racial institutions, and their association of relief and rehabilitation, the absorption of portions of the refugees in countries where they now find themselves, and the settlement of tens of thousands German Jews in Palestine and in other countries whose doors the High Commission is endeavoring to open to them.

"I am confident that the Jews of the United States will show by their deeds that they are fully aware of the desperate needs of the hour. Their generous response will enormously facilitate the task which the High Commission for Palestine is undertaking. Moreover, the prompt success of this united campaign will hearten all of those engaged in similar endeavors elsewhere. It will also demonstrate once more to the whole world and particularly to the governments which make up the High Commission, and which

Hits Steuben Society for Chiding Mayor

German-Jewish Group Asks LaGuardia to Disregard Protest

Labeling the Steuben Society "the organization which under its present leadership is practicing race hatred contrary to its own constitution," the Federation of German-Jewish Societies attacked the Society for its criticism of the part played by Mayor LaGuardia in the "Case of Civilization Against Hitlerism."

In a letter to the Mayor, Robert Rosenbaum, president of the German-Jewish group, and Fritz Schlesinger, chairman of the executive committee, ask the Mayor to disregard the Steuben Society protest.

The letter recalls the promotion by the Steuben Society of a German Day celebration under the auspices of December 6, at which Nazi elements led by the Steuben Society, met the protests of New York Jews and liberals with demands for rights of free speech. At this celebration Rosenbaum and Schlesinger, who appeared as good will envoys of German Jews, were harassed and expelled from the meeting.

Protest Not Representative
"The leading motive of the German Day celebration, arranged and carried out by the Steuben Society, has been on the right of free speech, a right which the Steuben Society wishes now to deny you," the letter states.

The Federation of German-Jewish Societies asks the Mayor "not to regard the letter of the Steuben Society as the voice of the American Jewish community in New York." On the contrary, the Federation states that it has the fullest confidence in your office conduct and are firmly convinced that all your actions have been inspired entirely and only by the democratic principles of America," the letter states.

Shortly before the convention of the "Case of Civilization Against Hitlerism" at the Garden last Wednesday, the Steuben Society wrote the Mayor asking him to take no part in the proceedings in order to subvert the "rising race hate" in New York. "We note with regret that you concern yourself in other fields which do not fall within the domain of the activities of your office," the Steuben Society letter observed. This protest was made public in the New Yorker Staats-Zeitung.

Counteract Nazi Propaganda

The first of a series of pamphlets by the National Council of Jewish Women to provide its leaders with information to assist them in fighting anti-Semitic propaganda comes from the press today. It is called "Anti-Semitism—A Study Outline."

Showdown Due Wednesday On Dickstein Anti-Nazi Bill

Holds 'Handful of Trumps,' Says Congressman—Fascist, Anti-Semitic Groups Will Also Be Investigated, He Asserts

Expressing expectation that his resolution calling for a House of Representatives special committee to investigate Nazi affairs in this country will be passed, Congressman Samuel Dickstein declared yesterday, "The showdown comes Wednesday, and I have a handful of trumps."

Dickstein interpreted unanimous adoption of his resolution by the House Rules Committee last week as a forecast of complete victory for the bill when it is introduced on the floor.

Women's Luncheon for Federation Charities Attracts Many People

More than 300 reservations have been made thus far for the fourth annual luncheon to be given by the women's division of the Brooklyn Federation of Jewish Charities on April 11 at the St. George Hotel, according to an announcement made by Magistrate Jeanette G. Brill, chairman of the event. Proceeds will be applied toward the division's quota in the Federal 600,000 twenty-fifth anniversary campaign, which will be launched this Wednesday night with a dinner at the Brooklyn Jewish Center, 607 Eastern Parkway.

Fellowship Discusses 'Life'

Capacity for knowing his wants and ability to evaluate the past so that it can best be utilized for future growth were asked by Rabbi William Margolis at the Fellowship Dhab Zedek at the Jewish Fellowship symposium on "Life" yesterday afternoon at the Hotel McAlpin. "What I Want of Life" was his subject.

Rabbi I. L. Brill, leader of the Jewish Fellowship, discussing "What I Have Received From Life," said "I have never demanded from life the impossible, that is, I have never demanded from myself the impossible; therefore, life has given me everything I wanted—not everything I desired—in the fullest measure."

Reit Addresses Synagogue

"Events in Germany have taught us that the only safety for the Jew is to be found in his allegiance to his religion," Judge Hyman J. Reit said at an address at the United Synagogue Saturday morning at the Concourse Center of Reform. "Only by maintaining synagogues and other Jewish institutions can the Jew survive," Judge Reit said.

"All the news concerning Jews" is faithful, said Judge Reit, "and the Jewish Daily Bulletin is the only Jewish daily newspaper printed in English."

He also reported that his resolution is designed to strike at not only Nazi German propaganda groups here, but also "dozens of other organization which are equally important in attacking the government and races and classes residing in the country."

Among those due for investigation are the Silver Shirts, the Crusader While Priests, the Order of 76, and many other groups aiming at the overthrow of our present form of government, Dickstein asserted.

"Every day," he remarked, "new evidence is brought to my attention pointing to the creation of a new anti-Democratic group or to new schemes for American pogroms."

The Order of 76 is sworn to wipe out "Jewish lawlessness," whether it be "Jewish mobster racketeering" or "Jewish corruption in high office." The Silver Legion, headed by William Dudley Selley, is expanding rapidly throughout the country.

"Keep In Trim"
According to Congressman Dickstein, Selley has instigated athletic centers throughout the country, the purpose of which is to keep his groups "in trim."

It was said that Selley had designed his athletic groups with a view toward creating a sense of military discipline among his followers, which might be utilized in the order of a Fascist army in his coming bid for power. "Many right-thinking people in this country," Dickstein said, "have been tricked into serving this maniac. Those who follow him for the most part do not know the real purpose of the movement."

"As yet I have not definitely decided as to whether or not I shall seek the chairmanship of the committee," the Congressman stated. "In any event, having spent six months in hard and fruitful work at the task of gathering data on Nazi and anti-American propaganda, I shall certainly take a leading part in prosecuting the enemies of our government."

League Leads Boycott Survey In Windy City

Directed by Dr. Yard;
Stores Canvassed by
Volunteers

CHICAGO, March 8.—A city-wide survey of stores is being conducted by volunteer committees in an effort to learn what stores carry German-made goods as part of the boycott campaign against Germany here.

"When it is found that a store carries German-made goods, interested persons speak to the manager or send letters," said Dr. James M. Yard, former director of religion and professor of political science at Northwestern University, now executive secretary of the Chicago Committee for the Defense of Human Rights Against Nazism, which is conducting the campaign.

"In addition to bringing the disapproval of Hitler methods and German-made goods to the attention of stores, our committee is urging Jews and non-Jews to refuse to purchase such goods. They are encouraged to watch labels on products and to refuse to buy anything made in Germany, or her provinces," continued Dr. Yard.

The boycott movement is non-sectarian, Dr. Yard said. Both Catholic and Protestant members of his committee outnumber the Jewish members. The chairman of the Chicago committee is Salmon O. Levinson, and the president is Dr. Paul Hutchinson, managing editor of the Christian Century.

Cooperating Group
Another group which is cooperating in the boycott movement here is the Chicago committee of the American Jewish Congress. William A. Nudelman is executive secretary. Sidney David, attorney and son of Judge Joseph B. David, is chairman.

Boycott activities in Chicago are less aggressive than in New York to date, Mr. Nudelman explained. "German" exports in 1933, according to figures given out by the German government, dropped 16 per cent below those of previous years," Dr. Yard said in commenting on the effectiveness of the campaign.

"We have no way of knowing how much of the decrease is attributable to the boycott. We do know, however, that 200,000 non-Jews are supportive of the boycott in the United States, Great Britain, France, Holland, Belgium, South Africa, Egypt, Canada and several South American countries."

One of the principal jobs of his committee and similar committees throughout the country, says Dr. Yard, is to counteract an all-red anti-Semitic movement springing up in this country.

Milwaukee's 'Man of Peace' Again Conciliating Disputes

MILWAUKEE, Wis., March 11.—Harry Bragarnick, Milwaukee's "man of peace," unofficial arbiter in local labor disputes, is again at work trying to mediate strikes on a half dozen fronts.

A neighborhood merchant, Bragarnick has time and again spent days at his own expense arbitrating labor-employer struggles that often seemed insoluble. His work has received publicity and praise in the local press.

His latest achievement has been a settlement of a threatened strike

of electricians, power engineers and machinists at the Phoenix Hooley Company. Through conciliation between the workers and the owners, directed by Bragarnick, a wage adjustment was agreed to.

Bragarnick is now striving to bring peace between owners of several Milwaukee theatres and their striking workers and doormen. Thus far, the executive board of the Motion Picture Theatre Owners' Association has been cool to his intervention, but Bragarnick is keeping up his attempts at conciliation.

Several other strikes have just broken out in various local industries and Bragarnick is getting busy with plans for conciliation. Arbitration has become a passion with him, and whenever a strike occurs he is on the spot to bring the warring elements to an agreement.

Among major strikes he has mediated successfully in the past have been two at the Phoenix Hooley Company and one at the Fried-Osterman Company, both involving thousands of men and women.

One newspaper described him as a "true philanthropist." "I like this sort of work," he explains. "It is my charity. The best form of charity is that which prevents people from going into the breadlines."

Dr. Reuben L. Kahn Placed on Honor List

ANN ARBOR, Mich., March 9.—Reuben L. Kahn of the University of Michigan medical school faculty, was given a place on the 1933 honor list of the Magazine of Modern Medicine.

Dr. Kahn was born in Lithuania in 1887. Graduating from Valparaiso, Yale and New York Universities, he served from 1920 to 1928 as immunologist with the Michigan Department of Health and while in Lansing developed his prescription test for social diseases which shortly attracted world-wide attention because of its high percentage of accurate determinations, its simplicity and speed. He was recently awarded the annual \$1,000 prize of the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

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Jewish Life Reviewed in Latest Cables and Letters

Desperation Drives Jews To Support of Dollfuss

Gloom-Ridden Vienna, Fearing Nazi Victory, Predicts Reign of Anti-Semitic Terror; Jews Accept Lesser Evil

(This is the second of a series of articles by Eugene Lyons analyzing the position of the Jews in Europe today. The articles are appearing daily in the Jewish Daily Bulletin.)

VIENNA.
Adolf Hitler received his first schooling in anti-Semitism in the fair city of Gemuetlichkeit on the Danube. He was told the story in his strange autobiography, where he conveys more than the facts and misleads the reader with magnificent frankness.

The realization that Jews are an international conspiracy came to young Adolf as he wandered hungrily through Vienna streets in one prophetic flash which later flashes confirmed and deepened. In less mystic terms he means, no doubt, that the future Fuehrer, with his peculiar genius for reaching down to the very marrow of mass prejudice, made the parasitic anti-Semitism of Vienna his very own. He absorbed it, distilled its quintessence and injected that poison in the veins of Germany.

No self-respecting Jew in Vienna is unaware that the anti-Jewish scourge of Germany is to a large extent Austrian in its origin. It was the first ferment of every politically-minded Jew here whom I questioned about the situation. Non-Jews were no less conscious of it.

Encouragement Unnecessary
For the 300,000 Jews in Austria, about 220,000 of them in the capital, it is a fact surrounded with evil omens. Persecution of Jews in Austria, once it is given free reign, will need even less demagogical encouragement than in Germany.

The economic pressures that provided the real motive power for anti-Jewish propaganda in Germany are not only operative, but operative in much larger measure, in Austria. Here the economic crisis is sharper, the hunger for the jobs and trade held by the Jews more desperate. Being a larger proportion of the nation's total population—over ten per cent—these capital Jews are naturally more in evidence under circumstances that so many of the names by which modern Vienna is best known to the outside world.

Dr. Sigismund Freud, Arthur Schnitzler, Dr. Steinhilber, Molnar, etc.—are Jewish names added fuel to the fires of racial resentment. The famous trial and the prominence of Jews in the leadership of the Social-Democratic Party just extinguished in blood is even more effective in Austria than in Germany. When the government, after the suppression of the socialists, proceeded to cover the culpable deeds of certain public-minded men with white cloth carrying the Fascist symbol, it was trying to humiliate not only Social-Democratic but Jewish heads.

Wilder, Adler, the Christian Socials, was not only a Marxist but a Jew. And Dr. Otto Bauer and Julius Deutsch, who led the hoped-for Jewish Socialists to the communal homes, are to the mass of gun-toting Heilmann men not only socialists but Jews. The fact that the great Social-Democratic movement in Vienna has always been overwhelming non-Jewish is brushed aside, like all facts which do not fit into the Fascist mold.

Certain colleagues among the

foreign correspondents in Vienna have told me in all seriousness that the Austrian Nazis, in anticipation of power, have drawn up a long list of Jews who will be the first victims of anti-Semitism terror when the time comes. The list is supposed to contain the names of over a thousand men and women eminent in cultural, business and political life.

I cannot worry for the existence of such a list. Very likely it is imaginary. Yet the rumor of such preparations is significant as an indication of what the city expects.

A prominent foreign journalist here was good enough to let me see a private letter which he wrote to his editor. Since it was not for publication, he was able to express himself without the restraint imposed by political or other considerations. The concluding sentence in that letter was approximately this:

"If the Nazis come to power in Austria, we will witness St. Bartholomew's Night of anti-Semitism terror that will make the recent German events look like children's play."

A Shattering Disaster

That, too, may be exaggeration. But it also attests the strong current belief that Austrian Jewry is menaced by a shattering disaster. One begins to understand the deep unease, the sense of evil foreboding, manifest in the everyday life of Jews here. Not only among the humble and poor, but perhaps even more clearly among Jews with money, position and reputations.

Not patriotism but desperation drives so many of them to support the Catholic hierarchy of Dr. Engelbert Dollfuss or the Fascist organization of Major von Doerflinger. There is no genuine conviction in that support; it is an acceptance of the lesser evil.

The only real chance of the Austrian Jews in this difficult period is upon the St. Germain treaty and upon the world opinion which may oblige the League to invoke the treaty in their defense. It is felt here that Austria, as long as it is not an intrinsic part of Hitler's Reich, will be more secure from foreign criticism than Germany.

A City of Gloom

To an outsider, remembering Vienna in its relatively quiet days of four or five years ago, steeped in the Vienna of literature and musical tradition, the city today is a place of gloom and depression. Its whole history and tradition seem smothered under bayonets and smeared with blood.

The Prussian capital, stolid and regimented at all times, seems a more natural background for Fascist methods than the city of Austria. The curve of Vienna's streets and its rivers, the breadth and easy charm of the Ring and the intimate intimacy of the narrow winding alleys, the restful cafes and beer-halls—all of it is pathetically out of harmony with the machine-gun and sudden armed hunting force.

I am not merely going sentimental. I am trying to grasp what this moment of chaos and terror may mean to the Jews. If the transformation can touch an outsider thus, how heavily must it weigh on the spirits of those who very likely are woven into the fabric of Vienna's

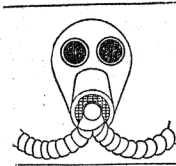

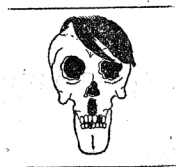

English M. P. Explains New Property Ruling Effected in Palestine

(J.P.A. Special Correspondence)
LONDON, Feb. 20.—Replying to a query put before the House of Commons today whether the new municipal ordinance for Palestine now in operation, why Tel Aviv had been deprived of the power to levy rates on unoccupied land as heretofore and why the women of Jerusalem had been deprived of their vote while the women of Tel Aviv retain the franchise, Malcolm McDonald said:

"The municipal corporation ordinance in Palestine was enacted on January 12. In section 102, it is provided that a Municipal Council with the approval of the district commissioner may levy a municipal property rate to be assessed inter alia upon the rateable value of unoccupied land.

"I have no information that power to impose such a rate has been withheld in the case of the municipal council of Tel Aviv.

"The ordinance provides for the grant of votes to women in Tel Aviv because this is known to be in accordance with the wishes of the local community.

"In the case of Haifa and Jerusalem, and other municipal areas, the ordinance provides machinery by which an alteration in the qualification of voters, including the grant of the vote to women, may be made in cases where it has two-third support."

All Palestine Unites Against Income Tax

Jews, Moslems, Christians Agree That Proposed Tax Is Harmful

(J.P.A. Special Correspondence)
JERUSALEM, Feb. 15.—There is much grumbling here among Jews, Moslems and Christians against the proposed income tax. Edgar Shelley, president of the Jerusalem Chamber of Commerce, a retired Australian, has been asked to call a meeting to discuss campaign methods to be employed against the proposed measure.

The Haifa Jewish Chambers of Commerce passed a resolution at a recent meeting asking government attempts to introduce an income tax in a time of prosperity.

An income tax for Palestine has again become a subject of government consideration and an official commission, consisting of the treasurer, William Joseph Johnson, the director of customs and trade, Kingsley Williams Stead, and the District Commissioner for Jerusalem, James Edward Francis Campbell, has been appointed to make evidence from chambers of commerce, representatives of the larger industries and professions, and from the public.

The income tax proposal raised before, evoked serious misgivings of the mercantile and civil communities. It led to various representations to the government opposing the suggestion and the High Commissioner, General Wauchope, explained to a joint meeting of Palestine Chambers of Commerce—Jewish, Moslem and Christian—on December 13, 1932, that while the government had not decided that the income tax must be introduced, nevertheless it had decided to obtain expert advice and the opinions of various sections of the community, and to consider to what extent the whole of Palestine would be included.

The present announcement by the government adds, "His Excellency then emphasized that the last thing government would wish to do would be to check the flow of capital into Palestine, or to make the investment of capital unremunerative." This had been the main contention of the Jewish Agency and other bodies interested in the Jewish upbuilding of the land.

"The primary object of an income tax," he said, "would be to increase the general standard of living."

As we announced last Friday, Sam Winegrad, six-foot forward of the City College crack quintet has been elected captain of the 1934-'35 basketball team, succeeding Coach Holman, center. Winegrad was one of the mainstays of the Lavender five during the past season, playing guard and forward and being successful. When Coach Holman forswore a dangerous opponent and a good shot on a visiting team, "Winnie" was chosen to be his constant shadow all during the game.

However, when there was no hope of perfect and continual guarding, Sam was sent in to roll up a score. He always comes to front shooting, too, and in a contest conducted among the colleges along the Atlantic seaboard last year, he placed first with ninety-seven consecutive baskets.

PREACHED IN CITY PULPITS

Goldenson Lauds Roosevelt

An appeal that Jews cooperate with President Roosevelt being made by Rabbi Isaac Goldenson in his sermon yesterday at Congregation Emanu-El, Fifth Avenue and Sixty-fifth street.

"When he looks over the American commonwealth, Franklin D. Roosevelt sees the same type of things and the same type of people that some of our sages of Israel saw," Rabbi Goldenson declared. "He sees the forgotten man."

"The President took pains to bring to the forgotten man the rabbi continued, thus assuring them that there is someone in high authority who is fighting for them, fighting to bring a 'new deal' in the crucible of the politically mighty." Mr. Roosevelt articulated the New Deal in what is called a planned society, Dr. Goldenson added. "The motive of this planning is to give a better place to the forgotten man in society, so as to bring the United States to a new position."

Declaring that there is something in the President's insight and motives which call forth understanding and sympathy from the Jews, Rabbi Goldenson counseled the congregation to think along the lines of social reconstruction in order to bring more cheer, well-being and happiness to the lives of the great masses of men.

The President's leadership "is a leadership of moral will and purpose," he said.

"We should be thankful," Dr. Goldenson concluded, "that we are living in America and not in another land where another leader is bringing together hateful nations and hateful ideas."

Steinberg on Divorce

In the second of a series of sermons on "Judaism and the Family," Rabbi Milton Steinberg of the Park Avenue Synagogue discussed "Divorce—the Jewish Position."

Describing the threatening increase of divorce throughout the United States, he pointed out the factors which are responsible for it. Dr. Steinberg interpreted the attitude of both those who hold that divorce is a sin and those who believe that it is a necessary evil and those who contend that they should be made more stringent.

"The great teachers of Israel have always realized that the law is not to be kept the family intact by making divorce difficult, that once the marriage has fallen there is no point in chaining two unhappy people to one another," Rabbi Steinberg declared. "Their method of preserving the integrity of the family was by imbuing people with a proper appreciation of the seriousness of marriage. The modern world, perplexed as it is over the threatened dissolution of the family, has turned to one another, the rabbis who insisted that the 'rope' approach to the marital problem is to emphasize the ideal

of marriage as a serious partnership. Once this idea is conveyed divorce cannot be a problem."

Asks Justice for South

"Justice to the negro and 'poor whites' of the South must be a part of the New Deal, and those who, for racial or economic reasons, refuse to practice justice must be warned lest they stir up resentment with dangerous consequences in the offing," declared Rabbi Louis N. Newman, speaking at Congregation Rodef Shalom, 7 West Eighth-street, yesterday. "One of the chief manifestations of John 'Wexley's' magnificent drama, 'Thy Shall Not Die,' is the need for the restoration of the economic position of the underprivileged in the class of the southern states. The ravages of the Civil War, the low status of popular education, the exploitation of the workers and the dissemination of fanaticism, racial and religious, have made the south a breeding center for many of the worst ills to which our nation is heir."

"It is no accident that John 'Wexley' is a Jew," Dr. Newman continued, and that the chief protagonist of justice in the drama is likewise a Jew; moreover, that the adversary in the eyes of the benighted and prejudice-ridden southern folk is the so-called Jew, banished from New York. Whenever individual Jews interest themselves in unpopular causes they bring upon themselves a veritable storm of wrath from those whose attitude they challenge. But there is within the bosom of every Jew, worthy the heritage of the prophets, a burning desire to bring justice to the oppressed, to bring to pass the reign of justice, and an irrepressible urge to oppose specific instances of economic and social persecution."

"Unlimited," the militant preacher admitted that on many occasions he was wrong in the causes he defended and chief among these was the cause of prohibition.

"Now I realize that I lacked the foresight to see what would support the legal sale of liquor," he said.

Hailing Mayor LaGuardia as "the greatest executive in the lifetime of this 'Rocky City,'" Dr. Wise declared what he called the shady activities of the Mayor's predecessors.

Dr. Wise recalled his fight with the administrations of Mayors Gaynor, Hyman and Walker and in colorful language described the wanton waste that prevailed while Tammany ruled New York during the past sixteen years.

He was bitter in his fight

against Mayor Hyman, said the speaker. At that time, a man ventured to introduce the two leaders to the other.

"Have you ever heard of Rabbi Wise," Hyman was asked.

"I ought to. He abused me enough"—to which Dr. Wise replied, "They abused you much, Mayor, but not enough."

Two men stand out among the famous personalities in modern Jewish history, according to Rabbi Wise. They are Dr. Theodore Herzl and Louis D. Brandeis, Justice in the United States Supreme Court.

He recalled the time when Zionism was in its infancy and spoke of the terrific opposition encountered by Dr. Herzl in advancing his ideal of a Jewish homeland.

There was a slight trace of irony in his voice when he referred to the fact that German Jews were the chief opponents to Zionism since its inception.

"Now," he said, "I seek a home for which they did absolutely nothing."

His Sense of Humor

His sense of humor undimmed, Dr. Wise related several anecdotes concerning his life in the public eye. He noted that once Mayor Gaynor said he was a ninth century copy of Dr. Parker, who was a copy of him.

"The only battles I regret having fought are those in which my opponents saw fit to use poison weapons against me. They usually attacked me for lying about them. Never in my career have I uttered deliberately a word against a man that was untrue."

"I regret these battles not because I was wrong on my character hurt me in any way, but for what it did to them," he continued.

"Despite my years of fighting, the real battles are just beginning. The Jewish people have many problems to solve before they can say they have won complete liberation."

Rabbi Wise reminisced about his fight for female suffrage while he was head of a congregation in Oregon.

"Oregon, which is about as big as New York and Pennsylvania put together and has about as many people as the Bronx, voted against giving the vote to women the time I campaigned for it. I left the state following that—and then they accepted it," he said. "I am proud that I fought for that cause."

The rabbi pointed out that a religious man is at an advantage in campaigning for any sort of cause, because the public realizes that he is not doing it for his own benefit.

With a final summation of his forty years in the pulpit, Rabbi Wise said: "I am glad that things now then I was when I started."

Preceding his sermon, Rabbi Wise officiated at a celebration by the young children of the congregation at the Free Synagogue house, 40 West 83rd-street.

He told the youngsters that religion means more to him than anything else in the world. He depicted the growth of the cause since its inception.

The children presented under the direction of Mabel Meyer "Sixty Years in tableaux," a dramatized version of Dr. Wise's life, written by Rabbi Berman and A. W. Berman.

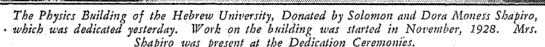

"The funds allotted to the American Palestine Campaign will be applied to the program being carried out by the Central Bureau for the Settlement of German Jew in Palestine, of which Dr. Chaim Weizmann is the chairman, and to the normal budget of the Kerem Howard (Palestine) Foundation."

"The funds allotted to the Joint Distribution Committee will be applied to continuing its activities of relief and reconstruction in co-operation with the German Jewish welfare organizations and with the refugee aid committees in various lands and toward the continuance of its programs of aid in behalf of the Jews of Eastern and Central Europe."

The Jewish Agency for Palestine and the Joint Distribution Committee will continue to cooperate with James G. McDonald, High Commissioner for Refugees coming from Germany, appointed by the League of Nations. Both organizations will also continue to work in cooperation with the Central British Fund for German Jewry.

Split Funds

"The fundraising was reached that, out of the first funds to be collected, the sum of \$250,000 each shall be allotted to the American Palestine Campaign for the program of the Jewish Agency in Palestine; and to the Joint Distribution Committee for its normal program of activities. In addition, commitments already made by the Joint Distribution Committee and by the American Palestine Campaign, in aid of the Jews of Germany and for the settlement of German refugees in Palestine, will require a further allotment of

\$250,000, which shall be made to each organization. The balance of the fund to be collected during the period of the joint campaign will be apportioned to meet the needs of the Jewish Agency for Palestine and the Joint Distribution Committee, in aid of the Jews of Germany and for the settlement of German Jews in Palestine, by an allocation committee jointly to be agreed upon by the representatives of both organizations, the members of which committee, we feel cer-

"The representatives of the American Palestine Campaign and the Joint Distribution Committee are still in conference with respect to the leadership and the administrative machinery of the campaign, announcement of which will shortly follow. It is deemed desirable, however, to make this advance statement in order that the American Jewish public, which has given unmistakable evidence of its desire for unity of action in dealing with the problem of Germany, may, as informed by the conclusion that has been reached, make immediate plans for combined campaigns in their respective communities."

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
