Nazi Preving On Jews Jailed And Expelled

Cell Leader and Wife Found Guilty of Extortion in Darmstadt

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
BERLIN, March 13.—A Nazi
cell leader and his wife who were charged with having used their Nazi status as a means of extorting money from a Jewish mer-chant have been sentenced to imprisonment by a Darmstadt court, which also ordered them expelled from the Nazi party and rescinded their citizenship rights for five

The cell leader, Otto Ernst, was given a one-year term. His wife, who led a woman's cell, must serve two and a half years in

In amounting the sentence the attorney for the state declared that the case called for severe punishment in order to protect decent Jews from indecent Nazis.

Einstein's Birthday Finds Him at Work: Just Another Day

"He thinks nobody knows he is having a birthday," Mrs. Einstein revealed. "He will be busy tomor-row with his usual routine. No, he is not even going out. He will be at home all day."

Meanwhile congratulations are pouring in from all parts of the world by mail, telegraph and cable. No reception is planned here, how-ever. The Einsteins do not even expect any visitors. "He likes to have a quiet day," Mrs. Einstein said.

Replying to the new nation-wide anti-Jewish boycott campaign initiated by the Nazi Trade and Artisans Association which is to begin March 23rd, the American begin March 23rd, the American Jewish Congress yesterday launched a new effort to bring about the boycott of German mer-chandise in this country and to eliminate German merchandise from American department stores, Dr. Joseph Tenenbaum, chairman of the Counter-Boycott Committee, announced.

An intensive radio campaign throughout the month of March which will parallel the Nazi drive in Germany has been initiated. It is to be supplemented with a white list of merchandising concerns which do not carry German pro-

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency) VIENNA, March 13.—Sturm VIENNA, March 13.—Sturm ueber Oesterreich, official organ of the Christian Socialist storm troops, who are led by Dr. Schu-schnigg, Austrian Minister of Justoday announced that the zenship of Jews naturalized in Austria since the war would be carried out soon in the widest possible fashion.

The paper urged the Minister of Economics not to permit naturalsecondnes not to permit natural-ized Jews to open new businesses or to transfer ownership of al-ready existing concerns into the hands of others, despite the fact that they have been citizens for more than sixteen years, and are entitled to the rights of citizens.

"The elimination of naturalized Jews from business must be car-ried out not in accordance with judicial regulations, but in accordance with the political interests of the state," the Christian Socialist paper said,

At the same time the Christi At the same time the Christian Socialist party issued a pamphlet calling for "practical anti-Samit-ism and the complete elimination of Jewish influence.

Declaims in Editorial It · Is Two-Edged Weapon

The New Yorker Staats-Zeitung, New York German dally, yester-day dedicated its editorial space to the contention that "The Boy-cott is a Two-Edged Weapon."

The editorial traced the effects of the boycott to the failure of spring Leipzig Trade Fair, dispatches, has collapsed utterly as far as foreign patronage goes. It recommends making the boycott

"The boycott," says the editorial, "is dangerous ammunition, which, considering the fact that it is threatening both sides, should be forbidden by law."

Boycott Expression of Unrest The editorial refers to the for-eign boycott of the Leipzig Trade Fair as one of the first expressions of international unrest since the "Peace of Versailles," an expression of unrest, it says, which

can become ever stronger. Declaiming that the prosperity of the world depends in large measure on the prosperity of Germany, the editorial prophesies that unless the boycott is made ununless the boycott is made un-constitutional the world in general must suffer. It quotes one German Jew, displaying at the Leipzig Trade Fair, as complaining that he is being boycotted by his own race in the United States.

Dr. Israel Goldstein, president of the Jewish National Fund of Amer ica, referred to the acquisition of land in Pal stine as "at least one corner of the world where Jewish hopes are not frustrated." He said that the interest of world Jewry is veering toward Palestine. The Jewish National Fund, he added, represens 'all that is fundamen-tal in Judaism."

Jews Are Hoodwinked. Says Commr. Howe. for Their Gifts

Indicating that in the sacred name of charity, racketeers in New York find their most fertile fields as representatives of fake Jewish religious enterprises, Stanley Howe, Chief Deputy Commiser in the Departm nt of Welfare declared war yesterday on a number of charity rackets, the majority of which prey on Jews.

Howe recently brought to light sufficient evidence to secure the whose aggregate receipts ran into many thousands of dollars.

"We are now ready with the facts regarding five other agencies of a similar nature," he wrote to Mayor LaGuardia, "which are ex-ploiting the poor and employing the name of "charity" to secure money from the public by fraud and misrepresentation for the per-sonal enrichment of unscrupulous promoters.

Of the five rackets now under investigation, four represent themnivestigation, four represent them-selves to be of a Jewish religious nature. One is a "synagogue" with a Catholic name. "This 'synagogue,'" Howe said

yesterday, "appears to be making money hand over fist. A battery of telephone solicitors, trading on vesterday. religion, takes Catholics and Jews alike for sums, which when to-talled amount to enough to build a real synagogue. The organiza-tion, needless to say, has neither synagogue nor temple, but be ause it is incorporated as a Jew sh synagogue we are unable to crack down on the racket." Get Exemptions

The law on such rackets is en-The law on such rackets is en-feebled, Howe revealed, by dis-pensations granted religious and fraternal societies from being specially licensed for charity drives. Licenses for securing money or donations of any sort in public must be obtained from the Department of Welfare, under a section of the New York ordinances. Another section, how-ever, makes the ruling inapplicable under the religious corporation's law, to such organizations as the one described.

Most incredible of all, in the phantasmagoria of Nazi ideas, is the charge that Jews dominated the county's life coupled with the theory of "Aryan" race superi-

e Jews are only one per cent of the German population—at most two per cent, if you count in admixtures of Jewish blood three generations back. Yet they acquired a disproportionate, often a dominant, place in the German legal and medical professions, in the universities, arts and sciences, in banking and trading.

That, in Nazi logic, is adduced as proof of the unique virtues and ineffable superiorities of the Ger-

By making blood rather than religion or faith-even highly diluted -the test of the matter, the Nazis deprived themselves of the argument that this Jewish control is the result of some mysterious plot. They use that argument, of course, but proceed to refute it themselves by persecuting Ger-mans who have long forgotten their distant relationship with

The Jewish Plot

They declaim over the Hebraic cabal, holding control by racial log-rolling as it were. But surely a professor whose grandfather was a Jew but who does not know it cannot have taken part in such a cabal. In casting him out from the university the Nazi regime is in effect admitting that it was Jewish blood, even one-sixteenth part of it, that helped him attain his eminent post.

I have read through a good deal of the anti-Semitic literature offi-cially published and circulated here. The facts are unquestion-ably doctored and weighted for ably doctored and weighted for effect. But it must be admitted that these books and pamphlets prove their point, prove it over-whelmingly. The extent to which Jewish Germans held posts of leadership in the national profes-sions existence letters theaten and sions, sciences, letters, theatre and the like was truly phenomenal.

Monument to Service

However this literature may strike an "Aryan" German, surely it can only evoke a deep pride in a Jewish reader. If half that the anti-Semitic writers charge be true, then the non-Jewish Germans have little in the picture to feed their vanity. The foul lan-guage in which most of this writ-ing is couched, the obscene cartoons with which it is embellished may be disregarded. They can only make Germans and Jews alike blush for the vulgarity that anke bush for the vulgarity that struts as patrictism. But the facts themselves, demonstrating so forcibly that Jews played a leading role in the cultural and economic life of a great nation despite their numerical weakness stand as a monument to the service of Jews to their native land For all their prattle about the Germans as a chosen race, the Nazis do not go out of their way to flatter the ordinary German. The way in which they inform him that a tiny minority managed to

put its stamp on the national cul-ture is hardly a compliment. One

Proof For Belief

Chile Called Ideal Place For Jewish Immigrants

By M. RIESENBERG

(J.T.A. Staff Correspondent) SANTIAGO, Feb. 20.—The idea that only Palestine can solve the Jewish question has been dissi-pated and slowly the Jewish masses are beginning to realize that decentralized Jewish emigration is not harmful to Palestine but rather helps that country, for only an economically sound country can help the idea of Zionism.

I have read through a good deal In the light of the renewal of Jewish migration, Chile assumes special significance as a possible destination. It must be remembered that the country is twice the size of Germany, yet it has only four and a half million inhab-The climate is mild and almost European, the various tropical and other diseases are non existent and the population is ex-ceptionally hospitable—all factors which aid the process of immigra-

> As a matter of fact, the ques-tion of large scale Jewish immigration to Chile is not new. In 1931 the matter was widely dis-cussed in the South American and cussed in the South American and European press, but the economic crisis of that year put an end to the discussion. Now that the crisis has lifted a bit the problem must be carefully considered and organ-izational work coordinated to handle the matter as efficiently as

Cautions On Investing

So far, Jewish immigration to Chile has largely been recruited from elements financially unable to introduce anything new into the economic life of the country. Jew-ish immigrants followed in the footsteps of those who had come before them and went into peddling and junk-trading. Very few of them had the courage to tackle the higher phases of economic ac-tivity, such as import and export trading, manufacture or mining. Those who did left their stamp up-on the whole economic life of Chile despite the fact that before they began they were solemnly the fate of thousands of persons warned that they had better stick and of the normal development of to peddling, as all other occupation.

There can be no doubt whatever that thousands of harassed Jews could find a haven in Chile. Jewish organizations, and, in particular, the World Jewish Congress should consider the matter carefully and work out a scheme which will avoid the unfortunate consequences of chaotic migration ac-tivities such as occurred in Uruguay several years ago. Certainly the World Jewish Congress can be expected to solve the difficult immigration problem, upon which the fate of thousands of persons

lies in his allying himself with the working class in its fight against ascism and its efforts toward ouilding a classless society, Dr. Garland Ethel, instructor of English at the University of Washington and recently returned from an extended visit to Russia and Ger-many, contrasted the "intolerable condition" of the Jews in Germany with the state of the Jew in the Soviet Union, at a meeting of the Jewish Junior League this week at the Seattle Talmud Torah. Anti-Semitism is an inherent part of Fascism, he said. It follows, he argued, that the Jew must in self-protection actively join forces with the class that is the foe of Fascism.

with a Jewish family in a district that was largely Jewish and not only observed the treatment of the Jews under Hitler rule, but also was in danger as a result of his association with Jewish people. Hitler Seeks Return To Barbarism, Asserts James Waterman Wise

That the promotion of athletics among the Jewish youth of the world everywhere be fostered, the Maccabian movement was founded, ironically enough in Germany. twenty-nine years ago. This organization grew from the nucleus created by the Bar-Kochba group ten years earlier in the same country. However, this group was not in-troduced to America until 1931. Today it has incorporated chap-ters in New York and Boston. New clubs are forming in Syracuse, Cin-cinnati, Rochester, Los Angeles, Chicago, and Omaha.

This movement reaches into 33 countries as far removed as Australia and the United States, South America and Canada, England and Jugo-Slavia, Sweden and Palestine. Its combined membership numbers well over 150,000 Jewish people of both sexes ranging in age from six years and up. This organizasix years and up. This organiza-tion is the greatest and most thrilling athletic enterprise to reach America in a long time.

The Great Democracy of Sports

In the great democracy of sports it is a fact that Jews can show individual winners. However, these young men and women athletes are included on the lists of the countries which they inhabit and the athletic clubs for which they run. Yet they do not compete for the glory and credit of the Jewish people. Such championship performances as they turn in can only have real value for us, as a race, when the individual performs as a representative of the Jewish peo-

The Maccabian movement is rying hard to crystallize the Jewish youth of America into a group wherein all Jews in the country will participate in amateur athle-tics under its banner. This requires time, hard work, and money. too, are needed to train

The call was sent out some time

ago and a great many answered. It still nee ds more members to create a new race consciousness in the field of sports. The Maccabian club does not as yet offer the fine training facilities that the New York A. C.—a million dollar insti-tution—can afford its members. Nor does it furnish its participants the entry fees and uniforms which a great many of the older and wealthier groups do. The officers are trying to do this and with time they will succeed.

At present it offers other things it offers ideals which are worth fighting for; and, more tangibly, en competitive meets and trips all over the country, and meets in Palestine and Europe. The trips alone are well worth the effort and any slight inconvenience that might be caused by resigning from a non-Jewish club and joining up with the Maccabians.

The First Maccabiad

Early in 1931, almost immediately following its founding in the cities of New York and Boston, the leaders of this organization bent all their efforts to provide a representative team to send to Palestine for the first Jewish Olympiad. It was decided that thirteen athletes were to go, nine on the track and field squad, and four on

track and heid squad, and four on the swimming team. David White, Gus Heyman, Har-ry Schneider, Martin Freedman, Harry Werbin and Dave Adelman were the male members of the track contingent. The women pinned their hopes on Miss Eva pinned their hopes on Miss Eva Bein, swimmer, and Miss Sid Koff, track and field star. Harold Kra-mer, Lou Abelson and Gene Siegel comprised the aquatic group. David White, executive secretary of the organization, was appointed captain and manager.

Notables Laud Memory of Mrs. Moskowitz

'Al Smith Pays Tribute to Woman Year After Death

A distinguished audience of more than 200, including social elite, political figures and a number of well-known journalists, gathered last night at the Wom-en's City Club, 22 Park avenue, at a memorial meeting for Mrs. Belle Moskowitz, who died one year ago today

Mrs. Charles Dana Gibson, who presided at the meeting, described her personal friendship with Mrs. Moskowitz. "She was the fineat friend and adviser any one could have," Mrs. Gibson declared.

Letters of tribute to Mrs doskowitz were read from Gover nor Lehman, George Gordon Battle and Secretary of Labor Frances Perkins.

"We are trying to recreate a friend who meant so much, not only in our individual lives, but also in the corporate life of the community and people beyond the community," Secretary Perkins

"As I knew her personally, I visited her regularly, Belle Moskowitz was not a simple per-son, but rather one who was buffeted about as all moderns are in the complexities of her own life and the age in which we are living. Her genius lay in the fact that she was aware of these complexi-

"Mrs. Moskowitz was always knitting, if not actually knitting a piece of goods, she was knitting the complex materials of life into ce," Secretary Perkins decis

Former Governor Alfred E. Smith paid a glowing tribute to Mrs. Moskowitz, for many years his close advisor in his political

"I would rather speak of Mrs. Moskowitz as a woman and as a mother than as the known political genius which she most cer-tainly was," the former governor said.

She had no sense of striving for her own personal recognition and unlike most women she was able to work with men. Of all the people I ever knew she had the most sympathetic understanding. I cannot remember her hav-ing said anything about anyone that was not all right. She had the rare gift of a keen mind and a generous heart.

"Although she and everyone else knew that she could have had any political post that was in my power as governor to grant she was modest and forever foregoing the limelight to stay in the rear and help others.

Wage Demands Of Federation Staff Denied

Proskauer Says Organization Is Financially Unable to Act

Delegates from the Asso of Federation Workers, representing more than five hundred employes of the Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies, 71 West Forty-seventh street, appealed last night to the Federation board of trustees for the rescinding of wage cuts and the resumption of the practice of annual salary increas

Judge Joseph M. Proskauer, president of Federation, declared that the board of trustees would refuse to take notice of this demand

In their statement to the board the Federation workers declared that Federation, in ignoring their repeated protests, "has relegated to a position of unimportance the question of salary standards of workers in Federation agencies. The workers are dissatisfied and impatient, and feel that by March of 1934 they are entitled to know what salaries they are receiving for the year which began in Janu

According to members of the delegation, Judge Proskauer then delegation, Judge Proskauer then asked, "Has anybody else got any-thing to say?" Cora Lieberman spokesman for the workers, re-plied. "We are waiting for an "There will be no an swer," Judge Proskauer replied. The association represents 500

Federation employes, most of them being case workers and clerical workers. The association ent a telegram to the board of trustees, demanding a definite answer by Thursday, when they will hold a general meeting.

Judge Proskauer, in a statement Judge Prostauer, in a statement last night characterized the com-mittee as representing a very negligible number of Federation employes. "I am delighted to say that the vast majority of our em-ployes have complete loyalty to Federation."

Describing the precarious financial position of Federation at the present time, Judge Proskauer declared that the board of trustees will nevertheless ask the various charitable institutions to make certain restorations in the lowsalaried grades. The parent or-ganization has no authority to carry out this demand, he declared Vudge Proskauer quoted from a

correspondence between Mary van Kleeck, director of studies at the Russell Sage Foundation, who de-fended the Federation employes, and himself. In his letters, Judge Proskauer declared, "We are starting the year 1934 with a reduction in pledges and no reserves what ever. In addition, we have to fac increased commodity costs. stark fact remains that with a given amount of money we can cut down in only two places—one is in our salary scale; the other is in the amount of relief given to the unfortunate, for whose succor we are organized."

The meeting which was attended by delegates of about 300 organi zations, was addressed by H. H. Cohen, president of the Philadelphia branch; Murray LeVine, ex-ecutive director; John L. Bern-stein, chairman of foreign activities; Isidore Hershfield, Washington representative: Howard Levy, honorary president; Mrs. Reba Shestak, chairman of the women's division, and Benjamin Rubiastein, assistant director of the Philadelphia branch,

In his report of activities for the year, Mr. LeVine reported that 1,897 applications were received from various sources to locate families in Philadelphia, or Philadelphia desiring to locate relatives abroad. Of these 820 nave beer successfully concluded, and 1,077 are still pending. Through HIAS Mr. LeVine reported, 7,796 persons sent to relatives abroad the business. families in Philadelphia, or Phila sent to relatives abroad the of \$84,629.37.

During that same period 7,540 persons called in the office for in formation relative to immigration or naturalization. In this group many enter who come here for advice and information which have advice and information which have little to do with either immigra-tion or naturalization, but deal with the economic and domestic difficulties that come to the lives of those who have not been in the country long enough to assimilate themselves to the new environ-ments and conditions.
