Jews in Russia

THE Jews in the collectivized farms in White Russia must work in the fields on Passover, according to the decision of a conference of Jewish farmers.

"Not a single collectivized Jewish farmer must stay away from the fields during Pesach" was the slogan formulated, arch" was the motion was broadcast to all Jewish farmers in White Russia stating that all foreign campaigns for Passover supplies for Russian Jews were directed by the Jewish bourgeoisie for counter revolutionary purposes.

There is no official anti-Semitism in Soviet Russia. Whatever anti-Semitism exists in Russia as a remnant of Tsarist and Black Hundred days is being rigorously suppressed by the Soviet government, for it is properly regarded as a dangerous, reactionary prejudice. But while anti-Semitism is being stamped out in Soviet Russia, Judaism is also being exterminated there. It is true that the Soviet government is strongly opposed to all religions, without discrimination, but the Jewish communist leaders are more energetic than their comrades in their efforts to uproot Judaism.

Untermyer's Offer

Samuel Untermyer's offer to help in the Congressional investigation of Nazi propaganda activities in this country should be welcomed by the Dickstein Committee. Mr. Untermyer has declared that if the investigation will be thorough, it will startle the country, for it will demonstrate that there are overwhelming under-cover sedition activities violating our neutrality, and that the present situation is similar to that which existed in 1917. "There is no one who could aid the Congressional Committee to make the investigation more thorough than Mr. Untermyer could. His vast experience, resourcefulness and fearlessness, as well as his genius for unearthing sinister secrets, would assure the success and effectiveness of the investigation.

New Austrian Constitution Calms Jews

Reports Quiet Fears But Official Assurances Are Awaited

VIENNA, March 22.—The official newspaper of the Dollfus regime, the Wiener Zeitung, today reported that the anxiously awaited new constitution for Austria, which is to place Austria on the basis of a corporate state, contains clauses guaranteeing freedom of belief and conscience.

While this announcement has somewhat calmed the fears of the Jews of Austria, who have been living in an atmosphere filled with dire rumors still that await tensely a second assurance guaranteeing the Jews equality of citizenship with other groups, Jewish apprehensions are based on the reported Heimwehr project to deprive a large number of naturalized Jews of full citizenship rights.

The Heimwehr project was first published in a Budapest paper as a dispatch from its Viennese correspondent. The Wiener Zeitung then republished the entire report. In view of the fact that the Austrian censor permitted the story to be printed in an official newspaper and the failure of the Austrian government to deny the report, Austrian Jews fear a sharp limitation of their rights.

The official papers of the government parties, including the Christian Socialists and the Heimwehr, continue to demand limitations of Jewish citizenship rights and the institution of a numerous clause against the Jews in many walks of life, particularly in the intellectual professions.

Recently the Austrian authorities announced the introduction of a numerous clause against Jewish artists on the government owned radio system. The number of Jewish artists permitted to appear on radio programs or to write for the radio was limited to the proportion of Jews in the total Austrian population.

Col. Wedgewood Queries House on Palestine Prohibition

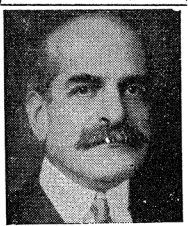

British Jews Launch New Fund Drive

Central Relief Reports \$203,800 Raised For Refugees

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

LONDON, March 22.—British Jews will launch its appeal for funds to help German Jewish refugees at a huge mass meeting to be held here on March 27, it was announced today.

Anthony Rothschild will preside at the meeting. Lord Reading, Lord Melchett and Sir Osmond E. Davignon Goldsmid will be the principal speakers. The British Central Relief fund has set April 15 as German Jewish Day in London. In the provinces April 8 has been designated for special collections for German Jewish relief.

According to a report of the Central Relief Fund issued today, \$203,800 was collected for German Jewish relief last year.

"The greatness of the tragedy which befell the German Jews is inadequately recognized even to-

Goldsmid Praises United Campaign For Refugee Relief

LONDON, March 22.—Sir Osmond E. Davignon Goldsmid, well known Jewish communal worker, issued a statement today through the Jewish Telegraphic Agency praising the creation of the United Jewish drive for funds for the German refugees instituted in the United States.

"I am extremely gratified that American Jews have agreed to unite with European Jews for the appeal for the German refugees," Sir Osmond declared. "I am sure that great political as well as financial gains will result from this move.

"I am convinced that this solidarity will greatly benefit the Jews of Europe," Sir Osmond said.

Baerwald Announces Officers of Combined JDC-APC Campaign—Jews of America Urged to Participate

Felix M. Warburg, Jewish philanthropist and financier, will head the \$3,000,000 united campaign of the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee and the American Palestine Campaign for the relief of German Jews announced Paul Baerwald, chairman of the huge drive for the relief of German victims of the Reich terror.

James G. McDonald, High Commissioner for German Refugees, was present and cooperated in the launching of the campaign.

He declared, in a speech broadcast over a nation-wide hookup, that the decision of the two large groups to work in unison for the relief of the Jewish victims would encourage both Jews and non-Jews throughout the country to cooperate more strongly in the drive for the \$3,000,000.

"A response from the Jews of America, worthy of their best traditions," he declared stirring, will enormously facilitate the carrying out of the task assigned to my colleagues and to me, and will demonstrate to the whole world that the Jews once more are glad of the opportunity to share in the great world-wide undertaking of mercy and justice."

Explaining that large sums of money are needed at once, the High Commissioner declared, "Two hundred programs are imperative for ample resources. One of these is that with which the High Commission is directly concerned: the grant, with which my office has worked of relief, retraining and employment of the Jewish refugees. The second, no official connection, is also basically important. The Jews within Germany are in desperate need of help to maintain, even on a low standard, their cultural, religious and philanthropic institutions. I cannot stress too strongly my personal concern that German Jewish culture should be maintained on the outside if it needs to maintain its cultural and spiritual life."

Warns of Losses to Judaism. McDonald originally estimated the number of refugees from Germany at 60,000. About eighty-six per cent of these are Jews, he said. Since that time, several thousand more refugees have come out, the Commissioner added.

Another aspect of the general problem is that of the situation within Germany itself, Mr. McDonald concluded. "Unless funds from the outside are made available to help the German Jews

maintain their cultural, religious and philanthropic institutions, lost to Judaism may be irreparable," he asserted. "Moreover, the masses of the German Jews have shown a stoicism and fortitude, in the face of an overwhelming tragedy, that merits the highest admiration. Their leaders, too, many of whom I have known personally, have displayed courage under heart breaking conditions that has stirred me to action. If only the Jews elsewhere could realize the price which German Jews are paying for loyalty to their ideals, there would be no hesitancy in making available at once the resources needed for work within Germany."

United Drive Officers

Officers of the united campaign were announced by Paul Baerwald. They are: Felix M. Warburg, national chairman; Paul Baerwald, Morris Rothenberg and Rabbi Jonah B. Wise, co-chairmen; Governor Herbert H. Lehman, Dr. Cyrus Adler, Judge Julian W. Mack, Joseph M. Proskauer and Rabbi Stephen S. Wise, honorary chairman; Joseph C. Hyman, honorary secretary, and Nathan Straus Jr., treasurer.

The campaign will be conducted by an administrative committee consisting of Mr. Baerwald, David M. Bressler, Harry L. Guckman, Joseph C. Hyman, Alexander Kahn, John L. Liebowitz, Louis Lipkay, Dr. Solomon L. Lowenstein, I. D. Morrison, Charles Reiss, Louis P. Rucker, Morris Rothenberg and Rabbi Jonah B. Wise. It will be directed by Isidore Coons and Robert Silverman.

Joseph C. Hyman, secretary of the Joint Distribution, introduced Judge Julian W. Mack, who presided at the meeting. Other speakers were Morris Rothenberg, Paul Baerwald and Rabbi Jonah B. Wise.

Message from Governor

Mr. Baerwald described the campaign as "the greatest appeal for service that has come to the Jews of America in this generation." Governor Lehman, who was unable to attend the conference, sent a message congratulating the two organizations for cooperating in the campaign and offering his full cooperation.

Morris Rothenberg, president of the Zionist Organization of America, told the conference that "unless the courage and the vision of their brethren in America come to their assistance in this dark hour, the Jews of Germany are doomed. There is no other word for it. Life itself is becoming impossible for our brethren in Ger-

Italy Bulwark Against Nazis, Asserts Gerard, Former Envoy

Hitlerism Will of Reich Populace, and Will Last, He States

A conviction that Hitlerism in Germany is a permanent manifestation of the will of the German people was expressed by James W. Gerard, in an interview yesterday. "I think that Hitlerism will last in Germany," the former Ambassador to Germany declared. Mr. Gerard represented the United States in Berlin during the war years, from 1913 to 1917, and is considered an authority on Germany.

In spite of his opinion that Nazism is not a passing phase in German history, Mr. Gerard is certain that Nazi ideas will disappear. "You have the example of Austria," he explained. "They will make an attempt to put Hitlerism into Austria, but the Italian will block the move. The Italians do not propose to have Germans under Hitler facing them across the Alps."

"All through history," the former Ambassador continued, "German leaders have attempted to get control of the Italian peninsula. It is traditional with Germany to want to get control of Italy. Mussolini naturally opposes them. Thus, Italy is the real bulwark against the spread of Hitlerism."

Turning to the problem of anti-Semitism under the Hitler regime, Mr. Gerard declared that "there is only one thing that will stop anti-Semitism in present-day Germany. That is the boycott. I think that the boycott is seriously injuring German trade. That alone may make them modify their harsh rules."

There is no immediate danger of war in Europe today, Mr. Gerard asserted. "The only nation that wants war is Germany," he said, "and it is pretty thoroughly disarmed."

Explains Palestine's Opportunities For Refugee Children

Speaking over Station WOR in connection with the campaign of the Council of Jewish Organizations on Palestine to raise \$40,000 to settle German Jewish children in Palestine, Judge Benjamin E. Greenspan explained the plight of Jewish children in Germany and the opportunities for settling them in Palestine. "In no other country in the world are children cared for and trained as scientifically and as thoroughly as in Palestine," he said.

Announcement was made of a concert to be given by the Council in honor of Professor Albert Einstein at Carnegie Hall on April 1.

Reform Jews Will Convene In Providence

Will Meet on April 15 to Discuss Religious Problems

(Special to the J.D.B.)
PROVIDENCE, March 22.—Several hundred delegates, representing Jewish reform congregations, sisterhoods and brotherhoods of Massachusetts and Rhode Island will convene in Temple Beth-El here Sunday, April 15, for a conference on religious problems generally, but with special emphasis on the question of Jewish education for both the adult and the younger generations.

The convention will be held in Providence for the first time in the history of the reform movement. It is sponsored by the North East Religious Union of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, parent body of all reform Jewish congregations in the United States.

Principal speakers will include Samuel B. Pincus, president of the National Federation of Temple Brotherhoods; Charles Brown, president, and Rabbi William G. Elliman of Worcester, Mass.; Samuel M. Kitzewitz of Lynn, Mass.; Rabbi Harry Levi of Temple Israel of Boston, and Rabbi Jacob B. Pollak of New York, who is executive secretary of the North East Religious Union.

Surviving are Mrs. Lippman; a son Louis, student at Dartmouth; a son Richard, thirteen; twin daughters, Hannah and Miriam, six years old; three brothers, Louis, Si and Reuben, all prominent in Atlantic City affairs; and two sisters, Clara Lippman of this city and Mrs. John Soloff of San Francisco.

Commissioner Outlines Needs Of Refugees

McDonald Addresses Boston Group at Start of Fund Campaign

(Special to the J.D.B.)
BOSTON, March 22.—James G. McDonald, High Commissioner for German refugees, was the principal speaker and guest of honor at a dinner last evening at the Hotel Somerset, at which was launched the united campaign of the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee and the American Palestine Campaign.

Mr. McDonald outlined the needs of the refugees, which he listed as (1) food, clothing and housing; (2) permits to remain in the countries where they happen to be and permits to work there; (3) restraining and mastering of trades for former professional men; (4) settlement in new homes, such as Palestine.

"That Palestine is the chief source of refuge has become increasingly evident," he declared, "so that Palestine to the limit of its absorptive capacity offers the best single refuge and a direct contribution to the solution of the refugee problem."

The High Commissioner brought out the duty of his commission, which was created by the League of Nations to seek places of refuge for the victims of Nazi persecution. There is also urgent need within Germany for the maintenance of cultural, religious and philanthropic organizations there, he declared. The problem of German refugees is a Christian as well as a Jewish one, he said.

Praises Campaign
Others who spoke at the dinner "All the news concerning Jews" is fully and promptly reported in the Jewish Daily Bulletin, which daily newspaper in English.

Work Starts Soon on Jewish Cooperative in New Jersey

Industrial-Agricultural Colony Has Sanction of Government, Which Has Granted a \$500,000 Loan—2,000 Apply

Without parallel in the annals of Jewish colonization here is the new project near Hightstown, N. J., because the proposed settlement is to combine industrial and agricultural features.

When in a few weeks construction begins on 200 homes, a school and other community buildings on the 1,300-acre tract of land, prominent among the new structures will be a clothing factory.

With the assistance of the Subsidized Homestead Division of the Department of the Interior, the Association for Jewish Farm Settlements is sponsoring the venture. Gerson Zybert, former Alderman of Warsaw, Poland, is the association's executive secretary, who in all his years of experience in this field, embracing every part of the world, has never encountered a Jewish industrial-agricultural settlement. He ought to know after ten years with the ORT. During the war he was connected with the JDC and in 1922 served as the Hiss vice-commissioner for Europe. He has filled many similar posts, in addition to serving as a Warsaw alderman for the past fourteen years and being a member of that city's cabinet of seven.

Many Apply

Already some 2,000 applications are in, after the announcement that two hundred families would be accommodated at the enterprise. An exacting questionnaire will lay bare the qualifications of the applicants. Tailors are in demand as well as people with farming experience. Their health, character, size of family will be looked into. Small families are preferred, but this will not be insisted upon very strenuously if other demands are met, Zybert declared.

Particularly significant in this proposed influx of would-be settlers when one considers that the government requires each to make an outright payment of \$500 and \$2,500 within twenty years, in addition to four per cent. interest. No one over forty-five is to be admitted initially. The settlers' families will have individual four-

or five-room homes, each with an acre of land for cultivation, thus leaving over 1,000 acres for communal agriculture. There will be fifteen types of modern buildings, eliminating drabness of appearance. Social halls, a schoolhouse, a factory, homes, and other buildings will lend variety. The government has granted a \$500,000 loan for the colony, which is situated midway between New York and Philadelphia, eight miles from the Pennsylvania Railroad station, and three miles from the nearest bus stop. A government representative is on the board of directors.

The colony is to be self-supporting. Each settler will receive a salary for his labors. Great interest has been aroused by the project on the part of Jewish leaders. Zybert said, quoting the recently-received letter from Professor Albert Einstein:

"There is no doubt that an external force in times past has been the reason why the larger portion of the Jewish masses has been concentrated into city trades and occupations. . . . Therefore, a movement like your association, to return some of the Jewish masses to the original means of production, is in the interests of the Jewish community as a whole and should be supported by every intelligent person."

Guedallas Urge Women Boycott German Products

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

LONDON, March 22.—Philip Guedalla, noted Anglo-Jewish biographer and historian, and his wife yesterday urged a monster mass meeting of the Women Shoppers League to boycott German made goods.

They declared that the women of the world held the key to the economic situation and should use it to look out Nazi barbarism, which they termed "the greatest threat to the Jews since the Spanish Inquisition."

Canada Editor Warns of Jews

Coburg Sheet Opposes Move to Allow German Exiles to Enter

(J.D.B. Special Correspondence)

COBURG, Ont., March 15.—A violent editorial attack on the character of Canadian Jews is featured in the Coburg World.

The editor is emphatic in his belief that Jews from Germany should not be permitted to settle in the Dominion, on the strength of their co-religionists' record in this country. Coburg is a small town eighty miles east of Toronto, with a limited Jewish population. The editorial declares:

"By their lack of business ethics, the soulless exploitation of human weakness, and their low standard of living many Jews in Canada have not measured up to our citizenship requirements. It would certainly be the height of folly for the government to allow more of them to come into the country."

Schneur, Hebrew Writer, Seriously Ill in Paris

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

PARIS, March 22.—Zalman Schneur, well-known Hebrew and Yiddish writer who has made his home in Paris for many years, is seriously ill of diabetes. He has been transferred from a Paris hospital to a sanatorium at Nice, France.

Schneur, who is 47 years old, was born in Russia, a descendant of a Chasidic family. He began his literary work in Odessa. Since then he has written a number of books and frequently contributed to Yiddish and Hebrew newspapers and journals.

Samuel Petersky, Jewish Leader in Canada, Dead

(J.D.B. Special Correspondence)

VANCOUVER, B. C., March 13.—Stricken by a fatal heart attack in the midst of an address on health and employment insurance, Dr. Samuel Petersky, one of the founders of Temple Emanuel here and active in the B'nai B'rith and Zionist organizations, died this week.

A native of Winnipeg, he was 51 years old. He leaves a widow, two sisters and two brothers.

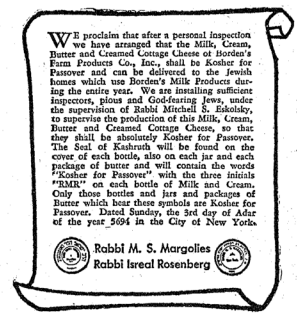

Stella Adler Brings Heritage To Theatre in 'Gentlewoman'

Stella Adler, playing the lead in "Gentlewoman," which opened at the Cort Theatre last evening, brings to her part the rich dramatic training imbibed in her youth from her father, the late Jacob P. Adler, who created many of the traditions of the present Yiddish theatre.

Miss Adler of the long, lithe body, blonde hair and straight figure, formerly cast in the English stage some years ago, after she had founded a group which closely followed the practices and purposes of the Yiddish stage. She didn't desert the Yiddish theatre, with which so much of her youth was tied up, and where she played leading roles for many years.

In her own words, this is why she made the change.

"With the Group Theatre I found a good theatre and a good platform that did what the Yiddish theatre had done until now and was a little further," she said. "I found in the Group Theatre an institution which functioned completely as a theatre. They are interested in all branches of theatrical development as well as in the development of the actor."

Problem Plays
"Like the Yiddish stage, the Group Theatre concerns itself with problem plays, and I don't think it is limited itself to Jewish subjects. The Group Theatre concerns itself with all political and social problems in America."

Miss Adler reclined on a couch in her blue and white modernistic suite at the Fifth Avenue Hotel after a long and tiring day. There was just a faint smile on her face as she answered questions about the role she is portraying in the new play.

"The part," she said, "is a beautiful but a terribly difficult one. The problem in the 'Gentlewoman,' she went on, "deals with what happens to a fine, sensitive, cultured and rich American woman whose mind is receptive and open, when the pillars that have held her up until 1934 fall down."

As though struck by the sudden humor of it, she sat up, laughed and said, "You know, it's going to be funny to see if the American gentlewomen are going to accept me."

Happy in Yiddish Roles
She was very happy while she was on the Yiddish stage and she still feels that in many instances speaking English is a distinct disadvantage.

Asked about the dramatic talent which seems to run through the entire Adler family, she said, "No one is born to play Shylock. Whether talent comes through the blood stream I don't know. Of course I hope so. Primarily I feel that I'm a craftsman and I never would have joined the commercial type of English theatre. In the Group Theatre they want to develop the actor."

From her father, whom she admired above everything else, she began a simple, honest Jew, she learned the first hard lesson of the relentlessness of the acting profession.

"I learned from him a terrible sense of the responsibility, will power and drive necessary in an actor. He used to tell me that if I wanted to do it, I had to do it myself. He said I couldn't let myself. He was a very severe critic—and I'm glad he was," said Miss Adler.

Hilerman in the Raw

The other night, as a matter of fact it was on Wednesday night, Hyman Adler presented at the Maxine Elliott Theatre Louis Reader's stirring and horrifying drama of what happened to one Jewish family in Germany under Hitler. The English playwright had called his play "The Shatterer's Lamp," and if there is any one in New York who can see it and remain unmoved then that person should hurry to a clinic to see how he has been able to live without a heart.

The Ironie Touch

Reads found his title in a poem by a gentle Shelley which reads: "When the lamp is shattered The light in the dust lies dead."

Taking this thought the playwright has fashioned a brutal, stabbing drama which shows only to well how Hitlerism has shattered the ideal, dreams and hopes of the humanitarian. In plot the play traces the tragedy that overtakes the kind Professor Fritz Opel and his family. The professor's wife is a Jewess and because of this the Hitler storm troopers vent their insane spleen. Before your eyes appears a realistic enactment of just how the Hitlerite

commission blasé please confer with our Fuehrer.

To return to more serious channels it is upon the question of the fate of many and Democratic factions, who have been seeking publicity for their respective shirt movements. With Dictatorism now empowered to subvert those interested in overthrowing the government, we shall shortly see many Fascists running for cover.

During our conversations with the bolder Nazis and native Fascist bands they expressed the conviction that the Dictatorist resolution of the never over in their belief they were considerably more outspoken than was safe.

The German Nazis in this country have been overly bold in declaring a boycott on goods and services of American Jewish citizens. Their weekly organ has advocated it, and they have invited the Jews to suggest large mobs of Germans to a boycott of American Jews through their mass meetings and military councils.

The Silver Shirts too have been blatant in demanding that the Jewish, persecuted and deported. There are evidences of a tie-up between the Silver Shirts and the American Nazis, and it is said on good authority that proof and hand to show that Berlin has subsidized the Silver Legion.

The showdown is coming for these and a dozen other groups now operating in this country. They will retire within their shells, or can they take it?

Much has been said and written about Silver Shirts, White Shirts, Brown Shirts, Blue Shirts, and shirts of various other colors. Palestine Gov't Concedes New Entry Rights

Number of Banks Which May Issue Certi- ficates Increased

(J.T.A. Special Correspondence)
JERUSALEM, March 18.—Following prolonged negotiations, the Jewish Agency Executive has succeeded in obtaining from the Palestine government a concession as regards the number of banks which are authorized to issue guarantee documents for capitalist immigrants.

In November, 1933, the government determined that the Anglo-Palestine Bank, Barclay's Bank, Ottoman Bank, Banco di Roma, and the Arab Bank are to be empowered to give certified documents testifying to amounts of money on deposit for capitalist immigrants in their applications for permits as permanent residents. The restriction affected a number of Jewish banks which enjoy relations with institutions abroad and receive large deposits from would be immigrants. In some cases, such deposits were transferred to the banks named by the government.

The Government has decided to increase the number of banks which may issue such certificates. Institutions operating for ten years or more having a paid up capital of \$10,000 and over, or banks with \$25,000 paid up capital, irrespective of their period of operation, are empowered to issue such certificates.

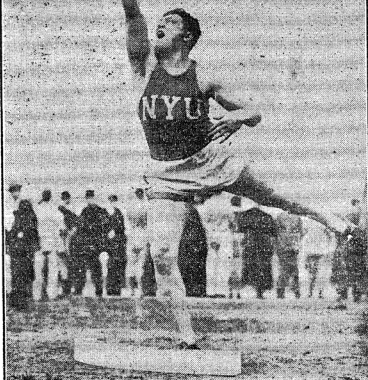

When Babe Scheuer came back from the I. C. 4-A track meet at Berkeley, California, the experts predicted great things for him. This was during the summer of 1932.

For more than a year after that Scheuer continued shotputting in excellent form. As a result he came through with a first place in the Metropolitan Inter-collegiate championships. This meet at Baker field drew the best track and field men from N. Y. U., Columbia, Fordham, Manhattan and C. C. N. Y.

This season however, Scheuer has proved a disappointment to the coaches, experts and track enthusiasts alike. Babe placed fifth in the national indoor I. C. 4-A games, contested recently at the Garden. His best put that evening was a poor heave of forty-five feet two and a half inches. It was indeed a ragged performance for this giant lad. Especially since he had been rated the outstanding star to beat Niblock, of Bowdoin College. The latter walked off with honors that night with a new indoor record toss of forty-nine feet ten inches.

Scheuer in Pain

Upon investigation we discovered that a grim drama of courage and determination had been enacted at the Garden the night of the track championships. No one in that capacity could witnessing the events, not even his coach, was aware of the torturing pain this boy was suffering.

For the past few months Scheuer had been complaining about a severe leg ailment. The day of the games doctors told him that only an operation could relieve and cure him and enable him to go on with his track work. But rather than participated in the finale and hurled the shot for a poor fifth.

Immediately afterwards he left for the hospital where an operation was performed on his right foot. (It is this foot which bears the brunt of the weight in the actual heave for a right-handed shot-putter).

Is Quite Confident

met Scheuer yesterday in

the Varsity room at University Heights hobnobbing about on crutches. He seemed cheerful in speaking of his track prospects and felt quite confident that his showing in the coming Metropolitan A. A. U. contests will reveal his old time championship calibre. However, he will be out of competition for the next few weeks.

We predict that Scheuer has it in him to toss the sixteen-pound iron ball well over fifty feet.

Baseball Bunts

The basketball team has moved out of the Varsity training quarters at N. Y. U. in order to make room for the baseballers. It's our guess that the trainers might have to serve kosher food again.

Rumor had it that because there were so many Jewish players on the first and second quintets special dishes were served to the boys. If we can put any credence in this story, the same will apply for Bill Gottlieb, veteran southpaw on Coach McCarthy's team. Also Emil Friedman, who is back at shortstop, and Nat Machowit of football fame, who is making a stab at an infield post, should receive the extra fare.

No doubt, if Gottlieb turns in the fine, smart performances he pitched last year against Fordham, the coach will personally deliver any kind of service. Especially when it happens to be the baseball team's thirteenth season.

Brooklyn Plays Ball Too

Long Island University is not to be outdone in having a league of nations play baseball at the school. The majority of the candidates, however, are Jewish.

Clair Bea, director of athletics and baseball coach, told us that his entire infield will be composed of anti-Hitlerites: Rabinowitz, Cooper, Segal and Miller, who is slated for the captaincy, have already cinched their positions. Joe Bender, who plays in the vicinity of the bleachers, is another veteran upon whom the coach is depending.

Convict Hitler By Providence Jury in Temple

Jews and Christians At- tend 'Trial' in Emanu-El

(Special to the J.D.B.)
PROVIDENCE, March 22.—Hitler and Hitlerism were convicted of perpetrating crimes against civilization by a jury of notables here last night. "The Case of Civilization Against Hitlerism" was in substance a replica of the trial held in Madison Square Garden in New York recently.

Speakers presented five counts against the Reich chancellor, who was accused by persons representing the Christian church, womanhood, democratic institutions, Jewish people and civilization itself. The trial was sponsored by Rabbi Israel Goldman, of Temple Emanu-El. Justice Philip C. Joslin, of the Rhode Island Superior Court, pronounced sentence.

An audience which crowded the vestry hall of Temple Emanu-El listened to addresses assailing Hitler in scathing terms the persecutions against minorities practiced by the Nazi power in Germany, and what speakers described as violations of the rules of civilization. The Rev. Dr. Samuel Cullis, president of the Rhode Island Ministers' Union, in presenting the point of view of the clergy, asserted his conviction that the non-Jewish world must bear much of the burden of warring Hitlerism.

Prominent Speakers
He said that every pulpit must be made the forum for expressing contrary opinion to Nazi principles.

Other speakers, including Professor Sharon O. Brown, chairman of the English department at Brown University and president of the Providence Community Forum; Alice W. Hunt, president of the Consumers League of Rhode Island; former Attorney General Fred B. Perkins, secretary of the Rhode Island Bar Association, and Rabbi Goldman, echoed the view that similar "trials" against Hitlerism should be held throughout the United States and that public opinion should be trained on what they called the "menace to civilization."

There were no speakers in defense of Hitlerism.

-Dr. Halkin Assails Menorah; Terms it 'Empty, Worthless'

Speaking yesterday before a City College Menorah Association Conference, Dr. Abraham S. Halkin, of the Semitics Department of Columbia University, bitterly assailed the Menorah, terming its ideals "empty and worthless."

"Menorah is an organ that can exist only in America," Dr. Halkin remarked. "The only reason why it still exists is that our people do not wish to run away from Jewishness entirely but at the same time do not desire to proclaim their Jewishness," he said. Menorah, he pointed out, is the "weakest plant."

Members of the City College Menorah Avukah group apparently backed Dr. Halkin on every point and vigorously applauded him while wishing his address.

Dr. Halkin also attacked the Zionist movements and clubs which are established only to "play bridge and for other petty reasons." Discussing these organizations he said "if Judaism should come to a point where one can Jewishly play handball it will be pretty bad."

Urging students to take definite steps on the Jewish problem, Dr. Halkin said that anti-Semitism in this country is sporadic but rapidly growing. He declared that should economic con-

many. Their tragedy is day by day becoming graver."

Appealing for unstinted aid in this country, Mr. Rothenberg explained that "there are several things which must be done. Relief must be extended where needed. Works of rehabilitation must be undertaken in Germany and in many of the refugees have made their escape. The children, the most innocent victims of the events in Germany, must not be allowed to live in an atmosphere of fear and hatred, which is poisoning their lives. As many German Jews as can possibly be absorbed in that land must be helped to settle in Palestine."

Palestine Only Solution

Mr. Rothenberg discussed the solution that Palestine offers as a haven of refuge. He characterized it as "the only country capable of absorbing a substantial portion of refugees. It should be remembered that in the last ten years Palestine absorbed ten times as many Jewish immigrants as the rest of the world. As Jewish manpower, capital and idealism for the reborn homeland are poured into the country, its opportunities for the reception of additional settlers become greater."

"Who can say what Jewish, vision and talent and will to live," he continued, "may achieve if our

people, now to be strengthened by the collaboration of the German element which was hitherto lacking, set themselves to the task of creating a rightful place for themselves in the sun."

Rabbi Jonah B. Wise, who last year headed the German Relief Fund of the Joint Distribution Committee, declared in his address that the needs of the German Jew are so great that every effort on their behalf must be generous to be of any use. The uniting of the two organizations, he said, will result in "greater aid for those who are in such dire difficulties."

day," the Central Relief report declared, pointing out that for the "first time in history the persecution of the Jews and the German disaster is a matter of international as well as communal importance."

Importance of Palestine

The report stresses the importance of the Zionist organizations and Falst institutions, pointing out that the most effective work for rebuilding the shattered lives of German Jewish refugees was carried out in Palestine where more than 9,000 German Jews have settled since the advent of Hitlerism.

The rise of the Nazis has resulted in the rise of an entirely new type of Jewish refugee. Most of the refugees are professional people hence making the relief task infinitely more difficult especially in view of the fact that the immigrants are no longer welcomed in the United States and other countries as they were in the case of the Czarist persecutions in 1905, the report declared.

The financial report of the Central Relief fund showed that over fifty per cent of the funds collected were spent in Palestine; \$5,000 having been allocated to Hebrew University and £1,750 to the Hafia trade schools, in order to create openings for German Jewish professors ousted from German schools.

Sir Osmond Goldsmid, in commenting on the report, pointed out that only one and one half per cent of the total was for overhead expenses.

Bernstein Honored By Albanian Gov't

Falk Konitza, Albanian minister to the United States, will present the Grand Cordons of Skanderbeg to Herman Bernstein, former United States Minister to Albania, at a private luncheon at the Ritz Carlton Hotel this afternoon. Mr. Konitza came from Washington especially for this occasion. The cordons are the highest Albanian decoration, and was sent to the former American envoy by King Zog of Albania.
