Our Responsibility

THE United Campaign of the Joint Distribution Committee and the American Palestine Campaign for the relief of German Jews was officially launched at a reception in honor of High Commissioner James G. McDonald. Mr. Felix M. Warburg, the foremost American Jewish philanthropist, will be the national chairman of the United Campaign, and distinguished representatives of both organizations have been chosen to cooperate with him in the task of raising \$3,000,000.

High Commissioner McDonald declared that "a response from the Jews of America, worthy of their best traditions, will enormously facilitate the carrying out of the task assigned to my colleagues and to me, and will demonstrate to the whole world that the Jews once more are glad of the opportunity to share in the greater world-wide undertaking of mercy and justice." He also pointed out that "the Jews within Germany are in desperate need of help to maintain, even on a lowered standard, their cultural, religious and philanthropic institutions."

Judge Julian W. Mack, who presided at the meeting, emphasized very effectively that American Jewry is called upon not to make sacrifices but rather to avoid itself of the great opportunity to come to the rescue of our distressed people abroad, in this grave crisis.

American Jewry cannot fail to make the right and prompt response to the appeal. It has rarely failed on previous occasions to demonstrate its generosity and fulfill its obligations to the less fortunate portions of our people in other lands. The response this time should be more generous even before the need is most urgent. The victims of the "silent" pogroms are suffering in silence in Germany. They dare not speak. The refugees scattered in various lands are in despair, awaiting help and hope from American Jewry. Palestine has saved thousands of these refugees and can save thousands more, if the required funds are raised promptly. The success of the United Campaign appeal will be a strong answer to Hitlerism. The programs of the Black Hundreds and the Tsars and the Arab riots and massacres in Palestine stirred us to the depths of our hearts. But even those manifestations of brutality were not as far-reaching as are the Nazi persecutions of the Jews and the Hitlerian menace to Jewry. Hitlerism aims at the systematic extermination of the Jews of Germany. It also aims at exterminating the Jewish people everywhere by sinister propaganda. No falsehoods have been overlooked by the Nazi agitators in their onslaught on the Jews. All the outworn, even the

Solution of Jewish Problem Only in Christian Law

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
VIENNA, March 23.—Prince von Starhemberg, commander-in-chief of the Fascist Heimwehr, declared today in the course of an interview with American newspapermen that the "Jewish problem cannot be solved by force." He said that the problem was soluble only through the application of "Christian laws reflecting the feelings of the Austrian people." The Heimwehr leader characterized the numerous clauses as "spiritual terror" and said that "worthy" Jews should be maintained in the Austrian state.

The interview with von Starhemberg lends fresh credence to the report first carried in a Budapest newspaper of a projected Heimwehr plan to deprive a large number of naturalized Jews of equality in citizenship rights and to prohibit Jews naturalized since 1918 from practicing in the liberal professions, the arts and holding public office.

The Budapest report was published in full by the Wiener Tagblatt, one of the official organs of the Dollfus regime. The project aroused grave apprehension among Jews because the censor permitted the newspaper to carry the report and no denial was forthcoming from government officials.

Contracts Not Renewable
A report was published today in the semi-official government organ, the Reichspost, that "Vienna Jewish and athlete doctors" had been officially notified that their contracts with the municipality were not renewable.

The ominous classing of Jews and athletes together is regarded as an indication that Austrian officials are determined to carry out their attack on Jewish medical men. Dr. Victor and Linz, a large number of Jewish physicians employed by the municipal government were summarily dismissed under one pretext or another and all applicants for the posts were told that they must present incontrovertible proof that they were "Christian Germans."

Revisionists for Palestine Break With Zionists

Executive Forbids Members Link With Vaad Leumi and Others

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
PARIS, March 23.—The executive committee of the World Revisionist Union today ordered that no member of the Revisionist party of Palestine be permitted to remain a member of what the Revisionists characterized as a "body dominated by a section practicing violence within the Palestine Yishuv." Accordingly, the Revisionists stated, Kenneth J. H. the Assafah Haincivorn and the Vaad Leumi no longer represent "the totality of the Zionist Yishuv and the Revisionists will not agree to a joint representative body unless the basis of such a group is changed."

The Revisionists demanded that any representative group include members of all the parties, but must exclude the possibility of "domination by Socialists or any other party."

Early in March, the Revisionist World Union sent an ultimatum to the Vaad Leumi expiring on March 15, demanding that the Vaad Leumi condemn the intercommunal strife in the ranks of Palestine workers. The ultimatum was ignored.

Saint Peter Blind? Nazis Answer Yes; (See Passion Play)

In the wake of Hitlerite "Aryanization" of the Bible, German professors, German industry, German culture, German education, and, in brief, Germany, the German Chancellor this year has decreed that Peter will be portrayed in the Passion Play at

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The Chancellor assembled the Reichsstatthalter, the Nazi appointee chief executives of the various German states in a meeting and ordered them to prevent arbitrary steps by isolated Nazi party organs and officials government bodies in economic and financial matters.

He informed the meeting that the Reich Ministers for Economics and Finance were to give only competent authorities to deal with economic and financial policies, while the president of the Reichsbank, Dr. Hjalmar Schacht was the only competent authority for dealing with currency and banking problems.

Local authorities in the states and local party organizations, the Chancellor continued, must from today on desist from issuing decrees on financial and economic matters without previous sanction by the central authorities.

Drive Goes On
Nevertheless, the anti-Jewish drive continued unchanged. In Upper Franconia, anti-Jewish posters are being shown everywhere, especially in Nuremberg.

Jewish Blind March To Pilsudski; Plea For Permission to Beg

WARSAW, March 23.—An unusual spectacle was presented here today, when forty Jewish blind men marched arm in arm through the streets of Warsaw to the Belvedere Palace, the official residence of Marshal Pilsudski, Polish dictator. They submitted a petition asking Pilsudski to intervene on their behalf because they were starving and begging had been forbidden by the authorities.

Huge crowds watched the strange procession and all traffic on the route of the march was halted. The guards at the palace made no difficulties about allowing the blind men to enter the Belvedere to present their petition. They were received by an adjutant, who informed Marshal Pilsudski of the petition. The Polish dictator promised to help the blind men.

LONDON, March 23. — There was reason some time ago to hope that the Nazi attitude towards German Jews was undergoing a process of reformation and that the pressure would be eased. The latest efforts on the part of the Brown Shirts zealots have dispelled those hopes, and we are again face to face with the stark naked truth that there is no reason to expect anything but brutality from a brutal, un-mindful people.

I have been away in Italy for the past five weeks. During all my stay in that country I never came in contact with any kind or sort of a Jewish question. So far as my visit in the country of Mussolini is concerned, I can truthfully say that not once did I hear anything about Jews, or Aryans, or pure-blooded Germans. There were a number of German people in evidence. I did not speak to any of them for two reasons: One is that they do not know what is going on in their own country, and if I say, they would probably quite naturally, and quite wholeheartedly to the policy, the commands and the pleading of their idolized leader who has completely deceived sixty-odd million of square-heads. The other reason is that I am not inclined to offer the amenities of "Gemuetlichkeit" to people who are so stupid as to believe that they are superior beings, when the merest elemental reflection should convince them that they are just the reverse.

I have been trying to trace a resemblance of Hitler's idolators to some other form of racial development, and have failed. Paraphrasing I know a good deal, or I think I do, about the psychology of backward races. So the Germans must stand alone as examples of the retardation which sometimes affects otherwise civilized peoples. They think they are super-people, though the rest of the world knows they are not. Again I must revert to Mr. Kipling's "Barrabar" people in the tree-tops.

Wise Receives Ovation By Allentown Jews and Christians at Address

(J.D.B. Special Correspondence)

ALLENTOWN, Pa., March 22. — Declaring that Hitlerism is the "most terrible revolt against Christianity in centuries," Rabbi Stephen S. Wise, in an address in the Jewish Community Center here last night, asserted that Hitlerism had usurped the place of the Germany of yesterday and that there is no relation between the two.

Rabbi Wise was given one of the most remarkable ovations ever rendered a lecturer in this city, Jews and Gentiles participating.

Rabbi Wise kept his engagement here in the midst of his sixtieth birthday celebration and it was generally agreed that his visit has helped to create a better feeling between Jews and Gentiles.

Whether it's local, domestic or foreign, the Jews about Jewish life you'll find it in the Jewish Daily Bulletin.

But mere expressions of disapprobation and ridicule do not get us nearer to the solution of the Jewish anti-Semitic campaign. Verbal bombs do not blow up the citadel. On returning from Italy I read that the Leipzig Fair was a so-called "great success," and then we read that nearly all the orders that were placed from abroad were given to business houses also from abroad, so that the Leipzig Fair has simply been of no use to Germany, except to bring to Leipzig some hundreds of commercial people from foreign parts engaged in dealing with one another, to the exclusion of the German who formerly did the bulk of the business. So far so good. . . .

I have seen a report from New York that it is proposed to raise a fund of three million dollars to assist in the emigration of Jews from Germany. I have previously wrote on this subject. I think I wrote in last September or October that if every Jew in the United States were to subscribe a dollar to such a fund, it would be possible to drain the majority of the Jews from stricken Germany. I do not think the sum of three million is adequate. You ought to try for six or seven million.

Mr. Landau of The Jewish Daily Bulletin, who has come to London for a visit, tells me that he is pleased with the great success that has been achieved by the transformation of the weekly into a daily publication.

I am an enthusiastic believer in the value of the printed word. The Jewish Daily Bulletin ought to have a New York City circulation of at least 150,000 and a provincial distribution of not less than 50,000. If I were a young man in New York, I would go out of my way to work for the wider dissemination of the paper which tells the people of Jewry what is going on in the world. I would work and work and work to help in this effort, for on the spread of the truth will depend the eventual fate of a people.

Mr. Landau knows nothing of what I am writing. I have not consulted him. This message may be secured in his New York office on the ground that it harbors too much of propaganda. I hope I will pass. I confess it is propaganda, but what Jew wants now is propaganda at tous jours propaganda.

Catholic Divines Call For Religious Equality; Form Good-Will Group

ROCHESTER, N. Y., March 23. — Catholic Church leaders were largely instrumental in launching the Inter-Faith Good-Will Committee here, which consists of Catholic, Jewish and Protestant representatives.

The first major affair of the committee will be a dinner in the Chamber of Commerce headquarters on April 9, to be attended by 300 persons of each faith. The speakers will be Archbishop Edward Mooney of the Rochester diocese, Rabbi Philip H. Bernstein and Dr. Justin W. Nixon.

The Rt. Rev. Monsignor William M. Hart, vicar-general of the Rochester Catholic diocese, heads the inter-faith group.

Bulgarian Jews Discuss Their Communities

Delegates Take Up Education Issue—Zionists Demonstrate

(J.T.A. Special Correspondence)

SOFIA, March 23. — The reinforcement of Bulgarian Jewish communities, the general status of Jewish schools, the Hebraization of such schools and the participation of Bulgarian Jewry in the European Congress of National Minorities were among the topics discussed here recently at a conference of sixty delegates representing the Jews of Bulgaria.

The delegates do not represent separate communities. They are elected by active voting on the part of Bulgarian Jews and Jews who are citizens of other states but are resident in this country. The election is ordered by the Ministry of Religious Education and Instruction, and the delegates receive a three-year mandate. The present group has so far been called to two conferences, the first in 1932.

Ratification Awaited

Statutes worked out by the first convention in 1920 for the league of Jewish communities are still to be ratified by the state. Such ratification is from the Jewish point of view, urgent, as Bulgaria has no law which would facilitate the disposition of Jewish religious and community affairs.

The question of participation in the forthcoming World Jewish Congress was not discussed as such, since Bulgarian Jewry, which considers itself a part of world Jewry, regards it as its self-evident duty to take part in this general Jewish convocation. The only step taken was that of investing the central consistory with the right to name delegates to the

world congress.

Provision was made for the first steps toward the opening of a Jewish high school and the installation of courses for training school directors.

The five Zionist Revisionist dele-

gates staged a demonstration, shortly before the last point on the program was discussed, by leaving the conference. They proposed a resolution against the mandatory scheme (1937-1941) and in favor of the Jewish State.

Jews Bearing Brunt of New Attack by Reviled Klansmen

ATLANTA, Ga., March 22.—Reviving under the effects of artificial inspiration, the Ku Klux Klan in the January number of the Klan Courier, published here monthly by the Knights of the K. K. K., has issued a new offensive against its traditional enemies, Catholics, Jews, Internationalists, and others.

Bearing the brunt of the attack, Jews stand in the front lines of the new American drive against the Klan. Both from the pulpit and through their limited press mediums, the Klan has begun its anti-Semitic activities.

Reporting a two-hour address by Gail Garter, Grand Dragon of the Nebraska Klan, in the Christian Church, the Courier says, "Mrs. Carter's word picture of the place and power that is held by the International Jew in the affairs of this nation and the world and the domination that exists from this source of Soviet Russia, was particularly illuminating and left with the audience something that cannot lightly be cast away, for the effects of this influence, according to the speaker, is probably the strongest force which must be cast aside."

The periodical reports that "there is a strong rumor of a change in the restrictive immigration law to permit the Jews to enter the United States from Germany, exclusive of all other German immigration to the United States. Other changes are anticipated that will materially change the 1924 laws adopted through our influence and activity."

At the end of the list, Klansmen are warned, "Wide awake Klansmen should carefully watch further developments dealing with the above and similar matters and then act among their circles of friends to neutralize the effect of the propaganda put out."

A contribution from Oklahoma announces that "the Americans are rushing to carry on under the banner of the Ku Klux Klan." It says that "the Klan's progress is evident in almost every city, county and state of the nation."

"In reorganizing," asserts the Courier, "we are fortified with experience of the past." Members are chosen with greater care, it says.

Jew Who Died In Soviet Polar Trips Honored

Killed Landing Supplies When Expedition Was Wrecked

(J.T.A. Special Correspondence)
MOSCOW, March 8.—Yitz Selinsky, noted Soviet Jewish poet and a member of the ill-fated Arctic expedition commanded by Professor Schmidt, paid a glowing tribute to Boris Mogilewitsch, Jewish supply officer of the expedition, who was killed when the ice-breaker Tchelushinsk was crushed in the Arctic ice-fields. "He was a hero," Selinsky declared, "and he died at his post performing to the last the duty which had been placed on him."

When it was realized that the Tchelushinsk was sinking, the entire party consisting of 103 people was safely landed on an ice-flo. Boris Mogilewitsch insisted on remaining behind to see that the supplies for the party were safely landed. He was the last one to leave the ship and was killed when a plank fell on him.

The expedition is now stranded on an ice-flo in the most inaccessible part of the Arctic Ocean, although Soviet airmen have succeeded in removing to safety the eight women, wives of the members of the expedition and two babies, one of them born on the Tchelushinsk.

Anxiety Felt

Great anxiety is felt for the safety of the men on the ice-flo and it they survive and are rescued it will be due mainly to Mogilewitsch's work by which all the expedition supplies, food, sleeping bags, tents and a wireless set through which the group maintains contact with the outside world, were safely landed.

Mogilewitsch, who was only twenty-two years old, was already known as a daring Polar explorer with bear hunting. His associates regarded him as a man of exceptional courage.

The Soviet government has appointed a special committee of five to head the rescue work. Two of these, Joseph Ussachitsh, chief of the civil fleet and Yoffe, assistant to the Department of Northern Affairs, are Jews.

Petah - Tikvah Colony Has 10,000 Population. Is Seeking Gov't Loan

PETAH-TIKVAH, March 10.—A loan of \$45,000, for which government approval is sought, is to be raised by the Local Council to develop waterworks, construct a slaughter house, a central market place, new public buildings, roads and sidewalks in the colony.

Explanation of Petah-Tikvah's need for these improvements was furnished by a delegation of councilors, headed by the president, S. Shampier, to the Assistant District Commissioner, J. H. H. Pollock and the Jewish District Officer, Joseph Kupperman.

In 1933, it was explained, the colony grew at a rate equal to the combined expansion of the three previous years. Population last year increased 20 per cent, and now totals 10,000 individuals.

The Council's revenue increased to \$16,500, as compared with the budgetary estimate of \$12,500.

Favorable consideration of the matter was promised at the meeting.

Merchants of Palestine Act to Halt Proposal For Gov't Income Tax

JERUSALEM, March 10.—A meeting of representatives of various Jewish economic and public institutions has been held here to deal with the proposed income tax, the general view taken being that such a levy would cause considerable harm to the development of the country and that it was to be opposed unrelentingly.

At the urgent insistence of Jewish and Arab merchants, a meeting of the Jerusalem Chamber of Commerce, inter-sectarian body, has been held, at which traders of all communities expressed strong objection to the revival of the old proposal for introduction of a tax on incomes. A resolution was drafted embodying a firm repudiation of the measure.

Moslem Council Books Inspection Is Asked By Opposition Group

JERUSALEM, March 10.—A demand by the Moslem opposition that a thoroughgoing audit of the accounts of the Moslem Supreme Council, headed by the British Consul, an institutionally party, has been submitted to the Palestine government in a memorandum. A committee from every town in Palestine with an Englishman to head it, whose function it would be to audit the accounts of the Moslem Supreme Council since 1929, is the proposal.

Money Granted By Latvia Gov't To Train Jews

Will Engage In Farm Work — Receive 6,000 Lat

RIGA, Latvia, March 8.—The Latvian Minister of Agriculture, Dr. M. Gulbis, speaking before the Budget Commission of the Latvian Parliament, endorsed a proposal made by the Jewish deputy, Dr. Dubin, a member of the Agudath Israel, orthodox Jewish group, to grant a subsidy for the training of Jews in agriculture.

After some discussion, the budget committee assigned 6,000 lat for Jewish agricultural training courses.

Agricultural courses for Jews received a government subsidy of 6,000 lat the previous year, the Minister of Agriculture said, and suggested the same subsidy for the coming year.

"We must agree," Dr. Gulbis said, "that the agricultural courses should be well attended. The question might well be put whether Jews should be given the opportunity for training in agriculture, but the fact is that many Latvian Jews are engaged in agriculture, and the government is in favor of such a subsidy. Since we are subsidizing the training courses of the various minorities, why shouldn't the Jews have a subsidy for agricultural training?" he asked.

Palestine Hospital Staff Threatens to Strike for Improved Conditions

(J.T.A. Special Correspondence)
TEL AVIV, March 10.—Nurses employed at four private maternity and other hospitals here are threatening to strike unless their demands for better working conditions are met.

Although recent arbitration resulted in agreement on a number of points, the directors of the hospitals refused to yield on questions of regulating dismissals and other personal status. A request by the nurses and female attendants that arbitration be resorted to on these points was rejected, and three nurses were dismissed. An ultimatum was that unless these three are reinstated and arbitration accepted, a strike in all four hospitals will be declared.

Starving Tribes In Trans-Jordan

Jewish Contributions Help to Rescue Them From Great Poverty

(J.T.A. Special Correspondence)
AMMAN, Trans-Jordan, March 10.—It is officially reported here that the Trans-Jordan government has taken under its wing 2,100 destitute men, women and children of the starving Beni Hassan tribe. They are provided with food, shelter and clothing.

The tribe has been in a state of desperate poverty for many months, and its sufferings have been intensified by the hard winter.

Many children have died of exposure and undernourishment. Camels, sheep and other animals of the tribe long ago perished of starvation.

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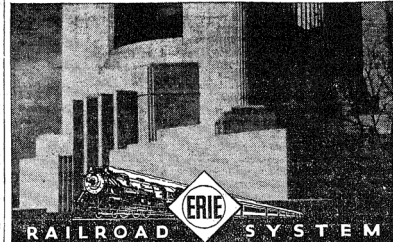


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IN THE REALM OF THE STAGE AND SCREEN

The Week's Crop

During the past week the wrappings were taken off four new plays which were then set down for your approval but before the atregeers got a chance to see what was being offered the critics just about took the hide off of three of these productions. "Another Love" a comedy from the French started the procession but was hooted roundly. John Howard Lawson's "Pure in Heart" was next in line and that piece received little encouragement. The other Lawson opening, "Gentlewoman," starring Stella Adler, escaped a thorough panning but the notices are not calc-lated to start the hordes toward the boxoffice. The only play of the week which looks as though it might have a chance is the anti-Nazi play, "The Shattered Lamp." This stirring, brutal drama of life in Germany under the Brown Shirts, raked the admiration and respect of the first nighters who, recognizing it as propaganda, nevertheless gave their verdict that it must be seen.

BOOKS

Lion Feuchtwanger's "The Oppermanns"

WE HAVE had many books of documentary evidence against Nazi Germany, its leaders and its led, books by refugees, investigators, journalists, pamphleteers and propagandists. They have been on the whole, searing indictments, indictments to rouse even the most indiffer-ent to indignation. Only in the case of one of these, "Murder—Made in Germany," was there the least effort to give the anti-Nazi material a fictional formal form. It has remained for Germany's greatest living Jewish novelist, Lion Feuchtwanger, who had the great good luck to be out of Germany when the mailed fist struck, to give us the first great expression in fiction of what the impact of Hitlerism has meant, on a large scale as affecting the nation and on a small, intimate scale, as affecting a family group of German Jews. The book bears the title of "The Oppermanns."

There is passion in the book, but passion does not get the better of the novelist. Nothing so clearly indicates the measure of Herr Feuchtwanger's power as a novelist as the manner in which he has leashed his own sense of indignation. In fact, I believe that Herr Feuchtwanger did a little leaning backward so that it becomes somewhat inadvisable, against the burden of newspaper reports, for the Nazis to call him an atrocity-monger. But the drive of the book as a whole is not impaired by the evidence of self-restraint. There is not in the whole range of the book such a scene as that with Helms Liepmann opens his "Murder—Made in Germany," but nonetheless "The Oppermanns" will stay with us longer, as a work of art, as pure narrative, carrying, and more than able to carry, its full weight of propaganda value.

Entrenched Family
The Oppermann family, before the terror came, was entrenched, socially, in business and in the medical world. It was an inter-married family, with sons half-Gentile. It had none of the marks of the proletarian or nouveau riche. It was a Jewish family but it was entrenched in German soil and German culture. The book opens with Gustav Oppermann, eldest of the three brothers, celebrating his 60th birthday. Senior partner in the Oppermann Furniture Stores, he is rather philosopher and litterateur than businessman. On the slightly younger brother, Martin, falls the responsibility of conducting the business. He is the family surgeon, a virtuoso of German medicine. Only Gustav is unmarried and he is at the beginning more concerned about Hitlerism and the danger about the rising Nationalist movement.

Lion Feuchtwanger tells us what the Nazi revolution means by showing us how it affects these

three brothers, their wives, their sisters and their sons; their employes and their club associates. Through young Barthold, Martin's son, we eloquently stated the meaning of the Nazi invasion of the German school system, and what happens to such high-minded German Germans as Rector Francois, who holds firm to his ideals against the crude martinet who is Nationalizing, that is brutalizing, the minds of his charges. Through Marcus Wolfsohn, a salesman in the Oppermann Furniture Stores, we see what the Nazi revolution means to a German Jew of the middle class who has no Jewish consciousness, but would like to be left alone.

Growth of a Soul
Herr Feuchtwanger has done another thing in "The Oppermanns." He has given us the development of a mature soul under pressure. Gustav Oppermann is shown at the opening of the book as a dilettante, living the life of cultivated leisure, untouched by any of the vital currents of the day. In fact, he is rather child-like and child-ish. Then comes impact after impact. He sees what is happening but it is not until he has reached refuge in a foreign land and evidences of the Nazi terror come to him, in document and verbal report, that he awakes to the true state of affairs, and then, to make amends for his murdered comrade, Professor Cohlen, at whose anti-Nazi stand he had once joined, he returns on a forged passport to take by his own shoulders the double burden of discerning the truth for himself and of suffering.

In brief, "The Oppermanns" is a fine novel and a deeply-moving work of art. H. S.

Baal Shem Tov's 'Will'

The second part of the material known as the "Will of the Baal-

Shem Tov" has just appeared in a Yiddish translation by S. H. Setzer, Jewish scholar who is publishing a series of studies under the general title of "Dos Wort Library."

The beginning of the "Will of the Baal Shem Tov," published by Mr. Setzer a short time ago, was Volume One of the Library. Mr. Setzer's treatment of the work is said to be the only scholarly one in any language.

S. H. Setzer was at one time editor of several Yiddish and Hebrew publications and is the author of some ten works in the field of Jewish thought, including "Ferdinand Lasalle," "Personalities," "The Quality of Mercy" and "The Wonder Tales of Reb Nachman Breslau."

Mr. Setzer's next study will be based on his reminiscences of M. Z. Peiserberg, Hebrew poet and author of the novel "Le-an" ("Whither?"), a study of the struggle between the older and the younger generation. The book was an outstanding contribution to Hebrew fiction. Peiserberg died about 1899, at the age of twenty-five.

Rabbi Speaks Before Parish on St. Pat's Day

ANN ARBOR, Mich., March 23.—Rabbi Bernard Heller, director of the Hilliel Foundation of the University of Michigan, was one of the principal attractions of the St. Patrick's Day dinner at St. Thomas Parish, where he appeared as a speaker.

Similarity of national experience between the Irish and the Jews was traced by Dr. Heller, who characterized St. Patrick as "the Moses of the Irish." He also sounded a plea for tolerance in America.

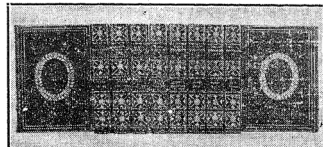
Slonimski, Warsaw Hebrew Writer, Dies

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ART AND ARTISTS

(The Bulletin reprints in full this week the review by Max Weber which appeared last week in a version abbreviated by the exigencies of the composing room.—Editor.)

J. B. Neumann, who gave up his lively New Art Circle some years ago to lecture on the Ethics and History of Art, has returned to the gallery field as co-director of the Contemporanea New Art Circle, 109 Madison Ave. The "Contemporanea" stands, I suppose, for the Architectural and Interior Decorating part of the gallery while the New Art Circle stands for Mr. Neumann.

The first exhibition opened with a display of recent paintings by Kunlyovsk, Max Weber and Arthur Dove.

The Kunlyovskis are amusing, as his paintings always are apt to be. They are the works of a talented, highly inventive and sophisticated personality who strives to be quaintly original. His little portrait is a lovely bit of painting. The intellectual abstractions of Arthur Dove on the other hand leave me, at least, entirely cold.

As for Max Weber, I remember seeing several of his paintings while I was a student at the National Academy of Design. They held me spellbound although I understand but little. They were strangely fascinating, attracting and repelling me. Since then I have always been on the lookout for his work and the more I saw the more I grew to like it.

Weber has opened my eyes to the shallowness and falseness of the academy and imbued in me a desire for self-expression and independent experimentation. In 1925 I wrote a glowing, youthfully enthusiastic appreciation of Max Weber and his art for which I was roundly teased and scoffed at by my fellow students. Since then, although I have gone through many periods in my artistic development with their concomitant influences my esteem and admiration for Max Weber has remained unalloyed.

The art of Weber is highly intellectual and emotional, sophisticated and religious. He possesses an extraordinary understanding of

form in the structural and voluminous sense and a beautiful sense of color. His landscape, the Pine-trees, is a veritable masterpiece light and earthy, painted with the almonaceous regard for texture and surface.

Elias Grossman

Elias M. Grossman, who is exhibiting his recent ethnics at the Jewish Club, has become quite a "bo-trotter" in his society for celebrities as models. They all posed "to him"—Einstein, Mussolini, Tagore, Gandhi. Portraiture is a most difficult art and more difficult than most of the great portraitists. Although Grossman possesses an accurate eye for likeness and character he cannot compete with the "faulsties" eye of the camera. This is why I prefer his informal studies of beggars and the simple unpretentious landscapes to his Mussolini and Colosseums.

Music

"Heard Melodies . . ."

That bandstand antiquarian, Bernardino Molinari, gave us not many days ago, through Arturo Toscanini, his friend, and the Philharmonic-Symphony, an edition of the 18th Century Vivaldi "Echo" Concerto for strings, cello and organ so surely convincing and so understandingly moulded that even Papa Haydn's charming Symphony "with the horn signal," which followed it, was somewhat obscured.

The week thus became not only a period for delving into antiquity, but for obscuring. The chorus of the Oratorio Society of New York sang no less a piece than Bach's 2 minor Mass, which is probably the most exalted expression ever to rise from what Nietzsche liked to call the Judaic-Christian religion. It sang the Mass with a distinguished orchestral accompaniment, if not a too inspired one, and a quartet composed of Jeannette Vredland, soprano; Rose Zampont, contralto; Dan Gridley, tenor, and Robert Crawford, baritone, all under direction of Albert Stoenes, who is at least to be congratulated on conducting the eighth complete tradition of this monumental utterance by the Society. In a very real sense, this event obscured the rest of the week. Miss Bampton was her thrilling, musically self, her Agnus Dei aria an unforgettable performance.

Leopold Moksowski the night before brought to light the Gilere symphony "Tysa Mironets," and then, apparently in an effort to atone for this indiscretion, conducted the Philadelphia Orchestra in Debussy's apocryphal, decadent "L'Après-midi d'un Faune" and several excerpts from Act III of "Parsifal," which filled the same Nietzsche already referred to with so much scorn for Richard Wagner.

The last "Salome" of the Metropolitan Opera season was easily the worst of the year, with Frederick Jagel (Herod) and Friedrich Schorr (Jokanaan) retelling involved in a miscue; Greta Ljungberg (Salome) falling to the stage in the midst of a dramatic sequence, and Karl Riedel conducting with astonishing listlessness.

The Musical Art Quartet ended its season with success. Harry Kaufmann, a pianist who knows a thing or two about tone projection and control, assisted it in the "Grand" manner; while the Musical Art alone assisted it expertly to a laurel wreath for its "laying of the Beethoven for a minor quartet" (Op. 122).

Ray Lev, another young pianist of remarkable gifts, played the "Jach Toccatina in C" which we have already heard in symphony arrangement this season. Maybe

eventually it will be given the way Sach wrote it—for the organ. In any case, Miss Lev showed dazzling technique and delicate expressiveness in Brahms, Chopin, Ravel and Liszt pieces.

The Workmen's Circle Chorus sang Labor and Revolutionary songs with Lazar Weiner conducting, and Yasha Fishberg, violinist, assisting.

Gerald Tracy played a piano "academically."

There you have a week or so.

Bordeaux Refugee Farm Colony Built Up on Old French Estate

BORDEAUX, March 22.—Without creating any of the stir which usually accompanies such undertakings, the work of establishing one hundred German Jewish refugee families in an agricultural colony near here is well under way.

About eighty kilometers from here, in the province of Gironde, a region that is beautiful, healthful and fertile, there is an old estate well equipped with buildings and out-houses but long neglected. Here it is that the harassed and despairing wanderers have been given a haven. Some of them, indeed, have already gone there to live and are getting food off the land.

There has been talk of Jewish

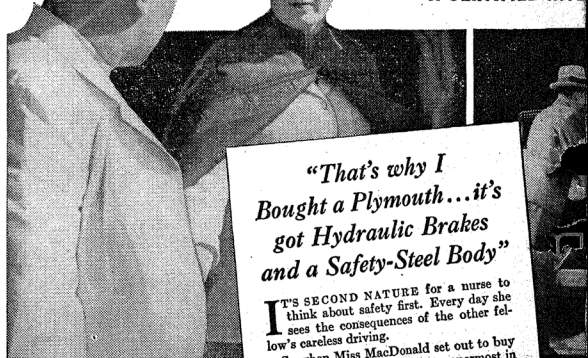
agricultural colonization in France for years. But it remained for the Exploitation Generale Agricole actually to begin the work of building up the first beautiful experiment. The work has nothing of the philanthropic about it, for in time each refugee family will be required to pay for the land it occupies.

The Exploitation Generale Agricole is headed by Professor Franz Oppenheimer, well known specialist of Jewish colonization problems. An agricultural school, where the refugees go through a preparatory course, has already been established.

Blanton Asks Dickstein Spike Anti-Alien Bill

Texan Asks Committee Be Discharged From Considering Measure

(Special to the J.D.B.)
WASHINGTON, March 23.—Dismissing his attack on Representative Samuel Dickstein, chairman of the Committee on Immigration and Naturalization, and other committee members not in sympathy with prohibiting immigration, Representative Thomas L. Blanton of Texas has filed a motion to discharge the committee from further consideration of his bill, H. R. 109, which would stop all im-

migration to this country for ten years.

Representative Blanton charged in the House that the committee on immigration "wiftfully refused year after year to bring in a bill to stop immigration to this country." He charged that "we have too many men on that committee who do not want to stop immigration." The Texan attributed the nation's unemployment problem to the "aliens who have been coming here constantly, many of them smuggled across our borders daily, that have taken the jobs away from our American citizens."

For the last dozen years, Representative Blanton has had pending in the House, a bill to stop immigration. During the present session, Representative Martin Dies of Texas has had a similar bill pending. The committee on immigration held a public hearing recently and voted it down.

Representative Blanton said that

"half the committee voted one way and half of them the other. It was the chairman of that committee who voted against reporting this bill. So it is the chairman of the committee that keeps the bill down. If he had voted to report it we would have this bill now on the calendar ready for passage, and we could pass it and preserve American jobs for American citizens."

Stating he knows that the people of the United States want to stop immigration, Representative Blanton said, "It is this continual horde of foreigners coming in here—the Nazi propagandists, propagandists for this, propagandists for that—who are doing the damage. If we want to stop this infernal propaganda, keep the aliens out of the country. Let us assume those we have before we take on others."

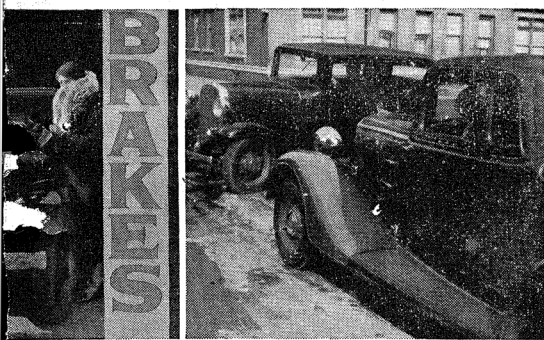

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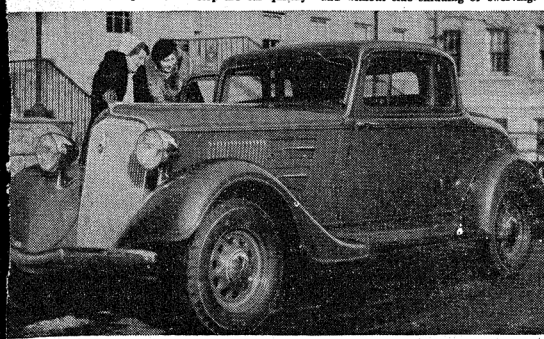

The Full Orbit of Our Responsibility

By ABBA HILLEL SILVER

WE are making progress! The decision of the Joint Distribution Committee and the Jewish Agency for Palestine to merge their campaigns and to unite in common action to meet the needs of Jewry on all fronts is gratifying evidence that we are making progress. American Jewry

will now be called upon to envisage the problem of Jewish relief and reconstruction as a unit and in its totality. The fragmentation of Jewish interests and the annual competition for preference and priority in communal estimation and support comes to a silver end.

Rabbi Silver to the Fortunate end.

It would have been an unparadisable waste of money and energy and a cynical disregard of the real wishes of the American Jewish public if in these critical times two separate campaigns would have been projected.

The objectives of the proposed campaigns of the Joint Distribution Committee and the Jewish Agency for Palestine overlap to a considerable degree. An essential part of the program of the Joint is the care of the German refugees. This is also true of the program of the Jewish Agency. Nine thousand of the German refugees have already gone to Palestine—fifty per cent of all who fled from Germany—nearly seven per cent of the total number of Jewish immigrants who came into Palestine since 1919. Thousands more will go there. Here at least is one common meeting ground where cooperation in fund raising on the part of the two agencies is clearly indicated. Whatever other purposes the Joint and the Jewish Agency may wish to serve, this large area of common responsibility makes a joint fund raising effort inescapable.

Many of the local Jewish welfare funds throughout the country who are in far closer touch with the real sentiments of the people than the leaders here have long ago grown weary of the separate and often conflicting campaigns of these agencies and have of themselves often merged frequently in the face of the obstructionist tactics of isolationist autocrats at national headquarters. Some of our communists who in the past have treated the unpleasant spectacle of attempted sabotage of united community efforts on the part of the national agencies with indifference and to indecent wrangling over quotas and percentages.

American Jewry in its present mood is not inclined to tolerate this any longer. The Jewish Agency for Palestine is deeply concerned in the plight of his German brothers. He wishes to contribute whatever he can to a general fund which will take care of the situation comprehensively. He senses the full scope of the problem and realizes that life will not permit a piecemeal solution. He is not interested in antiquated and academic discussions about Zionism. He knows that thousands of those whom he wishes to help, choose to stay in Palestine. He knows that the settlement of these refugees in Palestine has a significance beyond that of private relief. He knows that this is a more than just another place of refuge. The German-Jewish tragedy has taught him the lesson which he was reluctant to learn through all these years and which he has to whom he looked for leadership did not teach him—the need of a homeland for a people whom so many

people are conspiring to render homeless. His entire outlook on Jewish life has undergone a radical change. This change is reflected in his demand for unity of action, at least in the field of fund raising. Most assuredly he is not interested in the petty rivalries and politics of organizations and their leaders.

The separate campaigns which in previous years were launched by the Joint and the Jewish Agency actually encouraged or kept alive separation in the Jewish community. Groups were encouraged to select specific segments of Jewish world need in consonance with their prejudices, predilections or fractional loyalties. One group would take the initiative in joint campaigns, another in Palestine campaigns. Each had its own leaders, its own workers, its own ideology, its own characteristic approach. A political and social line of cleavage was thus maintained in those communal enterprises which should have hastened rather than retarded the process of integration of Jewish group life.

Life has now accomplished what reason and sound judgment failed to accomplish. The pressure of an overwhelming Jewish tragedy has forced upon us not a choice, we hope, but a union. The objective of the one campaign will now embrace German-Jewish relief, Eastern and Central relief and the upbuilding of Palestine—in a word, the full orbit of our responsibility. The antithesis from now on must be not between Zionist and non-Zionist, but between cooperator and separatist Jew. The choice now is between remaining within the generous fold of a united national Jewish undertaking, or outside of it.

If this agreement represents more than an ad interim truce, if it is truly grounded in a new understanding and a new statesmanship, and if the leaders of the camps are prepared to exercise the fullest measure of tolerance, patience and good will in the initial stages of their united action, this decision may prove the germinal phase of great good for the whole household of Israel. Then a great light will have been found in a small people. . . .

Could this be one of the Strasser brothers?

THE WEEK REVIEW

Germany

From Hitlerland centers around the boycott of all Jews in industry and trade, originally planned by the Nazis for March 10, but which is already in full swing.

Reports indicate that the Nazi regime either cannot or will not control Nazi parties and local chieftains throughout Germany. In Wiesbaden minor riots occurred because impetuous Jewish traders attempted to take advantage of the expected Easter trade. At the same time Nazi leaders in Hamburg issued a declaration for a complete boycott of Jews in every field of professional business and social life, which all Nazi party members were to sign. The very next day, however, the Nazi Bavarian Minister of Economics, Dr. Esser, speaking in Nuremberg, the very center of the anti-Jewish boycott movement and the home of the notorious Julius Streicher, issued a sharp warning against "boycotts, and Nazi party officials completely disavowed the declaration which the Nazi party members were asked to subscribe to.

The widely heralded spring campaign for employment opened with the usual fanfare of Nazi trumpets and the usual national-wide radio broadcasts by Hitler and Goebbels. The Deutsche Zeitung, leading Nazi paper, in a bitter article attacking the Jews, called for a campaign for work on an "Aryan basis" and declared that Germans were unable to compete with the "destructive mentality of the Jew" in trade and industry.

The Berlin Jewish community issued an appeal to German Jews asking them to back the spring employment campaign and made a special appeal to Jewish employers to hire Jewish unemployed and thus lighten the burden of the Jewish community.

Austria

From official Austrian sources assurances were given that the new constitution for the authoritarian, corporative state to be promulgated soon will contain clauses guaranteeing freedom of conscience and belief. The gloom hanging over the Jews of Austria was somewhat lightened by this announcement, but fear is still felt over a project announced by the Heimwehr, the real rulers of Austria, which would deprive a large number of naturalized Jews of full citizen rights and property. Significance is lent to the Heimwehr plan because the vigilant Austrian censor passed it and because no official notice of the plan has been forthcoming from official sources.

Great Britain

English Jewry rallied its second largest rally for German Jewish refugees. The report issued by the British Central Re-

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Heif Fund showed that over £200,000 was collected in the last campaign, more than half of which was spent in Palestine. The report praised Palestine as the place which the shattered lives of German Jewish refugees were most successfully reconstructed. . . . Neville Laski, Anglo-Jewish League chairman, in a speech before the Board of Deputies of British Jews that the outside world could not accept Germany's assurances regarding treatment of the Jews as long as the Nazi regime tolerated perpetual incitement against the Jewish population.

Palestine

The government of Palestine granted 1,350 workers immigration certificates to the Jewish Agency for Palestine against an undetermined immigration schedule. . . . Dr. Chaim Weizmann, Zionist leader, now in Palestine in connection with his work for the settlement of German Jewish refugees there, called for peace in Palestine and rebuked the various factions for their bitterness toward each other. . . . Speedy removal of the ban on the "Brown Book of the Hitler Terror" was announced. . . . Palestinian authorities, it seemed, objected to the cover of the book, which portrayed Goebbels as an ape with bloody hands. A curious situation existed in the Holy Land, for while the "Brown Book" was banned, Hitler's autobiography was freely sold.

The Rest of Europe

Codreanu, leader of the Iron Guard, and the actual assassins of Premier Duce were formally charged with the crime. Codreanu emerged from hiding and surrendered himself to the authorities. . . . Ukrainian terrorists continue

their attacks on the Jews of Galicia. Here the Jews were attacked because they are farmers. The Ukrainians think the Jews should stick to trade. . . . Six Endek students were arrested and charged with having brutally attacked Professor Handelman, aged Jewish scholar in Poland. The Polish government announced that the attack will be regarded as an attack on a state official and severely punished. . . . Heiz Liepmann, German Jewish writer who was sentenced by a Polish court to serve one month in jail for having allegedly libeled President von Hindenburg of Germany, was freed and immediately deported to Belgium, setting at rest rumors that he might be deported to Germany.

The United States

Felix M. Warburg, philanthropist and financier, accepted the national championship of the \$3,000,000 united drive for the relief of German Jews. . . . The birthday of Rabbi Stephen S. Wise was widely celebrated in New York City and other Jewish centers in the United States. A purse of \$40,000 was presented to Dr. Wise, which he announced would be used to further the work of the Jewish institutions in connection with. . . . A committee of notable American women headed by Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt petitioned President Roosevelt to liberalize restrictions against the admission of German refugees. . . . The House of Representatives voted to carry out a sweeping investigation of Nazi propaganda activities in the United States as proposed by Congressman Samuel Dickstein. An appropriation of \$25,000 for the committee was also voted. . . . Only thirty-one Congressmen voted against the measure.

Jerusalem Mayoralty Question Raises Many Strong Issues

Jews and Moslem Factions Oppose Present Incumbent—British Policy Is to Keep Arab Population Divided

JERUSALEM, February 21.—Will Ragheb Bey, the present Mayor of Jerusalem and one of the great Moslem clans of Palestine, continue in office after the municipal elections are held throughout the land, even though he is not returned at the polls?

That is a question which now agitates the minds of all communities here. For the opposition to Ragheb Bey not only among the Jews, because of his openly-expressed anti-Zionist views and his public fouting of Jewish civic rights, but also among a section of his own Moslem compatriots. The mayor of Jerusalem need not necessarily be previously elected councilor by public suffrage according to the provisions of the new Municipal Corporations Ordinance. The High Commissioner may appoint two councilors in Jerusalem, while the mayoralty is also an appointed office. That means that the administration may appoint a non-elected man a councilor and then, for the purpose of the law, the mayor.

Undoubtedly the mayoralty of Jerusalem is the key to British policy in Palestine, and it is unlikely that the Palestine administration will allow that fact to escape it when considering who is to head the "city fathers" of Jerusalem for the next few years. According to what is informed quarters here, the likeliest mayor of Jerusalem under the new country-wide civic regime will be none other than the present incumbent of that office, Ragheb Bey Nakshebi.

It would be sanguine to expect Ragheb Bey not to continue in his present office. According to an informant, Ragheb himself has let some hints drop that he has practically been promised the post he now holds for as long as he wishes—for life, if he feels that way. It is not unnatural that this promise should have been made by the British authorities. An informant declared, because they are interested in keeping the Moslems divided into parties, and Ragheb is their safest trump card in the complicated local game.

Many people here, with a knowledge of the workings of the local political machine and a practical experience of the tortuousness of the Moslem mind, take a fatalistic view of the situation. "Ragheb is in for life," is their prediction, and nothing is going to shake him off his high municipal perch. British officials in the East inevitably are influenced by environmental factors, and Ragheb Bey is one of them; and no amount of argument with officials will change their attitude.

The same percepts holds true with the mayor of Jaffa, Azam Bey Sadeh, who is also the favorite with the high British political pundits. But not so the other mayors, who are in a quandary as to their future: they declared at their last conference to rescuse the then unenacted Municipal Corporation Bill that unless every inch of their demands was granted, they would resign. Many of their proposals were thrown

overboard by the government, but they did not resign, nor did they pay heed to the urgings of Musa Kazem Pasha Ab-Husseini, president of the Arab Executive, who circulated them to keep their promise and quit.

Dual Policy

Their quandary now is how to counter the eventual Arab Executive propaganda and polling-take and justify their failure to carry out threats of resignation. Azam Bey Sadeh, mayor of Jaffa, is said to have replied to an overture to take part in a boycott of the municipal elections, that he would do so if he were guaranteed that no one else would put forward his

candidacy for the mayoralty—a sure sign that he hopes, notwithstanding the popular vote, to retain that office!

Abraham Goldberg has long been associated with Jewish activities. The passage of the Lodge-Fish resolution by both houses of Congress in 1922 was due chiefly to Mr. Goldberg's activity on its behalf. The resolution endorsed the rebuilding of Palestine as the Jewish homeland.

The spiritual heads of Chicago's reform and conservative congregations agreed that their separate groups and the Assembly will be fully represented at the Mid-Western Conference.

Gustave Golding, president of the Federation of Chicago Congregations, presided at a special meeting of his organization Wednesday noon, March 21, at the Standard Club. Here again, it was unanimously agreed that a complete and active part will be taken by their group and affiliated groups at the April 8 Conference.

One of the largest meetings in preparation for the conference was that held Wednesday night, March 21, by the Jewish Youth Groups, at the LaSalle Hotel. It was the first meeting held of Chicago's 123 Youth organizations. The affiliated organizations were

represented by more than 200 delegates, who quickly organized a central body under the direction of Rabbi Israel H. Weisfeld. In addition to pleading complete support for the participation in the Mid-West Conference, the young people drew up tentative plans for active campaigning throughout the city for the boycott of German-made goods.

However, the central authorities have succeeded in preventing the boycott against the Jews from spreading to other parts of Germany.

The seriousness of the situation may be gathered from the state of affairs in the German Jews, who had originally intended to set apart April 1 as a fast day to commemorate the unhappy events of the past year. This however, was found to be impossible since April 1 coincides with the second Passover seder, when fasting is impossible, according to the Jewish religion. One year ago the Nazis carried out on that date a nation-wide one-day boycott of the Jews of Germany.

Gain "Moral Strength"
The All-German Jewish Representative Body, the central organization of German Jewry, issued a call to all Jews to recall, during the Passover celebration the gravity of the past year and thus "gain moral strength."

The Jewish Telegraphic Agency learned today the government is preparing a decree for regulating agricultural training which will make it possible for young Jews to obtain this training. Authorities have been instructed not to make distinctions in agricultural training between "Aryans" and "non-Aryans." The decree is being drafted and it is understood it will be issued shortly.

His Story of Hardship

The broken, shabby man related in quivering tones a tale of the hardships he had undergone for twelve years in his daughter's home. He had been servant and nursemaid to son-in-law and grandchildren. Now that his half-blind eyes failed him, they had no further use for him. His eviction into the streets, he said, was a matter of days. But all he desired was an assurance from the plaintiff that she would permit him to dine at her table during the Passover holidays. After that . . . God would help, somehow.

His daughter then took the floor. She claimed that her father had gossiped about her unmercifully. She was the talk of the neighborhood. He had even caused trouble between her husband and his partner. She refused to furnish him with any further shelter.

The plaintiff and defendant retired for a brief respite. In five minutes the judges had come to a decision. The Rabbi announced that Mrs. Rabinowitz would have to keep her father through the holidays. After that, she and her other children would each contribute one dollar per week for his board and lodging elsewhere.

Case Number Two

Case number two was that of Joseph Ehrlichman, aged 47, and Abe Orlick. The former accused the latter of having publicly insulted him at a benefit ball of the Tolson Society, five years ago, aged 47, Ehrlichman had been collecting money for the society. Dr. Orlick had cast aspersions upon his plaintiff's honesty. This had led to the plaintiff's loss of credit among his neighbors and business associates. A mere fifteen thousand dollars would cover the disaster.

The plaintiff broke out like an angry peckish when aroused. He used violent language. Besides he was a great heckler for detail. He began his story:

"Halloo—halloo." He did not omit mention of the knock on the door when speaking of a visit. Remarkably patient, the judges listened to the harangue.

The defendant gazed at the ceiling with an air of martyrdom. The two wives in the case stared at one another indignantly, muttering. The air seemed charged with malvolence. Finally, after hearing a denial made by the doctor as to the exact content of his words to the night in question, the judges decided that for the sake of peace, a public apology was due the plaintiff. The case was dismissed.

At midnight the judges were still dispensing justice, the litigants were still filling complaints.
