Warburg, the foremost American Jewish philanthropist, will be the national chairman of the United Campaign, and distinguished representatives of both organizations have been chosen to cooperate with him in the task of raising \$\$3,000.000. \$3,000,000.

High Commissioner McDonald declared that "a response from the Jews of America, worthy of their best traditions, will enormously facilitate the carrying out of the task assigned to my col-leagues and to me, and will demonstrate to the whole world that the Jews once more are glad of the opportunity to share in the great world-wide undertaking of mercy and justice." He also pointed out that "the Jews within Germany are in desperate need of help to maintain, even on a lowered standard, their cultural, religious and philanthropic insti-tutions."

Judge Julian W. Mack, who presided at the meeting, emphasized very effectively that American Jewry is called upon not to make sacrifices but rather to avail itself of the great oppor-tunity to come to the rescue of distressed people abroad, in this grave crisis.

It has rarely failed on previous occasions to demonstrate its genericity and fulfil its obligations to the less fortunate portions of our people in other lands. Says No Force

Solution of Jewish Problem Only In Christian Law

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
VIENNA, March 23, — Prince

von Starhemberg, commander-inchief of the Fascist Helmwehr, declared today in the course of an interview with American news-papermen that the "Jewish prob-lem cannot be solved by force," He said that the problem was somi-ble only through the application of "Christian laws reflecting the feel-ings of the Austrian people." The ngs or the Austrian people." The Heimwehr leader characterized the numerous clauses as "spiritual terror" and said that "worthy" Jewry should be maintained in the Austrian state.

The interview with von Starhemberg lends fresh credence to the report first carried in a Budapest newspaper of a projected Heimwehr plan to deprive a large number of naturalized Jews of equality in citizenship rights and to prohibit Jews naturalized since 1918 from practicing in the liberal professions, the arts and hold-ing public office.

The Budapest report was published in full by the Wiener Tageblatt, one of the official organs of the Dollfuss regime. The project the Dollruss regime. The project aroused grave apprehension among Jews because the censor permitted the newspaper to carry the report and no denial was forthcoming from government officials.

Accordingly, the Revisionists stated, Kenesseth Is-Revisionists stated, Kenesseth Israel, the Assefath Hanivcharim and the Vaad Leumi no longer represent "the totality of the Zion-ist Yishub and the Revisionists will not agree to a joint represen-tative body unless the basis of such a group is changed."

The Revisionists demanded that any revisionists demanded that any representative group include members of all the parties, but must exclude the possibility of "domination by Socialists or any other party."

The arrest caused a sensation here in view of the fact that the trial of the Iron Guardist assas sins of Premier Ion Duca is now in progress and because of the so-cial standing of Professor Gomoju.

'Amity' Discussed At Detroit Forum

Editor, Rabbi and Minister Talk on Friendship Be-tween Jew and Gentile

DETROIT, March 22, — "The Way Out—A Formula for Amity Between Jew and Gentile" was Between Jew and Gentile" was the topic of a symposium which was sponsored by the Zionist Or-ganization of Detroit. Philip Slomovitz, editor of The Detroit Jewish Chronicle, Dr. Augustus P. Reccord, minister of the Unitarian-Universalist Church of Our Fa-Temple Beth El were the speakers.

Mr. Slomovitz, speaking on the national and economic aspects, ad-vocated the rebuilding of Pales tine as a solution to the Jewish problem. Dr. Reccord expressed the belief that the problem of amity is approaching realization in the United States through the decline of intolerance. He stated that progress has thrown Jew and Gentile in closer contact with each other, and that knowing each other better, there is a better understanding and good will.

Rabbi Fram declared that Christians and Jews will have to unite to "puncture the Jewish myth." to "puncture the Jewish myth."

He maintained that this myth was built up through 2,000 years of propaganda, a "myth that personifies the Jew as a symbol that is cruel, greedy, reprehensible.'

Miss Lee, who was in Germany recently, said that "events in Ger-many are an alarm signal which the women of America and England may well heed. If Nazis goes on unchecked women stand to lose their citizenship rights, which they so recently won." Miss Lee deplored the doctrine

of the three K's, Kirche, Kinder und Kueche, laid down by the Nazi government for German women. cterizing the doctrine as "an insult which touches every wor in the world," Miss Lee stated that the most exasperating thing about 'back to the kitchen' phase of Nazism is the placid manner in which German women seem to be accepting it.

Only the enlightened minority of German women, heroically running the risk of being clapped into con-centration camps, stuff anti-Nazi pamphlets under their clothing and circulate them. They are not suspected of being agents contraband, as plumpness does not arouse sus-picion in Germany.

I have been away in Italy for the past five weeks. During all my stay in that country I never came in contact with any kind or sort of a Jewish question. So far as my visit in the country of Mus-solini is concerned, I can truthfully say that not once did I hear anything about Jews, or Aryans, ore pure-blooded Germans. There were a number of German people in evidence. I did not speak to any of them for two reasons: One is that they do not know what is going on in their own country, and if they did, they would probably quite naturally subscribe whole-heartedly to the policy, the commands and the pleading of their idolized leader who has comletely locoed sixty-odd million of uare-heads. The other reason is lat I am not inclined to offer the menities of "Gemuetlichkeit" people who are so stupid as to believe that they are superior be-ings, when the merest elemental reflection should convince them that they are just the reverse.

I have been trying to trace a resemblance of Hitler's idolators to some other form of racial deopment, and have failed. Parenthetically I know a good deal, or I think I do, about the psychology of backward races So the Germans must stand alone as ex-amples of the retardation which sometimes affects otherwise civil-ized peoples. They think they are super-people, though the rest of the world knows they are not. Again I must revert to Mr. Kip-ling's Bandarlog people in the tree-tons.

But mere expressions of disapprobation and ridicule do not get us nearer to the solution of the Hitlerite anti-Semitic campaign. Verbal bombs do not blow up the citadel. On returning from Italy I read that the Leipzig Fair was a so-called "great success," and then we read that nearly all the orders that were placed from abroad were given to business houses also from abroad, so that the Leipzig Fair has simply been of no use to Germany, except to bring to Leipzig some hundreds of commercial people from foreign parts engaged in dealing with one another to the exclusion of the German who formerly did the bulk of the business. So far so good. . .

I have seen a report from New York that it is proposed to raise a fund of three million dollars to assist in the emigration of Jews assist in the emigration of Jews from Germany. I have previously dwelt on this subject. I think I wrote in last September or Octo-ber that if every Jew in the United States were to subscribe a dollar to such a fund, it would be pos-sible to drain the majority of the Jews from stricken Germany. I do not think the sum of three mil-lion is adesuate. You ought to try for six or seven million.

Mr. Landau of The Jewish Daily Bulletin, who has come to London for a visit, tells me that he is pleased with the great success that has been achieved by the transformation of the weekly into a daily publication.

I am an enthusiastic believer in I am an entusiastic benever in the value of the printed word. Delegates Take Up Education Issue-Zionists Demonstrate

(J.T.A. Special Correspondence) SOFIA, March 23. - The reenforcement of Bulgarian Jewish communities, the general status of Jewish schools, the Hebraiza tion of such schools and the participation of Bulgarian Jewry in the European Congress of National Minorities were among the topics discussed here recently at a conference of sixty delegates representing the Jews of Bulgaria.

The delegates do not represent separate communities. They are elected by active voting on the elected by active voting on the part of Bulgarian Jews and Jews who are citizens of other states but are resident in this country. The election is ordered by the Ministry of Religious Eccaction and Instruction, and the delegates receive a three-year mundate. The present group has so far been called to two conferences, the first in 1932.

Ratification Awaited

Statutes worked out by the first convention in 1920 for the league of Jewish communities are still to be ratified by the state. Such of Jewish communities are still to be ratified by the state. Such ratification is, from the Jewish point of view, urgent, as Bulgaria has no law which would facilitate the disposition of Jewish religious and community affairs.

In Soviet Polar Is Seeking Gov't Loan By Latvia Gov't **TripIsHonored**

Killed Landing Supplies When Expedition Was Wrecked

(J.T.A. Special Correspondence) MOSCOW, March 8.—Ilya Selvinsky, noted Soviet Jewish poet and a member of the ill-fated Arctic expedition commanded by Proessor Schmidt, paid a glowing tri-Boris Mogilewitch, Jewish y officer of the expedition, was killed when the icebreaker Tchelushkin was crushed in the Arctic ice-fields. "He was a hero," Selvinsky declared, "and he died at his post performing to the last the duty which had been placed on him."

When it was realized that the Tchelushkin was sinking, the entire party consisting of 103 peo-ple was safely landed on an ice-floe, but Mogliewitch insisted on remaining behind to see that the supplies for the party were safely landed. He was the last one to leave the ship and was killed when a plank fell on him.

The expedition is now stranded on an ice-floe in the most inaccessible part of the Arctic Ocean although Soviet airmen have sucactions sovet aimen have succeeded in removing to safety the eight women, wives of the members of the expedition and two habies, one of them born on the Tchelushkin.

Anxiety Felt

Great anxiety is felt for the safety of the men on the ice-floe and if they survive and are rescued it will be due mainly to Mogilewitch's work by which all the expedition supplies, food, sleeping bags, tents and a wireless set through which the group main-tains contact with the outside world, were safely landed.

Mogliewitch, who was only twenty-six years old, was already known as a daring Polar explorer and bear hunter. His associates writed him as a man of excep-

Lion Feuchtwanger's "The Oppermanns"

WE HAVE had many books of documentary evidence against Nazi WE HAVE had many books of documentary evidence against Naza Germany, its leades and its led, books by refuges, investigators, journalists, pamphieteers and propagandists. They have been on the whole, seating indictments to rouse even the most indifferent to indignation. Only in the case of one of these, "Murder—Made in Germany," was there the least effort to give the anti-Nazi material a fictional formal form. It has remained for Germany's greatest living Jewish novelist, Lion Feuchtwanger, who had the great good luck to be out of Germany when the mailed fist struck, to give us the first great expression in fiction of what the impact of Hitlerism has meant, on a large scale as affecting the nation and on a small, intimate scale, as affecting a family group of German Jews. The book bears the title

novelist. ist. Nothing so clearly the measure of Herr Feuchtwanger's power as a novel-ist as the manner in which he has leashed his own sense of indignation. In fact, I believe that Herr Feuchtwanger did a little leaning backward so that it becomes somewhat inadvisable, against the burden of newspaper reports, for the Nazis to call him an atrocity-monger. But the drive of the book as a whole is not impaired by the evidences of self-restraint. There is not in the whole range of the book such a scene as that with which Heinz Liepmann opens his "Murder—Made in Germany," but nonetheless "The Oppermanns" will stay with us longer, as a work of art, as pure narrative, carrying, and more than able to carry, its full weight of propaganda value.

Entrenched Family The Oppermann family, before the terror came, was entrenched, socially, in business and in the medical world. It was an inter-married family, with sons half-Gentile. It had none of the marks of the proletarian or nouveau riche. It was a Jewish family but it was entrenched in German soil and German culture. The book and German culture. The book opens with Gustav Oppermann, eldest of the three brothers, celebrating his 50th birthday. Senior partner in the Oppermann Furniture Stores, he is rather philosophen and literature than business. pher and litterateur than business man. On the slightly younger brother, Martin, falls the responsibility of conducting the business. Edgar is the famous surgeon, a treasure of German medicine. Only Gustav is unmarried and he is at the begining more concerned about his Lessing biography than about

of "The Oppermanns."

There is passion in the book, but three brothers, their wives, their passion does not get the better of sisters and their sons; their emsisters and their sons; their em-ployees and their club associates. Through young Berthold, Martin's son, we see eloquently stated the meaning of the Nazi invasion of the German school system, and what happens to such high-minded German Germans as Rector Fran cois, who holds firm to his ideals against the crude martinet who is Nationalizing, that is brutalizing, the minds of his charges. Through Marcus Wolfsohn, a salesman in the Oppermann Furniture Stores, ve see what the Nazi revolution means to a German Jew of the middle class who has no Jewish consciousness, but would like to be left alone. Herr Feuchtwanger has done another thing in "The Opper-manns. He has given us the development of a mature soul under pressure. Gustav Oppermann is shown at the opening of the book as a dilettante, living the life of cultivated leisure, untouched by any of the vital currents of the day. In fact, he is rather child-like and child-ish. Then comes impact after impact. He sees what is happening. But it is not until he has reached refuge in a foreign land and evidences of the Nazi terror come to him, in docu-ment and verbal report, that he awakes to the true state of af-fairs, and then, to make amends to his murdered comrade, Professor Cohn, at whose anti-Nazi ar-dor he had once jibed, he returns on a forged passport to take upon his own shoulders the double bur-

den of discovering the truth for himself and of suffering. In brief, "The Oppermanns" is a fine novel and a deeply-moving work of art. H. S.



J. R. Neumann, who gave ur his lively New Art Circle some years ago to lecture on the Esthe tics and History of Art, has re-turned to the gallery field as co director of the Contempora New Art Circle at 509 Madison avenue The "Contempora" stands, I sup-pose, for the Architectural and Interior Decorating part of the gallery while the New Art Circle stands for Mr. Neumann.

The first exhibition opened with a display of recent paintings by Kuniyoshi, Max Weber and Arthur

The Kuniyoshis are amusing, as his paintings always are apt to be. They are the works of a talented highly inventive and sophisticated personality who strives to be quaintly original. His little portrait is a lovely bit of painting. The intellectual abstractions of Arthur Dove on the other hand leave me, at least, entirely cold

As for Max Weber. I remember seeing several of his paintings while I was a student at the Nawhile I was a student at the Na-tional Academy of Design, They held me spellbound although I un-derstand but little. They were strangely fascinating, attracting strangely fascinating, attracting and repelling me. Since then I have always been on the lookout for his work and the more I saw the more I grew to like them.

Weber's art opened my eyes to the shallowness and falseness of the academy and imbued in me a desire for self-expression and independent experimentation. In 1925 I wrote a glowing, youthfully en-thusiastic appreciation of Max thusiastic appreciation of Max Weber and his art for which I was roundly teased and scoffed at by fellow students. Since then hough I have gone through have gone although many periods in my artistic de-velopment with their concomitant influences my esteem and admira-tion for Max Weber has remained unalloyed.

The art of Weber is highly intellectual and emotional, sophisti-cated and religious. He possesses an extraordinary understanding of

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ninous sense and a beautiful sense f color. His landscape, the Pinerees, is a veritable masterpiece ich and earthy, painted with a ine almost tactile regard for texure and surfaces.

Elias Grossman Elias M. Grossman, who is exibiting his recent etchings at the ewish Club, has become quite a lobe-trotter in his search for celbrities as models. 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

An essential part of the program of the Joint is the care of the German refugees. This is also true of the program of the Joint part of the German refugees and the Joint Park of the German of the German refugees and the Joint Park of the Germany—nearly seven per of the Joint Committee per cent of the Joint Committee of the Joint Committee of Joint Park of the Jo cent of the total number of Jewish immigrants who came into Pales-tine since 1919. Thousands more will go there. Here at least is one common meeting ground where co-operation in fund raising on the part of the two agencies is clearly indicated. Whatever other purposes the Joint and the Jewish Agency may wish to serve, this large area of common responsibility makes a joint fund raising effort inescapable.

Many of the local Jewish welfare funds throughout the country who are in far closer touch with the real sentiments of the people than the leaders at headquarters have long ago grown weary of the separate and often conflicting campaigns of these agencies and campaigns of these agencies and have of themselves merged them, frequently in the face of the ob-structionist tactics of isolationist autocrats at national headquar-ters. Some of our communities were in the past treated to the unpleasant spectacle of attempted unpleasant spectacle of attempted sabotage of united community ef-forts on the part of the national spokesmen of these agencies and to indecent wrangling over quotas and percentages.

American Jewry in its present mood is not inclined to tolerate this any longer. The average American Jew is deeply concerned in the plight of his German brothers. He wishes to contribute what-ever he can to a general fund which will take care of the situation comprehensively. He senses the full scope of the problem and realizes that life will not permit a piece-meal solution. He is not interested in antiquated and academic discussions about Zionism. He knows that thousands of those om he wishes to help, choose to go to Palestine. He realizes that the settlement of these refugees in Palestine has a significance be-tend that of private relief. He understands that Palestine is more

The choice now is between remaining within the generous fold of a united national Jewish undertaking, or outside of

If this agreement represents more than an ad interim truce, if it is truly grounded in a new understanding and a new statesman-ship, and if the leaders in both camps are prepared to exercise the camps are prepared to exercise the fullest measure of tolerance, pa-tience and good will in the initial stages of their adjustments, then this decision may prove the germinal basis of great good for the whole household of Israel. Then a great hour will not have found us a small people. . . .



THE WEEK IN REVIEW

News from Hitlerland centers around the boycott of all Jews in industry and trade, originally planned by the Nazis for March 23, but which is already in full swing. Reports indicate that the Nazi regime either cannot or will not control Nazi parties and local chieftains throughout Germany. In Wiesbaden minor riots occurred because imporerished Jewish trad-ers attempted to take advantage of the expected Easter trade. At the same time Nazi leaders in Nuremberg issued a declaration for a complete boycott of Jews in every field of professional business and social life, which all Nazi party members were asked to sign. The very next day, however, the Nazi Bayarian Minister of Economics, Dr. Esser, speaking in Nuremberg, the very center of the anti-Jewish boycott movement and the home of the notorious Julius Streicher, issued a sharp warning against the boycott, and Nazi party officials completely dis-avowed the delcaration which the Nazi party members were asked to subscribe to.

The widely heralded spring campaign for employment opened with the usual fanfare of Nazi trum-pets and the usual nation-wide radio broadcasts by Hitler and Goebbels. The Deutsche Zeitung. leading Nazi paper, in a bitter ar-ticle attacking the Jews, called for a campaign for work on an "Ary-an basis" and declared that Germans were unable to compete with the "destructive mentality Jew" in trade and industry "destructive mentality of the

The Berlin Jewish community issued an appeal to German Jews asking them to back the spring employment campaign and made a special appeal to Jewish em-ployers to hire Jewish unemployed and thus lighten the hurden of the

From official Austrian sour

assurances were given that the new constitution for the authoritarian, corporative state to be promulgated soon will contain clauser mulgated soon will contain clauses guaranteeing freedom of con-science and belief. The gloom hanging over the Jews of Austria was somewhat lightened by this announcement, but fear is still felt over a project announced by the Heimwehr, the real rulers of Austria, which would deprive a large number of naturalized Jews of full citizen rights and equality. Significance is lent to the Heimwehr plan because the vigilant Austrian censor passed it and because no official denial of the plan has been forthcoming from official sources

Great Britain

English Jewry launched its sec-ond campaign for relief for Ger-man Jewish refugees. The report issued by the British Central Re-

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lief Fund showed that over £200 .-000 was collected in the last cam-paign, more than half of which was spent in Palestine. The report praised Palestine as the place where the shattered lives of German Jewish refugees were most successfully reconstructed. . . Neville Laski, Anglo-Jewish lea der, declared in a speech before the Board of Deputies of British Jews that the outside world could not accept Germany's assurances regarding treatment of the Jews as long as the Nazi regime tolerated perpetual incitement against the Jewish population.

The government of Palestine granted 1,350 workers immigragranted 1,350 workers immigra-tion certificates to the Jewish Agency for Palestine against an undetermined immigration schedule. . . . Dr. Chaim Weizmann noted Zionist leader, now in Palestine in connection with his work for the settlement of German Jewish refugees there, called for peace in Palestine and rebuked the various factions for their bitterness toward each other. . . . Speedy re-moval of the ban on the "Brown moval of the ban on the Brown Book of the Hitler Terror" was announced. Palestine authorities, it seemed, objected to the cover of the book, which portrayed Goebbels as an ape with bloody hands.
A curious situation existed in the
Holy Land, for while the "Brown Book" was banned, Hitler's autobiography was freely sold.

Jerusalem Mayoralty Question Raises Many Strong Issues

Jews and Moslem Factions Oppose Present Incumbent-British Policy Is to Keep Arab Population Divided

JERUSALEM, February 21.— Will Ragheb Bey Nashashibi, present Mayor of Jerusalem and head one of the great Moslem clans of Palestine, continue in office after the municipal elections are

held throughout the land, even though he is not returned at the polls?

That is a question which now agitates the minds of all communities here. For there is opposition to Ragheb Bey not only among the because of his openly Jews. pressed anti-Zionist views and his public flouting of Jewish civic rights, but also among a section of his own Moslem compatriots

The mayor of Jerusalem need not necessarily be previously elected a councilor by public suffrage according to the provisions of the new Municipal Corporations Ordinance. The High Commis sioner may appoint two councilors in Jerusalem, while the mayoralty is also an appointed office. means that the administration may appoint a non-elected man a councilor and then the mayor.

Undoubtedly the mayoralty of Jerusalem is the key to British policy in Palestine, and it is un-likely that the Palestine administration will allow that fact escape it when considering who is to head the "city fathers" of Jerusalem for the next few years.

According to well informed quarters here, the likeliest mayor of Jerusalem under the new coun-trywide civic regime will be none other than the present incumbent of that office, Ragheb Bey Nasha-

It would be sanguine to expect Ragheb Bey not to continue in his present office. According to an informant, Ragheb himself has let some hints drop that he has practically been promised the post he now holds for as long as he wishes-for life, if he feels that way. It is not unnatural that this promise should have been made by the British authorities, the informant declared, because they are interested in keeping the Moslems divided into parties, and Ragheb is their safest trump card in the complicated local game.

Many people here, with a knowl-edge of the workings of the local political machine and a practical experience of the tortuosities of the Moslem mind, take a fatalistic view of the situation. "Ragheb is in for life," is their prediction, and nothing is going to shake him off his high municipal horse. Brit-ish officials in the East inevitably are influenced by environmental factors, and Ragheb Bey is one of these factors; and no amount of argument with officialdom will change their attitude

The same perhaps holds true with the mayor of Jaffa, Azam Bey Said, who is another firm favorite with the high British pundits here. But not so the other mayors, who are in a quandary as to their future: they declared at their last conference to discuss the then unenacted Municipal Cor-poration Bill that unless every inch of their demands was granted, they would resign. Many of their proposals were thro

overboard by the government, but they did not resign, nor did they pay heed to the urgings of Musa Kazem Pásha Al-Husseini, presi-dent of the Arab Executive, who circularized them to keep their promise and quit.

Their quandary now is how to counter the eventual Arab Execucounter the eventual Arab Execu-tive propaganda at polling-time and justify their failure to carry out threats of resignation.
