Jewish Activities in the Metropolitan Area

Masada Would Concentrate on Jews in Diaspora

Less Emphasis on Palestine Asked Here

A departure from the present Zionist platform which places emphasis on a return to Palestine, to concentration on Jews of the Diaspora, was advocated at the first annual Masada Youth Zionist Organization conference of the metropolitan chapters held at the Central Jewish Institute.

The conference was the first of a series of campaigns to strengthen the existing Masada organization and to make plans for a huge membership drive which is launched within a few days.

Israel Bernian, chairman of the cultural committee, presided at the morning session. David Marcus, president of the New York Masada, greeted about one hundred delegates representing fifteen chapters, with an address on the policy of the organization. Isaac Imber, head of the national Masada organization, declared that Masada stresses need for union of the various factions of Zionism.

"In many of the small communities, Masada has already succeeded in doing that," he said.

Twelve new chapters were inducted formally into the organization at the afternoon session. Morris Rothenberg, president of the Zionist organization of America, who presented new chapters with their charters, impressed them with the thought that each Masada club is a Zionist cell from which Zionist ideology must radiate.

The conference decided to cooperate with the Kfar Ushishin project and set the sum of \$2,000 as their quota. It was also announced that Masada will place a Jewish National Fund box in every Jewish home. As part of its membership campaign Masada will enlist the cooperation of non-Zionist Jewish clubs in the city.

Palestine Women's Group Holds Tea and Musicals

The western section of the Women's League for Palestine held a tea and musical yesterday at the home of the chairman, Mrs. Louis Diamond. About fifty attended, among them Mrs. William Prince, president of the league.

The league, which has several groups throughout the city, is a pioneer in the field of refugee work and has established a home in Haifa where German-Jewish girls are housed and taught useful trades.

Effective Organization To Combat Hitlerism Is Urged by Cahn

A plea for an effective organization of Jews to combat Hitlerism was made by Edward Cahn before the Talk of the Town Club.

Asserting that because Gentile cooperation comes, Jews themselves must lead the way in the struggle against anti-Semitism, the lecturer pointed out that the danger was facing Jews in America and elsewhere as much as in Germany because "today the world is one, it is suffering from a degeneration and it is likely to be chosen as the scapegoat."

"While we cannot expect armed intervention on behalf of the Jews, we can look to the economic boycott to open the eyes of the people of Germany to the folly of Hitlerism."

Dowling, former presiding justice of the Appellate Division and vice-president of the Non-Sectarian Anti-Nazi League, was adopted at a special meeting of the board of directors of the League. Dr. Abba Hillel Silver, first vice-president of the League, presided. Messages of condolence from the League were sent to the family.

The resolution said in part: "We knew him as an alert mind and a compassionate heart which was touched even by the suffering of people thousands of miles away. He joined our cause wholeheartedly to do his share to check the Hitler menace to the world. In the passing of Victor J. Dowling, liberalism and justice have lost an important leader."

Hitler Hates Women, No Equality in Reich, Says Katharine Anthony

"With Hitler it is not even a secret that he fears and hates women," writes Katharine Anthony in the April American Spectator.

"He must therefore countermand every principle and ideal that they have striven for in Germany for the past thirty years. No co-equality, no birth-control, no equality of the sexes is tolerated in the Nazi state. The women's organizations which once pursued these aims and similar ones have silently dispersed and vanished. Hitler will force the women of Germany, including the two million surplus in the population, into the Prussian bed of woman's historic mission."

The author states that when Paul Goebbels expounds the woman's mission before a gathering of women, he is not simply explaining the government and its rulings, but in the manner of a pope is "enunciating infallible doctrine."

Students Aim Off Propaganda, Asserts Rabbi

Nazi Manifestations in Colleges Are Results, He Says

Declaring that teaching in modern institutions of higher education is "shallow and flabby," Rabbi Baruch Braumstein, counselor to Jewish students at Columbia University, declared that the student is an easy target for propaganda in a speech before the Jewish Fellowship at the Hotel McAlpin.

"The manifestations of swastika stories, the growing division and dislike between student groups on the same campus, show that propaganda is having results," Dr. Braumstein asserted. "Vicious propaganda is spreading rapidly among college students, which preaches a none too happy state of affairs when tomorrow they become the nation's leaders."

"The responsibility for maintaining the traditional spirit of college life, one of decency and fair play, among its students now rests with the college authorities. I solemnly warn them, if they refuse to act to curb a growing evil on the pretext of the preservation of the right of free expression, they are permitting various groups to gain the power to crush all free speech and freedom of thought," he concluded.

Jew Must Be Real Citizen, Avers Dr. Lyons

Distinct in Religion, He Is to Ban Hyphen From His American Rights

"In religion the Jew must be distinct, in politics he must be an American citizen without any hyphen," Dr. Alexander Lyons, rabbi of the Eighth Avenue Temple, Brooklyn, declared last night in a lecture on "A Jewish Democracy" before the Midwood City Fusion Party, 1708 Avenue J.

"We must not have the Jewish Democracy," he said. "We must have more democracy in America because it is being threatened. There seems to be the suggestion of a danger of too much dictation. All American citizens must be on their guard against a discouragement of loss of their rights as individuals."

"The Jew has always stood for a responsible individualism. He must not secure this by united Jewish action. This will only call for organized opposition of other groups. The Jew must not exercise his religious influence in co-operation with other liberal Americans as to safeguard democratic rights for the entire citizenship," Gaston Koch, executive member of the Midwood City Fusion Party, introduced Dr. Lyons.

Future of Jews Dark, Says Rabbi

Schultz Is Fearful of Decline of Liberal World Forces

The future of Jews throughout the world is "dark," Rabbi Benjamin Schultz said in an address last night on the subject, "The New Anti-Semitism and the Present Outlook." He spoke at Congregation Alavath Shalom of Flatbush, Avenue R and East Sixteenth Street.

"Fortunately or unfortunately," Rabbi Schultz said, "Jews have been aligned with the liberal forces in most countries, but liberalism is on the decline everywhere, including the United States."

"Under the Fascist form of government such as seems likely everywhere at the moment, Jews would be in a most unfortunate position. Under a Communist form of government—the other alternative—the Jewish people would gradually disappear, even though the Jews themselves would be safe in body."

"Hitler persecution of the Jews is only an incident in the gradual process of an overwhelming danger. The Jews can survive it only by manifest courage and a strengthening of their allegiance to liberalism."

The lecture concluded a series of twelve by Rabbi Schultz. The congregation expressed its appreciation by presenting him with a handsome radio last night. Seaman R. Kay presided.

Endeks Begin Anti-Jewish Trade Drive

Distribute Leaflets In Wilno Urging An Easter Boycott

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
WILNO, Poland, March 26.—The Endek anti-Semite today began an Easter boycott against Jewish merchants in the city. Members of the organization distributed large numbers of leaflets appealing to the population to "buy from Gentiles."

The Endeks are the National Democrats, an opposition political party whose chief plank is anti-Semitism and opposition to the Pilsudski regime. They have maintained a continuous offensive against the Polish Jews.

Even when the Pilsudski regime forced through parliament a new constitution which the Endeks dislike they showed their dissatisfaction through riots against the Jews, widely scattered cities in Poland.

Forbid Revisionist Youth Maneuvers

Polish Authorities Fear Demonstrations Against Jews by Endeks

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
WARSAW, March 26.—Maneuvers which "the Brith Trumpdorfer" is conducting for the Revisionist party, planned to hold this summer at Zaleszycki, Poland, were today forbidden by the Polish authorities, following an objection to the plan.

Authorities fear that the Endeks, National Democrats, anti-Semitic anti-governmental party, may utilize the occasion for demonstrations against the government and against the Jews.

It is believed that the Brith Trumpdorfer will hold their maneuvers in Czechoslovakia.

Recently Endek Senators called the attention of the Polish government to the proposed Brith Trumpdorfer exercises and asked whether the government would permit an "international Jewish army" to gather on Polish soil.

European Trade Is Sought by Palestine Trade Delegation

(J.T.A. Special Correspondence)
JAFFA, March 10.—A special meeting of Palestinian exporters and importers is scheduled here on February 27 to nominate members of the proposed trade delegation to European countries. Expenses will be provided for the trip. The Agricultural Economics and Statistics committee is a joint body of the General Agricultural Council of Palestine, an inter-sectarian commission under government auspices, has called the meeting.

Abraham Goldwater, local banker, is chairman of the joint committee, which includes five Jewish members, five Arab members, and one Englishman. The secretary, a government official, is a British Jew.

Cuban Jews Uniting; Press Boycott Action Against Reich

Jewish Center, Formed Ten Years Ago With HIAS Aid, Is Flourishing—Schnaider, Bliss and Liszovics Are Leaders

(Special to the J.D.B.)

HAVANA, March 15.—Despite the general abandonment of conditions here and the division of opinion among various Jewish groups, Cuban Jewry has set about bringing order into its community life, crystallizing its stand on the boycott of German goods.

Ten years ago, with the aid of the New York division of HIAS (Hebrew Immigrant Aid Society), the Jewish Center of Havana was founded. Since that time a number of institutions have been established. Most of them were not in a Jewish center, but as a result that communal work suffered.

However, the recent economic and political difficulties have tended to unify Cuban Jewry and its efforts to protect what little it has succeeded in building up so far. With this in view the Jewish Center is attempting to unite within its ranks a number of Jewish institutions, including the Jewish Women's League, the League for Tubercular and Mentally Diseased, the Jewish Club, the Jewish Committee and several philanthropic societies.

The new membership of the Center is young, educated, progressive. Abraham Schnaider, its newly-elected president is, for example, a one-time medical student and son of a prominent family of Tulehlin, Russia. He came to Cuba in 1928.

Schnaider is also president of the League for the Tubercular and Mentally Diseased, which is providing care for forty-two tubercular and eight mentally diseased patients. Provision is also being made to care for some fifty sick children and their families.

The league income is derived from its 500 members and proceeds from entertainments which its dramatic section arranges.

Its Loan Fund

The Jewish Center has established a loan fund and supports the only Jewish library in Cuba and a Jewish school where 328 children study. Forty per cent of

Jewish Doctors Excite Bombay

Medical Circles There Agitated Over Arrival of Exiles, Who Practice Unregistered

(J.T.A. Special Correspondence)
BOMBAY, India, March 5.—Medical circles here are agitated over the arrival of a number of exiled German Jewish doctors who have commenced practice in Bombay as unregistered physicians. Members of the Medical Association are urging that rules be adopted to prevent all foreign unregistered doctors from practicing anywhere in India. It is understood that the matter will be submitted to the government of India in the near future.

Under the Indian Medical Act foreign doctors may not be registered unless they have passed their examinations in Great Britain, the Dominions of India itself. However, foreign unregistered doctors are permitted to practice in India, but they may not sign death certificates, medical or legal documents, and they are forbidden to sue for fees owed them. In addition, unregistered medical men may commit unregistered doctors for fear of having his name removed from the medical roster.

they are children of families which are unable to meet tuition costs. The Center was also instrumental in establishing the Juridical Committee, which has actively protected the interests of Jewish residents during the various political upheavals.

In order to combat effectively German trade here, the Czechoslovakian Chamber of Commerce of Cuba has been organized by Meyer Liszovics, who hopes to strengthen trade relations between Cuba and Czechoslovakia and thus minimize the market for German goods. The first shipment of Czechoslovakian goods are expected shortly.

A second step in the anti-German campaign was the banquet arranged for representatives of the Cuban press by the Intersectoral Committee, which includes representatives of every Jewish group here. More than twenty Cuban publications responded to the invitation, as did the president of the Cuban Journalists' League and the Press Department of the Ministry of Interior.

Dr. Angula, president of the Journalists' League, speaking in the name of the Cuban press and group, expressed friendship to wards the Jews and decried anti-Semitism. The Intersectoral Committee expects the press to aid in the anti-German boycott, basing its hopes on a promise by Dr. Ramon Seidlin, editor of "El Pais." David Bliss, president of the committee, believes that conditions for the successful conduct of the boycott are very favorable.

While the boycott front is a united one, there is considerable evidence of opinion here as to the advisability of conducting a campaign for the relief of German victims of Hitlerism.

Inquiry by your correspondent elicited a number of statements by Jewish leaders here. Some of them believe with Abraham Schnaider that all effort should be concentrated upon the boycott, since little could be expected of a drive for funds. Mr. Schnaider thinks the abnormal political situation existing in Cuba today would prove a serious detriment to any such drive.

An opposing viewpoint was expressed by Mr. Liszovics, president of the Adath Israel and the Czechoslovakian Chamber of Commerce. Mr. Liszovics believes that the Cuban Jews are in duty bound to conduct a fund campaign and to make it a 100 per cent success. If the Jewish organizations of America will authorize him to do so, Mr. Liszovics said, he would undertake to launch a relief drive.

Palestine Museum of Archaeology Is Now Being Transferred

(J.T.A. Special Correspondence)
JERUSALEM, March 10.—The transfer of the Palestine Archaeological Museum to its handsome new building, built entirely of white stone, at the northeast corner of the walled Old City, is now under way. All antiquities found in Palestine which have been retained here will be housed in the building, which will also serve as the headquarters of the Palestine Department of Antiquities.

The building was erected at a cost of two million dollars, which was donated by John D. Rockefeller Jr.

Blue, Red, Brown Shirts Are Worn by Jews of Palestine

(J.T.A. Special Correspondence)

JERUSALEM, March 10.—In a world of strong passions, it is interesting to note that Palestine Jews also wear shirts of different hues to indicate their political affiliations.

The Socialists wear blue shirts, disdaining red as being too radical a color. The Histadrut members wear blue shirts long before General O'Duffy adopted them as the uniform of his militants in the Irish Free State. The Jewish Labor dress in this land, particularly in the hot summer, consists of blue polo shirts, open at the neck and with short sleeves, khaki hiking shorts, golf stockings and low cut shoes.

The Revisionists wear brown shirts. They claim they used this color before Hitler thought of it for his legions.

Sports organizations, like the Maccabees, affect white with a dash of pale blue to indicate their Zionist spirit.

Yugoslavian Jews Open Central Office To Coordinate Work

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)

BELGRADE, March 26.—To cope with the serious inroads which the economic crisis here has made upon Yugoslavian Jewry a central office for Jewish aid has been opened in Zagreb. The principal purpose of the central office is to unify and systematize the social work of all Jewish institutions in the country.

Through the office cheap credit will be made available and cooperatives and labor exchanges will be established. The first thing the central office will do, however, will be to compile statistics for a survey of occupational distribution of Jews. These statistics will later serve as the basis for a rational distribution of young Jews in industry, artisanship and agriculture.

Shortage of Funds Forces Tarbut Schools Closing

Two Hundred Polish Hebrew Schools Compelled to Suspend Classes

WARSAW, March 26.—Two hundred Tarbut Hebrew schools throughout Poland closed here today due to a lack of funds.

Most teachers, despite their small salaries, have not been paid for the past six months.

Many schools are facing the danger of eviction from the buildings where they are located.

The Tarbut administration is appealing for support and warns of a complete ruin of the Hebrew school system in the country with one of the largest Jewish populations in the world. It will issue a plea for help at the meeting of the "action" committee of the World Zionist Organization.

Scotland Yard Tracing Anti-Semitic Posters Found in Booths

LONDON, March 26.—Scotland Yard detectives are attempting to trace the persons responsible for the appearance of small anti-Jewish handbills on telephone booths in South London.

"Look at the noses of our new aristocracy," the legend on the handbills, in large letters reads. Members of British Fascists, Limited, the group led by Sir Oswald Mosley, declared when interviewed that they are not anti-Semitic and know nothing of the affair.

Critical Moments

Samuel Levine— Jewish Soldier

There are not many of what might be called lighter moments in Sidney Howard's serious play "Yellow Jack," which is now doing its share of business at the Martin Beck Theatre, but those that there are, are supplied by Samuel Levine, a young Jewish actor who plays the role of a Jewish soldier who has volunteered to act as a human guinea pig for experimental purposes.

"Yellow Jack" is the entirely stirring drama that snags what happened when United States medical officers set out to discover the cause and cure of yellow fever. The introduction of a Jewish soldier in the experiment is fiction. In reality the volunteers who offered their lives were Cubans and soldiers from the middle-west, but Sidney Howard in adapting the idea for the stage added four soldier characters, a southerner, a mid-westerner, an Irishman and a Jew. I intimated above Samuel Levine was given the part of the Jewish soldier.

Born in Russia

The thin dark Levine is a native of Russia and came to this country when a mere child. He is now a successful character actor it is but fitting that Levine made his first money selling newspapers, but he did not do so. He did not act before he discovered his histrionic talents. He worked on a freighter, in carnivals and even in the circus. His first stage appearance was in "Wall Street" in 1927. A succession of parts followed. Among the more recent were "Dinner at Eight" in which he played Meno Kana, the theatrical agent, "Wonder Boy," "Three Times the Hour," "Headquarters," "This Man's Law," "The Pan Allee," "Solitaire," "Jarnegan" and the Players' Club revival of "Julius Caesar."

Shakespeare in Night Club

Levine has almost always found himself in a role calling for comedy. It is late to think the Jew destined to remain a Jewish comedian forever," he remarked sadly. "I hope some day to prove that I can do other things. If I can't, I think I'd better go back to reciting Shakespeare in a night club."

This reference to reciting Shakespeare in a night club does not ring as odd while in Florida he got a job in a place called "The Two Bit Club." He was hired to tell jokes but found the place of humor dried up when he was confronted with the wet diners. He finally solved his problem by reciting with grimace, excerpts from Shakespeare's plays. He was fired when the female proprietor of this night club found out what he was doing. He then decided to make up the lines himself and any way, she didn't think his material was any good.

Made His Own Part

While "Yellow Jack" was in rehearsal Levine demonstrated why he has become one of the better character actors on Broadway. Instead of dogmatically reciting the lines written for him, the author Levine worked his own changes, adding a Yiddish idiom or a phrase that was characteristic of the role he was portraying. Director McClintock saw the value of Levine's suggestions and the lines remained in the play.

Social Service Agencies Here Toured by Woman Students

Theory and practice will be put to a test today when junior and senior students of fourteen well-known colleges in the East will begin a three-day tour of welfare agencies in this city. The pilgrimage will be made under the guidance of Carol Rouse and Ruth Steinberg, members of the board of the Association of Volunteers of the Welfare Council.

This annual event is planned to give the girls, who are approaching graduation, an insight into the vital social problems of the day and the methods that are being used by representative agencies in dealing constructively with them. The expedition will include first a visit to the Russell-Sage Foundation Building, 130 East Twenty-second street. There Jane Hoyt, acting director of the Welfare Council, will give the students a bird's eye view of the various types of social service provided in New

York City. With the aid of graphic charts, Miss Hoyt will demonstrate how the work of the city's eight hundred health and welfare organizations are coordinated through the Welfare Council to prevent duplication of effort and waste of time and money.

Other visits will include the Altru Workshop in the Bronx, which is supervised by the Committee on the Care of Jewish Tuberculars. Here the group may observe patients in the early stages of tuberculosis being taught to make high-grade garments which are sold to wholesale houses and hospitals.

On Thursdays Abraham Goldfeld, director of the Lavanburg Homes on 124 Gorka street, will conduct the group through the apartments and discuss with them the advantages of the low renting housing project, designed primarily for families with young children.

The Bulletin's Day Book

We have recently been talking with Edgar H. Burman, past Commander in Chief of the Jewish War Veterans, who is at present marshalling Jewish and non-Jewish youth into a militant band for the protection of practically every body's rights under the Constitution.

The organization being created, "Minute Men of the United States" is unique among Jewish groups inasmuch as it advocates fighting Fascism with its own weapons. Burman intends giving unity against unity, numbers against numbers, force against force, "always a little more of each," he said, "than the other side can offer."

Burman emphasizes the fact that his group will be purely a defensive organization. They will carry no clips on their shoulders, remain aloof from all foreign districts, and concentrate their attention purely on maintaining the status quo of American Jews and other groups which might come into the persecutorial category should an American People, Christians or Gentiles ever allow the same threat toward scrapping the constitution.

The Minute Men will be organized on a purely military basis with commanders, vice-commanders, captains, lieutenants, etc., taking the place of civilian presidents, secretaries, etc. The Fascist movement, said mainly to the youth, will be met by youth, for Burman has set severe age limitations on candidates. They will be drilled and organized, however, by former World War Veterans who have been trained to handle emergencies with more persuasive means than the usual demonstrations, and are free of all fear, faith, and mental, rather than intestinal, fortitude.

The Minute Men, who will be as well or better drilled in military tactics than the other groups springing up throughout the country, will carry as "armament" short coats similar to those employed by British troops. Their distinctive apparel will consist of

overalls caps with the legend, "Minute Men" across the front.

Burman said that since the original formation of the group in New York, he has received queries and applications for membership from Hollywood to Maine. More than 3,000 persons have signified their interest in either joining the movement, he said, and groups have already been formed in many of the Eastern States.

The commander said that a unit may apply for membership upon the enlistment of twenty or more Jewish youths in any community. They must be that the principles of the group, which usually defend those who might be considered by Fascists as a racial minority, will be upheld leaders of the organization are insistent that the nucleus body be Jewish. Gentiles may be voted into the organization without restriction, and they may hold any office including that of commander in chief.

Burman said that thus far he has personally financed the mailing and other financial requirements of the group. "We are neither a profit-making nor a profit-sharing outfit," he said, "and we won't accept funds which put us under obligation to any man or organization. We do, however, need dough to carry on."

At present the Minute Men are maintaining offices at headquarters of the Jewish War Veterans, 278 Fifth avenue. Plans for organizational and recreational facilities remain but plans as yet.

Within the next few months, Burman said, "we intend setting up meeting places throughout the country. We'll have athletic rooms for the use of members and build a gymnasium, strong, and patriotic American. Men and women who might otherwise spend their time decaying on street corners."

If trouble never comes," he observed, "the Minute Men will win." The Minute Men will have accomplished a good purpose, he said, have built men that "Uncle Sam will be proud of."

The crucifixion of Jesus was enacted by the Roman government. Jesus was executed as a rebel against the Romans who conquered Palestine and oppressed the Jewish people. Pontius Pilate, the Roman governor, the Gospels at stretched out to Charles Dickens's story, Pontius Pilate is described as a just, merciful man, and as a defender of Jesus.

Thus the Dickens story of Jesus is adding fuel to the flames of anti-Semitism, based on discredited accounts as presented by the Gospels. The Roman who ruled over Palestine. This story, written for children, will now be read anew by millions of children in the United States. New legends and new distortions will breed new anti-Jewish hate.

It has been proved that some of the legends in the Talmud made by peasants immediately after they had heard for the first time sermons on the crucifixion of Jesus, as preached by the Roman priests. As some of the Jews were told by the priests that the Jews had killed Jesus, these Roman peasants rushed out of the churches to punish their Jewish neighbors.

Charles Dickens never intended to publish his story, "The Life of Jesus," in the Talmud. He made no honor his memory by selling it for publication nor for a huge sum.

1,325 Refugee Students Placed In Universities by Aid Body

(Special to the J.D.B.)

GENEVA, March 26.—More than 1,000 German emigre students who have suffered as a result of "Aryanization" of Reich education institutions have been placed in universities and colleges of other countries by the International Student Service, which has central headquarters in Switzerland.

The organization, which High Commissioner James G. McDonald of the German Refugee Group charged with the task of caring for displaced in universities, has offered scholarships and other benefactions to the victims of Nazi repression.

According to a report issued here, the Service carries on its work "with a view to relieve congestion in certain university centers. As the majority of refugees are Jews, this has tended to create a feeling of anti-Semitism in countries where it had hitherto not existed."

The report says that the relief

work is confined to "constructive work among students who have plans and good prospects of being able to support themselves within a reasonably short period. Assistance is intended for all German students who are not involved in political opinions, who have left Germany or who have left the country. The officer through whose hands the matter passed yesterday declared, "We will not have any of the kind of movement as was organized within the National Guard, whether they be German, Irish, Italian, Jewish or of any other descent. They are a group created for the defense of the country."

From unofficial sources of information it is learned that the "National Guardmen of German Descent" originated in the Fourteenth street and Sixth avenue and spread rapidly throughout other National Guard units. It is claimed that the movement was instigated by other organizations.

The Stahlheim Kapelle in cooperation with the League of Friends of the German Nation, have frequently during recent months a series of military concerts in New York and nearby suburbs. Their meetings have been ushered by a formation of Nazi troops, almost identical with that of the Storm Troops in Germany. They salute Nazi flags which have adorned their meetings. In the swastika, in fact, has constituted the primary motif in the decorations of their places of celebration, while the American flag was either absent or hung on a platform surrounded by dozens of Hitlerite banners. The Stahlheim is an organization of veteran German soldiers, which was coordinated with the Hitler government many months ago.

A spokesman for the management of the New York City yesterday stated that the military concert and ball had been held as planned.

Indian Moslems Plan to Boycott Palestine Jewish Goods — See Viceroy

JERUSALEM, Feb. 14.—The Moslem Students' Council office, which is the headquarters for the Moslem Congress, has received reports from India that a deputation of Moslems, including members of the Bengal Legislative Council, will appear to the Viceroy of India and expressed "the apprehensions of Indian Moslems concerning the Palestine question." Lord Willingdon is said to have promised to transmit their complaints to the British government. A sympathy meeting was held at Bombay on the 14th of February coinciding with the Moslem political demonstrations in Palestine. It was decided to declare a blockade of Palestine Jewish goods imported into India. Among the speakers was Abdul-Aziz Ali Shah, the Tustiman Moslem leader who is familiar figure in the East and is now visiting India, and Maulana Shaikat Ali.

Zionist Leaders Hold Meeting In Jerusalem

Actions Committee Session Hears Tribute to Dr. Leo Motzkin

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
JERUSALEM, March 25.—The auditorium of the uncompleted building for the Jewish Agency for Palestine tonight was the scene of the opening of the sessions of the Actions Committee of the World Zionist Organization.

The hall was crowded with prominent leaders of Diaspora Jewry, Palestine Jewish leaders, non-Jewish notables and journalists. Most of the members of the Actions Committee were present for the opening of the sessions. Dr. Chaim Weizmann was absent.

Portraits of Dr. Hertz, Dr. Leo Motzkin and Dr. Chaim Weizmann, the last two draped in black, were the only decorations on the walls of the hall.

Dr. Nahum Sokolow, president of the World Zionist Organization, opened the meeting with an eulogy of the late Dr. Leo Motzkin, permanent chairman of the Actions Committee, who died in Paris on November 7, 1933. Dr. Sokolow's right hand stood an empty chair draped in black, the seat cushionarily occupied by Dr. Motzkin. Dr. Sokolow termed Motzkin "the very embodiment of Jewish parliamentarism."

Memorandum Mendel Ushishkin, veteran head of the Jewish National Fund, also paid a tribute to Motzkin recalling his virtues and nobility and his "impeccable services to the Jewish people."
