Editorial Notes HERMAN BERNSTEIN

REFORE going to Albania as American Minister, I assured my Jewish friends that would not try to discover hitherto unknown Jewish set-tlements, or the Lost Tribes of Israel, for we have a dif-ficult enough task in coping with the problems of the Jewish communities that are known

For about three and a half years I did not have to deal with any Jewish problems, officially any Jewish problems, omcasiny or unofficially. There is no Jewish question in Albania, that beautiful little country on the Adriatic. There are only one hundred Jews in the entire country, according to the latest cendiscrimination against them in discrimination against them in Albania, not merely because the Jewish community is small in number, but because Albania happens to be one of the rare lands in Europe today where religious prejudice and hate do not exist, even though the Al-banian people are themselves divided into three faiths, Mos-leyn Albanian Orthodox and Albanian Orthodox Catholic.

The only Jewish figure that some people remember in con-nection with Albania in the past is that of Sabbatai Zevi, the s that of Sabbatai Zevi, the "false" or rejected Messiah, who ended his days in Dulcino, whither he had been exiled by the Sultan of Turkey. Dulcino, an Albanian town on the Adri-atic coast, was then under Turk-ish rule, and is now part of Yugoslavia. It is quite near the ancient Albanian city of Scutari.

Last summer I went for a week-end by motor to Dulcino. Situated on a high picturesque mountain, the ancient town of Dulcino is now in ruins, and a comparatively new town has been built on the shore of the Adriatic. The few cultured in-habitants of Dulcino, especially the professor of history at the Gymnasium, who acted as my guide through the old ruins, told me that while they knew that Sabbatai Zevi had lived and died

Sabbatai Zevi had lived and died in Dulcino, they were unable to find any trace of his tomb, or any signs of Jewish life there in the past. The Turks had dein the past. The Turks had de-stroyed that city years ago. Then there was further destruction during the Balkan and World Wars, when various armles in-vaded that region. The Sultan had chosen for Sabbatai Zevi's aville a meet included succepture. exile a most isolated spot, but the view from the picturesque ancient city overlooking the sea is fascinating.

But it seems there is really no place on earth that the Wandering Jew has overlooked. If there are only a hundred Jews Albania today, I discovered dence that a rather large Jewish community existed there durcenturies.

announced that they would take all necessary precautions. El Pais, Cuban daily paper, com-menting on the story, declared that such an attempt would be a natural act of revenge by the Jews against the Hitler government and expressed the belief that the re-ports were well founded.

Prime Minister Bennett of Canada

His speech, together with those of A. J. Freiman, president of Can-ada Zionists, and Morris Rothenberg, president of the American Zionist or mization, was broad-cast over the air.

In the principal address of the evening, Mr. Rothenberg stated that the position of German Jews is constantly growing worse. He painted a picture of Nazism's vic-tims in fear and trembling, with the children condemned to the cruthe enteren concerned to the cru-elest fate of all. They are existing, he said, in an "atmosphere of hatred and poison, their future blighted and nothing to look for-ward to."

In response to Mr. Rothenberg's appeal for funds, \$10,000 was raised to aid in the work of refugee set-tlement in Palestine.

### Former Health Head Talks at Rodeph Sholom House

Louis I. Harris, former h Commissioner of New York City, addressed a joint meet-ing of the Rodeph Sholom Sisterhood and the West Side Hadassah yesterday afternoon at the Rodeph yesterday arternoon at the Rodeph Sholom community house, 7 West Eighty-third street. Dr. Harris' subject was "Impressions of the New Palestine," and outlined his reactions to activities in the health field observed during his visit to Palestine in 1933 as chairman of the Medical Reference Board of

The speaker paid tribute to "the almost superhuman work that has already been done by the women of Hadassah" for Jew and Arab alike, and stressed the importance of a greater budget to support this "laboratory of experimenta-tion in the humanities."

"The women who feel they merely give money," said Dr. Har-ris, "do not begin to understand how capably that money is used, and how potent it is to create refuge where, on the basis of peaceful understanding with the Arab, the Jew may look to the future. This is especially timely in view of the hymns of hate now reverberating from many quar-

In conclusion Dr. Harris urged concentration of effort upon the fundamentals of civilized life, such as improvements in sewerage, water supply, sanitation, and provi-sion of milk to lower the infant mortality rate.

In speaking of what I have called the misguided and short-sighted Jewish propaganda in favor of Germany since the War, I have in mind especially the pervasive campaign against the "war guilt lie" and for the revision of Peace Treaties, particularly for the abolition of the Polish Corridor. This propaganda, and the echoes it stirred up in the United States, this country, and else-where, did not a little to convince the German people that their country had indeed been guiltless of all responsibility for the War, and was therefore the victim of outrageous injustice. The spread of this sense of injustice helped in its turn to foster in Germany the persecution manta which Hit-ler has known so well how to turn against the Jews themselves. The result, as Mr. Edgar Mowrer truly result, as Mr. Engar Mowrer Cruly says, has been the conclusion that "since they (the Germans) lost the War, since they were poor and weary and bewildered, since they had been taught to believe selves a wronged and humili themselves a wronged and humili-ated nation, the question inevitably arose, how could such a situation come to be? According to my in-formant, who was in a position to know what the Nazi leaders believed or wished to have believed, this discussion took place in Ber-lin shortly before the Hitlerite drive against the Jews last March. Hiter is represented as having urged that, in view of Nazi propaganda, his followers would expect swift and drastic action against the Jews. Therefore, it would be necessary to hit the Jews quickly, and hard, and then to cease lest international complications occur. Strike Swiftly and Hard

Dr. Goebbels agreed, adding only that it would be necessary to hit that it would be necessary to hit the Jews very swiftly and very hard. Captain (now General) Goering demurred. He recom-mended that the Nazis should not only hit the Jews very swiftly and very hard but should go on hit-ting them. The Jews, he added, would never be able to disavow Russian Bolshevism, lest the Bolshevists also turn against them; and, just as Mussolini had won and, just as susselim had won widespread support by appearing to be the savior of Italy from Communism, so the Nazis would win approval, even for their campaign against the Jews, by claiming that their violence was necessary to save Germany and Western

Europe from Jewish Bolshevism.

Goering's arguments prevailed. It was all the easier for the Nazis to give this color to their persecution because Russian Rolshevism however strong or weak Jewish influence upon it may have been, has not been precisely careful of in-dividual human right, or tender towards the Russian upper and middle classes or even towards the Russian people and their religion. And it is a fact, which no impartial observer can gainsay, that a high proportion of Jewish journals and Jewish writers in other coun-tries have shown marked sym-pathy with Russian Bolshevism and with Communism in general. Indeed, not a few Jews have seemed disposed to turn their backs upon the principles of Western liberal civilization, in the name of which they were emancipated during the nineteenth century, and to have allied themselves with sys. tems or doctrines inspired by poli-tical or economic intolerance. These things should give the Jews, and the non-Jews who most abhor Hitlerism and all its works, much food for thought. # Joan of Arc of Working Girls

By HARRIET STRACHSTEIN Rose Schneiderman, a diminu-tive figure with flaming red hair, is the Joan of Arc of the Ameri-

can working girl.

Years ago she had a vision of a nowerful union of women in trade Today that dream is realized in the National Women's Trade Union League, of which she is president.

It took many a battle against tyrannical bosses, phlegmatic Congressmen and most of all the dead-ly "laissez faire" attitude of the working girl herself to bring about the present comparatively satisfying standard of wages and conditions among women in industry.

In an interview at her quarters in the A. W. A. Clubhouse Miss Schneiderman described the purpose of the organization.
"Fundamentally," she explained,

"it aims to organize the unorgan-ized women in industry through education. At our clubhouse at 247 Lexington avenue, opportuni-ties for education and recreation are furnished gratis. The women are trained not only in cultural subjects, such as English, economics and history, but in the art of public speaking as well, to fit them for leadership in trade unions.

The League Cooperates "The League cooperates with the unions in their struggle to improve the women's living and working conditions. It initiates and supports progressive and labor legisla-tion in their behalf and acts as intion in their behalf and acts as in-terpreter of their problems to the community and to legislative branches of the government." Miss Schneiderman praised en-

thusiastically Mrs. Roosevelt's sympathetic attitude towards the Roosevelt's working women. The President's is a League member herself and has been very active in behalf of the organization.
"Mrs. Roosevelt has always

"Mrs. Roosevelt has always helped us with anything we have asked her to do," declared Miss Schneiderman. "Her loyalty to the trade unions is a great influence for us in public and her understanding of conditions as they affect wage earners is astounding." In reference to the NRA, Miss Schneiderman emphasized the fact

that due to the increase in the number of workers, the women's trade unions have gained approxi-mately one million more members since last year. Rose Schneiderman is averse

discussing the personal side of her life. Her heart lies in her work alone. But it is known that her alone. But it is known that her biography reads like a story by Horatio Alger. It is a series of conquests over apparently insur-mountable difficulties.

She came to this country from Russia at the age of ten. Before she had time to finish her public school education she was forced to seek work in a cap factory. There she began her first battle for improvement of conditions among women in industry.

First she organized her own branch of the Cap Workers' Union. Here she served as secretary, treasurer and member on the executive board, utilizing her noon and evening hours for the nurnose Moontime she slaved ten hours a day at a sewing machine.

In 1906 she began organizing for the Women's Trade Union League and became its vice-president. She took part in a strike of thirty thousand shirt waist makers, helped speak for them and raised funds. She assisted in forming the International Ladies' Carment Workers Union, labored arduously for women's suffrage in New York State, attended the Peace Conference in Paris to present recommendations from the American working women, and later traveled to Vienna as delegate to the Inter-national Congress there.

Helped Organize Labor Party In 1920 she helped organize the Labor Party in New York City and ran as candidate for the United States Senate on the Farmer Labor Party ticket. Eight years ago she became president of the National Women's Trade Union League. Now she is a member of the Advisory Committee to the Secretary of Labor and a member on the Labor Advisory Board un-der the NRA. These are just a few of her activities.

About the working women of America today, Rose Schneider-man has this to say:

"Marriage is no longer a cure-all for them. Women's place in industry is now permanent. They must organize like men. For or-ganization is their only salvation!"

## Miriam Beard Gives Facts at Meeting of AJC Women

The shortsightedness of German womanhood was largely respon-sible for Hitler's rise to power in Germany, asserted Miriam Beard, daughter of Charles and Mary Beard, the historians, last night at a forum in the Free Synagogue arranged by the Women's Asso-ciation of the American Jewish Congress as the second event of an educational series to acquaint the public with the nature of

Nazism's menace Nazism's menace.

Froducing factual evidence of her charges, she sounded a warning to women of the United States that they will be a thousand times more guilty than the women in Fascist Germany if Fascism comes to this country.

to this country.

A. discussion followed Miss Beard's address, under the leader-ship of Edward Cahn. Mrs. Kaja

Williams presided.

Declaring that women are as Declaring that women are as much responsible for Fascism in Germany as men, Miss Beard stated: "Her plight is pitiful, but more pitiful was her shortsighted-

ness."

Miss Beard, who is the wife of Professor Vagts, German educator now in exile in this country, and who recently returned from a five years' residence in Germany, drew an analogy between what trans-pired in Nazi Germany and the rise of Nazi propaganda in this country

Warns American Women "We women in the United States," she said, "know what Fascism is and does; we have the solemn warnings before our eyes we have also an economic power which the women of unhappy and impoverished Germany never had If Fascism comes in America, woman will be a thousand times more ilty than she was in Germany.
"You will say, but American

women are too proud to tag after warriors as camp followers! Yes? Have you not noticed in the latest issue of Professor Moley's Today that of the shareholders of the Fascist Silver Shirt press, nearly half were women?

If women want to exert any influence, Miss Beard declared, "It

## Blames Women Bureau Teaches Racial Amity | PoultryInquiry Martel Flouts Of Reich For To High Schools and the Public Witness Avers Report of Deal

to the Service Bureau for Educa-tion in Human Relations at 519 West 121st street, in charge of Mrs. Rachel Davis Du Bois, a Quaker school teacher.

The prospects are the public and The prospects are the public and the high schools throughout the country, where an attempt will be made through the presentation of various cultural programs to in-culcate a spirit of racial amity in the growing generation.

Additional high power salesmen are a board of twenty-two educators with Professor Haber Harner of Teachers College, Columbia University, as chairman. In order to render judicious service in this field of racial harmony, two Jews, two Negroes and two Italians will act as advisors on the board. Mrs. Du Bois is executive secretary.

This is no brand-new untested commodity which Mrs. Du Bois offers to the schools. For seven years she has spread her material in Pennsylvania and New Jersey schools and found an enthusiastic and responsive clientele. Her asand responsive clientele. Her as-sembly programs dealing in a friendly spirit with the valuable contributions of Jewish, Italian, Negro, Japanese and Chinese cultures have met with such success that she was flooded with requests from schools and teachers for more of her splendid ideas. The result was the official opening of the Bureau two weeks ago, which she aptly calls her "workshop." Unable to cope with all the work alone, she enlisted the aid of other men and women educators who felt that such a precious article as racial amity needed more than one

person to help put it across.
Yesterday a Bulletin reporter visited the lively, buzzing shop where CWA workers are digging p fresh ideas for programs, and heard from Mrs. Du Bois an account of the nurpose and origin of count of the purpose and origin of her interesting experiment. She is a tall, slender woman, with keen dark eyes and determined-looking features that promise victory to all her undertakings.
"The public and high schools in

this country can be a powerful influence in counteracting prejudices imbibed in the home," she declared emphatically. "It is only by dis-pelling these prejudices that we can ever hope for peace and order in this world.

"Years ago when I first began this work I noticed the lack of understanding and sympathy the part of American children to-wards those of alien races. I personally witnessed incidents in a school in Woodbury, New Jersey, where I taught for four years, that brought this fact home to me very graphically. It was there that I inaugurated my assembly promaugurated my assembly programs, introducing plays, tableaux speeches and exhibitions aimed to show the youngsters the contribusnow the youngsters the contribu-tions of foreign elements to our civilization. These programs aroused such interest that other schools invited me to present them too. I therefore resigned my posi-tion as teacher to devote all my time to planning these ideas for assembly and class room work in

social relations. "Most teachers need assistance because of their lack of reference Since so many schools have sent in their requests, I found it necessary to establish this bureau where the technique and sub-ject matter for practical school work is developed and then issued.'

Assisting Mrs. Du Bois in these plans are not only the educators on the board, but five or six young people from each cultural group,

As proof of the effectiveness of assembly programs, Mrs. Du Bois quoted the head of an English department who said that recently, after a speech by Rabbi L. I. Newman in his school, he had noticed a greater respect on the part of the Gentile students to-ward the Jewish ones.

A test too was made on four thousand students in different schools in the East, both before and after the presentations of these programs and the resulting answers showed a definite change towards a more favorable attitude.

In reply to a query as to how the Jews can abet this courageous

experiment, Mrs. Du Bois said: "First by advising us in building our school programs. Secondly by inviting different groups to events of Jewish importance, and last by funds for books and supplies and by furnishing speakers."

So far the work is practically a private enterprise. But Mrs. Du Bois expects that in the very near future the publi and high schools will adopt her methods as part of the system of compulsory educa-

### Shortage of Labor Felt in Palestine

Railways Administration Obliged to Employ Illiter-ate Help

(J.T.A. Special Correspondence)
JERUSALEM, March 19.—The
government of Palestine is expercing the current labor shortage in Palestine due to under-immigra in Palestine due to under-immigra-tion, according to a report in Da-var, Labor daily. Citation is made of a strange reversal of policy on the part of the Palestine Railways Administration. Hitherto train-drivers and stokers were not em-ployed unless they were literate, under one of the railroad regulations. But owing to difficulty in finding employees who can read write, the regulation has been rescinded.

Many skilled workers have left the railroad service to obtain higher pay and better conditions elsewhere on the labor market, There are few to replace them. The administration was obliged to employ

Davar points out that very high standards of general and technical education are required in all rail-road companies in the world, but not so in Palestine.

## Young Jew is Professor In Brazilian Conservatory

By ISAAC RAIZMAN

SAO PAULO, Brazil, April 2.-Ten years ago a young Jewish boy of sixteen became a student at the Sao Paulo Conservatory of Music and Dramatics. He was the first Jewish student to enter the institution.

Today the second book written by that young man, now a profes-sor of piano at the conservatory, is being praised very highly in Bra-zilian newspapers and music cir-

The name of the young professor is Israel Pelafsky, and that of his book is "Introduction to Piano Pedagogy." The book, one of the few books of its kind here, is written in Portuguese and is divided into two parts covering "Piano Pedagogy Through The Centuries" and "A Historical Resume of The Instruments Which Preceded The Piano, and The Composers, Teachers and Pianists Who Compose The Repertory of The Piano." The volers and realists who Compose The Repertory of The Piano." The vol-ume stresses the moral and social functions of music in the days gone by and in our own day.

"The human being with the progress of civilization and the perfection of his spiritual formation, is capable of profound sensibility, of vague anxieties and spiritual uplift," Professor Pelafsky says in his book, "and he sublimates . . . the force of his spiritual and moral capacity in the highest expression of human culture—in the arts, and principally, in music."

## Only Jew on the Staff

The young professor, who is the only Jew on the staff of the con-servatory, sketches in his book the evolution of the essentials of piano teaching and the technique of piano playing, and describes the growth of the present methods for the use of the hand, the forearm and the wrist. He also dwells on the fact that men and women should be taught the technicalities differently because of the difference in their arm muscle development.

In the latter part of his work Professor Pelafsky sketches the origins of music, tracing its evolutions through mythology, Greek poetry, the cantos of the Middle Ages and the modern composers

Professor Pelafsky's first book, 'Contemporary Music," resulted in the author's being invited to write for "Revista," a periodical pub-lished by the National Institute of Music, most important in Brazil, at Rio de Janeiro.

#### Professor at Nineteen

Israel Pelafsky was born in the Argentine. When he was five he was brought to Brazil by his par-ents. At sixteen he entered the conservatory, and at nineteen he was professor of piano. He has been teaching advanced classes for some six years, and is greatly liked

some six years, and is greatly faced and admired by his pupils and his former teachers, now his colleagues. Since Israel Pelafsky entered the conservatory at Sao Paulo ten years ago, there have been a num-ber of Jewish students there, in-cluding Esther Epstein, who had held government scholarships for music study abroad and Adolpho music study abroad and Adolpho Tabacov, who last year won first prize at Rio de Janeiro in a con-test to determine the best Brazilian pianist.

Professor Pelafsky is proud of his Jewish name and is an active worker in the local Jewish community, where he is a member of several Jewish institutions. Some time ago he sponsored a movement to present to Dr. Silveira Bueno, Portuguese journalist and editor, an album containing appre-ciations of Dr. Bueno's services to Jews against their anti-Semitic

enemies in this country. Representative of the new generation of South American Jewry, Professor Pelafsky and his con-tributions to Brizilian culture are a credit to the Jewish colony here.

But the publisher doesn't like the book and would rather not publish it. Has he given him back his script? Not by a long shot. He'd like to get his money back, maybe from another

## Kahn Leaves Entire Estate To Children

Filed for Probate Yesterday -- No Provision Made for Widow

The four children of Otto H. Kahn, who died March 20, receive his entire estate, valued at "more than \$15,000, with real property at more than \$5,000 and personal property at more than \$10,000," according to the terms of his will, filed for probate yesterday in Sur-rogate's Court.

The children who will share the estate are: Gilbert W. Kahn, 912 Fifth avenue; Roger W. Kahn, 7 Gracie Square; Mrs. Maud E. Marriot, London, and Mrs. Margaret Ryan, 1100 Fifth avenue.

In addition to receiving one-fourth of the residue and one-fourth of the personal effects, the two sons will get \$150,000 each in eash. Mrs. Marriot and Mrs. Ryan sonal effects and one-fourth of the residue. The bequest to Mrs. Marriot is left in the form of a cor poration bearing her name.

No provision was made for Mr. Kahn's widow, Mrs. Addie W. Kahn, the will stating that she is "otherwise adequately provided for. She is acquainted with the contents of this will and they have her unqualified approval."

#### Will Made Last Year

The will, which was dated June The will, which was dated June 26, 1933, was accompanied by a codicil dated July 5, 1933, and names as executors Roger W. Kahn, Mrs. Addie Kahn Benjamin Euttenweiser, 1125 Park avenue, and George W. Bovernizer, 1305 Albemarle Road, Brooklyn.

While no actual provision is made in the will for the late banker's employees, it contains a re-quest that Mrs. Kahn and the quest that Mrs. Kahn and the children distribute among them whatever sums they deem fit. "From their own knowledge of the circumstances," the will states, "they may determine which, if any, of my employes, whether employed in connection with my office or household, shall receive by way of remembrance any sum or sums of money and that they shall make to such persons such distributions as may seem fit and proper to them in their own discretion. request only and is not to be deemed in any sense binding upon

ASHEVILLE, N. C., April 15.— William Dudley Pelley, commander of the Silver Shirts, anti-Semitic organization, together with two of his sides, have been ordered to appear before the clerk of the Superior Court of Buncombe County on April 25 in connection with receiv ership proceedings instituted against the Galahad Press, Inc., publishers of Liberation, weekly organ of the Silver Shirts.

Judge Michael Schenck, of the Superior Court, on Saturday signed an order appointing W. Bowen Henderson, Asheville accountant, as temporary receiver for the

A receiver was appointed after Deputy Sheriff John Garrison re-Deputy Sherni John Garrison se-turned unsatisfied an execution se-cured by Charles G. Scott and Company of Washington, D. C. on a judgment against the concern.

Attached to the returned unsatisfied execution was an affidavit made and sworn to by the Deputy Sheriff that he talked with Robert Summerville, secretary and treas-urer of the Galahad Press, and was told by Summerville that the com-pany "has no property and does not even have a sheet of paper."

The affidavit was sworn to and subscribed before John W. Hayes, Deputy Clerk of Buncombe Coun-Deputy Clerk of Buncombe County Superior Court. A bond of \$500 has been posted by Henderson as receiver and all books, records and correspondence of the Galahad Press are now in posses-sion of the receiver. Records turned over to Henderson include stock books, account books, bank check records and records of all receipts and disbursements of the Liberation Magazine. The subscription lists of the

magazine, all correspondence relat-ing to the affairs of the Galahad Press or Liberation, and its records reveal that more than 200 persons in all sections of the country have stock in the press. In an order signed by Judge Schenck, Summerville, Pelley and Harry F. Sieber, business manager of the organization, are required to "appear before J. B. Caln, clerk of Buncombe County Superior Court, on the 25th day of April at ten o'clock and answer concerning any property or assets of said corporation and what disposition if any has been made of the money, assets of property coming in to said or-ganization, and such other matters as may be pertinent to such supplemental proceedings."

Pelley is said to be in California.

## Defer Trial of Benes Says Gov't Four Who Beat Bronstein, Jew

Marks Tenth Postpone ment Since 1932 of Gendarmes' Trial

CZERNOWITZ, April 16,---For the tenth time since 1932, the Ru-manian Court of Appeals postponed the trial of the four Rumanan gendarmes accused of having brutally tortured Samson Bronstein, member of the central committee of the Rumanian Poale Zion, Socialist Zionist party. The reason assigned for today's postponement was the absence of two of the ac-

Bronstein was arrested in May 1932, on suspicion that he was identified with illegal Communist activities in Rumania. During his "examination" by local gendarmes headed by Captain Panisoara, he was so brutally beaten and tortured for six hours that he was confined to a hospital for more than six months. At first thought that Bronstein At first it was would never walk again, but he has since recovered.

The three gendarmes and Captain Panisoara have so far pleaded not guilty.

Longfellow, in his Tales of a Wayside Inn, has a poem on Albania's national hero, Skanderbeg, who lived in the sixteenth century. The poem is in the form of a tale told by a Spanish Jew. It is also recorded in ancient books of Skanderbeg's period that the grave of Albania's national hero, who had achieved universal fame as a ruler and as the liberator of his country from Turkish despotism, was visited by Moslems, Christians and Jews

In the course of my travels through Albania I visited Valona and endeavored to ascertain the facts regarding the history of the old Jewish settlement there.

The most prominent Jew in Valona is Joseph Matattia. He is a merchant and also a member of the Valona Municipal Council. His knowledge of the history of the Jewish community in Va-

lona was quite meager.

"We know nothing concrete about the history of our people in Valona," he said. "Our old men died, without leaving any written records concerning the Jewish setlement. We know that quite a large Jewish community emigrated here from Venice during the first Venetian occupation, about five hundred years ago. Then the Turks captured this country from the Venetians, and the Jews fied from Valona, as they could not remain under Turkish oppression. When the Venetians drove the Turks out and recaptured this region, the Jews returned. But after some time, the Turks occupied Valona once more, and the Jews fled again in heate scattering in all again, in baste, scattering in all directions."
