GENERAL JAN C. Justice and former Premier in the South African government, at the corner-stone laying of a new synagogue in Cape Town,

"As long as I am Minister of Justice there will be equal justice for all, there will be no underdog and no Ghetto in South Africa."

General Smuts also expressed the belief that the Jews of the world need not fear the future, because "public opinion will right the Jewish position."

He was instrumental in promoting the Balfour Declaration with regard to Palestine. He has been consistently helpful to the cause of Jewish regeneration in Pales-tine, for which he was recently honored by South African Jewry who raised a fund for the estab-lishment of a colony in Palestine to be known as Kfar Smuts.

Matzoh Moguls Are Summoned In Short Weight Inquiry Here

Public Being Bilked Out of Weight, Says Markets Department; Buyers Receive Five Pounds Minus One Ounce; Summonses Issued

The trouble over those seven ounces started in the last days of the Weights and March when the Weights and Measures division of the Department of Public Markets discovered that the public was being bilked out of that much matzohs every time it purchased a package of the unleavened bread. Instead of get-ting the five pounds they were payting for, buyers were actually get-ting only four pounds and nine ounces. Moreover, as a special Passover treat, those same four pounds and nine ounces, in at least one prominent instance, were cut down to four pounds and six ounces, it was revealed yesterday by Deputy Commissioner Alexan-der Hamilton, who has been con-ducting an investigation into ducting an investigation into charges that matzon manufactur-

Seven ounces of matzohs are ers and jobbers were indulging in hardly enough for one good Pass- the old-fashioned game of short-over meal, but those seven ounces weighting.

Scores of Summonses

In the last few weeks scores of summonses have been issued against manufacturers, jobbers and retailers, returnable in Magistrates Court. Those against the retailers are being dismissed by the magistrates, on the grounds that there is no evidence of fraud on their part. The moguls, however, who make and sell tons of matzohs annually, are having tougher sled-

ding.

After the meeting the League officials accompanied by August Zaleski, Polish Senator, and Professor Anigstein visited the Jowish quarter of Warsaw, where they observed the extreme poverty of

the Polish Jews.

A dinner for the visitors was given by the Polish Foreign Office at the Europa Hotel.

The High Commissioner and his assistant will leave tomorrow for short visits to Stockholm, Copenhagen and London.

WARSAW, April 18.-James G. McDonald, League of Nations McDonald, League of Nations High Commissioner for German re-fugees today publicly praised the policy of the British government with regard to the admission of German Jewish refugees into Palestine over which Britain holds a mandate.

"Important as is the refugee problem," Mr. McDonald declared "It is a minor one in comparison to the Jewish problem as a whole.

My conviction is that the Jewish leaders should consider not only the immediate question of the refugees but the larger aspects of the Jews in Eastern Europe."

Mr. McDonald is visiting War-saw to inspect the work being done in behalf of the refugees from the Reich.

The executive body of the autonomous governing group set up by the League to cope with the refugee problem. The body will meet in London early in May.

Hebrew Week By Rabinovitch 300, Including Talmud Rehabilitating Difficult Job, B'klyn Societies

Director Says

Material relief by public and private agencies will have to be supplemented by constructive social service long after the depression lifts, in the opinion of Samuel Rabinovitch, executive director of the United Jewish Aid Societies of Brooklyn, who yesterday made public an analysis of the work of the organization, an affiliate of the Brooklyn Federation of Jewish

"The matter of rehabilitating an individual who has come to us for aid," said Rabinovitch, "is a slow and difficult process. Sometimes and difficult process. Sometimes the headway made is slow and discouraging, but at other times you see a person who was broken in mind and spirit, shunned and unmind and spirit, shunned and un-wanted by the world, emerge into a normal, healthy being. Then you realize that your work is well

"There is a never-ending proces sion that keeps making its way to the gates of the societies," he declared. "Cripples, tuberculars, cardiacs, mental cases and helpless women with even more helpless children. People come from all over Brooklyn. It is the constant march of the diseased and the deformed, seeking help and guid-ance in a world that has no use for any but the able and the fit. lists of the United Jewish Aid Societies there were 5,300 families in 1933, and of these a large proportion were unemployed.

Pape also said that he was a member of the National Socialist Party of Germany, that he is still loyal to Ger-many, and that he was appointed to the leadership of the Western Division of the Friends of New Germany by Heinz Spanknoebel who, until his flight from Amerivan justice, was the leader of the National Socialist Party in the United States, which later became the League of Friends of New Germany.

Cash Assets \$30,000 Sunderland said that Pape had requested his aid in delaying deportation so that the Friends of w Germany might gain control of the German Alliance, an organization with assets of between \$25,000 and \$30,000 in cash and about 40,000 members which he wished to bring into the Nazi organiza-tion. At the same time Pape re-quested Sunderland to help him recover a Friends of New Germany membership list which had fallen into the hands of the Los Angeles Police Department, according to the witness's testimony.

Sunderland at the same time told of the connection between Max Socha, a prominent leader of German society in Los Angeles and a member of the German Allance, and Pape. To Pass More Anti-Hate Bills

Manitoba Measure Is Given as Example for Other States

MONTREAL, Que., April 20,-

State legislatures in Canada and the Federal Parliament in Ottowa will be asked to pass bills similar to the one passed by the Manitoba State Legislature making it possible to bring suit against persons responsible for the publication of lifelong material against a race or religion and to halt the publication of such material.

The Manitoba bill, which was in-troduced by Marcus Hyman, Laborite, and passed unanimously by the legislature, provides that

The repeated publication of a libel against any rance or creed likely to expose persons belonging to such race or professing such creed or hatred, contempt or ridcule shall, without prejudice to any other recourse, entitle any perse belonging to such race or profess ing such creed to sue for damages and for an injunction to prevent the continuation and circulation of such libel or any libel of a simi lar character; and the Court of King's Bench or any judge thereof is hereby empowered to entertain such action



There can be no doubt that prosecutions will lie, not merely for criminal libel as distinguished from civil libel suits, when directed against a whole race or creed, but for criminal incitements to breaches of peace, unlawful assemblages and illegal conspiracies and combinations.

As far back as 1732, the British courts in the case of Rex vs. Os-borne 2 Barnadiston 138, 156; W Kelynge's Reports 231; 2 Swans-ton 503 note held that a despicable libel against the Jews of Eng-land could be prosecuted criminally, and conflicting reports of the case indicate that prosecutions both for criminal libel and for incitement to break the peace would lie. The title to the land remains vested in the Fund: all the colon-

ist gets is a leasehold for a long term, devisable by will. Whatever stock and equipment he needs he must pay for, but he is given fif-teen years or more to do so, and he needn't make his first payment until he has got on his legs. Inas. much as a large part of the land is owned by rich effendis, safely resident in Beirut or Cairo, the Fund commonly deals with them, but sometimes it buys from Arab villagers who hold tracts in common. Not infrequently an Arab commune sells part of its land, hoping to buy modern stock and machinery with the money and so improve what remains, but apparently this scheme seldom works, for the Arab doesn't learn easily, and his Jewish neighbors soon and his Jewish neighbor him far behind.

Thus the Arabs are being gradually shoved out of the valleys and into the hills. But setting up a new Jewish colony does not always, or necessarily, involve disessing Arabs. Sometimes the Fund buys a tract of swampland and puts colonists to work draining it. In this way thousands of acres have been recovered in the

The Arabs who still occupy this arable land farm it in the manner of Abraham. They use a wooden homemade plow so light that when his day's work is done a farmer shoulders it and carries it home. They raise the same crops year after year and never fertilize the soil. Their draft animals look as starved and fieabitten as they do themselves. Thus it takes a large tract to support a meagre Arab village, and fa-mine is always around the corner.

New Colonists Progressive

The earliest Jewish coloniststhey began to filter in so long ago as the 70's of last century as the 70's of last century—were mainly pious fellows who aspired to live like Abraham too, and in consequence they got on but little better than the Arabs. 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Perfection in Art, Palestine Trip, Critical Two Life Goals of Mark S. Joffe

Admirers Fete Artist In Honor of His 70th Birthday

After a useful life of three score and ten years Mark S. Joffe, world renowned artist, still looks for-ward. Two ideals becken to him the goal of perfection in art and a wisit to the land of his dreams, Palestine.

In honor of his seventieth birth-day his friends and admirers have arranged an exhibition of his paintings at the Academy of Al-lied Arts. Last night more than 150 of them celebrated his anni-versary with a dinner at the Samovar Restaurant, where Judge Jonah Goldstein presided as toast-master. Some of the speakers of the evening were Rabbi Moses S. Abels, Peter Wierneck, S. Dingol, Dr. S. Margoshes, Saul Raskin and Abner Lashkowsky. Prior to the dinner Mark Joffe

consented to an interview at the Academy of Allied Arts.

The long years of struggle in the past have left no mark of bit-

ss upon him. His slight form is still erect, his gray eyes sparkle, his views have grown gentle and mellow with time

"Ripe Too Early

Contemplating the scene of con-temporary art he spoke with a quizzical sort of humor. "A great many artists today grow ripe too early," he said. "Their work is early," he said. "Their work is too much allke; they strive to fol-low in the footsteps of a few lead-ing lights like Matisse, imitating not his best works but his early ones. The result is discord and a lack of harmony. The arms and legs and features of their figures are all out of proportion. What is absolutely unrecognizable they call abstractions. However there is much in the modern trend that is worth watching and studying. One can always learn from youth."

Here he introduced some of his

own sketches as he called them owing a marked leaning towards the splashy type of painting so popular now. One of them, a view from a roof top, appeared parti-cularly vivid and well done. Reviewing the effect of modern

art on industry, Mr. Joffe asserted: "Our furniture and other utensils for home purposes have so far improved through modern influences that they are not only more useful and comfortable, but simpler and statelier in lines."

Favors Compromise Joffe approached the question of introducing the artist's own eco-nomic theories into his work in a spirit of compromise. He quali-fied his affirmative answer by say-"The artist should not coming: "The artist should not com-plete any work for his client be-fore first submitting a sketch showing approximately what will be the finished idea. He is however exceedingly hopeful and optimistic. On the day of his seventieth birthday he said: "I am happy becaus: I am surrounded with riches worth more than money. in trouble-ridden Austria during recent months has been the talk-ing pictures. Since the advent of the Hitler regime and the foisting of the esthetic ideals of Herr Dokter Paul Joseph Goebbels upon the German motion picture industry, there has been a rapidly diminishing demand for the German prod-uct. Even in Germany, the docile audiences seemed to prefer anything in the way of entertainment to the propaganda vehicles to which the German film producers were restricted by their over-lord, and the films produced in lord, and the films produced : Austria began to enjoy a vogue.

The ousting of Jews from all phases of the industry in the Reich materially aided the Austrian producers, putting at their disposal a wealth of talent previously almost a German monopoly. Ger-many's loss was Austria's gain.

But Austria is, after all, a small country, with a prospective movie audience of insignificant propor-tions compared to that of Germany. And Austria is, as it has meen, dependent on the showing of its motion pictures in Germany for a market great enough to support the industry. Against Austria's 700 motion picture houses, Germany has 5,000. A determining factor in the Austrian movie industry is, therefore, the agree-ment with Germany, governing the quota of Austrian films allow be shown in the latter country.

This agreement, about to expire, has been renewed, the cables re-port, but under conditions which may well mark the end of Austria's bid for artistic supremacy.

Herr Dokter Goebbels was well ware of the increasing popularity of the Austrian motion pictures even in his own well-coordinated land and it irked this arbiter of German culture and thought. Germany's Actions Belie Peace Words

Says Prof. Zurcher Over WEVD-J. W. Wise Asks Jews to Continue Fight

Germany's actions today and the warlike words of yesterday make it impossible for Europe and the rest of the world to take seriously her peace pronunciamentos, de-clared Professor Arnold J. Zurcher in a speech last night over Station MEYD. The speaker, a member of the Department of Political Science of New York University, discussed "Some International As-pects of Fascism." The broadcast was under the auspices of the Foreign Affairs Forum.

- Earlier in the evening, James Waterman Wise, editor of Opinion, broadcast an address over the same station on "The Nazi Assault on Freedom." "We must not forget," he said, "that that struggle is a part of the broader battle to bring about economic and hence human eman-cipation for the masses of all people." Mr. Wise spoke under the auspices of the American Jewish Congress.
