Clumsy Propaganda MOVING picture on "Hit-

A MOVING picture on Tru-ler's Reign of Terror" was banned in Chicago after its first showing at the Ma-jestic Theatre. It is believed that the German diplomatic representatives in this country representatives in this country objected to the showing of this film. It is reported that Dr. Jacger, the German Consul in Chicago, told the Mayor of Chicago that this film should be stopped on the ground that it would stir up antagonism between two riendly actions add. tween two friendly nations, add-ing that "the picture is a fake, that most of it was made in New York and not in Germany."

This is the same film which is announced to have its premiere in New York at the Mayfair Theatre, on April 30. Cornelius Vanderbilt, Jr., and Edwin C. Hill, newspapermen, collaborated in the preparation of the pic-

Several days ago this picture was shown to representatives of the Jewish press. The produc-ers as well as Cornelius Vanderbilt, Jr., and Edwin C. Hill un-doubtedly had the best of intentions. They attempted to ex-pose Hitlerism and its reign of pose Hitlerism and its reign of terror. But the film is so poorly constructed, the case against Hitler is so clumsily presented and the photography in most in-stances is so inferior, that the picture is likely to do more harm than good.

That which is effective in the film is no longer new, and that which is new in it is ineffective. It is an unfortunate piece of clumsy propaganda that will only cause irritation. It fails to only cause irritation. It takes to present the awful tragedy that is being enacted in Germany un-der the Hitler reign of terror,

Misguided "Patriots"

In my editorial entitled "Caution!", on April 11, I referred to the Nazi meetings in Queens and the attempts on the part of well-intentioned but misguided Jews to break up these meetings by force, and pointed out that the violence of the Nazis should not be met with counter-violence, that the violators of American law and order and offenders against public decency should be properly dealt with by the American authorities.

When the Nazis and their syn when the Nazis and their sym-pathizers in this country hold public meetings at which they launch campaigns to "boycott the boycotters of German goods," they are inciting one element of the American population against another. When Americans urge a boycott of German goods be-cause of the atrocities that are committed under the Hitler cause of the atroctites that are committed under the Hitler regime, they are not urging any boycott agains: German Ameri-cans, unless such German Americans are identifying themselves with the Nazi propaganda and with Nazi activities. the Kumanian government, neaded by Premier George Tatarescu, pro-testing the projected law "for the protection of national work." It is understood that this law would exclude non-citizens from many benefits enjoyed by citizens. President Filderman's memoran-

dum pointed out that thousands of Rumanian Jews would be placed in a precarious position by the law, since they had not realized that under the law they must individ-ually apply for citizenship.

The Bessarabian provinces of Czarist Russia, which came under Rumanian rule after the World War, contain large numbers of Jewish residents.

Dr. Filderman also pointed out that these Jews would be deprived of the benefits of citizenship, de-spite the fact that they had been living in the region for centuries.

'Patriotic Front' Seeks 'Elimination of Alien Influence in State'

VIENNA, April 24.—The Patriotic Front, which is composed of
the clerical groups supporting
Chancellor Engelbert Dollfuss,
made public today their program for solving the Jewish question. The communique, addressed to the press, declared that the "Jewish question must be regulated some day in accordance with Austrian culture, eliminating all alien in-fluence in the Austrian state." The statement was signed by Captain Reichel, who is acting as leader of the Patriotic Front under Chancellor Dollfuss.

Although the Dollfuss government has officially disclaimed any intention of changing the status intention of changing the status of the Austrian Jews, or of introducing restrictive measures against them, the Christian Socialist party, one of the mainstaps of the Dollitus regime, under of the Dollitus regime, under he leadership of Dr. Emmerich Czernak, has openly demanded numerus clausus for Jewish students and the withdrawal of citizenship rights from the Jews.

Looks at Social Work Finance From City View

Hearn Declares for Unity in \$500,000 Drive in Brooklyn

Financing of social work should be looked at from the standpoint of the entire city and not of the individual boroughs, Municipal Court Justice Murray Hearn, a vice-president of the Brooklyn Federation of Jewish Charities, declared in a statement made public last night in support of the Federation's current campaign to raise \$500,000 for its twenty-five affiliated societies. Justice Hearn was chairman of the 1933 deficit

"The oneness of the Greater City," said Judge Hearn, "is an important point in considering the future of Jewish social work. The recent two-year study by the Jewish Communal Survey of Greater New York indicated that if the city is looked at as a whole, Jewish institutions are up to the needs of the Jewish population in a number of ways. There is a sufficient number of beds to care for children in institutions, and a sufficient number of beds in Jew-ish general hospitals. If, on the r hand these matters are regarded from the point of view the individual boroughs, we find in some localities a wide differ-ence between the local needs and the actual facilities.

"It is therefore obvious that if the present frontiers of the bor-oughs were rigidly maintained, and guards set up against the in-cursions of residents from other sections, each borough would have to develop, with the growth of its Jewish population, adequate institutions and facilities for handling its problems without outside help The fact is, however, that resi dents in Manhattan, the national center of wealth, have an obligation to take a definite financial re-sponsibility for the welfare prob-lems of Brooklyn."

Asserts Brother

Objects to 'Slandering Memory of Our Ancestors'

A bitter family feud flared up yesterday between two brothers, one formerly prominent in Zionist circles and Jewish affairs generally, the other a converted Catholic who for more than twelve years lived in Germany whence he returned only recently after several months in Nazi prisons.

When Harry Diamant returned from Europe, accompanied by his German wife and adopted son, there appeared to be some differ-ence of opinion on his religious status. When a few days ago a New York tabloid began to ture a series of his articles detailing his experiences in Nazi Germany he was described as faith a Roman Catholic, his racial heritage in part Jewish," Incensed by this characterization Louis Dia-mant, lawyer, of 160 Claremont avenue, wrote to the editor of the Jewish Daily Bulletin, saying in

"I am his older brother. I understand that in the last years b.
H. it was fashionable among the 'cultural' Jews in Germany to vert. My brother and I were born full blooded Jews and were so brought up. If, in his old age, and in this age of advancement, he is hankering after the Pearly Gates and has found this route, if honest and sincere, that is his business, and I have no right to say any thing against it.

"What I do object to, though, is the slandering of the memory of our ancestors, which makes us all the siandering of the memory or our ancestors, which makes us all a sort of half-breed. As I said, we are all pure blooded Jews and there is not a drop of non-Jewish blood in our ancestry, which goes way back to the time 'when the memory of man runneth not to the contrary.' In fact, it strikes two generations of rabbis.'

Charactering his brother's atti-tude as "selfish and hypocritical," Harry Diamant, at his apartment at 545 West 111th street, yester day declared that previously Louis "did not give a God-damn for re-ligion which he considered a curse."

Harry further said that when doubt appeared as to his ancestry he informed the editor of the newspaper which is running his articles, "dressed up" by a staff writer, that both his parents were Jewish.

Mrs. Harry Diamant, speaking intermittently in German to her husband and in limping English to the reporter, added that Louis showed no concern or desire to help when his brother was in Nazi prisons, and had no business interfering now.

It re-mains for the enterprising Fascist leaders of the country to corporate in their organizations the small local groups, among the unemployed, the heavily taxed, the rabid patriots and the general cranks are only too willing to cooperate with any movement which will remedy in part or as a whole their real and imagined complaints. It was from such people that the old Ku Klux Klan received upport a decade ago.

Today in California the Ku Klus Klan has been rejuvenated in spir-it. The terrorist methods of the

organization of pioneers who brought law and order to the west-ern plains before the government could establish adequate protec-tion. The Vigilantes of 1934 have threatened law-abiding citizens, beaten others, and driven the officials of smaller communities to a state of abject fear.

In the Imperial Valley in Cali-fornia, and elsewhere throughout that state, the Silver Shirts have cropped up. In some quarters it is said that members of the Silver Legion are also members of the Vigilantes. If this be so, we have a fairly accurate conception of the ultimate modus operandi of Pelley's organization.
Farther north, in the San Fran-

cisco Bay region of the state, the Liberators hold forth. They are far milder than the Vigilantes. Both, observers say, have become successfully militant under the direction of certain groups of legionnaires (Hitler's original brown shirts were for the most part veterans), and both have drawn heavily upon the membeship of the Ku Klux Klan. The Liberators have Kux Kian. The Liberators have pounced upon the pet peeve of Pel-ley, the "international money changers," as the most statwart plank of a generally inadequate platform. The Liberators are ac-tive in civic reform in all small communities, and gradually they are being recognized as municipal and political powers. They are in many ways anti-Roosevelt and anti-Democrat, and their attachment to all civic organizations, which can give them support at the polls, is touching. Christian Friendship for Jews Is Praised by Rabbi Lazaron

Gottheil Medal Winner Gives Some Do's and Some Do Nots

The following is the second and last of a series of articles by the Jewish member of a good-will trio who toured the country recently and were awarded the Gottheil Medal for distinguished service to Jewry

By MORRIS S. LAZARON would, of course, be stupid and futile to infer that I believe all Jewish students should act as one in social and political matters on the campus. Jewish politics on the campus are just as deplorable as Jewish politics in civil life and also it must be admitted that the same social groupings that divide Christians from Jews divide Jews from Jews. These groupings are to be expected. They are natural. However, there is no excuse for Jewish fraternity students to ad-opt an attitude of snobbishness toward their fellow Jewish students ward their fellow Jewish students in the belief that by cutting them-selves off from association with their fellow Jewish students they will be free from the burden of anti-Jewish prejudice.

What I have said thus far is chiefly by way of analysis. I would like, before I close, to suggest a number of "don'ts" and "do's" which might be of some practical help to our Jewish students in their campus relations. These sugges-tions are neither startling nor new. It might be well to state them however, for they summarize many chats I have had with both Jewish and Christian students and repre-sent what is going on in the student mind.

1. Don't hold in light esteem that thing which is characteristic of the American campus—"college spir-it." Granted that there is a great it." Granted that there is a great deal to be said as to the puerility of many expressions of "college sprit," it is a mistake, I believe, to assume an eir of superiority and alcofness. There are some stu-dents who hold themselves aloof from campus activities, walking in high disdain in a sort of rarified atmosphere as if they would have nothing to do with these petty things. With all of its shortcoms, this thing called "college it" has something to give to each student. After all, the col-lege is a real world and the same effort at integration is necessary in this small world of the campus that is necessary in the larger world of life. Let the student make an effort to identify himself with the life and the movements of the college, never permitting these things, however, to dominate him but realizing that they make for the enrichment and development

of his character 2. Don't ignore sports or extracurricula activities and don't think that you can save the world—or even the college campus, matter-by sponsoring all sorts of

activities I would be the last one to deny the Jewish student, or any student for that matter, a genuine interest in the radical movements of the time. Change is in the air. There is a way, however, in which interest in these things should be man-ifested. Now a situation of this sort can be handled in two ways: one is a quiet, insistent analysis of the situation: the other is fiery denunsituation; the other is fiery denunciation, indulgence in personalities in unrestrained, heated language. Which way do you think would be the wiser way to handle such a college problem? What happened was this: Some of the Jewish students adopted the second method. They not only prejudiced their cause and hurt themselves, but they also fed whatever of latent anti-Jewish feeling there was on the campus. Again let me repeat: It is not so much question of not taking the leadership in radical activities as it is gentlemanliness

and good sportsmanship in the approach to college problems.

3. Don't try to be too friendly with Christian students. Be yourself. Be natural. Don't be apologetic for other Jews with the imgetic for other Jews with the im-plication, so metimes even ex-pressed, "Of course, you know he is a different sort of bread than I am." Stand on your own. Meet is a uniferent sort of bread than I am." Stand on your own. Meet the Christian fellows naturally. There is a great deal of human friendliness that is waiting for the Jewish student of which he often deprives himself by deprives himself by over-anxiety. Restraint will bring the offer of friendship where over - anxiety shuts it off. This cultivation of reserve is a lesson that many of our Jewish students have to learn. On the other hand, don't go around with a chip on your shoulder. Presume a certain amount of friendliness on the part of the Christian

At the present time, when there is so much Nazi propaganda, when German exchange students take their orders from the Minister of Propaganda in Berlin and spew into our country their poisonous hate, it is essential that on the campus there be available sources of information which present the Jewish, the American and the humanitarian points of view Let the fraternities present to the library such books as Mowrer's "Germany Turns the Clock Back" or "The Brown Book of the Hitler Terror," and similar revelations of the terror of Nazism.

Mutual Appreciation

The chief problem that confronts our American democracy is the problem of mutual appreciation. Attitudes of appreciation are much more difficult to achieve today by reason of the tensions brought about by the depression. Yet it is fundamentally true that no group will ride out of this depression on the backs of any other group. I speak primarily as an American and not as a Jew when I say that we do not want to develop in this country the same prejudices and hates which have prejudices and hates which have laid Europe low; for hate does something to a man. The victim of hate is a pathetic figure, but the one who hates is a tragic figure. Prejudices and hate disintendent of the worsonality and destroy grate the personality and destroy the heart which gives them hos-

The Jewish students faces the job of integrating himself in the life of the campus. But the Christion student faces the same job. only the Traces the same job. Only the Two belongs to a minority group; a group against which there is a recognized prejudice. When the Jewish student understands that his integration can be achieved more easily and more happily by being himself, by loy-alty to the best traditions of his Jewish heritage and when he practices that loyalty, he will cease to conceive of himself as a problem. He does not have to relinquish— indeed, he cannot relinquish—his Jewish background and inherit-

Finally, it is well for Jews to realize that while anti-Semitism today is more organized, more pow-erful, more utterly ruthless than ever before in Jewish history, nev er before have Christians risen in such number, so nobly and so pow-erfully to our defense. We make a mistake if we underestimate the number and power of our friends.



Public Library's Jewish Division Heaven for 100 Students Daily

A happy hunting ground for book lovers is the Jewish Division in room 217 of the New York Public Library.

An average of one hundred people per day visit this haunt of peace. Against the exhilarating background of book shelves they forget their daily cares in the romantic history of other times.

The director of the Division, Dr. Joshua Bloch, is lord over this little paradise of books. He is a middle-aged mild mannered man with a keen sense of humor and has a veritable encyclopedia of facts about his department and its

Both the depression and the present racial unrest have affected the division considerably, he in-formed a Bulletin reporter yesterday.

"The existence of a large num-ber of unemployed has naturally increased the reading public," said Dr. Bloch. "There has been a Dr. Bloch. "There has been a marked revival in the demand for long Hebrew and Yiddish novels. They present an escape from the economic problems of the day in settings of other times.

Year of 1933 Important
"Then, too, the year of 1933 has been of tremendous significance in the history of the Jewish people and has awakened a sudden inter-est as to the place of our people in the social, political and eco-nomic structure of society.

"In our collection there are books

in thirty-six languages dealing in all matters affecting the relation of the Jews to their non-Jewish neighbors. By means of this excellent apparatus readers can study and examine all racial, social and religious claims made for and against the Jew.

Medalie Fears Change in Character of Aid Group

"We have reached a point where any further reduction on our budget would not only mean curtailment of many important functions, but perhaps result in a change in the character and objectives of our organization," declared George Z. Medalie in his annual president's report to the Jewish Board of Guardians last night at 99 Park avenue.

: Medalie deplored the lack of funds which has resulted in the inability of the Board to move from its "antiquated quarters," or to provide for retirement of its social workers.

Expressing gratitude to the Expressing of Jewish Charities for its aid, Medalie recommended that the Board emphasize "a preventive program, which is the rather than to spend millions and millions of dollars upon criminals and the effects of crime in later

Dr. John Slawson, executive di-rector of the Board, reported that about 6,000 persons were rendered service by the Board during the past year, an increase of 6.5 per cent over the preceding year.

A report prepared by Mrs. Sidney C. He referred to Lion Feuchtwanger's latest statement in the new volof the Brown Book, containing the list of 800 people murdered er the Hitler regime during the past year, and analyzed the Nazi propaganda machine of falsehood

Mr. Bernstein then enumerated various instances in which the American Government had voiced its protest against foreign governments because of atrocities com-mitted there, and asked why Hitler was now treated with greater consideration than the Tsar of Russia and the Sultan of Turkey were treated when Jews were po-grommed in Russia and Armenians were massacred in Turkey.

He pointed out that the Hitler government was not only persecut ing a portion of its own population in Germany, but was also engaged in activities intended to foment strife and hate among Americans and to undermine democratic American institutions.
