#### An American Lesson

The Declaration of Toler ance, as a supplement to the Declaration of Independence, written into the history of the Pennsylvania Commonwealth, in connection with the application of the Silver Shirts for a certificate of incorporation, is an inspiring gesture which cannot fail to create a wholesome impression at this particular time. Drafted by Richard J. Beamish, Secretary of the Commonwealth, the document bears the signatures of more than a hundred religious, civic, political and economic organizations, and is a perpetual memorial against the organization known as the Silver Shirt Legion and similar un-American organizations.

The text of the "Declaration of Tolerance" contains the following passages:

"We protest against the issu-ance of a charter for either a business corporation or a nonprofit corporation by the Com-monwealth of Pennsylvania to monwealth of remassions any organization whose purpose makes for religious or racial intolerance or hatred.

"We also protest against the issuance of a certificate of authority to any foreign corpora-tion seeking to do business in Pennsylvania, whose objectives either directly or indirectly make for intolerance or bigo-

At the last moment represen tatives of the Silver Shirts withdrew their application for a cer-tificate of incorporation by tele-graph, but the hearing was held and the un-American organiza-tion was effectively rebuked.

In New York, at the Silver Shirt pro-Nazi meetings, envel-opes containing the "literature" of the Silver Shirts are still being sold. These envelopes bear the inscription: "Halt, Patriots! Act to save your home—your family, your country and your constitution." Each envelope, costing twenty-five cents, contains "the Truth about Communities in our Commun ists in our Government, the Alien International Bankers and the Secret World Conspiracy."

And the Silver Shirts ask, among other questions, the following:

"Do you know that forty mil-lions of this nation are living on charity, during a period of na-tural abundance?

"Do you know that charity is being deliberately encouraged, that the resources of all may be depleted and thus the citizenry

### Fire Chief Levy Tells of Thrills; 300 Jewish Firemen In N. Y.

When you've attended four alarms per day for thirty years Battalion Chief Jacob J. Levy admits that the novelty does wear off

"I've always craved excitement since I was a boy," he confessed. prayed for rain—and God sent him a flood."

The Chief, a robust man of fiftyone with a merry twinkle in his gray eyes, is the only Jew to in the United States who holds the position of Fire Chief. Recently fourteen hundred of his friends, fellow-officers and members of the Fourth Battalion which he commands, honored him with a recep-tion at the Great Central Palace on Clinton street. He was pre-sented with a diamond studded gold badge in reward for his thirty years of distinguished service in

the department. In his snug quarters vesterday on the top floor of the fire house on 4 Attorney street the Chief described his feelings on that gala occasion. "Was I excited? I should say not. I'm known as the coolest fireman in the whole decoolest freman in the whole department. Nothing ever affects me. The only trouble was that George Raft, the movie star, showed up and stole the whole spotlight away from me. He cited as an outstanding ex-ample the Standard Oil fire in Brooklyn fifteen years ago which lasted a week. The disaster covered an area of five blocks and destroyed twenty-three tanks containing a million gallons of oil apiece. Another serious fire in the annals of the department was the destruction of the Equitable Building in 1912. The Fire Chief himself was killed and eight others were burned to death. This fire

lasted four days.
"But the most horrible tragedy of all," the Chief recollected sad-ly, "and one that even affected my nerves was the Triangle Shirt Waist fire in 1908 when 147 lives were lost. That one I shall never forget as long as I live."

In reference to the number of Jewish firemen in the city he said: There are approximately 300 of them and 12 per cent are officers. As to their bravery and efficiency. they are equal to any one. In 1926 I organized a society known as the 'Naer Tormid' which means per-petual life. Most of the Jewish boys belong to this association. We supply funds to our sick members and help the families of those who

die in service."

Chief Levy has been listed no less than seven times on New York City's roll of honor. He carries that many decorations to prove that he risked his life in saving others. He made the most startling ladder rescue in the history of the department twenty-three years ago

in a house on Cherry street.

"But the fellow I saved proved to be a maniac," he confessed ruefully. "He had set fire to the house himself and tried to commit suicide. The boys haven't quit kid-ding me about it ever since."

Amount the books advertised are: "The World Secret Government"; "No More Hunger"; "Communism in Germany"; and many others car-rying listoric and current attacks. on the Jews.

In a recent issue of Le Patriote an effort was made on the part of the editors to justify the persecution of the Jews ever since their dispersion from Palestine early in the Christian era.

Le Patriote, so far as can be determined, is patronized by a number of Fascist organizations in Ca-nada and a few in the United States as well as a number of Fas-cist groups abroad. In Canada it has successfully appealed to the Croix de Feu, one of two leading Fascist factions in France with many branches in North America and French colonies; the Blue Shirts, and groups sympathetic to Hitler and in league with the Friends of New Germany. This sharp decrease is attributed to the effectiveness of the boycott.

"The boycott," the statement says, "has proven the most effec-tive means of combating Hitler-ism and since the Trans-Atlantic shipping trade is one of the impor-tant items in the Hitler budget, it is important that it be boycotted

# Jewish Life Reviewed in Latest Cables and Letters

### Lazare Will Be Feted 30 Years After His Death

#### France Forms Group to Pay Homage to Historian

(J.T.A. Special Correspondence)
PARIS, April 10.—To celebrate
the thirtieth anniversary of the
death of Bernard Lazare, famous
French-Jewish historian and poet, a committee has just been formed in France under the presidency of Senator Justin Godard, formember of the French Cabinet.

The work to which French non-The work to which French non-lows as well as Jews are this year paying homage to this champion of fairmindeness in a world of bigorry, is his presentation of the Jowsh side to a Europe that was seething with anti-Semitism. His greatest work, which has immor-tailzed him is his, 'Anti-Semitism'. Its History and its Causes," which he published in Paris, in 1894, and in which he reviewed anti-Semitism from the early days of the Chris-tian era. It was an answer to the persecution of Jews in Russia, Ru-mania and Germany of those days and to the anti-Semitism which began to raise its head even in France at that time and which cul-minated in the Dreyfus case.

It was largely due to the writings of Bernard Lazare, whose works have been translated into all languages of Europe, that the more progressive elements in Eumore progressive elements in Eu-ropean countries began to see the justice of the Jewish side of the story, and that anti-Semitism yielded its place to a more fair-minded attitude toward Jewis. Bernard Lazaro distinguished himself particularly in connection with the Dreyfus case, as he was one of the principal champions of

one or the principal champions of the innocently accused Jew in the French press, and helped to rees-tablish the Jew in French public opinion through his writings.

The famous Dreyfus case of thirty years ago, when anti-Semitism dominated France as Hitlerism does Germany today, has been brought to life again in France by the well-known French writer,

Armand Charpentier, in his new book just published under the title "Histoire de L'Affaire Dreyfus." Although the new work in no way changes what the French have long ago accepted as definite proof of the innocence of the man who had been convicted purely because of anti-Jewish agitation, it brings out many new facts about anti-Semitism in France at the beann-semitism in France at the be-ginning of the present century, when the position of the Jew in France was very much similar to that of the Jews in Germany to-day. The book is based upon reday. The book is based upon re-cently discovered documentary evidence, the Schwarzkoppen files, which add new proofs of the unfair anti-Jewish bigotry of those days and helps to vindicate the Jew in French eyes.

### Reich - Jewish SchoolChildren Keep Sabbath

#### Gov't Order Sanctions Observance of Holidays

(J.T.A. Special Correspondence) -BERLIN, April 11.—A new government order issued here grants the right to Jewish parents to keep their children from attending school on the Sabbath. The Board of the Free Federation for the Interests of Orthodox Jewry issued a circular to all German rabbis calling their attention to the order.

"If parents do not avail them-selves of the alternative and the youngsters attend school on the Sabbath," says the circular, "they will become accustomed from early youth to the complete desecration of the Sahhath.

or the Sabbath.
"The formulation of the government order suggests that it expects Jewish parents in whose life
religion plays any part at all, to
make use of the right to keep their children away from school on the Sahhath.

"We would quote as an example of what should be done the at-titude adopted in a middling town in Hessen where the Jewish population is overwhelmingly liberal. The town consented to keep the children from school. We should urge that the community arrange for supplementary classes for those children who fall back in their school work because of regular absence on the Sabbath."

# In South Spain Until Recently

#### Were Descended From Victims of Royal Edict of 1492

(J.T.A. Special Correspondence)
PARIS, April 10.—Despite five
hundred years of strict enforcement of the laws excluding Jews
from Spain, until recently there
remained in the southern provinces of Spain thousands of descendants of the Jews who stayed in Spain after the Royal Edict of 1492, expelling all Jews from Spanish lands, according to the results of a survey published in the "Cahiers Juifs" of Paris.

These Spanish Jews, who are the direct descendants of that sec-tion of Jewish population of Spain who were allowed to remain in Spain because they openly accepted Christianity, have been conform-ing to Christian faith only externally, but in the intimacy of their homes continued to adhere to Indolem

To the population at large they are known as Christians, as they attend Church and have their chil-dren baptized and comply with all the outward requirements of the Catholic Church of Spain. At the same time they still continue to celebrate the Jewish holidays and identify themselves as Jews among others of their own race.

Have Two Groups
They classify themselves into
two groups: the Black Jews and
the White Jews. The Black Jews
is the name applied to those who
strictly adhere to all Jewish observances, and confess Christianity only as an outward form, while the White Jews observe only parts of the Jewish ritual, which con of a mixture of Catholic and Jew-ish observances, although they, too, acknowledge themselves as Jews among their own.

Centuries of secretiveness in or-der to avoid detection by the Cath-olic Church have left their im-prints on these Jews in their aloofness from the rest of the popula-tion. Some of them occupy high places in government and church, and only rarely does one of them openly confess Jewish descent. The "Cahiers" mentions the case of the Spanish ambassador to the Court of the Czar of Russia. Senor Mendizabal, who when a discussion came up as to titles of nobility, said he could trace his nobility further back than any of the dukes and counts present, for he traced his descent to the Patriarchs, Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob. He was a member of one of the Jewish Spanish families which secretly retained their Judaism for cen-

But Goebbels would make the former city opera Naziland's model. Goering's ire is in-tensified by the fact that the new tensified by the fact that the new head of the city opera, Rode, has started to offer special induce-ments to lure the artists that he covets for his establishment.

Now, while Goebbels is a great propaganda specialist and unsur-passed as a creator of majestic schemes, he has pretty tough sled-ding in materializing his grandi-ose projects, and it looks as though Goering will emerge vic-

In the background of the feud is the Jewish question. Goering, with all his maniacal fierceness, has well-defined ideas on the subhas well-defined ideas on the sub-ject. He considers the Jewish-question a closed incident. The Jews' rights have been limited by law, and within that framework why not let them be? Petty per-secutions, in his view, are un-worthy of the soaring spirit of the Third Reich. For him the National Socialist revolution is over and the era of "enlightened abso-lutism" is on.

Goering appears to be displeased with such deeds of valor as the removal from the stage of Otto Walburg, Willy Rosen or the or-Walburg, Willy Rosen or the or-chestra leader of Winter Garden. Not so with Goebbels, a perpetual revolutionist who won't put down his arms. His is still a merciless and bloodthirsty attitude toward the Jews, who must all be confined in a pale of settlement and begin to engage in petty trade.

### THE READER'S FORUM

Editor. Jewish Daily Bulletin:

In your issue of March 21 there appeared the verbatim report on the budget for the current year of the Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies, which was delivered by Judge Joseph M. Proskauer, the presiding officer, at a meeting of the board of trustees. Certain of his re-marks related to the difficulties Federation has encountered the three years in raising sufficient funds for its work, and to the consequent reduction of service to clients and of salaries to vice to clients and or salaries to employes. But this year, Judge Proskauer says, in view of the in-creased living costs they have "felt an absolute obligation to increase those salaries of employees who receive less than \$2,000 a year. at least in part back to a point where we think they get a living wage."

The report does not give an accurate picture of the effect of the salary restorations, and by implication, casts an unfavorable re-flection on the struggles recently waged by Federation workers in behalf of more adequate wage scales. In order to clarify the po-sition of the employes and the wrong impressions left by the re-, the executive committee of Association of Federation Workers—the organization of Federation employes—has issued the following statement.

The Association of Federation Workers has always stood for adequate relief and service to the cli-entele as well as a living wage for the employes of Federation do not feel that the increase in budget from \$3,100,000 to \$3. 500,000 meets either of these objectives ad quately.

Resident workers in hospitals and institutions are not, contrary to Judge Proskauer's statement, slated for restoration of any por-tion of their salary cuts, despite the fact that they constitute the Artists will release the picture

underpaid and highly exploited group in the employ of Federation. In cases where workers are receiving rescinds, these not commensurate with sharp increase which has taken place in the cost of primary necessities during the past year.

Judge Proskauer, both in his report to the board and in his cor-respondence with Miss Mary Van Klecck, which appeared in the March 12 issue of "Better Times." implied that Federation did not reduce salaries until 1933. This is definitely untrue. Federation or-dered its first cut in January, 1932. and succeeding ones in September and in February, 1933.

While the granting of refunds to employes earning less than \$2,000 represents a partial victory for the workers, the relationship between them and Federation remains essentially the same. They continue to regard the board of Federation as their ultimate employer whose interests, especially on economic issues, are not identical with theirs

The Association will continue to urge the demands put forward last fall, namely, complete restoration of the 1931 salary scale and the resumption of the practice of regular annual increases in all agen-

"Goebbels frowned for a moment and did not answer. I got in another lick for my Jewish friends. 'Can you deny that the Jew is intelligent, often more so than the Gentile?' I asked.

"Goebbels regarded me. 'Perhaps their wits have been sharpened by persecution, he snapped."
