Nazi Cruelty to Jews Moves Edwin Markham to Protest

Venerated American
Poet Cries Out for
'Justice'

"Let there be thunders in the world; let be A protest that will shake the ruler's knee.
Let there be protest till the happy hour
When Justice shall unlothe her arm of power."

"Thus does Edwin Markham, author of 'The Man With the Hoe' speak out, moved by the persecution of the Jews in Germany and by the need for reminding the American people of their traditions of freedom and brotherhood in the face of the oppression abroad."

The venerable eighty-two-year-old poet, regarded as "America's uncrowned poet laureate," has just completed a poem, "A Cry for Brotherhood: A Protest Against Hitler's Persecution of the Jews," which was released to the press yesterday through the American Jewish Committee.

The poem is reproduced in full on another page of today's Bulletin. It describes the racial hatred of the Jews, from the time they "left their old night with Asia in their blood" through all the years the people were in bond-

age, when "Tyre heard their dirge and Babylon their moan." Then a comparison is made between the oppression of old and the modern oppression in Nazi Germany, where "we see again the old hand hand laid on these wretched and blind."

Farms Closed To 'Non-Aryan' German Youth With Union of Maccabib Split Vets in Berlin

Chalutzim Denied Right
to Train for Work
in Palestine

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
BERLIN, April 27.—The Ministry of State in the province of Oldenburg has refused to place German Jewish Chalutzim, undergoing training for work in Palestine, the German Peasants League announced today. The league declared that not a single farmer or gardener would accept Jews for training.

German Jewish youths anxious to shift their occupations to agriculture, and even those youths eager to undergo training for work in Palestine, have encountered bitter opposition by the Nazi regime. Local Nazi leaders have denounced the proposal to place "Jews on German soil."

Jewish Pedagogue
Heckled by Students
in Lithuanian College

KAUNAS, April 27.—Anti-Semitic Lithuanian students of the University of Kaunas today interrupted the inaugural lecture of Doctor M. Guttmann, Jewish member of the school's medical faculty. A demonstration against Dr. Guttmann was carried out by a group of students who yelled, whistled and shouted "beat the Jews!"

Forbidden Sports Contests
in Which Soldiers Are
Entered

BERLIN, April 27.—The president of the German Maccabi Association today issued an order forbidding all contests between Maccabi clubs and clubs owing allegiance to the Union of Jewish Pioneers. The Maccabi Association also ordered its groups not to participate in sport festivals in which teams of the Union were represented.

This drastic step, the Maccabi ruling body declared, is the result of a protest.

Arlosoroff Court Will Quiz Widow at Scene of Murder

JERUSALEM, April 27.—The first week of the trial of the three Revisionist Zionists, Abba Achimeyer, Abraham Stavsky and Zvi Rosenblatt, accused of the murder of Dr. Chaim Arlosoroff, ended today.

The court, consisting of four judges, decided to proceed to the Tel Aviv Sanatorium, where the murder took place, and ask Mrs. Sima Arlosoroff, widow of the murdered man, to give additional testimony at the scene of the crime. The judges will also visit the Jaffa jail in order to determine whether it could have been phys-

Streicher's Drive Is Stirring Nazis Against the Jews

His Paper Promises to 'Reveal Ritual Murders' and 'Plot to Kill Hitler' by the Jewish Kahal

LONDON, April 27.—The new circulation campaign of Julius Streicher's weekly, Der Stuermer, self-described as "the greatest anti-Semitic weekly in the world," is bearing fruit in the fertile Nuremberg area over which Streicher, by virtue of his position in the Nazi party and as member of the Bavarian cabinet, is virtual dictator and overlord.

A Jewish Telegraphic Agency correspondent who returned today from a special tour through the Nuremberg area found gigantic placards posted on all available wall space throughout the old cathedral city announcing the "startling revelations" of a Jewish murder plot directed against Hitler.

Facing the railroad station on all sides the posters attracted much comment among visitors and has led to a "black" or "francisco" kind of stirring them to the high pitch noticeable just before the violent outbreaks against the Jews in Guntzenhausen and other points last month.

Der Stuermer's latest advertising of its sensational May 1 issue announces that twenty pages will be devoted to the paper's "exposé" of Jewish ritual murder guilt and that it will include fourteen pictures of alleged ritual murders.

The ritual murder Kahal "This ritual murder number brings the most basic and most comprehensive proof that the murder of Adolf Hitler was decided upon by the Jews in Kahal (meeting of Jewish leaders) in the advertisements proclaim.

"This ritual murder number," the paper claims, "is the worst blow ever struck against world Jewry. It will excite vast attention all over the German and abroad."

The necessity for this type of propaganda in Franconia where anti-Semitism thanks to Streicher and his years of incessant agitation, is most pronounced, is seen in that, despite repeated warnings and threats, large sections of the population continue to patronize Jewish stores and shops.

Brann Court Condemns Nazi for Espionage

PRAGUE, April 27.—A court which that brutal murder of Professor Theodore, famous Czech Jewish philosopher, at Marienbad last fall was sufficient proof that espionage activities of German Nazis were a menace to the public safety of Czechoslovakia. The court today, sitting in camera, convicted Herbert Schulz, a Nazi party agent. Schulz had been engaged here in spying on returns from the Reich and reporting to Germany the addresses of Jewish emigrants now located here.

Mustering Enthusiasm

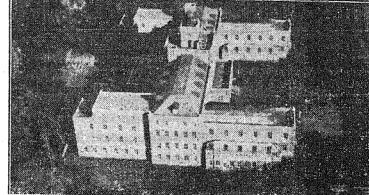
The purpose of such gatherings is, naturally, to muster enthusiasm. How can enthusiasm be mustered? When only the socially privileged get seats on the fifty-yard line? There will, of course, always be cranks who complain about their tables, and certainly someone

has to sit behind the goal posts. But it would seem that the ideas of democracy might be carried just a little bit farther. There are always at these luncheons hard working teams whose captains send in their reservations as early as possible, but who are nevertheless relegated to tables in the far corners of the room.

Is there no way of distributing seats more equitably? This is no quibbling matter. The unfortunate—or perhaps it is after all the fortunate—majority miss a good part of the speeches. This, it is true, not entirely due to their positions. The staidy china, such dishes is in most cases quite loud enough to drown a fire siren. Not that the speakers' voices carry with the blizzard clarity of a fire siren, or, for that matter, with much clarity at all. A great many of them have a distressing habit of addressing their remarks to those seated within a radius of five feet, which makes it rather uncomfortable for those who are not.

Let us sure a national ordinance forbidding the making of speeches while lunch is being served would raise more general enthusiasm than the speeches themselves. Such an ordinance might at least serve to change some people's definition of a woman's luncheon as an affair in which the women eat up most of the hotel china, and someone stands up to speak in order to distract you while the same waiters grab your food from under your nose.

Mrs. Greenebaum Tells of Work For Sick At Irvington House

It was a very charming, dark-haired woman who received a Bulletin reporter at the Hotel Pierre yesterday to tell of her activity in charitable work. She spoke vivaciously, feeling off names like the Irvington House, the Vocational Adjustment Bureau, Federation for the Support of Jewish Philanthropic Societies, Mount Sinai Hospital, Physicians' Emergency Aid with a rapidity born of familiarity and interest.

The woman was Mrs. Fred H. Greenebaum. Her interest in the organization she named can be attested by the single fact that she is chairman of the entertainment committee, vice-president, and a member of the board, former chairman of the membership committee, and member of the executive board, all of a single organization, the Irvington House, at Irvington-on-Hudson.

When she speaks of the House, her face lights up and she goes into detail, describing every phase, every cranny in its history.

Mrs. Greenebaum told the Bulletin reporter how the House started in Mincola fourteen years ago as a place for cardiac children to stay during vacations, how the idea succeeded so well that it was decided to have a winter home, how money was raised and a membership drive was begun and chapters went out, and how, finally, property was bought and a real home was begun, with eighty children cared for. And Mrs. Greenebaum radiated victory as she told of the triumph.

But the triumph was short-lived. Four years ago, the House burned down to the ground. All of the children were saved from the fire. From honors, from the lionable Westchester country clubs, everywhere, aid was offered, and the children were cared for while a new home was being found for them.

And now a few Irvington House with accommodations for 150 small heart sufferers has been built.

"Yes," he the poet continues, "from the trembling lips of many a seer the whole world has heard, and still can hear, the Psalms, the Torah, and the Talmud speak protection for the plundered and the weak."

Finally, in a thundering peroration, Markham demands a vigorous protest from all civilized people: "Protest this cruel wrong! In thunders of the sermon and the song. Let cries go forth in shrill tempestuous note! As if they rose from Tempus's roaring throat."

And he continues with a demand for universal brotherhood, for a cry for universal understanding that shall "be heard on earth and under every sky!"
—Edwin Markham, who was born in Oregon on April 23, 1852, is

best known for his poem, "The Man With the Hoe," written in 1889, which received world-wide attention, being hailed as "the best thing of the next thousand years." He also is known for his poem, "Lincoln, the Man of the People," as well as for his many volumes of verse and his lectures.

The late Richard Wagner, to whom assiduous veneration is the order of the day in Germany, not for any reason which might conceivably appeal to a civilized man, but because of certain barbaric notions he cherished, is currently the recipient here in New York of quite another kind of homage.

Heretobut we have no illusions about the unpleasantness of the late Richard Wagner as a human being. We can do no less, gladly celebrate the artist.

This afternoon in Carnegie Hall there ends a series of three concerts of the Philharmonic Symphony, conducted by Toscanini, and directed at the utterly laudable purpose of glorifying this artist.

Already there have been heard excerpts from "Siegfried," "Tannhaeuser," "Tristan und Isolde," "Lohegrin" and "Parsifal," not to mention one or two other pieces. As solists, Gertrude Kappel, Marion Tetva, Paul Althouse, Hans Clemens, Emanuel List and Richard Bonelli have appeared with the orchestra.

I got no joy from the great prominence given the pietistic "Parsifal," which caused Nietzsche to shy, in deep disgust away from the composer out of whose brain he had hoped to elicit music for his Superman. I was decidedly disappointed in the dragging tempo and odd accentuations accorded the wonderful "Tannhaeuser" Bachian music, where the strings, those transfigured vehicles for Wagnerian imagery, were smothered in the Toscanini conception.

La Kappel, who is no Isolde, and L'Althouse, who is anything but a Tristan, struggled heroically with their task in the Act II love scene, but in vain. They seemed nervous about the business. Miss Tetva sang the Brangane interruption efficiently.

I have mentioned these less-than-happy matters first to get them out of the way.
I have no desire to soft-pedal the admirable "Siegfried" Wald-

wen or the workmanlike Act I and III. "Lohegrin" Preludes given us by Toscanini, nor can I fail to mention the splendid List singing in "Parsifal."
Maybe I expected too much...

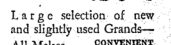

San Francisco Has Oratorical Contest May 13

Religious School Students to Compete; Other West Coast News

SAN FRANCISCO, April 27.—Students of Jewish religious schools in all parts of Northern California will compete in the annual oratorical contest set for May 13 in San Francisco under the auspices of the Board of Jewish Ministers of Northern California.

Plans for this event, which is anticipated with much interest by Northern California Jewish communities, were completed at this month's meeting of the board. The contest will be staged at Temple Emanuel here.

Membership Drive

Plans for an intensive membership drive over the entire western slope will be considered at a conference of leaders of the United Synagogue of America called by Rabbi Elliot M. Burstain of this city, president of the Pacific regional branch of the organization.

The conference will be held in May or June in either Portland or Seattle and will be attended by Rabbi Burstain with Northwest leaders of the United Synagogue movement.

With San Francisco's Jewish National Welfare Fund campaign now past the half way mark, Director Berthold Gugenheim has issued an appeal to all workers to intensify their efforts to bring the campaign over the top and attain the \$400,000 goal.

Dr. Alexander Mellichampe, former president of Amherst College, was one of the speakers at the last luncheon rally of workers.

Speakers Bureau Formed Under leadership of Harry K. Wolf as chairman, a speakers bureau is being formed through the sponsorship of the General Council and the Max H. Hirsch Lodge No. 4 of the B'nai B'rith to augment the work of the coast-wide anti-defamation bureau recently organized in this city.

Hart Will Give \$50,000 To Jewish Charities

Under the terms of the will bequests of \$50,000 each are left to Northwestern University, the Jewish Charities of Chicago and the Max Hirsch Hospital. The bulk of the estate is left in trust to Abraham S. Hart, a son; Mrs. Maxine Hart Spitz, a daughter, and two grand children, James M. Hart and Richard F. Hart.

\$175,000 Is Goal Of Detroit Drive

Allied Jewish Campaign to Be Held From May 27 to June 7

(Special to the J.D.B.)
DETROIT, April 27.—Henry Wineman, chairman of the board of governors of the Jewish Welfare Federation of Detroit, yesterday announced that the sum of \$175,000 has been set as the goal for the Allied Jewish Campaign, to be conducted here from May 27 to June 7, inclusive.

Wineman added that approximately half of this sum will be allocated to German relief funds. He further stated that the board enthusiastically concurred in the budget committee's recommendation, to subscribe all money obtained over and above the goal set to work of relieving the suffering of Jews in Germany and aiding those who emigrate to Palestine and other countries to adjust themselves and become self-supporting in those countries.

"In setting the goal this year, Federation took into consideration many factors, tangible and intangible," said Mr. Wineman. "Foremost among the tangible factors are the budgets of our eight local agencies, the Fresh Air Society, Hospitalization Fund of North End Clinic, Hebrew Free Loan, House of Shelter, Jewish Community Center, Jewish Old Folks' Home, Jewish Unemployment Emergency Relief, and the United Hebrew Schools, whose functioning must be guaranteed if these vital services are to be continued.

"The need for them is recognized. No argument on this point need be advanced. They have proved their usefulness and their rightful 'claim to our support'."

'Fight Hitlerism' German Class Told

Slogan Suddenly Pops Up on University of Washington Blackboard

SEATTLE, Wash., April 27.—Handwriting on the wall—literally—this week caused considerable furry among University of Washington German students. The handwriting, which appeared Friday morning, in large letters chalked on the blackboard of a campus German classroom greeted students with this message, in German:

"Down with the bloodthirsty Hitler! Up, you students, and fight against Hitlerism!"

It was signed "An International Student."

Mrs. O. Torszief, instructor, translated the message to the excited class—and then erased the sign. Monday, in a class recitation on Heinrich Heine, famous German Jewish poet, she declared, "It is too bad Heine and other Jewish writers are condemned in Germany today, in spite of the great contributions Jews have made to German literature."

Jewish members of the anti-Hitler department of the class declared "handwriting on the wall."

Hartford Jewish Women To Adopt Reich Refugee

HARTFORD, Conn., April 27.—Mrs. Julius Hart of New York, a member of the executive board of the national organization of the Council of Jewish Women, and a former chairman of the New York State Conference, addressed the Hartford section in Temple Beth Israel.

The section voted to adopt a German-Jewish refugee between 6 and 16 years of age and finance the transportation to Palestine.

The Last Five

Have I been premature? For the past few weeks I have been sounding the knell of the Spring 1934 theatrical season and after each knell I learn that the next week will bring forth another batch of new hopefuls for the stage. It is beginning to look like a critical compulsion.

For instance, take this coming week. Five plays will get started. On Monday, the Theatre Guild which had its ups and downs, mootly ups, will offer "Jig Saw" at the Barrymores. This piece takes the place of "Races," anti-Hitler play that never got any nearer New York than Philadelphia. On the same evening Sam Charters will offer his "Folianthe," for the fifth week of his Gilbert and Sullivan cycle. Tuesday night the serious Mr. Zlaty will debut as a producer with a revival of Theda's "The Lady From the Sea" at the Little Theatre. "Love Kills" will be offered at the same time at the Forrest Theatre. Wednesday evening the fifth opening will be "Picnic" at the National Theatre.

Picnic Without Ants

"Picnic" is said to be one of those serious comedies. It is the work of Gretchen Danrosch, daughter of the distinguished pianist. She is not exactly a newcomer to Broadway, having written "The Pausing Present," which Arthur Hopkins produced several years ago. "Picnic" is being produced by Arthur J. Beckhard, who did "Another Language," a "family play," the action of which takes place in a New England village. Wednesday the breaking up of an old American family under the social forces at work in modern life.

These Revivals

These revivals are becoming overwhelming. In such profusion to the point where the general public come from producers' offices that it will soon be necessary to go out and revive some of the old theatre-treasures so that an audience can be kept during the next week. Shubert's stated that, beginning May 7 at the Forty-fourth Street Theatre, they would start a series of revivals of once popular musical comedies such as "The Merry Widow" and "Bitter Sweet." Mr. Purcell also organized the Knickerbocker Light Opera Company and plans to follow "The Chocolate Soldier," "The Desert Song," "Dearest Enemy," "Hiss the Deck" and other favorites.

Hardly a healthy sign—hitherto, fertile Broadway never dodged a chance to bring out something of the past. The interest in revivals indicates a paucity of new material for producers or else a fear to take chances. Somebody who can turn out a good musical will clean up by coming back into the past continues.

From the Cinema

The Strand looks as though it had a winner with its "Twenty Million Sweethearts," a picture filled with good music and clever acting starring Dick Powell, Ginger Rogers, Ted Danson and band, and the Mills Brothers.

The Music Hall has held over "Stand Up and Cheer," a hedgehog of its merits not without its faults. The Revue of Adolphe Menjou and Claire Dodd may be seen in "Journal of a Crime" and you may also see in the Embassy the first of a long and longly large birthday cake to commemorate the seventh anniversary of the opening of the gigantic

house. And of course there is, at the Mayfair, the "Hitler Reviol" picture. The Reviol is doing "wax" in "Not Dressing," with Bing Crosby, Carol Lombard, Burns and Allen, Ethel Merman and Leon Erroll. Also featured for the week is Alexander Woolcott in a short, whimsical titled "Mr. W's Little Game."

In the Offing

The craze for historical pictures has struck Hollywood a terrific blow. In the offing is "Richelieu" which George Arliss will do when he gets back from London. After playing a series of Jewish roles, Mr. Arliss should find that of the famous French cardinal a relief! Another picture with historical tinge is "The Affairs of Cellini." This one, in which Fredric March and Constance Bennett will star, is based on Edwin Justin Mayor's play, "The Florentine." Underplata, who will release the picture, deserve credit for changing to a title which will convey a definite meaning. The picture will of course deal with the life of Benvenuto Cellini, sixteenth century man of affairs who by touting his own horn in his famous autobiography has become an immortal. I wonder, though, how many average Americans have ever heard of Cellini?

'Jig Saw' Tomorrow

"Jig Saw," by Dawn Powell, is the name of the play the Theatre Guild will present at the Ethel Barrymore Theatre tomorrow.

The cast includes Ernest Truex and Spring Byington. Featured players are Helen Westley, Elliott Clawson, May L. Norman, Gertrude Plyn and several others from the Theatre Guild's alumni. Philip Moeller is directing rehearsals and Les Simonson is designing the settings and costumes.

Opera Adds Productions

Three new productions will be added to the repertoire of the New York Hippodrome Opera next week. CAPITAL COMMENT

BY NATHAN KOENIG

Secrecy surrounds the activities of certain groups interested in the expansion of trade between Germany and the United States. While no official overtures have been made to the United States government by the German government, it has become apparent that the movement to increase trade between the two nations is being furthered by American business interests. Reports indicate that the approaches evidently originate with German interests.

It appears as if both the United States and Germany could agree to a trade pact. But, there are certain facts which stand in the way of immediate negotiations. These facts are generally recognized by officials and business interests of both nations.

In the first place, there is strong public disapproval at this time against any trade arrangements with the German government as long as that government insists on its highly nationalistic attitude which includes the persecution of Jews and other groups branded as not conforming to Nazi "ideals."

Another fact in the picture is a fear that Germany will partially or completely default on debts due to private individuals in this coun-

try. So far as the United States government is concerned, Germany was unable to pay \$50,000,000 of principal and interest due March 31, on mixed claims and Army of Occupation costs. The German government however was willing to make a "token" payment of \$1,250,000.

Holdings of German securities may be placed in a position where they will press for a trade understanding between the United States and the Hitler government. The German government is understood to be considering a scheme for "stimulating German exports and using part of the increased foreign exchange thus made available to meet interest payments in other currencies." The rest of the money, it is understood, might be used for the purchase of needed goods from other countries. The fact that part of the increased foreign exchange resulting from trade stimulation would be used in payment of interest charges on debts, may encourage holders of German

securities to "lobby" for a trade agreement with that country.

Representative McCormack's Nazi propaganda investigating committee means business. At least that is the impression gleaned from the few guarded statements made by those engaged in the committee's work.

Executive sessions are being held quite frequently by the committee. At present the probers are busy laying lines of strategy along which the investigation will be conducted. In the next few days an announcement may be expected as to who will be the committee's head counsel. Then, after a few executive sessions at which the committee members and counsel will put their heads together, the propaganda inquiry will get into its stride. The first hearing may be held early in May.

Representative William I. Stroh of New York played the role of a New Deal champion when in an hour's address in the House he defended the principles under which the Roosevelt administration is operating and lashed into Congress that this country is drifting towards a dictatorship or towards Communism.

The New Yorker's address was a scholarly piece of work and was highly praised by his colleagues. In the course of his speech Representative Stroh made reference to Germany and the Hitler government which proved quite pertinent to his remarks and drew applause from fellow House members.

German-Americans Worried Here

Fear for Kin Closes Lips of Germans Here

Secret Nazi Police in U. S. Puts Fear Into Many

Nazi activities in this country have been brought to a head by the first open attack on the Jews since the fall of the New Germany. Hitler organization in the United States, which has proclaimed a boycott on the Jews. The following is the first of a series of articles detailing the nature and growth of the Nazi-inspired anti-Semitic movement in this country in all its ramifications. The articles are based upon an exhaustive investigation of Nazi propaganda activities in this country and in Germany for a period of one year.

Already the Nazi terroristic influence has taken hold of the entire German-American community of New York and throughout the country. The German-American community respects the awful influence of Hitler's secret police and concentration camps, and his brow beating is felt in New York as much as in the fatherland.

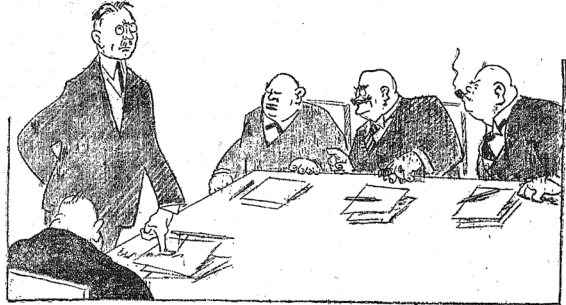
Fortunately, in the past, the many cases of Hitler's subjection of German Americans cannot be given in detail here. I have met German, Jew and New Yorker who are frequently asked why they speak openly their convictions on the Hitler government; and those who have no relatives in Germany are frequently asked why they submit to subjection by threats of American Nazis.

Aboard Nazi Ships

Those who question the truth of these statements I would refer to avenues through which they can secure some corroborations. Board any German steamer shortly before it sails from New York. You will find much Hitler-hurrying among those aboard who are being favored by the Nazi government. Well beyond the range of hearing of passengers and crew you will find a few timid souls whispering their honest opinions and fears of Hitlerism. You will find none, who by so much as a statement from any conversation you might be expected to overhear, questions the power, glory and beneficence of the German character. You will find a German Jew or German liberal living in New York, or to any American, for that matter, who has relatives living in Germany, and he will in him to state for publication his sincere opinion of the Hitler government. You will find here a cringing human being who will beseech you to mention his name if his convictions either in print or in conversation.

That the Hitler government has attained a secret police organization in this country is the conviction of many Germans and German Jews in New York, who feel the effects of it. I am not free to state the names of my informants, but I can give the details.

In the case of, at the very least, ten Jewish members of German

societies in New York, relatives in the fatherland were subjected to severe interrogation at the hands of Nazi secret police, and in some cases arrests were made. The homes of those living in Germany were ransacked by members of the secret police; their correspondents were summarily opened; and they were treated by storm troops, criminal police and National Socialist party agents.

Agents Learn of Words

These incidents occurred shortly after those in America had been quoted in the newspapers as opposing either the policies of the Hitler government or decrying the high budget manner in which Hitler's agents here had taken over German-American society and set up a highly Hitlerized press. In some instances their utterances and attitudes had not appeared in the American press; their words had in some manner been overheard and reported to Hitler's agents.

Thousands of Germans have begged their relatives in the United States to refrain from taking any part in social or political activities in the United States. They ask this because they are being watched, because they have been openly warned that they will be held responsible for any anti-Nazi demonstration on the part of their relatives in America. Most of the letters stating the position of these poor people in Germany are mailed outside the country.

The Scheideman type of hostage-holding is as prevalent today as at any time during the Hitler administration. The practice is carried out quietly and, as ever, the oppressed fear to make outcry.

Secret Nazi Police

Who these secret Nazi police in the United States are is a question that many would like to have answered. It is probable that until now they have been connected with the League of Friends of New Germany. The most authoritative sources of information state that when Heinz Spanknobel, organizer of the American branch of the Nazi party and the Friends of New Germany, fled from this country after the issuance of a writ for his arrest he returned to Germany through Canada and was placed in a makeshift concentration camp in Southern Germany. The concentration camps are under the direction of the Nazi secret party and since the flight of Spanknobel had been in their employment during the latter months of his service in this country.

Intimates of Fritz Gissel, who resigned from the leadership of the League of Friends of New Germany about one month ago to return to Germany "to take part in building up the Third Reich,"

quote the ex-treasurer as saying that he will be given some such job as Spanknobel now has with the secret police. Whether or not he is now employed by that organization and whether he and his men at the head of the Friends of New Germany constitute the communication link between the American Jewry and the German secret police is a mooted question.

Besides silencing German Jewish elements abroad by means of threats and actual punitive measures, Nazis here have attempted to throttle American and American Jewish institutions which have dared condemn Hitler and his administration for their actions. It has recently been the experience of the writer to go over a file of threatening letters which have been compiled over a period of a few months. They have been addressed for the most part to a single Jewish municipal employee, his "fan mail," I am told, averages about a score of letters a week, and they come from literates and slightly illiterate (who express their anti-Semitism with signs and symbols) from Portland, Me., to Portland, Ore.

Many Crank Letters

My conversations with numerous other Jews, both active in public affairs and obscure as private citizens, indicate that none is entirely free from the growing Nazi-inspired anti-Semitism. There are those in which the writers' opinions are expressed in unprintable and incoherent epithets; those of six or eight lines of type-written pages in which the writer's opinions are expressed in length or pointed out with menacing words; those of various; others with nothing but profane pictures and scribbled captions. They are signed by "An Ex-Teacher," "The American Nazi," "Not an Antisemit," etc., etc.

While the messages themselves, 90 percent of which reflect the sentiments of an afflicted Jew, the mental distortions of the writer, the distorter believes that as a whole they indicate the extent of a rising race hatred in the United States. Some identify the source of their anti-Semitic inspiration.

There is, for instance, the clipping from the front page of the "Daily Worker" in which the

Jews are termed "a world pest" (a favorite term of present day anti-Jewish propagandists in Germany) and in which it is declared: "Jews! We warn Jewry! We warn Jewry for the last time!" A note accompanying this clipping is signed "A Silver Shirt," through which the regulation "Do not be inscribed. He warned in part that "Some day you Jews will be held responsible—the time is fast approaching when you Jews will be horseshopped through the streets of New York!"

Another letter referring to the DAWA (the Nazi anti-Jewish boycott organization), says in part: "We ar tru with the Jews no more dealing you only wat in 6 weeks you will se how your business is going to be ol over New York! We stop buying from Jews. Jews hav ruint evrythng tar at the course of this Depresson." One communication, with a clipping from the German Outlook (the English language supplement of the Deutsche Zeitung) is signed by "German American." It ends with, "The future will find you in the camp of your opponents," which from the preceding information appears one might interpret as a concentration camp.

Anti-Semite Trivia

Other anti-Semitic letters are inspired by such trivia as the fact that a Jewish merchant in a small Pennsylvania town ordered a quantity of fixtures on credit shortly before he declared himself bankrupt; quotations from Hitler's "Mein Kampf"; the fact that a little Jewish boy in the Bronx struck a German youth for referring to him in uncompromising terms; the Reichstag address of Adolf Hitler; and a number of statements made by Jewish officials for the general press.

Anti-Semitism grows. With the regimentation of German Americans into Nazi groups it extends its tentacles across the country. In later articles the extent of the Hitlerization of German society is to be discussed at length. At this time it is sufficient to say that the doctrine of intolerance begun by Hitler have been carried to this country, and during recent months Hitlerism has embodied themselves firmly in considerably more than 50 per cent of German America. Not only that, they are being extended to embrace Americans of other extraction.

Ecuador Seen As Haven for Refugee Jews

Kreinin Says Country Is Favorable Toward New Immigrants

(Special Telegraphic Agency) PARIS, April 27.—The council of the Emigré, directed by the Jewish Emigration Committee which is now in session here, will send a commission to Ecuador in South America to examine conditions there and determine whether the country is suitable for Jewish immigration. Dr. M. Frenkel, president of the Emigré, informed the council that the Ecuadorian republic is prepared to submit favorable conditions for Jewish immigration to that country.

The council decided to send a delegation to the Portuguese government to negotiate for the settlement of Jews in Angola, Portuguese West Africa.

At the same time the Emigré council decided to participate with other organizations in the expense involved in sending a commission to investigate conditions in Bureya, proposed autonomous Jewish region in Soviet Siberia, in the event that such a commission is decided upon.

Silver Urges Rabbis Not to Visit Germany Sets Bad Example for Laymen and Aids Reich Exchange

(Special to the J.D.B.)
CLEVELAND, April 27.—Rabbi Arthur S. Silver, vice-president of the Non-Sectarian Anti-Nazi League to Champion Human Rights, has issued an appeal to the rabbis of this and other lands, both reform and conservative, not to visit Germany this summer.

Last summer a number of rabbis went to Germany to inform themselves of conditions there. While they may not be traveling on German boats, rabbis who visit Germany nevertheless support German railroads and hot-els and help furnish the much needed foreign exchange with which Germany hopes to balance its foreign accounts, stated Rabbi Silver.

One of the most important ways of prosecuting the boycott against Germany is by way of destroying its tourist trade and rabbi visiting Germany set a bad example for laymen, he asserted.

It is common knowledge that the rigid censorship within Germany makes it impossible for any man, however alert or inquisitive, to learn much of anything about the true conditions in the Reich during his tourist visit there, concluded the Rabbi.

Austrian Anti-Semitic Press Waxes Sardonic Over 'War Profiteers'

VIENNA, April 27.—A Sarcastic comment by the anti-Semitic press here has greeted the Legitimus Reich issue by the German General Sommer, ex-president of the League of Jewish Front Fighters.

Declaring that the number of Jewish Front Fighters is "obviously inadequate for any organization of consequence," the Sued-Deutsche Tageblatt writes that the proclamation should address itself also to "the many more Jews who have grateful memories of Imperial Austria during the War, who were not front fighters."

"We mean," the paper states, "the Jewish war-contractors and war profiteers. They can be easily won over. It is only the propaganda that has failed to address itself to them. We hope that our hint will be found to be of use. We are not all of us as forgetful as the propaganda of this proclamation appears to be of the existence of the Jewish war profiteers."

Envoys Asks Reich To Protect Swiss

Jewish Citizens Suffer From Harsh Measures of Nazis

(Jewish Telegraphic Agency)
GENEVA, April 27.—Intervention by the Swiss Embassy in Berlin in behalf of Swiss Jews living in the Reich was revealed today in the report of the Swiss Foreign Office for 1933.

The report discloses that the embassy notified the German government that articles of agreement between the two countries must be applied to all Swiss citizens irrespective of racial origin.

It explains that this step was necessary because the "Aryan" legislation had affected Swiss citizens of Jewish origin.
